"THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT 1888."

Further Regulations made by the Minister for the Prevention of Fires under section sixteen of "The Public Health Act 1888."

WHEREAS by *The Public Health Act 1888*, it is amongst other provisions enacted that "the Minister" may from time to time make, alter, and rescind Regulations for the prevention of fires in public buildings within the meaning of section one hundred and ten of *The Public Health Amendment Act 1883* (called in the said first-mentioned Act "the Principal Act"), and in all common lodging-houses and licensed premises of a licensed victualler within the meaning of *The Licensing Act 1885*, and in all boarding houses or similar establishments in which twenty-five or more persons besides the servants and family of the occupier habitually reside, and generally for securing the public safety and convenience in the same: And whereas by section thirty of the said *Public Health Act 1888*, it is enacted that "any person disobeying or neglecting to comply with any regulations made under the authority of the said Act shall be guilty of an offence against the said Act, and that any person guilty of an offence against the said Act not otherwise specifically provided for shall be subject to the same penalties, costs, and expenses, to be recoverable in the same manner as those provided in section one hundred and sixty-eight of the said Principal Act in the case of offences against such Principal Act." And whereas I, the Honorable Alfred Deakin, Her Majesty's Chief Secretary for the Colony of Victoria, being "the Minister" within the meaning and intention of the said recited section sixteen of the said *Public Health Act 1888*, in exercise of the powers and authority conferred upon me as such Minister by the said section sixteen of the said Act, did, on the twenty-eighth day of June last past, make certain Regulations for the prevention of fires, and generally for securing the public safety and convenience as aforesaid, and it is expedient to alter the same: Now therefore I do hereby make the further Regulation following, that is to say:—

1. Nothing in the said Regulations of the said twenty-eighth day of June shall apply to or affect the licensed premises of a licensed victualler if the said premises do not contain more than sixteen rooms.
2. Notwithstanding anything contained in clause 1 of Part I. of the said Regulations, it shall be sufficient if the taps, unions, and hose therein prescribed are of the maximum size permitted by the rules, regulations, or by-laws governing the public water supply of the municipality within which such building, house, or premises is situated.

Exhibition of Revolving white Light on Ouvier Island, entrance to Hauraki Gulf.

WITH reference to the preliminary notices Nos. 9 and 20 of 1889, issued by this Department on the 3rd April and 7th August last, it is hereby notified that, on and after Sunday, the 22nd day of September, 1889, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse which has been erected on Ouvier Island, the position and characteristics of which are as follow:—

The lighthouse is situated on the eastern extremity of Ouvier Island, which lies off the south-eastern entrance to Hauraki Gulf, east coast of the North Island of New Zealand.

The tower is 50 feet in height from base to top of the lantern, is built of iron, and painted white.

The light will be a first order revolving white light, visible all round the horizon as far as the land will allow. It will attain its greatest brilliancy every thirty seconds. The light is elevated 390 feet above the sea, and, allowing 15 feet for the height of the eye, will be seen at a distance of about 26 nautic miles in clear weather, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

Vessels should not round Cape Colville with the light open.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE DISCIPLINE ACTS.

(REVISED.)

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the third day of December, 1888.

PRESENT :

His Excellency the Governor.

Mr. Gillies.

WHEREAS by *The Discipline Act 1870* it is provided that the Governor in Council may make Rules and Regulations for the employment removal or dismissal and for the better government of persons engaged by virtue of the said Act and for enforcing good order and discipline among them and otherwise carrying out the said Act and from time to time annul alter or amend the same and substitute others in lieu thereof : And whereas the Governor in Council has from time to time made certain Rules and Regulations for the said purposes : And whereas it is expedient to annul all such Rules and Regulations so made as relate to the Permanent Military Forces or to the Militia and to make new Rules and Regulations :

Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this present order make the Rules and Regulations following, that is to say:—

1. All Rules and Regulations relating to the Permanent Forces, or to the Militia, Mounted Rifles, Rifle Volunteers, Volunteer Ambulance Corps, or Militia Reserves, and made by the Governor in Council under the authority of *The Discipline Act 1870*, are hereby repealed, save as to anything done offences committed penalties or punishments incurred or proceedings instituted.
2. The following Rules and Regulations shall apply to all persons who have been heretofore or may be hereafter appointed to or who are now or may be hereafter engaged in or employed in the Permanent or Militia Forces, Mounted Rifles, and Rifle Volunteers, Volunteer Ambulance Corps, or Militia Reserves.

MILITARY FORCES IN THE SERVICE OF HER
MAJESTY'S GOVERNMENT IN VICTORIA.

DEFINITIONS.

1. The term "Minister" in the following Regulations shall mean the Minister of Defence.

The term "Commandant" shall mean the Military Commandant.

2. The term "Commanding Officer" shall mean the Commanding Officer of any Corps or Detachment. The Commandant shall determine when any portion of a Corps is a detachment within the meaning of these Regulations.

3. The term "General Orders" shall mean any written orders issued under the authority of the Commandant.

4. The Permanent Forces are composed of persons serving regularly; and the Militia, Mounted Rifles, Rifle Volunteers, Volunteer Ambulance Corps, and Militia Reserves, are composed of persons serving occasionally.

PART I.—GENERAL REGULATIONS FOR THE VICTORIAN MILITARY FORCES.

N.B.—The regulations under this head apply to Permanent Forces, Militia, Mounted Rifles, Rifle Volunteers, Volunteer Ambulance Corps, and Militia Reserves.

SECTION I.—CONSTITUTION.

Military Forces placed under command of the Military Commandant.

1. The Military Forces in the service of Her Majesty's Government in Victoria, subject to such Rules and Regulations as are now or may be from time to time passed by the Governor in Council, shall be placed under command of the Military Commandant.

Commandant, responsibility of.

2. The Military Commandant shall be responsible for the discipline of the troops, and their constant preparation for active service, and, in case of attack, for the immediate and advantageous disposal of every description of force placed under his command.

Commandant, duties of.

3. It shall be the duty of the Military Commandant to inform himself of the resources of his command in regard to provisions, labourers, horses, and the means of transporting troops and stores, and to obtain an accurate knowledge of all the strategic features of the country, of fortified places, and his means of defence, and of every particular which may increase his power of acting with advantage against an enemy, and to furnish reports to the Minister of Defence upon all such matters whenever required.

Commandant to inspect corps.

4. It shall be the duty of the Military Commandant to inspect, at least twice in each year, all corps formed in the different districts of Victoria, and placed under his command, with a view to ascertain and specially report to the Minister of Defence upon their state, condition, general efficiency, and equipment.

Commandant and Staff, duties of.

5. The Military Commandant and the other officers regularly employed shall faithfully and diligently employ the whole of their time in the service of the Government, and they shall in all things obey the orders and directions of the Government.

Commandant and officers to afford information to the Minister.

6. The Military Commandant and the officers under his command should be prepared at all times to afford the Minister of Defence any information he may require as to the efficiency of the whole or any part of the Force, with regard to its discipline, equipment, and preparation for immediate service.

Channels of communication.

7. All orders and directions of the Government with respect to the administration of the Forces shall be communicated to the Military Commandant by the Minister of Defence, or through the Secretary of Defence, and the Commandant will issue the necessary orders to give effect to the same. All communications intended for the Minister of Defence shall be addressed to and forwarded through the Secretary as the channel of communication with the Minister of Defence.

Commandant and officers, liability to suspension or removal.

8. If the Military Commandant or any officer under his command at any time neglect or refuse to carry out and give full and complete effect to the preceding Regulations, or if the Military Commandant or any officer under his command from any cause become or be unable to perform his duties under his engagement, the Minister of Defence may, if he think fit, recommend to the Governor in Council that the said Military Commandant or such officer (as the case may be) be suspended or removed, and he may thereupon be removed by the Governor in Council.

9. Every person is required, before he becomes subject to the provisions of *The Discipline Act 1870* and the Acts amending the same and the regulations made in pursuance thereof, to take and subscribe before some justice of the peace or a commissioned officer in command of a corps the oath prescribed by *The Discipline Act 1870*. Oath to be taken by all serving.

10. All oaths administered and subscribed in accordance with the provisions of *The Discipline Act 1870* shall be transmitted by the justice or officer (as the case may be) before whom the same were taken to the Commandant. Transmission of oath.

SECTION II.—PRECEDENCE AND DISTINCTION OF CORPS.

1. The following is the order of precedence of the several corps in the Victorian Military Forces, viz.:— Precedence of corps.

1. Cavalry.
2. Nordenfelt Battery.
3. Victorian Artillery.
4. Field Artillery (A, B, and C Batteries).
5. Garrison Artillery Batteries, in the order of their distinctive numbers.
6. Victorian Engineers { Submarine Mining Company.
Field Company.
7. Infantry Battalions, in the order of their distinguishing numbers.
8. Mounted Rifles.
9. Rifle Volunteers.

On parade, for purpose of manœuvring, corps are to be distributed and drawn up in the mode which the officer commanding may judge most convenient and best adapted to the purposes of the service.

SECTION III.—COMMAND, RANK, AND
PRECEDENCE.

- Command.** 1. All commands shall belong to the senior combatant officer present on duty, irrespective of the branch of the service to which he belongs.
- Rank.** 2. Officers of the Militia Force, Mounted Rifles, and Rifle Volunteers shall rank with officers of Her Majesty's regular forces as juniors of their respective ranks, and rank with officers of the Permanent Force of the colony according to the rank and dates of their commissions.
- Precedence of officers.** 3. The relative precedence of officers holding commissions of the same rank and date shall be determined by date of previous commissions, and where there are none by the order in which they appear in the *Government Gazette*.

5. Nothing contained in these Regulations shall give a claim to any officer of the Victorian Navy to assume command of the Victorian Military Forces on shore, nor to any officer of the Military Forces to assume command of any of the ships of the Victorian Navy or any of the officers or men thereunto belonging.

SECTION IV.—HONOURS, SALUTES, AND SIGNALS.

1. Honours and salutes shall be regulated in accordance with the Queen's Regulations on this subject, Sec. III.

2. The following is a list of the stations at which salutes are authorized to be fired on triumph days, &c.:—

3. Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers and privates in uniform shall give the military salute to His Excellency the Governor and to all Commissioned Officers.

4. No member of the Militia, Mounted Rifles, or Rifle Volunteers shall be buried with military honours, except by the express desire of his friends, notified to the Officer Commanding the Corps.

5. The general alarm signal on which the Forces are to assemble will be as provided by orders to be issued as required by the Commandant.

SECTION V.—COMMISSIONS AND PROMOTIONS OF OFFICERS.

1. Commissions will be issued, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of section 5 of *The Discipline Act 1870*, to all persons serving in the said Forces above the rank of warrant officers.

2. All appointments and promotions of officers are to be submitted by the Commandant, through the Council of Defence, for the approval of the Governor in Council.

3. All proposed resignations of Officers are to be submitted for the acceptance of the Governor in Council in the same manner as appointments and promotions.

4. All appointments and engagements, promotions, and resignations of Commissioned Officers are to be inserted in the *Government Gazette*, in the terms conveying the Governor's approval or acceptance of such appointment, promotion, or resignation.

But the Governor in Council may nevertheless, on the recommendation of the Military Commandant, require any officer who would otherwise so retire, notwithstanding his age, to continue to perform his duty.

Officers relinquishing their commissions are not to be considered as retaining any rank in the service, except in cases which may be exempted from this Regulation by special authority.

6. Field officers and captains retired with permission to retain their rank and wear the prescribed uniform, and who are desirous of having their names retained in italics in the Victorian Military Forces List, are to send to Head Quarters on the 1st July of each year a notification of their being alive. Officers not under the rank of Captain who are liable to retire by reason of age on completion of their term of engagement, and any officer not under the rank of Captain after ten years' commissioned service, may be allowed to retire, with permission to retain their rank and wear their uniform. A step of honorary rank and permission to wear uniform will be given to officers who are not under the rank of Captain on retirement, provided they have held their latest commission for ten years in the Military or Volunteer Forces.

7. The Council of Defence shall, on the nomination of the Commandant, recommend to the Governor in Council competent Officers, who have previously served in the Imperial Regular or Auxiliary Forces, or in any Colonial Militia or Volunteer Force, who may be considered suitable for appointment in the Victorian Military Forces. All such Officers will be posted on probation for six months, during which time they must pass such practical examination as may by General Order be directed, failing which their commissions will not be confirmed. The time of probation may be extended on the recommendation of the Commandant for a period not exceeding six months. Officers on probation (with the exception of those employed in the Permanent Forces) shall not receive any pay unless special authority is given.

8. Every other candidate for a commission must pass through the School of Instruction, and obtain a certificate of fitness for his branch of the Service. On selection, he will be posted by the Commandant on probation for six months, during which time he must pass such examination—technical and practical—as may be directed, failing which his appointment will not be confirmed. The time of probation may be extended, on the recommendation of the Commandant, for a period not exceeding six months.

9. Arrangements will be made for attaching Officers, if they desire it, to the Victorian Artillery, for instruction in their duties. Not more than four Officers so attached in one year will be permitted to draw the pay and allowances of a Junior Lieutenant of Victorian Artillery for a period not exceeding two months.

10. Officers appointed under clauses 7 and 8 shall receive temporary commissions.

11. All recommendations for appointments, promotions, and resignations of Officers will be made by Commanding Officers to the Commandant.

12. Any Officer applying may, on the recommendation of the Commandant, be placed on the Reserve List if in the Militia, or on the Unattached List if in the Mounted Rifles or Rifle Volunteers.

13. The services of Unattached Officers and Officers on the Reserve List are at all times to be at the disposal of the Commandant, but they are not to perform any duty unless he authorizes them to do so.

14. Before promotion to the rank of Captain or Major, candidates must pass an examination in professional subjects. Officers may, however, on the recommendation of the Commandant, be promoted without passing such examination, on the condition that they do so on the first available opportunity. The promotion of Officers who fail to pass the examination within a reasonable time will be cancelled.

15. Mounted Officers, and candidates for appointment as such, *Equitation*. must attend riding-school, if required by the Commandant.

16. The professional examinations required will comprise the *Examinations, subjects of* following subjects:—

- (a) Regimental duties.
- (b) Drill.
- (c) Duties in the field.
- (d) Gunnery (for Officers of Artillery only).

The scope of each subject will vary according to the rank for which the examination is required. The various subjects, (a) to (d), showing the scope to be required from Officers of each rank, will be detailed in a syllabus to be published in General Orders.

17. The appointment of Honorary Chaplains is allowed on the *Honorary Chaplains* recommendation of the Commandant.

18. Honorary veterinary surgeons may be appointed to mounted *Honorary veterinary surgeons* corps on the recommendation of the Military Commandant.

SECTION VI.—DISCIPLINE.

I.—GENERAL.

1. The Queen's Regulations and the customs of the Imperial *Queen's Regulations to be taken as a guide.* Military Service, where not inconsistent with *The Discipline Act 1870* and Acts amending the same and any regulations made thereunder, will be taken generally as a guide in all matters of discipline affecting the Force.

2. The regulations for the exercise and evolutions of the various *Drill exercise and evolutions.* branches of H.M. Service are to be carried out, and the most exact adherence to the system therein established is required of all Officers, subject only to such alterations as may be prescribed by General Orders.

These regulations prescribe the adoption and the practice of an uniform system of exercise and drill, and it is of the highest importance that this principle of uniformity should be strictly observed and maintained.

3. As it is desirable to keep up in all ranks a proper feeling *Treatment of soldiers.* and high sense of honour, by which the correct and willing discharge of duty will best be insured, Officers of every rank should be impressed with the advantage which they individually, their own Corps, and the Service at large will derive from the adoption towards the Non-commissioned Officers and privates of a system of command and treatment which shall insure respect towards superiors.

4. Officers are to adopt such a system themselves, and are to *Observance of the rule by Warrant and N. C. Officers.* require it to be adopted by the Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers; and the example of Officers will have the effect of checking the use of improper and offensive terms on the part of the Non-commissioned Officers towards the privates. If acts of intentional neglect or of insubordination should take place, and the means of correction and punishment authorized by the Regulations of the Service have to be resorted to, these measures will have double effect if not preceded by intemperate language.

5. Officers are to avoid reproving Non-commissioned Officers *Reproving N.C. Officers.* for any irregularity, neglect of duty, or awkwardness, in the presence or hearing of the privates—unless it shall be necessary for the benefit of example that the reproof be public—lest their authority should be weakened or their self-respect lessened.

6. Officers are at all times accountable for the maintenance of *Responsibility of Officers in general.* good order and the rules and discipline of the Service, and they are to afford in these respects the utmost aid and support to the Commanding Officer. It is their duty to take notice of, repress, and instantly report any negligence or impropriety of conduct in Non-commissioned Officers and privates, whether on duty or off duty, although the offenders may not belong to their particular Battalion, Troop, Battery, Company, or Detachment.

7. Deliberations or discussions, having the object of conveying *Praise or censure of superiors forbidden.* praise, censure, or any mark of approbation towards superiors or any others in Her Majesty's Service, are strictly prohibited, as being subversive of discipline, and an assumption of power which belongs to the Sovereign alone, or to those Officers to whom the command and discipline of the Troops may be intrusted. Every *Presents and testimonials.* Officer will therefore be held responsible who shall allow himself

- to be complimented by Officers, Warrant Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, or men, who are serving, or who have served under his command, by means of presents of plate, swords, &c., or by any collective expression of their opinion.
- Corps not to assemble except for drill, &c. 8. Corps or portions of a Corps are not to assemble for any purpose unconnected with military parade, drill, or rifle practice, except with the approval of the Commandant.
- Political meetings. 9. Members of the Force are not individually or collectively to attend political meetings or join in public political discussions or demonstrations in uniform. Bands are not to appear in uniform except at parade or drill without the consent of Commanding Officers.
- Publishing military information. 10. Commanding Officers of Corps, Troops, Batteries, Companies, or Detachments are to use their utmost vigilance to prevent members of the Force publishing information relative to the numbers, movements, or operations of Troops, or any military details; and any member of the Force will be held personally responsible for reports of this kind which he may make without special permission, or for placing the information beyond his control, so that it finds its way into unauthorized hands. Furthermore, members of the Force are forbidden to give publicity to their individual opinions in any manner tending to prejudice questions that may at the time be undergoing official investigation by the Military authorities. Anonymous complaints, and the publication through the medium of the press of anything calculated to act injuriously to the interests of the Service or to excite discontent in the Force, are also strictly prohibited.
- Anonymous complaints. 11. Commanding Officers shall be responsible for the discipline, drill, and instruction of the various Troops, Batteries, Companies, or Detachments under their command, and they shall notice any infraction of the provisions of the law, or of the orders of the Commandant, relating to the use of arms, the regulations about clothing, distinctive marks of rank, discipline, and the like.
- Commanding Officers, responsibility of. 12. When members of the Force belonging to one or more Corps are brought together under arms, at rifle matches or on other occasions, either in or out of uniform, the Senior Officer present is to be considered as in command; and although his position in this respect does not involve any authority for his interference in the arrangements of the meeting, yet he is held responsible for the due maintenance of order and discipline among the members of the Force present.
- Senior Officer on parade. 13. Disobedience of orders or disrespect shown to higher authority shall be instantly reported to the Commanding Officer, and it is impressed upon all ranks that discipline depends entirely upon instant obedience, so that not only must all Commissioned Officers see that it is always duly enforced, but Non-commissioned Officers failing to report any contempt or neglect of their authority will be liable to be summarily reduced. Obedience must be rendered even when it may be considered justifiable subsequently to prefer a complaint.
- Disobedience of orders. 14. If any member of the Force has cause to think himself aggrieved, he may represent his case, through his Captain or other Officer commanding his Troop, Battery, Company, or Detachment, to the Commanding Officer. Any appeal against the decision of the Commanding Officer will be made through the proper channel to the Commandant, and any further appeal will be made through these officers for transmission to higher authority.
- Right of appeal. 15. When a member of the Force has been dismissed for misconduct, a notification of the fact, with the cause of dismissal, will be inserted in Regimental Orders, in addition to the *Government Gazette*.
- Dismissal from the Force to be published. 16. Members of the Force must not, under any circumstances, alter or tamper with their rifles, or use other than the authorized ammunition; and any rifle which, on inspection, may be found to have had any part altered or damaged will be at once returned into store, and repaired at the expense of the member to whom such rifle was issued.
- Care of rifles and ammunition. 17. All fines shall be noted in returns, and shall be appropriated according to law.
- Fines.

18. No member of the Force shall travel free by rail to or from any muster, drill, parade, or rifle practice, outside the military district in which his corps is situated, without authority from the Military Commandant. Any member of the Force contravening the Regulations under the Railway Act, with reference to the free conveyance of members of the Defence Forces, thereby renders himself liable to dismissal.

II.—PUNISHMENTS AND OFFENCES.

Punishments.

1. Commanding Officers are in all instances to report in writing to their superior officer any punishment awarded by them to men under their command. No officer, warrant officer, or non-commissioned officer is to be subject to any minor punishment at the hands of his Commanding Officer. Offences committed by any of the above which, in the opinion of the Commanding Officer, cannot be dealt with by reprimand, should be reported for the orders of the Commandant. Awards by Commanding Officers.
2. The following punishments will constitute regimental entries:—
 - (a) Every conviction by a court under the Discipline Act, and every case of desertion in which trial has been dispensed with, and every conviction by a court of ordinary criminal jurisdiction or by a court of summary jurisdiction. But when the sentence by the last-named court is a fine, and the offender has not undergone imprisonment in default of payment, the Officer Commanding may, if he thinks that a regimental entry of the conviction should not be made, represent the case to the Commandant. Convictions by the civil power for offences committed prior to enlistment are not to be entered. Regimental entries.
 - (b) Every case of reduction of a non-commissioned officer to a lower grade or to the ranks by order of the Commandant for an offence, but not for inefficiency.
 - (c) Every award of imprisonment by the Commanding Officer.
 - (d) Every award of deprivation of pay.
 - (e) Confinement to barracks exceeding seven days.
 - (f) Fines of a larger sum than five shillings.
 - (g) Any punishment awarded by the Officer Commanding in provost prison, or by the authorities in a civil gaol.
3. The Commandant may summarily reduce in rank any warrant officer, non-commissioned officer, or private for misconduct, or may fine or dismiss any warrant officer, non-commissioned officer, or private for misconduct, or may discharge any warrant officer, non-commissioned officer, or private independently of any other punishment to which he may be subject; but no warrant or non-commissioned officer shall be reduced to a rank below that in which he was engaged. Commandant, powers of.
4. On the discharge of any man from the Forces, he shall be furnished on application with a printed form of discharge, signed by the Commandant, containing a record of his character. Discharge certificate.
5. In the case of dismissal, no certificate of character will be given. All dismissals will be notified in the *Government Gazette*. Dismissal.
6. Offences committed by warrant and non-commissioned officers of the permanent staff attached to corps will in all cases be reported to Head Quarters for the orders of the Commandant. Warrant and N.C. Officers, Permanent Staff.
7. It would be inconsistent with subordination for a Commanding Officer to admit of the right of option or appeal from any of the above awards; but he may, if he think proper, vindicate the justice of his first order by resorting to the alternative of a court. Right of option not permitted.
8. Non-commissioned officers may, with their Commanding Officer's consent, and the approval of the Commandant, resign their rank, and revert to the rank or position they may have previously held, but they are not allowed to do so in order to escape the consequences of misconduct without the special sanction of the Commandant. A certificate of the Commanding Officer, stating the cause of the resignation (together with the written authority of the Commandant), is to be forwarded to Head Quarters, to be appended to the man's enrolment form. Resignation of N.C. Officers.
9. Solitary confinement is, as much as possible, to be reserved for cases of drunkenness, riot, or violence; and, in aggravated cases, should be followed by extra duty and drills. Imprisonment.

10. Every person serving under *The Discipline Act 1870* who is guilty of any of the acts or omissions following shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations, and will be subject to be brought before the courts therein provided if charged with any of the following offences:—

- (1.) Without orders from his superior officer leaves his guard, picquet, patrol, or post.
- (2.) Forces a safeguard.
- (3.) Forces or strikes a soldier when acting as sentinel.
- (4.) By discharging fire-arms, drawing swords, beating drums, making signals, using words, or by any means whatever occasions false alarms in action, on the march, in the field, or elsewhere.
- (5.) When acting as sentinel commits any of the following offences, that is to say :—
 - (a) Sleeps or is drunk on his post.
 - (b) Leaves his post before he is regularly relieved.
- (6.) Is guilty of mutiny or sedition.
- (7.) Strikes or uses or offers any violence, or uses threatening or insubordinate language, to his superior officer.
- (8.) Disobeys any lawful command given personally by his superior officer in the execution of his office, whether the same is given orally, or in writing, or by signal or otherwise.
- (9.) Resists an escort whose duty it is to apprehend him or to have him in charge.
- (10.) Breaks out of barracks, camp, or quarters.
- (11.) Deserts or attempts to desert Her Majesty's Service.
- (12.) Is guilty of fraudulent enlistment or enrolment.
- (13.) Absents himself without leave.
(In case of persons serving occasionally, absence without leave shall mean failing to attend two parades in each month without having obtained leave from his Commanding Officer.)
- (14.) Without urgent necessity quits the ranks.
- (15.) Being an officer, behaves in a manner unbecoming the character of an officer and a gentleman.
- (16.) Is guilty of disgraceful conduct.
- (17.) Malingers, or feigns or produces disease or infirmity; or wilfully maims or injures himself or any other soldier, whether at the instance of such other soldier or not, with intent thereby to render himself or such other soldier unfit for service, or causes himself to be maimed or injured by any person with intent thereby to render himself unfit for service.
- (18.) Is drunk, whether on duty or not on duty.
- (19.) Is guilty of frequent drunkenness.
- (20.) (a) When in command of a guard, picquet, patrol, or post, releases without proper authority, whether wilfully or otherwise, any prisoner committed to his charge; or
(b) Wilfully or without reasonable excuse allows to escape any prisoner who is committed to his charge or whom it is his duty to keep on guard.
- (21.) Being in arrest or confinement or in prison or otherwise in lawful custody, escapes or attempts to escape.
- (22.) Makes away with or is concerned in making away with (whether by pawning, selling, destruction, or otherwise howsoever) his arms, ammunition, equipments, instruments, clothing, regimental necessities, or any horse of which he has charge, or any Government property in his charge, or any property of officers or members of the Force.
- (23.) Loses by neglect any of the above-mentioned articles.
- (24.) Steals or embezzles, or receives knowing them to be stolen or embezzled, any money or goods the property of a comrade or of an officer, or any money or goods belonging to any regimental mess or band or to any regimental institutions, or any public money or goods.
- (25.) Ill-treats any horse used in the public service.

- (26.) In any report, return, muster roll, pay list, certificate, book, route, or other document made or signed by him, or of the contents of which it is his duty to ascertain the accuracy—
 (a) Knowingly makes or is privy to the making of any false or fraudulent statement; or
 (b) Knowingly makes or is privy to the making of any omission with intent to defraud.
- (27.) Is guilty of any offence of a fraudulent nature not before in these Regulations particularly specified.
- (28.) Loses by neglect any public money or money belonging to any regimental institution entrusted to his charge.
- (29.) Violates or neglects to obey any command or injunction contained in the Rules and Regulations made under the Discipline Act.
- (30.) Is guilty of any act, conduct, disorder, or neglect to the prejudice of good order and military discipline though not specified in the foregoing cases.

III.—COURTS.

1. *The Discipline Act 1870* lays down rules for the constitution of courts, and defines the powers with which they are invested. Authority for constitution, &c., of courts.
2. All charges preferred against persons serving under the said Act, and the circumstances on which they are founded, are to be carefully inquired into, without delay, by the Commanding Officer of the accused. The said Commanding Officer will either deal with the case himself (if it is within his power, under *The Discipline Act 1870* and Acts amending the same and these Regulations), or refer the matter to higher authority. In the latter case, the evidence of the witnesses for the prosecution and for the defence shall be taken down in writing, in a narrative form, in the presence of the accused, unless such accused shall fail to attend after having been duly warned. The evidence of each witness, when taken down, shall be read over to him, and shall be signed by him, or, if he cannot write his name, shall be attested by his mark and witnessed. Any statement of the accused material to his defence shall be added in writing. Investigation of charges.
3. Whenever it can be arranged without serious inconvenience to the Service, the members of a court assembled for the trial of an officer are to be of equal, if not superior, rank to the prisoner. Courts on officers.
4. Any number of prisoners may be tried together for an offence committed collectively, but when more prisoners than one are tried by the same court, and they are arraigned upon separate and distinct charges, the court is to be re-sworn at the commencement of each trial, and the proceedings of each trial are to be conducted and recorded separately. Separate trial for each prisoner.
5. It is important that every trial by court once begun should, as far as possible, proceed with strict regularity and without interruption to its conclusion. The court have the power of granting an adjournment, but they should in no case permit an adjournment for the purpose of obtaining further evidence, either on behalf of the prosecution or of the prisoner, unless they are satisfied that such adjournment and production of further evidence will not render the trial unjust, and ought reasonably to be allowed in order to assist the courts of justice. Great care is therefore to be taken, both by the prosecuting officer and the prisoner, to have ready at the trial all the witnesses and documents which they may desire to produce in support of their respective cases. Adjournments.
6. The accused is to be furnished, within a reasonable time before trial, with a copy of the charge to be preferred against him. Copy of charge to be given to prisoner.
7. In framing charges, care is to be taken to render them specific in names, dates, and places, but all non-essential minutiae are to be avoided. Instruction in framing charges.
8. A charge of "disgraceful conduct" is never to be preferred unless the offence is clearly of a felonious or fraudulent nature, or of a cruel, indecent, or unnatural kind. Charges of "disgraceful conduct."
9. No person under the rank of a non-commissioned officer is to be brought to trial by court-martial on a first charge of drunkenness only. If, however, he is to be tried for another offence, a charge of drunkenness may be added as a separate charge. In cases of frequent drunkenness, the evidence given from the Defaulters' Book is to specify the date, place, and Charges of drunkenness.

- circumstance of each previous instance of drunkenness. The entries in the Defaulters' Book are to be conclusive evidence of the previous instances of drunkenness therein stated.
- Plea of prisoner. 10. In every case in which a prisoner pleads guilty, the court is, notwithstanding, to receive, and to report in the proceedings, such evidence as may afford a full knowledge of the circumstances, as it is essential that the facts and particulars should be known to those whose duty it is to report on the case, or who have discretion in carrying the sentence into effect.
- Former convictions, age, &c. 11. After any person has been found guilty of the charge or charges preferred against him, the court is to inquire into and record the prisoner's former convictions (if any), and any sentence which he may be undergoing; also his age, service, and any decorations or other honorary rewards he may be in possession of. These particulars are required for the guidance of the court in awarding punishment, as well as for that of the confirming authority in sanctioning the award. The evidence under this head is to be given, whenever possible, by a commissioned officer who is not a member of the court.
- Minutes of proceedings. 12. The minutes of the proceedings of all courts-martial are to be fairly and accurately recorded in a clear and legible hand, without erasures. When interlineations, which should be avoided as much as possible, are necessarily made, they are to be verified by the president's initials. The pages are to be numbered, and the sheets, when more than one, are to be fastened together. Care is to be taken that sufficient space, at least half a page, is left, immediately below the signature of the president, for the signature and remarks of the confirming authority.
- Re-assembly of court. 13. Whenever a court is re-assembled for the purpose of revising their proceedings, the letter, order, or memorandum, or a copy thereof, containing the instructions to the court, and the reasons for requiring the revision, is to be attached to, and form part of, the proceedings.
- Rules of procedure for trial. 14. All trials shall be conducted in accordance with the rules of procedure appended to the English Army Act in force for the time being, so far as such rules may not be inconsistent with the provisions of *The Discipline Act 1870* and Acts amending the same.
- Sentences remitted or proceedings quashed. 15. When any person has been tried and sentenced by a court, and his punishment has been wholly remitted, his conviction is to be recorded; but when the proceedings of a court are quashed on account of their illegality, or from any other circumstances, such person is to be relieved from all consequences of his trial, and all record of it is to be erased.
- Prisoner may have assistance during trial. 16. At any trial held under the Act, a prisoner may have a person to assist him during the trial, whether a legal adviser or any other person. A person so assisting him may advise him on all points, and suggest the questions to be put to witnesses, but may not, under any circumstances, either examine witnesses orally or address the court.

SECTION VII.—INTERIOR ECONOMY.

I.—OFFICERS, WARRANT AND NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS.

- Authority of Commanding Officer. 1. A Commanding Officer is invested with authority which renders him responsible to his Sovereign and his country for the maintenance of discipline, order, and a proper system of economy in the Corps or portions of a Corps under his command. He is to exact from Officers and men the most implicit obedience to Regulations, and he is not only to enforce by command, but to encourage by example, the energetic discharge of duty.
- Instruction of Officers and men. 2. He is to see that the Officers are practically instructed in their duties. He will, at his discretion, direct the Field Officers and the Captains to take the command of the Parade, and in his presence to exercise the Brigade, Battalion, or Corps. The instruction of his men also forms a most essential part of the supervision of a Commanding Officer.
- Conduct of Officers to be reported. 3. It is the duty of a Commanding Officer to bring specially to the notice of the Commandant, without favour or partiality, any Officers who may be distinguished for attention to and proficiency in their duties, as well as those who, from incapacity or habitual inattention, are deficient in a knowledge of their

duties, or show an indisposition to afford the Commanding Officer that support which he has a right to expect from them, or conduct themselves in a manner injurious to the efficiency and the credit of the Corps.

4. An Officer in temporary command is not to give out any Standing Orders, or to alter those issued by the Commanding Officer, without a reference to him or to the Commandant. On the other hand, a Commanding Officer, when absent from his Corps, is not justified in issuing Regimental Orders. Officers in temporary command.

5. Commanding Officers are to cause every Order and Circular issued for general information and guidance to be made known throughout the Corps; and they are to afford all Officers under their command every facility for becoming acquainted with current changes in Regulations and Orders. Ignorance of published Orders will never be admitted as an excuse for their non-observance. All Orders relating to the Corps are to be read and explained immediately after such Orders are received, and those of an important nature are to be read on three successive Parades. Promulgation of orders.

6. Nothing more essentially tends to the maintenance of regularity and good order than that system or chain of responsibility which should extend from the highest to the lowest grade. Chain of responsibility.

7. It is of importance that the Regimental Field Officers should, at all times, make themselves thoroughly acquainted with the professional abilities of the whole of the Officers placed under their charge, so as to assist Commanding Officers in the appreciation of the military acquirements of those under their command. In like manner, Officers commanding Troops, Batteries, and Companies should make themselves thoroughly acquainted with the ability and acquirements of the officers under their command, who ought at all times to look to them for information and advice. Testing acquirements of Officers.

8. Great attention is required from the Officers Commanding Troops, Batteries, and Companies to the cleanliness of the clothing, arms, and accoutrements. The dress and appearance, as well as the demeanour, of members of the Force should on all occasions and in all situations be such as to create a respect for the service. Cleanliness of the men to be attended to.

9. In a Battalion of Infantry, two Field Officers, in addition to the Commanding Officer, will be mounted on Parade. The Companies of a Battalion of Infantry are to be equal in size. They will form on Parade according to the seniority of the Captains from flanks to centre, viz., the senior on the right, next senior on the left, and so on; but for purposes of drill and exercise their position may, in accordance with the "Field Exercise," be varied at the discretion of the Commanding Officer. Batteries of Artillery will form up according to the regimental seniority of the Brigade or Battery. Order on parade.

10. For purposes of interior economy, each Troop, Battery, and Company is to be permanently designated as follows:—Cavalry, Field Artillery, Infantry, Mounted Rifles, and Rifle Volunteers, by a letter of the alphabet, commencing from A; Garrison Artillery by consecutive numbers. Troops, Batteries, Companies, and Squads.

For the convenience of inspection and general supervision, each Troop is to be divided into two squads; each Battery of Field Artillery into three divisions, and each division into two subdivisions; each Battery of Garrison Artillery into two half-batteries; each Company into two half-companies, and each half-company into two sections.

The subaltern Officers, to whose supervision the squads, divisions, half-batteries, or half-companies are respectively intrusted, are responsible to the Captain or other Officer Commanding, who is answerable for the whole of his Troop, Battery, or Company to the Commanding Officer. Subaltern Officers on joining are to provide themselves with a nominal roll of their squads, divisions, half-batteries, or half-companies, and are as soon as possible to make themselves acquainted with the disposition, character, age, and service of each of their men.

11. It is expected that every Officer who has been two years in the service will be capable of commanding and exercising a Troop, Battery, or Company in every situation, and will be perfectly acquainted with its interior arrangement, economy, and discipline; and that every Officer who shall have been two years in command of a Troop, Battery, or Company will be competent in every Proficiency of Officers.

respect to undertake the duties of a Field Officer. No Officer of Infantry is to be confirmed in his commission until he has gone through a course of musketry instruction; and, in the Cavalry, a course of singlestick, fencing, and army signalling instruction.

Warrant and N.C. Officers, appointment of. 12. All Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers will, subject to such conditions and restrictions as may from time to time be imposed by the Governor in Council, be appointed, on behalf of the Governor, by the Commandant or other persons duly authorized by the Governor in Council.

Warrants. 13. All members promoted to warrant rank will receive warrants bearing the signature of the Commandant.

Mode of addressing Warrant Officers. 14. Non-commissioned Officers and men will address Warrant Officers in the same manner as they do officers, but will not salute them.

Books. 15. Every Sergeant is required to provide himself with, and to have in his possession, a copy of the Regulations for the Field Exercise and movements of that branch of the service to which he belongs.

Acting N.C. Officers. 16. When additional Non-commissioned Officers are required, Corporals may be appointed to act as Sergeants (to be styled Lance-Sergeants), and privates as Corporals (to be styled Lance-Corporals, or, in the Artillery, Acting-Bombardiers), who, if they prove themselves efficient, are to be promoted as vacancies occur. Such appointments not to carry extra pay.

Numbers of. 17. The number of these acting Non-commissioned Officers is not to exceed one Lance-Sergeant and three Lance-Corporals or Acting-Bombardiers to each Troop, Battery, or Company, unless the effective strength of the Troop, Battery, or Company exceeds 75 privates, in which case one additional Lance-Corporal or Acting-Bombardier is allowed.

Examination of Warrant and N.C. Officers. 18. All candidates for the rank of Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers must pass such examination as may be directed by General Order before being eligible for appointment by Commanding Officers.

II.—PAY.

Paymaster to issue. 1. All pay and allowances are issued by the Paymaster, in accordance with the rates laid down from time to time by Order in Council or Defence Circular.

Responsibility of Commanding Officers. 2. Commanding Officers are responsible for the proper disbursement of all moneys received by them from the Paymaster, and shall keep such record of their expenditure and receipts as may from time to time be directed.

Channel for special correspondence. 3. In any case in which a Commanding Officer may desire to question a decision communicated to him by the Pay Department, or to apply for any grant of money not provided for by Regulation, he shall do so through the Commandant.

III.—STORES.

Responsibility of Commanding Officers. 1. Commanding Officers are responsible for the proper custody of all stores which may be issued on their requisitions by the Controller, and that the proper establishment of stores, as laid down from time to time, is kept up.

Establishment. 2. The regulated establishment of stores allotted to each corps must not be exceeded or reduced except by the authority of the Minister, which must be obtained through the Commandant.

Requisitions. 3. When the articles requisitioned for come within the authorized establishment, the requisitions will be signed by the Commanding Officer, and forwarded direct to the Secretary, who will send same to the Controller; but in all cases where articles not forming part of the regulated equipment are required, the requisition must be marked "Special," and forwarded, through the Commandant, to the Secretary for the approval of the Minister. When approved by the Minister, such requisitions will be forwarded to the Controller.

Barrack equipment, Victorian Artillery. 4. In the case of stores forming part of barrack equipment of the Victorian Artillery, the certificate of the officer commanding, that such stores have become unserviceable from fair wear and tear, attached to the requisition for new stores will be sufficient authority for the Controller to satisfy the requisition.

5. When articles requisitioned for are supplied from stock, they will be accompanied by the requisition forms in duplicate. The black forms will be signed and returned without delay to the Controller, and the red form will be retained as a voucher. Requisitions for articles from stock.

6. When articles on approved requisitions are supplied direct by contractors, and not from Ordnance stock, the Officer receiving the stores will be responsible that they are in accordance with contract as to quality and description, and that the quantities charged are correct. Requisitions for articles from contractor.

The order on contractor, duly signed by the Officer authorized to receive the stores, will be retained by the Controller as his authority for passing contractors' accounts. Requisitions to be made in duplicate.

7. Requisitions in duplicate must be forwarded to the Controller for all stores to be supplied by or returned to the Ordnance Branch; the red form to be signed by the Controller on the receipt of the stores and returned to the Corps, to be retained as a voucher; the black form will be sent by the Controller to the Secretary, who will initial and return it to the Controller.

8. Requisitions in duplicate for stores to be struck off the books as lost must be forwarded to the Controller. The authority to strike them off will be entered on the red form, which will be returned to the Corps as a voucher. When stores are returned as unserviceable, or struck off the books as lost, the proceedings of a Board approved by the Commandant must be attached to the requisition, and will be forwarded by the Controller to the Secretary for initial and return. Requisitions to strike off stores.

9. Requisitions in triplicate for the transfer of stores from one Corps to another must be forwarded to and approved by the Commandant. One form (black) will be retained by the Controller, one form (red) by the Officer receiving the stores, and one form (red) by the Officer transferring them. Requisitions for transfer of stores.

10. Requisitions for the repairs of stores must be forwarded to the Controller, and must state clearly the nature of the repairs required; and all repairs will be executed in the order in which they are received, except in special cases, when instructions to the contrary are issued. Requisitions for repair of stores.

11. No erasures as to numbers or description of stores are to be made by Commanding Officers on any voucher. When any stores requisitioned for cannot be supplied, they will be struck out of the requisition in red ink by the Controller, or Assistant Adjutant-General, who will enter the cause of non-supply in the column for remarks, and initial. Erasures and alterations.

Similarly, alterations in vouchers for stores returned must be initialled by Commanding Officers.

12. In all cases where stores are lost, damaged, or have become unserviceable from any cause, the Officer in whose charge they are will apply to the Assistant Adjutant-General for a Board to report upon them. In case of loss or damage, it will be the duty of the Board to express an opinion by whom the loss should be borne, unless the value is less than £1, when the certificate of the Commanding Officer will be sufficient, and except also as provided in paragraph 4. Stores lost or damaged.

13. In order to ensure the utmost accuracy in the supply of stores required for each branch of the service, it is directed that all requisitions are to contain full and exact details as to the number and particular description, as shown in the Vocabulary of Stores, of every article required. The responsibility of the professional details will rest with the officer requiring the stores, whilst the Controller will only be responsible for providing and issuing them in accordance with the details furnished. Requisitions to be complete.

14. Expended stores must be entered in the Expense Book as they are drawn for consumption. The Expense Book must be made up at the end of each quarter, and, after being examined and signed by the Commanding Officer, the various items must be transferred to the proper columns on the issue side of the Equipment Ledger (see example shown on Appendix A, at end of such ledger), and a requisition (Appendix C) to strike off such expended stores must be forwarded to the Controller not later than the third day after the end of each quarter. In the event of no stores being expended during any quarter, a blank requisition must be forwarded in the same manner as if stores had been expended. The Victorian Artillery and the Submarine Mining Company, Victorian Engineers, will make up their Expense Books and furnish strike-off requisitions *monthly* instead of quarterly. Expense Book.

Equipment
Ledger.

15. All articles received and issued (except expended stores, which are to be posted up quarterly, as per last clause), and articles issued on payment which are not part of equipment of Corps, such as books issued for sale to officers, must be entered under their proper headings in the Equipment Ledger as the transactions occur, and the ledger folios in which the entries are made must be inserted in the columns provided for that purpose on the requisition forms.

16. Once in each year—viz., on the 31st December—the Equipment Ledgers and Abstract Books are to be balanced and the balances brought down. The balances are to be compared with the articles actually on hand, and the general correctness of the Ledger or Abstract Book certified to by the Commanding Officer; after which, and not later than the 7th day of January, the Ledgers and Abstract Books are to be forwarded to the Controller for inspection and comparison with Ordnance Store Books.

If at any time the Controller may have reason to believe that the books of a Corps are not being properly kept, he may report to the Secretary, who will thereupon take steps that the books be forwarded for his inspection.

Whenever Commanding Officers are permanently changed, the books will be balanced as at the close of the year.

SECTION VIII.—DRESS REGULATIONS FOR VICTORIAN MILITARY FORCES.

GENERAL, FOR ALL ARMS.

Buttons.

1. *Buttons* of special pattern, gilt, with badge (Southern Cross and motto—"Aut pace aut bello, Victoria"), universal pattern. The 3rd Battalion V. Rifles wear bronze buttons same pattern.

2. *Badges of rank* to be worn by officers on shoulder-straps, as in Imperial army. Shoulder-straps of same pattern as for Royal Artillery in full dress. Shoulder-straps of same material as uniform, with black lace edging, and badges in gold in undress. The 3rd Battalion V. Rifles will wear shoulder-straps and badges as in the Imperial Rifle Regiments.

Lace.

3. *Lace*.—Gold, Royal Artillery pattern in full dress, excepting full dress trousers of officers of Infantry, which shall have Infantry pattern lace thereon. Black, as in Imperial army, in undress. The 3rd Battalion V. Rifles will wear black lace, as in the Imperial Rifle Regiments.

Badges on
pouches.

4. *Badges on pouches* of officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of same pattern as buttons (universal pattern), excepting Artillery, who shall wear the gun on the pouch. The 3rd Battalion V. Rifles will wear a silver bugle, as in the Imperial Rifle Regiments.

Sword-
knots.

5. *Sword-knots* for officers.—Gold, Royal Artillery pattern, in full dress; brown leather in undress. For warrant and non-commissioned officers, white leather. 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, black leather for all ranks; Mounted Rifles and Rifle Volunteers, brown leather for all ranks.

Badges on

6. *Badges on forage caps*.—Universal pattern.

Helmets.

7. *Helmets*.—Dark blue, with gilt badge (universal pattern), gilt chain and spikes. Plume for Cavalry and Nordenfolt Battery. The 3rd Battalion V. Rifles will wear dark green helmets, with bronze badge, chain, and spike.

8. *Badges of rank* for warrant officers, as in Imperial Service—Crown for sergeant-majors, star for quartermaster-sergeants, to be worn on right forearm.











9. *Chevrons*.—Gold for non-commissioned officers, on right arm only. Sergeants of Artillery wear gun above chevron; battery sergeant-majors and quartermaster-sergeants wear crown or star over gun; troop and company sergeant-majors and colour-sergeants wear crown; and company quartermaster-sergeants star above chevron. The 3rd Battalion V. Rifles will wear chevrons, crowns, and stars of black, worked with red, as in the King's Royal Rifle Corps.

10. *Shoulder-straps* for non-commissioned officers and men of same colour of uniform, with the following badges—In yellow worsted for Cavalry, Nordenfolt Battery, Artillery, and O. C. and

T.; blue for Engineers; white for 1st, 2nd and 4th Battalions of Infantry and Ambulance Corps; crimson for Mounted Rifles; and scarlet for 3rd Battalion V. Rifles and Rifle Volunteers:—

11. *Pouches* for officers.—Black patent leather, with universal Pouches. badge, excepting Artillery, who shall wear the gun. Victorian Engineers, black patent leather, as for Royal Engineers. Full dress, special pattern, for Artillery only. 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, as in the Imperial Rifle Regiments.

12. *Pouch belts* for officers.—Full dress, gold, as for Royal Artillery; undress, white patent leather, as for Royal Artillery, except for Cavalry, who wear brown leather. Victorian Engineers, as in Royal Engineers. 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, special pattern, black leather, with silver plate, chain, and whistle. Mounted Rifles and Rifle Volunteers, special pattern.

13. *Boots*.—Mounted officers, non-commissioned officers, and Boots. men wear, when on mounted duties, knee boots, as in Imperial army. Officers who are not mounted wear wellington or ankle boots.

13. *Sabretache*.—Undress for mounted officers, as in Imperial Sabretache. army.

15. *Spurs*.—With knee-boots, crane-necked spurs fastened with straps and buckles: brass for field officers of Engineers and Infantry; steel for Cavalry, Artillery, 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, and other mounted officers. With wellington boots, box spurs for mounted officers; brass for field officers of Engineers and Infantry; steel for Cavalry, Artillery, 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, Mounted Rifles, Rifle Volunteers, and other mounted officers of Infantry. Brass, in full dress, for all except adjutants of Infantry and mounted officers 3rd Battalion V. Rifles.

16. *Sword belt*.—Full dress: gold, as in Royal Artillery. Undress: white patent leather, as in Royal Artillery, except for Cavalry, Mounted Rifles, and Rifle Volunteers, who wear brown leather, but with universal badge on plate in both cases. Victorian Engineers, as in Royal Engineers, but with universal badge on plate. 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, black, as in the Imperial Rifle Regiments.

17. *Gloves*.—White leather, except the 3rd Battalion V. Rifles, who wear black leather, and Mounted Rifles and Rifle Volunteers,

who wear brown leather. Brown leather may also be worn by all corps on parade, in marching, field day, and drill order, but officers of corps must be uniform.

- Haversacks. 18. *Haversacks* for officers, as in Imperial Service.
- Mess dress. 19. *Mess dress* may be adopted by any corps, should the officers desire it, on the application of the Commanding Officer.
- Cloaks. 20. *Cloaks* for officers as for Staff in Imperial army, but without velvet collars.
- Great Coats. 21. *Great coats* for warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men, of all branches, as per sealed pattern. Cloaks for Cavalry and mounted non-commissioned officers and men, special pattern.
- Undress summer uniform. 22. An undress uniform, special pattern, of khaki serge or drill, may be adopted by any corps, on the application of the Commanding Officer, for wear during the summer months.

Cavalry and Nordenfelt Battery. Officers. 23. CAVALRY AND NORDENFELT BATTERY. OFFICERS.

Tunic.—Special pattern.

Jacket as for non-commissioned officers and men, but edged with $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch gold lace and full dress shoulder straps, and chevron of $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch gold lace on cuffs.

Forage cap, as in Royal Artillery, but with universal badge above lace in front, and gold braid welt round top.

*Pantaloon*s, as in Imperial Cavalry, blue, with double stripe of gold lace.

Trousers, as in Imperial Cavalry, blue, with double stripe of gold lace.

Sword.—Light Cavalry, but with wooden scabbard, as in Bengal Cavalry.

Patrol jacket, as in Royal Artillery, but with standing collar.

Artillery. Officers. 23A. VICTORIAN ARTILLERY AND ARTILLERY MILITIA. OFFICERS.

Tunic, as in Royal Artillery (buttons excepted).

3. The half-yearly issue will consist of one pair of trousers and one pair of boots. One tunic will be issued every two years. One helmet, blue, will be issued after two and a half years' service.

4. The annual issues of clothing will be made on the 1st October each year, and the half-yearly issues on 1st April and 1st October.

5. Recruits will be supplied with new articles of clothing if enlisted more than six months prior to the next annual issue, and, if available, with part-worn articles if enlisted less than six months prior to the next annual issue.

* *vide* Instructions as to New or Part-worn Clothing.

6. Compensation, on the recommendation of the officer commanding Victorian Artillery, in lieu of clothing, will be allowed to such warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men, whose clothing is fit for wear for another period, at contract rates, such compensation not being paid until the end of the period of the issue of clothing.

7. New or part-worn clothing does not become the property of the soldier after the next periodical issue, but must be kept for fatigue or barrack work, and cannot be made away with at discretion.

8. The officer commanding Victorian Artillery can, however, sanction the disposal of clothing when there is too large an accumulation in the soldier's possession; buttons, chevrons, and badges, being invariably removed before sale.

9. Men to engage for five years, with the option, if approved by the Commandant, of extending their service for a second period of five years on the completion of the first five years. Condition of service.

10. Recruits, to be engaged and sworn in under the Discipline Act, on the prescribed form of attestation, and to be not less than 19 or more than 30 years of age. Minimum height, 5 feet 8 inches; chest measurement not less than 35 inches. Of good character, able to read and write fairly, and to pass medical examination.

11. Men recently discharged from the Imperial Service, under 45 years, and men of special qualifications, may be engaged and sworn in, if approved by the Commandant, provided they pass the medical examination, although they do not comply in every respect with the above conditions.

12. Boys may be engaged between the ages of 14 and 19, according to the establishment fixed from time to time.

13. Threepence per day will be retained from the pay of all gunners and trumpeters during the 3rd, 4th, and 5th years' service, and sixpence per day from the pay of all non-commissioned officers during the whole of their service and from the pay of gunners and trumpeters during the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th years of their service, as deferred pay, to be drawn on discharge, or on the completion of their term of engagement. But non-commissioned officers, trumpeters, and gunners dismissed or discharged for misconduct, or on account of bad character, to forfeit all claim to deferred pay earned in their then current term of service, if so directed by the Commandant. Deferred pay.

14. All deferred pay due to deserters is forfeited by the act of desertion.

15. One shilling per day to be retained from pay to meet expenses of rations. Rations.

16. No man can claim his discharge until the expiration of his term of service, but a man of good character may, if he be permitted by the Commandant, purchase his discharge during the first three years of service for £20, during the fourth for £10, and thereafter may be granted a free discharge. Discharge

17. The sum of sixpence per diem will be allowed for a district gunner at each of the forts. Contingencies, allowances, &c.

18. Extra pay, at the rate of five shillings per diem, will be given to four (4) men for performing the work of armourers.

19. Extra pay, at the rate of one shilling (1s.) per diem, with two annual increments of sixpence per diem, will be given to a wheeler.

9. Recruits to be, if possible, artisans, and to be engaged and sworn in under the Discipline Act ; to be not less than 19 or more than 35 years of age, minimum height 5 feet 8 inches, chest measurement not less than 35 inches, of good character, able to read and write, and to pass the medical examination.

10. Men recently discharged from the Imperial Service under 45 years, and men of special qualifications, may be engaged and sworn in, if approved by the Commandant, provided they pass the medical examination, although they do not comply in every respect with the above conditions.

11. Threepence per day will be retained from the pay of all sappers during the 3rd, 4th, and 5th years' service, and sixpence per day from the pay of all non-commissioned officers during the whole of their service and from the pay of sappers during the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th years of their service, as deferred pay, to be drawn on discharge, or on the completion of their term of engagement. But non-commissioned officers and sappers dismissed or discharged for misconduct, or on account of bad character, to forfeit all claim to deferred pay earned in their then current term of service, if so directed by the Commandant.

12. All deferred pay due to deserters is forfeited by the act of desertion.

13. One shilling per diem to be retained from pay to meet Rations. expenses of rations.

14. No man can claim his discharge until the expiration of his term of service; but a man of good character may, if he be permitted by the Commandant, purchase his discharge for £20.

SECTION V.—WORKING PAY.

1. Working pay shall be the remuneration of working parties detailed, with the sanction of the Commandant, for the performance of work for the departments of the force, and shall be issued according to the regulations hereinafter laid down.

2. When on active service in the field, working pay shall only be issued to troops when employed on works of a special character.

3. The rate of working pay for non-commissioned officers and men shall be one shilling a day; but when the party is employed for less than four hours only half-rate to be issued.

4. Pay to be issued to soldiers employed as ordinary labourers, or on such work as—

- (a) Assisting armourer to brown arms.
- (b) Assisting artificers to repair guns, carriages, or platforms.
- (c) Whitewashing buildings.
- (d) Filling cartridges, or storing, packing, or cleaning stores in reserve stores.
- (e) Issuing stores for use in other stations.
- (f) Formation of drill or exercise grounds.
- (g) Original construction of ranges, butts, and cavalry jumps.
- (h) Return of stores into reserve stores.

5. When working parties are necessarily employed in water or in works of emergency at night, they shall, for the time of such special employment, receive, at the discretion of the Commandant, an addition of one-half to the ordinary rates of working pay.

6. Soldiers should not be employed emptying stagnant wells or cesspools if civil labour can be obtained, but if necessarily employed they shall be paid at such rates, not exceeding twice the rate of working pay, as may be approved by the Commandant.

7. The working hours shall be counted from the time the party parades at the place at which their attendance is required; but when the aggregate distance which a working party may have to march to and from the works exceeds three miles, working pay may, under the sanction of the Commandant, be issued for the time necessarily occupied in marching the distance in excess of three miles.

8. The issue of working pay at daily rates shall be confined to soldiers whose employment involves daily attendance, although they may not necessarily be at work throughout the day.

Proportions.	9. Non-commissioned officers may be employed in the proportion of one non-commissioned officer to every ten men or less, to superintend working parties.
Negligence; stoppages.	10. If a non-commissioned officer or soldier misconducts himself, or is negligent or inefficient while employed with a working party, the Commandant may stop the whole or any portion of the man's pay for the days on which he misconducts himself, or is negligent or inefficient.
With what other pay issuable.	11. Working pay shall be issued in addition to any other pay and allowances to which non-commissioned officers and men may be entitled.
Special work.	12. When troops are required to perform work analogous to that for which working pay is granted by these Regulations, but for which working pay is not ordinarily allowed, the Commandant may authorize the working pay if, owing to either the climate, hours of labour, or to special local difficulties, the work is exceptionally severe. A report in such cases to be made to the Minister of Defence.
Not issuable on fatigue duty.	13. Working pay shall not be issued to soldiers employed on fatigue duty.
Terreplein of a battery.	14. Keeping the terreplein of a battery in military charge neat and in ordinary repair (mowing the grass excepted) will be considered as fatigue duty, and working pay will not be allowed.
Artillery.	15. Working pay shall not be issued to Artillery soldiers when employed on work connected with their duties, except when—
Special.	<p>(a) Removing guns of 12 tons and upwards, their carriages and platforms, for a distance exceeding 300 yards, to or from an emplacement in any other manner than by water, or by horses along a line of road.</p> <p>(b) Removing heavy warlike stores or guns of under 12 tons, for a distance exceeding one statute mile, in any other manner than by water, or by horses along a line of road.</p> <p>(c) Removing guns or warlike stores by horses along a line of road, provided the distance going and returning, including the march from stables, is not less than ten miles.</p> <p>(d) Scrapping or painting ordnance, shot or shell, carriages, platforms, or miscellaneous stores, whether in store or in use.</p> <p>(e) Making up ammunition which is not required for artillery armament or salutes, or making up ammunition for the Store Department.</p> <p>(f) Examining guns in stores.</p> <p>(g) Embarking or disembarking guns or warlike stores which are not in Artillery charge.</p>
Requisitions for fatigue parties.	16. All requisitions for fatigue parties should show the nature of the work for which the fatigue party is required, the hours at which work is to commence and terminate each day, and the period for which the work will last, or, if that is uncertain, the probable period.
Officer to sign requisition.	17. The requisition should be signed by the Officer responsible for the performance of the work which the fatigue party has to carry out, and it will be his duty, when the period during which the work will last is not specified in the requisition, to report to the Officer furnishing the fatigue party immediately the work is finished, in order that the fatigue party may not be unnecessarily furnished. In the event of the fatigue party not arriving at the time and place specified, an immediate report will be made to the Assistant Adjutant-General, as well as to the Officer whose duty it was to furnish the fatigue party, and this Officer will be held responsible, failing a satisfactory explanation, for any loss which may result. Similar reports will be furnished on every day on which a fatigue party may be absent or late. Failing despatch of these reports, the responsibility will rest upon the Officer superintending the work.
Reports to be furnished.	
Relief of fatigue parties.	18. Should work be required to last continuously for more than eight hours, the Officer furnishing the fatigue party will arrange for the relief of the party, if necessary; and in all such cases the Officer superintending the work will state, in his requisition, the most convenient hours for relief.

19. If fatigue parties are required for work before sunrise or after sunset, or on Sundays or public holidays, it must be so stated in the requisition. In all such cases, double working-pay will be granted. Fatigue parties required at special hours.

SECTION VI.—CONTAGIOUS DISEASES.

(a) All persons serving in the Permanent Forces, when under medical treatment at the expense of Government for diseases resulting from their own indiscretion or misconduct, shall be placed under stoppages of pay of one shilling per day during the time they are off duty, and the medical officer shall furnish a certificate to the Commanding Officer of such persons of any case under his treatment, the result, in his opinion, of such indiscretion or misconduct, and such certificate shall be authority to the Commanding Officer for placing such persons under stoppages. Stoppage of pay.

(b) All persons serving in the Permanent Forces, whether quartered in barracks or permitted to reside outside, must report at once to the medical officer (or, in his absence, to the Commanding Officer) the occurrence of any contagious disease affecting themselves or any person domiciled with them. Report to be made.

(c) The diseases referred to are such as small-pox, measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhoid fever, &c.; also any venereal disease. Definition.

(d) Concealment of venereal disease or such diseases as are above specified from the knowledge of the medical officer (or, in his absence, of the Commanding Officer), or the employment of unauthorized medical advice and treatment, will be considered as an offence against the Regulations. Concealment an offence.

PART III.—MILITIA FORCES.

SECTION I.—CONSTITUTION AND ESTABLISHMENT.

1. The Victorian Militia shall consist of such Commissioned, Warrant, and Non-commissioned Officers and men as may from time to time be duly engaged and appointed under the provisions of *The Discipline Act 1870* and the Acts amending the said Act. Constitution.

2. Engagement shall be for a period not exceeding five years, of which the first three shall be in the Militia, and the remaining two in the first class Militia Reserve, but members may, with the sanction of the Commandant, re-engage during the last year of their service for a further period of one, three, or five years. Members who have served three years in the Militia may be permitted by the Commandant to serve the remaining two years in the Militia instead of in the 1st Class Militia Reserve. Engagement period of.

3. Any person so engaged may (with the approval of the Governor in Council if an Officer, or of the Commandant if below the rank of an Officer) resign from the Militia, and such person shall pay to Her Majesty— Resignation fee, &c.

£4 (four pounds), if such resignation is tendered during the first year of such person's service.

£2 (two pounds), if such resignation is tendered during the second year of such person's service.

£1 (one pound), if such resignation is tendered during the third, fourth, or fifth year of such person's service.

Such sum shall be taken to be as and for liquidated damages due by such person to Her Majesty, and shall become due immediately on the acceptance of the resignation of such person being signified to him by the Commandant, and may be recovered in the name of Her Majesty.

But the Commandant may remit the whole or any portion of such penalties on the recommendation of the Commanding Officer.

Submarine

4. Members of the Submarine Mining Company, Victorian Engineers, will be enrolled under three sections, viz.:—

Section A. Persons having had scientific training as electricians, telegraphists, civil engineers, surveyors, &c.

Section B. Artisans and mechanics.

Section C. Boatmen.

Every applicant must show by evidence satisfactory to the Commanding Officer that he is eligible by prior training for the section to which he seeks admission.

Age, limits
of.

5. No person shall be engaged unless he be a British subject, and between the ages of 18 and 35, but persons who have previously served in the Imperial Regular or Auxiliary Forces, or in any Colonial Militia or Volunteer Force, may be enrolled if under the age of 45. Officers or Non-commissioned Officers of the Imperial Regular and Auxiliary Forces, or of any Colonial Militia or Volunteer Force, may be appointed though their ages exceed 35. Persons who have served in a Volunteer Cadet Corps for a period not less than two years may be engaged between the years of 17 and 18, if fulfilling all other conditions.

Medical ex-
amination.

6. All applicants for engagement shall be subject to a medical examination.

Height,

7. The standard height for each arm of the Service will be—

Exceptions to the standard of height and chest measurement may be allowed with the approval of the Commandant.

Boys can be

8. Boys may be engaged for the purpose of being trained as trumpeters, drummers, buglers, or musicians. Not more than two boys per Troop, Battery, or Company will be allowed. Age 14 to 18 years.

Recruits'
drill, attend-
ance at.

9. All applicants for engagement in the ranks must attend recruits' drill after joining till passed into the ranks by the officer duly appointed for that purpose. Any recruit who fails to attend 48 hours' drill within the first three months after joining should be recommended for discharge, unless in the opinion of his Commanding Officer there are extenuating circumstances.

Men in ex-
cess of estab-
lishment.

10. Officers commanding Corps can, with the approval of the Commandant, engage men in excess of the fixed establishment, pending the occurrence of vacancies in the Corps. All such men will be required to sign a declaration, before taking the oath, that they are aware they are not entitled to receive pay whilst supernumerary to the fixed establishment of the Corps.

SECTION II.—DISCIPLINE.

Dress.

1. Members of the Force must appear in authorized uniform, or in purely civilian dress—the unsoldierlike appearance of Militiamen dressed partly in uniform and partly in civilian costume bringing discredit not only on themselves but on the Force to which they belong.

Dress.

2. Members of the Force must be properly dressed when going to and returning from parade.

Arrest.

3. Any member of the Force may, for any offence against good order and discipline, be placed under arrest by his Superior Officer.

Definition.

4. Arrest shall signify suspension from all military duty and participation in rifle shooting; and any member placed under arrest shall deliver up his arms and accoutrements to such person as his Commanding Officer may direct.

Disobedi-
ence of
orders or

5. If any member of the Force, while under arms or on duty with the company to which he belongs or any portion of the Force, or while engaged in any military exercise or drill—either in uniform or plain clothes, or while going to or returning from any place of exercise or assembly—disobeys any lawful order of the Officer under whose command he then is, or is guilty of misconduct, any Superior Officer may order the offender, if an Officer, into arrest, and if not an Officer into the custody of any Non-commissioned Officer or private; but so that the offender be not kept in such custody longer than during the time such portion of

the Force as aforesaid remains under arms or on duty. After which, his case will either be disposed of by the Officer Commanding on the spot, or he will be suspended from duty under clause 3, and reported to higher authority.

6. Duty with a company or any portion of the Force is held to mean not only presence under arms on parade, but the performance of all administrative duties of a military nature in or out of uniform. Duty, definition of.

7. Officers commanding shall, immediately after parade, receive the reports of Officers as to any members of the Force who have misconducted themselves, and shall either deal summarily with the case or report it to a higher authority. In case of fine, record of offence and punishment shall be made in the Order Book. Non-commissioned Officers shall not be subject to any fine unless previously reduced to the ranks. Mode of punishment.

8. Any member of the Force who fails to produce, for inspection, when required, any arms, accoutrements, or other property intrusted to his care may be proceeded against under the Act, and steps taken for his summary discharge from the Force, for disobedience of orders. Every member failing to become effective shall, on demand, immediately return to the head-quarters of his Corps all arms, accoutrements, clothing, stores, &c., which may have been issued to him. Responsibility for Government or other property.

9. Any member of the Force whose services are dispensed with shall deliver up in good order, fair wear and tear only excepted, all arms, ammunition, accoutrements, clothing, or appointments, or any public stores or property issued to him; and if he refuse or neglect to comply with this Regulation, he may be proceeded against under the Act. Public property to be returned.

10. Any loss, damage, or destruction of arms, accoutrements, uniform, or stores which may be traced to any member, unless caused by circumstances beyond his control, will be required to be made good by stoppage from his pay; or, in default thereof, proceedings against him will be instituted under the Act. Damage to public property to be made good.

11. Any member of the Force absent without leave for a period of three months shall be dismissed, unless in the opinion of the Commandant there be extenuating circumstances. Absence for three months.

12. Every member of the Force shall attend in each month at least two parades or drills, of which one shall be a daylight parade, except in June and July, when both may be evening parades. Any member of the Force failing to attend the required number of parades or drills in any month, unless on leave, shall be at the end of each month deemed to have been absent without leave within the meaning of these Regulations. Monthly attendance at parades.

13. All combatant ranks on the roll on the 1st July in each year; Commanding Officers of Corps and Brigade and Regimental Staff excepted, in order to be classed as effective, must attend in each year three whole days, fifteen half days, and twenty-four night drills, and undergo the prescribed Gunnery or Musketry course, viz.:—

These courses may be included in above drills.

Any member of the Force who shall have been absent with leave during any portion of the year for a period not exceeding six months may, with the sanction of the Military Commandant, be classed as effective, provided that he has attended a number of drills proportionate to the time during which he was doing duty with his corps. Sick leave.

14. Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st July and 30th September must attend all the duties prescribed in para. 13. Effectiveness for recruits.

Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st October and 31st December must attend two whole days, twelve half days, and twenty night drills.

Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st January and 31st March must attend one whole day, four half days, and twelve night drills.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st April and 30th June may be classed as "Effective," irrespective of the number of drills they may attend.

15. Pay will be issued to Commanding Officers of Corps and Brigade and Regimental Staff on the certificate of the Commandant that they have been effective during the period for which it is claimed.
16. Commanding Officers of Corps and Brigades, Regimental Staff, and Officers detached from their Corps on special duty, shall be classed as effective on having performed the duties required of them by General Order.
17. Attendance at church parades or funerals shall not be allowed to count towards effectiveness, nor shall pay be granted for such attendance. Guards of honour shall only count for pay and effectiveness when ordered by the Commandant.
18. Whole-day parades will be ordered by the Commandant, who shall call at least four of such in each year on public holidays. Half-day parades shall be held on half-holidays, and will be ordered by Commanding Officers; but no half-day parades shall be called during the months of June and July, and not more than three (3) shall be called during any other month of the year (except for musketry practice), without the sanction of the Commandant.
19. If temporarily resident in another district, a Militia man may, by order of the Commandant, be attached to a Corps serving in such district, and drills done with such Corps shall be returned to his Commanding Officer and count towards pay and effectiveness.
20. One whole day will be considered equal to two half days or four night drills; one half day will be considered equal to two night drills; two half days will count as one whole; but no number of night drills will be allowed to count for daylight parades.
21. For the purpose of these Regulations, the duration of parades and drills shall be as follows:—
A whole-day parade, not less than eight hours.
A half " " three "
A night drill " " one and a-half hours.
- But should the Corps, having assembled, be dismissed through inclemency of weather or other cause before the minimum time be reached, such parade or drill may be returned as complete provided the sanction of the Commandant is obtained. No member of the Force arriving on the parade ground after parade has been formed up and told off shall be entitled to claim payment for such parade.
22. An extra number of parades and drills shall be called in order to allow members the opportunity of earning the maximum amount; but members will not be paid more than the maximum, even although attending a larger number of parades and drills.
23. When the Commandant, or officer deputed by him, makes the half-yearly official inspection of a corps, battalion, battery, or detachment, every Officer, Warrant Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or man should be present in the ranks, unless prevented by sickness or urgent necessity. In the former case, a certificate from the officer in medical charge to be produced; in the latter, leave may be granted by the officer commanding, but only in urgent cases. Any member of a corps not attending such inspection is liable to a fine of ten shillings.
24. Any member of the Force, not being a Commissioned Officer, permanently removed from his district may, by order of the Commandant, be transferred to any arm of the Service in the district to which he is removed; and the Commandant shall by General Order decide what position such member shall take. Commissioned Officers may not be transferred to another branch of the Service except by authority of the Governor in Council.
25. In the event of any member of the Force becoming physically unfit for duty, the Commandant may cause a Medical Board to assemble to report upon such member, and upon their recommendation may deal with his case.
26. Any Officer who does not qualify as an effective shall not be allowed to retain his commission, unless it be represented by the Commandant that there are special reasons for the relaxation of this regulation.
27. Any Non-commissioned Officer who does not qualify as an effective shall be reduced to the ranks, unless it shall appear to the Commandant that there are special reasons for the relaxation of this regulation.

Pay for Commanding Officers and Staff.

28. After any portion of the Force has been called out for actual military service, it shall be released from such service only by order of the Governor in Council; and before such portion of the Force is released from actual military service it shall be returned to the locality to which it belongs.

A corps on actual military service to be released by the Governor in Council.

29. A corps, or portion of corps, is not to quit, as a military body, the district to which it belongs unless the sanction of the Commandant be previously obtained. A district comprises the area in which are situated the registered abodes of members of a corps.

Corps not to quit district.

30. Commanding Officers shall have power to enforce fines, not exceeding the following amounts :—

In (j) and (k), the maximum fine is obligatory, and cannot be reduced or remitted without the sanction of the Commandant.

31. Fines which cannot be settled from arrears of pay in accordance with para. 13, sec. III., Part III., should be recovered by the Commanding Officer in a Court of Petty Sessions.

Fines to be recovered.

SECTION III.—PAY AND ALLOWANCES.

1. All funds, effective allowances, and other moneys shall be paid to and administered by the Commanding Officers.

Duty of Commanding Officers.

2. At the commencement of each financial year, Commanding Officers will be credited for each effective member with the sum of 20s. per head, together with 30s. per head on the established strength; to be expended by the said Commanding Officers, on behalf of their Corps, on the following items :—

Effective allowance.

- (a) Clothing.—Provision of all authorized clothing for warrant and non-commissioned officers and men (great coats excepted), including lace, buttons, chevrons, forage caps, and badges.
- (b) Orderly-rooms. — Lighting, cleaning, water, care of grounds, stationery, furniture; also, expenses incidental to care and protection of stores, and to making good Government property lost or damaged, the loss or damage of which cannot be traced to individuals, and is not chargeable to Government.
- (c) Expenses in connexion with parades and camps.
- (d) Expenses incidental to target practice and prizes, not exceeding fifteen (15) per centum of the effective money.
- (e) Battalion bands.
- (f) Cost of all supplies received from the Ordnance Stores, on repayment, or any other expenditure authorized by the Council of Defence.

3. It is to be distinctly understood that the effective allowance is not to be used for the payment of supplies made to individuals, or for the expenses of individuals which are not authorized by the Regulations. Commanding Officers will be held personally responsible for any expenditure in excess of the effective allowance for which they may not have received special authority.

Not to be expended on individuals.

4. Commanding Officers of the three batteries of the Field Artillery Brigade will be credited with an additional sum of Thirty shillings (30s.) for each driver of the said batteries, this sum to cover the cost of providing extra articles of clothing.

Additional allowance for drivers, Field Artillery.

- Disbandment.** 5. In case of the disbandment of a Corps, any balance of the effective allowance or other funds shall lapse into the Defence Vote, after payment of all expenses sanctioned under these Regulations.
- Responsibility of Commanding Officers.** 6. Commanding Officers shall be responsible to Government for the due custody and expenditure of the Government allowances, no portion of which shall pass from their control or be expended except by their direction. The Government allowances shall be kept in a special bank account, and all books and accounts connected with the expenditure thereof shall be produced when required at Inspections.
- Effective allowance for Detachments.** 7. In cases where effective allowance is payable to officers commanding detachments, $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ (two and a half per cent.) will be deducted from the amount of such allowance, and paid to the officer commanding the Brigade or Battalion, to enable him to meet the expenses incidental to the administration of his command. Officers commanding Brigades or Battalions will keep an account of all such money received by them, and at the close of each financial year any balance remaining unexpended will be divided among the several batteries or companies of their command in proportion to the amount received on account of each.
- Deductions for Victorian Rifle Association.** 8. The following deductions shall be made from the effective allowances to Metropolitan Corps, and the amounts thereof paid to the treasurer of the Victorian Rifle Association for the support of ranges, &c., viz.:—One shilling and sixpence per head on the establishment of Corps armed with the rifle; One shilling per head on the establishment of Corps whose arm is not the rifle.
- Balance-sheet.** 9. On or before the 10th of July in each year a balance-sheet of the past year's receipts and expenditure, signed by the Commanding Officer, and countersigned by two other Officers, must be forwarded to the Minister of Defence. No portion of the annual allowance shall be issued to any Corps until such balance-sheet shall have been received by the Minister.
- Person to examine accounts.** 10. The Council of Defence shall from time to time appoint and authorize some person or persons to examine all books and accounts of any Commanding Officer, and report thereon.
- Commanding Officer's guarantee.** 11. Every Commanding Officer shall furnish such guarantee as may be decided by the Governor in Council.
- Drill-rooms can be let.** 12. Commanding Officers are permitted to let drill-rooms belonging to their corps (when not required for instruction) for purposes other than military.
All rents to be paid by the Officer Commanding the troop, battery, company, or detachment which occupies the drill-room to the Officer Commanding the corps, who will apply the same for the benefit of the said corps, in accordance with the regulations for the disbursement of the effective allowance, subject to such ratable deductions for benefit of head-quarters as he may deem advisable.
The rate of hiring to be fixed by the Commanding Officer.
When orderly-rooms are let to the public for entertainments, all incidental expenses, such as cost of gas consumed, &c., must be deducted from the proceeds of the entertainment, and not from the effective allowance.

(b) For the first year of service, recruits sworn in between the 1st October and 31st December shall not be entitled to more than three-fourths, and recruits sworn in between 1st January and 30th June shall not be entitled to more than one-half, of the amount provided in the above scale for the financial year.

(c) Recruits shall be paid at the rate of one shilling per drill for attendance at recruit drills on condition of being passed into the ranks, but in no case shall the total payment for the first year of training exceed the sums specified in paragraph 13 (a).

(d) At the close of the half-year ending 31st December, members of the Force may receive a payment on account for the parades and drills attended during the half-year. Such payment on account shall not exceed a moiety of the amount which could be earned in the whole year, and the amount so paid on account shall be deducted from the amount earned for the year. The Commanding Officer may deduct from such payments any fines which have been inflicted and are in arrear.

14. When members of the Militia Force are supplied with rations, the actual cost of rations, not exceeding 1s. per diem, will be deducted from their pay. No such deduction will, however, be made from the pay of members who may be called out under para. 13 (e).

15. Horse allowance, £50 per annum, will be paid to each Mounted Officer on condition that he keeps a horse approved as a charger.

Such horse must be the *bona fide* property of the Officer drawing the allowance, must be sound and suitable for the service, and a register of such horses must be kept in each Corps.

Mounted Officers who do not keep horses, and Officers attached on probation to Mounted Corps, provided that there are vacancies in the establishment of officers of such corps, will be allowed the actual amount of horse hire, not exceeding 15s. per day, of attendance at parades and drills. Horse allowance will not be paid to any Officer for any period during which he may have been on leave of absence, unless during such period his horse shall have been left available for military duties.

SECTION IV.—MEDICAL STAFF.

1. The Officers of the Medical Staff will, subject to the orders of the Commandant, be detailed for duty by, and be under the immediate command of, the Principal Medical Officer, both for discipline and professional supervision.

2. When on active service, or when the Militia Force is in camp, they will be employed in general, station, or field hospitals, with troops in barracks or in the field, and on all such special duties in camp or quarters as the Principal Medical Officer may decide.

4. Medical officers will be detailed for duty with the various corps, and will, on the application of officers commanding corps to which they are attached, perform, without further reference, the unmentioned duty:—

5. Attendance at artillery and rifle practice and field days will be arranged for by the Principal Medical Officer at Head Quarters, and by the Senior Medical Officer at out-stations. Additional duties.

6. In the event of an officer being unable to attend to any of the foregoing duties, he will either make arrangements with some other Medical Officer to take his place (informing the Commanding Officer) or report to the Principal Medical Officer, in sufficient time to enable him to provide for the duties.

8. Medical Officers will be liable to be detailed for Boards, &c., where the attendance of a Medical Officer is necessary. Boards, attendance at.

9. Medical Officers will receive pay as follows:—

(a) For examination of recruits, 2s. 6d. a head.

(b) For other military duties—

Surgeon-Majors, £2 10s. for whole day.

Ditto £1 5s. for half-day.

Surgeons, £2 for whole day.

(c) The maximum amount of pay, however derivable, from the various sources, shall not exceed in one year £60 for Brigade-Surgeon, ranking as Lieut.-Colonel; £48 for a Surgeon-Major, ranking as Major; and £36 for a Surgeon.

10. Horse allowance will be issued to Mounted Medical Officers under the same regulations as to other Mounted Officers.

11. At any Military Station where the services of a Medical Officer of the Victorian Militia are not available, the Officer Commanding may make arrangements with a civil practitioner to carry out the duties required.

12. Officers of the unattached list of the Medical Staff are liable at all times to be called upon to supply the places of those on the fixed establishment. Any officer who being so called upon fails to do any duty for the space of three years is liable to be removed from the Force.

18. Fees will be allowed on the same scale as the pay of a Surgeon. Bills for such fees must be supported by the receipt of the civil practitioner and a certificate by the Officer Commanding that no Medical Officer of the Militia is available.

All drills will be carried out under the orders of the Officer Commanding the Corps, who will call a sufficient number of half-day parades and night drills to enable full pay, as laid down in the Regulations, to be earned. Six night drills in each half-year shall be devoted to Infantry drill.
Pay during encampments, &c.	4. During encampments, or when called out for active service, Non-commissioned Officers and men will receive an allowance of two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) per diem in addition to the pay of their rank.

SECTION VI.—THE ORDNANCE, COMMISSARIAT, AND TRANSPORT CORPS.

Constitution.	2. The Sergeants, Corporals, and Privates shall be either volunteers from the Militia, specially approved, or men specially enlisted for the service.
Drills and parades.	3. All drills and parades will be carried out under the orders of the Officer Commanding, who will call a sufficient number of half-day parades and night drills to enable full pay as laid down in the Regulations to be earned. Six night drills in each half-year shall be devoted to Infantry drill. The Drivers will only be employed in camps, or when called out for active service, and will receive an allowance of 10s. a day, with free rations, during the time they are so employed.

Employment of.	4. During encampments, or when called out for active service, Non-commissioned Officers and men will receive an allowance of two shillings and sixpence per diem, in addition to the pay of their rank.

SECTION VII.—BANDS.

Strength.	1. The Band of a Battalion is not to exceed a total strength of 1 Sergeant, 1 Corporal, and 18 Privates, in addition to the boys allowed to be engaged. These men are to be effective for service, to be perfectly drilled, and liable to serve in the ranks on any emergency, and the numbers stated are not to be exceeded.
Supernumeraries.	Attendance at Band practice to count as drills. Commanding Officers are empowered to employ supernumeraries as Bandsmen in addition to the numbers authorized, provided that no portion of the cost falls upon the effective allowance.
Clothing.	2. Bands are to be dressed in the same uniform as their Battalions.

3. Boys engaged under regulations relating to Militia for Boys training as musicians may be clothed like Bandsmen.

4. When Bands are playing together the Band Sergeants are to lead according to seniority of appointment. Senior Band Sergeant to lead.

5. The following books of instruction, published by authority, are to be strictly adhered to by the Corps to which they appertain, without additions or alterations either as regards the soundings or their application:—"Trumpet and Bugle Sounds for all Branches of the Service," "Instructions for the Fife," and "The Art of beating the Drum." Books of Instruction.

6. It is essential that the band, the bugles, and the drums and fifes when playing or beating for military purposes, particularly for the marches, should adhere strictly to the time which will allow, within the minute, the exact number of steps prescribed in the "Field Exercise." For this purpose, the music for the different cadences is to be practised, under the direction of the Band-Sergeant, with the plummet until the cadence has been acquired. The band and the drums are to be frequently practised together, in order that when relieving each other in the quick march the cadence may be preserved uniformly and uninterrupted. Bands to adhere to correct time. Bands to be practised together.

7. In order to ensure uniformity throughout the bands of the Force, the instruments are to be of the same pitch as that adopted by the "Ancient Philharmonic Society." Instruments.

SECTION VIII.—LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

1. Leave of absence, not exceeding one month, may be granted by Commanding Officers to all officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Militia under their command, or they may delegate this power to Officers Commanding Troops, Batteries, or Companies. Beyond this period, application must be made to the Commandant through the proper channel. Leave of absence.

PART IV.—MOUNTED RIFLES.

SECTION I.—CONSTITUTION AND ESTABLISHMENT.

1. The Mounted Rifles shall consist of such members of a Rifle Club as elect to join the Mounted Branch of the Club, and are approved of by the Officer commanding the Battalion. Rifle Constitution.

2. Engagement shall be for a period not exceeding three years, but members may, with the sanction of the Commandant, re-engage during the last year of their service for a further period of one, three, or five years. Period of engagement.

Any person so engaged may (with the approval of the Governor in Council if an Officer, or of the Commanding Officer if below the rank of an Officer) resign from the Mounted Rifles by giving 14 days' notice in writing to the Officer commanding his Detachment. Resignations.

3. No person shall be engaged unless he be a British subject, and between the ages of 18 and 35, but persons who have previously served in the Imperial Regular or Auxiliary Forces, or in any Colonial Militia or Volunteer Force, may be enrolled if under the age of 45: Persons who have served in a Volunteer Cadet Corps for a period of not less than two years may be engaged between the ages of 17 and 18, if fulfilling all other conditions. Age, limits of.

4. Boys may be engaged for the purpose of being trained as Boys, trumpeters, drummers, buglers, or musicians. Not more than two boys per Company will be allowed. Age 14 to 18 years.

5. All applicants for engagement in the ranks must attend recruit drill until considered fit to be passed into the ranks by the Officer commanding the Battalion. Recruit drill.

6. After being passed into the ranks, members of the Battalion will be required to undergo a minimum of 12 daylight drills per annum. Such drills will be held at such time and place as may be found convenient, and in the presence of the Commanding Officer or such other Officer as he may appoint. Drills to be attended.

Effective-

7. No Mounted Rifleman should be classed as effective unless he shall have completed 12 daylight drills during the twelve months between 1st July and 30th June in each year, and completed his course of musketry training.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st July and 30th September must attend 12 daylight drills and have completed the course of musketry.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st October and 31st December must attend 6 daylight drills, and have completed the half-yearly course of musketry.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st January and 31st March must attend 3 daylight drills, and have completed the quarterly course of musketry.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st April and 30th June must attend 2 daylight drills.

8. Any combatant Mounted Rifleman who fails to carry out the provisions of paragraph 7 by the 30th June in each year may be struck off the strength, unless such failure was caused by illness, to be certified to by the surgeon of his company or other duly qualified medical practitioner.

Transfers.

9. If temporarily resident in another district, a Mounted Rifleman may by order of the Commanding Officer be transferred to a Detachment serving in such district, and drills done with such Detachment shall be returned to his Commanding Officer and count towards effectiveness.

10. Attendance at church parades or funerals shall not be allowed to count towards effectiveness.

11. An extra number of parades and drills shall be called in order to allow members the opportunity of qualifying as effective.

Annual
inspections.

12. When the Commandant, or Officer deputed by him, makes the annual official inspection of the Battalion or a Detachment, every Officer, Warrant Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or man should be present in the ranks, unless prevented by sickness or urgent necessity. In the former case, a certificate from the Officer in medical charge to be produced; in the latter, leave may be granted by the Officer commanding the Detachment, but only in urgent cases.

13. The musketry course will be as may be directed by the Military Commandant.

Free kit.

14. Every Mounted Rifleman, on enrolment, will be supplied, free of charge, with the following articles, which must be kept in good order, remain the property of the Government, and be returned whenever called for:—

And on being passed into the ranks he shall receive in addition, and under the same conditions:—

15. Any Officer who does not qualify as an effective shall not be allowed to retain his commission, unless it be represented by the Commandant that there are special reasons for a relaxation of this regulation.

16. Non-commissioned Officers will be appointed by the Officer commanding the Battalion.

17. Any Non-commissioned Officer who does not qualify as an effective shall be reduced to the ranks, unless it shall appear to the Commandant that there are special reasons for the relaxation of this regulation.

Service in

18. After any portion of the Battalion has been called out for actual military service, it shall be released from such service only by order of the Governor in Council; and, before such portion of the Battalion is released from actual military service, it shall be returned to the locality to which it belongs.

19. The Battalion, or any portion of it, is not to quit, as a Battalion military body, the district to which it belongs unless the sanction of the Commandant be previously obtained; and no member is to quit for a period of more than one month the neighbourhood of his Detachment without returning his complete free kit to the Officer commanding the Detachment to which he belongs.

SECTION II.—DISCIPLINE.

1. Members of the Battalion must appear in authorized uniform or in purely civilian dress, the unsoldierlike appearance of Mounted Riflemen dressed partly in uniform and partly in civilian costume bringing discredit not only on themselves but on the Force to which they belong. Authorized uniform to be worn.
2. Members of the Battalion must be properly dressed when going to and returning from parade. Parades, proper dress to be worn.
3. Any member of the Battalion may, for any offence against good order and discipline, be placed under arrest by his Superior Officer. Arrest.
4. Arrest shall signify suspension from all military duty and participation in rifle shooting; and any member placed under arrest shall deliver up his arms and accoutrements to such person as his Commanding Officer may direct. Definition of arrest.
5. If any member of the Battalion, while under arms or on duty with the Company to which he belongs or any portion of the Battalion, or while engaged in any military exercise or drill—either in uniform or plain clothes, or while going to or returning from any place of exercise or assembly—disobeys any lawful order of the Officer under whose command he then is, or is guilty of misconduct, any Superior Officer may order the offender, if an Officer, into arrest, and, if not an Officer, into the custody of any Non-commissioned Officer or private; but so that the offender be not kept in such custody longer than during the time such portion of the Battalion as aforesaid remains under arms or on duty. After which his case will either be disposed of by the Officer Commanding on the spot, or he will be suspended from duty, under paragraph 3 (as above), and reported to higher authority. Disobedience of orders or misconduct.
6. Duty with a Company or any portion of the Battalion is held to mean not only presence under arms on parade, but the performance of all administrative duties of a military nature in or out of uniform. Military duty.
7. Officers commanding shall, immediately after parade, receive the reports of Officers as to any members of the Battalion who have misconducted themselves, and shall either deal summarily with the case or report it to a higher authority. Mode of punishment for misconduct.
8. Any member of the Battalion who fails to produce, for inspection, when required, any arms, accoutrements, or other property entrusted to his care may be proceeded against under the Act, and steps taken for his summary discharge from the Battalion for disobedience of orders. Every member failing to become effective shall, on demand, immediately return to the head-quarters of his Corps all arms, accoutrements, clothing, stores, &c., which may have been issued to him. Public or other property, responsibility for.
9. Any member of the Battalion whose services are dispensed with shall deliver up in good order, fair wear and tear only excepted, all arms, ammunition, accoutrements, clothing, or appointments, or any public stores or property issued to him; and if he refuse or neglect to comply with this Regulation, he may be proceeded against under the Act. Public property to be returned.
10. Any loss, damage, or destruction of arms, accoutrements, uniform, or stores which may be traced to any member, unless caused by circumstances beyond his control, will be required to be made good by him; or, in default thereof, proceedings against him will be instituted under the Act. Damage to be made good.
11. The Commandant may summarily reduce in rank any Non-commissioned Officer, or may dismiss any Warrant Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or private, for misconduct. Such dismissal shall entail dismissal from the Rifle Club to which the dismissed member belongs, and the Commanding Officer may discharge any Non-commissioned Officer or private. Reduction or dismissal.
12. Any member of the Battalion absent without leave for a period of three months shall be dismissed, unless in the opinion of the Commandant there be extenuating circumstances. Absence without leave.

Division of

13. For the convenience of inspection and general supervision, each Company is to be divided into Detachments. The officer to whose supervision and command each Detachment is entrusted are responsible to the Officer commanding the Company, who is answerable for the whole of his Company to the Commanding Officer. Each Detachment Officer is to keep a nominal roll of his Detachment, and is to make himself acquainted with the character, age, place of residence, and service of each man in it. The Officer commanding the Company will keep a nominal roll of the whole Company, showing the date of enlistment of each man in it and the name of his Detachment.

SECTION III.—PAY AND ALLOWANCES.

Administra-

1. All funds, effective allowances, and other moneys shall be paid to and administered by the Commanding Officers of Companies, under the supervision of the Officer commanding the Battalion.

2. At the commencement of each financial year, Commanding Officers of Companies will be credited for each effective member with the sum of 30s.* together with a sum of 20s.* for each man who may have been passed into the ranks before the preceding 30th of June. The amount so credited shall be vested in a committee, composed of the Officer commanding the Company and Officers or Non-commissioned Officers commanding Detachments. The Company committees shall be under the control of the Commanding Officer.

3. The committee shall establish a fund in each Company, and shall apply it primarily to the maintenance of clothing (great-coats exclusive), keeping of saddlery in thorough order, expenses incidental to musketry practice, drills, camps, exercises, and all expenses incurred in the performance of military duty. It is to be distinctly understood that the effective and capitation allowances are not to be used for the payment of supplies made to individuals, or for the expenses of individuals which are not authorized by the regulations. Commanding Officers of Companies will be held personally responsible for any expenditure in excess of the effective and capitation allowances for which they have not received special authority.

4. Commanding Officers of Companies shall be responsible to the Commanding Officer for the due custody and expenditure of the Government allowances, no portion of which shall pass from their control or be expended except by their direction. The Government allowances shall be kept in a special bank account, and all books and accounts connected with the expenditure thereof shall be produced when required at inspections.

Balance-
sheet
required.

5. On or before the 10th of July in each year a balance-sheet of the past year's receipts and expenditure, signed by the Commanding Officer of the Company and two other Officers, and countersigned by the Officer commanding the Battalion, must be forwarded to the Minister of Defence. No portion of the annual allowance shall be issued to any Corps until such balance-sheet shall have been received by the Minister.

Audit of
books and
accounts.

6. The Council of Defence shall from time to time appoint and authorize some person or persons to examine all books and accounts of any Commanding Officer, and report thereon.

Guarantees.

7. Every Commanding Officer of a Company shall furnish such guarantee as may be decided by the Governor in Council.

SECTION IV.—MEDICAL AND VETERINARY STAFF.

Uniform.

1. The Officers of the Medical and Veterinary Staff will wear the uniform of their Corps, and will perform duty with their Corps only.

Authority of

2. Whenever the Mounted Rifles may be brigaded with other troops, the officers of the Medical Staff will be under the general direction of the Principal Medical Officer of the Military Forces; and will take rank with Officers of the Victorian Medical Staff in accordance with dates of commissions.

No pay given
to officers.

3. No emolument is attached to any of the above appointments.

* Subject to the amount of the effective and capitation allowances for Mounted Rifles being voted by Parliament.

SECTION V.—LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

1. Leave of absence, not exceeding three months, may be granted by the Commanding Officer to all officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of the Mounted Rifles under his command, or he may delegate this power to Officers commanding Companies. Beyond this period, application must be made to the Commandant through the proper channel.

PART V.—RIFLE VOLUNTEERS.

SECTION I.—CONSTITUTION AND ESTABLISHMENT.

1. The Rifle Volunteers shall consist of such members of a Rifle Club as elect to join that branch of the Club, and are approved of by the Officer commanding Rifle Volunteers.

2. Detachments of Rifle Volunteers may, on the recommendation of the Commandant, be established in any Rifle Club where not less than 20 members elect to engage, provided that within a radius of 35 miles where rail is available, or 10 miles where rail is not available, a sufficient number of similar Detachments can be raised to form a Company of not less than 120 men.

3. Engagement shall be for a period not exceeding three years, but members may, with the sanction of the Commandant, re-engage during the last year of their service for a further period of one, three, or five years.

Any person so engaged may (with the approval of the Governor in Council if an Officer, or of the Commanding Officer if below the rank of an Officer) resign from the Rifle Volunteers by giving 14 days' notice in writing to the Officer commanding his Detachment.

4. No person shall be engaged unless he be a British subject and between the ages of 18 and 35, but persons who have previously served in the Imperial Regular or Auxiliary Forces, or in any Colonial Militia or Volunteer Force, may be enrolled if under the age of 45. Persons who have served in a Volunteer Cadet Corps for a period of not less than two years may be engaged between the ages of 17 and 18, if fulfilling all other conditions.

5. Boys may be engaged for the purpose of being trained as drummers, buglers, or musicians. Not more than two boys per Company will be allowed. Age 14 to 18 years.

6. All applicants for engagement in the ranks must attend recruit drill until passed into the ranks.

7. After being passed into the ranks, members will be required to undergo a minimum of 12 daylight drills and 12 night drills per annum. Such drills will be held at such time and place as may be found convenient, and in the presence of the Commanding Officer or such other Officer as he may appoint.

Daylight drills shall be attended by two or more Detachments of a Company; 50 per cent. of the collective strength of the Detachments ordered to parade must attend in order that a daylight drill may count towards effectiveness.

8. No Rifle Volunteer shall be classed as effective unless he shall have completed 12 daylight drills and 12 night drills during the 12 months between 1st July and 30th June in each year, and completed his course of musketry training.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st July and 30th September must attend 12 daylight drills and 12 night drills, and have completed the course of musketry.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st October and 31st December must attend 6 daylight drills and 6 night drills, and have completed the half-yearly course of musketry.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st January and 31st March must attend 3 daylight drills and 3 night drills, and have completed the quarterly course of musketry.

Recruits passed into the ranks between 1st April and 30th June must attend 2 daylight drills and 2 night drills.

9. Any combatant Rifle Volunteer who fails to carry out the provisions of paragraph 7 by the 30th June in each year may be struck off the strength, unless such failure was caused by illness, to be certified to by a duly-qualified medical practitioner.

- Transfers.** 10. If temporarily resident in another district, a Rifle Volunteer may, by order of the Commanding Officer, be transferred to a Detachment serving in such district, and drills done with such Detachment shall be returned to his Commanding Officer and count towards effectiveness.
- Church parades and funerals.** 11. Attendance at church parade or funerals shall not be allowed to count towards effectiveness.
- Extra drills.** 12. Any extra number of parades and drills shall be called in order to allow members the opportunity of qualifying as effectives.
- Annual inspections.** 13. When the Commandant, or Officer deputed by him, makes the annual official inspection of a Company or Detachment, every Officer, Warrant Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or man should be present in the ranks, unless prevented by sickness or urgent necessity. In the former case, a certificate from a medical practitioner to be produced; in the latter, leave may be granted by the Officer commanding the Detachment, but only in urgent cases.
- Musketry training.** 14. Annual musketry training will be carried out in accordance with instructions which will be issued under the authority of the Commandant, except in places where such practice is impossible, when the practice laid down for members of Rifle Clubs shall be equivalent.
- Free kit.** 15. Every Rifle Volunteer on enrolment will be supplied, free of charge, with the following articles, which must be kept in good order, remain the property of the Government, and be returned whenever called for:—
M.-H. rifle, complete, with bayonet and sling.
Waist-belt and frog.
Bandolier or pouch.
Haversack.
Water-bottle.
- Officers to be effective.** 16. Any Officer who does not qualify as an effective shall not be allowed to retain his commission, unless it be represented by the Commandant that there are special reasons for a relaxation of this regulation.
- N.C. officers, appointment of.** 17. Non-commissioned Officers will be appointed by the Officer commanding the Rifle Volunteers.
- N.C. officers to be effective.** 18. Any Non-commissioned Officer who does not qualify as an effective shall be reduced to the ranks, unless it shall appear to the Commandant that there are special reasons for the relaxation of this regulation.
- Service in the field, release from.** 19. After any company or portion of a Company has been called out for actual military service, it shall be released from such service only by order of the Governor in Council; and before such portion of the Battalion is released from actual military service, it shall be returned to the locality to which it belongs.
- Corps not to quit district without authority.** 20. No Company, or any portion of it, is to quit, as a military body, the district to which it belongs unless the sanction of the Commandant be previously obtained; and no member is to quit for a period of more than one month the neighbourhood of his Detachment without returning his complete free kit to the Officer commanding the Detachment to which he belongs.

SECTION II.—DISCIPLINE.

- Authorized uniform to be worn.** 1. Members of the Rifle Volunteers must appear in authorized uniform or in purely civilian dress, the unsoldierlike appearance of Rifle Volunteers dressed partly in uniform and partly in civilian costume bringing discredit not only on themselves but on the Force to which they belong.
- Parades. Proper dress to be worn.** 2. Members of the Rifle Volunteers must be properly dressed when going to and returning from parade.
- Arrest.** 3. Any volunteer may, for any offence against good order and discipline, be placed under arrest by his Superior Officer.
- Definition of arrest.** 4. Arrest shall signify suspension from all military duty and participation in rifle shooting; and any member placed under arrest shall deliver up his arms and accoutrements to such person as his Commanding Officer may direct.
- Disobedience of orders or misconduct.** 5. If any volunteer, while under arms or on duty with the Company to which he belongs, or any portion of the Military Forces, or while engaged in any military exercise or drill—either in uniform or plain clothes, or while going to or returning from any place of exercise or assembly—disobeys any lawful order of

the Officer under whose command he then is, or is guilty of misconduct, any Superior Officer may order the offender, if an Officer, into arrest, and, if not an Officer, into the custody of any Non-commissioned Officer or private; but so that the offender be not kept in such custody longer than during the time such portion of the Military Forces as aforesaid remains under arms or on duty. After which, his case will either be disposed of by the Officer commanding on the spot, or he will be suspended from duty under paragraph 3 (as above), and reported to higher authority.

6. Duty with a Company, or any portion of the Military Forces, ^{Military duty.} is held to mean not only presence under arms on parade, but the performance of all administrative duties of a military nature in or out of uniform.

7. Officers commanding shall, immediately after parade, receive ^{Mode of punishment for misconduct.} the reports of Officers as to any volunteers who have misconducted themselves, and shall either deal summarily with the case or report it to a higher authority.

8. Any volunteer who fails to produce, for inspection, when required, any arms, accoutrements, or other property entrusted to his care, may be proceeded against under the Act, and steps taken for his summary discharge for disobedience of orders. Every member failing to become effective shall, on demand, immediately return to the head-quarters of his Company all arms, accoutrements, clothing, stores, &c., which may have been issued to him. ^{Public or other property, responsibility for.}

9. Any volunteer whose services are dispensed with shall deliver up in good order, fair wear and tear only excepted, all arms, ammunition, accoutrements, clothing, or appointments, or any public stores or property issued to him; and if he refuse or neglect to comply with this regulation, he may be proceeded against under the Act. ^{Public property to be returned.}

10. Any loss, damage, or destruction of arms, accoutrements, uniform, or stores which may be traced to any member, unless caused by circumstances beyond his control, will be required to be made good by him; or, in default thereof, proceedings against him will be instituted under the Act. ^{Damage to be made good.}

11. The Commandant may summarily reduce in rank any Non-commissioned Officer, or may dismiss any Warrant Officer, Non-commissioned Officer, or private for misconduct. Such dismissal shall entail dismissal from the Rifle Club to which the dismissed member belongs, and the Commanding Officer may discharge any Non-commissioned Officer or private. ^{Reduction or dismissal.}

12. Any volunteer absent without leave for a period of three months shall be dismissed, unless in the opinion of the Commandant there be extenuating circumstances. ^{Absence without leave.}

13. For the convenience of inspection and general supervision, each Company is to be divided into Detachments. The Officers to whose supervision and command each Detachment is entrusted are responsible to the Officer commanding the Company, who is answerable for the whole of his Company to the Commanding Officer. Each Detachment Officer is to keep a nominal roll of his Detachment, and is to make himself acquainted with the character, age, place of residence, and service of each man in it. The officer commanding the Company will keep a nominal roll of the whole Company, showing the date of enlistment of each man in it, and the name of his Detachment. ^{Division of companies.}

SECTION III.—CAPITATION ALLOWANCE.

1. All funds, capitation allowances, and other moneys shall be paid to and administered by the Commanding Officers of Companies under the supervision of the Officer commanding the Rifle Volunteers. ^{Administration of funds.}

2. At the commencement of each year, Commanding Officers of Companies will be credited for each member passed into the ranks before the preceding 30th of June with the sum of 20s.* The amount so credited shall be vested in a committee composed of the Officer commanding the Company and Officers or Non-commissioned Officers commanding Detachments. The Company committees shall be under the control of the Commanding Officer. ^{Capitation allowance.}

3. The committee shall establish a fund in each Company, and shall apply it primarily to the maintenance of clothing (great-coats exclusive), expenses incidental to musketry practice, drills, camps, exercises, and all expenses incurred in the performance of ^{How allowance is to be applied.}

military duty. It is to be distinctly understood that the capitation allowance is not to be used for the payment of supplies made to individuals, or for the expenses of individuals which are not authorized by the regulations. Commanding Officers of Companies will be held personally responsible for any expenditure in excess of the capitation allowance for which they have not received special authority.

Commanding officers responsible of.

4. Commanding Officers of Companies shall be responsible to the Commanding Officer for the due custody and expenditure of the Government allowances, no portion of which shall pass from their control or be expended except by their direction. The Government allowances shall be kept in a special bank account, and all books and accounts connected with the expenditure thereof shall be produced when required at Inspections.

Balance-sheet required.

5. On or before the 10th of July in each year a balance-sheet of the past year's receipts and expenditure, signed by the Commanding Officer of the Company and two other Officers, and countersigned by the officer commanding the Rifle Volunteers, must be forwarded to the Minister of Defence. No portion of the annual allowance shall be issued to any Corps until such balance-sheet shall have been received by the Minister.

Audit of books and accounts.

6. The Council of Defence shall from time to time appoint and authorize some person or persons to examine all books and accounts of any Commanding Officer, and report thereon.

Guarantees.

7. Every Commanding Officer of a Company shall furnish such guarantee as may be decided by the Governor-in-Council.

SECTION IV.—LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

Leave of absence.

1. Leave of absence, not exceeding three months, may be granted by the Commanding Officer to all officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers, and men of Rifle Volunteers under his command, or he may delegate this power to Officers commanding Companies. Beyond this period, application must be made to the Commandant through the proper channel.

SECTION V.—DRESS AND EQUIPMENT.

Members to provide their own uniforms.

1. Every member of the Rifle Volunteers will be required to provide himself with authorized uniform, as laid down in the Dress Regulations.

PART VI.—VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE CORPS.

SECTION I.—CONSTITUTION AND ESTABLISHMENT.

Constitution.

1. The Volunteer Ambulance Corps will consist of—

 - 1 Sergeant-Major
 - 1 Sergeant-Compounder
 - 2 Sergeants
 - 3 Corporals
 - 42 Privates
- Total, 50

Effectiveness.

2. No member of the Volunteer Ambulance Corps shall be classed as effective unless he shall have completed 12 daylight drills and 24 night drills during the twelve months between the 1st of July and the 30th of June in each year.

Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st of July and the 30th of September must attend 12 daylight drills and 24 night drills.

Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st of October and the 31st of December must attend 6 daylight drills and 12 night drills.

* Subject to the amount of the capitation allowance for Rifle Volunteers being voted by Parliament.

Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st of January and the 31st of March must attend 3 daylight drills and 6 night drills.

Recruits passed into the ranks between the 1st of April and the 30th of June must attend 2 daylight drills and 4 night drills.

3. Every member of the Volunteer Ambulance Corps, on being passed into the ranks, will be supplied, free of charge, with the following articles, which must be kept in good order, remain the property of the Government, and be returned whenever called for:—

- 1 great coat.
- 1 jacket.
- 1 pair of trousers.
- 1 helmet.
- 1 forage cap.
- 1 waist-belt and frog.
- 1 bayonet.

4. The Volunteer Ambulance Corps shall serve under the regulations for Rifle Volunteers, so far as they may be applicable, and not inconsistent with the foregoing regulations.

5. The following uniform is authorized:—

Jacket—As for Rifle Volunteers, but with Geneva cross on the left arm as in the Militia Ambulance Corps.

Head-dress—As for Rifle Volunteers.

PART VII.—RESERVES.

SECTION I.—MILITIA RESERVE OF OFFICERS.

1. The Unattached List of officers in the Militia will be designated in future the Militia Reserve of Officers. Reserve, how composed.
2. Officers on the present Unattached List of the Militia, whose term of service will expire on 31st December, 1888, will not be required to join the Reserve unless they desire it. Option of joining given to certain officers.
3. Officers on the Reserve are liable to retirement on account of age, under the same conditions as those on the Active List of the Militia. Retirement on account of age.
4. The services of officers on the Reserve are at all times to be at the disposal of the Commandant. In order to be effective, they must attend four days at the annual training or nine half-day parades during the year. Effective-ness.
5. Officers below the rank of Major will be attached for duty to such corps as the Commandant may direct, and will not be allowed to do duty with other corps unless by permission. Duty to be performed.
6. Officers above the rank of Captain will be employed on such duties as the Commandant may determine. Duty to be performed.
7. Officers must have performed the drills mentioned in para. 4, by the 30th June in every year, in order to be classed as effective, unless they have joined the Reserve during the year; in which case they must have performed a proportional number of drills. Notwithstanding this regulation, officers of the latter class will be permitted to perform the whole number of drills requisite for the year. Effective-ness.
8. Any officer on the Reserve who is not effective will not be allowed to retain his commission, unless, in the opinion of the Commandant, there are special reasons for the relaxation of the rule. Officers to be effective.
9. Officers on the Reserve will receive the pay of their rank for all duties performed, provided it does not exceed in any one year the amount allowed for four whole days or nine half-days. Officers who join the Reserve during the financial year cannot receive pay for more drills than the total number allowed for the Militia (Active List). Rate of pay.
10. Officers on the Reserve will be eligible to fill vacancies on the Active List of the Militia. Officers eligible for Active List.

SECTION II.—FIRST-CLASS MILITIA RESERVE.

First-class Reserve, how composed.	1. The 1st Class Militia Reserve will consist of—(a) all members of the Militia passed to the Reserve after completing three years' service in the ranks, and (b) of such men now serving in the Reserve, or who may now or hereafter be serving in the Militia, who have been effective in the Militia for a period of not less than one year, and elect to join it, provided that they are recommended by their Commanding Officer and approved by the Commandant. Every member of the 1st Class Militia Reserve shall receive a retaining fee of £3, due annually on the 1st July, provided that he has been classed as effective in the Reserve on the 30th June preceding.
Effective-ness.	2. A member of the 1st Class Militia Reserve, in order to be classed as effective, must attend four days at the annual training, or at nine half-day parades during the year, and must also undergo a special course of musketry or gunnery, to be prescribed by the Commandant, which shall not extend over a longer period than the duration of three half-day parades and three night drills.
Bonus for attendance at encampment.	3. Members of this Reserve who are classed as effective will receive from the fund provided by Parliament for the annual encampment an additional sum of £1 as bonus if they shall have attended the four days' annual (or Easter) training.
Musketry and gunnery courses, when dispensed with.	4. The special courses of musketry and gunnery may be dispensed with, in the case of men joining the Reserve subsequent to 1st July, who have undergone the ordinary course with their corps during the year.
Retaining fee.	5. No man transferred to the Reserve subsequently to the 30th April in any year shall be entitled to receive the retaining fee for such year.
Transfers. Proportionate pay.	6. A member of the 1st Class Reserve, who has been transferred to such Reserve between the 1st July and the 30th April, will be required to perform a proportionate number of the drills required for the whole year in order to be classed as effective, and shall receive a proportionate amount of the retaining fee, but he may, if he desires, perform the whole number of drills laid down, and receive the full amount. The Commandant shall determine the requisite proportion of drills under this clause.
Fine for non-effectives.	7. Any member of the Reserve failing to become effective shall be liable to be fined £1 and to be transferred to the 2nd Class Reserve, at the discretion of the Commandant.
Change of address to be notified.	8. Members of the 1st Class Militia Reserve shall be under the same obligation as members of Militia to notify change of address to their Commanding Officers.
Return to Active List, provision for.	9. Any member of the 1st Class Militia Reserve may, at his own request, and with the sanction of the Commandant, be replaced upon the active list of his corps to fill a vacancy on the establishment.
Discharge.	10. A member of the 1st Class Militia Reserve may obtain his discharge on the same conditions as members of the Militia.
Militia or Reserve, service in.	11. Members who have served three years in the Militia may be permitted by the Commandant to serve the other two years in Militia instead of joining 1st Class Militia Reserve.
Right of option to members after five years' service.	12. Members, on completion of five years in the Militia, or in the Militia and the 1st Class Militia Reserve, may be permitted by the Commandant (a) to re-engage for an equal period in the Militia and the 1st Class Militia Reserve, not exceeding in the aggregate five years nor less than two years, (b) or may re-engage for any period not less than two years in the 1st Class Militia Reserve, provided that their age at the termination of such period shall not exceed 45 years.
Transfers to other districts.	13. A member of the 1st Class Militia Reserve removing permanently from the district in which the head-quarters of his corps is situated may, if he desires it, and with the approval of the Commanding Officers concerned, be transferred by the Commandant to the 1st Class Militia Reserve of any corps in his new district, in order to enable him to attend drills and rifle shooting, provided there be vacancies in the 1st Class Militia Reserve of such corps.
Members are subject to Discipline Act.	14. Members of the 1st Class Militia Reserve, while at rifle practice or on parade of any sort with their corps, shall be in every way subject to the provisions of the Discipline Act.

15. Members of the 1st Class Militia Reserve will be shown on a separate line on all returns of their corps, and a nominal roll, giving their addresses, shall be sent to Head Quarters on 1st July annually. Returns, &c., to be furnished.

16. The number of men in the 1st Class Militia Reserve of any corps shall not exceed such a number as will raise it to its war establishment, without the special sanction of the Minister. Strength of Reserve.

17. Every man joining the 1st Class Militia Reserve shall receive, or retain if already in possession of them, the arms, equipment, and clothing of his corps. Equipment.

18. Free ammunition will be granted to the 1st Class Militia Reserve of each corps, provided it is fired with the corps. Free ammunition.

19. Members of the 1st Class Militia Reserve will have the same facilities as members of rifle clubs for the purchase of rifles and ammunition. Purchase of rifles and ammunition.

20. Any member of the 1st Class Reserve who may be discharged, dismissed, or transferred to the 2nd Class Reserve, shall hand over to his Commanding Officer all Government and corps property in his possession. Government or other property to be returned.

21. At the commencement of each year, Commanding Officers will be credited for each effective member of the 1st Class Militia Reserve with the sum of 20s. per head as effective allowance. Effective allowance.

SECTION III.—SECOND-CLASS MILITIA RESERVE.

1. Members of the 2nd Class Militia Reserve will not be liable to be called on for service except in case of national emergency, notified by proclamation in the *Government Gazette*. 2nd Class Reserve, how composed.

2. Any member of the Militia who may have been absent for a period of three months may, by order of the Commandant, be transferred to the 2nd Class Militia Reserve instead of being dismissed. Militiamen absent for three months.

3. Members of 2nd Class Militia Reserve to be under the same obligations as members of Militia to notify change of address to their Commanding Officers. Change of address to be notified.

4. A member of the 2nd Class Militia Reserve may obtain his discharge on the same conditions as members of the Militia. Discharge.

5. Members, on completion of five years in the Militia, or in the Militia and 2nd Class Militia Reserve, may be permitted by the Commandant (a) to re-engage for an equal period in the Militia and Militia Reserve not exceeding in the aggregate five years nor less than two years, (b) or may re-engage for any period not less than two years in the 2nd Class Militia Reserve, provided that their age at the termination of such period shall not exceed 45 years. Right of option to members after five years' service.

6. A member of the 2nd Class Militia Reserve removing permanently from the district in which the head-quarters of his Corps is situated may, if he desires it, and with the approval of the Commanding Officers concerned, be transferred by the Commandant to the Militia Reserve of any Corps in his new district, in order to enable him to attend drills and rifle shooting, provided there be vacancies in the Militia Reserve of such Corps. Transfers to other districts.

7. Every facility to be given to the men of the 2nd Class Militia Reserve to go through the course of Annual Musketry with their Corps. Men of the Militia Reserve to be eligible for Musketry prizes. Musketry course.

8. Free ammunition to be granted to 2nd Class Militia Reserve of each Corps, provided it is fired with the Corps. Free ammunition.

9. 2nd Class Militia Reserve, while at rifle practice or on parade of any sort with their Corps, to be in every way subject to the provisions of the Discipline Act. Members are subject to Discipline Act.

10. No pay will be issued to the 2nd Class Militia Reserve for any drills or rifle practice attended except when called out by proclamation. When pay is given.

11. Members of the 2nd Class Militia Reserve to be shown on a separate line on all returns of their Corps, and a nominal roll, giving addresses, to be sent to Head Quarters on 1st July annually. Returns to be furnished.

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- Strength of Reserve. 12. The number of men on the 2nd Class Militia Reserve of any Corps shall not exceed such a number as will raise it to its war establishment without the special sanction of the Minister.
- Purchase of rifles and ammunition. 13. Members of the 2nd Class Militia Reserve to have the same facilities for the purchase of rifles and ammunition as granted to Rifle Clubs by the new Regulations.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies; &c.; &c.; &c.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict. No. 506) it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the council of any municipality; by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public highway, and such land shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force: And whereas the Council of the City of Sandhurst has requested that the street hereinafter mentioned be so declared a public highway: Now therefore I, the Administrator, of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice declare the land acquired or used for the street hereinafter named and described, and situate in the City of Sandhurst, to be a Public Highway within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

The births of 1,478 children, viz., 744 boys and 734 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of August. In the month of July 1,581 births were registered, or 103 more than in the month under review. The births were 433 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but only 81 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in August numbered 723, viz., 394 of males and 329 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 755, or 96 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in July by 128, but exceeded the average of August during the previous ten years by 197. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have exceeded that average by only 20.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 3.38, and of deaths registered 1.65.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 68.0° on the 28th, and the lowest was 32.1° on the 3rd. The mean temperature of the month (50.1°) was about the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (27.3°) took place on the 27th, and the least (5.2°) on the 20th. The mean daily range was 14.8°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.532 inches on the 26th, and the lowest was 29.403 inches on the 8th. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.020 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 15 days, the amount of rainfall being 2.06 inches. The average rainfall in August during the previous ten years was 1.71 inches, or about one-third of an inch less than in the month under notice.

Fog occurred on 5 days during the month.

Males contributed 54 per cent., and females 46 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 36 per cent. to that mortality, as against 30 per cent. in 1888, 36 per cent. in 1887, 30 per cent. in 1886, 23 per cent. in 1885, 39 per cent. in 1884, 30 per cent. in 1883, 31 per cent. in 1882, 33 per cent. in 1881, 43 per cent. in 1880, and 36 per cent. in 1879.

Forty-four deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a builder, aged 75, died of cancer; a female, aged 75, of apoplexy; a carter, aged 75, of paralysis; a female, aged 75, of dilatation of the heart; a female, aged 75, of syncope; a labourer and a female, each aged 75, of bronchitis; an engineer, aged 75, of pneumonia; a weaver and female, aged 76 and 77 respectively, of apoplexy; a gentleman, aged 77, of hemiplegia; a female, aged 78, of uræmia; a miner, aged 79, of paralysis; a female, aged 79, of bronchitis; a female, aged 80, of embolism; a gentleman, aged 80, of heart disease; two females, each aged 80, of bronchitis; a female, aged 81, of syncope; a female, aged 81, of bronchitis; two females, aged 81

and 84 respectively, of pneumonia; a female, aged 86, of cancer; a female, aged 86, of bronchitis; a female, aged 87, of paralysis; a female, aged 87, of bronchitis; a blacksmith, aged 88, of gastric catarrh; a labourer, aged 89, of bronchitis; a soldier, aged 77, a dressmaker, aged 78, a gentleman and two females, each aged 79, a winekeeper and a shepherd, each aged 81, a shipowner, aged 82, a farmer, aged 83, a draper and a female, each aged 84, two females, each aged 86, a farmer, aged 87, a female, aged 88, and a female, said to be 100, of old age.

Thirty-eight deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 31 resulted from accident, 2 from homicide, and 5 from suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A labourer, aged 22, two females, aged 40 and 45 respectively, and a laundress, aged 51, died of injuries—the result of falls; a hawker, aged 22, and a commission agent, aged 37, were crushed in a lift; a female, aged 50, was killed whilst stepping out of a train in motion; two labourers aged 37 and 46 respectively, were passed over by railway trains; two labourers, aged 32 and 45 respectively, were killed by vehicles; a cab driver, aged 24, by being thrown from a cab; a cooper, aged 45, died of injuries received whilst on duty as a fireman; a sawyer, aged 67, of fracture of the thigh—how caused not stated; a female child, aged 4, of injuries consequent on scalds; a solicitor, aged 32, and a bookmaker, aged 54, were poisoned—the former by chloroform, properly administered, the latter by an overdose of laudanum, taken to procure sleep; a carter, aged 20, a stonemason, aged 34, a female aged 52, a carpenter, aged 55, and a contractor, aged 69, were found drowned in the River Yarra; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 60, was drowned in the Saltwater River; a male servant, aged 28, was found drowned in Hobson's Bay; and a female, aged 70, was drowned in a bath, consequent on an epileptic fit; a female infant, aged 14 days, a male infant, aged 21 days, and a male infant, aged 1 year, were overlain; two females, each aged 50, were suffocated—how caused not stated; a male infant, aged 14 hours, died of pressure on the umbilical chord. The homicidal deaths were those of a newly-born male infant, who was suffocated at birth, and a female, aged 27, whose throat was cut—a verdict of wilful murder being returned in each case. The suicidal deaths were those of a labourer, aged 27, who shot himself; a labourer, aged 25, who cut his throat; a butcher, aged 43, and a bookkeeper, aged 64, who hanged themselves; and a baker, aged 62, who suffocated himself by means of gas.

One hundred and eighteen deaths, or 16 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—55 in the Melbourne Hospital, 19 in the Alfred Hospital, 4 in the Children's Hospital, 4 in the Lying-in-Hospital, 12 in the Immigrants' Home, 14 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Austin Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 258, of which 138, or 54 per cent., were of males, and 120, or 46 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 155 were under one year of age, 52 were between one and two, 19 were between two and three, 13 were between three and four, and 19 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 465. Of these, 256, or 55 per cent., were males, and 209, or 45 per cent., were females; 22 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 16 were between fifteen and twenty, 26 were between twenty and twenty-five, 25 were between twenty-five and thirty, 25 were between thirty and thirty-five, 21 were between thirty-five and forty, 27 were between forty and forty-five, 38 were between forty-five and fifty, 34 were between fifty and fifty-five, 51 were between fifty-five and sixty, 42 were between sixty and sixty-five, 39 were between sixty-five and seventy, 36 were between seventy and seventy-five, 19 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 25 were upwards of eighty.

REGULATION No. 8.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an urban district for the purposes of *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, do hereby, pursuant to, and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by, *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, make the Regulations following:—

The Regulations made by the Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust on the 2nd day of March, 1889, and approved by the Governor in Council on the 19th day of March, 1889, is hereby repealed.

1. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the water supply district:—

(1) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Twenty pounds annual value and under, the amount which at the rate levied for the year would be payable in respect of a tenement of Twenty pounds annual value, provided that such charge shall not in any case be less than Twenty shillings per annum.

(2) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Twenty pounds annual value, the amount payable in respect of such annual value at the rate levied for the year, provided that such charge shall not in any case be less than Twenty shillings per annum.

(3) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement (except in cases of special agreement with the Trust), One shilling for every one thousand gallons.

2. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case when water is supplied by measure shall be:—

(1) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge at One shilling per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied, if supplied otherwise than by measure.

(2) If for other than domestic purposes, thirty thousand gallons per half-year.

3. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees or plants, or washing house walls or carriages, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by meter.

4. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from the premises, or who shall allow any person to carry or take away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. The service-pipes for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of consumers shall in no case exceed the following diameters:—For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch diameter; for the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch diameter; for the supply of water for other than domestic purposes, and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case.

6. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the

provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting on the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

7. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter.

8. Overflow-pipes to private baths will not be permitted.

9. Water closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

10. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering one million (1,000,000) gallons.

11. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

12. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said regulations, and not otherwise.

13. In the construction of these regulations, the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation whether aggregate or sole, and the word "Trust" shall mean the "Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust."

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1884* it was amongst other things enacted that, notwithstanding anything therein before contained, the Governor might by Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, should cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber or particular description of timber or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick or other earth from such portions of Crown lands as were named in such Proclamation, or should exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any licence granted under the authority of Part VIII. of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do hereby declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut or remove bark from wattle trees on the undermentioned Crown lands, viz.:—

1. The Crown lands comprised in the Moyston Common.
2. The Crown lands, in the parish of Jallukur, leased under the 32nd section of *The Land Act 1884*, and known as the "Londonderry Paddock."—(89.N.11079.)

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR RECREATION IN THE PARISH OF HINNO-MUNJIE.

WE, Samuel Houston Young, George Worcester, Thomas Easton, Henry Foster, and William Coughlan, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the reserve for recreation in the parish of Hinno-Mungie, having framed the following regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof; and for the preservation of good order and decency therein; and also for the collection and receipt of tolls, entrance fees, or other charges for entering therein or thereupon, submit the said regulations to the Board of Land and Works to be made by such Board, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 133 of *The Land Act 1884*:—

REGULATIONS.

1. The reserve shall be open to the public, free of charge, from sunrise to sunset, except on such days (not exceeding twelve in any one year) as the reserve may be set apart for shows, races, sports, fetes, and holiday amusements, on any of which occasions a sum not exceeding Two Shillings and Sixpence (2s. 6d.) may be charged and taken for the admission of every person to the reserve.

2. The committee of management shall be at liberty to allow any duly recognised committee of any shows, races, sports, fetes, or holiday amusements to use the reserve; and such committee shall abide by any order given by the committee of management in reference to the reserve, or buildings, or other erections for the time being thereon.

3. No person shall remain in the reserve who may offend against decency, as regards dress, language or conduct.

4. No person shall climb upon or jump over the fences or gates, or stick bills, or cut names thereon, or in any way damage the trees, seats, or any building whatsoever, or roll or throw stones in the reserve.

5. No person shall erect any dwelling in the reserve, or any booth or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article without the consent, in writing, of the committee of management first obtained.

6. No person except laborers and workmen employed in the reserve shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantation of young trees or shrubs.

7. Any person committing in the reserve or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences shall be liable to be removed from the reserve, notwithstanding such person may have purchased and shall or may be in possession of a ticket of admission to the reserve:—

1. Assaulting any person.
2. Being drunk.
3. Crossing or trespassing on the playing ground during the time any amusement is taking place or when crossing or trespassing on such ground would injuriously affect it for the several purposes for which the same is set apart.
4. Using profane or obscene language.
5. Using abusive or insulting words.
6. Behaving improperly or riotously.
7. Obtaining admission to the reserve or any buildings thereon when not entitled to such admission or refusing to surrender, if required, to any gatekeeper or other authorized person any ticket duly authorizing admission to the reserve.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with the section 133 of *The Land Act 1884*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

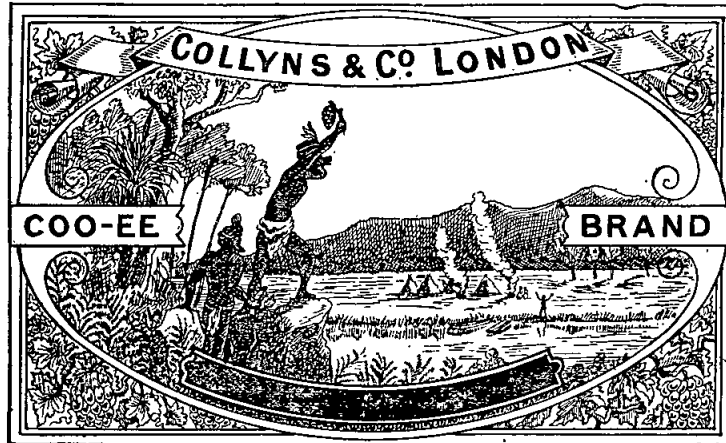

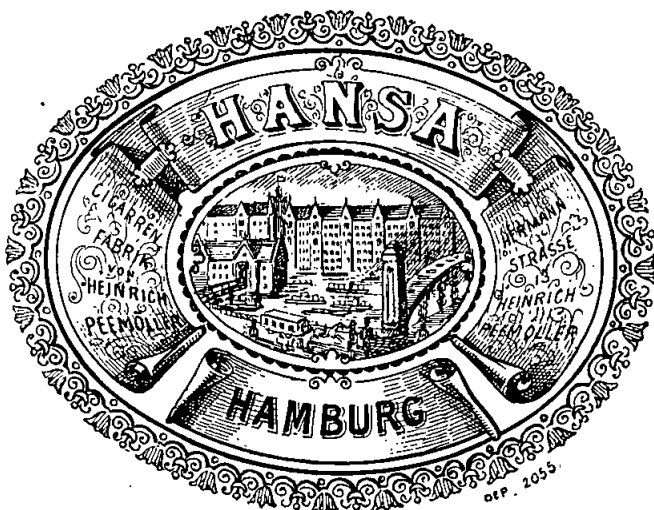

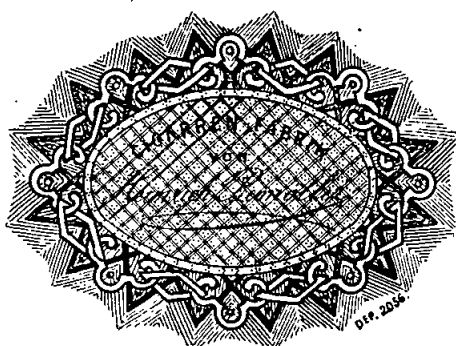
