**"THE EXPLOSIVES ACT 1885."—REGULATION.**

**I**N accordance with the provisions of *The Explosives Act 1885* (No. 853, Sec. 18), the Governor in Council has made the following Regulation to come into force on the 1st day of April 1886, and to apply to such explosives only as may be stored on and after that date, viz.:—

**REGULATION.**

Instead of the rent and charges to be paid under Schedule 2 of the above cited Act, the rent and charges specified in the subjoined Schedule shall be payable on all explosives stored in any magazine or hulk appointed for the storage of explosives under the control of the Government:—

**ANSER ISLANDS, BASS' STRAITS.—SUNKEN ROCK.**

**A**DVERTING to notice, dated the 5th October 1885, mariners are now notified that a recent survey by Commander Hoskyn, of H.M. ship *Myrmidon*, fixes the exact position of the rock upon which the *Gulf of Carpentaria* struck as follows:—

From the rock:—

The summit of Anser Island bears N. 79° E., distant 1·3 miles.

The summit of the middle island of the group bears S. 57½° E., distant 1·05 miles.

The summit of Cleft Island bears S. 7½° E., distant 0·8 mile.

Bearings magnetic.—Variation 9° 40' E.

The rock is of small extent, and six feet at low-water ordinary springs is the least water over it.

Mariners are still cautioned against navigating the passages between either the north and south Anser Islands, or between Cleft Island and Citadel Island.

The births of 936 children, viz., 462 boys and 474 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of February. In the month of January, 1,021 births were registered, or 85 more than in the month under review. The births were 255 above the average of the previous ten years, but only 109 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in February numbered 714, viz., 376 of males and 338 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 222, or 31 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in January by 69, but exceeded the average of February during the previous ten years by 218. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been 112 above that average.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was 2.71, and of deaths registered 2.07.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 104.1° on the 19th, and the lowest was 45.9° on the 14th. The mean temperature of the month (62.7°) was nearly three and a half degrees below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (42.8°) took place on the 17th, viz., from a maximum of 92.9° to a minimum of 50.1°. The least range (9.0°) was on the 20th, viz., from a maximum of 64.0° to a minimum of 55.0°. The mean daily range was 18.5°. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.838 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on 10 days, the amount of rainfall being 1.54 inch.

Males contributed 53 per cent., and females 47 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 48 per cent. to that mortality, as against 48 per cent. in February 1885, 40 per cent. in February 1884, 42 per cent. in February 1883, 46 per cent. in February 1882, 45 per cent. in February 1881, 52 per cent. in February 1880, 45 per cent. in February 1879, 52 per cent. in February 1878, 51 per cent. in February 1877, and 53 per cent. in February 1876.

Twenty-two deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these:—A gentleman, aged 75, died of apoplexy; a female, aged 75, a male patient in the Kew Lunatic Asylum, and a female, each aged 76, of brain disease; a female, aged 75, of congestion of the lungs; a female, aged 77, and a laborer, aged 83, of heart disease; a farmer, aged 78, of carbuncle; a gentleman, aged 78, of diarrhoea; a cabinetmaker, aged 78, of broncho-pneumonia; a female, aged 78, of ascites; a bootmaker, aged 81, of gastritis; a female, aged 84, of bronchitis; a seaman, aged 87, was drowned; and a laborer, aged 77, a female, aged 77, a splitter, aged 80, a currier, aged 84, a gentleman and a laborer, each aged 85, a gentleman, aged 86, and a female, aged 95, died of old age.

Of the deaths registered during the month, 33 were ascribed to external causes, of which 28 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 3 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A shunter, aged 19, was killed by being crushed between two railway trucks; a farmer, aged 19, died of fracture of the skull caused by a kick from a horse; a jockey, aged 15, of laceration of the brain, resulting from a fall from a horse whilst riding a race; a fireman, aged 20, was killed by a fall from an engine; a laborer, aged 37, died of rupture of the bladder, probably occasioned by a fall; a gold miner, aged 44, was killed by a fall from a tram car; a groom, aged 24, died of fracture of the skull and other injuries, a cab passing over him; a carter, aged 45, of injury to the chest, a lorry passing over him; and a ship's carpenter, an inmate of the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, of injuries received whilst pulling down a wall. A farmer, aged 65, was gored to death by a bull; a female, aged 24, died of burns; a female, aged 26, an oysterman, aged 29, a laborer, aged 30, a female, aged 42, of sunstroke; and a veterinary surgeon, aged 41, of poisoning with liquor ammonia; a male infant, aged 1, and a boy, aged 8, were drowned, the latter whilst fishing in a quarry; a boy, aged 9, was drowned in Duke's dock; a boat closer, aged 29, a laborer, aged 50, a seaman, aged 87, were drowned in the River Yarra; a lighterman, aged 28, was drowned off the Australian Wharf; a barman, aged 20, a carpenter, aged 25, and a tailor, aged 66, were found drowned; a baker, a patient in the Kew Lunatic Asylum, aged 33, was suffocated, a piece of quartz becoming impacted in his windpipe during a fit of epilepsy; and a male infant, aged 10 days, died of umbilical hæmorrhage. The homicidal deaths were those of a laborer, aged 28, and of a female, aged 35, who were wilfully murdered. Of the suicidal deaths, a horsedealer, aged 46, shot himself; a farmer, aged 35, cut his throat; and a Chinaman, of occupation unknown, aged about 40, poisoned himself with opium.

One hundred and seventeen deaths, or 16 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—56 in the Melbourne Hospital, 18 in the Alfred Hospital, 4 in the Children's Hospital, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, 4 in the Immigrants' Home, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 6 in the Austin Hospital, 7 in the Melbourne Gaol, 3 in the Infant Asylum, 1 in the Protestant Refuge, and 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 340, of which 178, or 52 per cent., were of males, and 162, or 48 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 225 were under one year of age, 100 were between one and two, 8 were between two and three, 3 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 374. Of these, 198, or 53 per cent., were males, and 176, or 47 per cent., were females; 15 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 23 were between fifteen and twenty, 32 were between twenty and twenty-five, 44 were between twenty-five and thirty, 30 were between thirty and thirty-five, 26 were between thirty-five and forty, 30 were between forty and forty-five, 24 were between forty-five and fifty, 28 were between fifty and fifty-five, 32 were between fifty-five and sixty, 15 were between sixty and sixty-five, 27 were between sixty-five and seventy, 17 were between seventy and seventy-five, 12 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 10 were upwards of eighty.

As compared with the experience of the previous month, the mortality from typhoid fever, which was very prevalent during the month under notice, showed a slight increase, deaths from this complaint rising from 29 to 39. On the other hand, the mortality from dysentery and diarrhoea, which had been steadily declining since December last, fell from 133 to 90. Only 3 deaths of mothers during or shortly after childbearing took place during the month, as against 6 in January and 13 in December. Comparing these numbers with the births, it follows that 1 mother perished in February to every 312 children born alive, as against 1 to every 170 in January, and 1 to every 73 in December.

THE LICENSING ACT 1885.—REGULATIONS FOR TAKING A POLL OF ELECTORS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 31 OF "THE LICENSING ACT 1885" (49 VICT. No. 857), REGARDING GROCERS' LICENSES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirtieth day of March 1886.

HIS Excellency the Governor in Council, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the powers conferred by *The Licensing Act 1885*, doth in the place of and in substitution for Regulations 25 and 26 of the Regulations for taking a poll of electors under the provisions of section 31 of the said Act regarding Grocers' Licenses, dated the second day of March instant, and also as an additional Regulation, make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

In place of the Regulation 25, the following:—

(a.) Upon the close of the poll every deputy returning officer shall in the presence of the poll clerks, if any, but How and when of no other person, open the ballot-box used at the polling-booth at which he shall have presided, and shall make up the result of the into one parcel the ballot-papers which shall have been used in voting at his polling-booth during the poll, in another the result of the separate parcel the ballot-papers which shall have remained unused, in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which shall have been set aside for separate custody thereof, and in another separate parcel the certified copies of rolls supplied, and all books, rolls, and papers kept or used during the poll at his polling-booth, and shall seal up the said several parcels, and shall endorse the same severally with a description of the contents thereof, and with the name of the polling-place, and with the number of the polling-booth, if more than one; and shall sign with his name the said endorsements; and shall transmit the said parcels to the returning officer at the booth presided over by the returning officer at the principal polling-place, together with an account, in which such deputy shall charge himself with the number of ballot-papers delivered to him, specifying therein the number thereof delivered to and used by voters, and the number not so delivered or left unused, and the number set aside as aforesaid for separate custody; and every such account shall be verified by the signature of the said deputy; and the returning officer shall at the booth presided over by him at such principal polling-place, and in the presence of the poll clerks, if any, and of no other person, open the ballot-box used at such booth; and shall also in the like presence open the several parcels containing the ballot-papers used at the several polling-places and books so transmitted to him, and shall then proceed to ascertain the result of the poll, which is to be determined in compliance with the provisions of section 33 of *The Licensing Act 1885*, and the returning officer and his deputies shall, upon and after such opening of the ballot-boxes, abstain from inspecting the writing upon the back of the ballot-papers and shall take care that the same is not seen by any person present before the papers are enclosed in a sealed parcel as provided in these Regulations.

In place of the Regulation 26, the following:—

(b.) As soon as conveniently may be after ascertaining the result of the poll, the returning officer shall make up Transmission of in one parcel the ballot-papers which shall have been used in voting at the poll, in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which shall have remained unused thereof, in another separate parcel the certified copies of rolls supplied, and all books, rolls, and papers kept or used during the poll, and shall seal up the said several parcels, and shall endorse the same severally with a description of the contents thereof, and with the name of the licensing district and the date of the poll; and sign with his name the said endorsement; and shall transmit the said parcel to the clerk of the Licensing Court for the district, who shall retain the same for a period of twelve months, after which period the same shall be destroyed.

In addition to the said Regulations, the following:—

(c.) If, from any cause not already provided for in the Regulations, no polling shall have been opened at any booth Adjournment of of a polling-place on the day appointed, the polling at such booth shall stand adjourned to a day not later than seven polling for clear days following the day upon which such polling was to have taken place, and the returning officer or deputy, other cause as the case may be, shall forthwith cause public notice to be given thereof. If such adjournment be by a deputy, then riot, &c. then he shall forthwith notify the same to the returning officer, and, in case of any adjournment of the polling authorized by the Regulations, the returning officer shall not finally determine the result of the poll until the poll so adjourned shall have been finally closed, and the ballot-papers transmitted to the returning officer.

And the Honorable Alfred Deakin, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGULATIONS UNDER "THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGES ACTS 1884 AND 1885" FOR REGULATING THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL OF AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirtieth day of March 1886.

WHEREAS by section 24 of *The Agricultural Colleges Act 1884*, as amended by section 2 of *The Agricultural Colleges Act 1885*, the Governor in Council is empowered from time to time to make, alter, and repeal regulations for regulating the election of members of the Council of Agricultural Education by members of agricultural societies subscribing not less than "Ten shillings per annum to any such society": And whereas the Governor in Council, on the seventeenth day of March One thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, made certain orders and regulations under the powers conferred by section 24 of *The Agricultural Colleges Act 1884*: And whereas it is desirable to repeal such orders and regulations and to make other regulations in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby, in exercise of the powers conferred by the above recited Acts, and of every other power enabling him in that behalf, order as follows (that is to say):—

1. *Repeat.*—The regulations of the Governor in Council for regulating the election by the governing bodies of agricultural societies of members of the Council of Agricultural Education, bearing date the 17th day of March 1885, are hereby repealed except as to acts, matters, and things made or done thereunder.

2. *Returning officer.*—The Governor in Council may from time to time appoint some fit and proper person to be the returning officer for each and every one of the five parts into which Victoria has been divided to conduct the election of members of the Council of Agricultural Education in each of such parts respectively, in accordance with the provisions hereinafter made in that behalf, and may from time to time remove such returning officer.

3. *Expenses of election.*—The expenses incurred by any returning officer for the purpose of holding and conducting any such election shall be repaid to him by the Council of Agricultural Education out of the Agricultural College Fund.

4. *Time of election.*—The election of members of the Council of Agricultural Education shall take place on the second Wednesday in the month of June 1886, and on the second Wednesday in the month of June in every succeeding third year.

5. *Notice concerning nomination and election to be given.*—The returning officer for each of such parts shall give twenty-eight days' notice of his intention to proceed on the day appointed to hold an election of members of the Council of Agricultural Education, and such notices shall be given by advertisement in the *Government Gazette*; and the returning officer shall also in such advertisement name the day appointed by him as the day of nomination, being not less than twelve days nor more than fifteen days prior to the day named for holding such election, within which all candidates must be nominated as hereinafter provided; and he shall also in such advertisement name the time and place when and where such nominations will be received, and shall sign such notice, and shall affix thereto the date on which it is given.

6. *Nomination.*—Any member of an agricultural society, subscribing not less than Ten shillings per annum to any such society, and resident within any of the parts into which Victoria is divided for the purposes of *The Agricultural Colleges Act 1884*, whose name is on the roll of members of agricultural societies for such part, and being desirous of nominating any person as a candidate for election by such part as a member of the Council of Agricultural Education, shall fill up a nomination paper in the form in the First Schedule hereto, stating therein the christian name and surname of such candidate, together with the other particulars required by the said schedule; and such nomination paper shall be signed by not less than four other persons whose names are on such roll as aforesaid, and also by the person named therein as a candidate accepting such nomination. Such nomination paper must be lodged or delivered by post at the place appointed not later than Four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed as the day of nomination.

7. *Roll.*—A roll of members of agricultural societies subscribing not less than Ten shillings per annum to any such society within each part, to be made out in accordance with section 11 of the said Act of 1884, as amended by section 2 of the said Act of 1885, under the direction of the Minister, by the Secretary for Agriculture, and forwarded to the returning officer of each such parts at least one clear month before the day of each and every election.

8. *Return and poll.*—The returning officer shall, in the event of there not being more than one person duly nominated for any part, make a return to the Council of Agricultural Education, and declare such person to have been duly elected a member thereof; but if more than one person be duly nominated for any one part, the returning officer thereof shall forthwith publish in the *Government Gazette* a list of the names of such candidates, and a poll shall be taken, and such returning officer shall forthwith cause voting-papers to be printed in the form in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall initial each of such papers, and shall enclose it in an unfastened envelope, having his own name and address printed thereon, and shall send by post, under a fastened

cover, one of such voting-papers and addressed envelopes to each and every person whose name appears on the roll as aforesaid. The returning officer shall endorse on every voting-paper so sent a number corresponding to that placed opposite the name of such person on such roll, which roll the returning officer shall retain in his own custody until after the election, as hereinafter provided.

9. *Voting-paper to be delivered or posted.*—The voter having recorded his vote on the voting-paper, and signed it, shall enclose such voting-paper in the envelope furnished to him with the printed address of the returning officer thereon, and shall deliver or cause to be delivered or post the same, so that it shall be received by the returning officer before Noon of the day fixed for holding such election. If there remain upon any voting-paper so received more names than that of one candidate, such ballot-paper shall be treated as informal, and the vote given on and by such paper shall be void and of no effect, and shall not be counted by the returning officer.

10. *Appointment of scrutineers.*—Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint in writing one scrutineer to be present when the returning officer opens the envelopes containing the voting-papers on the day of holding the election.

11. *Number of votes to be counted.*—*Casting vote.*—The returning officer shall, at Noon of the day named in such advertisement for holding any election, proceed in the presence of any scrutineers appointed by any candidate to open the envelopes with his printed address thereon which have been returned to him, and to take out the voting-papers therein contained, and compare the number and signature thereon with the number and name on the roll, and shall count the votes for each and every such candidate; and as soon as conveniently may be after the day of holding such election the returning officer shall give public notice, in the *Government Gazette*, of the number of votes given to each and every candidate, and shall declare the candidate who has received the greatest number of votes to be duly elected as a member of the Council of Agricultural Education; and if two or more candidates have received an equal number of votes, and a larger number than any other candidate, the returning officer shall record his casting vote in favor of one of them. The returning officer shall, within seven days from and after the holding of any election, return to the Council of Agricultural Education the names of the candidates who have been duly elected members thereof.

12. *Voting-papers to be kept for fifteen months.*—The roll and all voting-papers so counted as aforesaid shall be at once enclosed in a packet, which shall be sealed up and endorsed by the returning officer.

All voting-papers not counted as aforesaid shall be similarly closed and endorsed. All voting-papers received after Noon of the day of election shall be endorsed by the returning officer, with the time of their receipt, and shall be enclosed in separate packets, and all such several packets shall be transmitted by post to the Secretary for Agriculture. Such packets shall be kept for a period of fifteen months, when the same may be destroyed.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1869* it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor at any time and from time to time, under regulations to be made for such purpose, to proclaim any Crown lands as a common, and place it under the management of any borough or shire council, mining or road board, or any person or persons, or any two or more of the said councils, boards, or persons, and direct the manner by which the fees should be imposed, paid, collected, and recovered for depasturing thereon, and how such fees should be disposed of, and at any time to alter, add to, diminish, revoke, or abolish such common, or unite one or more commons; and it was also enacted that notice of any proposed proclamation, alteration, addition, diminution, revocation, or union of commons should be published and all objections thereto should be heard in the manner set forth in the One hundredth section of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby diminish or abolish (as the case may be) the undermentioned commons, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:-

**THE GLEN GRANT AND TARNAGULLA UNITED FARMERS' COMMON** (within the shire of Marong).—The portion of the Glen Grant and Tarnagulla United Farmers' Common within the shire of Marong, constituted a separate common by Order of the 21st October 1867, is hereby diminished by deducting therefrom fifty-six acres three roods thirty-six perches of land, being suburban allotment 14, town of Marong, and allotment 107C, parish of Marong.—(85.M.44516.)

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1884* it was amongst other things enacted that, notwithstanding anything therein before contained, the Governor might by Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, should cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber or particular description of timber or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth, from such portions of Crown lands as were named in such Proclamation, or should exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do hereby declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut live or dead timber on the Crown lands situate within a distance of thirty feet from the Daylesford water supply pipe-track, in the parishes of Bullarto and Glenlyon.

Within the boundaries of the North-Eastern Vermin District—Five shillings.  
Within the boundaries of the Warracknabeal Vermin District—Ten shillings.

## SHIRE OF WANNON.

## BYE-LAW No. 3.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Wannon, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, doth hereby make the bye-law following, that is to say:—

1. *Interpretation of terms.*—In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them:—

"House" shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work-rooms, common or other lodging-houses, or other buildings or premises.

"Cesspool" shall mean any receptacle for night-soil or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground.

"Street" shall mean and include any highway, and any public bridge, and any lane, road, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

2. *Premises to be kept so as not to be a nuisance.*—Every occupier or person having the management or control of any house or premises shall cause the same to be kept in such a state as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

3. *Removal of refuse from houses.*—Every occupier of a house or premises shall remove therefrom all dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, or such other refuse matter produced or accumulated thereon once every week, and in case of default of such occupier the Local Board of Health may remove the same.

4. *Receptacles for house refuse.*—Every occupier of a house or premises shall provide and keep thereon a box or some other covered receptacle for the temporary deposit of house refuse, which box or receptacle shall be of such dimensions as the same may, with the contents thereof when full, be readily and conveniently movable by one man, or so many such boxes or receptacles as may be necessary to contain all the house refuse produced or accumulated on such premises during one week; and shall cause all house refuse to be deposited as soon as conveniently may be in some such box or receptacle.

5. *Removal of refuse from places where animals are kept.*—Every occupier of land on which is erected any stable, shed, sty, yard, or other place for the keeping of animals shall from time to time remove from such premises all dung, soil, or other

manure produced or accumulated thereon as often as the same shall amount to two cubic yards, or once at least every week; and in case of the default of such occupier the Local Board of Health may remove the same.

6. *Power to use refuse as manure.*—Nothing hereinbefore contained shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil, or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed, or to be used as manure on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used to contravene any bye-law of the Local Board of Health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

7. *Removal of refuse from places where noxious or offensive trades are carried on.*—Every occupier and every person having the management or control of premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, or manufactory whatsoever, shall cause all rubbish, filth, offal, soil, or other offensive matters, and all waste products of such manufacture from which effluvia may arise, to be removed from such premises once at least in every forty-eight hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and so that no noxious or offensive effluvia arise therefrom; and if any such occupier or other such person shall neglect or fail to have removed any such offensive matter or waste products as aforesaid, the same may be removed by the Local Board of Health.

8. *Removal of blood from places where animals are slaughtered.*—Every occupier, licensee, or person having the management or control of an abattoir, slaughter-house, or place where any cattle or other animals are killed, shall cause all the blood from the animals killed therein, as soon as conveniently may be, to be collected in a fit receptacle to be provided for that purpose, and to be effectually deodorized by mixing therewith commercial sulphate of iron or chloride of lime in the proportion of one pound to the gallon, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient effectually to deodorize the same, and to be removed from the premises within forty-eight hours after such blood is shed.

9. *Removal of offal.*—Every occupier of any premises on which may be any offal shall forthwith effectually deodorize the same, and remove the same from the premises within twenty-four hours.

10. *Construction of privies.*—No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy, except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground, and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or movable receptacle for night-soil, the contents whereof does not exceed five cubic feet, and with the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material, having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half an inch to the foot.

11. *Supply of deodorizing material to earth-closets.*—Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil to be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficiently and thoroughly and effectually to deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle for night-soil.

12. *Emptying receptacles for night-soil.*—Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises once at least in every week shall empty or cleanse, or cause to be emptied or cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

13. *Removal of night-soil to be by properly constructed conveyances.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof, or of effluvia therefrom.

14. *Hours within which night-soil may be removed.*—No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except between the hours of Ten and Twelve o'clock at night, or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying, or causing to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place for the deposit of night-soil, shall cause the night-soil taken therefrom to be removed as soon as the same is emptied.

15. *Construction of cesspools.*—Every cesspool shall be furnished with a watertight cover or roof, and every cesspool which shall be formed or made below the surface of the ground shall be constructed with watertight walls or sides which project on all sides at least six inches above the surface of the ground.

16. *Emptying of cesspools.*—Every occupier of premises, and every person having the management or control of premises on which there shall be any cesspool, shall cause the same to be emptied once at least in every week.

17. *Times within which cesspools may be emptied.*—No person shall empty, or assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood,

or other refuse and offensive matter, except between the hours of Ten and Twelve o'clock at night, or until such contents have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying or causing to be emptied—

18. *Conveyances by which cesspools may be emptied.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse or offensive matter except by means of a cart, carriage, or other conveyance properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents, or any portion thereof, or of any effluvia therefrom.

19. *Disposal of refuse and offensive matter.*—No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter, in any place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health.

20. *Night-soil, &c., removed from any earth-closet, &c., and deposited anywhere to be covered with earth.*—Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited, or assisting in placing or depositing, on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place of deposit, shall immediately on deposit thereof cover the same or cause the same to be covered with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

21. *Earth-closets, &c., not to be emptied into drains or sewers.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any drain or sewer, so that the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any drain or sewer.

22. *Prevention of pollution of water.*—No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any person using such water or drink, or milk or other produce of such dairy.

23. *Cesspools not to be emptied into water used for drinking or domestic purposes.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any water supplied, used, or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents or any portion of the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any such water.

24. *Every accumulation or deposit of offensive matter so situated as to find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deodorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within one week of notice given by the Local Board or by one of its officers.*

25. *Keeping of animals.*—No person shall keep any animal of any kind so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

26. *Animals not to be so kept as to pollute water.*—No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drink, or milk or other produce of such dairy.

27. *Supply of water to slaughter-houses.*—Every occupier or licensee or person having the management or control of a slaughter-house or abattoir, shall cause the same to be supplied with a sufficient quantity of water for all purposes.

28. *Drainage of new buildings.*—Every person erecting or causing to be erected any new building shall cause the foundations thereof, and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well drained, so that no water, soakage, or damp shall lodge there.

29. *Drainage of existing buildings.*—Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the healthfulness of the inmates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

30. *Registration of cowkeepers, dairymen, and purveyors of milk.*—Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of March in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Ten shillings.

31. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the Secretary for the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

32. *Milk stores and shops to be kept clean.*—Every person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman shall cause every milk store or milk shop in his occupation, or under his management or control, and every milk vessel used by him for containing milk for sale, to be kept thoroughly clean.

33. *Dairymen, &c., to report disease to the Health Officer.*—Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and every person having the management of any such trade, shall forthwith report, in writing, to the Health Officer the occurrence of any disease in any of his milch cows, or of any contagious or infectious disease in man or animal upon the premises upon which such trade is carried on.

34. Bye-law number two, as made by the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Wannon, is hereby repealed.

35. *Extent of application of bye-law.*—This bye-law, number three, and numbered by sections one to thirty-six, shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the place or places within the jurisdiction of the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Wannon.

36. *Penalties.*—If any person commit a breach of any of the foregoing sections of this bye-law, he shall, for every such breach, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, or to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued; provided the justices before whom any penalty imposed hereby is sought to be recovered may order the whole or part only (not being less than Five shillings) of such penalty to be paid. And every person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the foregoing penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by these bye-laws or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such Local Board of Health have or have not taken advantage of such powers.

#### SHIRE OF BUNINYONG.—LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH. BYE-LAW No. 1.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Buninyong, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, doth hereby make the Bye-law following, that is to say:—

1. *Interpretation of terms.*—In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them:—

"House" shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work-rooms, common or other lodging-houses, or other buildings or premises.

"Cesspool" shall mean any receptacle for night-soil, or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground.

"Street" shall mean and include any highway, and any public bridge, and any road, lane, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

2. *Premises to be kept so as not to be a nuisance.*—Every occupier or person having the management or control of any house or premises shall cause the same to be kept in such a state as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

3. *Removal of refuse from houses.*—Every occupier of a house or premises shall remove therefrom all dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, or such other refuse matter produced or accumulated thereon once every week, and in case of the default of such occupier the Local Board of Health may remove the same.

4. *Receptacles for house refuse.*—Every occupier of a house or premises shall provide and keep thereon a box or some other

covered receptacle for the temporary deposit of house refuse, which box or receptacle shall be of such dimensions as that the same may, with the contents thereof when full, be readily and conveniently movable by one man, or so many such boxes or receptacles as may be necessary to contain all the house refuse produced or accumulated on such premises during one week, and shall cause all house refuse to be deposited as soon as conveniently may be in some such box or receptacle.

5. *Removal of refuse from places where animals are kept.*—Every occupier of land on which is erected any stable, shed, sty, yard, or other place for the keeping of animals, shall from time to time remove from such premises all dung, soil, or other manure produced or accumulated thereon, once at least every week, and in case of default of such occupier the Local Board may remove the same.

6. *Power to use refuse as manure.*—Nothing contained in the foregoing section shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil, or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed, or to be used as manure on any garden or land, or to be kept for the purpose of being used on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravene any bye-law of the Local Board of Health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

7. *Removal of refuse from places where noxious or offensive trades are carried on.*—Every occupier and every person having the management or control of premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, or manufactory whatsoever, shall cause all rubbish, filth, offal, soil, or other offensive matters, and all waste products of such manufacture from which effluvia may arise, to be removed from such premises once at least in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and so that no noxious or offensive effluvia arise therefrom; and if any such occupier or person shall neglect or fail to have removed any such offensive matter or waste products as aforesaid, the same may be removed by the Local Board of Health.

8. *Removal of blood from places where animals are slaughtered.*—Every occupier, licensee, or person having the management or control of an abattoir, slaughter-house, or place where any cattle or other animals are killed, shall cause all the blood from the animals killed therein, as soon as conveniently may be, to be collected in a fit receptacle to be provided for that purpose, and to be effectually deodorized by mixing therewith commercial sulphate of iron or chloride of lime in the proportion of one pound to the gallon, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient to effectually deodorize the same, and to be removed from the premises within twenty-four hours after such blood is shed.

9. *Removal of offal.*—Every occupier of any premises on which may be any offal shall forthwith effectually deodorize the same, and remove the same from the premises within twenty-four hours.

10. *Construction of privies.*—No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground, and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or other movable receptacle for night-soil, the contents whereof does not exceed three cubic feet, and with the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half an inch to the foot.

11. *Supply of deodorizing material to earth-closets.*—Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

12. *Emptying receptacles for night-soil.*—Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises once at least in every week shall empty or cleanse, or cause to be emptied or cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

13. *Removal of night-soil to be by properly constructed conveyances.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof, or of effluvia therefrom.

14. *Hours within which night-soil may be removed.*—No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except between the hours of Ten p.m. and Six a.m., or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying, or causing to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, shall cause the night-soil taken therefrom to be removed as soon as the same is emptied.

15. *Emptying of cesspools.*—Every occupier of premises and every person having the management or control of premises on which there shall be any cesspool already in existence, shall cause the same to be emptied once at least in every fourth week.

16. *Times within which cesspools may be emptied.*—No person shall empty, or assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse and offensive matter except between the hours of

Ten p.m. and Six a.m., or until such contents have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying or causing to be emptied any cesspool shall remove, or cause to be removed, the contents thereof as soon as the same is emptied.

17. *Conveyances by which cesspools may be emptied.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool, or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse or offensive matter except by means of a cart, carriage, or other conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents, or any portion thereof, or of any effluvia therefrom.

18. *Disposal of refuse and offensive matter.*—No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter, in any place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health.

19. *Night-soil, &c., removed from any earth-closet, &c., and deposited anywhere, to be covered with earth.*—Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited, or assisting in placing or depositing, on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place of deposit, shall, immediately on the deposit thereof, cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six (6) inches in thickness.

20. *Earth-closets, &c., not to be emptied into drains or sewers.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any drain or sewer, or so that the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any drain or sewer.

21. *Prevention of pollution of water.*—No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

22. *Cesspools not to be emptied into water used for drinking or domestic purposes.*—No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any water supplied, used, or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents or any portion of the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any such water.

23. *Every accumulation or deposit of offensive matter so situated as to find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any water used, or likely to be used, by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deodorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within one week of notice given by the Local Board or by one of its officers.*

24. *Keeping of animals.*—No person shall keep any animal of any kind so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

25. *Animals not to be so kept as to pollute water.*—No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

26. *Supply of water to slaughter-houses.*—Every occupier or licensee or person having the management or control of a slaughter-house or abattoir shall cause the same to be supplied with a sufficient quantity of water for all purposes.

27. *Drainage of new buildings.*—Every person erecting, or causing to be erected, any new building, shall cause the foundations thereof, and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well drained, so that no water soaks or damp shall lodge there.

28. *Drainage of existing buildings.*—Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the healthfulness of the inmates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

29. *Registration of cowkeepers, dairymen, and purveyors of milk.*—Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairymen, or purveyor of milk, shall, on or before the first day of February in every year, register himself before the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Five shillings:—

31. *Milk stores and shops to be kept clean.*—Every person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman shall cause every milk store or milk shop in his occupation, or under his management or control, and every milk vessel used by him for containing milk for sale, to be kept thoroughly clean.

32. *Dairymen, &c., to report disease to the Health Officer.*—Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and every person having the management of any such trade, shall forthwith report in writing to the Health Officer the occurrence of any disease in any of his milch cows, or of any contagious or infectious diseases in man or animal upon the premises upon which such trade is carried on.

33. *Extent of application of bye-law.*—This bye-law, containing sections No. one to thirty-four, both inclusive, shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the place or places within the jurisdiction of the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Buninyong, and shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

34. *Penalties.*—If any person commit a breach of any of the provisions of this bye-law, he shall, for every such breach, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, or to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued; provided the justices before whom any penalty imposed hereby is sought to be recovered may order the whole or part only (not being less than Five shillings) of such penalty to be paid. And every person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the foregoing penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such Local Board of Health have or have not taken advantage of such powers.

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#### ROMSEY SHIRE LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH. BYE-LAW NO. 1.

*For keeping free from noisome matter yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, &c., and for regulating management of earth-closets, privies, &c., disinfecting and deodorizing night-soil and other offensive matter, and for regulating its removal and final deposit.*

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Romsey, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health Act 1883," and every other power enabling the said local board in their behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 1 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the shire of Romsey.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said shire shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connexion therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land in the said shire on which there shall be erected any stable, cowyard, cattleshed, or pigsty, shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state, in respect of cleanliness, as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health; and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to five cubic yards; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or

other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said shire shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or such other efficient deodorizer sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of night-soil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering, so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of effluvia therefrom.

9. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Any person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading, on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

11. The occupier of any premises within the shire used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance, or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order a portion only—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid; and any person committing any such breach shall be liable to the penalty notwithstanding that the local board of health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

## ROMSEY SHIRE LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

## BYE-LAW No. 2.

*For the registration of cowkeepers, dairymen, and purveyors of milk, and for cleansing milk stores and shops, and the suppression of any nuisance connected therewith.*

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Romsey, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health Act 1883," and every other power enabling the said local board in their behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, do hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 2 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the Shire of Romsey.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of May in every year, register himself with the local board of health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the secretary of the local board of health an application in the form contained in the schedule hereto; and every such person shall, with every such application, pay a fee of Two shillings and sixpence.

5. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the secretary of the local board of health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

6. Every person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman shall cause every milk store or milk shop in his occupation, or under his management or control, and every milk vessel used by him for containing milk for sale, to be kept thoroughly clean.

7. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper or purveyor of milk, and every person having the management of any such trade, shall forthwith report, in writing, to the health officer the occurrence of any disease in any of his milch cows, or of any contagious or infectious disease in any person or animal upon the premises upon which such trade is carried on.

8. Every person who shall commit a breach of this bye-law, or any of its provisions, shall be liable, in the discretion of the convicting justices, to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds and not less than Five shillings, or in the like discretion to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds and not less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.
