The commander of H.N.M. surveying vessel *Blommendal* has unsuccessfully searched for the reef marked on the chart E. S. E. of the *Gezusters*.

The reef, reported and so named by H.B.M.S. *Seallow*, with 3½ fathoms least depth, was found by the *Blommendal*, which sounded over it, to be of little extent and to have 4½ fathoms least water.

The births of 977 children, viz., 477 boys and 500 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of May. In the month of April 999 births were registered, or 22 more than in the month under review. The births were 171 above the average of the previous ten years, but only 51 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in May numbered 526, viz., 278 of males, and 248 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 451. The deaths were fewer than those in April by 39, but exceeded the average of May during the previous ten years by 60. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been 22 below that average.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was 3.03, and of deaths registered 1.63.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 75.0° on the 2nd, and the lowest was 41.2° on the 14th. The mean temperature of the month (54.6°) was one and two-thirds of a degree above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (27.0°) took place on the 2nd, viz., from a maximum of 75.0° to a minimum of 48.0°. The least range (5.1°) was on the 21st, viz., from a maximum of 58.0° to a minimum of 52.9°. The mean daily range was 13.4. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.074 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 17 days, the amount of rainfall being rather more than an inch and a fifth.

Males contributed 53 per cent., and females 47 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 33 per cent. to that mortality, as against 36 per cent. in May 1884; 34 per cent. in May 1883; 30 per cent. in May 1882; 31 per cent. in May 1881 and May 1880; 39 per cent. in May 1879; 26 per cent. in May 1878; 34 per cent. in May 1877; 38 per cent. in May 1876; and 37 per cent. in May 1875.

The deaths of 28 persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month, viz.:—Those of a female, aged 77, who died of dysentery; a laborer, aged 77, of alcoholism; a female, aged 77, of dropsy; a female, aged 78, of paralysis; a male and a female patient in the Kew Lunatic Asylum, each aged 75; a female, aged 89, of disease of the brain; a female, aged 76, a contractor, aged 78, a gentleman, aged 80, of bronchitis; a female and a farmer, each 78, and a shepherd, aged 84, of pneumonia; a gentleman, aged 80, of hernia; a female, aged 81, of disease of the heart; a merchant, aged 82, of peritonitis; a blacksmith, aged 84, of gangrene of the leg; a female, aged 85, of jaundice; a farmer, aged 86, and a gardener, a male inmate of the Benevolent Asylum, aged 104, of congestion of the lungs; a butcher, also an inmate of the Benevolent Asylum, aged 75, a schoolmistress, aged 75, a gentleman, aged 80, a gentleman, aged 81, a female, aged 85, two dressmakers, aged 87 and 89 respectively, and a male, of occupation unknown, aged 94, of old age.

Twenty-three deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 21 were set down to accident, 1 to suicide, and 1 to execution. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy, aged 9, died of rupture of the urethra, caused by his falling on a beam, across which he was walking; a laborer, aged 32, was killed by a fall of earth whilst at work, and a farmer, aged 36, by a dray-wheel passing over him; a plumber, aged 42, died of fracture of the skull—no evidence how caused; a bookseller, aged 38, of fracture of the skull, caused by a fall down stairs; a shipwright, aged 55, of fracture of the skull, occasioned by falling from a stage in the Graving Dock; a male infant, aged 9 months, of burns; a female infant, aged 8 months, and a male child, aged 1 year, of scalds; a tinsmith, aged 16, of burns, caused by an explosion in a workshop; a female servant, aged 27, and a female, aged 65, of burns, the former through her clothes catching fire; a male child, aged 1 year, was drowned in a tub of water; another child, aged 2, was drowned in a manner not stated; a laborer, aged 37, 2 males, of occupations unknown, aged 40 and 45 respectively; a goldminer, aged 56, a grocer, aged 57, and a bookbinder, aged 63, were found drowned in the Yarra; a female infant, aged 2, was overlain by its mother. The suicidal death was that of an advertising agent, aged 28, who shot himself in the head. The execution was that of a shoemaker—the convict Barnes—aged 45, who was hanged in the Melbourne Gaol.

One hundred and thirteen deaths, or 21 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—58 in the Melbourne Hospital, 13 in the Alfred Hospital, 2 in the Children's Hospital, 7 in the Lying-in Hospital, 8 in the Immigrants' Home, 7 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Austin Hospital, 3 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Infant Asylum.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 176, of which 82, or 47 per cent., were of males, and 94, or 53 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 124 were under one year of age, 30 were between one and two, 7 were between two and three, 8 were between three and four, and 7 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 350. Of these, 196, or 56 per cent., were males and 154, or 44 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 5 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 22 were between twenty and twenty-five, 30 were between twenty-five and thirty, 23 were between thirty and thirty-five, 19 were between thirty-five and forty, 26 were between forty and forty-five, 29 were between forty-five and fifty, 36 were between fifty and fifty-five, 37 were between fifty-five and sixty, 26 were between sixty and sixty-five, 31 were between sixty-five and seventy, 10 were between seventy and seventy-five, 12 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 16 were upwards of eighty.

As compared with the previous month, deaths in the zymotic class fell in May from 112 to 81, and those in the constitutional class from 105 to 98. Under the former head, deaths from diphtheria fell from 6 to nil; those from croup, from 8 to 6; those from dysentery and diarrhoea from 40 to 16; and those from want of breast-milk, from 12 to 6. On the other hand, deaths from typhoid fever rose from 25 to 29; and those from hydatids from nil to 5. Under the constitutional head, deaths from cancer fell from 21 to 14; those from tumor from 5 to 1; those from tabes mesenterica from 6 to 2; and those from hydrocephalus from 9 to 3; but those from dropsy rose from nil to 2; and those from phthisis from 60 to 74. Only 2 deaths were set down as due to circumstances attendant on child-birth, which, according to general experience, is an exceedingly low number. Comparing these with the births (977), a proportion is obtained of 1 death of a mother to every 488 children born alive.

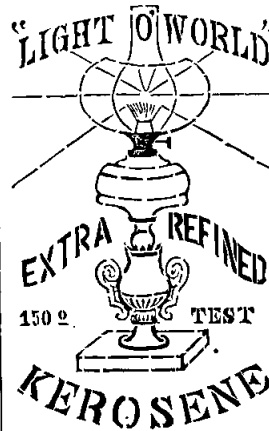
