Torpedo ground at Singapore. Straits Settlements.

ACCORDING to "Bericht aan Zeevarenden" No. 51, the Hague, 1887, the undermentioned areas are designed for torpedo experiments.

1. The first area, a square the side of which is about 4 cables long, situated westward of Rimau Point, is marked on the two sea-angles by red buoys; the other angles are formed by Rimau Point, and by a board on shore about 4 cables distant from each other.

2. The other area is situated at the east entrance of Sinki Strait; on the east it is marked by a line, joining the eastern black buoy of South Channel and the white beacon on Buran Darat; on the west by a line drawn from Teregeh and Beralata points.

VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

SUNDAY TRAINS TO AND FROM FRANKSTON, MORDIALLOC, AND MELBOURNE.

On and after Sunday, 11th March, the following trains now running to Mordialloc will run to Frankston, viz.:-10 a.m., 12.40, 2.15, 6.0, and 8.40 p.m., from Melbourne. Trains will leave Frankston for Melbourne at 9.25 a.m., 12 noon, 2.15, 4.5,

and 8.5 p.m. The train now leaving Melbourne for Mordialloc at 3 p.m. and running past certain stations will, on and after Sunday, 11th March, leave at 4 p.m. and stop at all stations, and return from Mordialloc at 5.30 p.m. The train now leaving Mordialloc for Melbourne at 1.50 p.m. will leave at 2.40 p.m.

CAULFIELD RACES ON SATURDAY, 24TH MARCH.

Special trains will leave Flinders street at 11.48, 11.58 a.m., 12.6, 12.18, 12.27, 12.39, 12.57, 1.6, and 1.15 p.m.; and return from Caulfield immediately the races are over. The usual race fares will be charged.

DELIVERY OF GRAIN.

On and after 26th March the hours for delivery of grain, &c., at the Melbourne goods sheds will be from 8 a.m. till 5 p.m. Saturdays 2 p.m.

MIDDLE BRIGHTON STATION.

On and after Wednesday, 4th April, Middle Brighton station will be open for goods not requiring shed accommodation, and in truck loads at owners' risk.

EASTER EXCURSIONS.

Holiday excursion tickets will be issued to and from all stations (suburban lines excepted) from the 26th March to the 7th April, both dates inclusive (Sundays excepted) available for return for one calendar month from date of issue. Example:—An excursion ticket issued on the 28th March will be available till the 28th April. When the last day falls on a Sunday, the ticket will be available till the next day. The journey must be commenced on the date the ticket is issued, but after a distance of 15 miles has been travelled, the journey may be broken at the discretion of the passenger.

Intercolonial Excursion tickets will also be issued from the 28th March to the 6th April inclusive, available for return for two (2) months, as under:—

- (a) From Melbourne to Sydney and Sydney to Melbourne.—These tickets will not be available by Express trains on the New South Wales Line, and the journey cannot be broken in that colony.
- (b) From Victorian Railway Booking Stations to South Australia, and *vice versa*.—Available by Express trains.
- (c) From Sydney to Adelaide and Adelaide to Sydney.—Available by Express trains on all lines.

Luggage.—Excursion passengers to and from stations in Victoria will only be allowed to carry such luggage free as can be stowed under the seats without inconvenience to other passengers, and those who have luggage for the van are required to be at the station half an hour before the train starts; stamped parcels rate will be charged for it. All luggage should be plainly addressed with the owner's name and the station it is for.

Horses and Vehicles.—From the 28th March to the 7th April, both days inclusive, the department cannot engage to forward horses and vehicles by passenger trains unless accommodation can be provided by special arrangement.

Commercial Travellers' Samples.—From the 29th March to the 7th April, commercial travellers' samples will not be taken to or from roadside stations except by mixed or goods trains.

Parcels.—On the 29th March, parcels must be at the Melbourne, Spencer street, or Prince's bridge parcels office, 30 minutes before starting time of ordinary trains.

Goods Sheds Holidays.—The 30th March and 2nd April will be observed as holidays in the goods branch, and goods trains will not run. Perishable goods will, however, be delivered at all stations on application. Consignees of powder can ascertain from the Station-master at Footscray, when explosives will be received in lieu of these dates:—On the 29th, 30th, and 31st March, and 2nd and 3rd April. Fruit and dairy produce cannot be carried by purely passenger trains between Melbourne, Sandhurst, and Ballarat, nor on the North-Eastern line, unless parcels rates are paid. Fruit and other perishables cannot be received at Melbourne goods shed for country stations after 12 o'clock noon on Thursday, 29th March.

Seaside Excursions.—The issue of these tickets at the principal stations will continue as already advertised (see posters at all stations).

SUBURBAN TRAIN SERVICE, EASTER HOLIDAYS.

Coburg Line.—Commencing on the 26th March and until 2nd April inclusive, an early train will leave Melbourne daily at 5.5 a.m., and return from Coburg at 5.35 a.m., stopping at all stations. It will reach Melbourne at 6 a.m. On the 30th March and 2nd April extra trains will leave Melbourne at 10.35 a.m., 12 noon, and 2.5 p.m., and return from Coburg at 11.10 a.m., 12.35, and 2.48 p.m.

Essendon Line.—On the 30th and 31st March and 2nd April, the trains usually leaving Melbourne at 6.25, 7.25, 8.27 a.m., 5.0 and 6.58 p.m., and returning at 6.55, 7.50, 8.55 a.m., 5.27 and 6.27 p.m., will not run.

Larerton and Werribee.—On the 30th March and 2nd April, the train usually leaving Melbourne for Werribee at 5.45 a.m. and returning at 6.40 a.m., will not run.

Oakleigh Line.—Commencing on the 26th March and until 2nd April inclusive, an early train will leave Prince's Bridge daily at 4.40 a.m., and return from Oakleigh at 5.20 a.m., stopping at all stations. It will reach Prince's Bridge at 5.58 a.m.

South Suburban Lines.—If necessary, the ordinary time-table on the Brighton, St. Kilda, Port Melbourne, Hawthorn, and Camberwell lines will be suspended on the 30th March and 2nd April, and trains will run as required.

Williamstown Line.—On the 30th March and 2nd April the ordinary time-table will be suspended from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., and trains will run about every twenty minutes.

The estimated population of Melbourne and suburbs (Greater Melbourne) about the end of the third quarter of 1887 was 391,546, the increase upon the estimate made twelve months previously being 19,916.

The births in Greater Melbourne during 1887 numbered 14,583, or 37.24 to every 1,000 of the population. This birth-rate was the highest in the last seventeen years.

The number of cases of twin-births registered during 1887 was 139, or 29 more than in 1886. As the whole number of births in 1887 was 14,583, there must have been 14,444 confinements, and one mother in 105 gave birth to twins. In the previous year the proportion of mothers giving birth to twins was 1 in 114.

The number of children set down as born out of wedlock during 1887 was 1,031, or 121 more than in 1886. The proportion of illegitimate births to the whole number of births registered was 1 to every 14 in both years.

The deaths in Greater Melbourne in 1887 numbered 8,324, or 21.26 to every 1,000 of the population. This death-rate was higher than that which prevailed in any of the previous sixteen years, except 1874, 1875, and 1876.

The deaths in 1887 exceeded by 734, viz.:—430 of males, and 304 of females—those in 1886. The increase in respect to males was made up of 222 under, and 208 over, 5 years of age; and that in respect to females was made up of 113 under, and 186 over, 5 years of age.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the year was 104.9° on the 10th January; and the lowest was 33.0° on the 27th June. The lowest shade temperatures ever recorded in Melbourne since 1869 were 28.2° on the 7th and 28.1° on the 8th July 1886; the next lowest being 29.9° in July 1884, and again in July 1885. The mean shade temperature of the year 1887 (53.1°) was exactly one degree higher than in 1886, and rather less than a degree (.9°) above the average during the 10 years ended with 1880. The greatest range of the thermometer in the shade during any one day (42.1°) took place on the 6th January, viz., from a maximum of 96.8° to a minimum of 54.7°. The least range (2.9°) was on the 30th July, viz., from a maximum of 54.0° to a minimum of 51.1°. The mean daily range was 16.3°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.495 inches, on the 11th July; and the lowest was 29.316 inches, on the 24th September. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.944 inches) was slightly above the average. Rain fell on 153 days, as against 128 days in 1886, and 130 days over a series of years. The amount of rainfall was 32.39 inches, as against 23.99 inches in 1886, and 25.46 inches over a series of years. The rainfall in 1887 was above that in any of the previous 27 years, with the exception of 1870, 1872, and 1875.

Of the births registered during the year 1887, 51 per cent. were of males, and 49 per cent. were of females. Of the deaths registered, 55 per cent. were of males, and 45 per cent. were of females. Children under 5 years of age contributed 42 per cent. to the total mortality, as against 41 per cent. in 1886, 38 per cent. in 1885, 41 per cent. in 1884, 36 per cent. in 1883, 40 per cent. in 1882, 38 per cent. in 1881, 40 per cent. in 1880 and 1879, 37 per cent. in 1878, 42 per cent. in 1877, 40 per cent. in 1876, 48 per cent. in 1875, 43 per cent. in 1874, and 42 per cent. in 1873.

The deaths of 412 persons, viz., 232 of males and 180 of females, of the age of 75 years and upwards occurred during 1887, or 63 more than in the previous year. Of these, 215 were stated to be between 75 and 80, 115 between 80 and 85, 61 between 85 and 90, 11 between 90 and 95, 7 between 95 and 100, 2 as 101, and 1 as 102 years of age. Of the deaths recorded during the year, 389—of which 312 were of males and 77 of females—were from external causes; 314 being ascribed to accident, 15 to homicide, and 60 to suicide. The accidental deaths occurred as follow:—*In quarry*, 1, viz.:—Caught between the buffers of two trucks. *With vehicles and horses*.—(a) *On railways*, 31, viz.:—Run over on line 21, collision 7, fall from engine 2, crushed by carriage or engine 1. (b) *Vehicles other than railways*, 34, viz.:—Passed over by or thrown from—cab 4, cart 12, buggy 5, gig 1, waggon 1, lorry 1, tramcar 5, road roller 1, meat truck 1, vehicle undescribed, 8. Of the homicidal deaths, 2 newly-born male infants were murdered, their skulls being fractured; a male infant died from cruel negligence at birth; a male infant was purposely drowned shortly after birth; and 2 female infants were purposely suffocated at birth; an accountant, aged 20, died of injuries to the head caused by another; a clothes-presser, aged 20, of gunshot wounds; a female, aged 38, was shot; and a female, aged 42, had her skull fractured, the aggressor in both cases being the husband; a compositor, aged 46, died of tetanus, caused by injuries wilfully inflicted; a woolwasher, aged 48, was thrown into the river Yarra, by a fellow workman, and drowned; an engineer, aged 55, had his skull fractured wilfully; a hatter, aged 60, and a female, aged 62, died of injuries to the head wilfully inflicted. Of those who committed suicide, 14 shot themselves, 9 cut their throats, 16 poisoned themselves, viz.:—2 with arsenic, 1 with belladonna, 3 with chlorodyne, 1 with a narcotic, 2 with opium, 1 with prussic acid, 3 with a preparation known as "Rough on Rats," 2 with strychnine, and in one instance the name of the poison was not stated; 10 drowned themselves, 9 hanged themselves, 1 threw himself under the wheel of a dray, and 1 placed himself in front of an approaching railway train. The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 4,865. Of these, 2,688, or 55 per cent., were males, and 2,177, or 45 per cent., were females; 196 were between five and ten, 124 were between ten and fifteen, 231 were between fifteen and twenty, 354 were between twenty and twenty-five, 445 were between twenty-five and thirty, 356 were between thirty and thirty-five, 319 were between thirty-five and forty, 329 were between forty and forty-five, 368 were between forty-five and fifty, 382 were between fifty and fifty-five, 303 were between fifty-five and sixty, 366 were between sixty and sixty-five, 370 were between sixty-five and seventy, 219 were between seventy and seventy-five, 213 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 199 were upwards of eighty, and of 1 the age was unspecified.

REGULATION.

THE Commissioners of the Swan Hill Shire Waterworks Trust, in pursuance of the powers contained in *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, do make the following Regulation:—

No. 7.

Regulation for making a rate on the several lands and tenements to be supplied otherwise than by measure with water for domestic purposes in the Urban Districts of Kerang and Castle Donnington.

1. A rate of Two shillings in the pound sterling on the annual value of the several lands and tenements to be supplied with water for domestic purposes in the urban districts of Kerang and Castle Donnington, according to the valuation for the time being of all lands and tenements comprised within the said urban districts of Kerang and Castle Donnington for the municipal rates of the shire of Swan Hill, is hereby made for the year commencing on the 1st day of January 1888 and ending on the 31st day of December 1888.

2. For every house or tenement of Ten pounds annual value or under, the sum of One pound per annum shall be due and payable.

3. Such rate is hereby made payable in manner provided by section 118 of the Act No. 946.

4. Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust shall from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rate.

The foregoing Regulation, No. 7, was made by the Commissioners of the said Swan Hill Shire Waterworks Trust, under and by virtue of section 119 of *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, on the 10th day of January 1888, and confirmed by the said Commissioners on the 7th day of February 1888.

SHIRE OF YARRAWONGA.

BYE-LAW NO. 13, AS TO DAIRIES, DAIRY CATTLE, AND MILK.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Yarrawonga, in the Colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in *The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883*, and every other power enabling the said Local Board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said Local Board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 13 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed.
2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.
3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the Shire of Yarrawonga.
4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of May in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Ten shillings.

5. Application for Registration as—

To the Secretary of the Local Board of Health for the Shire of Yarrawonga.

Sir,—I desire to be registered in accordance with the particulars in the schedule hereunder:—

6. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the secretary of the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

7. *Milk stores and shops to be kept clean.*—Every person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman shall cause every milk store or milk shop in his possession or occupation, or under his management or control, and every milk vessel used by him for containing milk for sale to be kept thoroughly clean.

8. *Dairymen, &c., to report disease to the health officer.*—Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and every person having the management of any such trade shall forthwith report, in writing, to the health officer the occurrence of any disease in any of his milch cows, or of any contagious or infectious disease in man or animal upon the premises upon which such trade is carried on.

9. *Penalties.*—If any person commit a breach of any of the provisions of this bye-law, he shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10, or to a penalty not exceeding £5 for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued. Provided that the justices before whom any penalty imposed hereby is sought to be recovered may order the whole or part only (not being less than Five shillings) of such penalty to be paid.

The foregoing bye-law was adopted and confirmed by the Council of the Shire of Yarrawonga, sitting as the Local Board of Health for the shire, on the seventh day of February in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven and the seal of the Council affixed thereto in the presence of—

SHIRE OF BROADMEADOWS.

BYE-LAW No. 2.

1. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

2. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said Shire of Broadmeadows, excepting clauses 8, 9, 10, 27, and 28, which shall apply to and have operation in the townships of Tullamarine, Broadmeadows, Campbellfield, and Fawkner only.

Definitions.

3. In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law, the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say—

“House” shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work-rooms, common or other lodging-houses, or other buildings or premises.

“Cesspool” shall mean any receptacle for night-soil or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground; and “earth-closet” shall include a pan closet of any description.

“Street” shall mean and include any highway, and any public bridge, and any road, lane, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

“Slaughter-yard” or “slaughter-house” shall include an abattoir or any place whatever where slaughtering takes place.

Words imputing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural and the plural the singular, and the word “person” shall include a corporation.

Part I.—General Cleanliness.

4. The occupier of every house and premises shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto or occupied in connexion therewith to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all dust, filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be, once at least in every week, removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the Local Board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, occupation, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be effectually deodorized and to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said Local Board at the expense of such occupier.

6. No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter in any street, road, lane, right-of-way, or place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health or in any way contrary to the directions of the Local Board or officer of health.

7. No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

Part II.—Disposal of House Refuse, and Cleanliness in Towns, &c.

8. The occupier of any land on which is erected any stable cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pigsty, or on which land is any building wherein any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine are kept shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard, or once at least in every week should the quantity not amount in that time to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said Local Board at the expense of such occupier.

9. Every occupier of a building or premises wherein or whereon any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine may be kept shall provide, in connection with such building or premises, whenever required by the Local Board or officer of health, a suitable receptacle for dung, manure, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may from time to time be produced in the keeping of any such animal in such building or upon such premises, and cause such receptacle to be constructed so that the bottom or floor thereof shall not in any case be lower than the surface of the ground adjoining such receptacle, and in such a manner and of such materials, and to be maintained at all times in such a condition, as to prevent any effluvia therefrom or any escape of the contents thereof, or any soakage therefrom, into the ground or into the wall of any building, and to be furnished with a suitable cover, and, when not required to be open, to be kept properly covered.

10. He shall likewise provide, in connection with such building or premises, if required by the Local Board or officer of health, a sufficient drain, constructed in such a manner and of such materials, and maintained at all times in such a condition, as effectually to convey all urine or liquid filth or refuse therefrom into a proper receptacle.

Part III.—As to Manure.

11. Nothing herein contained shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil (not being night-soil), or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed, or to be used as manure on any garden or land, or to be kept for the purpose of being used on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravene any bye-law of the Local Board of Health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or contrary to any directions of the Local Board or officer of health.

12. Every person placing, depositing, or spreading, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any liquid manure of which night-soil, urine, or any similar offensive matters form a part, night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered, with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness, and shall keep and use the same in such a way only as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health. And before doing so such person shall obtain the written permission of the Local Board or officer of health, subject however to any general regulation or directions which the Central Board by publication in the *Government Gazette* may make or give. But such permission shall be no defence in any complaint or prosecution for having kept or used such liquid manure, night-soil, offal, blood, or other matter in such a way as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

Part IV.—As to Earth-closets, &c.

13. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground; and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or other movable receptacle for night-soil, the content whereof does not exceed three cubic feet, and with the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material, having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half-an-inch to the foot.

14. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately, on the deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

15. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet, and provided with a closely-fitted cover of pattern to be approved by the inspector of nuisances.

16. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid, sulphate of iron, chloride of lime, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

17. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall, once at least in every week, empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

18. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and finally placed in such place or places only as may be appointed by the Local Board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

19. No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m., unless otherwise permitted by the Local Board (of which the proof shall lie on such person), or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying or causing to be emptied any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil shall cause the night-soil taken therefrom to be removed so soon as the same is emptied.

20. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any drain or sewer, or so that the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any drain or sewer.

Part V.—Special Provisions for Encampments.

21. Whenever public works are being carried out, causing a number of persons to form any temporary encampment, the contractor for the construction of the works shall immediately cause latrines—such as are used in military camps—to be erected, in such a manner, and in such a position, and in such numbers as the Health Officer or the Government Medical Officer may direct; and the said latrines shall be filled in with earth from time to time, so as not to become a nuisance or injurious to health. And if at any time such latrines or a sufficient number are not erected, or the necessary filling is not done, or the said latrines are not kept in such a state as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, the Local Board may erect suitable latrines, and may remove any that have been erected and have become a nuisance or injurious to health, at the expense of the said contractor. And if at any time women or children are living in any such encampment, suitable earth-closets or pan-closets, supplied with some efficient deodorant, shall be erected and provided by such contractor, and the excreta shall be properly removed from such closets as often as may be necessary.

22. No act of defecation or micturition by any person living in such encampment shall take place within three hundred yards from the banks of any river, creek, lagoon, or watercourse near such encampment; nor shall any such act take place, or any night-soil be deposited, or any urine, manure, offal, offensive matter, or refuse of any kind whatever be emptied, deposited, laid, placed, or discharged in such a way or in such a manner that it may or be likely to find its way into any such river, creek, lagoon, or watercourse, or so that such river, creek, lagoon, or watercourse be in any manner polluted or contaminated.

23. The person in charge of any house, hut, tent, or building in such encampment in which any other person may be ill from typhoid fever, or the attendant on such patient, shall destroy, or cause to be destroyed, all faecal discharges from the said patient by fire, with as little delay as possible; and in no case whatever shall any such faecal discharges be put, placed, or deposited (whether with the intention of burning or otherwise) on any ground or in such a manner that it may or be likely to find its way into any such river, creek, lagoon, or watercourse.

Part VI.—Prevention of Pollution of Water.

24. No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed in or so that the same may or be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any persons using such water or drinks, or milk, or other produce of such dairy.

25. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any water supplied, used, or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents or any portion of the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any such water.

26. Every accumulation or deposit of offensive matter so situated as to find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or

likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deodorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within twenty-four hours of notice given by the Local Board or one of its officers.

Part VII.—Drainage of Buildings.

27. Every person erecting or causing to be erected any new building shall cause the foundations thereof, and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well drained, so that no water-soakage or damp shall lodge there.

28. Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the healthfulness of the inmates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

Part VIII.—Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairy-men, and Purveyors of Milk.

29. Every person carrying on the trade of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of October in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written; and every such person shall, with every such application, pay a fee of Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.).

30. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the secretary of the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

31. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said Local Board, or by any person authorized in writing by the chairman or secretary of the said Local Board; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are or is likely in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said Local Board may, by an order in writing signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, or in the case of an unregistered person served personally or left at his dwelling-place, or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said Local Board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

32. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated, and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

33. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept, and kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

34. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

35. If any person or any member of the family of any person registered as aforesaid, or not so registered, but employed as a cow-keeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the Local Board or officer of health or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said Local Board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cow-keeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk until danger, in the opinion of such Local Board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until in either case all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk, or of its contamination, has ceased.

36. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy or in the herds of any cow-keeper, dairyman, vendor, or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the Local Board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

37. No cow-keeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep or permit or suffer to be kept any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cow may be kept or sheltered.

Part IX.—Penalties.

38. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds (£10) for every such breach, or of Five pounds (£5) for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid; and any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, or whether such Local Board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Broadmeadows this twenty-seventh day of January, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

PUBLIC HEALTH.—SHIRE OF HAMPDEN.

BYE-LAW No. 2.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Hampden, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in *The Public Health Amendment Statute 1884*, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, do hereby make the following bye-law, being bye-law No. 2 of the said local board of health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law, excepting Part III., shall apply to and have operation in the whole of said shire, and Part III. of this bye-law shall apply to and have operation in all that portion of the shire which is not a surveyed or proclaimed township.

4. *Definitions.*—In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

“House” shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work rooms, common or other lodging houses, or other buildings or premises.
“Cesspool” shall mean any receptacle for night-soil or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground; and “earth-closet” shall include a pan closet of any description.

“Street” shall mean and include any highway and any public bridge, and any road, lane, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

“Slaughter-yard” or “slaughter-house” shall include an abattoir or any place whatever where slaughtering takes place.

Words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural, and the plural the singular, and the word “person” shall include a corporation.

Part I.—General Cleanliness.

5. The occupier of every house and premises shall cause the yard and the ground belonging thereto or occupied in connexion therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all dust, filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be, once at least in every fourteen days or oftener if ordered by the health officer, removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of any premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, occupation, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon, to be effectually deodorized and to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

7. No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter in any street, road, lane, right-of-way or place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health, or in any way contrary to the directions of the local board or officer of health.

8. No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health or any person using such water, or drinks, or milk, or other produce of such dairy.

Part II.—Disposal of House Refuse, and Cleanliness in Towns, &c.

9. The occupier of any land on which is erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty, or on which land is any building wherein any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine are kept, shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; or once at least in every week should the quantity not amount, in that time, to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

10. Every occupier of a building or premises wherein or whereon any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine are kept shall provide, in connexion with such building or premises, whenever required by the local board or officer of health, a suitable receptacle for dung, manure, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may from time to time be produced in the keeping of any such animal in such building or upon such premises, and cause such receptacle to be constructed so that the bottom or floor thereof shall not in any case be lower than the surface of the ground adjoining such receptacle, and in such a manner and of such materials and to be maintained at all times in such a condition as to prevent any effluvia therefrom, or any escape of the contents thereof, or any soakage therefrom, into the ground or into the wall of any building, and to be furnished with a suitable cover, and, when not required to be open, to be kept properly covered.

11. He shall likewise provide in connexion with such building or premises, if required by the local board or officer of health, a sufficient drain constructed in such a manner and of such materials and maintained at all times in such a condition as effectually to convey all urine or liquid filth or refuse therefrom into a proper receptacle.

Part III.—As to Manure.

12. Nothing herein contained shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises which are not within any surveyed or proclaimed township from causing any dung, soil (not being night-soil), or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed, or to be used as manure on any garden or land, or to be kept for the purpose of being used on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravene any bye-law of the local board of health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or contrary to any directions of the local board or officer of health.

13. Every person placing, depositing, or spreading, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any liquid manure of which night-soil, urine, or any similar offensive matters form a part, night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same or cause the same to be covered and shall keep the same covered with a layer of earth

not less than six inches in thickness, and shall keep and use the same in such a way only as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health. And before doing so such person shall obtain the written permission of the local board or officer of health, subject however to any general regulation or directions which the Central Board by publication in the *Government Gazette* may make or give. But such permission shall be no defence in any complaint or prosecution for having kept or used such liquid manure, night-soil, offal, blood, or other matter in such a way as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

Part IV.—As to Earth-closets, &c.

14. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than three inches above the surface of the adjoining ground, and every such building shall be constructed with proper openings or flues to provide sufficient means of ventilation, and shall be provided with a suitable pan or other movable receptacle for night-soil, the content whereof does not exceed three cubic feet, and with the requisite apparatus for the application of dry earth or some other deodorizing material to the contents thereof, and shall be constructed and placed so as to afford easy means of access for the purpose of removing the pan or receptacle and the contents thereof, and emptying and cleansing the same. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half-an-inch to the foot.

15. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately, on the deposit thereof, covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.

16. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered so as to be water-tight and with handles thereto and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet, and provided with a closely-fitted cover of pattern to be approved by the inspector of nuisances.

17. No closet door or trap shall abut or open on a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

18. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of one foot from the top of the sides, walls, or lining of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of eleven p.m. and five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid, sulphate of iron, chloride of lime, or some other efficient deodorizer sufficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

19. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least every fourteen days or oftener if ordered by the health officer empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

20. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of night-soil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of effluvia therefrom.

21. Where any nightman is licensed by the municipal authorities, such nightman shall be employed by the occupier of the premises for the removal of night-soil therefrom, and no other person shall remove the same.

22. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and finally placed in such place or places only as may be appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same.

23. No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except between the hours of eleven p.m. and five a.m., unless otherwise permitted by the local board (of which the proof shall lie on such person), or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying or causing to be emptied any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, shall cause the night-soil taken therefrom to be removed as soon as the same is emptied.

24. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter, into any drain or sewer, or so that the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any drain or sewer.

Part V.—Prevention of Pollution of Water.

25. No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any persons using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

26. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter, into any water supplied, used, or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents or any portion of the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any such water.

27. Every accumulation or deposit of offensive matter so situated as to find its way or be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deodorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within twenty-four hours of notice given by the Local Board or by one of its officers.

Part VI.—Drainage of Buildings.

28. Every person erecting, or causing to be erected, any new building shall cause the foundations thereof, and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well drained, so that no water soakage or damp shall lodge there.

29. Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the healthfulness of the inmates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

Part VII.—Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairy-men, and Purveyors of Milk.

30. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and every person selling any dairy produce, shall, on or before the first day of May in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Two shillings and six-pence.

32. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said Local Board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

33. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated; and the drain-

age of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

34. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept, and be kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

35. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

36. If any person, or any member of the family of any person, registered as aforesaid, or not so registered, but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the Local Board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said Local Board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, until danger, in the opinion of such Local Board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

37. If at any time disease exists in the dairy, or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the Local Board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force; and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

38. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep or permit or suffer to be kept any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

Part VIII.—Penalties.

39. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid; and any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health (being the Municipal Council) in and for the Shire of Hampden this first day of February, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

GRANT OF ONE HUNDRED AND FIFTY POUNDS (£150) AS PRIZES FOR THE BEST MANAGED FARMS IN VICTORIA.

THE Governor in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations in connection with the above-named grant:—

- REGULATIONS.**
1. Two first prizes of Fifty pounds each will be awarded, one for the best farm in the Northern districts of the colony, and one for the best farm in the Southern districts. A second prize of Twenty-five pounds will be awarded for the second best farm in each of the above districts.
 2. The work of selecting the most suitable farms for competition will be entrusted to the Agricultural Societies.
 3. Notice of nomination must be forwarded to the Secretary for Agriculture, Melbourne, not later than the 3rd October 1888.
 4. The notice must contain full particulars as to the name of the owner, and where the farm is situated.
 5. The competition is to be restricted to freeholders in occupation and Crown tenants.
 6. Upon receipt of information as to the farms selected for competition, the Minister of Agriculture may appoint three judges to decide the merits of such farms, and a decision of a majority of such judges shall be final.
 7. The judges will be required to communicate to the Minister of Agriculture their decisions; also to report on the merits of the whole of the farms selected for competition.

The prices must be expressed, without alterations or erasures, in words as well as in figures, and the total amount of tender stated.

Printed forms of tender, showing the estimated monthly consumption, and conditions of contract, may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Melbourne; and for the respective districts from the Receivers and Paymasters at Geelong, Ararat, Ballarat, Beechworth, Castlemaine, Maryborough, Sale, Sandhurst, and Portland; the Medical Superintendent, Lunatic Asylum, Sunbury; and the Inspector of Forests, Macedon, by whom also information will be afforded to persons tendering.

Security will be required, either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect. The security is calculated at Ten per cent. on contracts under £1,000, and Five per cent. over that sum; and the preliminary deposit at Ten per cent. of the security; but no deviation will be allowed from the amounts above specified.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Supplies for country stations for which no local contract may have been taken, or for which the contract has been terminated, may be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

3. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter cases, hogheads, butter firkins, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed at the contractor's expense.

4. Bread.—A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Third quality (that issued to prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, fine sharps, the produce of prime, strong, thin-skinned, good colored wheat, to be perfectly free from coarse pollard or other offal.

5. Milk.—The milk must be fresh, pure, and of the best quality, and subject to test when required by the department. Should the supply prove to be not of contract quality, any expense incurred will be charged to the contractor.

6. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quality admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

7. Potatoes to be dry and free from dirt. Contractors to supply 105 lbs. of potatoes for each cental credited to them, and, in addition, to take back all rejected before being cooked.

8. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

9. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with the delivery of the supplies. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

10. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

11. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 10.

12. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

13. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will also be competent for two or more of the official visitors, in conjunction with the medical superintendent, to reject any supplies that they may consider not in accordance with contract; and in such cases the reference to a board of survey will not be deemed to be necessary on the part of the contractor.

14. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will be competent for a board of survey, consisting of the medical superintendent (or, in his absence, of the deputy medical superintendent) and any two officers named by him, to examine and reject any supplies that may be objected to. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Treasurer of the colony for the time being; but pending such appeal, he must take back the rejected articles and at once supply others of approved quality; failing which, the supplies required may be obtained by the officer concerned, and the expense charged to the contractor.

15. As the exact quantity of any article of provisions which may be required cannot be stated, the estimate being approximate only, the Government will not be bound by the quantity

stated in the schedule, but will be at liberty to order more or less, according to circumstances, and the contractor will be bound to supply the same as ordered.

16. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board to survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

17. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivery or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the said Treasurer may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any part of the security.

18. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carriers to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 17 of these conditions.

19. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

20. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract, by giving, in writing, a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made; and under no other circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. It will also be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board to terminate the contract, without notice, for the breach or neglect of the same, or should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

21. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Imperial Commissariat or Defence Department, or on account of other Governments, or for rabbit extirpation, or for supplies to the aborigines; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment; or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment.

22. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and in addition the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

23. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as may be the case, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from or increase of the price of the item so affected.

CITY OF BALLAARAT.

A Bye-law of the City of Ballaarat made under the 229th and 433rd Sections of the "Local Government Act 1874," and numbered 67, to repeal Bye-laws numbered 63 and Bye-law numbered 65 of the said City of Ballaarat.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the "Local Government Act 1874," the Mayor, Councillors, and citizens of the City of Ballaarat order as follows:—That from and after the date of this Bye-law coming into operation Bye-law numbered 63 of the City of Ballaarat, passed on the 9th day of January 1883, and Bye-law numbered 65, passed on the 19th day of December 1884, shall be and the same are hereby repealed.

LICENSE FOR BOATS.

1. The Council may from time to time license to ply for hire, to hire, to let, or to use for any purpose such steamers, steam boats, sailing boats, rowing boats, punts, or vessels upon the water and premises within the said municipal district of the city of Ballaarat, and known as Lake Wendourse, as after inspection had as herein provided shall have been found fit for the conveyance of passengers or for public or private use, and for every such license there shall be paid to the Council the fees hereinafter mentioned.

APPLICATION FOR LICENSE.

2. Before any such license is granted a written application for the same shall be made to the Council, and every such application shall be in the appointed form, and shall be signed with his name by the owner of the steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat to which the same shall relate, and in every such application the name, surname, and place of abode of the applicants, and all the owners of such steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat to which the same shall relate, the name of the said steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat shall be duly stated, and every such application shall have annexed thereto such certificate as next hereinafter mentioned, and every person so applying, who in such application states untruly or wilfully omits any of the particulars hereby required to be stated, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two pounds.

APPOINTMENT OF INSPECTOR.

3. The Council may, and shall from time to time, appoint a fit person as, and to be, Inspector of steamers, steam boats, sailing boats, rowing boats, punts, vessels, and other boats, and may from time to time remove such person from his office.

INSPECTION OF BOATS AND CERTIFICATE.

4. Any person desirous of obtaining a license for any steamer or steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat, upon payment to such Inspector of a fee of Two pounds two shillings may require such Inspector to inspect such steamer or steam boat or other boats as aforesaid, and the engines, machinery, tackle and gear thereof; and such Inspector shall thereupon inspect the same, and if he shall find the same to be seaworthy and fit for the conveyance of passengers and for public use he shall deliver to the person so requiring a certificate to that effect in the form in the first schedule hereto, and every such Inspector who shall make default contrary to the Bye-law shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

LICENSE.

5. The license shall be in the form in the second schedule hereto, and every such license shall be signed by the town clerk, and be duly entered by him in a registry book kept for that purpose, and every such license shall be in force for one year only from the date thereof, or until the next general licensing day (if any) which shall have been appointed by the Council; and the owner named in every such license shall cause to be painted or marked, and to be kept painted or marked, on some conspicuous part of such steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat the name and number of the license of the said steamer, steam boat, or other boats, as aforesaid, and the number of passengers which such steamer, steam boat, or other boats as aforesaid is licensed to carry in form following, that is to say "licensed to carry passengers," and the same respectively shall be so painted or marked in legible letters and figures at least one inch in length and of a proportionate breadth; and every owner of any licensed steamer, steam boat, or other boats as aforesaid, upon which there shall not be so painted or marked the several matters aforesaid shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

PLYING WITHOUT LICENSE.

6. If any steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, or vessel be let for any purpose, or ply for hire for the conveyance of passengers without having a license in force, or without having its name, or without having the number of its license or without having the number of passengers licensed to be carried painted or marked in legible letters and figures at least one inch in length and proportionate breadth upon some conspicuous part thereof, the owner (whether licensed or not) shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

INSPECTION OF BOATS.

7. The Council may from time to time, as they may see fit, cause an inspection of such steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat, and of the tackle and gear thereof to be made by the Inspector or Inspectors of Boats as aforesaid, and if upon such inspection or otherwise the Council shall be satisfied that such steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat, or any such tackle or gear thereof is not in a seaworthy condition, or not fit for the conveyance of passengers or for public use, they shall cause notice, in writing, to that effect to be given to the owner or one

of the owners named in the license for such steamer, steam boat, or other boats, as aforesaid; and if after such notice such steamer, steam boat, or other boats, as aforesaid, shall ply for hire while the same or the tackle or gear thereof are so not seaworthy or not fit for such conveyance and use as aforesaid, the Council may suspend for a stated time the license for such steamer, steam boat, or other boats, as aforesaid; and every boatman or person who knowingly shall ply for hire in any such water, or to or from or alongside of any such landing place, as aforesaid, with any steamer, steam boat, or other boat, as aforesaid, which shall be, or the tackle or gear whereof shall be unseaworthy or unfit for such conveyance and use as aforesaid, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

BOATMAN'S LICENSE.

8. No person shall act as a boatman in any steamer, steam boat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat plying for hire in any such water whether or not he be the owner of such steamer, steam boat, or other boats, as aforesaid, without having a license so to act from the Council; and if any person desiring to obtain such license shall make written application for the same, and produce to the Council a certificate signed by five ratepayers of the city that the applicant is a person of good character and of proper skill and fitness for being so licensed, the Council, if satisfied of the truth of the matters contained in the said certificate, and if it shall seem fit, may grant such license upon payment by the applicant to the Council of the sum hereinafter mentioned, and every such license and certificate may be in the form in the Third Schedule hereto, and every such license shall be signed by the Town Clerk, and be registered, together with the particulars therein contained, by him in a registry book to be kept for that purpose.

OMISSION TO CARRY ETC., WHEN REQUESTED.

9. Every owner or boatman in charge of a licensed steamer, steamboat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boat who plies for hire in the said lake, and without reasonable excuse refuses or neglects when required by the person wishing to hire, or having hired, such steamer, steamboat or other boats as aforesaid, to carry with reasonable expedition to any place or for any distance appointed as herein provided in that behalf, the full number of passengers appointed as herein provided in that behalf, or any less number or quantity, or who, if so plying for passengers at separate fares, without reasonable excuse refuses or neglects to carry with reasonable expedition to any such place or for any such distance as aforesaid any passenger offering himself as such not forming together with any passengers already received to carry an excess of the number appointed as herein provided, or who carries in such steamer, steamboat or other boats as aforesaid a greater number of persons than the number so appointed as aforesaid, or who demands and takes for the hire of such steamer, steamboat, or other boats as aforesaid, or for the conveyance of any passenger, a greater sum than the Council may from time to time fix, shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

BOATMEN TO PRODUCE LICENSE, ETC.

10. Every licensed boatman shall, when required by any constable or by any duly appointed officer of the corporation or by any person wishing to hire or having hired any steamer, steamboat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel or other boat in which such boatman shall be plying, or by any passenger or person intending to be a passenger, or having immediately before been a passenger in or by such steamer, steamboat, or other boats as aforesaid, produce for the inspection of such person the license of such boatman, and also a copy of the table of fares and charges that may from time to time be appointed by the council as herein provided, and every such boatman who shall, on being so required, refuse or neglect so to produce such license or copy, and any boatman plying for hire with any steamer, steamboat, or such other boats as aforesaid, who uses any abusive or insulting language to any person who wishes to hire or has hired such steamer, steamboat or such other boats as aforesaid, or to any passenger or person intending to be a passenger in or having immediately before been a passenger in or by such steamer, steamboat or other boat as aforesaid shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

SUSPENSION OR REVOCATION.

11. Any license granted by the council may at any time, if it shall be proved to their satisfaction that any owner of the steamer, steamboat, sailing boat, rowing boat, punt, vessel, or other boats thereby licensed, or any person thereby licensed to act as a boatman (as the case may be) has been convicted of any offence against this bye-law, or in respect of any property entrusted to him as such owner or boatman respectively suspend for any stated time, or on a like proof of a second such conviction, or of any two such convictions, suspend for any stated time, or revoke as seems to them fit, such license; and no license while suspended either under this section or otherwise, or when revoked shall be deemed to be of any force or virtue hereunder.

That in the working and sailing of steam and all other boats and vessels the following rules and regulations shall be observed:—

STEAMERS.

1. *Two steamboats under steam meeting.*—If two boats under steam are meeting end on, or nearly end on, so as to involve risk of collision, the helms of both shall be put to port, so that each may pass on the port side of the other.

2. *Two steamboats under steam crossing.*—If two boats under steam are crossing so as to involve risk of collision, the boat which has the other on her own starboard side shall keep out of the way of the other.

3. *Sailing boats and boats under steam.*—If two boats, one of which if a sailing boat and the other a steamboat, are proceeding in such directions as to involve risk of collision, the steamboat shall keep out of the way of the sailing boat.

4. *Boats under steam to slacken speed.*—Every steamboat, when approaching another boat in such a way as to involve risk of collision shall slacken her speed, or, if necessary, stop and reverse.

5. *Steamboats overtaking other boats.*—Every steamboat when overtaking any other boat shall keep out of the way of the said last-mentioned boat.

6. Every steamboat when approaching a landing place shall slacken speed, so as to admit of her coming up at a slow pace, and shall come up broadside on. Steamboats shall leave the landing place at a slow pace, so as to avoid accident.

7. Steamboats when approaching the Gardens' jetty, shall proceed to the north of the northernmost of the two islands, on the west side of the lake, and when leaving shall proceed eastward to the south of such island.

8. All embarking and disembarking of passengers at the jetties or landing places shall take place when steamboats shall be securely moored, and no steamer having once started shall return to embark passengers.

9. Steamers bound westward shall travel as nearly as possible along the line of the northern embankment. Those bound eastward to follow the south shore of the lake.

10. Steamers using the north shore channel shall not use that portion of the channel bordering the gardens' foreshore.

11. All steamers after sunset shall show a red light on the port side, a green light on the starboard side, and a white light at the funnel top.

SAILING BOATS.

12. If a boat under sail is proceeding in such direction as to involve risk of collision with a rowing boat, the sailing boat shall give way.

13. When two sailing boats approach each other from opposite directions, the one on the port tack shall in every case give way either by going about or by passing astern of the one on the starboard tack.

14. When two or more boats are sailing to windward, the boat on the port tack shall give way to that on the starboard tack; and boats going free shall at all times give way to those on a wind on either tack.

15. *Interpretation.*—When, by the above rules, one of two boats is to keep out of the way, the other shall keep her course. Provided always that in obeying and construing these rules due regard must be had to all dangers of navigation; and due regard must also be had to any special circumstances which may exist in any particular case rendering a departure from the above rules necessary in order to avoid immediate danger.

ROWING BOATS.

16. All rowing boats being steered shall give way to boats without a coxswain.

PASSENGERS EMBARKING AND LANDING.

17. All steamers, sailing boats, rowing boats, punts, vessels, and other boats licensed to carry passengers shall embark and land their passengers respectively at such places as the council may from time to time appoint, and at no others.

18. Steamers approaching the landing place at the Botanical Gardens shall not approach within ten yards of the jetty.

PASSENGERS.

19. Steamers shall be allowed to carry as many passengers at one time as sitting accommodation will permit, calculating one foot six inches of sitting space for each adult.

20. Every sailing boat carrying passengers shall have, in addition to the master in charge, one competent man for every ten passengers for which it may be licensed to carry; and every steamer shall have one man for every fifty passengers it may be licensed to carry.

21. All goods or property left by passengers in any boat shall be delivered by the owners of such boat to the town clerk as soon as practicable after the same shall have been found.

LICENSE FEES.

22. The fees to be paid by all steamers, steamboats and other boats for hire shall be according to their capacity, and shall be calculated at One shilling per head per annum for the number of passengers they may each be authorized to carry.

23. All private boats not let for hire shall pay an annual fee of Five shillings.

24. Every man engaged in working passenger vessels or boats for hire shall hold a license, the fee for which shall be One shilling.

25. Every license shall be issued for one year only, and all licenses shall terminate on thirty-first day of December in each year.

LAKE MARGIN.

26. No person shall vend or otherwise dispose of any fruit, provisions, or refreshments of any kind without having first obtained the license or consent of the Council.

27. All boat-houses to be hereafter constructed on frontages leased by the Council shall be at least fifty feet or such further distance as may be deemed expedient by the Council's officers from the outward fence toward the water, and shall be placed on a line perpendicular to the contour of the fence at that spot; and no boat-house, shed, or other building shall hereafter be built except on designs to be submitted to and approved by the Council, and until the occupier or builder shall be furnished with the consent of the Council under the hand of the Town Clerk.

28. No person shall lay down any moorings or drive any stake into the bed of the Lake without the written consent of the Council under the hand of Town Clerk being first obtained, under a penalty of Two pounds.

29. If any person bathes in the Lake or wash therein or cause to enter in anything to pollute it, he shall for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

30. All dogs and poultry found in the Lake or within the Lake Margin shall be liable to be destroyed, and for any damage done by them the owner shall make compensation, to be recovered before any justice of the peace.

31. The Council may as and when it shall think fit enclose or otherwise set apart any portion of the Lake or grounds around it for such purpose or purposes as it may deem necessary, and any person found trespassing on every such portion of the Lake or ground around it shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

FISHING IN LAKE.

32. That no person shall use in Lake Wendouree any weir net, implement, device, or contrivance, fixed to the soil or made stationary or partly stationary in any way or manner for the purpose of taking fish.

33. That no person shall angle for or remove or take from the said Lake any fish which may be therein during the months of May, June, July, August, September and October in each and every year.

34. That no person shall angle with or use more than two artificial baits of any kind whatsoever, upon or in the said Lake at one and the same time save and except artificial flies. That no person shall angle in the said Lake with more than two hooks covered with live bait at one and the same time.

35. That no person or persons shall be allowed to catch fish in the Lake between the hours of Nine (9) p.m. and Four (4) a.m.

36. That no person shall use ground-bait of any kind whatsoever in the said Lake for the purpose of attracting fish to any particular spot or for any other purpose whatsoever.

37. That all persons catching any fish in the said Lake under four ounces in weight shall forthwith return the same to the Lake.

38. That no person shall remove or take away or cause or procure to be removed and taken away from the said Lake any ova or spawn without the consent of the said Council for the time being of the City of Ballaarat being first obtained.

39. That no person shall angle for or by any other means endeavour to take fish from the said Lake on any Sunday.

40. Any person detected in leaving any weight, stone, line, or other obstacle at the bottom of the Lake shall, on conviction, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

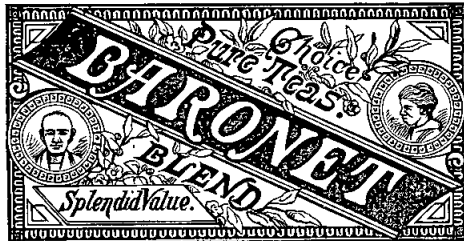

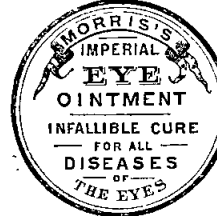
