No. IX.

REGULATIONS OF THE VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS.

WHEREAS by *The Victorian Railways Commissioners Act 1883* it is enacted that the Victorian Railways Commissioners shall make Regulations for the granting of leave of absence from time to time to employes in the Railway Service, and that such Regulations, when confirmed by the Governor in Council, shall have the same force and effect as if they had been contained in the said Act. Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said enactment, the said Victorian Railways Commissioners make the following Regulations:—

1. The following holidays shall be held as common to the whole of the Department, namely—Christmas Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, and the Queen's Birthday.

2. For the purposes of these Regulations, the officers and employes of the Department are divided into three classes, as shown by the Schedules attached hereto.

CLASS 1.—OFFICERS AND OTHERS ON YEARLY SALARY.—After one year's service, 10 days' leave of absence to be granted, and one day additional for every year of service up to 21 days, exclusive of gazetted holidays and of the four holidays held to be common to the whole of the Department.

CLASS 2.—ARTISANS AND OTHERS.—After one year's service, 7 days, and one day additional per annum up to 14 days, exclusive of the four holidays held to be common to the whole of the Department, but inclusive of gazetted holidays.

CLASS 3.—LABORERS AND OTHERS.—After one year's service, 4 days, and one day additional per annum up to 7 days, inclusive of gazetted holidays, but exclusive of the four holidays held to be common to the whole of the Department.

3. Any officer or employe may be retained on duty, if necessary, on any of the days specified as holidays, whether gazetted or otherwise, but in such case he will be granted some other day in lieu thereof.

4. Employes engaged in the workshops of the Department will be required to take the holidays to which they may be entitled during such time as the workshops are closed.

5. Leave will be granted as may be convenient, but not in the Traffic Branch during November, December, and January. All applications (to be endorsed by the officer in charge) must reach head-quarters in sufficient time to be dealt with before the leave is actually wanted. Heads of branches may instruct employes to take their leave whether required at the time or not, and, if declined, the privilege will be forfeited.

6. Annual leave shall not be cumulative, and will lapse if not applied for within the twelve months in which it is due.

7. Applicants must apply for the full period of leave to which they are entitled.

8. When compatible with railway requirements, employes will be allowed leave for a day or two (if necessary), with pay, to vote at elections.

9. If any officer have been in the public service at least twenty years, and have not been reduced for misconduct, the Commissioners may, with the sanction of the Governor in Council, on the recommendation of the Minister, grant to him leave of absence for a period not exceeding twelve months—six months on full pay, and six months on half pay; but for such period of absence such officer shall not be entitled to receive any increase of salary.

10. Militiamen obtaining leave of absence for the purpose of attending drill, shooting matches, &c., shall have the period so absent deducted from their annual leave, or shall have such leave granted, business permitting, without pay.

11. The holidays of officers and employes appointed before *The Victorian Railways Commissioners Act 1883* came into force shall not be reduced, notwithstanding anything which may appear to the contrary under these Regulations, and any increase in their holidays shall only be made at the rate of one day per annum for every additional year of service from the time these Regulations come into force.

VICTORIAN MILITARY FORCES.—REGULATIONS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the first day of March 1887.

WHEREAS by *The Discipline Act 1870* it was provided that the Governor in Council might make rules and regulations for the employment, removal, or dismissal, and for the better government of persons engaged by virtue of the said Act, and for enforcing good order and discipline among them, and otherwise carrying out the said Act, and from time to time annul, alter, or amend the same and substitute others in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following alterations to the Regulations for the Victorian Military Forces, that is to say:—

PART II.—GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR THE PERMANENT AND MILITARY FORCES.

Paragraphs 8 and 9 are cancelled, and the following new paragraph is hereby inserted in lieu thereof:—

If the Military Commandant or any officer under his command at any time neglect or refuse to carry out and give full and complete effect to the preceding regulations, or if the Military Commandant or any officer under his command from any cause become or be unable to perform his duties under his engagement, the Minister of Defence may, if he think fit, recommend to the Governor in Council that the said Military Commandant or such officer (as the case may be) be suspended or removed, and he may thereupon be removed by the Governor in Council.

And the Honorable John Lamont Dow, for Her Majesty's Minister of Defence for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The births of 1,209 children, viz., 621 boys and 588 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of January. In the month of December 1886, 1,042 births were registered, or 167 fewer than in the month under review. The births were 409 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but 208 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in January numbered 956, viz., 510 of males and 446 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 253, or 26 per cent. The deaths outnumbered those in December 1886 by 189, and exceeded the average of January during the previous ten years by 404. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have exceeded that average by only 265.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was 3.26, and of deaths registered 2.58.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 104.9° on the 10th, and the lowest was 47.9° on the 1st. The mean temperature of the month (69.1°) was rather more than 3½ degrees above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (42.1°) took place on the 6th, viz., from a maximum of 96.3° to a minimum of 54.7°. The least range (8.7°) was on the 11th, viz., from a maximum of 72.5° to a minimum of 63.8°. The mean daily range was 20.9°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.092 inches on the 20th, and the lowest was 29.402 inches on the 14th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.808 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on 6 days, the amount of rainfall being 1.11 inch. The average rainfall in January for the previous ten years was 1.50 inch, or 0.39 inch more than that in the month under notice.

Males contributed 53 per cent., and females 47 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 53 per cent. to that mortality, as against 54 per cent. in January 1886, 48 per cent. in January 1885, 44 per cent. in January 1884, 48 per cent. in January 1883, 49 per cent. in January 1882, 45 per cent. in January 1881, 43 per cent. in January 1880, 44 per cent. in January 1879, 47 per cent. in January 1878, and 49 per cent. in January 1877.

The deaths of 40 persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month, viz.:—Those of a gardener, aged 78, and a gentleman, aged 82, who died of diarrhoea; a sailor, aged 75, and a female cook, aged 82, of valvular disease of the heart; a laborer, aged 75, a general dealer, aged 76, a male, of no stated occupation, and a storekeeper, each aged 87, of pneumonia; a female, aged 77, a gentleman, aged 81, a gardener, aged 82, and a bootmaker, aged 92, of bronchitis; a female, aged 77, and a carpenter, aged 78, of softening of the brain; a female, aged 80, and a female, aged 86, of paralysis; a hatter, aged 81, of syncope; a cabinetmaker and a farmer, each aged 80, and a grazier, aged 84, of heart disease; a miner, aged 82, of liver disease; a naval captain, aged 82, of disease of the prostate gland; a gentleman, aged 83, of cystitis; a tallow chandler, aged 83, of dropsy; a carpenter, aged 84, of fracture of the ribs; a female, aged 86, of constipation; and two females, each aged 77, a cabinetmaker, a carder, and a laborer, each aged 78, a gardener, aged 79, a warder, aged 80, a bootmaker and a market gardener, each aged 84, a female, aged 85, a gardener and a female, each aged 86, a female, aged 92, and a retired sailor, aged 95, of old age.

Thirty-six deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 28 were set down to accident, 1 to homicide, and 7 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A male infant, aged 9 months, was killed by the overturning of a cart; and a laborer, aged 28, by being thrown from a waggon; a boy, aged 11, died of internal injuries resulting from the kick of a horse; a bootmaker, aged 28, 2 males of occupation unknown, aged 39 and 54 respectively, were passed over by railway trains; a general dealer, aged 52, died of laceration of the brain, from fracture of the skull caused by a horse colliding with his hand.

cart and throwing him on his head; an accountant, aged 58, of fractured rib, caused by falling from a tramcar whilst alighting; a laborer, aged 60, had his neck broken by a stone from an explosion falling on him; a female, aged 60, died of shock caused by internal injury, the nature of which was unknown; and a carpenter, aged 84, of a fracture of the ribs, caused by being knocked down by a tramcar. A laborer, aged 44, died of a gunshot wound; a male infant, aged 9 months, and a carter, aged 28, of sunstroke; and a dealer in fancy goods, aged 72, from the effects of an overdose of brandy taken by himself. Two boys, aged 7 and 10 respectively, 2 carters, each aged 50, a miner, aged 51, a butcher, aged 53, and a male, of occupation unknown, aged 56, were drowned in the River Yarra; a carter, aged 15, was drowned in the West Melbourne Swamp whilst in a fit; and a laborer, aged 27, was found drowned in Hobson's Bay. A male infant, aged 7 months, was overlain: a male infant, aged 1 year, was suffocated by hanging whilst trying to pass through the rails of his cot; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 67, was choked by a piece of meat becoming impacted in his throat; and a male infant died of compression of the neck during birth. The homicidal death was that of an engineer, aged 53, who had his skull fractured, a verdict of manslaughter was brought in. Of the suicidal deaths a builder, aged 24, shot himself; an ironmoulder, aged 28, and a laborer, aged 40, cut their throats; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 40, a boarding-house keeper and a dealer in musical instruments, each aged 56, hanged themselves; and a news agent, aged 39, threw himself under a dray wheel.

One hundred and twenty-five deaths, or 13 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—55 in the Melbourne Hospital, 17 in the Alfred Hospital, 3 in the Homoeopathic Hospital, 2 in the Children's Hospital, 6 in the Women's Hospital, 8 in the Immigrants' Home, 8 in the Benevolent Asylum, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 7 in the Austin Hospital, 4 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 1 in the Police Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 511, of which 256, or 50 per cent., were of males, and 255, or 50 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 388 were under one year of age, 101 were between one and two, 12 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 4 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 445. Of these, 254, or 57 per cent., were males, and 191, or 43 per cent., were females; 10 were between five and ten, 10 were between ten and fifteen, 20 were between fifteen and twenty, 34 were between twenty and twenty-five, 42 were between twenty-five and thirty, 25 were between thirty and thirty-five, 31 were between thirty-five and forty, 44 were between forty and forty-five, 28 were between forty-five and fifty, 36 were between fifty and fifty-five, 38 were between fifty-five and sixty, 41 were between sixty and sixty-five, 28 were between sixty-five and seventy, 17 were between seventy and seventy-five, 13 were between seventy-five and eighty, 27 were upwards of eighty, and the age of one was unknown.

As compared with the experience of the previous month, deaths from specific febrile or zymotic diseases increased from 185 to 206, those from constitutional diseases from 113 to 157, and those from local diseases from 279 to 369. Under the zymotic head, deaths from measles rose from 1 to 3, those from typhoid fever from 26 to 40, and those from diarrhoeal diseases (which are usually prevalent in the hot weather) from 130 to 149. Under the constitutional head, deaths from tabes mesenterica rose from 10 to 20, those from acute hydrocephalus from 8 to 19, and those from phthisis from 67 to 82. Under the local head, deaths from nervous complaints rose from 87 to 100, those from heart affections from 28 to 47, those from throat and chest affections from 51 to 72, and those from bowel and stomach disorders from 75 to 122. Eight deaths occurred during the month amongst childbearing women, as against 3 in December. Comparing these numbers with the births registered during the same period, it follows that 1 death of a mother took place to every 151 children born alive, as against 1 to every 347 such children in the previous month.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Rabbit Suppression Act 1884* it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor might from time to time by Proclamation declare any animal to be a natural enemy of the rabbit, and prohibit within certain proclaimed districts the killing or capturing of any such animal without a special permit in that behalf, and might from time to time alter and revoke any such Proclamation: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Brougham Loch, K.C.B., the Governor aforesaid, under and by virtue of the power and authority in me vested by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation declare the animals known as

The Native Cat,
 The Tiger Cat,
 The Domestic Cat (run wild), and
 The Iguana

to be natural enemies of the Rabbit; and do hereby prohibit the destruction or capturing of the said animals within the boundaries of the Shire of Numurkah without a special permit being first had and obtained in that behalf.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Supplies for country stations for which no local contract may have been taken, or for which the contract has been terminated, may be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

3. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter cases, hogsheds, butter firkins, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed at the contractor's expense.

4. Bread.—A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Third quality (that issued to prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, fine sharps, the produce of prime, strong, thin-skinned, good colored wheat, to be perfectly free from coarse pollard or other offal.

5. Milk.—The milk must be fresh, pure, and of the best quality, and subject to test when required by the department. Should the supply prove to be not of contract quality, any expense incurred will be charged to the contractor.

6. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and, when the quality admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

7. Potatoes to be dry and free from dirt. Contractors to supply 105 lbs. of potatoes for each cental credited to them, and, in addition, to take back all rejected before being cooked.

8. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

9. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with the delivery of the supplies. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

10. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

11. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the

board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 10.

12. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

13. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will also be competent for two or more of the official visitors, in conjunction with the medical superintendent, to reject any supplies that they may consider not in accordance with contract; and in such cases the reference to a board of survey will not be deemed to be necessary on the part of the contractor.

14. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will be competent for a board of survey, consisting of the medical superintendent (or, in his absence, of the deputy medical superintendent) and any two officers named by him, to examine and reject any supplies that may be objected to. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Treasurer of the colony for the time being; but pending such appeal, he must take back the rejected articles and at once supply others of approved quality; failing which, the supplies required may be obtained by the officer concerned, and the expense charged to the contractor.

15. As the exact quantity of any article of provisions which may be required cannot be stated, the estimate being approximate only, the Government will not be bound by the quantity stated in the schedule, but will be at liberty to order more or less, according to circumstances, and the contractor will be bound to supply the same as ordered.

16. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

17. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivery or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the said Treasurer may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any part of the security.

19. 8. In the event of the officer ordering the coal not requiring the same to be put into the ship's bunkers, as required by condition No. 5, a rebate of 1s. per ton to be made by the contractor.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supply as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final.

10. If the board of survey shall decide that the coal is of inferior quality, the delay in delivering the quality specified in condition No. 1 will subject the contractor to a mulct assessed according to the actual loss sustained by such delay, and it will also be in the power of the Treasurer of the colony for the time being to terminate the contract forthwith.

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, marked cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy Postmaster-General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

6. The money or other security deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being duly signed.

TENDERS are hereby invited, and will be received until Noon on Tuesday the 29th day of March 1887, for the Conveyance of Post Office Mails, viz., Letters, Packets, Parcels, and Newspapers, as undermentioned, FOR THREE YEARS, from the 1st July 1887 to 30th June 1890.

1. Tenders are required to be written on a form, printed copies of which may be had gratuitously on application at any post office in the colony, and are to be forwarded (if by post, PREPAID AND REGISTERED) for receipt at the General Post Office by the hour and date first above mentioned, addressed to the Honorable the Postmaster-General, with the words "Tender for Mail Service No. " endorsed on the cover, or placed in the tender-box at the General Post Office.

2. Tenderers are requested to describe by their numbers, as below, the mail services for which they tender.

3. The amount of the tender must be stated AT RATE PER ANNUM in words as well as figures.

4. Every tender must bear the *bona fide* signature and address of the tenderer, and bear the names of two responsible persons willing to become bound for the fulfilment of the contract in such sum as the Government may direct, not exceeding the gross amount of the contract.

5. Every tender must be accompanied by cash, marked cheque, bank draft, or a bank deposit-receipt to the credit of the Deputy-Postmaster General for a sum equal to TEN PER CENT. of the annual amount named in the tender; this deposit to be absolutely forfeited to the Government in case the person whose tender may be accepted shall fail to complete the usual bond and contract to the satisfaction of the Government within ten days of being notified that the documents are ready for execution. The notice of acceptance, if delivered at the address named in the tender, shall be deemed sufficient.

6. The money or other security deposited by successful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, on the bond and contract being duly signed.

7. The money or other security deposited by unsuccessful tenderers will be returned to them upon application, and on their signing receipts for the respective amounts.

8. In the event of a new line of railway, or a new railway station on an existing line being opened for traffic, and it being decided that the mails shall be conveyed by rail, the Postmaster-General shall have the power of cancelling the contract for any mail service running in the vicinity of the railway without compensation to the contractor, or shall have power to alter the points of arrival and departure of the mails; and in the event of the travelling distance on any mail line being in such manner increased or diminished, all payments for the service subsequent to the alteration shall be computed on the basis of the average mileage-rate of the contract.

9. In the event of it being found necessary, from any cause, to absolutely cancel a contract, the Postmaster-General shall have full power to do so, provided that, unless the contract be cancelled on account of any fault on the part of the contractor, or on account of the opening of a railway line or a new railway station, payment shall be made to the contractor as compensation of a sum equal to ten per cent. of the moneys which would have become due on the unexpired period of the contract if the latter had been continued for the full term of three years.

10. Tenderers are requested to state the mode by which they propose to convey mails, whether by vehicle, on horseback, or by man on foot. If by vehicle, the description of vehicle and number of horses by which it is to be drawn to be given.

11. Tenderers are informed that from the 1st of July this year the Department will, in addition to the carriage of English and Indian parcels as at present, institute a Victorian parcel post system, and undertake to carry parcels up to 7 lbs. in weight by all services for which tenders may be accepted for conveyance of mails by vehicle.

Packets up to 3 lbs. in weight will be conveyed by horseback services as at present.

12. SHIRE OF OMEO.

PUBLIC HEALTH.—BYE-LAW No. 6.

For keeping free from noisome matter yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, &c.; and for regulating management of earth-closets, privies, &c., disinfecting and deodorizing nightsoil and other offensive matter, and for regulating its removal and final deposit.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883," and of every other power enabling them on this behalf, the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Omeo, being the municipal council thereof, for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, doth hereby make the bye-law following, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the township of Omeo, within the said shire.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said township shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connection therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land in the said township on which there shall be erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said township shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of eleven p.m. and five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall, once at least in every week, empty and cleanse or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of nightsoil on or belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of nightsoil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of effluvia therefrom.

9. All nightsoil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any nightsoil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

11. The occupier of any premises within the township used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered, so as to be water-tight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

BYE-LAW NO. 1, MADE BY THE LOCAL BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE SHIRE OF MAFFRA.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Maffra, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in "The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883" and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, doth hereby make the following Bye-law number one of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

2. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building the floor whereof is at no point less than three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground; and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or other movable receptacle made watertight for nightsoil, the content whereof does not exceed three cubic feet, and with the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorising material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing same. Every privy attached to any hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half an inch to the foot.

3. No closet-door or trap shall abut on any street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding twelve feet in width.

4. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, or some other material efficient for deodorising nightsoil, and shall cause all nightsoil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of such deodorising material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorise the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

5. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises, once at least in every two weeks, shall empty or cleanse, or cause to be emptied or cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of nightsoil on or belonging to such premises.

6. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, the contents of any earth-closet, privy, or cesspool, or place for the deposit of nightsoil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance, properly constructed, and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents, or of any portion thereof, or of any effluvia therefrom.

7. No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of nightsoil except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m., or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorised, and every person emptying or causing to be emptied any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of nightsoil, shall cause the nightsoil taken therefrom to be removed as soon as the same is emptied.

8. No person shall place or deposit any nightsoil in any place so as to be a nuisance to any person, or injurious to health.

9. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any nightsoil, removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall, immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof, cover the same, or cause the same to be covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

10. On the appointment by the local board of any place or places for the final reception of nightsoil, all nightsoil shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only.

11. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in every township in the shire of Maffra.

12. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

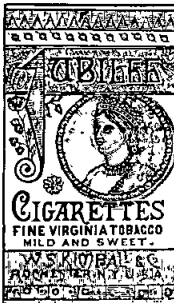
