MARINE BOARD BYE-LAW.

At a meeting of the Marine Board of South Australia, held at the Marine Board Offices, Port Adelaide, on Thursday the seventh day of April in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-one:—

the following bye-law was duly made pursuant to the powers conferred by the Marine Board Acts of 1860, 1873, and 1879: and the Board directed that such bye-law should be substituted for that made on the 20th day of January 1880 and numbered 11, which is therefore hereby repealed:—

No. 11.—LIGHT DUES.

Light dues shall be paid on all vessels (except those exempt under clause 7 herein) according to the undermentioned scale, viz.:

1. If from or to a foreign port ... 4d. per ton register.
2. Sailing ships from or to Australasian ports ... 1½d. "
- Steam-ships ditto ... 1d. "
3. Ocean-going steam-ships calling at an anchorage, en route, to or from Australasian or foreign ports ... ½d. "
4. Sailing vessels arriving and departing in ballast, if to or from a foreign port ... 1½d. "
- Ditto, ditto Australasian port ... ½d. "
5. On ships trading only within the province the following coasting light dues shall be paid, viz.:

"Ocean-going steam-ships" and ships in ballast.

6. Satisfactory proof must be furnished to the Board before the advantage granted above to "ocean-going steam-ships" can be claimed; also, as to whether any sailing ship is in ballast or not.

Vessels exempt.

7. Light dues shall not be charged on the following vessels, viz.:

Her Majesty's ships of war, troop-ships, and transports hired by Her Majesty's Government; but this exemption shall not apply to merchant ships freighted wholly or in part by the Government for the voyage to or from Port Adelaide.

Ships of war belonging to Sovereign Powers in alliance with Her Majesty.

Ships belonging to the Royal Yacht Squadron, and yachts or ships used solely for pleasure, and not engaged in trade or the conveyance of passengers for hire.

Ships outfitting to or refitting from whale fisheries.

Foreign and Australasian ports.

8. All ports other than Australasian ports and the ports of South Australia shall be foreign ports within the meaning of this bye-law; and the term "Australasian ports" shall mean all ports in the colonies of New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, New Zealand, Tasmania, Western Australia, and the Northern Territory of South Australia.

Certificate of Registry to be produced.

9. The masters of all ships for which light dues are charged must, within twenty-four hours after arrival, produce the certificate of registry of the ship at the offices of the Marine Board, or, in the case of vessels on which a quarterly charge is made, at least once in every three months.

Clearance of ships.

10. A receipt for light dues when levied shall be given to every person paying the same; and no officer of customs, at any port, shall grant a clearance or transire for any such ship unless the receipt for the same is produced to him. The receipt for light dues must be exhibited by the master or person in charge of any ship to any officer of the Marine Board, at such time as may be deemed necessary.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the seventeenth day of May 1881.

WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict. No. 506), it was amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council might, from time to time, make Order, amongst other things, altering, for the purpose of adjusting, the boundaries of conterminous municipal districts, being shires, without any petition; and it was also enacted that any error in any Order under the provisions of Part I. of the said Act might be rectified by the Governor in Council by any subsequent Order: And whereas by an Order in Council, bearing date the twentieth day of May One thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, the boundaries of the shire of St. Arnaud were incorrectly described, and it is expedient to re-define the same: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby revoke so much of the hereinbefore mentioned Order in Council of the twentieth day of May One thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine as relates to the Shire of St. Arnaud, and doth hereby re-define the boundaries of the said shire in manner following, that is to say:—

ST. ARNAUD SHIRE.—Commencing at the Avoca River at the north-east angle of the Natto Yallock pre-emptive right; thence by the north boundary of said section to its north-west angle; thence by a direct line westerly to the eastern boundary of the shire of Stawell on the west boundary of the township of Navarre; thence to the centre of the road from Navarre to Wallaloo and following same north-westerly to its intersection with the east boundary of the parish of Wallaloo; thence north by that boundary and the east boundary of the parish of Marnoo to the south-east angle of the township of Korokubal; thence west by the south boundary and north by the west boundary of that township to its north-west angle; thence west by the north boundary of the parish of Marnoo to the centre of the Richardson River; thence northerly by the centre of said river and the centre line of the Avon River to the south boundary of the Witchipool run; thence westerly by the south boundaries of the Witchipool, Laen, Lola, Sheep Hills, and Warracnabeal runs to the intersection of the last-named run's south boundary with the Yarriambiack Creek; thence northerly by the centre of the Yarriambiack Creek to the Lake Goorong; thence round the east side of the lake to its most northern point; thence by a direct line easterly to the junction of Lalbert Creek with Lake Lalbert; thence southerly by Lalbert Creek to its intersection with the north boundary of the Towaninny pre-emptive right; thence east by the northern boundaries of Towaninny pre-emptive right and John Finlay's two hundred and ninety-two acre block to the north-east angle of John Finlay's two hundred and ninety-two acre block; thence magnetic south along the eastern boundaries of John Finlay's two hundred and ninety-two and one hundred and sixty acre blocks and John McColl's block to the south-east angle of the last-named block; thence east to the north-east angle of Bartholomew McKew's block; thence magnetic south along a road to the south-east angle of John H. Draper's block in the parish of Towaninny; thence west by the south boundary of John H. WHEREAS by *The Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict. No. 506) it was amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council might, from time to time, make Orders, amongst other things, to subdivide or re-subdivide any municipal district into any number of

subdivisions not exceeding eight; and every such Order should be published in the *Government Gazette*, and should take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas a petition purporting to be signed by one-fourth of the persons whose names are for the time being inscribed on the municipal roll of the Shire of Benalla has been presented to the Governor in Council, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the forty-sixth section of the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order abolish all previous subdivisions of the Shire of Benalla, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned doth hereby re-subdivide the said Shire of Benalla into three several subdivisions, the boundaries whereof shall be as follow, that is to say:—

CENTRAL RIDING.

Commencing at the south-west corner of suburban allotment 5, section 12, Benalla; thence north by the road forming the west boundary of sections 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16, Benalla, to the Broken River; thence easterly by that river and the south boundary of section D, parish of Benalla, to the west boundary of suburban allotment 1, section 1, Benalla; thence north by that boundary to the north-west angle of said allotment; thence east by the road forming the north boundary of sections 1, 2, 3, and 4, suburban lands, Benalla, to the north-east angle of last-named section; thence south by the road forming the east boundary of sections 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8, suburban lands, Benalla, to the south-east angle of section last named; thence west by the road forming the south boundary of sections 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12, suburban lands, Benalla, back to the commencing point.

PROPOSED SEVERANCE OF AREA AND CONSTITUTION OF A NEW SHIRE.

The petitioners—ninety-one in number—purport to constitute a majority of the ratepayers in the portion of the Shire of Glenelg which is described in their petition, and they desire that the area so described may be severed from the Shire of Glenelg, and constituted a new shire, under the name or title of "The Shire of Normanby."

Area described in the petition:—

Petitioners state that owing to the immense area of country embraced within the boundaries of the Shire of Glenelg it is practically unworkable, that many of the roads within the area described are neglected, and do not receive the attention they deserve.

Petitioners therefore pray that the above area may be separated from Glenelg and constituted a separate shire under the name of the Shire of Normanby, and that the number of Councillors may be nine.
