PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the thirty-first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "*An Act to protect Game*" (31 Vic. No. 311), it is amongst other things enacted that for the purposes of the said Act the term "game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the first schedule to the said Act; and the terms "native game" shall mean and include all birds and other animals mentioned in the second schedule to the said Act; provided that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, at any time after the passing of the said Act, by proclamation to name any other bird or animal which shall be included in such first or second schedule respectively, and after the publication of any such proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, and the expiration of the period mentioned in such proclamation for the time of its coming into operation, the birds or other animals so named shall be deemed and considered as being thenceforward included in such schedule: And it is also enacted that the period of the year during which the said Act shall be in operation as regards all or any of the birds and other animals mentioned in the second schedule shall be from and after the first day of August until the thirtieth day of November in each year, or such other period as the Governor in Council may by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* from time to time direct: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby name the "Ibis" as a bird which shall be included in the second schedule to the said Act annexed upon the expiration of the period hereunder mentioned for the coming into operation of this proclamation, and that the period of the year during which the said Act shall be in operation as regards the "Ibis" aforesaid shall be from the first day of January to the thirty-first day of December in each year, both days inclusive: And, with the advice aforesaid, I do appoint that this my proclamation shall come into operation upon the fifteenth day of March, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

The births of 1,021 children, viz., 535 boys and 486 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of January. In the month of December, 963 births were registered, or 58 more than in the month under review. The births were 259 above the average of the previous ten years, but only 96 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in January numbered 783, viz., 403 of males and 380 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 238, or 30 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in December by 18, but exceeded the average of January during the previous ten years by 250. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have exceeded the average of those ten years by 136.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was 2.96, and of deaths registered 2.27.

The highest temperature in the shade, recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 100.0° on the 5th, and the lowest was 48.3° on the 12th. The mean temperature of the month (68.0°) was nearly three degrees above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (36.1°) took place on the 15th, viz., from a maximum of 93.0° to a minimum of 56.9°. The least range (6.6°) was on the 6th, viz., from a maximum of 63.6° to a minimum of 57.0°. The mean daily range was 20.4°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.265 inches on the 12th, and the lowest was 29.398 inches on the 31st. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.885 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on 10 days, the amount of rainfall being 4.54 inches.

Males contributed 51 per cent., and females 49 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 54 per cent. to that mortality, as against 48 per cent. in January 1885, 44 per cent. in January 1884, 48 per cent. in January 1883, 49 per cent. in January 1882, 45 per cent. in January 1881, 43 per cent. in January 1880, 44 per cent. in January 1879, 47 per cent. in January 1878, 49 per cent. in January 1877, and 52 per cent. in January 1876.

Twenty-six persons died during the month who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years. Of these:—A librarian, aged 77, and a female, aged 78, died of typhoid fever; an ironmoulder and a bootmaker, each aged 75, a female, aged 76, and a groom, aged 77, of heart disease; a bootmaker, aged 76, a gentleman, aged 77, and a bootmaker, aged 86, of apoplexy; a clergyman and a female, each aged 77, a cabinetmaker, aged 78, and a female, aged 81, of paralysis; a laborer, aged 79, of congestion of the lungs; a seaman, aged 85, of Bright's disease; a laborer, aged 75, a female, aged 76, a carpenter and a toolmaker, each aged 79, a female, aged 80, a carpenter, a blacksmith, and a female, each aged 82, a female, aged 85, a female, aged 86, and a laborer, aged 87, of old age.

Thirty-six deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 30 were set down to accident, 1 to homicide, 4 to suicide, and 1 to execution. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A shunter on the Victorian Railways, aged 28, died of internal injuries, caused by being crushed between the buffers of two trucks; a contractor, aged 35, was killed by the upsetting of a trolley; a carpenter, aged 66, and an engine-driver, aged 70, were passed over by trains. A stevedore laborer, aged 37, died of internal injuries received whilst engaged in unloading a ship's cargo; a laborer, aged 41, of injury to the knee, being struck by an iron girder on board ship; a cab proprietor, aged 40, of fracture of the skull, resulting from a fall from a horse; a female, aged 52, of fracture of ribs, through falling out of bed; a draper, aged 55, of injury to the head, through falling from a buggy; a laborer, aged 58, of fracture of the skull, through falling from a scaffold; a mariner, aged 60, of injury to the head, through falling on board ship; and a carter, aged 53, of fracture of thigh and other injuries, through being knocked down by a horse and dray. A female, aged 60, died of a gunshot wound in the head; a girl, aged 14, of burns, through her clothes catching fire; a storeman, aged 26, was burnt to death during a fire at Jones' Bonded Store; a girl, aged 14, a farrier, aged 23, and a laborer, aged 47, died of sunstroke; and a doctor of medicine, aged 24, was poisoned with chloroform. Two boys, aged 10 and 13 respectively, a clerk, aged 16, and a youth and a laborer, each aged 17, were drowned whilst bathing; a laborer, aged 20, a cook, aged 38, a compositor, aged 40, a farmer, aged 60, were found drowned in the River Yarra; a female infant was suffocated at birth; and a female, aged 50, was choked whilst eating food. The homicidal death was that of a girl, aged 8, who was murdered by her mother and sisters. Of the suicidal deaths, a groom, aged 21, shot himself; a cellarman, aged 28, cut his throat; two laborers, aged 45 and 46 respectively, drowned themselves. The execution was that of a seaman, aged 40, who was hanged in the Melbourne Gaol.

One hundred and eight deaths, or 14 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—55 in the Melbourne Hospital, 14 in the Alfred Hospital, 1 in the Homœopathic Hospital, 5 in the Children's Hospital, 3 in the Lying-in Hospital, 6 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 5 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the Austin Hospital, 4 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Infant Asylum, and 1 in the Protestant Refuge.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 419, of which 207, or 49 per cent., were of males, and 212, or 51 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 334 were under one year of age, 69 were between one and two, 8 were between two and three, 7 were between three and four, and 1 was between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 364. Of these, 196, or 54 per cent., were males, and 168, or 46 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 13 were between ten and fifteen, 19 were between fifteen and twenty, 31 were between twenty and twenty-five, 29 were between twenty-five and thirty, 32 were between thirty and thirty-five, 24 were between thirty-five and forty, 20 were between forty and forty-five, 32 were between forty-five and fifty, 44 were between fifty and fifty-five, 28 were between fifty-five and sixty, 24 were between sixty and sixty-five, 13 were between sixty-five and seventy, 17 were between seventy and seventy-five, 16 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 10 were upwards of eighty.

As compared with the experience of the previous month, deaths from whooping-cough rose from 4 to 15, and those from typhoid fever from 22 to 29. The mortality from dysentery and diarrhoea, however, slightly declined, deaths from those complaints having fallen from 154 to 133, whilst those from cholera fell from 10 to 5. Six deaths of mothers during or shortly after childbearing took place during the month, as against as many as 13 in December. Comparing these numbers with the births registered, it follows that 1 death of a mother took place in January to every 170 children born alive, as against 1 to every 73 in December.

WHEREAS by the Land Act 1884 it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council should have power from time to time to make rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following Regulations, viz.:-

Regulations—License Liens.

1. The holder of a registered license lien under section 57 of the Land Act 1884 may apply to transfer such license lien to any other person upon the following conditions, viz.:-
2. That all rents or fees due to date have been paid.
3. Applications to register transfer of license liens shall be made upon the form prescribed in Schedule A hereto, accompanied by a statement in the form prescribed by Schedule B hereto, signed by the licensee, acknowledging his indebtedness to still exist to the amount set forth by the license lien.
4. No transfer of a license lien shall be of any effect until the same shall have been registered in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

6. The fee for registration of the transfer of a license lien shall be One pound.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE PORT MELBOURNE CRICKET AND RECREATION RESERVE.

WE, Thomas Swallow, Frederick Thomas Derham, Alexander McPetric, John Finlay Malcolmson, and William Henry Swallow, the duly appointed Committee of Management of that portion of the Reserve for Public purposes in the City of Melbourne and suburbs, permissively occupied by the Port Melbourne Cricket Club for cricket and other purposes of public recreation, and known as and hereinafter designated the "Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve," having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, and also for the collection and receipt of tolls, entrance fees, or other charges for entering therein or thereupon, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works to be made by such Board in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 133 of *The Land Act 1884*:—

Regulations.

1. The Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve shall be parcelled out into the following divisions:—
1st. The pavilion, grand stand, members' and ladies' reserves.
2nd. The playing ground.
3rd. The remainder of the reserve.

2. All persons shall be admitted to the third division free of charge from sunrise to sunset, except on days whereon important cricket and football matches shall be played, and on days on which sports shall be held in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve.

3. No person shall enter at any time into any part of the first division except on production of a ticket issued by the committee of management duly authorizing such person in that behalf.

4. All persons paying for admission to the third division, or any part thereof, shall be supplied with a ticket of admission, which they shall upon demand produce, and, if required, surrender to any gatekeeper or other person having authority from the committee of management to demand the production or surrender of the same.

5. Persons renting or hiring for any cricket match or other event any booth or other erection in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve shall abide by any order given by the committee of management in reference thereto, or to the buildings or other erections for the time being thereon.

6. No person shall enter or remain in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.

7. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, or flowers in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein.

8. No person shall climb or jump over the fence or gates, stick bills thereon, or cut names on or damage the fences, trees, or seats, or roll or throw stones in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve.

9. No person shall put in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve any cattle, sheep, goats, or pigs, or bring any dog therein, unless led by a chain or cord, without the authority, in writing, of the committee of management.

10. No person shall erect any dwelling in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve, nor any booth or other structure, for the purpose of offering for sale any article, without the consent, in writing, of the committee of management first obtained.

11. No person, except laborers and workmen employed in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.

12. Any person committing in the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve, or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences shall be liable to be removed from the Port Melbourne Cricket and Recreation Reserve, notwithstanding such person may have purchased and shall or may be in possession of a ticket of admission thereto, or to any part thereof:—

(1.) Assaulting any other person.

(2.) Being drunk.

(3.) Crossing or trespassing upon the playing ground during a cricket match, or sports, or during practice at cricket, or when crossing or trespassing upon the ground would be injurious to it as a cricket ground.

(4.) Using profane, indecent, or obscene language.

(5.) Using any threatening, abusive, or insulting words.

(6.) Behaving improperly or riotously.

(7.) Being found in any part of the first, second, and third divisions, and not producing upon demand, or not surrendering, if required, to any gatekeeper or other person having authority from the committee of management to demand production of the same, a ticket duly authorizing admission to that part wherein such person shall be found.

(8.) Obtaining admission to any part of the first, second, or third divisions when disentitled to such admission under these regulations.

13. The following shall be the scale of fees which may be charged and taken for admission to the third division and to the grand stand on such days as the committee of management may appoint:—

For admission of each person to the third division during any cricket or football match such a sum as the committee of management may determine, not exceeding One shilling.

For admission of each person to the grand stand such a sum as the committee of management may determine, not exceeding Two shillings.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 133 of *The Land Act 1884*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding (£5) Five pounds for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding (£10) Ten pounds.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

IN conformity with Acts of Parliament 27 Victoria No. 201, and 44 Victoria No. 677:—

1. That all fees and charges shall be paid when applications are made or orders given.

2. That any person desiring ground for a private grave or vault, tomb, monument, cenotaph, tombstone, or for any other purpose in the cemetery, under the above Acts, shall apply to the trustees therefor. If approved; the trustees, on payment of the required fees, shall issue to such person so applying the certificate of right of burial in the form specified in the schedule hereto.

3. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery on a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

4. That any person desiring to construct a brick grave, or vault, or tomb, or to erect a monument, tombstone, cenotaph, wall, fence, or any other erection in any part of the cemetery shall apply to the trustees for permission to do so, and at the same time submit a plan, design, or drawing of such with full particulars, for approval. Copper cramps must be used.

5. That any order for interment shall be given at the office or to the sexton at the cemetery between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. the previous day, otherwise an extra charge will be made. No free interment shall be allowed without said notice.

6. That the name, age, late place of residence, probable cause of death of the deceased, and other particulars shall be furnished at the time of giving the order.

7. That the trustees shall cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but any person wanting a brick grave or vault shall be permitted to construct the same under direction of the surveyor or such other person as may be appointed by the trustees, on payment of the required fees; and every coffin placed therein shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.

8. That every coffin shall have on the lid a metal plate with the name of the deceased painted or affixed thereon.

9. That every grave shall be at least six feet deep; and no interment shall be allowed in any grave with a less depth than three feet from the top of the coffin to the original surface of the ground after such interment.

10. That no interment shall be permitted in any private grave or vault except on the production of the certificate of right of burial, or satisfactory evidence that the person desiring to bury therein is entitled to do so.

11. That no other interment shall be allowed in any private grave unless the written consent of the owner shall be given in with the order.

12. That no burial shall be permitted to take place in said cemetery, under the present state of the law, without a certificate from the deputy-registrar of deaths or coroner. Such certificate shall be delivered to the secretary or to gatekeeper when the funeral enters the cemetery.

13. That the hour fixed for burials shall be as follows:—On week-days—From September to April inclusive, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; from May to August inclusive, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. On Sundays—Throughout the year, from 2 to 5 p.m.

14. That no burial shall be allowed to take place between the hours of 7 p.m. and 7 a.m., except by special permission of the trustees.

15. That the time fixed for any burial shall be the time when the funeral is to be at the cemetery, and the same shall be punctually observed.

16. That no vehicle, except the hearse and mourning coach, shall be permitted to enter the gates.

17. That every grave, vault, tomb, monument, tombstone, cenotaph, wall, fence, or any other erection shall be maintained and kept in thorough repair and proper condition by or at the expense of the owner.

18. That any person desiring to place any inscription or epitaph in any part of the cemetery shall apply to the trustees for permission to do so, and at the same time submit a copy thereof, which may be approved or disallowed.

19. That any person putting up any erection, or placing any inscription or epitaph on any part of the cemetery, without the permission of the trustees, shall be liable to the penalties imposed by the above Acts for so doing, and may be further dealt with as a trespasser.

20. That every erection shall be placed on proper and substantial foundations (extending to the bottom of the grave when ordered). All stones, refuse, and rubbish remaining after any work is completed shall be removed at once.

21. That all materials required for the completion of any stone or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery, and shall be admitted only at the south entrance gate; and no vehicle conveying any such materials shall be permitted to enter the cemetery in wet weather, or when the ground is soft, without the consent of the trustees being first obtained.

22. That no catacombs shall be allowed.

23. That no wooden erection shall be allowed.

24. That the trustees shall not (unless in very exceptional cases) permit the removal of any corpse from any grave for reinterment, either in said or any other cemetery. If found necessary, the coffin shall be enclosed in a second and air-tight coffin prior to removal.

25. That any workman not employed by the trustees shall be under the supervision and control of the surveyor, sexton, or person authorized by the trustees, who shall have power to regulate his hours of labor, to see that his work is completed satisfactorily and with despatch, and to remove him summarily from the cemetery upon any cause of offence.

26. That, unless otherwise ordered on special occasions, the principal entrance shall be open daily from sunrise to sunset.

27. That no child under 10 years of age shall be admitted into the cemetery, except in charge of a responsible person.

28. That no smoking shall be allowed within the cemetery, nor any firearms discharged therein.

29. That no dogs shall be admitted into the cemetery.

30. That any person violating the rules of propriety and decorum, or committing any nuisance or trespass, or injuring any tree, shrub, flower, border, or any erection, or otherwise infringing the above Acts, or any rule, regulation, or bye-law made for protection of the cemetery, may be prosecuted as the law directs.

31. That no person shall be allowed to pluck any flower, or to take any flower or plant from or out of the cemetery.

32. That the sexton or person authorized by the trustees shall exercise a general supervision and control, under the trustees, over all matters pertaining to the cemetery.

33. That a plan of the cemetery, showing the distribution of the land, compartments, situations, and numbers of graves, and a registry of all certificates of right of burial, shall be kept at the office, and may be inspected.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—AS TO DAIRIES, DAIRY CATTLE, AND MILK.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Grenville, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in the Public Health Amendment Statute 1883, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 2 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed.
2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.
3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the shire of Grenville.

REGISTRATION OF COWKEEPPERS, DAIRYMEN, AND PURVEYORS OF MILK.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of March in every year, register himself with the local board of health in manner following, that is to say:—By signing and forwarding to the secretary of the local board of health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall, with every such application, pay a fee of Two shillings and sixpence per annum.

5. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the secretary for the local board of health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.
6. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said local board

or by any person authorized, in writing, by the chairman or secretary of the said local board, and if on inspection such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting, to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said local board may, by an order in writing signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling house of the registered person, or in the case of an unregistered person served personally or left at his dwelling place or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person; and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said local board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated; and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

8. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept, and be kept perfectly clean, and shall within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances be fumigated, disinfected, or limewashed, as may be in any such order so directed.

9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

10. If any person, or any member of the family of any person, registered as aforesaid, or not so registered but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the local board of health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

11. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the local board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

12. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

13. In the interpretation of this bye-law, words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or in the like discretion to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

BYE-LAW No. 3.

For keeping free from noisome matter yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, &c.; and for regulating the management of earth-closets, privies, &c., disinfecting and deodorizing nightsoil and other offensive matter, and for regulating its removal and final deposit.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Grenville, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in the Public Health Amendment Statute 1883, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being bye-law No. 3 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said shire of Grenville.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said shire shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connection therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land in the said shire on which there shall be erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pigsty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state, in respect of cleanliness, as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard. And if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said shire shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid, or some other efficient deodorizer, sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall, once at least in every week, empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied or cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of nightsoil or on belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of nightsoil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance, properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering, so as to prevent the escape of the contents, or any portion thereof, or of effluvia therefrom.

9. All nightsoil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed, or deposited, or spread, or assisting in placing, or depositing, or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

11. The occupier of any premises within the shire used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered, so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties, such portion not being less than Five shillings, to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the local board of health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said borough.

Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairymen, and Purveyors of Milk.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairymen, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of April in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of five shillings.

6. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said local board, or by any person authorized in writing by the chairman or secretary of the said local board; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting,

to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said local board may, by an order in writing, signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, or in the case of an unregistered person served personally or left at his dwelling-place or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said local board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated, and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

8. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept, and be kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be fumigated, disinfected, or limewashed, as may be in any such order so directed.

9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

10. If any person, or any member of the family of any person, registered as aforesaid, or not so registered but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the local board of health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

11. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor, or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the local board or officer of health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

12. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

13. In the interpretation of this bye-law words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or, in the like discretion, to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health (being the Municipal Council) in and for the Borough of Horsham this fifth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

BYE-LAW No. 1.

For keeping free from noisome matter yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, &c.; and for regulating management of earth-closets, privies, &c., disinfecting and deodorizing nightsoil and other offensive matter, and for regulating its removal and final deposit.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Borough of Horsham, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in the "Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 1 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said borough.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said borough shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connection therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land in the said borough on which there shall be erected any stable, cowyard, cattle-shed, or pigsty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said borough shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of nightsoil on or belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of nightsoil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of effluvia therefrom. In the said borough a nightman licensed by the municipal authority shall be employed by the occupier of the premises for such removal of nightsoil.

9. All nightsoil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed, or deposited, or spread, or assisting in placing, or depositing, or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

11. The occupier of any premises within the borough used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and be of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless

the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the local board of health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

If any person commit a breach of this bye-law, he shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10 for every such breach, or to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, provided the justices before whom any penalty hereby imposed is sought to be recovered, may order the whole part or part only not being less than five shillings (5s.) of such penalty to be paid; and every person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the foregoing penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may have powers to remedy such breach and whether such Local Board of Health have or have not taken advantage of such powers.

The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said shire shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time, as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom, except between the hours of eleven p.m. and five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or some efficient deodorizer, sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of nightsoil on or belonging to such premises.

CITY OF MELBOURNE.—BYE-LAW No. 86.

Bye-law for imposing penalties on any shopkeeper failing or neglecting to close his shop in accordance with the provisions of "The Factories and Shops Act 1885," or of any bye-law made in pursuance thereof.

Whereas by the forty-fifth section of "The Factories and Shops Act 1885," numbered 862, it is enacted that any municipal council may, if it think fit, from time to time make, alter, and repeal bye-laws in and for the municipality for *inter alia* the purpose of imposing penalties not exceeding Ten pounds on any shopkeeper failing or neglecting to close his shop in accordance with the pro-

visions of the said Act or of any bye-law made in pursuance thereof. And whereas the council of the City of Melbourne, which is the municipal council in and for the municipality of the said city, doth so think fit, be it and it is by the said municipal council hereby prescribed, ordered, and directed that the penalties which shall be imposed and inflicted upon any shopkeeper keeping any shop within the municipal limits of the city of Melbourne for failing or neglecting to close his shop in accordance with the provision of "The Factories and Shops Act 1885," or of any bye-law made in pursuance of the said Act, shall be the sum of One shilling for the first offence, and any sum not exceeding Five shillings for any subsequent offence.

BYE-LAW No. 87.

A Bye-law permitting shops of a particular class to keep open after the hours mentioned in "The Factories and Shops Act 1885."

WHEREAS by the forty-fifth section of "The Factories and Shops Act 1885," numbered 862, it is enacted that any municipal council may, if it think fit, from time to time make, alter, and repeal bye-laws in and for the municipality for *inter alia* permitting shops of any particular class (not included in the third schedule to the said Act) on obtaining a license to keep open after the hours in the said Act mentioned, and during such hours as shall be specified in such license, provided that a petition certified to by the municipal clerk as being signed by a majority of the shopkeepers keeping shops of such class within the municipal district shall have been previously presented to such municipal council: And whereas the council of the city of Melbourne, which is the municipal council in and for the municipality of the said city, has had presented to it petitions from shopkeepers keeping shops of each of the classes mentioned in the schedule to this bye-law, each of which petitions has been certified to by the town clerk of the said city as the municipal clerk thereof as being, to the best of his knowledge and belief, signed by a majority of the shopkeepers keeping shops of the class mentioned therein:

And whereas the council of the city of Melbourne, which is the municipal council in and for the municipality of the said city, so thinks fit, be it and it is by the said municipal council hereby ordered and directed—that every shopkeeper keeping a shop of any of the classes named in the schedule to this bye-law, within the city of Melbourne, and which are not of the classes named in the Third Schedule to the Factories and Shops Act 1885, upon receiving license so to do from the town clerk of the said city, which license the said town clerk is hereby empowered by the said municipal council, the council of the city of Melbourne, to issue on its behalf, upon application made for the same, may keep open his said shop after the hours in the said Act mentioned, and not later than the hour of Eleven o'clock *post meridian*, on every week-day evening except that of Saturday, and on Saturday not later than Twelve midnight.

BYE-LAWS OF THE BENDIGO GOLD DISTRICT GENERAL HOSPITAL, INCORPORATED.

Under Acts 220 and 816, an Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions, and the Hospitals and Charitable Institutions Amending Act 1884.

Introductory.

I. All bye-laws made prior to the date of the making of these bye-laws shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

II. In these bye-laws the word "governor" shall mean and be equivalent to the word "contributor" in the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 220.

Object.

III. The object of this institution shall be to afford medical and surgical aid to the sick poor, and to relieve casualties.

IV. Medical and surgical aid may also be afforded to persons able and willing to pay for such aid, at such rates as the board of management may determine upon.

V. Should at any time the applications for admission be in excess of the means for accommodation, the poor shall be admitted in preference to those who are able to pay.

Common Seal.

VI. The common seal of the corporation shall be kept by the treasurer, and shall not be affixed to any deed, instrument, or writing, except by order of the committee, at a meeting at which five members at least are present at the time of making such order, and for which meeting notice to make such order has been given.

Governors and their Privileges.

VII. Contributors to the maintenance fund of £1 and upwards shall be annual governors, and as such entitled to recommend one in-patient during the year for every £1 contributed, the year to be computed from the date of contribution.

VIII. Contributors of £10 or upwards in one sum to the maintenance fund shall be enrolled as life governors, and entitled to recommend one in-patient during each year.

IX. Every governor shall be entitled to one vote at all general meetings.

X. Every yearly subscription shall be paid in advance, and every first yearly payment shall be calculated from the date of such payment, but no such first yearly payment shall entitle to a vote at a general meeting within one month from the date of such payment.

XI. The privileges of annual governors shall be suspended until all arrears are paid.

Board of Management.

XII. The board of management shall consist of a president, two vice-presidents, and treasurer, and nine members of committee, who shall be elected by the governors.

XIII. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer respectively, shall hold office for one year and thereafter until the election of their successors, but shall be capable of re-election.

XIV. Except as hereinafter provided, all governors of the hospital shall be capable of being elected as officers of the corporation, or as members of the committee.

XV. No person who shall hold any office or place of profit under the corporation, or be concerned or participate in anywise in any contract with the committee, or in the profit thereof, or of any work to be done under the authority of the same, shall be capable of being or continuing a member of such committee, provided that such disability shall not apply to any member of any company, partnership, or association, consisting of more than ten persons, when such contract shall be entered into for the general benefit of such company, partnership, or association. But no member of the committee shall vote or take part in the discussion of any matter in or before the committee in which he shall directly or indirectly, by himself or his partners, have any pecuniary interest.

XVI. The board of management shall direct the collection and distribution of funds, appoint and dismiss all paid officers and servants, frame regulations for the management of the hospital—the same not being repugnant to the general rules—present a report to the annual meetings, and manage the affairs of the institution generally.

XVII. Five members shall form a quorum.

XVIII. All accounts for payment shall be passed by the board, and signed at the meeting by the chairman.

XIX. Should vacancies occur in the office of members of the board of management, consulting medical officers, or auditors, the board shall supply such vacancies for the remainder of that year.

Visiting Committee.

XX. The house visiting committee, consisting of three members, shall be elected every three months, by and from the committee of management.

XXI. It shall be the duty of the visiting committee, or one of its members, to visit the hospital at least once a week, to inspect the several wards and offices, and report thereon at the monthly meeting of committee; also to offer any suggestion as to necessary repairs, alterations, and improvements, or general management of the institution.

Treasurer.

XXII. The treasurer shall receive all moneys on behalf of the institution, and deposit the same in such bank as the committee shall direct, to the credit of the Bendigo Hospital. He shall pay all accounts passed by the committee by drafts on the bank, which shall be countersigned at a meeting by the chairman. He shall keep an account of all money received and paid, and report the same to each monthly meeting of the committee, and shall present a financial report to the annual general meeting of governors, the same being previously examined and signed by the auditors.

Auditors.

XXIII. The annual general meeting in July shall elect two governors, not members of the board of management, as auditors for that year.

XXIV. The auditors shall, at the end of each year, examine the treasurer's annual financial report, with all accounts, vouchers, and documents relating thereto, and shall report thereon to the annual general meeting.

Consulting Medical Officers.

XXV. Not less than two, nor more than four consulting medical officers, who must be legally qualified medical practitioners, shall be elected annually, and the vacancies caused by their retirement shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies on the committee.

XXVI. The consulting medical officer shall attend at the hospital for consultation or operation whenever requested to do so by the resident surgeon.

Resident Surgeon.

XXVII. The resident surgeon shall be a legally qualified medical practitioner; he shall not engage in private practice, nor in any other occupation, but shall devote his whole time and attention to the duties of his office.

XXVIII. He shall receive the recommendation and applicants for surgical and medical aid, examine the nature of each case, and decide upon its fitness for admission, and shall discharge patients as he may consider them sufficiently relieved.

XXIX. He shall have charge of all patients in the hospital, and of their treatment, but in case of difficulty or danger, shall request the attendance of any or all of the consulting medical officers.

XXX. He shall superintend and control all subordinate officers in the hospital, and have power, in case of insubordination or neglect of duty, to suspend any of them until the decision of the board, and, if necessary, to engage temporary substitutes for officers thus suspended.

Assistant Surgeon.

XXXI. The assistant surgeon shall be a legally qualified medical practitioner, and shall live on the premises. He shall not engage in private practice nor in any other occupation, but shall devote his whole attention to the duties of his office.

XXXXII. He shall be under the direction of the resident surgeon, whose instructions he shall strictly carry out. He shall have charge of all patients, and the general superintendence of the institution, its officers and servants, during the temporary absence of the resident surgeon.

XXXXIII. In all accidents and other cases he shall, without delay, send for the resident surgeon, and shall adopt such preliminary remedies as he may consider necessary.

XXXXIV. He shall perform the night dispensing during the absence of the dispenser, and shall make such arrangements as will ensure that he and the dispenser shall not be absent at the same time.

Secretary and House Steward.

XXXXV. He shall attend all special, general, and committee meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings, and transcribe them carefully into books kept for that purpose; and he shall carry out the directions of each meeting in the particulars incident to his department.

XXXXVI. Subject to the authority of the resident surgeon, he shall direct and control all servants, and have power, in cases of insubordination or neglect of duty, to suspend any of them until the decision of the board, and, if necessary, to hire temporary substitutes for servants thus suspended.

XXXXVII. He shall order, receive, examine, take charge of, and distribute all articles supplied for use in the hospital, excepting those belonging to the dispenser.

XXXXVIII. He shall carry out all regulations made by the board for the domestic management of the hospital, and be responsible for the cleanliness and good order of all the wards and rooms, and of the out-buildings and grounds.

XXXXIX. He shall keep all such books and accounts as are required, and render such reports as may be ordered by the board.

XL. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of the institution.

Admission of Patients.

XLI. Cases of accident shall be received without recommendation, those requiring treatment in the hospital being admitted at once, and those suitable for out-door treatment receiving aid as may be necessary; but in either class of cases the aid shall not be continued when the patients may be able to obtain professional attendance at their own expense.

XLII. Cases of disease combined with destitution may be admitted on the recommendation of a governor, *vide* rules 7 and 8, or, when recommendations from governors cannot be obtained, on written reports of the circumstances from the officer in charge of the police, from ministers of religion, or the Mayors of Sandhurst and Eaglehawk.

XLIII. The fitness of applicants for admission shall be decided by the resident surgeon, and those approved of by him will be admitted when there are beds vacant to receive them.

XLIV. All property found on persons who may die in the hospital shall be appropriated to defray the expense of their maintenance and burial, the residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives.

XLV. In the event of any person able to pay for medical or surgical treatment being detected in the receipt of the charity of the institution, such patient shall be held accountable for all expenses incurred in his or her behalf.

Visitors.

XLVI. Persons wishing to visit patients, or to inspect the hospital, shall be admitted subject to such regulations as may be made by the board, and officiating ministers of religion shall have access to the hospital, to visit patients, at all times.

Regulations for Out-door Patients.

XLVII. The written certificate of an annual or life governor will be required to be produced by each applicant for out-door relief. Contributors will be expected to use every care, before giving such certificates, that the persons to whom they are given are really in destitute circumstances.

XLVIII. Applicants shall, in future, be received on each Tuesday, at Two o'clock p.m., when the visiting committee will decide upon each case, as part of the business of their weekly visit.

Meetings in General.

XLIX. At all meetings of governors or of committee, the president or, in his absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall take the chair, but in the absence of all these officers the meeting shall choose its own chairman.

L. At all meetings of the governors or of the committee, the chairman shall have a deliberative vote, and also a casting vote whenever the numbers are equal.

LI. All questions other than elections at meetings of governors, and all questions at meetings of the committee, shall be decided by a show of hands, and if it be demanded by any member, by a division.

LII. When any vacancy is, by effluxion of time, about to occur in any office of the corporation, other than the committee, the committee shall give public notice, by advertisement, that such vacancy is about to occur, and shall fix therein a time, not less than three clear days from the date of such notice, within which candidates for any such vacancy shall send to the secretary their notice of candidature, and a day on which, in the event of a contest, the election shall be held.

LIII. No person shall be admitted as a candidate at any such election unless he has notified his candidature to the secretary, in writing under his hand within the time so limited.

LIV. Where, at the expiration of the time fixed for receiving notice of candidature there is the same number of candidates as there are vacancies in each office respectively, the committee shall declare such candidates duly elected.

LV. Where, at the expiration of the time so fixed, there are more candidates than vacancies, the committee shall, in some daily paper published in Sandhurst, give not less than three days' notice of the names of such candidates, and the governors shall,

upon the day appointed for the election, elect by ballot some or more of such candidates to fill the vacant office or offices, as the case may be.

LVI. All vacancies in the committee caused by the annual retirement of members thereof, in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of Parliament of Victoria, 220, shall be filled in the same manner as is hereinbefore provided in the case of officers of the corporation other than the committee.

Meetings of Governors.

LVII. In the month of July in every year a meeting of the governors shall be held for the reception and the adoption of the annual report and balance-sheet, and for the transaction of any other business of which notice has been given in the advertisement convening such meeting.

LVIII. At all general meetings of the governors twelve shall constitute a quorum; but if no quorum be present within half-an-hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned to the following week, at the same day and hour.

LIX. The committee, at their discretion, may, and upon the written request of twelve or more governors, under their hands, stating the purpose of such meeting, shall summon a special meeting, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

LX. Every meeting of governors shall be called by advertisement in two, at least, of the public newspapers published in Sandhurst, at least one week before the day of meeting.

Meetings of the Board of Management.

LXI. The board shall meet for general business on the second Wednesday in each month, and for special purposes at such times as may be requisite.

LXII. The president, vice-presidents, and treasurer shall be *ex-officio* members of all sub-committees.

LXIII. The committee shall commence business as soon after the time notified as there is a sufficient number of members present to constitute a quorum; but if, at the expiry of twenty minutes from the time specified, there is not a quorum present, the meeting shall stand adjourned to such day as the members then present shall direct, not more than seven days from the day of meeting.

LXIV. No business shall be entered upon until the minutes of the previous meeting have been confirmed, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy.

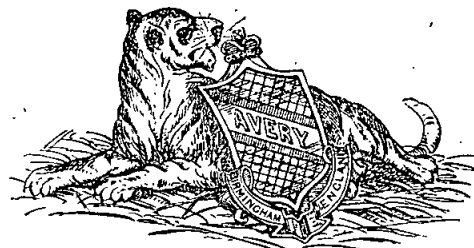

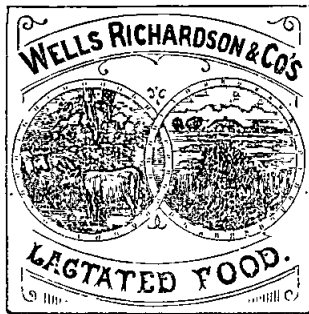
