PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency The Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Licensing Act 1876* (No. 566, section 14) it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time upon the application in writing of the council of any municipality to proclaim any part of the municipal district of such municipality, to be defined by such council, not being a borough having a population of Five hundred persons liable to be rated, as shown by the rate-book, a special area; and it was further enacted that the fee which should be paid for a publican's license in respect of premises situated within a special area should be Ten pounds only; and the Governor in Council might from time to time revoke any proclamation made under the authority of the above

recited section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim as special areas under the provisions of the fourteenth section of the Act above recited the localities hereinafter mentioned, within which the fee to be paid for a publican's license shall be Ten pounds only, that is to say:—

1. The site on which the Lake Boga Hotel now stands.
2. A district comprised within a chain on each side of the main road, between Echuca and Swan Hill for that portion of the said road which lies between the place at which it is intersected by the boundary of the Shire of Echuca, and the Southern boundary of the parish of Murrabit.
3. The said parish of Murrabit.
4. The township of Koondrook.

## LADDERS.

The ladders are to be of red or yellow Baltic fir, free from large or loose knots, and perfectly straight in grain, sound and free from heart and sap. The rounds are to be cleft, of young and fresh hickory, English ash, or English oak, straight in grain, and turned to 1½ inch diameter in centre, and for ¾ inch holes at ends. The sides of the ladders are to be bored to receive the rounds, and the holes are to be tapered outwards, so as to admit of the round being opened and wedged. All the rounds are to well fill the holes, and be wedged with glue into the sides, previously having received a coat of wet white lead. Every eighth round a tie bolt ½ inch diameter with collar at each end 1½ inch diameter is to be inserted below the round with nut and washer at each end, the rounds to be 9 inches apart centre to centre. The ladders are to be finished with three coats of good lead and oil paint, of such color as may be ordered.

The 36-feet ladders are to spread at bottom 18 inches clear between the sides, which are to be 4½ inches x 2½ inches; and at top 9½ inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 30-feet ladders 18 inches clear at bottom, with sides 4½ inches x 2½ inches; and at top 10½ inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 24-feet ladders 16 inches clear at bottom, and sides 4½ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 20-feet ladders 15 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 16-feet ladders 14 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ inches x 1½ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

The 12-feet ladders 13 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ inches x 1½ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1½ inches.

Specification.

Whenever specially ordered, the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron," and of such particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the Locomotive Superintendent, so as to produce a hard, close, soft, or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfections, and are to be sound in every respect and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same, and the contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and clean. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the station nearest to the contractor's works, there to be delivered to the contractor free of cost or carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam-boards. The orders will express the kind or description of casting according to the schedule distinction, and the rates there filled in opposite each item will be allowed accordingly.

The Railway Department will supply all patterns, and deliver the same to the station nearest to the contractor's works free of cost, from whence the contractor must fetch them when required, and when due notice of same has been given in writing. Any pattern lost by the contractor must be replaced by him.

Whenever only one or two castings are required, and they can be moulded from the broken originals, the contractor will be bound to mould from such patterns without requiring the Government to supply a wooden or other pattern for same, and no extra price will be allowed.

All pipes and bends must be moulded in loam whenever required, and a loam pattern made. A loam pattern must be struck up for any casting when a pattern cannot be supplied, and when only one casting or so is required, and when of that simple form that it can be made from a loam pattern; and no extra rate or charge will be allowed for the loam pattern beyond the loam price stated in schedule. The Government will supply all necessary striking boards, but no plates or cramps.

All patterns, loam-boards, &c., supplied by the Government must be returned by the contractor in good order to the Government, with the castings, and delivered to the Railway Stores at Williamstown.

Notwithstanding the delivery of any castings, and a receipt having been given for them, should such castings turn out unsound, not in accordance with pattern or instructions, or in any way whatever defective, or of different quality of iron to that ordered, they must be removed at the expense of the contractor, and other castings must be supplied in lieu thereof without delay and without additional charge.

Should the contractor, in the opinion of the Engineer-in-Chief or the Locomotive Superintendent, fail to furnish work in accordance with the specification, then, in seven days after due notice to that effect shall have been given in writing, the Secretary for Railways shall have full power to re-advertise and re-let this contract to any other person the Board of Land and Works shall think fit; and at the expiration of seven days after such notice shall have been given to the contractor this contract shall become null and void.

## REGULATION UNDER SECTION 110 OF "THE LAND ACT 1869."—SURVEY FEES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the tenth day of January 1882.

WHEREAS by the *The Land Act 1869* power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby rescind the Regulation made by Order of the twenty-seventh day of January 1881, fixing the fees payable for surveys, and doth make the following Regulation in lieu thereof, viz. :-

## SURVEY FEES.

1. The amount of the survey fee payable by a selector shall, for the period from the 1st day of January 1882 to the 1st day of January 1885, be in accordance with the amount fixed by the Graduated Scale and Schedule, copies of which are hereunto annexed, and shall be payable on the order of the Land Officer for the time being of the district in which the land applied for is situated; and the amount of the fee shall be the same to the selector whether the selection be wholly or partly composed of lands previously surveyed or unsurveyed land, except as regards (a) lands specially surveyed and subdivided into lots deemed suitable for selection by the Department of Lands, before being declared available; (b) selections composed of detached portions and (c) selections in the counties of Croajingolong, Karkaroo, Weeah, and Millewa outside the limits of any defined contract survey district. For these exceptional cases the fees shall be as follow :-

(a) When lands specially surveyed for selection by the Department, before being declared open for selection, are taken up in greater or less areas than was intended when subdivided, or so as to necessitate further expense in surveys, the selector shall, in addition to the cost of the original subdivisional survey, also pay the cost of any modification required by him.

(b) When the right of selection is exercised in any detached portions, a separate survey fee, according to scale, will be required for each portion.

(c) Lands situated outside the limits of the contract surveyors' districts, as now defined, will be subject to a special fee for survey, and the amount of such fee shall in each case be determined by the Surveyor-General.

2. All monies collected on the orders of the Land Officers towards the expense of selection surveys shall be deposited by the selectors at the Treasury and credited to an account called the "Survey Fees Account."

3. Accounts passed against deposits placed to the credit of the "Survey Fees Account" shall be signed by the Land Officer ordering the collection of the money, or his successor in office, and shall be countersigned by the Inspecting District Surveyor.

4. In any case where the whole of the fee collected shall not have been expended on the survey of a selection the Land Officer shall report the fact to the Assistant Surveyor-General immediately on certifying the surveyor's account, and such balance as may remain shall be carried to revenue or otherwise disposed of as the Secretary for Lands may direct.

## SCHEDULE TO THE GRADUATED SCALE OF CHARGES FOR SELECTION SURVEYS FOR THE YEAR 1881.

In cases of selections in connection with which only a part of the boundaries or a portion of the areas require to be specially surveyed, the contract surveyor shall be paid in proportion to the work required to be done as follows :-

## For Subdividing a Surveyed Allotment.

- When the total length of the lines required to be marked does not exceed 60 chains, the fee shall be the minimum fee (fee for 20 acres) according to the contract scale for the locality.
- When the length does not exceed 80 chains, the fee shall be the same, or  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the maximum fee (for 320 acres), according to said scale, when the latter exceeds the former amount.
- When the length exceeds 80 chains, the fee shall be half the maximum.
- When the allotment is subdivided by a road the above fees shall be increased by 25 per cent.

## Other Partial Surveys.

- For setting off and marking on the ground one side of a road along a boundary-line of a section already marked on the ground, the fee shall be half the fee for running a subdivision-line of the same length.
- If the plan of a selection can be rendered complete by adding to, or exercising from, a surveyed allotment, the survey shall be limited to the survey of such addition or excision, and the surveyor paid accordingly.
- In cases where some trifling alteration or addition only is required to complete the survey, the amount payable to the contract surveyor shall be fixed by the Inspecting District Surveyor subject to appeal to the Assistant Surveyor-General.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS.**

THE public will be admitted to the gardens subject to the following rules:—

1. The gardens are open from Nine a.m. till Half-past Four p.m. in winter and Six p.m. in summer, except on Sundays, when the gates are not opened until One p.m.
2. No dog will be allowed in the gardens under any circumstances, and any so found will be destroyed, and the owner held responsible for any damage done.
3. Visitors are especially prohibited from teasing or disturbing the animals or birds, also from interrupting the workmen by conversation or otherwise. All enquiries or applications for information on subjects connected with the Society to be addressed to the Secretary at the Society's office, Melbourne.
4. Visitors are not allowed to leave bottles, broken glass, crockery, paper, or litter of any kind in the gardens, nor to light any fire therein, nor to post any bills on the fences, houses, or trees.
5. No cricket, football, swings, or other games allowed within the gardens.
6. Children under 12 years of age will not be admitted within the gardens unless with a parent or other adult, and no person will be permitted to enter the gardens unless decently dressed.
7. Walking across the shrubberies or flower borders, pulling flowers or branches from the plants, shrubs, or trees, standing upon or climbing over any of the fences, climbing trees, or bird-nesting, are strictly prohibited.
8. Cutting names or letters or marks of any kind, or writing on any of the seats, trees, or fences or any building erected for the accommodation of the public, is strictly prohibited.
9. No person shall be allowed in the gardens with firearms, bows and arrows, shanghae, sling, or other such implement. Any person found with such shall be liable to be prosecuted and to the seizure and forfeiture of such implements by any constable or employé of the Society.
10. Entrance into those parts of the grounds which are specially closed for plantation or other purposes is strictly prohibited.
11. Any person found in a state of intoxication, or behaving in a disorderly manner, or creating or taking part in any disturbance, or committing in the gardens any act of indecency, or committing a breach of any of the above rules, may be forthwith removed from the gardens, and shall be liable to prosecution according to law.
12. Admission to the gardens is free on Sundays. On Mondays non-subscribers will be admitted on payment of One shilling for each adult and Sixpence for each child under twelve years of age. On all other days of the week non-subscribers will be admitted on payment of Sixpence for each adult and Threepence for each child under twelve years of age. Members of the Society admitted free.

**SHIRE OF HAMPDEN.**

**REGULATIONS FOR MANAGEMENT OF THE UNDERMENTIONED COMMONS WITHIN THE SHIRE OF HAMPDEN.**

- Camperdown Town Common,
- Cobden Town Common,
- Darlington Town Common,
- Foxhow Town Common,
- Lismore Town Common,
- Pirron Yallock Town Common, and
- Terang Town Common.

In pursuance of the Regulations relating to Commons made by the Governor in Council on the first day of April 1879, the Council of the Shire of Hampden, having drafted the following Regulations for management of the above-mentioned commons, submit the same for revision by the Board of Land and Works and approval by the Governor in Council, in lieu of the Regulations heretofore in force in respect of such common.

*Regulations.*

1. Ratepayers and holders of business licenses or carriers' licenses may respectively depasture on the common within five (5) miles from their places of residence four (4) head of large cattle, or the equivalent of the whole or a portion thereof in small cattle, on the basis that one (1) head of large cattle be deemed equivalent to three (3) head of small cattle. The managers may however, if deemed desirable, increase or diminish at the beginning of any month or quarter the number of stock depasturing on the commons.
2. In the construction, and for the purposes of these regulations, the words "large cattle" shall mean cows, heifers, oxen, steers, mares, geldings, colts, fillies, asses, and mules; and the words "small cattle" shall mean sheep and goats.
3. The scale of fees for depasturing cattle on the commons shall be as follows, payable in advance:—

Name of Town Common.	For every head of Large Cattle.	For every head of Small Cattle.
Camperdown ...	9d. per month	4d. per month
Cobden ...	8d. "	3d. "
Terang ...	9d. "	4d. "
Darlington ...	2s. per quarter	8d. per quarter
Foxhow ...	2s. "	8d. "
Lismore ...	1s. 6d. "	6d. "
Pirron Yallock ...	1s. 6d. "	6d. "

The months shall commence on the first day of each calendar month, and the quarters shall commence on the first day of January, the first day of April, the first day of July, and the first day of October in every year.

4. Sheep will be allowed to depasture on such portions only of the commons as the managers may set apart for that purpose.
5. At the commencement of each month and quarter respectively the herdsman will call on all persons having cattle entered on the common books, and, if the fees are not paid, the cattle of such persons shall within three days of such demand be deemed to be trespassing on the commons, and may be dealt with accordingly.
6. Every person desiring to depasture stock on the commons must deliver a description of the same in writing, signed by the owner, or some person on his behalf, to the herdsman of such common, who will satisfy himself as to the correctness of the same, and give a receipt specifying their description and brands; and immediately afterwards the herdsman, assisted by the owner, or some person on his behalf, shall brand the cattle with the common brand in tar or pitch.
7. No person other than the owner shall wilfully disturb or remove from the commons any cattle depasturing thereon, unless the consent, in writing, of the herdsman shall be first obtained.
8. The managers will not be responsible for any loss of or injury to any cattle depasturing on the commons; but, in the event of any cattle duly registered and all fees thereon paid being impounded in any pound, the herdsman shall pay one-half the pound fees.
9. Cattle affected with any contagious disease will not be allowed to depasture on the commons, and, should any cattle become affected with such disease while depasturing on the commons and registered on the common books, the herdsman shall give immediate notice, in writing, personally, or by delivering, or causing the same to be delivered, at the residence of the owner or owners of such cattle, that if the said cattle are not removed from the common within twenty-four hours from the time of delivery of such notice the owner or owners of such cattle will be liable for all expense incurred in the removal or destruction of such cattle. Cattle found on the commons suffering from any contagious disease, and the owners thereof being unknown, may be destroyed by the herdsman in the presence of one of the managers, and a written description of the cattle so destroyed, signed by the herdsman and witness, shall be forwarded to the constable in charge stationed nearest to the common on which the cattle have been destroyed.
10. If any cattle above the age of six months, in respect of which commonage fees have not been paid, be found depasturing

on the commons, such cattle will be dealt with as trespassing thereon. Pigs and geese found trespassing on the commons will be dealt with according to law.

II. All complaints against the herdsman, must be made in writing to the President of the Shire of Hampden, and must set forth the nature of the charge, and be duly signed by the person aggrieved.

Every person offending against any of the foregoing regulations, shall, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20) for each offence.

A Regulation of the City of Sandhurst, made under the 48th and 49th sections and subdivision 1 of part 10 of the 13th schedule of "The Local Government Act 1874," adopted by Bye-law No. 1 of the council of the said city, for fixing the standings of hackney carriages and of borough stage carriages, and the mode in which such carriages are to stand thereon, and the routes and places of call for borough stage carriages, and the times and succession for the starting and running of such stage carriages.

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#### THE BALLARAT WATER COMMISSIONERS.

BYE-LAW 5, MAKING A RATE FOR WATER SUPPLY PURPOSES.

THE Corporation styled "The Ballarat Water Commissioners" doth hereby, pursuant to and in exercise and execution of the powers and authorities conferred on it by "The Water Works Act 1880," and "The Local Governing Bodies Loan Act 1872," make the following rate for one year from the first day of January 1882, upon all lands and tenements within the Water Supply District of Ballarat, that is to say:—

The rates and charges hereinafter specified are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied otherwise than by measure for domestic purposes:—

On every house or tenement of the annual value of £20 and under, the annual minimum sum of One pound sterling, except for lands where no water is laid on, and on these the annual sum of £5 per centum on the amount of valuation.

On every house or tenement above the annual value of £20, and not exceeding £300, the annual sum of £5 per centum on the amount of valuation.

On every house or tenement above the annual value of £300, and not exceeding £500, the annual sum of £4½ per centum on the amount of valuation.

On every house or tenement above the annual value of £500, the annual sum of £4 per centum on the amount of valuation.

Warehouses and wholesale stores not being domiciles or used in retail business, the annual sum of £3½ per centum on the amount of valuation.

The foregoing Bye-law was made and passed by the Ballarat Water Commissioners on the sixteenth day of December 1881.

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#### B YE-LAWS OF THE WANGARATTA DISTRICT HOSPITAL.

(Incorporated 1870.)

AT a Special Meeting of contributors of the Wangaratta District Hospital, held at Wangaratta on the 8th day of December 1881, it is ordained as follows:—

Whereas it is expedient that the Rules of the Wangaratta District Hospital now in force should be revised and amended, the said Rules are hereby repealed, and the following Bye-laws substituted in lieu thereof:—

1. That the object of the institution be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons, and temporary assistance to any in cases of accident.

2. The institution shall consist of a president, two vice-presidents, treasurer, two auditors, governors, and contributors, as hereinafter described.

3. The committee of management, elected in the first instance by the general body of contributors, retiring annually by rotation of one-third of the oldest members (who are eligible for re-election) shall be re-constructed at the Annual General Meeting of contributors, and shall consist of fifteen members, including the president, two vice-presidents, and the treasurer.

#### QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS.

4. Every benefactor of Twenty pounds or upwards shall be a life governor, and every annual contributor of Two pounds an annual governor, with the right of voting at all meetings of contributors and of having two patients always on the books of the institution.

Every benefactor of Ten pounds or upwards shall be a life contributor, and every contributor of One pound per annum an annual contributor, with the right of voting at all meetings of contributors, and of having one patient always on the books of the institution.

Every annual contributor of Five pounds or upwards shall have the privilege of having three patients always on the books of the institution.

Every executor paying under any will a bequest of Fifty pounds, every person raising a sum of Twenty pounds, any person elected by a public body voting Ten pounds in one year, and any person elected by the committee of management in consideration of special services, shall be respectively honorary governors, with the right of voting at all meetings of contributors and of having one in-patient and one out-patient always on the books of the institution, subject to the approval of the committee of management, and provided always that the funds of the hospital admit of the reception of such patients.

5. No governor or contributor will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription for the financial year has been paid.

6. No person shall vote as a governor while he is a salaried officer, pupil, or patient of the hospital, nor any governor subscribing for the first time, unless his subscription shall have been paid one month previously.

#### GENERAL RULES.

7. The committee of management shall frame such rules and regulations as they may consider necessary for carrying on the ordinary business of the institution, and from time to

time alter, amend, or annul any such rules; but no new rule or regulation shall be made affecting the constitution or privileges of the governors or contributors, nor any scheme for altering or enlarging the scope of the institution or the principles of admission and discharge of patients, except at general meetings of contributors.

#### SPECIAL MEETING OF CONTRIBUTORS.

8. It shall be competent at any time for the committee of management, of which at least five members shall be present, or for nine or more contributors, by writing under their hand, to require the president, or, in his absence, one of the vice-presidents, to summon a special meeting of the contributors. The occasion for calling such a meeting shall be stated in the requisition, and no other business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it was summoned. Seven days' notice shall be given of every such meeting, with the objects for which it was called, by advertisement, in one or more local newspapers.

#### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

9. In the event of any vacancy in the offices of president, vice-president, treasurer, or member of committee during the financial year, the election of a successor shall take place at an ordinary meeting of the committee, or a special meeting of the committee called for that purpose.

10. The financial year of the institution shall end on the thirtieth day of June in each year.

11. The committee of management shall direct the general business of the hospital, enter into contracts, or otherwise provide for the supply of all provisions, utensils, and requirements of every kind, appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants, direct payment of all accounts, meeting for this purpose once a month, and on such other times as they may appoint. The president shall be the chairman of the committee, or, if absent, one of the vice-presidents, and failing these, some other member. The chairman shall have a casting vote in addition to his vote as a member. The committee shall elect from amongst themselves a house committee, consisting of three members, a patients' committee, consisting of three members, and a finance committee of three members. Each committee shall appoint its own chairman. The house committee shall visit the hospital at such times as they may appoint, and as frequently as possible. They shall inspect and report upon the condition of the wards, the bedding, furniture, and utensils, examine the accounts to be laid before the general committee, and generally note any matter of importance for their consideration. The patients' committee shall visit the wards and report to the general committee any matter of interest affecting the patients, and exercise such supervision as may prevent any abuse of the charity in the admission or continuance of any improper case in the hospital. The finance committee shall, before every ordinary meeting of the committee, examine the collector's book, the cash book, and the bank pass book, and present a report to the committee of the present and probable future state of the finances. The committee of management shall present a yearly report of the affairs of the hospital to the General Annual Meeting of the contributors, to be held on the second Thursday in the month of January in each year—such report to be left at the hospital for inspection at least one week prior to the annual meeting. Four members of committee to form a quorum, and ten contributors to form a quorum at the General Annual Meeting.

12. The accounts of the charity shall be audited every year, and be presented by the committee with their yearly report.

13. No member of committee shall be present at the discussion of, nor record his vote upon, any matter in which he is pecuniarily interested.

#### PATIENTS.

14. Accidents and such cases of decided emergency, as in the opinion of the hospital surgeon cannot be delayed, shall be received at any time.

15. Patients able and willing to pay for medical or surgical treatment may be admitted by the patients' committee, but no person shall be admitted as a paying patient unless he or she produces to the patients' committee a certificate from a legally-qualified medical practitioner to the effect that he or she is a fit subject for hospital treatment.

16. Destitute persons may be admitted as in-patients free of charge on producing the recommendation of a governor or of an annual contributor, and making the usual declaration before a member of committee.

17. Persons unable to pay for medicine and medical attendance (or for either), but not requiring admission to the house, may be treated as out-patients on producing the recommendation of a governor and member of committee, and making the usual declaration before a member of committee.

18. No pregnant female, for the purpose of confinement; no child under five years of age, unless for the purpose of undergoing a surgical operation; no person insane or suffering from *delirium tremens*; no person whose case shall be considered by the hospital surgeon to be incurable; nor any one whose disease (in the opinion of the committee) ought not to come within the operation of the charity, shall be admitted into the house; and no person who, in the opinion of the hospital surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an out-patient.

#### MINISTERS' VISITS.

19. Ministers of religion shall have access to sick persons of their respective denominations at all times, subject to the approval of the house surgeon, and in any case where a patient shall desire the attendance of a minister, the house surgeon or senior officer in charge shall at once intimate such desire to the minister.

#### MEDICAL OFFICERS.

20. There shall be one paid surgeon and two or more honorary medical officers.

#### SURGEON.

21. The house surgeon shall be a legally qualified medical practitioner.

22. The institution shall at all times have the prior claim upon his services; he shall be in attendance at the institution every day from 9 a.m. till noon, and not leave until every patient has been attended to, prescribed and dispensed for, and the medical comforts for the day issued.

23. He shall also attend to every patient in the institution between the hours of 7 and 10 p.m.

24. He shall be allowed private practice outside the institution (subject to limitation by the committee) between noon and 7 p.m., provided always that he shall make provision for being communicated with during his absence.

25. He shall receive all certificates from applicants for admission, examine the nature of each case, and decide on its fitness for admission, and shall discharge such patients as he considers fit to be discharged.

26. He shall have charge of all patients in the institution, and their treatment; but if necessary, in case of difficulty or danger, shall request the attendance of the honorary medical officers.

27. He shall perform all surgical operations and *post-mortem* examinations; he shall also give due notice to the honorary medical officers when a consultation is to be held or an operation performed, but in all cases of emergency shall act to the best of his judgment.

28. He shall superintend and control all the servants, and in case of insubordination or neglect of duty suspend any of them, pending the decision of the committee, and if necessary shall hire temporary substitutes for servants so suspended.

29. He shall perform the duties of dispenser, and have charge of all surgical instruments, drugs, chemicals, &c., and make or cause to be made an inventory of the same, and keep or cause to be kept an account of the receipts and expenditure or loss and breakage of such instruments, drugs, and chemicals. He shall give written orders for all medical comforts required.

30. He shall keep all such accounts and make such reports as may be directed by the committee.

31. He shall carry out all regulations made by the committee for the good management of the institution.

#### HEAD WARDSMAN.

32. The head wardsmen shall be subject to the authority of the surgeon, under whom he will direct and control all servants, and will be responsible for the cleanliness and good order of the wards and rooms, and of the outbuildings and grounds.

33. He shall keep an account of all stores, linen, bedding, &c., and enter the same in a book to be kept for that purpose.

34. He shall also satisfy himself that the articles supplied are of good quality, weigh and measure the same, and see that they are in accordance with the contracts entered into.

35. He shall have the wards cleaned up every morning, and see to their ventilation, and shall administer medicine and medical comforts as ordered by the house surgeon.

36. He shall pay careful attention to the condition of the male patients, and report daily to the surgeon, when on his rounds, any change in the symptoms he may have noticed.

37. He shall communicate at once with the surgeon on the arrival of any patient.

38. He shall see that every male patient (unless an order to the contrary be given) has a bath before being put to bed, and thereafter see to his personal cleanliness.

39. He shall prevent the introduction of any improper food or stimulants into the hospital, and report any cases where such practices are attempted.

40. He shall suppress any noise or disturbance in the wards, cause visitors to withdraw after visiting hours, and report to the surgeon any misconduct on the part of the patients.

#### MATRON.

41. The matron shall be mistress of the household, under the direction of the surgeon, and have control of the female servants.

42. She shall provide convenient beds for the reception of patients, and see to their comfort on the day of admission, and during the whole of their residence in the hospital.

43. She shall superintend the cooking and serving of the patients' diets prescribed by the surgeon, shall have control of the laundry and the stock of linen and clothing, and see that all articles are kept properly marked, and have charge of the linen and clothing of patients; she shall see that every female patient has a bath on admission into the hospital (unless an order to the contrary be given by the house surgeon) and see thereafter to their personal cleanliness.

44. She shall visit each ward daily, morning and evening, and see that good order and cleanliness are maintained, and shall prevent the introduction of improper food or stimulants, and report at once to the surgeon any irregularity of the servants or patients.

#### PATIENTS.

45. The patients shall obey strictly all directions of the house surgeon.

46. No patient shall leave his or her bed or ward without permission.

47. No patient shall leave the hospital grounds without obtaining permission from the surgeon.

48. No male patient shall enter the female ward, nor female patient enter the male ward, without permission from the surgeon.

49. Patients and their friends are prohibited from giving money or any gratuity whatsoever to any employes in the hospital for their personal benefit, but the head wardsmen may receive contributions to the funds of the hospital, which will be acknowledged in due course by the secretary.

50. In-patients, who in the opinion of the surgeon are fit for work, shall assist the matron and wardsmen as they may direct.

51. Any patient gambling, smoking in the wards, or behaving in any indecent manner in any part of the hospital premises, will be liable to immediate discharge by the surgeon.

52. Visitors who may be guilty of the above offences, or who persist in supplying liquor or provisions to the patients, or otherwise infringing the rules, will be prohibited from visiting the hospital.

53. Any patient who breaks the above rules may be expelled at once by the house surgeon.

PRESIDENT.

54. The president shall have the general supervision of the external business of the hospital, and shall sign on behalf of the committee all correspondence of importance.

TREASURER.

55. The treasurer shall receive all moneys on behalf of the institution, and shall invest the same in such bank as the committee shall direct to the credit of the institution.

56. He shall sign cheques for all accounts passed by the committee on receipt of a warrant for the same, signed by the chairman of the meeting at which such accounts were passed, and shall hand the cheques to the secretary, who shall countersign before issuing them.

57. He shall keep account of all moneys received and paid, and report the same to each meeting of the committee, and shall present a financial report to the annual general meeting, the same being previously examined by the auditors.

SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

58. He shall convene and attend all special, general, and committee meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings, and transcribe them carefully into books kept for that purpose; and he shall carry out the directions of such meetings in the particulars incident to his department.

59. He shall collect subscriptions to the institution, and in all cases give receipts for such subscriptions, and pay over the same to the treasurer at least once in every fortnight, and render an account of the amount by him received since the last payment, and shall enter into a bond with two sureties of £50 each.

60. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of his department, and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the institution under the direction of the committee.

61. He shall compile all reports that may be ordered by the committee, fill up all cheques, and perform the clerical duties connected with the office of treasurer.

VISITORS.

62. Visitors will be admitted to see patients between the hours of 2 and 5 p.m. daily, subject to the approval of the house surgeon.
