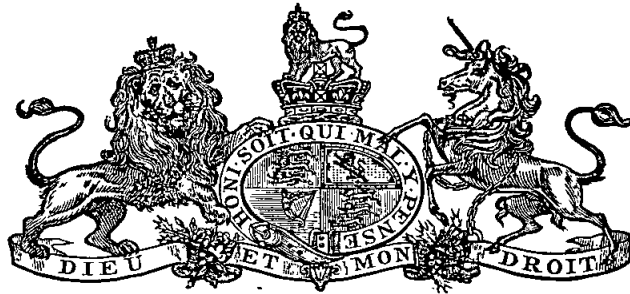

THE NEW HEBRIDES CONVENTION.

Convention relative to the New Hébrides, signed at Paris, November 16, 1887.

The Government of Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Government of the French Republic, being desirous to abrogate the declaration of the 19th June 1847, relative to the islands leeward of Tahiti, and also to make provision for the future protection of life and property in the New Hebrides, have agreed upon the following articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The Government of Her Britannic Majesty consent to proceed to the abrogation of the declaration of 1847 relative to the islands to the leeward of Tahiti as soon as the agreement hereinafter contained for the future protection of life and property in the New Hebrides by means of a Joint Commission shall have been carried out.

ARTICLE II.

A joint naval commission shall be immediately constituted, composed of British and French naval officers on the Pacific station, charged with the duty of maintaining order, and of protecting the lives and property of British subjects and French citizens in the New Hebrides.

ARTICLE III.

A declaration to that effect shall be signed by the two Governments.

ARTICLE IV.

The regulations for the guidance of the commission shall be drawn up by the two Governments, approved by them, and transmitted to the commanders of the British and French ships on the Pacific naval station within a period not exceeding four months from the date of the signature of the present convention, should it be impossible to do so earlier.

Le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté la Reine du Royaume Uni de la Grande-Bretagne et d'Irlande et le Gouvernement de la République Française désirant abroger la déclaration du 19 Juin 1847, relative aux Iles Sous-le-Vent de Tahiti, et assurer, en même temps, pour l'avenir, la protection des personnes et des biens aux Nouvelles Hébrides, sont convenus des articles suivants:—

ARTICLE I.

Le Gouvernement de Sa Majesté Britannique consent à procéder à l'abrogation de la déclaration de 1847, relative au groupe des Iles Sous-le-Vent de Tahiti, aussitôt qu'aura été mis à exécution l'accord ci-après formulé pour la protection, à l'avenir, des personnes et des biens aux Nouvelles Hébrides, au moyen d'une Commission Mixte.

ARTICLE II.

Une commission navale mixte, composée d'officiers de marine appartenant aux stations Anglaise et Française du Pacifique, sera immédiatement constituée; elle sera chargée de maintenir l'ordre et de protéger les personnes et les biens des sujets Britanniques et des citoyens Français dans les Nouvelles Hébrides.

ARTICLE III.

Une déclaration à cet effet sera signée par les deux Gouvernements.

ARTICLE IV.

Les Règlements destinés à guider la Commission seront élaborés par les deux Gouvernements, approuvés par eux et transmis aux commandants Anglais et Français des bâtiments de la station navale du Pacifique, dans un délai qui n'excèdera pas quatre mois à partir de la signature de la présente convention, s'il n'est pas possible de le faire plus tôt.

ARTICLE V.

Immediately on the approval of those regulations by the two Governments, and the consequent withdrawal of the French military posts from the New Hebrides, the Government of Her Britannic Majesty will proceed to the abrogation of the declaration of 1847. It is understood that the assurances relating to trade and to convicts, which are contained in the *note verbale* of the 24th October 1885, communicated by M. de Freycinet to Lord Lyons, shall remain in full force.

In witness whereof the undersigned, duly authorized for that purpose, have signed the present convention, and have affixed thereto their seals.

CENTENNIAL INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION, MELBOURNE, 1888.

THE attention of persons intending to exhibit at the Centennial International Exhibition, Melbourne, 1888, inventions for which letters patent may lawfully be granted under the Patent Laws of Victoria is invited to section 22 of Act 808, *The Patents Act 1884*, and particularly to the conditions of protection therein mentioned. The terms of the section are as follows :-

"The exhibition of an invention at an Industrial or International Exhibition, or the publication of any description of the invention during the period of the holding of the Exhibition, or the use of the invention for the purpose of the Exhibition in the place where the Exhibition is held, or the use of the invention during the period of the holding of the Exhibition by any person elsewhere without the privity or consent of the inventor, shall not prejudice the right of the inventor or his legal personal representative to apply for and obtain provisional protection and a patent in respect of the invention or the validity of any patent granted on the application, provided that both the following conditions are complied with (namely) :-

- (a) The exhibitor must, before exhibiting the invention, give the law officer one month's notice of his intention to do so; and
- (b) The application for a patent must be made before or within twelve months from the date of the opening of the Exhibition."

ENGINEER STUDENTS AND STUDENTS IN NAVAL CONSTRUCTION IN HER MAJESTY'S DOCKYARDS.

SIR,—With reference to my predecessor's Circular Despatch of the 10th of January last, I have the honor to transmit to you, herewith, printed copies of revised Regulations for the entry of Engineer Students and Students in Naval Construction in Her Majesty's Dockyards, received from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and dated the 1st of July last.

REGULATIONS FOR THE ENTRY OF ENGINEER STUDENTS AND STUDENTS IN NAVAL CONSTRUCTION IN HER MAJESTY'S DOCKYARDS.

(The Engineer Students are trained for service afloat as Engineer Officers in Her Majesty's Navy.)

(The Students in Naval Construction are trained with a view to their joining the Royal Corps of Naval Constructors.)

1. *Vacancies open to public competition principally; a few to be filled by nominated candidates.*—Vacancies for appointments as engineer students in the dockyards will be filled principally by means of competitive examinations open to all sons of British subjects, being of the prescribed age and of good moral character, but their Lordships will reserve to themselves the right to nominate a few candidates at each entry who will be appointed on passing the examination specified in paragraph 11.

The candidates to be nominated will be selected by the Board of Admiralty from sons of officers of the Navy, Army, or Royal Marines who have been killed in action or who have been lost at sea on active service, or killed on duty, or who have died of wounds received in action or injuries received on duty within six months from the date of such action or injury, or sons of officers of the Navy or Royal Marines who have performed long and meritorious service. The number to be so nominated will not exceed one-fifth of the total number of engineer students to be entered. Except as regards exemption from the competitive examination, these candidates will be subject in all respects to these regulations.¹

Three engineer studentships will be given annually to sons of gentlemen in the colonies on the recommendation of the Secretary of State for the colonies, provided they pass the required examination. These candidates will be subject to precisely the same regulations as herein laid down for nominated service candidates.²

2. *Appointments.*—The number of appointments to be made in each year will be fixed by their Lordships.

3. *Time for sending in applications.*—The list of candidates for these appointments by open competition will be kept at the office of the Civil Service Commissioners. All applications for the forms to be filled up by persons who wish to compete must be sent to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, London, S.W., on or after the first of January in each year, and care must be taken that the forms when filled up are returned so as to reach the Civil Service Commissioners on or before the 15th March following, as no notice will be taken of forms received after that date. The list of nominated candidates will be kept at the Admiralty.

4. *Age.*—Candidates must not be less than fourteen nor more than sixteen years of age on the first day of May in the year in which they are examined.

5. *Age and character, evidence of.*—Evidence of age and character will not be required before the examination, but candidates successful in it will not be eligible for appointment unless they satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners on these points.

6. *Medical examination, time and place.—Re-vaccination.*—The medical examination of the successful candidates will be held under the authority of their Lordships, as soon as possible after the result of the educational examination is made known. No candidate will be entered as an engineer student unless he is pronounced to be physically fit. Candidates in or near London will be medically examined by the medical director-general of the Navy at the Admiralty. Those residing near one of Her Majesty's Dockyards, or one of the first reserve ships, or drill ships of the Royal Naval Reserve, or the flagships at Queenstown, will be examined by the medical officers attached thereto. The medical examinations will be conducted in all respects in strict accordance with the instructions for the examination of persons for admission into the naval service. All candidates at the time of their medical examination must produce certificates to the satisfaction of the examining officers that they have been re-vaccinated, or they must be re-vaccinated before they can be considered eligible for entry into the dockyard.

¹ Applications for nominations must be made so as to arrive at the Admiralty before the first of February in each year, and should be addressed to the Secretary of the Admiralty if the candidate is the son of an officer of the Navy or Marines; to the Military Secretary Horse Guards, if the candidate is the son of an officer of the Army; and to the Military Secretary, India Office, if the candidate is the son of an officer of the Indian Army.

² The names of the colonial candidates are to be received at the Admiralty from the Colonial Office on or before the first of February in each year.

7. *Educational examination, time and place.*—The educational examination will be held by the Civil Service Commissioners in London, Liverpool, Portsmouth, Devonport, Bristol, Leeds, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, Dublin, Belfast, and Cork, and will take place in the month of April of each year. The exact date may be ascertained by application to the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, on or after the first of January in each year.

8. *Competitive examination.*—The following will be the subjects of the competitive examination, and the maximum number of marks for each subject:—

All candidates will be tested as to their ability to read aloud with clearness, distinctness, and accuracy, and without hesitation. Stammering, or any imperfection of utterance, will be regarded as a disqualification.

9. *Examination fee.*—A fee of one shilling will be required from every candidate attending an examination.

10. *Result of examination.*—Candidates in the competitive examination who fail to pass in the first four subjects (those marked with an * asterisk), or in reading aloud, will be disqualified, and their other papers will not be examined. Successful candidates will be entered as engineer students in one of the dockyards, according to the number of appointments which it may be decided to make that year; they will be taken according to their position on the examination list. Candidates who obtain less than 700 marks in the aggregate will not be placed upon the list.

11. *Examination for nominated candidates.*—The candidates who are nominated by their Lordships, and by the Secretary of State for the Colonies, will be required to pass the same test examination in the first four subjects as the candidates who enter for the competitive examination. They will also be examined in the other subjects to ascertain the extent of their knowledge and to determine their order of merit, and no nominated candidate will be appointed as an engineer student who obtains less than 700 marks in the aggregate.

12. *Informing of result of examination.*—Candidates will be informed by letter from the Civil Service Commission of the result of their examination as soon as it has been ascertained.

13. *Entry as engineer students.—Appointment as students in naval construction.—Bonds and indentures.*—The successful candidates will be entered as engineer students at H.M. Dockyard at Devonport about the first of July in each year, and students in naval construction not exceeding two in number annually will be appointed from among engineer students who have shown special ability at the end of their third year of service. The students must join with their parents or guardians in a bond for £300 to enter, if required, into Her Majesty's service as assistant engineers, or as assistant constructors, if at the expiration of their training they should obtain certificates of good conduct and efficiency for entry in the service. These bonds and the indentures of apprenticeship must be completed in all respects before the students join the dockyard.

14. *Fees.*—The parent or guardian of each engineer student entered in future will be required to make six annual payments during the six years of the student's training, viz.—£30 each year for the first two years, £20 for the third year, £25 for the fourth year, and £5 each year for the fifth and sixth years. It will, however, be at the discretion of my Lords to reduce these annual payments during the first four years in the case of sons of officers killed or drowned or who have otherwise lost their lives on service. Should a student leave or be dismissed from the service, the payments which have been made in his behalf will be forfeited.

15. *Payment of fees.*—The payments are to be made to the cashier of the dockyard to which the student is appointed; the first payment is to be made before the student is entered, and the subsequent payments on or before the 30th day of June in each of the five succeeding years.

16. *Clothing, washing, necessaries.—Board, lodging, medical attendance.*—The parents or guardians of the students will also be required to provide the uniform (see par. 39) or other clothing, washing, and necessaries of each student. Board and lodging, and medical attendance, will be provided by the Admiralty. The students will be required to reside in the dockyard or in a vessel adjacent thereto.

17. *Pay.*—The weekly pay of students during their training will be as follows, provided they are well reported on by the officers:—

18. *Leave.*—Five weeks' leave (30 working days) on full pay will be granted each year to all students whose conduct and progress have been satisfactory. This leave is to be taken during the school vacations at midsummer and Christmas.

19. *Checking of pay.—Discharge, if unfit.*—The students are not to be checked pay while on leave, nor when hurt. When sick they will be checked of their pay after they have been absent for six months in the aggregate during any period of twelve months. At the expiration of this time a special report is to be made to their Lordships in each case. Students pronounced at the end of twelve months' absence on account of sickness or hurt to be permanently unfit or unlikely to be capable of entering Her Majesty's service as assistant engineers or as assistant constructors will be discharged. Should any student in the course of his training develop physical unfitness for the service, he will be discharged.

20. *Supervision.*—The students will be under the supervision of the superintendent of the dockyard and a staff of officers, and subject to such rules and regulations as their Lordships may deem necessary.

21. *Cancelling bonds and indentures.*—Engineer students in their first year of training, who may be desirous of leaving the service, and whose reasons are considered satisfactory, may be allowed, under their Lordships' authority, to have their indentures and bonds cancelled, but this concession is not to be claimed as a right.

22. *Employment and instruction of engineer students.*—The period of training of students will be for six years, which will be divided between H.M. Dockyards, Devonport and Portsmouth. They will receive practical training in the workshops, and instructions in iron ship-building. While the engineer students are being instructed in iron ship-building they are to be under the direction of the chief constructor. They will attend the dockyard schools for such periods, and to pursue such studies as may from time to time be determined on; they will also pass a portion of their time in the drawing office. Means will be afforded them of acquiring the groundwork of the knowledge required by a naval engineer respecting the working of marine engines and boilers, including those repairs which can be carried out afloat, the practical use of the various instruments used in the engine-room, also of the construction and working of electric light, torpedo and gun machinery, and of becoming generally acquainted with the duties of a naval engineer.

23. *Examination of students.*—Students will be examined once a year under the direction of the president of the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.

The educational examination at H.M. Dockyard at Devonport at the end of their third year of study will be a qualifying one, and the subjects will be separated into two divisions, compulsory and optional. The papers will be so constructed that 40 per cent. in the compulsory subjects will be the standard of qualification for passing; the optional subjects will, however, be taken into account for the order of merit. Students who pass the examination will proceed to H.M. Dockyard at Portsmouth, and those who fail will continue serving another year at Devonport. A second failure will involve dismissal from the service.

24. *Engineer students who fail at end of third year of study.*—Students who fail at Devonport at the end of their third year of study, and join Portsmouth at the end of their fourth year, will be examined at the end of their sixth year of service, i.e., after two years' study at Portsmouth. In the event of their passing the examination they will not lose time, but if they fail they will only be allowed one more opportunity of passing, viz., at the end of their seventh year of service.

25. *Prizes practical work.—Final examination.*—Students will be examined as to their practical acquirements and knowledge of steam machinery and ship-building respectively at the end of the fourth, fifth, and sixth years of their service by officers of the Admiralty. Prizes will be given annually at each dockyard to the students most highly reported on as regards their skill as workmen. Practical engineering and ship-building respectively will be considered an essential subject at examinations, and in the lists showing the results of examinations the numbers obtained in practical subjects will be shown distinct from those obtained in educational subjects. Students will not be eligible for entry as acting assistant engineers, or acting assistant constructors, unless they obtain at least 50 per cent. of the total number of marks for practical engineering or ship-building on their final examination, and also display a competent knowledge of the subjects taught in the dockyard schools.

26. The educational examination of students at the end of their sixth year of study will be a qualifying one, and the subjects will be separated into two divisions, compulsory and optional. The qualifying standard for passing will be 40 per cent. in the compulsory subjects.

27. The examination of the sixth year students in practical workmanship and knowledge of engine-room duties, &c., is to be held at the dockyard in time for the necessary certificates to be forwarded to the Admiralty on or before the 23rd June in each year, and it will include tests of their skill as workmen.

28. *Students who fail.*—Students who fail to pass the examinations at the end of their sixth year will be allowed to continue serving another year at Portsmouth. A second failure at the end of the seventh year will involve dismissal from the service. In no case will the limit of seven years be exceeded.

29. *Pay of a student during seventh year and payment to be made.*—The pay of a student in the seventh year will be the same as during the sixth year, and the payment to be made by the parent or guardian of the student in the seventh year will also be the same as for the sixth year of service.

30. *To be able to swim and to be physically fit for service.*—Students will not be entered as acting assistant engineers, or acting assistant constructors, until they have been pronounced fit for Her Majesty's service by the medical officers, and have learned to swim.

31. *Appointments as acting assistant engineers, or acting assistant constructors, and as to their proceeding to the Royal Naval College for a course of study.*—Students who pass the

examinations described in paragraphs 25, 26, 27, and 30 will be arranged in two classes according to the marks they obtain in the combined total for the compulsory and optional educational subjects and practical subjects. Those who obtain 50 per cent., or above, of the combined total will have the privilege of proceeding to the Royal Naval College on the first of October succeeding the examination, where they will pass through a course of higher instruction. The engineer students will be entered as acting assistant engineers on the first of July of each year, and the students in naval construction will be entered as acting assistant constructors. Engineer students who obtain 40 per cent. in the compulsory educational subjects referred to in paragraph 26, but less than 50 per cent. of the combined total above mentioned, and also pass the examinations mentioned in paragraphs 25, 27, and 30, will be entered as acting assistant engineers in H.M. Navy on the first of July of each year, and will be eligible to receive third class certificates. They will not proceed to the Royal Naval College, but will remain in the Steam Reserve at Portsmouth, to be appointed to H.M. ships as their services are required.

32. *Confirmation of acting assistant engineers.—Certificates obtained at the R.N. College.*—All the acting assistant engineers will be confirmed at the end of twelve months' time from the date of their entry into Her Majesty's Navy if their conduct and qualifications are reported satisfactory, and those at the Royal Naval College who obtain first and second class certificates at the final examination at the end of the first session will be allowed to count twelve months and six months' time respectively for promotion only.

33. *Commission to be withheld for misconduct or failing to pass examination at R.N. College.*—In the event of the conduct and qualifications of any acting assistant engineer not being reported satisfactory during his twelve months' probation, or of his failing to pass satisfactorily at the final examination at the Royal Naval College, his commission will be withheld for six months, or for such other period as may be determined on by their Lordships.

34. *Acting assistant engineers' pay, &c.*—The pay of acting assistant engineers while at the Reserves will be 6s. a day, and they will receive 1s. 6d. a day in lieu of provisions, &c. While at the Royal Naval College at Greenwich they will be provided with quarters, and during their first session they will be paid 6s. a day and 1s. 6d. a day towards the mess expenses.

35. *Assistant engineers selected for further period of study at Greenwich.*—Two assistant engineers will be selected annually from those who take the highest place at the examination on the completion of their first course at Greenwich, to pass through a further course of scientific instruction if they desire it. These two will be allowed to study at the college for a second and third session. They will receive 7s. 6d. a day and 1s. 6d. a day towards the mess. On the completion of the third session at the college they will be sent to sea as assistant engineers, and after one year's service at sea, they will be considered eligible to fill vacancies occurring in the civil appointments at the dockyards and at the Admiralty.

36. *Acting assistant constructors' pay, &c.*—Acting assistant constructors who, at the end of the first session at the Royal Naval College, fail to obtain a satisfactory report of their qualifications, will be required to withdraw from the service, and forfeit a moiety of the bond, unless the failure be due to sickness. The pay of the acting assistant constructors until the completion of their training at the Royal Naval College will be the same as that of the acting assistant engineers and assistant engineers of the same service.

Such acting assistant constructors only as obtain first or second class professional certificates on their final examination at the Royal Naval College will be admitted to the corps, their first appointments being as third class assistant constructors. Those who obtain third class certificates will not be admitted to the corps, but will be eligible to receive appointments as draughtsmen in the dockyards.

Every student entering the Royal Corps of Naval Constructors will be liable to serve at any foreign naval establishment the Admiralty may direct; he will also have to proceed to sea, if so required.

The period of service in the third class for all assistant constructors to be four years. If favorably reported on at the end of this period as to character, ability, and industry, each officer will be eligible for promotion to the second class. Promotions from the second class to the first class of assistant constructors will be by selection. Those officers who have taken first class certificates on their final examination at the Royal Naval College will be eligible for promotion to first class if favorably reported on after five years' service, reckoned from the date of leaving the college, and those who have obtained second class certificates to be similarly eligible after seven years' service.

37. *Employment during vacations at Greenwich.*—The assistant engineers who pass the second and third sessions at Greenwich will be attached during the vacations between the 30th June and 1st October to the dockyards or steam reserves, where they will be employed sketching machinery, attending trials of new and repaired engines, and gaining such professional information as will be most useful to them for the purposes of engine design. The assistant constructors will also be attached to the dockyards during the vacations, and will be employed on duties appertaining to their position.

38. *Assistant engineers and assistant constructors to enter into a bond.*—An assistant engineer or assistant constructor who is selected at the end of the first session at the Royal Naval College to remain for two more sessions at the college will be required before commencing the second session to enter into a bond, with surety for the sum of £500, not to leave Her Majesty's service within seven years of the completion of the term at Greenwich. This is in reference to defraying the charges incurred by the public for his education. The resignation is in every case to be subject to their Lordships' approval.

39. Students are to be provided with—

Eight buttons placed by four to be worn on the breast of the tunic. The engineer students to have a single purple velvet stripe round the sleeve of the tunic, and the students in naval construction to have a silver-grey stripe.

Patterns of the several articles of uniform are kept, and can be seen at the Admiralty, Whitehall, and at the offices of the Naval Commanders-in-Chief at Sheerness, Portsmouth, and Devonport.

40. Text-books, stationery, and drawing materials.—Students will be required to find their own books, and a list will be furnished to each on appointment. They will also be required to find their own stationery and drawing materials.

41. The foregoing regulations will be generally followed, but my Lords will modify them from time to time as may be considered desirable.

MEDICAL EXAMINATIONS.

42. Medical examination.—With a view to prevent parents and guardians from incurring the inconvenience and expense of preparing candidates for entry as engineer students in Her Majesty's Dockyards who may be physically unfit for Her Majesty's service, it is suggested that the candidates be submitted to examination by the medical adviser of the family, or any other qualified medical practitioner, to whom the following points may be submitted as those upon which they will be physically examined by naval medical officers. It is to be understood that this private examination is merely suggested as a guide to parents and guardians, and to lessen the chances of disappointment, and that it is by no means intended to take the place of, or to influence in any way, the regular official physical examination.

A weak constitution, arising from imperfect development or weakness of the physical powers of the body, either hereditary or from chronic disease, wounds, or injuries.

Chronic eruptions on the skin or scalp.
 Malformation of the head, with a dry, harsh, divergent state of the hair of the scalp, fracture or depression of the bones of the skull, disordered intellect, imbecility, epilepsy, paralysis, or impediment of speech.

Blindness or defective vision, as tested by Snellen's test types, in one or both eyes, fistula lachrymalis, and ptosis.

Impaired hearing, or discharge from one or both ears, disease or thickening of the lining membrane of the external ear.

Disease of the bones of the nose or of its cartilages, and polypus.

Disease of the throat, palate, or tonsils; unsound teeth, offensive breath from constitutional causes, unhealthy gums, scrofulous diseases of the glands of the throat or neck, external cicatrices from scrofulous sores.

Functional or organic disease of the heart or blood vessels, deformity or contraction of the chest, flattening of the sub-clavicular regions, phthisis, hæmoptysis, bronchitis, dyspnoea, aphonia, chronic cough, or other symptoms of tubercular exudation into the pulmonary tissues.

Swelling or distention of the abdomen, undue obesity, disease or enlargement of the liver, spleen, or kidneys. Rupture, weakness, or distention of the abdominal rings; vesical weakness, or incontinence.

The existence of any congenital defect, or of varicocele. Any disease of or pertaining to the alimentary canal.

Paralysis, weakness, impaired motion, or contraction of the upper or lower extremities, from whatever cause; aneurism, a varicose state of the veins, especially of the leg. Bunions, distortion, malformation of the feet, or malposition of the fingers or toes.

Distortion of the spine, of the bones of the chest or pelvis, from injury or constitutional defect.

Engineer officers in charge of engines of 3,000 indicated horse-power and upwards in the larger ships of modern construction will, in consideration of the increased responsibilities attaching to their position, be granted rates of charge pay varying from 4s. to 9s. a day, according to the special circumstances of each case, in lieu of the above rates, which are for ships fitted with ordinary machinery. Engineers and assistant engineers in charge of engines of ships not in commission are allowed 1s. a day. Chief engineers in charge of machinery of an exceptional ship, such as the *Hecla*, though under 3,000 indicated horse-power, 4s. a day.

EXTRA PAY.

The senior engineer in ships in commission, having engines of 3,000 indicated horse-power and upwards, is allowed 1s. a day extra pay.

The chief inspectors and inspectors of machinery in the Reserves, in consideration of their responsible duties, are allowed an additional 3s. a day.

PROMOTION.

Assistant engineers, qualified for advancement, are eligible for promotion to the rank of engineer after five years' service. Assistant engineers who obtain 1st class certificates at the Royal Naval College count 12 months towards promotion, and those who obtain 2nd class certificates count 6 months towards promotion.

The promotion of engineers, chief engineers, and inspectors of machinery depends on the number of vacancies that occur in the several superior ranks.

RELATIVE RANK

Assistant engineers rank with sub-lieutenants according to date of commission.

Engineers of less than 6 years' seniority rank with but after lieutenants under 8 years' seniority.

Engineers of 6 years' seniority rank with lieutenants of less than 8 years' seniority according to date of commission.

Chief engineers rank with but after lieutenants of 8 years' seniority.

Staff engineers rank with lieutenants above 8 years' seniority. Fleet engineers rank with commanders according to date of commission.

Inspectors of machinery, under 8 years' service on full pay as such, rank with captains under 3 years.

Inspectors of machinery, of 3 years' service on full pay as such, rank with captains of 3 years. The captain to reckon his seniority from the date of completing 3 years in that rank. The inspector of machinery to reckon his seniority from the date of completing 3 years' service as such.

Chief inspectors of machinery rank with captains of 3 years' seniority according to date of commission.

MEMORANDUM AS TO THE PAY, ETC., OF THE ROYAL CORPS OF NAVAL CONSTRUCTORS.

1. The number, the designation, and the salaries of the members of the corps are as follow:—

Director of naval construction, £1,500 a year, rising to £1,800 after five years' service.

Two chief constructors, £600 a year, rising to £850 by £25 a year; and a London allowance of £150 a year.

Three constructors, £400 a year, rising to £550 by £20 a year; and a London allowance of £120 a year.

Five assistant constructors, first class, £300 a year, rising to £450 by £15 a year. Duty pay of £50 a year to assistant constructor in charge of foreign records. Duty pay of £50 a year to assistant constructor acting for chief constructor.

One assistant constructor, first class (for scientific experiments), £250 a year, rising to £300 by £15 a year.

Six assistant constructors, second class, £160 a year, rising to £240 by £10 a year, and a London allowance of £50 a year.

DOCKYARDS.

Six chief constructors, Chatham, Portsmouth, Devonport, Sheerness, Pembroke, and Malta Dockyards, £600 a year, rising to £700 by £25 a year, and a house.

Eight constructors, £400 a year, rising to £550 by £20 a year, and a house.

One constructor, Hong Kong, £400 a year, rising to £550 by £20 a year, a house, or an allowance of £150 a year in lieu thereof; and a colonial allowance of £100 a year.

One constructor, Bermuda, £400 a year, rising to £550 by £20 a year, a house, and a colonial allowance of £100 a year.

Ten assistant constructors, first class, £250 a year, rising to £300 by £15 a year.

Eighteen assistant constructors, second class, £160 a year, rising to £240 by £10 a year.

Nine assistant constructors, third class, £110 a year, rising to £150 by £10 a year.

RE-ADMISSION OF LIVE STOCK INTO VICTORIA.—REGULATIONS.

THE Governor in Council has approved of clause 5 of the "Regulations for the admission into Victoria, free of duty, of goods produced or manufactured in this colony, and temporarily removed therefrom," and also the "Regulation for temporary removal of animals across the border for stud purposes," being repealed, and the following regulations relating to the removal of live stock substituted in lieu thereof:—

1. Live animals may be removed from Victoria, and subsequently re-introduced without payment of duty, provided that notice of intended removal be given in the proper form (see form C subjoined) to the nearest officer of Customs, and that the animals are duly inspected by such officer prior to export, and an export entry duly passed.

2. The length of time within which such animals may be re-introduced shall be twelve months, but such time may be extended for a further period not exceeding six months, on application to the Secretary for Customs.

3. When the animals are returned, an import entry must be passed, and the officer of Customs must be satisfied, before allowing the desired re-introduction, that the animals sought to be re-introduced are identical with those exported under these regulations.

REGULATIONS FOR THE EXAMINATION OF LAND SURVEYORS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve of the following Regulations for the examination of Land Surveyors, viz:—

Intending candidates must give notice of their intention in writing, and must forward to the Board documentary evidence that they have complied with the following preliminary conditions; and, upon their applications being approved by the Board, shall pay the prescribed fee of £4 4s. into the Treasury, Melbourne, or any Receipt and Pay Office, and forward receipt for same to the Secretary to the Board.

All candidates presenting themselves for examination must be provided with a book of logarithms, a 40-20 scale, a parallel ruler, protractor, and all necessary appliances (except paper) for plan drawing.

PRELIMINARY CONDITIONS.

I. A candidate must have passed the matriculation examination at the University of Melbourne, including English, Geography, Arithmetic, Geometry, Algebra, and Physics, or such other examination as shall, in the opinion of the Board, be equivalent thereto; and must have served with some recognized surveyor for not less than three years, two of which must have been in the field.

II. Or he must have served under articles for not less than four years some recognized surveyor, two years at least of such service to have been in the field; and must give satisfactory evidence of having received such education as will qualify him for the proper exercise of his profession.

III. Or he must have completed the third year's course in the Engineering School of the Melbourne University, and must have served in the field for two years with some recognized surveyor.

IV. Or he must have completed the full course in the Engineering School of the Melbourne University, and have served one year in the field as above.

NOTE.—By service in the field is to be understood the survey and subdivision of land.

A candidate whose application shall have been approved as showing that he has complied with either of the above conditions will be eligible for examination.

6. Levelling and mensuration of earthwork.
7. Charting :
Construction of maps and charts ;
Compilation of charts from detached plans and notes ;
Reduction of bearings to common datum.
8. Drawing :
Mechanical work of map drawing ;
Hill shading ;
Writing.

The Board of Examiners shall affix a numerical value to each subject, and shall determine the numerical or other standard for Passes in the several subjects. In the event of a candidate failing to pass on first presenting himself for examination, the Board shall have the option of admitting him a second time without charge, or at a reduced fee, if he shall have obtained a certain standard in such examination.

CERTIFICATES WITHOUT EXAMINATION.

Certificates will be granted by the Board without examination to gentlemen who shall produce evidence satisfactory to the examiners that they have complied with the following conditions,

and shall have paid the prescribed fee. But such certificates shall state on the face of them that they have been granted without examination :—

I. Having passed some examination (equivalent in the opinion of the Board to that prescribed in Victoria) in Great Britain, the United States of America, India, or some British colony, and producing evidence of having successfully practised as a surveyor for not less than twelve months in some of the Australian colonies.

II. Or producing evidence satisfactory to the Board of the possession of sufficient professional qualifications and experience, and of having successfully practised as a surveyor for not less than twelve months in some of the Australian colonies.

Examinations shall be held from time to time, as the interests of the Public Service may require; and notice thereof shall be published in the *Government Gazette* of the intention to hold an examination at least one month before the date fixed upon.

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BROUGHAM LOCH, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

No. 506) it was amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council might, from time to time, make Orders, amongst other things, to alter the boundaries of the subdivisions existing in any municipal district; and every such Order should be published in the *Government Gazette*, and should take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas a petition in accordance with the thirty-ninth and forty-fourth sections of the said Act has been presented to the Governor in Council, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the forty-sixth section of the said Act, and no counter petition received: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth by this present Order direct that the boundaries of the West and South Ridings of the Shire of Kara Kara be altered and amended, and that the boundaries hereafter described be adopted in lieu of those previously proclaimed, which are hereby abolished, that is to say:-

WEST RIDING.

Commencing at a point on the north boundary of the shire where it is intersected by the road from Donald to St. Arnaud; thence south-easterly by the centre of that road to the east boundary of the parish of Darkbonee; thence south by the centre of the road forming the east boundary of said parish to the road south of allotment 38A; thence west by that road to the west boundary of that parish at the north-west angle of allotment 27; thence by the centre of the road forming the said west boundary to the Avon River; thence westerly by the centre of the Avon River to the eastern boundary of the parish of Marnoo; thence southerly by the eastern boundary of the parishes of Marnoo and Warngar to its intersection with a one and a-half (1½) chain road from Tottington to Bolangum Homestead section; thence north-westerly and west by said road to its intersection with a (3) three-chain road from Navarre to Wallaloo, being the western boundary of the shire; thence following such boundary in a northerly direction to the point of commencement.

SOUTH RIDING.

Commencing at a point on the shire boundary at the Avoca River where it is intersected by the three-chain road from Avoca Forest; thence south-westerly by the centre of such river passing between allotments 40 and 41, parish of Kooreh, to a point north of the north-east angle of G. Dobson's selection; thence south to and by the east boundary and west by the south boundary of said selection to the north-east angle of the parish of Moolerr; thence west and south-west by the north boundary of that parish to the road north of the Racecourse Reserve, parish of St. Arnaud; thence west by that road to the east boundary of the parish of Darkbonee; thence south by that boundary to the road south of allotment 38A said parish; thence west by that road to the west boundary of the parish at the north-west angle of allotment 27; thence south by the road forming the said west boundary to the Avon River; thence westerly by the Avon River to the eastern boundary of the parish of Marnoo; thence southerly by the eastern boundary of the parishes of Marnoo and Warngar to its intersection with a one and a-half (1½) chain road from Tottington to Bolangum Homestead section; thence north-westerly and west by said road to its intersection with a (3) three-chain road from Navarre to Wallaloo, being the western boundary of the shire; thence following such boundary south, south-easterly, easterly, and northerly to the point of commencement.

Whenever the line described as aforesaid runs beside or along a river, creek, or road, whether specifically described or not, the centre of such river, creek, or road shall be taken to be the boundary-line.

The boundaries of the East Riding are not affected but remain as described in *Government Gazette* of 14th November 1884.

The shire boundary referred to is that described in the *Government Gazette* of the 19th December 1884.

And the Honorable John Nimmo, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**LANCEFIELD WATERWORKS TRUST
CONSTITUTED.**

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-first day of February 1888.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor.

WHEREAS by *The Water Conservation Act 1887* it was amongst other things enacted that, at the expiration of two months after the notice of any application should have been first advertised in the *Government Gazette*, the Minister, if satisfied that the provisions of the now in part recited Act have been substantially complied with, should submit such application, and the general plan and description therein referred to, and all petitions which have been received in respect of such application, to the Governor in Council, together with any recommendations as to the granting of the application, or as to any alterations or additions he might think desirable in the proposed Waterworks: And the Governor in Council might thereupon approve of the construction of such proposed Waterworks, with or without any alterations or additions in the general plan and description thereof, or might disapprove of the construction of such Waterworks, and should make an Order in Council accordingly: And it was further enacted that, if the Governor in Council should approve of the construction of such Waterworks, with or without alterations, or additions, or restrictions of any such general plan and description, a Waterworks Trust should be constituted to construct, maintain, and continue the whole or any part of the Waterworks therein described, in accordance with the provisions of such Order and of the now in part recited Act: And every Order approving the construction of any proposed Waterworks, and of the constituting of a Waterworks Trust for the purpose, should—

(a) State the amount of money which the Governor in Council will grant as a loan for the purpose of carrying out such proposed Waterworks, and of paying the cost and expense of preparing the general plan and description of the same, and the costs of the application for the constituting of such Waterworks Trust; and also the rate of interest which will be charged for such loan, such rate being at least one-half per centum more than the rate payable by the Government on the Public Loan out of which such loan might be granted.

(b) Specify the limits of the lands, whether within or without the municipal districts of the council or councils applying for the proposed Waterworks, within which such Waterworks Trust shall have authority, to be called a Waterworks District.

(c) State what are the principal works to be constructed.

(d) Assign a corporate name to such Waterworks Trust; and

(e) Contain such provisions (not inconsistent with this Act) as according to the nature of the application and the facts and circumstances of each case the Governor in Council thinks fit.

And it was further enacted that the Governor in Council might, where a Waterworks District is either wholly or with the exception of the Waterworks or proposed Waterworks thereof within one or more ridings of any municipal district, appoint the councillors for such riding or ridings, together with any other person or persons not exceeding three in number to be the Commissioners of the Waterworks Trust of such Waterworks District.

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, has approved of a general plan and description, as set forth in a certain application of the councillors for the Lancefield Riding of the Shire of Romsey, for a Loan of Six thousand seven hundred pounds (£6,700), to carry out certain Waterworks for the domestic supply of a Waterworks District under the said Act, embracing a portion of the Shire of Romsey as shown on the general plan and description accompanying the said application deposited in the Department of Mines and Water Supply, and doth hereby order and appoint as follows:—

(1.) The construction of the said Waterworks and the constitution of a Waterworks Trust.

(2.) That the Councillors for the Lancefield Riding of the said Shire of Romsey municipal district and one other person shall be the Commissioners of the Waterworks Trust.

(3.) That the amount of the loan hereby granted shall be Six thousand seven hundred pounds sterling, for the purpose of constructing works for the supply of the Town of Lancefield with water, and also for paying the cost and expense of the plans and application for the same; and that the interest to be charged for such loan shall be Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum, payment of which interest shall be made half-yearly.

(4.) That the limits of the land within which the said Waterworks Trust shall have authority shall be those portions of the Shires of Romsey and Newham included within the boundaries hereunder described, viz.:—

Commencing at a point on the southern boundary of the Lancefield pre-emptive right in the parish of Lancefield nineteen chains west from the south-east corner of said right; thence by a line bearing three hundred and fifty-nine degrees thirty-five minutes for five chains; thence by a line bearing two hundred and sixty-nine degrees thirty-five minutes for forty-three chains fifty links; thence by a line bearing three hundred and fifty-nine degrees thirty-five minutes to a point nineteen chains fifty links due east of the eastern end of a line forming the north side of a street which is the northern boundary of the township of Lancefield; thence by a line from that point west for a distance of nineteen chains fifty links to the south-east corner of suburban lot forty-five; thence westerly along the south boundaries of suburban lots
