"THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACT 1885."

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the 29th section of *The Factories and Shops Act 1885* (49 Vict. No. 862), and after due inquiry, I, the Chief Secretary of Victoria, being the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the said Act, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of the said section 29 in the

BISCUIT FACTORY OF MR. T. B. GUEST, WILLIAM STREET,

for a period of three weeks, from the 23th March instant, upon these express conditions, that is to say :—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factory any female or any male under the age of sixteen for more than fifty-four hours in any one week in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That none of such females or males shall be so employed without receiving payment for the extra work they are called upon to perform.
3. That none of such females or males shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without their consent.
4. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such factory for the information of all concerned.

"THE LICENSING AMENDMENT ACT 1888."

NOTICE TO ELECTORS WHO MAY BE ABOUT TO PETITION THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL TO CAUSE A POLL TO BE TAKEN TO DETERMINE WHETHER THE NUMBER OF VICTUALLERS' LICENSES SHALL BE INCREASED OR DECREASED.

THE attention of electors who may be about to petition the Governor in Council to cause a poll to be taken to determine whether the number of victuallers' licenses in any licensing district shall be increased or decreased is hereby specially directed to the provisions of sections 5 and 17 of *The Licensing Amendment Act 1888*, passed on the 22nd December 1888.

Section 5 directs the manner in which electors shall affix their signatures to petitions.

Section 17 prescribes the penalties to be inflicted for—

- (a) Wilfully signing when not an elector;
- (b) Voting or attempting to vote more than once at the same poll;
- (c) Departing or attempting to depart from the polling-booth after having received a ballot-paper without having deposited the same in the ballot-box;
- (d) Personation.

The full text of sections 5 and 17 is as under :—

5. *Form of signature of petition.*—Any person signing the petition to the Governor in Council under section twenty-two of the Principal Act shall affix to his name his number and qualification as set out in the electoral roll for the electoral division in respect of which he claims the right to petition as aforesaid, and such petition shall also name a person whom the petitioners desire to be their scrutineer under the provisions hereinafter contained. A notification by the Minister in the *Government Gazette* that such petition has been signed by one-fifth of the number of persons qualified to petition of the acceptance of the petition and of the name of the scrutineer named in such petition shall be conclusive evidence in all Courts that such petition has been signed by one-fifth of the persons qualified to petition and that such scrutineer has been duly appointed.

17. *Penalties.*—If any person not being on the roll of electors for the electoral division forming any licensing district wilfully sign any petition under section twenty-two of the Principal Act, or if any person vote or offer to vote more than once at the same poll, or depart or attempt to depart from any polling-booth after having received a ballot-paper without having deposited the same in the ballot-box, or personate any other person for the purpose of voting at such poll, he shall on conviction before any two justices be imprisoned with or without hard labor for any period not exceeding six months.

REGULATIONS UNDER "THE EDUCATION ACT 1872" AMENDED.

WHEREAS by the 18th section of *The Education Act 1872* it was enacted that the Governor in Council might from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned: Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that section III. of the Regulations under *The Education Act 1872* be amended by the addition thereto of the following clause, that is to say:—

7. In order to prevent, during the year 1889, any loss of income to teachers consequent on the change of method of examination for results on the class programme instead of on the class below, ten (10) shall be added to the percentage gained; but in no case shall the percentage exceed one hundred.

Exhibition of Flashing Light on Eddystone Point, East Coast, Tasmania.

With reference to the Preliminary Notice issued by this Board, dated 7th March 1888, and to the Notice No. 13, issued 7th January 1889, it is hereby notified that on and after the 1st day of May 1889, from sunset to sunrise, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse which has been erected on Eddystone Point, the position and characteristics of which are as follows:—

The Eddystone Lighthouse is situated in latitude 40° 59' 40" S., longitude 148° 20' 50" E. (approximate).

The light will be 142 feet above the mean sea-level, and the bright part of it will be visible in clear weather, at the height of 10 feet, 17½ miles.

It is a First Order Dioptric Flashing Light, showing every half-minute bright triple flashes from N. 22° W. (which will clear the rocks off St. Helen's Point 1 mile) round easterly to S. 3° W., which will clear the Salamander Rock 1 mile, and red sectors will show from S. 3° W. to S. 48° E. (covering that Salamander Rock, Eucalyptus Rock, and other dangers in the vicinity) and from N. 22° W. round S. to N. 14° E.

A red subsidiary light, placed 60 feet to the eastward of the tower, will also be exhibited at the same time, with a radius of 2½ miles at a height of 15 feet above the mean sea-level. This will clear the Victoria Rocks 1½ miles.

SOUTH CHANNEL, PORT PHILLIP BAY.

PILOTS, masters of vessels, and others are hereby informed that, on or about the 1st day of April 1889, dredging operations will be commenced in the South Channel, beginning at a point fifteen hundred (1,500) feet easterly from the Pile Light, and extending from such point westerly three thousand six hundred (3,600) feet.

During the progress of deepening the channel, and until further notice, three pile buoys will be moored in line to mark the south side of the proposed new cutting, and the dredge will be moored so as to leave during night or day a clear channel passage two hundred (200) feet wide to the northward of the dredge.

From sunset to sunrise the dredge will exhibit three lights forward and three lights aft from globular lanterns, each not less than ten (10) inches diameter, such lanterns will be placed in a vertical line one above the other not less than six feet apart, the lowest lights being twenty feet above the level of the sea. The highest and lowest of these lights shall be white, and the middle lights shall be red.

Caution.

Mariners and others, when navigating the South Channel in the vicinity of the dredge, are warned to use the channel passage northward of the dredge, and to proceed quite slow when passing.

The births of 1,323 children, viz., 693 boys and 630 girls, were registered in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of February. In the month of January 1,386 births were registered, or 63 more than in the month under review. The births were 535 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but 311 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in February numbered 940, viz., 496 of males and 444 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 383, or 41 per cent. The deaths were less than those in January by 271, and exceeded the average of February during the previous ten years by 363. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to exceed that average by 200.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 3.15, and of deaths registered 2.24.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 96.0° on the 13th, and the lowest was 45.5° on the 20th. The mean temperature of the month (65.9°) was a fraction above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (39.2°) took place on the 21st, viz., from a maximum of 94.3° to a minimum of 55.1°. The least range (6.8°) was on the 5th, viz., from a maximum of 68.9° to a minimum of 62.1°. The mean daily range was 19.6°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.237 inches on the 28th, and the lowest was 29.570 inches on the 3rd. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.887 inches) was very slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 7 days, the amount of rainfall being 1.50 inches. The average rainfall in February during the previous ten years was 1.43 inches, or slightly below that in the month under notice.

Males contributed 53 per cent., and females 47 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 52 per cent. to that mortality, as against 47 per cent. in 1888, 52 per cent. in 1887, 48 per cent. in 1886, 48 per cent. in 1885, 40 per cent. in 1884, 42 per cent. in 1883, 46 per cent. in 1882, 45 per cent. in 1881, 52 per cent. in 1880, and 45 per cent. in 1879.

Thirty-four deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a gentleman, aged 79, a fallow chandler, aged 85, a goldsmith, aged 86, of diarrhoea; a female, aged 78, of dysentery; a female, aged 82, of rheumatic gout; two females, aged 83 and 87 respectively, of cancer; a baker, aged 78, of hæmatemesis; a laborer, aged 76, of apoplexy; a female, aged 75, an undertaker, aged 77, a male of unknown occupation, aged 83, and a laborer, aged 88, of heart disease; a laborer, aged 78, of bronchitis; a laborer, aged 75, and a female, aged 78, of disease of the lungs; a miner, aged 79, of disease of the

liver; two females, aged 77 and 78 respectively, of chronic nephritis; a female, aged 75, of injury to the head caused by a fall; 2 fisherman, aged 77, a grocer and a male of occupation unknown, each aged 79, a gardener, aged 80, a charwoman, aged 81; a farmer and a female, each aged 82, a laborer and a female, each aged 83, a female, aged 84, a laborer and a female, each aged 85, a female, aged 87, and a female, aged 94, of old age.

Thirty deaths were ascribed to external causes during the month, of which 22 were set down to accident, and 8 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A wool-classer, aged 40, died of fracture of the skull, caused by a wall falling on him; a female, aged 57, of injuries received in a carriage accident; a house painter, aged 20, a laborer, aged 33, a male cook, aged 49, a clerk, aged 60, and two females, aged 73 and 75 respectively, of injuries consequent on falls; a seaman, aged 32, of fracture of the skull, caused by being struck by a lever; and a boy, aged 4, of inflammation of the brain, the result of a kick from a horse. A boy, aged 3, and three females, aged 16, 28, and 44 respectively, were burnt to death; a female infant, aged 1, a boy, aged 7, two laborers, aged 16 and 23 respectively, a gardener, aged 40, and a laborer, aged 60, were found drowned; a seaman, aged 28, was drowned in the River Yarra, owing to the sinking of a punt. A male infant, aged 5 hours, died of asphyxia, from pressure during protracted labor; a female infant, aged 14 days, of hemorrhage from the umbilical cord. The suicides were those of a dentist, aged 67, who shot himself; a compositor, aged 27, a laborer, aged 55, and a gardener, aged 60, who poisoned themselves—the first with prussic acid, the last two with strychnine; a laborer, aged 31, and a gardener, aged 44, who drowned themselves in the River Yarra; and a female, aged 42, who hanged herself.

One hundred and forty-nine deaths, or 16 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.—58 in the Melbourne Hospital, 29 in the Alfred Hospital, 5 in the Homeopathic Hospital, 6 in the Children's Hospital, 3 in the Lying-in Hospital, 16 in the Immigrants' Home, 12 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Austin Hospital, 6 in the Melbourne Gaol, and 2 in the Protestant Refuge.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 485, of which 264, or 54 per cent., were of males, and 221, or 46 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 364 were under one year of age, 87 were between one and two, 16 were between two and three, 12 were between three and four, and 6 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 455. Of these, 232, or 51 per cent., were males, and 223, or 49 per cent., were females; 21 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 27 were between fifteen and twenty, 39 were between twenty and twenty-five, 43 were between twenty-five and thirty, 36 were between thirty and thirty-five, 23 were between thirty-five and forty, 32 were between forty and forty-five, 39 were between forty-five and fifty, 33 were between fifty and fifty-five, 42 were between fifty-five and sixty, 32 were between sixty and sixty-five, 26 were between sixty-five and seventy, 19 were between seventy and seventy-five, 16 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 18 were upwards of eighty.

Under the heading of miasmatic diseases, the returns show a falling off, as compared with January's experience, of 2 in deaths from diphtheria, of 7 in deaths from typhoid fever, and of 81 in deaths from diarrhoeal diseases (simple cholera, diarrhoea, and dysentery). Deaths—chiefly of infants and young children—from debility, atrophy, and inanition also fell from 182 to 118, and deaths from cancer from 28 to 21; but deaths from phthisis increased from 72 to 76. Deaths of women in childbed numbered 6 in January and 5 in February, the proportion being 1 to every 231 births in the former, and 1 to every 265 births in the latter month.

In the above table, the population estimate has been brought on to the end of the year, the mean of the year being also shown. Neither of these estimates are strictly comparable with the statements of population given in previous years, which were made up for varying periods in the different municipal districts. The figures comparable with those of 1887 are 430,970, the increase of population in Greater Melbourne during the twelve months upon this basis being 39,424.

The excess of births over deaths in Greater Melbourne, as a whole, is set down as 7,039, which figures furnish a proportion of only 82 per cent. If, however, the births and deaths occurring in hospitals and asylums be excluded, the excess of the former over the latter would be 8,188 or 116 per cent.

In 184 instances twins, and in three instances triplets, were born in Greater Melbourne during the year under notice. As the births in the same period numbered in all 15,645, the confinements must have numbered 15,455. Thus one mother in 84 gave birth to twins, and one mother in 5,151 brought forth three children at a birth.

The births set down as illegitimate during 1888 numbered 1,065, or 45 more than in 1887. About a third of these took place in the Women's Hospital or in buildings affiliated thereto. The proportion of illegitimate births to the whole number of births registered was 1 in 14 in 1887, and 1 in 15 in 1888.

Subjoined are the birth and death rates in each sub-district in 1888. Births and deaths in hospitals, asylums, &c., are excluded, and the sub-districts are arranged in order, the sub-district with the highest birth or death rate being placed first and the rest in succession:—

In calculating the rates for the above table, the births occurring in hospitals, asylums, &c., have been excluded, as already stated. If these should be included, the proportion per 1,000 of the mean population of Greater Melbourne would be—births, 37.30; deaths, 20.52.

According to the table, the birth-rate is lower in Melbourne City than in any other sub-district, and the death-rate in that city also much below the average.

In view of its elevated and apparently healthy position, the high death-rate in Northcote will, no doubt, excite surprise; as will also the low birth-rate in St. Kilda, a town in which the preponderance of females over males was found at the last census to be greater than in any other part of Victoria.

In consequence of the excessive mortality which attends the period of infancy, high death-rates are usually concurrent with high birth-rates. This, however, it will be noticed, is not always the case, Flemington and Kensington standing very high in the birth-rate column, but low in the column for death rates.

In Greater Melbourne, taken as a whole, the average number of persons to the acre at the end of 1888 was two and two-thirds (2.66), but the density of the population varies considerably in the different sub-districts, ranging from nearly 38 persons to the acre in North Melbourne Town, to less than 2 persons to the acre in Kew Borough, and about 1 person to every 4 acres in the portion of the district situated in shires. The following table shows the area of, and density of the population living in, each sub-district:—

It should be remarked that, in some of the sub-districts extensive parks, gardens, and other public reserves exist, so that the population is really living in closer proximity than the figures indicate. Melbourne City contains 1,739 acres of such reserves; Kew, Kensington, 307 acres; St. Kilda, 230 acres; Richmond, 195 acres; Brighton, 166 acres; Port Melbourne, 80 acres; Essendon, 54 acres; Fitzroy, 49 acres; and smaller areas in the other municipalities.

On the old basis, the population for 1888 would have been 430,970. The births in Greater Melbourne were more numerous in 1888 than in any previous year, as also was their proportion to the total population; the latter, however, being closely approached in 1887.

The deaths in Greater Melbourne were likewise more numerous than in any previous year, but their proportion to the total population was exceeded in 1887, 1884 (slightly), 1882, and in the four years ended with 1877.

The proportion by which the births exceeded the deaths was higher in 1888 than in any year since 1872. All the figures in this table relating to births and deaths include those which occurred in hospitals, asylums, &c., which accommodate large numbers of persons coming from country districts. Should these be eliminated, the number of births would be somewhat less and that of deaths would be considerably less, whilst the excess of births over deaths would be very much higher.

The mean temperature in 1888 was exceeded in six of the previous seventeen years, and was a small fraction above the average; the mean atmospheric pressure in 1888 was exceeded in only one of those years, and was also a fraction above the average. The rainfall in 1888 was much less than in any of the preceding years named, except 1879, and was nearly 5½ inches below the average.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at the Melbourne Observatory during the year 1888 was 104°, on the 15th January; and the lowest was 28.3°, on the 27th July. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (47.5°) took place on the 19th February, viz., from a maximum of 92.9° to a minimum of 45.4°. The least range (4.2°) was on the 4th March, viz., from a maximum of 59.2° to a minimum of 55.0°. The mean daily range was 18.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.5 inches, on the 27th June; and the lowest was 29.3 inches, on the 13th July. Rain fell on 123 days, the amount of rainfall being 19.42 inches, as stated in the table.

Of the births registered in Greater Melbourne during 1888, 51 per cent. were of males, and 49 per cent. were of females. Of the deaths during the year, 55 per cent. were of males, and 45 per cent. were of females. Children under the age of 5 years contributed 42 per cent. to the total mortality, as against 42 per cent. in 1887, 41 per cent. in 1886, 38 per cent. in 1885, 41 per cent. in 1884, 36 per cent. in 1883, 40 per cent. in 1882, 38 per cent. in 1881, 40 per cent. in 1880 and 1879, and 37 per cent. in 1878.

The deaths of 2,687 infants under 1 year of age occurred in Greater Melbourne during 1888, the proportion being 17.17 to every 100 births. The corresponding proportion in 1887 was 17.51; in 1886, 17.34; and in 1885, 16.92. In the 15 years ended with 1887, the mean proportion to every 100 infants born of those who died before completing their first year of life was 17.07.

The deaths of 386 persons, viz., 202 males and 184 females, of the age of 75 years or upwards, occurred during 1888, or 26 less than in the previous year. Of these, 165 were between 75 and 80, 128 between 80 and 85, 66 between 85 and 90, 17 between 90 and 95, 6 between 95 and 100, and 4 were over 100, the ages returned being 100, 100, 101, and 104. Before the fifth and after the twenty-fifth year of age, deaths of males were more numerous than those of females; between the ages of 5 and 15, deaths of the two sexes were about equal, but between the ages of 15 and 25, deaths of females were the more numerous. A considerable increase in 1888, as compared with previous years, will be observed in the mortality from diphtheria and croup, the number of deaths from these complaints in that year having been much greater than in any of the previous 17 years. The deaths from typhoid fever were fewer by 12 than in 1887, but more numerous than in any other year. The figures in the table indicate a decrease in deaths from diarrhoeal diseases (simple cholera, diarrhoea, and dysentery) in 1888, as compared with the experience of the previous two years; but the large increase in deaths set down to diseases of the digestive system creates a suspicion that this apparent increase may be due to the inadequate definition of the causes of death in some medical certificates, as many as 406 deaths having been returned as caused by "diseases of the stomach," which, in the absence of further information, are necessarily classed as diseases of the digestive system. Taking deaths from diarrhoeal diseases and from diseases of the digestive system together, an increase is shown for 1888, the numbers being 1,610 in that year, as against 1,547 in 1887, and 1,345 in 1886. A marked increase is observable in the mortality from phthisis in the last two years, also in that from bronchitis and laryngitis, but the mortality from cancer in 1888 shows a slight falling off. An increase has taken place in the number of deaths of child-bearing women in the last two years, but as the number of births has also increased the proportion is not above the average.

During the five years ended with 1888, 1,364 deaths were set down to typhoid fever, and 2,749 to diarrhoeal diseases. The following figures show that both these complaints are much more fatal in the summer than in the winter months, there being comparatively few deaths from typhoid fever in July, August, September, October, and November, and from diarrhoeal diseases in June, July, August, September and October.

It will be noticed that the birth-rate was higher in Melbourne than in Hobart, Wellington, or Perth, but lower than in the other three capital cities; also that in Melbourne the death-rate was higher, and the excess of births over deaths was lower than in any of those cities except Hobart.

It should be mentioned that the death-rate of Melbourne is much swelled by the large number of country residents who are admitted to and die in the Metropolitan hospitals. In the Wellington returns, and probably in those of some of the other capital cities, it is the custom to eliminate such entries, and it is probable that in Melbourne, such deaths bear a higher proportion to the total number of deaths recorded than they do in any of the other cities named.

KYNETON SHIRE WATERWORKS TRUST.—REGULATION.

THE Administrator of the Government in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulation, made by the Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust under the provisions of *The Water Conservation Act 1887*.

REGULATION No. 8.

THE Chairman and Commissioners of the Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust, the waterworks district of which has been proclaimed an urban district for the purposes of *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by *The Water Conservation Act 1887*, make the Regulations following:—

The Regulation made by the Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust on the 11th day of October 1884, and approved by the Governor in Council on the 27th day of October 1884, is hereby repealed.

1. The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the water supply district:—

(1.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Twenty pounds annual value and under, the amount which at the rate levied for the year would be payable in respect of a tenement of Twenty pounds annual value.

(2.) For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Twenty pounds annual value, the amount payable in respect of such annual value at the rate levied for the year.

(3.) For every water-trough supplied with water from the works of the Trust, the sum of Twenty shillings per annum.

(4.) For every steam boiler supplied with water from the works of the Trust, Fifteen shillings per annum for each horse-power of such steam boiler.

(5.) For water supplied by the Trust by measurement (except in cases of special agreement with the Trust), One shilling and sixpence for every one thousand gallons.

2. The minimum quantity of water to be charged for in each case when water is supplied by measure shall be:—

(1.) If for domestic and other than domestic purposes, the quantity for which the charge at One shilling and sixpence per thousand gallons would be equal to the amount of the assessed rate which would be payable for the premises so supplied, if supplied otherwise than by measure.

(2.) If for other than domestic purposes only, thirty thousand gallons per half-year.

3. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground, or trees or plants, or washing house walls or carriages, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by meter.

4. Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to carry or take away such water, or shall sell the same to any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust who shall take or carry away water from any drinking tap, trough, or private or public service-pipe, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. No person shall lay any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the Trust without giving two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipes of the Trust, nor shall make such communication except under the superintendence and according to the directions of a duly authorized officer of the Trust appointed for the purpose; and any person committing a breach of this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

7. The service-pipes for conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of consumers shall in no case exceed the following diameters:—For the domestic supply of premises not exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch diameter; for the domestic supply of premises exceeding Twenty pounds annual value, $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch diameter; for the supply of water for other than domestic purposes, and for all supplies by meter, such diameter as the Trust shall authorize in each case.

8. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of any lands or tenements who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, or who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying of a service-pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land or tenement abutting upon the street or road in which are the pipes of the Trust.

9. If any person shall waste water of the Trust, by neglecting to repair any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person, after having received notice from any officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises, either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise as to the Trust may seem fit, until the necessary repairs shall have been effected.

10. No person supplied with water by the Trust shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, and any person committing a breach of this Regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every such breach.

11. No person shall connect any service-pipe or branch service-pipe with any steam boiler for the purpose of feeding or supplying the same with water, without first affixing a self-acting valve for preventing the pressure of the steam reversing or affecting the dial of the meter.

12. Overflow pipes to private baths will not be permitted.
13. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

14. No meter shall be affixed unless the dial of the same is capable of registering one million (1,000,000) gallons.

15. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does, or causes or permits to be done, anything in contravention of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any lawful charge imposed by the Trust when due, or fails to do anything which under any of these Regulations ought to be done, or wilfully or negligently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied.

16. The water supplied in the waterworks district of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with these Regulations, and not otherwise, through pipes and meters laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said Regulations, and not otherwise.

17. In the construction of these Regulations the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation whether aggregate or sole, and the word "Trust" shall mean the "Kyneton Shire Waterworks Trust."

Part I, Section VIII.—Dress Regulations.

To paragraph 4 (Badges on Pouches) add—
The Submarine Mining Company, Victorian Engineers, will wear a special badge.

To paragraph 40 (Musketry badges) add—
To every Sergeant of the best shooting Company in the Infantry Militia—

A badge of crossed rifles and Crown worked in gold, to be worn on the right forearm.

To paragraph 42 (Badges for Certified Signallers) add—
For Army Signalling Certificates, a gold embroidered crown will be added above the flags.

Part IV.—Mounted Rifles.

SECTION I.—CONSTITUTION AND ESTABLISHMENT.

Strike out paragraph 1, and substitute thereof—

Detachments of Mounted Rifles may, on the recommendation of the Commandant, be established in any locality where not less than 16 members elect to engage. Any detachment falling below 8 effective members will be liable to be disbanded.

ROAD PROCLAIMED UNDER "THE LAND ACT 1884."

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1884* (No. 812, sec. 73) it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor might from time to time, by a notice in the *Government Gazette*, proclaim as a street or road or as a township any portion or portions of Crown lands, and the lands in such township, or within any city, town, or borough proclaimed before the passing of the said Act should be sold by auction in the manner therein provided for the sale of Crown lands by public auction, and the lands upon which such street or road should have been proclaimed should be and be deemed to be thenceforward dedicated to the public: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice proclaim as a road the portion of Crown lands hereinafter described, that is to say:—

The security is calculated at Ten per cent. on contracts under £1,000, and Five per cent. over that sum; and the preliminary deposit at Ten per cent. of the security; but no deviation will be allowed from the amounts above specified.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c.

2. Supplies for country stations for which no local contract may have been taken, or for which the contract has been terminated, may be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

3. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter cases, hogsheads, butter firkins, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed at the contractor's expense.

4. Bread.—A sample of the best ordinarily retailed to the public will be considered as a test loaf for first quality. Third quality (that issued to prisoners of the Crown) to be made of flour, fine sharps, the produce of prime, strong, thin-skinned, good colored wheat, to be perfectly free from coarse pollard or other offal.

5. Milk.—The milk must be fresh, pure, and of the best quality, and subject to test when required by the department. Should the supply prove to be not of contract quality, any expense incurred will be charged to the contractor.

6. Fresh meat is to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately, also buttocks only when ordered. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than ten inches, must have been cut off. The sticking pieces must be removed from the fore quarters of beef.

7. Potatoes to be dry and free from dirt. Contractors to supply 105 lbs. of potatoes for each cental credited to them, and, in addition, to take back all rejected before being cooked.

8. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned.

9. The order issued by the head of department must accompany the goods, and the account is to be rendered simultaneously with the delivery of the supplies. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

10. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account.

11. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the head of the department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 10.

12. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

13. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will also be competent for two or more of the official visitors, in conjunction with the medical superintendent, to reject any supplies that they may consider not in accordance with contract; and in such cases the reference to a board of survey will not be deemed to be necessary on the part of the contractor.

14. In the case of supplies for lunatic asylums, it will be competent for a board of survey, consisting of the medical superintendent (or, in his absence, of the deputy medical superintendent) and any two officers named by him, to examine and reject any supplies that may be objected to. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Treasurer of the colony for the time being; but, pending such appeal, he must take back the rejected articles and at once supply others of approved quality; failing which, the supplies required may be obtained by the officer concerned, and the expense charged to the contractor.

15. As the exact quantity of any article of provisions which may be required cannot be stated, the estimate being approximate only, the Government will not be bound by the quantity stated in the schedule, but will be at liberty to order more or less, according to circumstances, and the contractor will be bound to supply the same as ordered.

16. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board to survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 10.

17. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivery or replacing them when required, or refusal to execute orders, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the said Treasurer may direct. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any part of the security.

18. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carriers to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 17 of these conditions.

19. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest, or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government.

20. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board to terminate the contract, without notice, should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

21. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Imperial Commissariat or Defence Department, or on account of other Governments, or for rabbit extirpation, or for supplies to the aborigines; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment; or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment.

22. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and in addition the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

23. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government will neither claim any decrease upon the contract price nor entertain any application from a contractor for any increase to it.

A Bye-law of the Shire of Malvern, made under section 213 of The Local Government Act 1874, and numbered 25, for "Regulating traffic and generally maintaining the good rule and government of the Municipality."

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1874*, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Malvern order as follows:—

1. All persons standing or loitering upon any of the carriage-ways, footways, or other public places of the shire shall discontinue to do so on requirement by any member of the police force.

2. All persons walking along the footways shall, in passing each other, keep on their respective right-hand side of the footway.

3. The driver of any vehicle shall give way, if he conveniently can, to any other vehicle during the taking up or setting down of any person into or from such other vehicle.

4. The driver of any hackney carriage or omnibus shall not stop the same for the purpose of taking up or setting down any passenger at any part of the street, except as near as may be to the left or near side thereof.

5. No driver of an omnibus or hackney carriage shall drive the same so as to immediately and closely precede or follow and intentionally conform to the progress of any other omnibus or hackney carriage in competition against or to the annoyance of any other person.

6. The driver of any vehicle, of whatsoever kind it may be, and whether private or public, before stopping the same in any carriage-way for any purpose shall give notice of his intention so to do, if riding upon such vehicle, by holding up his whip or his hand so that the same may be seen by the driver of any other vehicle in rear of his, and upon stopping he shall so place his vehicle as to cause as little obstruction as possible to the traffic; and if the stoppage prevent the passing of any other vehicle, or interrupt or delay traffic, he shall, upon being so required by the driver of such other vehicle, or by any member of the police force, remove his vehicle so as to permit such other vehicle to pass, or so as to discontinue such interruption or delay.

7. Between the hours of eight o'clock in the morning and six o'clock in the evening of any day no person shall cause interruption or annoyance to passengers along the public roadways or footways by raising or discharging dust upon or across any such roadway or footway, whether from buildings in process of demolition or otherwise.
