AMENDED PORT AND HARBOR REGULATIONS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Passengers, Harbors, and Navigation Statute 1865* it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, might from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and frame rules and regulations for the governance and preservation of the said ports respectively, and for the regulation of shipping in the same; and also for the due protection and preservation and for the good government and management of all public wharfs; and might appoint officers to carry out and enforce such rules and regulations; and any such limits, boundaries, rules and regulations, might from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby repeal clauses numbered respectively 86 and 87 of the General Rules and Orders of the twenty-sixth day of January One thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the fourth day of February of the same year, and do frame the following clauses as amended Port and Harbor Regulations to be observed in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

AMENDED REGULATIONS.

Clause 86.—The master of every ship on entering any port in Victoria for which a pilot or pilots is or are licensed; unless such ship or such master is exempt from pilotage by law, or unless there be a licensed pilot on board such ship, shall, until a licensed pilot has come on board, display and keep flying the usual signal for a pilot; and such master shall by every means in his power, consistent with the safety of his ship, facilitate such pilot getting on board, and shall not enter such port without a pilot being on board and in charge of such ship.

Clause 87. The master of every ship which by law is exempt from payment of pilotage shall, on entering any port or harbor in Victoria cause a white flag to be hoisted (below the blue flag mentioned in clause 1) at the main-mast head and keep it flying until such ship is anchored within the port.

The births registered in 1880 were in the proportion of 31·99 to every 1,000 persons living, which was lower than the proportion in any other year of the previous decenniad; was lower by 1·33 per 1,000 than the rate in 1879; and lower by 2·28 per 1,000 than the average of the decenniad.

The deaths in 1880 were in the proportion of 19·18 to every 1,000 persons living, which was a higher proportion than in 1871 or 1872, slightly lower than in 1879, and much lower than in any of the other years of the previous decenniad. The proportion in 1880 was lower than the average of that decenniad by 1·28 deaths per 1,000.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the year was 106·5° on the 20th January, and the lowest was 29·0° on the 18th July. The mean temperature of the year (57·8°) was more than half a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (52·0°) took place on the 30th December, viz., from a maximum of 103·9° to a minimum of 51·9°. The least range (2·6°) was on the 3rd December, viz., from a maximum of 57·0° to a minimum of 54·4°. The mean daily range was 17·0°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29·917 inches) was below the average.

Males and females during the year 1880 were born in the proportions of 51·2 and 48·8 per cent. respectively; they died in the proportions of 53·5 and 46·5 per cent. Children under the age of 5 years contributed 40 per cent. to the total mortality, as against 40 per cent. in 1879; 37 per cent. in 1878; 42 per cent. in 1877; 40 per cent. in 1876; 48 per cent. in 1875; 43 per cent. in 1874; 42 per cent. in 1873; 47 per cent. in 1872; 47 per cent. in 1871; and 45 per cent. in 1870.

The deaths of 222 persons, viz., 114 males and 108 females, of the age of 75 years or upwards occurred during 1880. Of these 124 were between 75 and 80; 63 between 80 and 85; 26 between 85 and 90; 6 between 90 and 95; and 3 upwards of 95, who were aged respectively 95, 97 and 98. Two hundred and twenty-three deaths from external causes—168 of males and 48 of females—were recorded during the year, of which 170 were ascribed to accident, 5 to homicide, 47 to suicide, and 1 to execution. Of the total deaths recorded, 1088, or 21 per cent., took place in public institutions, viz.:—575 in the Melbourne Hospital, 82 in the Immigrants' Home, 33 in the Children's Hospital, 73 in the Alfred Hospital, 55 in the Lying-in Hospital, 79 in the Benevolent Asylum, 72 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 65 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 19 in the Melbourne Gaol, 3 in the Penitridge Stockade, 17 in the Protestant Refuge, 4 in the Homeopathic Hospital, 3 in the Industrial Schools, 1 in the Industrial Home, 3 in the Blind Asylum, 2 in the Protestant and 1 in the Roman Catholic Orphanage, and 1 in the Magdalen Asylum.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 2,088, of which 1,086, or 52 per cent., were of males, and 1,002, or 48 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 1,439 were under one year of age, 383 were between one and two, 138 were between two and three, 79 were between three and four, and 49 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 3,096. Of these, 1,637, or 53 per cent., were males, and 1,459, or 47 per cent., were females; 140 were between five and ten, 91 were between ten and fifteen, 148 were between fifteen and twenty, 212 were between twenty and twenty-five, 199 were between twenty-five and thirty, 227 were between thirty and thirty-five, 246 were between thirty-five and forty, 241 were between forty and forty-five, 261 were between forty-five and fifty, 314 were between fifty and fifty-five, 228 were between fifty-five and sixty, 238 were between sixty and sixty-five, 184 were between sixty-five and seventy, 145 were between seventy and seventy-five, 124 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 98 were upwards of eighty.

In 1880, as compared with the previous year, deaths from zymotic diseases decreased by 104, those from local diseases by 15, and those from external causes by 18; but, on the other hand, deaths from constitutional and developmental diseases increased by 156 and 68 respectively. During the year under review, measles appeared in an epidemic form for the first time since 1875; it, however, caused only 174 deaths, whereas in 1875 it caused 508 deaths. Typhoid fever was less fatal than it had been for many years past, and caused 57 deaths less than in 1879. Deaths from phthisis increased by 89, and those from bronchitis by 53; the mortality from both these causes was much greater than in any previous year. Deaths from accidents were fewer by 28, but those from suicide were more numerous by 12 than in the previous year: the former were above, the latter below, the average. Metria, which usually causes 20 or more deaths annually, was fatal in only 3 cases in 1880, whilst childbirth resulted fatally in 42 cases—an average number. To every 192 children born alive one death of a mother occurred.

1. **River Murray.**—Along the left bank of the River Murray from its source to the point where the boundary-line between the colonies of South Australia and Victoria intersects the same, all land, the property of the State, within a distance of three chains from the ordinary winter level of the river as confined by the said left bank, and as regards the several ana branches leaving and re-entering that river on its left bank, the beds of the same, and all lands of the State within a distance of two chains from either bank of the said ana branches measured from the winter level of the water confined within the said banks.

5. **River Crawford.**—The bed of the River Crawford from its source near Bransholme to its junction with the Glenelg, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the same measured from the winter level of the water within the said banks.

6. **Surry River.**—The bed of the Surry River from the point where it is crossed by the Portland and Melbourne Railway to high-water mark made by spring tides on the shore of Portland Bay, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the same, and from high-water mark at spring tides, as far as the same extends along the bed of the said river.

7. **Fitzroy River.**—The bed of the Fitzroy River from the junction of Hunter's Creek till it meets Darlot's Creek, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the said river.

8. **Darlot's Creek and Lake Condah.**—The bed of Lake Condah and all lands, the property of the State, around the same within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from the contour level at which the waters of the lake discharge into Darlot's Creek, the bed of the said Darlot's Creek, and all lands, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links of either bank of the said creek from Lake Condah to high-water mark at spring tides on the shore of Portland Bay, and from high-water mark as far as the tideway extends along the bed of the said river.

9. *Eumeralla River and Lake Yambuk*.—The bed of the Eumeralla River from its source to the point where it enters Lake Yambuk, and all land, the property of the State, within one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the same, and where there is no defined channel to this river, a strip of land, the property of the State, four chains in width following the general direction of the lowest level between the points where the defined channel is lost and is again re-formed; the bed of Lake Yambuk and of the channel communicating therefrom with the sea, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of two chains from the said channel and lake measured from high-water mark at spring tides in said channel, and on the shore of the said lake.

9a. *Shaw River*.—The bed of the Shaw River from the south boundary of the homestead section of Dunmore to the point where it enters Lake Yambuk, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the said river.

10. *Moyno River and Belfast Lough*.—The bed of the Moyno River from the northern boundary of section 13, parish of Kangertong, to the point at which it enters the drainage channel cut through the Moyno Swamp, the bed of the said channel, till it re-enters the river near Tarrone, and again the river-bed to the point at which it falls into Belfast Lough, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the said river and drainage-channel, the bed of Belfast Lough and of the channel communicating therefrom with Belfast harbor, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of two chains from the said channel and lough measured from high-water mark at spring tides in said channel, and on the shore of the said lough.

11. *Merri River*.—The bed of the Merri River from the point where it enters the village reserve of Woolsthorpe to the point where it runs into Warrnambool Bay, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the same, the said distance to be measured from high-water mark at spring tides, so far as the tideway extends upwards along the bed of the said river.

12. *Hopkins River*.—The bed of the Hopkins River from its source in the Great Dividing Range to Allan's Ford, near Warrnambool, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the same; from Allan's Ford to the point where it falls into Warrnambool Bay, the bed of the river, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of two chains, measured from high-water mark at spring tides, along such portion of the course of the river; also all land, the property of the State, within a circle of five chains radius around the Hopkins Fall, measured from the centre of the said fall.

12a. *Brucknell Creek*.—The bed of the Brucknell Creek from its source to the point where it falls into the River Hopkins, and all land, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the said creek.

13. *Mount Emu Creek*.—The bed of the Mount Emu Creek from the junction of the Trawalla Creek to its junction with the Hopkins River, and all lands, the property of the State, within a distance of one hundred and fifty links from either bank of the said Mount Emu Creek.

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service, and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient. **CHEQUES ON ACCOUNT OF DEPOSITS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

4. Every tender must bear the *bond fide* signatures and addresses of the tenderer, and of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the same in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General, for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount for which the tenderer is willing to undertake the service; and to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient. *CHEQUES ON ACCOUNT OF DEPOSITS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.*

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by "The Local Government Act 1874," the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Wyndham order as follows:—

1. *Penalty on offences relating to the good order of towns, &c.*—Any person guilty of any of the following offences omissions or neglects shall on conviction pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds:—

(i.) Throwing any glass filth dirt rubbish or other matter of a similar nature upon any road footway or public place:

(ii.) Riding driving or wheeling any barrow or carriage upon or along any footpath:

(iii.) Placing any timber bricks or other building materials upon any footway channel surface drain or carriage road without the permission of the local authority having been first obtained:

(iv.) Burning any shavings or other materials upon any footway carriage road or open or public place:

(v.) Leaving any inflammable materials or matter in any public shed or place or on any open space near any building without having first obtained the permission of the local authority:

(vi.) Drawing or trailing any sledge timber or other heavy material upon any footway or carriage road to the injury of such footway or carriage road:

(vii.) Emptying any privy or cesspool or carting away any nightsoil or other offensive matter without a license from and without having given such security as is required by the local authority:

(viii.) Allowing any nightsoil or other offensive matter to be spit or otherwise cast into or upon any road street footway or public place:

(ix.) Allowing the drippings of the eaves of any house to fall upon any public footway:

(x.) Placing any placard or other document writing painting on or otherwise defacing any house or building or any wall fence lamp post or gate without the consent of the occupier or owner thereof:

(xi.) Opening any drain or sewer or removing the surface of any footway or carriage road without the permission of the local authority having been first obtained:

(xii.) Neglecting to clean all private yards ways passages or avenues, by which neglect a nuisance by offensive smell or otherwise is caused:

(xiii.) Rolling any cask beating any carpet breaking in any horse flying any kite using any bows and arrows or playing at any game to the annoyance of any person in any public place; or obstructing any footpath or carriage road whether by allowing any cart or animal to remain across such footpath or carriage road or by placing goods thereon or otherwise:

(xiv.) Throwing or discharging any stone or other missile to the damage or danger of any person:

(xv.) Having any awning on any footway in any public street or thoroughfare not being seven feet clear above the footway, or hanging any goods on or under such awning over the footway:

(xvi.) Blasting any rock stone or timber in or near any public place without permission of the local authority and not attending to any directions in regard thereto given by such local authority:

(xvii.) Furiously or negligently riding or driving through any public place:

(xviii.) Exposing in any public street or thoroughfare (except in any fair or market lawfully appointed for that purpose) any horse or other animal for show hire or sale:

(xix.) Making cellar door or other opening from the footway of any street or public thoroughfare without the consent of the local authority:

(xx.) Any carter plying for hire without a license:

(xxi.) Any carter waiting for hire allowing his cart or dray to stand in any other place than those appointed by the local authority or demanding higher rates than authorised by such local authority:

(xxii.) Plying for hire with any boat not being a steam-boat at any ferry or on any river without a license from the local authority or demanding higher rates than sanctioned by such local authority:

(xxiii.) Discharging any firearms or setting off any fireworks or carrying any fire-arm sword dirk dagger or other offensive weapon within any town or public place without permission from the local authority:

Provided that the provision last aforesaid shall not apply to any justice, or any person in Her Majesty's military or naval service, or any member of the police or other peace officer, or any member of a recognised volunteer corps, or any special constable, or any person actually in pursuit of any felon or offender.

2. *Local authority to make rules for boatmen and carters.*—Any local authority may make such rules and regulations with reference to the licensing of carters and boatmen, the places where they shall stand, the rates they shall receive, the distance they shall be compellable to go, and such other matters as may tend to the public convenience in regard to them as such local authority may see fit.

3. *Builders not to erect scaffolding or enclosures for building materials in the streets without permission of local authority.*—No person without a license first had and obtained from

the local authority shall erect place or set up or build in any public place any hoarding or scaffolding or place or erect any posts bars rails boards or other thing by way of enclosure for the purpose of making mortar or of depositing sifting screening or slaking any brick stone lime sand or any other materials for building or repairing any house or other tenement or erection or for any other purpose; and such license as aforesaid shall specify therein the length of time for which any such hoarding scaffolding posts bars rails boards or other thing when so erected or set up may be continued and shall contain such other directions respecting the same as are necessary. And if any person place set up erect or build or cause or permit to be erected placed set up or built any such hoarding or scaffolding or any enclosed posts bars or rails or any other matter or thing for the purposes aforesaid or for any other purpose without such license or contrary to the provisions and conditions of such license or to be continued for any longer time than is allowed or expressed in such license, then and in any of the said cases such person shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds and also the sum of One pound for every day that the same has been and is set up and continued contrary to the provisions hereof, and the said local authority may four days after notice cause the same to be pulled down and removed and the same and all the materials thereof to be kept and detained until such person pays to such local authority all the penalties incurred by such persons together with the charges of pulling down removing and keeping the same; and if the same be not claimed and the said penalties and charges as aforesaid paid within the space of five days next after the pulling down and removing thereof, such local authority may order or cause the same to be sold by public auction and the proceeds thereof applied according to the provisions hereinafter mentioned respecting the appropriation of moneys arising from forfeitures.

4. *Penalty on exposing articles for sale in public streets; articles may be seized.*—If any person expose for sale any article whatsoever on any footway or outside of any shop window or doorway abutting on any public thoroughfare or street so as to obstruct the public thoroughfare, he shall on conviction forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; and if any article so exposed be not removed within six hours after notice, any local authority or any officer of police or any constable without warrant may seize any such article; and every such article shall be forfeited and sold and the proceeds thereof applied according to the provisions hereinafter mentioned respecting the appropriation of moneys arising from forfeitures.

5. *Local authority or justice may depute constable to inspect slaughterhouses, &c., and remove filth at occupier's expense if he neglects to do so himself.*—The local authority or any justice may authorize and depute any peace officer or constable from time to time to visit and inspect any butcher's shambles slaughterhouse or yard or any house outbuilding lane alley or other place for the purpose of ascertaining if the same be kept cleansed; and such person so authorized shall if it appear that any accumulation of manure dung offal soil filth coal ashes or other unwholesome or noxious matter whatsoever ought to be removed, shall give notice to the person to whom the same belongs or to the occupier of the premises whereon it exists to remove the same; and if at the expiration of four days after such notice the same be not complied with, the manure dung offal soil filth coal ashes or other matter referred to shall be removed by such constable or other peace officer at the expense of the person to whom such notice was given, and such expense may be recovered in the same manner as any penalty inflicted hereunder.

6. *Penalty on building chimney of inflammable materials.*—If any person after the coming into operation of this Act erect or cause to be erected in any city town district or place to which this provision may be extended any chimney or fireplace of timber or other matter liable to ignition or do not place for a sufficient distance some matter or material not liable to ignition between such chimney or fireplace and any material of an inflammable nature or liable to ignition, the occupier of such house shall, on notice from the local authority being served upon him or left at such premises requiring such fireplace or chimney to be so altered as not to come within the meaning of this provision and neglecting after the expiration of seven days to comply with the conditions of such notice, forfeit and pay a penalty of not more than Ten pounds.

7. *Carriage and foot-ways to be set out.*—Upon the extension of any of the provisions of this Part of this Act to any city town or borough in Victoria, the council of such city town or borough, or if there be no such council the Surveyor-General, shall cause to be set out the breadth of the carriage and foot-ways in the streets and public places of every such city town or borough, and shall cause the said footways to be marked by posts at the corners and intersections of the streets; and the carriage and foot-ways when so set out shall be deemed to be the carriage and foot-ways respectively of such city town or borough.

8. *Plans to be laid before Governor in Council.*—Before the Surveyor-General shall cause to be set out the carriage and foot-ways of any such city town or borough as aforesaid, he shall submit to the Governor in Council a plan of the same showing the proposed breadth of the carriage and foot-ways; and thereupon the Governor may by notice in the *Government Gazette* fix and declare the breadth of such carriage and foot-ways and the distance from the outer edge of such footways within which it shall not be lawful to erect any building or fence.

SHIRE OF MAFFRA.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOURTEENTH SCHEDULE.

A Bye-law of the Shire of Maffra, and numbered 2, made under the provisions of the "Local Government Act 1874," for prohibiting and regulating the depasturing of Cattle and Stock within the boundaries of Maffra Township, for the suppression of nuisances, and for maintaining the good rule and government of the municipality.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the "Local Government Act 1874," the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Maffra order as follows, viz.:-

That the provisions regarding impounding contained in sec. 382 of the Local Government Act 1874 be enforced, and that all cattle found depasturing or wandering at large in any of the streets of Maffra, or any of the following roads leading therefrom be impounded, viz.:-

A1. The main Boisdale road from the N.E. angle of Maffra Township to the boundary of Maffra Common.

B. The 3-chain road to Upper Maffra, between Maffra Township and the boundary of the Maffra Common.

C. The road leading past Cameron's up to Sandy Creek Bridge, and thence by Toomey's and Fisher's to the 3-chain road before described.

D. All cross roads connecting these lines of traffic and lying between these terminal points.

That the above order be carried out under the following rules and regulations, that is to say:-

That all residents of the township of Maffra shall be exempt from such impounding up to a limit of 4 head of large cattle and two head of horses, such cattle to be milch cows, and such horses to be horses in use for saddle or draught purposes, and that in the case of public carriers the number so exempted be a team of horses in actual use.

That a condition precedent to such exemption be a payment, half-yearly in advance, at the rate of 4/ per annum for every head of cattle and 6/ for each head of horses so exempted, such payment to be as a remuneration to the officer appointed by the Council as the person in charge of such cattle or horses and hereafter called the herdsman.

When the above fee is paid to the herdsman he shall register each head of cattle or horses, in a book to be kept for that purpose, as exempt from the operation of the bye-law, and in the case of cattle shall place a pitch brand on same, in token of such exemption, and shall give to the person so registering a receipt for the money paid, which shall also be entered in a book to be kept for that purpose, for the information and use of the council.

All calves and foals under the age of 8 months, the progeny of cattle so exempted, shall be likewise exempted.

No bull shall be liable to be so registered or exempted without the special consent of the council.

A muster of all stock so registered and exempted shall take place on a day, of which notice shall be given by an advertisement, at the close of every half-yearly period; and owners requiring exemption for the ensuing half-year are required to present their stock at the mustering yards on these occasions, and complete their registration; and after 3 months shall have run of any half-yearly period dating from the time of muster, the exemption fee shall be 1s. for the remaining 3 months.

The herdsman shall keep an entry of all cattle impounded by him, and present a return of same every 6 months on the day preceding each half-yearly muster and registration, together with the books in which such entries have been made.

The council or the herdsman will not be responsible for any stock so registered and exempted, but it will be the herdsman's duty to see all stock so exempted once in every 3 days; and, in the event of any stock straying outside the above-described limits, to give notice of same immediately to the owners thereof.

The council or herdsman will not be answerable for any damages arising from the impounding of exempted stock by any person owning lands abutting on or adjacent to the above-described streets or roads, or owning lands in any situation whatsoever.

No pigs, goats, or sheep are to be allowed to wander or depasture on such streets or roads; and all travelling stock must move thereover at a rate of at least 2 miles in each hour.

No person will be allowed to remove permanently from the herdsman's charge any stock registered and exempted as above, without due notice of same beforehand, upon receipt of which the owner so removing will be entitled, without further charge, to substitute for each head so removed one other head of stock for the unexpired portion of the registration period.

The council shall have the right of to cause all stock suspected of contagious disease to be removed from such streets or roads; and in the event of any registered cattle or horses dying, the owner shall cause same to be destroyed immediately upon receiving notice, failing which the herdsman shall cause same to be destroyed at the owner's risk and cost.

No entire horse shall be liable to registration or exemption. Violation of the provisions of this bye-law shall render the person or persons so offending liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

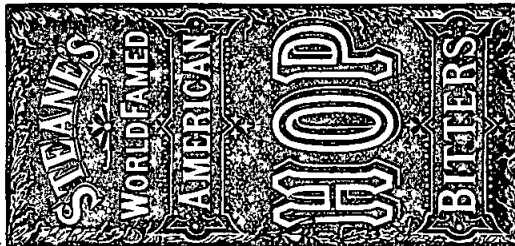
