TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND RUSSIA FOR THE MUTUAL SURRENDER OF FUGITIVE CRIMINALS.

THE following Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor, and its Enclosure, are published for general information.

SIR.—I have the honor to transmit to you, for information and publication in the Colony under your Government, an extract from the *London Gazette*, containing an Order of the Queen in Council of the 7th of March 1887, for carrying into effect the Treaty for the mutual surrender of fugitive Criminals, signed between Great Britain and Russia on the 24th of November last.

The Treaty came into operation on the 21st of March of this year, in conformity with Article XIX.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts 1870 and 1873 it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any Foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such Foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's Dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British Possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British Possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such Foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer.

And whereas in accordance with section 18 of *The Extradition Act 1870* the Legislature of the Dominion of Canada has, by laws passed in the years 1877 and 1882, and respectively styled *The Extradition Act 1877* and *An Act to Amend the Extradition Act 1877*, made provision for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in, or are suspected of being in, the Dominion.

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-fourth day of November One thousand eight hundred and eighty-six between Her Majesty and His Majesty the Emperor of Russia, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Majesty the Emperor of All the Russias, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up; their said Majesties have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty for this purpose, that is to say:

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, the Right Honorable Stafford Henry Earl of Iddesleigh, Viscount St. Cyres, a Peer of the United Kingdom, and a Baronet of Great Britain, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, &c., &c.;

"And His Majesty the Emperor of All the Russias, M. Georges de Staal, Privy Councillor, Grand Cross of several Russian and foreign Orders, his Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, &c., &c.;

"Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

"ARTICLE I.

"The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other those persons who, being accused or convicted of a crime or offence committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty.

"ARTICLE II.

"The crimes or offences for which the extradition is to be granted are the following:—

- "1. Murder, or attempt, or conspiracy to murder.
 - "2. Manslaughter.
 - "3. Counterfeiting or altering money, or uttering counterfeit or altered money.
 - "4. Forgery, counterfeiting, or altering or uttering what is forged, or counterfeited, or altered.
 - "5. Embezzlement or larceny.
 - "6. Malicious injury to property if the offence be indictable.
 - "7. Obtaining money or goods by false pretences.
 - "8. Crimes against bankruptcy law.
 - "9. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, or director, or member or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.
 - "10. Perjury, or subornation of perjury.
 - "11. Rape.
 - "12. Carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age.
 - "13. Indecent assault.
 - "14. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of a woman.
 - "15. Abduction.
 - "16. Child stealing.
 - "17. Kidnapping and false imprisonment.
 - "18. Burglary or housebreaking.
 - "19. Arson.
 - "20. Robbery with violence.
 - "21. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
 - "22. Threats by letter, or otherwise, with intent to extort.
 - "23. Piracy by law of nations.
 - "24. Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.
 - "25. Assaults on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to destroy life, or to do grievous bodily harm.
 - "26. Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.
 - "27. Dealing in slaves in such a manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.
- "Extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both the Contracting Parties.
- "Extradition may also be granted, at the discretion of the State applied to, in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

"ARTICLE III.

"Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

"ARTICLE IV.

"The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Russian Government, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial, within the Russian or British dominions respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

"If the person claimed on the part of the British Government, or if the person claimed on the part of the Russian

"Et Sa Majesté l'Empereur de Toutes les Russies, M. Georges de Staal, Conseiller Privé Actuel, Grand-Croix de plusieurs Ordres Russes et étrangers, son Ambassadeur Extraordinaire et Plénipotentiaire près la Cour de Sa Majesté la Reine du Royaume-Uni de la Grande-Bretagne et d'Irlande, Impératrice des Indes, &c., &c.;

"Lesquels, après s'être communiqués leur pleins pouvoirs respectifs, trouvés en bonne et due forme, ont arrêté et conclu les Articles suivants:—

"ARTICLE I.

"Les Hautes Parties Contractantes s'engagent à se livrer réciproquement les individus qui, poursuivis ou condamnés pour un crime ou un délit commis sur le territoire de l'une des Parties, seraient trouvés sur le territoire de l'autre, dans les circonstances et sous les conditions prévues par le présent Traité.

"ARTICLE II.

"Les crimes et délits pour lesquels l'extradition sera accordée sont les suivants:—

- "1. Meurtre, ou tentative de meurtre, ou complot ayant ce crime pour but.
 - "2. Homicide sans préméditation ou guetapens.
 - "3. Contrefaçon ou altération de monnaie, mise en circulation de monnaie contrefaite ou altérée.
 - "4. Faux, contrefaçon, ou altération, ou mise en circulation de ce qui est falsifié, ou contrefait, ou altéré.
 - "5. Détournement frauduleux, ou vol.
 - "6. Destruction ou dégradation de toute propriété, lorsque le fait incriminé est punissable de peines criminelles ou correctionnelles.
 - "7. Escroquerie d'argent, ou d'autres objets, sous de faux prétextes.
 - "8. Crimes contre les lois sur la banqueroute.
 - "9. Fraude (abus de confiance) par un administrateur, banquier, agent, commissionnaire, curateur, ou directeur, ou membre ou fonctionnaire d'une société quelconque, pour autant que le fait est puni par les lois en vigueur.
 - "10. Faux serment ou subornation de témoins.
 - "11. Viol.
 - "12. Commerce charnel avec une jeune fille âgée de moins de 16 ans, ou tentative à ce fait.
 - "13. Attentat à la pudeur avec violence.
 - "14. Administration de substances ou emploi d'instruments dans l'intention de provoquer l'avortement.
 - "15. Enlèvement.
 - "16. Vol d'enfants.
 - "17. Sequestration ou détention illégale.
 - "18. Effraction ou escalade d'une habitation et de ses dépendances dans le but de commettre un crime.
 - "19. Incendie volontaire.
 - "20. Vol avec violence.
 - "21. Blessures ou graves injures corporelles infligées avec mauvaise intention.
 - "22. Menaces écrites ou autres faites en vue d'extorsion.
 - "23. Piraterie considérée comme crime par le droit des gens.
 - "24. Submersion, échouement ou destruction d'un navire en mer, ou tentative ou complot ayant ce crime pour but.
 - "25. Attaque à bord d'un navire en haute mer dans le but d'homicide ou afin de porter de graves lésions corporelles.
 - "26. Révolte ou complot de révolte par deux ou plusieurs personnes à bord d'un navire en haute mer, contre l'autorité du capitaine.
 - "27. Traite des Esclaves telle qu'elle est punie par les lois des deux pays.
- "L'extradition aura également lieu pour complicité à und des crimes ci-dessus mentionnés, pourvu que la complicité soit punissable par les lois des deux Parties Contractantes.
- "Elle dépendra de l'Etat requis d'accorder également l'extradition pour tout autre crime à raison duquel l'extradition peut avoir lieu d'après les lois en vigueur des deux Parties Contractantes.

"ARTICLE III.

"Chacun des deux Gouvernements aura liberté pleine et entière de refuser à la autre l'extradition de ses propres sujets.

"ARTICLE IV.

"L'extradition ne sera pas accordée si l'individu réclamé par le Gouvernement du Royaume-Uni ou par celui de l'Empire de Russie, a déjà été jugé, acquitté ou puni, ou se trouve encore sous jugement, soit dans l'Empire de Russie, soit dans le Royaume-Uni, pour le crime à raison duquel l'extradition est demandée.

"Si la personne réclamée par le Gouvernement du Royaume-Uni ou par celui de l'Empire de Russie est en état de prévention

Government, should be under examination, or is undergoing sentence under a conviction, for any other crime within the Russian or British dominions respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until after he has been discharged, whether by acquittal or on expiration of his sentence, or otherwise.

"ARTICLE V.

"The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution, or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

"ARTICLE VI.

"A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has in fact been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

"ARTICLE VII.

"A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored or had an opportunity of returning to the State by which he has been surrendered.

"This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

"The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

"If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

"A sentence passed in contumacium is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

"ARTICLE IX.

"If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

"ARTICLE X.

"If the fugitive has been arrested in the British dominions, he shall forthwith be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the British dominions.

"In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the British dominions shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or the affirmations of witnesses taken in Russia, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating the fact of, a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

"1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Russian State.

"2. Depositions or affirmations or the copies thereof must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Russian State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

"3. A certificate of or judicial document stating the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the Russian State.

"4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the Russian State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by the law of the British dominion, where the examination is taken, may be substituted for the foregoing.

"ARTICLE XI.

"If the fugitive has been arrested in Russia his surrender shall be granted if upon examination by a competent authority it appears that the documents furnished by the British Government furnish sufficient *prima facie* evidence to justify the extradition.

"The Russian authorities shall admit as valid evidence records drawn up by the British authorities of the depositions of witnesses, or copies thereof, and records of conviction or other judicial documents or copies thereof: Provided that the said documents be signed or authenticated by an authority whose competence shall be certified by the seal of a Minister of State of Her Britannic Majesty.

"ARTICLE XII.

"The extradition shall not take place unless the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case

"Le criminel fugitif ne sera pas extradé si le délit pour lequel l'extradition est demandée, est considéré comme un délit politique, ou si l'individu prouve que la demande d'extradition a été faite en réalité dans le but de le poursuivre ou de le punir pour un délit d'un caractère politique.

"ARTICLE VII.

"L'individu qui aura été livré ne pourra en aucun cas, dans le pays auquel l'extradition a été accordée, être maintenu en état d'arrestation, ou poursuivi pour aucun crime ou faits autres que ceux qui avaient motivé l'extradition à moins qu'il n'ait été réintégré ou n'ait eu l'occasion de retourner de lui-même dans l'Etat qui l'avait extradé.

"Cette stipulation n'est pas applicable aux crimes commis après l'extradition.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"L'extradition sera demandée par l'organe des Agents Diplomatiques respectifs des deux Hautes Parties Contractantes.

"La demande d'extradition d'un prévenu devra être accompagnée d'un Mandat d'Arrêt décerné par l'autorité compétente de l'Etat requérant, et des preuves qui, d'après les lois de l'endroit où le prévenu a été trouvé, justifieraient son arrestation, si l'acte punissable y avait été commis.

"Si la demande d'extradition concerne une personne déjà condamnée, elle doit être accompagnée de l'Arrêt de Condamnation qui a été rendu contre le coupable par le Tribunal compétent de l'Etat requérant.

"Un Arrêt rendu par contumace ne sera pas considéré comme une condamnation, mais une personne ainsi condamnée pourra être traitée comme une personne poursuivie.

"ARTICLE IX.

"Si la demande d'extradition s'accorde avec les stipulations précédentes, les autorités compétentes de l'Etat requis procéderont à l'arrestation du fugitif.

"ARTICLE X.

"Si le fugitif est arrêté sur territoire Britannique, il sera aussitôt amené devant un Magistrat compétent qui devra l'entendre et procéder à l'examen préliminaire de l'affaire de la même manière que si l'arrestation avait eu lieu pour un crime commis sur territoire Britannique.

"Les autorités de la Grande-Bretagne quand elles procéderont à l'examen établi par les stipulations précédentes devront admettre comme preuves entièrement valables les dépositions assermentées ou les affirmations faites en Russie, ou les copies de ces pièces, de même que les Mandats d'Arrêt et les sentences rendues dans ce pays, ainsi que les certificats de condamnation ou les pièces judiciaires constatant le fait d'une condamnation, pourvu que ces documents soient rendus authentiques de la manière suivante:—

"1. Un mandat doit être signé par un Juge, Magistrat, ou officier de l'Empire Russe.

"2. Les dépositions ou affirmations ou les copies de ces pièces doivent porter la signature d'un Juge, Magistrat, ou officier de l'Empire Russe, constatant que ces dépositions ou ces affirmations se trouvent être en expédition originale ou en copie vidimée selon le cas.

"3. Un certificat de condamnation ou un document judiciaires constatant le fait d'une condamnation doit être certifié par un Juge, Magistrat, ou officier de l'Empire Russe.

"4. Ces mandats, dépositions, affirmations, copies, certificats, ou documents judiciaires doivent être rendus authentiques dans chaque cas, soit par le serment d'un témoin, soit par l'apposition du sceau officiel du Ministre de la Justice, ou de tout autre Ministre de l'Empire Russe; cependant, les pièces susénoncées pourront être rendues authentiques de toute autre manière qui serait reconnue par les lois locales en vigueur dans la partie du territoire Britannique, où l'examen de l'affaire aura lieu.

"ARTICLE XI.

"L'extradition d'un fugitif arrêté en Russie sera accordée, s'il résulte de l'examen qui en sera fait par une autorité compétente que les documents fournis par le Gouvernement Britannique contiennent des preuves *prima facie* suffisantes pour justifier l'extradition.

"Les autorités Russes devront admettre comme preuves entièrement valables les procès-verbaux des dépositions de témoins dressés par les autorités Britanniques, ou les copies de ces procès-verbaux; ainsi que les procès-verbaux des condamnations ou autres documents judiciaires, ou les copies de ces actes; pourvu que ces documents soient signés ou rendus authentiques par une autorité dont la compétence sera certifiée par le sceau d'un Ministre d'Etat de Sa Majesté Britannique.

"ARTICLE XII.

"L'extradition n'aura lieu que dans le cas où les preuves fournies auront été trouvées suffisantes, d'après les lois de l'Etat requis, soit pour justifier la mise sous jugement du pri-

the crime had been committed in the territory of the said State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to. And the fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered until the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his being committed to prison to await his surrender.

"ARTICLE XIII.

"If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

"ARTICLE XIV.

"If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to or the proper Tribunal thereof shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

"ARTICLE XV.

"All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension, shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery thereof, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

"ARTICLE XVI.

"All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

"ARTICLE XVII.

"When, for the purposes of a criminal matter, not being of a political character, pending in any of its Courts or Tribunals, either Government shall desire to obtain the evidence of witnesses residing in the other State, a 'Commission Rogatoire' to that end shall be sent through the diplomatic channel, and which shall be executed in conformity with the law of the State where the evidence is to be taken.

"The Government which sends the 'Commission Rogatoire' will, however, take all necessary steps and pay all expenses for finding and procuring the attendance before the Magistrate of the witnesses named for examination in such Commission.

"ARTICLE XVIII.

"The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty so far as the laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

"The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions may be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by the Chief Consular Officer of the Russian Empire in such Colony or possession.

"Such requisitions may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

"Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Russian criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

"Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

"ARTICLE XIX.

"The Treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

"In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered that the operation of the said Acts shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the Russian Empire and to the said Treaty, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Acts aforesaid continue in force, and no longer.

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the *Foreign Deserters Act 1852*, it is provided that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power, when within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended, and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the dominions of His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said *Foreign Deserters Act 1852*, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the *London Gazette*, seamen, not being slaves, and not being British subjects, who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships. Provided always that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, he may be detained till he has been tried by a competent court, and until his sentence, if any, has been carried into effect.

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

His Excellency the Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations relating to the exportation and re-introduction of samples of merchandise.

REGULATIONS.

1 Commercial travellers' samples of merchandise may be exported and re-introduced into Victoria, provided that such samples have been entered outwards in the usual way, by export warrant, which shall give full particulars of all goods intended to be shipped, and also that a bond in accordance with the form in Schedule "A" has been entered into by the exporter, with two approved sureties, for a sum equal to twice the amount of duty chargeable on such goods, and conditioned that no other goods will be substituted or returned instead of the samples so exported.

2 Persons intending to export samples must, at the time of passing the export entry, make application to the Collector of Customs for permission to ship the same, and for the services of an officer to inspect the goods. Such officer will compare the

samples with the invoice thereof, which must be furnished to him by the exporter in duplicate, and the officer shall certify the entry as being correct, and also sign the invoices produced. He shall then seal the packages containing such goods. When the packages have been put on board the exporting vessel, a water-side officer shall make the entry "shipped," on being satisfied that the seals are unbroken and the goods duly exported. The exporter shall deliver to the export officer one of the duplicate invoices, signed as aforesaid.

3 In the event of the whole or any portion of the goods so exported being returned, the same shall be specially entered as "returned samples," and shall be compared and verified, if possible, by the officer who superintended the packing thereof in the first instance, with the invoice certified to by him at the time of examination, and deposited with the export officer.

4 In lieu of a bond for each shipment, a general bond may be accepted, in accordance with the form in Schedule "B," from exporters of samples. Such bonds shall be for such sum as the Collector of Customs may direct in each case, with two approved sureties, and may be taken to cover all exportations of samples to any places in the Australasian Colonies for a period not exceeding twelve (12) months.

5 All samples of merchandise not duly entered outwards under the foregoing Regulations shall, on re-importation, pay the full rate of duty chargeable thereon on original importation, and under no circumstances will any exception to, or relaxation of, these regulations be made.

SALARIES.—NON-CLERICAL DIVISION.

Act No. 773, Section 41, Sub-section VIII.

LADDERS.

The Ladders are to be of Red or Yellow Baltic Fir, free from large or loose knots, and perfectly straight in grain, sound and free from heart and sap. The rounds are to be cleft, of young and fresh Hickory, English Ash, or English Oak, straight in grain, and turned to 1½ inch diameter in centre, and for ¾-inch holes at ends. The sides of the Ladders are to be bored to receive the rounds, and the holes are to be tapered outwards, so as to admit of the round being opened and wedged. All the rounds are to well fill the holes, and be wedged with glue into the sides, previously having received a coat of wet white lead. Every eighth round a tie-bolt ½ inch diameter with collar at each end 1½ inch diameter is to be inserted below the round with nut and washer at each end, the rounds to be 9 inches apart centre to centre. The Ladders are to be finished with three coats of good lead and oil paint, of such colour as may be ordered.

The 36-foot Ladders are to spread at bottom 18 inches clear between the sides, which are to be 4½ inches x 2¾ inches; and at top 9½ inches clear, and sides 2¾ inches x 1½ inches.

The 30-foot Ladders 18 inches clear at bottom, with sides 4½ inches x 2¾ inches; and at top 10½ inches clear, and sides 2¾ inches x 1½ inches.

The 24-foot Ladders 16 inches clear at bottom, and sides 4½ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1¾ inches.

The 20-foot Ladders 15 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3¾ inches x 2 inches; at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1¾ inches.

The 16-foot Ladders 14 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ x 1¾ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1¾ inches.

The 12-foot Ladders 13 inches clear at bottom, and sides $3\frac{3}{8} \times 1\frac{3}{4}$ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides $2\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{1}{4}$ inches.

The 10-foot Ladders 13 inches clear at bottom, and sides $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches \times $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides $2\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{1}{4}$ inches.

All the Ladders over 14 feet long are to be parallel in the sides to one-third of the height from the bottom; that is, the sides are to be of the same section one-third up as at bottom.

SPECIFICATION.

Whenever specially ordered, the castings shall be run from the very best "cold-blast iron," and of such particular brand, quality, and mixture as may be described in the order; or of such other substituted mixture as may be approved or directed by the Locomotive Superintendent, so as to produce a hard, close, soft, or other description of metal.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfections, and are to be sound in every respect and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same, and the Contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting, where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and clean. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Station nearest to the Contractor's works, there to be delivered to the Contractor free of cost or carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam-boards. The orders will express the kind or description of casting according to the schedule distinction; and the rates there filled in opposite each item will be allowed accordingly.

The Railway Department will supply all patterns, and deliver the same to the Station nearest to the Contractor's works, free of cost, from whence the Contractor must fetch them when required and when due notice of same has been given in writing. Any pattern lost by the Contractor must be replaced by him.

Whenever only one or two castings are required, and they can be moulded from the broken originals, the Contractor will be bound to mould from such patterns without requiring the Victorian Railways Commissioners to supply a wooden or other pattern for same, and no extra price will be allowed.

All pipes and bends must be moulded in loam whenever required, and a loam pattern made. A loam pattern must be struck up for any casting when a pattern cannot be supplied, and when only one casting or so is required, and when of that simple form that it can be made from a loam pattern; and no extra rate or charge will be allowed for the loam pattern beyond the loam price stated in schedule. The Victorian Railways Commissioners will supply all necessary striking boards, but no plates or cramps.

All patterns, loam-boards, &c., supplied by the Victorian Railways Commissioners must be returned by the Contractor in good order, with the castings, and delivered to the Railway Stores at Williamstown.

Notwithstanding the delivery of any castings and a receipt having been given for them, should such castings turn out unsound, not in accordance with pattern or instructions, or in any way whatever defective, or of different quality of iron to that ordered, they must be removed at the expense of the Contractor, and other castings must be supplied in lieu thereof, without delay and without additional charge.

Should the Contractor, in the opinion of the Engineer-in-Chief, Engineer for Existing Lines, or the Locomotive Superintendent, fail to furnish work in accordance with the specification, then, in seven days after due notice to that effect shall have been given in writing, the Secretary for Railways shall have full power to re-advertise and re-let this contract to any other person the Victorian Railways Commissioners shall think fit; and at the expiration of seven days after such notice shall have been given to the Contractor, this contract shall become null and void.

WHEREAS by section 2 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1886*, No. 893, it is enacted that where any land or water easement which may be taken or appropriated for any of the purposes of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881-1885*, shall be held by any lessee or licensee of the Crown, a description of the land or water easement so taken or appropriated, and the fact of the same having been so taken or appropriated, shall be endorsed upon the lease or license under which the same is so held, and such endorsement shall be registered in the Lands Office: Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the fee for the registration in the Crown Lands Office of any water easement shall be Ten shillings.

And the Honorable John Lamont Dow, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

AVOCA WATER TRUST.—REGULATIONS.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations made by the Avoca Water Trust under the provisions of *The Water Conservation Acts 1881-1884*.

REGULATIONS.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Avoca Water Trust part of the Water Works district of which has been proclaimed an urban district for the purposes of *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1883 and 1884*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881 and 1884*, make the Regulations following:—

No. 1. Water-troughs, and persons plying for hire with horse and dray, shall be supplied with water by measure only, provided that the minimum quantity of water to be charged for shall in each case be 6,000 gallons per year.

No. 2. The valuation of lands and tenements for the purpose of water rates shall be the same as the valuation of such lands and tenements during the same or the previous year by the Council of the municipal district in which such lands or tenements are situated, or (if there be no such valuation) the valuation of such lands or tenements by a police magistrate; and that no such rate shall exceed the amount of Ten pounds per centum on such valuation. Provided that the charge for the supply of water aforesaid shall not in any case be less than the sum of Twenty shillings per annum.

No. 3. The rate or charge for water supplied by meter shall be Fourpence per 100 gallons.

No. 4. The Trust may cause a meter or meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary. Such meter or meters to be provided and fixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supplied to be charged for by measurement at the aforesaid rate. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial on the same is capable of registering one million gallons. Except in the case of special agreements with the Trust, or in cases not otherwise specially provided for, the minimum quantity of water to be charged for in any case where water is supplied by measure shall be a quantity equal to that quantity which the amount of the assessed water-rates of the lands or tenements so supplied would purchase at Fourpence per (100) hundred gallons, had such rates been levied.

No. 5. If any meter should cease to register, or be reported by any officer of the Trust as out of repair or registering inaccurately, the Trust shall estimate and charge for the water consumed during the period such meter was not in working order, and until it is repaired and refixed either by taking an average of the quantity used during the previous quarter or during the corresponding period of the previous year, or they may insert a check-meter on the service-pipe.

No. 6. Overflow-pipes to any vessel will not be permitted.

No. 7. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away from his premises such water, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

No. 8. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away from any tap, trough, or public or private service-pipe any water shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

No. 9. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for that purpose. And any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

No. 10. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, nor shall any person not supplied with water by measure at any time use water by hose. And any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and also to have his supply of water cut off for a period not exceeding one month.

No. 11. Water is supplied by the Trust for domestic purposes only, unless by measure.

No. 12. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam-boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water without affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter under a penalty of Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice from the Trust.

No. 13. No person shall affix any service-pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter or repair, or in any manner interfere with any of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipe of the Trust, until he shall have obtained from the Trust a license in that behalf to execute such work. And any unlicensed person affixing, altering, or repairing, or in any way interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

No. 14. Before any such license shall be granted by the Trust the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber. The Trust shall have power of cancelling such license at any time.

No. 15. Any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust without giving two days' notice to the Trust of his intention so to do, or shall in any way tamper with or alter any pipe the property of the Trust without the permission of the Trust in writing being first obtained, or who shall wilfully or carelessly break, injure, or open any lock, cock,

valve, pipe, work, or engine, the property of the Trust, shall be liable for each such offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

No. 16. If any person shall neglect to keep in proper repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the Trust may seem fit, unless the necessary repair shall have been effected. The service-pipe from the main being the property of the owners or occupiers of the tenements supplied by such service-pipe, the occupier, if any, and if none, the owner shall in every instance in which any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipe being leaky, or otherwise out of repair, or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds. And, in the event of continuing the offence, to a further penalty of Two pounds for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

No. 17. In the construction of these bye-laws, the word person shall be deemed to extend to and include a Corporation whether aggregate or sole. And the word Trust shall mean the Avoca Water Trust.

No. 3.

Regulation for making a Rate on all the Rateable Property in the Maryborough Waterworks District.

1st. A rate of One shilling in the pound sterling, except as hereinafter mentioned, on the annual value of all the rateable property in the Maryborough Waterworks District, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements comprised within the said waterworks district for the municipal rates of the Borough of Maryborough, is hereby made for the year commencing on the first day of January 1887 and ending on the thirty-first day of December 1887. Provided that, in pursuance of an Order of His Excellency the Governor in Council dated the twenty-ninth day of March 1887, and made by virtue of the powers conferred by section 95 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883*, the sum of One pound sterling shall be the minimum amount of rates to be paid annually by every owner of any house or tenement liable to be rated by the Maryborough Waterworks Trust when the valuation in respect to such house or tenement shall not exceed the sum of Twenty pounds sterling per annum.

2nd. Such rate to be paid in two equal instalments, the first of which instalments shall be due and payable on the first day of July 1887, and the second instalment shall be due and payable on the first day of January 1888.

3rd. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and collect the said rate.

4th. The foregoing Regulation, No. 3, was made by the Commissioners of the Maryborough Waterworks Trust under and by virtue of "sub-section 4" of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881* on the 22nd day of April 1887.

WIMMERA UNITED WATERWORKS TRUST.— REGULATION.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulation made by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust, under the provisions of section 44 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881*—

The Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 44 of "The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1881," do make the following Regulation:—

No. XI.

Regulation for the making of a rate for the year 1887 on all rateable property in that portion of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, of which notice has been given that the same has been supplied with water, under the provisions of *The Victorian Water Conservation Acts 1881-1885*, and which notice was published in the *Government Gazette* of March 12th 1886, wherein the portion of the district so described as supplied with water is as follows, that is to say—the whole of the area of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, except in the parishes of Hindmarsh, Joop, Jeparit, Batyik, Tarranyurk, Willenabrina, Yellangip, Katyil, and Dimboola.

Whereas the Governor in Council has, by an order made the thirteenth day of April 1886, under the provisions of section 33 of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883*, divided the Wimmera United Waterworks District into divisions, and directed that the necessary rates for paying interest on all moneys borrowed by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust for the construction and maintenance of their waterworks, or to meet any other expenses in connection therewith, shall be levied in the following only of such divisions, viz.:—The Shire of St. Arnaud division, the Shire of Kara Kara division, the Shire of Dunnmunkle division, the Shire of Stawell division, the Shire of Wimmera division, and the Shire of Dimboola A division; and has further directed that such rates be levied differentially as between such said several divisions, and that the proportion in which such several divisions shall be rated respectively one to another shall be as follows, that is to say, that the respective ratings in the pound sterling on the annual value of rateable property rated for municipal purposes in the said several divisions shall be—Shire of St. Arnaud division, Seven pence; Shire of Kara Kara division, Fifteen pence; Shire of Dunnmunkle division, Fourteen pence; Shire of Stawell division, Nine pence; Shire of Wimmera division, Thirteen pence; Shire of Dimboola A division, Twenty-four pence.

And whereas the Governor of the colony of Victoria, by Proclamation dated 28th June 1886, proclaimed certain areas in and around the townships of Murtoa and Warracknabeal to be respectively Urban Districts under the provisions of *The Victorian Water Conservation Act 1883*, No. 778.

And whereas the Governor in Council by an Order dated the 13th day of December 1886, diminished the extent of the said Wimmera United Waterworks District by excising therefrom the territory described above as the Shire of Wimmera division.

The following rate is made on the annual value of all the rateable property in the said several divisions of the Wimmera United Waterworks District, excepting in the said parishes of Hindmarsh, Joop, Jeparit, Batyik, Tarranyurk, Willenabrina, Yellangip, Katyil, and Dimboola, and in the said Urban Districts of Murtoa and Warracknabeal, according to the valuation for the time being on all such lands and tenements for the municipal rates of the Shires of St. Arnaud, Kara Kara, Dunnmunkle, Stawell, and Dimboola respectively, that is to say—on rateable property within the Shire of St. Arnaud division, a rate of Seven pence in the pound sterling of such valuation on rateable property; in the Shire of Kara Kara division, a rate of Fifteen pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Dunnmunkle division, a rate of Fourteen pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; in the Shire of Stawell division, a rate of Nine pence in the pound sterling of such valuation; and in the Shire of Dimboola A division, a rate of Twenty-four pence in the pound sterling of such valuation.

Such rate is hereby made payable on the first day of June 1887.

No. 219), it was amongst other things enacted, that all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises thereafter to be erected, built, enclosed, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within Victoria, which were from time to time proclaimed by the Governor in Council, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, or penal establishments, should, from and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments (hereinafter called "gaols") respectively of the place or district where the same are situated, and should be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected (also hereinafter called "gaols"), and of the prisoners confined within the same; and it was also enacted that, except where it was otherwise proclaimed by the Governor in Council, every gaol should be and be taken for all purposes as being equally a house of correction and a prison for debtors, and also every house of correction should be taken to be a prison: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power and authority conferred by the said Act and all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and notify that the buildings and premises hereinafter described are and shall be a public gaol, prison, and house of correction within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

ARARAT GAOL.—Comprising all buildings, erections, houses, enclosed places, and premises erected, built, or enclosed on the following site, which was temporarily reserved for police and other public purposes, by Order of 26th August 1867, viz. two acres, county of Ripon, town of Ararat: Commencing at the north-western angle of the site, the said angle being formed by the junction of the eastern side of Ligar street with the southern side of High street; bounded thence by the last-named street, bearing N. 71° 52' E. five chains; thence by Ingor street, bearing S. 18° 8' E. four chains; thence by Barkly street, bearing S. 71° 52' W. five chains; and thence by Ligar street, bearing N. 18° 8' W. four chains, to the point of commencement.

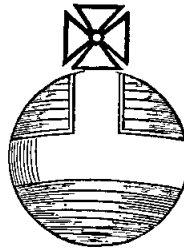
