PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS Her Majesty has been graciously pleased, by Commission under Her Royal Sign Manual and Signet, bearing date at Windsor the twenty-second day of February, One thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, to constitute and appoint me, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, to be Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies: Now I, the Governor and Commander-in-Chief aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that I have this day, at the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, taken the prescribed Oaths before His Honor Sir William Foster Stawell, Knight, the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the said Colony, and that I have assumed the said office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies under and by virtue of Her Majesty's said Commission.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony of Victoria, at Melbourne, this twenty-ninth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seven-nine, and in the forty-second year of Her Majesty's reign.

LETTERS PATENT passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies.

Letters Patent, Dated 21st February

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India: To all whom these Presents shall come: Greeting.

WHEREAS We did, by certain Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date at Westminster the Twentyfirst day of May 1873, in the Thirty-sixth year of Our Reign, constitute and appoint Our trusty and well-beloved Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, to be, during Our pleasure, Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of Victoria as therein described, and its Dependencies; And whereas We are desirous of making permanent provision for the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our said Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, without making new Letters Patent on each demise of the said Office. Now know ye that We do by these presents revoke and determine the said recited Letters Patent, and everything therein contained: And further know ye that We, of Our special grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion, do by these presents constitute, order, and declare that there shall be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony of Victoria (comprising the territories bounded on the west by Our Colony of South Australia, on the south by the sea, and on the east and north by a straight line drawn from Cape Howe to the nearest source of the River Murray, and thence by the course of that river to the Eastern Boundary of Our Colony of South Australia) and its Dependencies (which said Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies are hereinafter called The Colony), and that appointments to the said Office, when vacant, shall be made by Commission under Our Sign Manual and Signet.

II. We do hereby authorize, empower, and command Our said Governor and Commander-in-Chief (hereinafter called the Governor) to do and execute all things that belong to his said Office, according to the tenor of these Our Letters Patent and of such Commission as may be issued to him under Our Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such Laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the Colony.

III. We do also by these Our Letters Patent declare Our will and pleasure as

IV. Every person appointed to fill the Office of Governor shall, with all due solemnity, before entering on any of the duties of his Office, cause the Commission appointing him to be Governor to be read and published at the seat of Government, in the presence of the Chief Justice, or some other Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony, and of the Members of the Executive Council thereof, which being done, he shall then and there take before them the Oath of Allegiance, in the form provided by an Act passed in the Session holden in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second years of Our Reign, intituled an Act to amend the Law relating to Promissory Oaths; and likewise the usual Oath for the due execution of the Office of Governor, and for the due and impartial administration of justice; which Oaths the said Chief Justice or Judge is

hereby required to administer.
V. The Governor shall keep and use the Public Seal of the Colony for scaling all

things whatsoever that shall pass the said Public Seal.

VI. There shall be an Executive Council for the Colony, and the said Council shall consist of such persons as are now or may at any time be Members thereof in accordance with any Law enacted by the Legislature of the Colony, and of such other persons as the Governor shall, from time to time, in Our name and on Our behalf, but subject to any Law as aforesaid, appoint under the Public Scal of the Colony to be Members of Our said Executive Council.

VII. The Governor, in Our name and on Our behalf, may make and execute, under the said Public Scal, grants and dispositions of any lands which may be lawfully granted and disposed of by Us within the Colony.

VIII. The Governor may constitute and appoint, in Our name and on Our behalf, Appointment of Judges, Justices, &c. all such Judges, Commissioners, Justices of the Peace and other necessary Officers and Ministers of the Colony as may be lawfully constituted or appointed by us.

Grant of lands.

IX. When any crime has been committed within the Colony, or for which the Grant of pardons. offender may be tried therein, the Governor may as he shall see occasion, in Our name and on Our behalf, grant a pardon to any accomplice in such crime who shall give such information as shall lead to the conviction of the principal offender, or of any one of such offenders if more than one; and further, may grant to any offender convicted in any Court, or before any Judge, or other Magistrate, within the Colony, a pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any remission of the sentence passed on such offender, or any respite of the execution of such sentence for such period as the Governor thinks fit; and further may remit any fines, penalties, or forfeitures due or accrued to Us: Remission of fines. Provided always that the Governor shall in no case, except where the offence has been Political offenders. of a political nature unaccompanied by any other grave crime, make it a condition of any Provise. Banishment from Colory prohibited. pardon or remission of sentence that the offender shall absent himself or be removed from

The Governor may, so far as We Ourselves lawfully may, upon sufficient cause suspension or removal to him appearing, remove from his office, or suspend from the exercise of the same, any person exercising any office or place within the Colony, under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted, by Us, in Our name, or under Our authority.

XIII. In the event of the Governor having occasion to be temporarily absent for a Governor may appoint a Straight period from the Seat of Government or from the Colony, he may in every such temporary absence from the Colony constitute and appoint Our seat of Government. short period from the Seat of Government or from the Colony, he may in every such case, by an Instrument under the Public Scal of the Colony, constitute and appoint Our Lieutenant-Governor, or if there be no such Officer, then any other person to be his Deputy during such temporary absence, and in that capacity to exercise, perform, and execute for and on behalf of the Governor during such absence, but no longer, all such powers and authorities vested in the Governor, by these Our Letters Patent, as shall in and by such Instrument be specified and limited, but no others. Provided, nevertheless, that by the appointment of a Deputy as aforesaid, the power and authority of the Governor shall not be abridged, altered, or in any way affected, otherwise than We may at any time hereafter think proper to direct.

CIV. And We do hereby require and command all Our Officers and Ministers, Civil officers and others to obey and assist the Governor.

Governor. and Military, and all other the inhabitants of the Colony, to be obedient, aiding, and assisting unto the Governor, or to such person or persons as may from time to time, under

the provision of these Our Letters Patent, administer the Government of the Colony.

XV. And We do hereby reserve to Ourselves, Our heirs and Successors, full power Power reserved. and authority from time to time to revoke, alter, or amend these Our Letters Patent as to Us or Them shall seem meet.

XVI. And We do direct and enjoin that these Our Letters Patent shall be read and Publication of Letters proclaimed at such place or places within Our said Colony as the Governor shall think fit.

INSTRUCTIONS to Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Colony Dated 21st February of Victoria and its Dependencies, or, in his absence, to Our Lieutenant-Governor or the Officer, for the time being, administering the Government of Our said Colony and its Dependencies.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, this Twenty-first day of February 1879, in the Forty-second year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent, bearing even date herewith, We have Preamble. constituted, ordered, and declared that there shall be a Governor and Commander-in-Chief (therein and hereinafter called the Governor) in and over our Colony of Recites Letters Patent, Victoria and its Dependencies (which said Colony and its Dependencies are therein and of Governor. hereinafter called the Colony): And whereas We have thereby authorized and commanded the Governor to do and execute all things that belong to his said office according to the tenor of Our said Letters Patent and of such Commission as may be issued to him under Our Sign Manual and Signet, and according to such Instructions as may from time to time be given to him, under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, and to such Laws as are now or shall hereafter be in force in the Colony. Now, therefore, We do, by these Our Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, direct and enjoin and declare Our will and pleasure as follows:-

Onths to be administered by the Governor.

I. The Governor may, whenever he thinks fit, require any person in the public service to take the Oath of Allegiance, together with such other Oath or Oaths as may from time to time be prescribed by any Law in force in the Colony. The Governor is to administer such Oaths or cause them to be administered by some Public Officer of the

Governor to communicate

II. The Governor shall forthwith communicate these Our Instructions to Our Instructions to Executive Council for the Colony, and likewise all such others, from time to time, as he shall find convenient for Our service to impart to them.

Executive Council not to proceed to business un-less summoned by the proceed to business u less summoned by the Governor's authority.

III. The said Executive Council shall not proceed to the despatch of business unless duly summoned by authority of the Governor, nor unless two members at the least (exclusive of himself or of the member presiding) be present and assisting throughout the whole of the meetings at which any such business shall be dispatched.

IV. The Governor shall attend and preside at the meetings of the Executive Council, unless prevented by some necessary or reasonable cause, and in his absence such Governor to appoint a member as may be appointed by him in that behalf, or in the absence of such member in the absence of the present shall preside; the seniority of the members of the said Council being regulated Governor and President. V. A full and exact journal or minute shall be kept of all the deliberations, acts,

proceedings, votes, and resolutions of the Executive Council; and at each meeting of the said Council the Minutes of the last meeting shall be read over and confirmed or amended, as the case may require, before proceeding to the dispatch of any other business.

VI. In the execution of the powers and authorities granted to the Governor by Our said Letters Patent, he shall in all cases consult with the Executive Council, excepting only in cases which are of such a nature that, in his judgment, Our service would sustain material prejudice by consulting the said Council thereupon, or when the matters to be decided are too unimportant to require their advice, or too urgent to admit of their advice being given by the time within which it may be necessary for him to act in respect of any In all such urgent cases he shall at the earliest practical period commu-

nicate to the said Council the measures which he may so have adopted, with the reasons thereof. VII. The Governor may act in the exercise of the powers and authorities granted to him by Our said Letters Patent in opposition to the advice given to him by the members of the Executive Council if he shall in any case deem it right to do so, but in Reporting the grounds for any such case he shall fully report the matter to Us, by the first convenient opportunity, so doing.

VIII. In the execution of such powers as are vested in the Governor by law for Rules to be observed in assenting to or dissenting from, or of reserving for the signification of Our pleasure, Bills from, or reserving Bills. which have been passed by the Legislature of the Colony, he shall take care, as far as rom, or reserving Bills. IX. The Governor shall not assent in Our name to any Bill of any of the classes

hereafter specified (that is to say):-

Temporary laws.

1. Any Bill for the divorce of persons joined together in holy matrimony. 2. Any Bill whereby any grant of land or money, or other donation or gratuity, may be made to himself.

Description of Bills not to be assented to.

3. Any Bill affecting the currency of the Colony.

Any Bill imposing differential duties (other than as allowed by the Australian Colonies Duties Act 1873).

5. Any Bill the provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon us by Treaty.

6. Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of Our forces in the Colony,

by land or sea. 7. Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance whereby Our prerogative, or the rights and property of Our subjects not residing in the Colony, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its dependencies, may be prejudiced.

8. Any Bill containing provisions to which Our assent has been once refused, or

which have been disallowed by us;

Unless such Bill shall contain a clause suspending the operation of such Bill until the signification in the Colony of Our pleasure thereupon, or unless the Governor shall have satisfied himself that an urgent necessity exists requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation, in which case he is authorized to assent in Our name to such Bill, unless the same shall be repugnant to the law of England, or inconsistent with any obligations imposed upon Us by Treaty. But he is to transmit to Us, by the earliest opportunity, the Bill so assented to, together with his reasons for assenting thereto.

Powers in Urgent Cases.

X. The Governor is to take care that all laws assented to by him in Our name, or Laws sent home to have reserved for the signification of Our pleasure thereon, shall, when transmitted by him, be fairly abstracted in the margins, and be accompanied in such cases as may seem to him necessary with such explanatory observations as may be required to exhibit the reasons and occasions for proposing such laws; and shall also transmit fair copies of the Journals and Journals and Minutes.

Minutes of the proceedings of the Legislative Bodies of the Colony, which he is to require from the clerks, or other proper officers in that behalf, of the said Legislative Bodies.

XI. XIII. All Commissions granted by the Governor to any persons to be Judges, Judges, &c., to be ap-Justices of the Peace, or other officers, shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted

XIV. The Governor shall forward to Us punctually from year to year, through one Bime Book of Our Principal Secretaries of State, such annual Returns as have been customarily transmitted to Us from the Colony relative to the revenue and expenditure, defence, public works, legislation, civil establishments, pensions, population, schools, course of exchange, imports and exports, agricultural produce, manufactures, and other matters in the said "Returns" more particularly specified, with reference to the state and condition of the Colony.

XV. The Governor shall not quit the Colony without having first obtained leave Governor's absence. from Us for so doing under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or through one of Our Principal
Secretaries of State, except for the purpose of visiting the Governor of any neighboring
Colony for periods not exceeding one month at any one time, nor exceeding in the Temporary leave of ab-

aggregate one month for every year's service in the Colony.

XVI. The 'temporary absence of the Governor for any period not exceeding one Governor's absence and month shall not, if he have previously informed Our Executive Council, in writing; of departure from the Colony. Interpretation. said Letters Patent, be deemed a departure from the Colony within the meaning of the said Letters Patent.
