#### PUBLIC AND BANK HOLIDAYS.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir Henry Brougham Loch, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the eighty-eighth section of The Public Service Act 1883, and in the fifth section of The Bank Holidays Act 1873, I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint

Wednesday the 21st day of September instant

to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Heathcote;

FRIDAY THE 23RD DAY OF SEPTEMBER INSTANT

to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Kyabram and Tatura;

WEDNESDAY THE 28TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER INSTANT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Swan Hill;

Wednesday the 5th day of October next

to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Charlton, Maldon, within the Borough of St. Arnaud, and within the South Riding of the Shire of St. Arnaud; and as a Bank Half-Holiday at Elmore, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon;

THURSDAY THE 6TH AND WEDNESDAY THE 19TH DAYS OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as Public and Bank Holidays within the Shire of Bacchus Marsh;

Wednesday the 12th day of October next

to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Borough of Talbot;

THURSDAY THE 13TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Warrnambool.

#### "THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACT 1885."

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the 29th section of The Factories and Shops Act 1885 (49 Vict. No. 862), and after due inquiry, I, the Chief Secretary of Victoria, being the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the said Act, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of the said section 29 in the

WORKBOOMS OF MESSES. BRIGHT AND HITCHCOCKS, GEELONG,

for a period of three months from the 1st October next, upon these express conditions, that is to say:

- That no person or persons shall employ in the said workrooms more than fitteen females, being dressmakers, for more than fifty-four hours in any one week in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
   That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without her consent.
   That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such workrooms for the information of all concerned.

## "THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACT 1885."

In Compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the 29th section of The Factories and Shops Act 1885 (49 Vict. No. 862), and after due inquiry, I, the Chief Secretary of Victoria, being the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the said Act, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of the said section 29 in the Workbooms of Messes. Moubray, Rowan, and Hicks, Nos. 33, 35, and 37 Collins Street west, Melbourne,

- for a period of three months from the date hereof, upon these express conditions, that is to say:—

  1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said workrooms any adult females, being seamstresses and dressmakers, for more than fifty-six hours in any one week in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.

  2. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without her consent.

  3. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such workrooms for the information of all concerned.
