LIABILITY TO QUARANTINE OF VESSELS, ETC.,  
ARRIVING FROM THE ISLAND OF TASMANIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Public Health Statute 1865* (28 Vict. No. 264) it is amongst other things enacted that if the Governor in Council shall by Proclamation notify that any place beyond the seas is infected with the cholera or other infectious or contagious disease, and that it is probable such disease may be brought from such place to Victoria, immediately after such notification all vessels whatever arriving from or having touched at any such place, and all vessels and boats receiving any person or thing whatsoever from or out of any vessel so coming from or having touched at any such infected place as aforesaid (whether such person or thing shall have come or been brought in such vessel or such person shall have gone or have been put on board the same either before or after the arrival of such vessel at any place in Victoria, and whether such vessel was or was not bound to any place in Victoria), and all persons and things whatsoever on board of any vessel so coming from or having touched at such infected place as aforesaid or on board of any such receiving vessels or boats as aforesaid, shall be liable to quarantine within the meaning of Part VI. of the said Act, and of any Order made by the Governor in Council and notified by Proclamation concerning quarantine and the prevention of infection from the time of the departure of such vessels from such infected place as aforesaid or from the time such persons or things should have been received on board respectively; and it is also enacted that all such vessels and boats as aforesaid, and all persons (as well pilots as others), and all things whether coming or brought in such vessels or boats from such infected place as aforesaid, or going or being put on board the same either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats at any place in Victoria, and all persons or things as aforesaid on board such receiving vessel or boat as aforesaid, shall upon their arrival at any place in Victoria be obliged to perform quarantine in such places for such time and in such manner as shall be from time to time directed by the Governor in Council and notified by proclamation as aforesaid: Until such vessels and boats, persons, and things as aforesaid shall have respectively performed and shall be duly discharged from quarantine, no such persons or things shall either before or after the arrival of such vessels or boats at any place in Victoria come or be brought on shore or go or be put on board any other vessel or boat in order to come

or be brought on shore in any such place (unless in such manner and in such cases and by such license as shall be directed or permitted by any such order as aforesaid): Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Proclamation notify that

THE ISLAND OF TASMANIA

is infected with Small-pox, and that it is probable that such disease may be brought from thence to Victoria.

SMALL-POX.—DETENTION OF S.S. MORETON FROM  
TASMANIA.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-sixth day of September 1887.*

WHEREAS by *The Public Health Statute 1865* (28 Victoria No. 264, Sec. 90) it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make such Orders as may be deemed expedient, upon any unforeseen emergency, with respect to any vessel arriving in Victoria under any alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection or contagion, and also with respect to the persons and things on board the same: And whereas an outbreak of Small-pox has occurred in the colony of Tasmania, and it is expedient to make an Order to prevent, as far as possible, the spread of such contagious disease in Victoria; and whereas the steamship *Moreton* arrived in Port Phillip Bay from the said colony on Sunday the 25th day of September instant, and was detained at the Port of Williamstown for inspection by the Health Officer: Now therefore I, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this Order declare valid such detention of the steamship *Moreton*, and it shall be deemed to have been done under and by virtue of this Order, and to be of as full force and effect as if this Order had been previously made.

And the Honorable Alfred Deakin, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WEDNESDAY THE 28TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER INSTANT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Shepparton;

FRIDAY THE 30TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER INSTANT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Violet Town;

WEDNESDAY THE 5TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Euroa; as a Public and Bank Half-Holiday within the Borough of Koroit, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon; and as a Public Holiday within the Shire of Belfast;

THURSDAY THE 6TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Borough of Port Fairy;

MONDAY THE 10TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Sandhurst, and as a Public Holiday at Eaglehawk;

TUESDAY THE 11TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Bairnsdale;

WEDNESDAY THE 12TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday at Carisbrook, and within the Borough of Maryborough; and as a Public and Bank Half-Holiday at Sandhurst, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon;

THURSDAY THE 13TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Half-Holiday at Sandhurst and within the Borough of Koroit, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon;

TUESDAY THE 18TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Shepparton;

WEDNESDAY THE 19TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public Holiday at Seymour;

TUESDAY THE 25TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Borough of Koroit, and as a Public Holiday within the Shire of Belfast;

WEDNESDAY THE 26TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shire of Shepparton;

THURSDAY THE 27TH DAY OF OCTOBER NEXT to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday within the Shires of Hampden and Shepparton.

## "THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACT 1885."

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the 29th section of *The Factories and Shops Act 1885* (49 Vict. No. 862), and after due inquiry, I, the Chief Secretary of Victoria, being the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the said Act, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of the said section 29 in

## ALL THE WOOLLEN FACTORIES OF VICTORIA

for a further period of three months from the 1st October 1887, upon these express conditions, that is to say:—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factories any female or any male under the age of sixteen for more than fifty-six hours in any one week, or more than ten hours in any one day, in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That no female or male under the age of sixteen shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without her or his consent.
3. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in each such factory for the information of all concerned.

## "THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACT 1885."

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the 29th section of *The Factories and Shops Act 1885* (49 Vict. No. 862), and after due inquiry, I, the Chief Secretary of Victoria, being the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the said Act, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of the said section 29 in the

BOOT FACTORY OF MR. J. G. YAGER, 127, 129, AND 131 KERR STREET, FITZROY,

for a period of three months from the date hereof, upon these express conditions, that is to say:—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factory more than twelve adult females for more than fifty-six hours in any one week in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without her consent.
3. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such factory for the information of all concerned.
