INCENDIARISM NEAR BIRREGURRA.

TWO HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN  
ACCOMPLICE.

WHEREAS about nine o'clock of the night of Saturday the seventh of February last a fire broke out in a log fence on the Ingleby Run, near Birregurra, by which sixteen miles of fencing, five thousand acres of grass, and thirty sheep, the property of Mr. George Armytage, were destroyed, the damage being estimated at £1,000: And whereas there is no reason to doubt but that the fence was set fire to by some evil disposed person or persons: And whereas Mr. Hayes, manager for Mr. Armytage, offers a Reward of One hundred pounds for such information as will lead to the arrest and conviction of the offender or offenders: Notice is hereby given that a Reward of One hundred pounds (supplemental to the reward offered by Mr. Hayes) will be paid by the Government for such information as will lead to the conviction of the person or persons who originated the fire aforesaid. The Governor will also extend Her Majesty's free pardon to any person implicated in causing the said fire (not being the person or persons who actually kindled it) who will give such information as will secure a conviction.
