NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Exhibition of a Fixed Light on Mersey Bluff, North-West Coast, Tasmania.

With reference to the preliminary notice issued by this Board, dated 12th October 1888, it is hereby notified that on and after the 2nd day of September 1889, from sunset to sunrise, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse which has been erected on Mersey Bluff, the characteristics of which are as follows:—

The lighthouse is situated in latitude 41° 9' 40" south, longitude 146° 22' 20" east (approximate).

The light will be 71 feet above the sea-level, and will be visible, at the height of 10 feet, 13 miles in clear weather.

The light will be fourth order dioptric, and will show seaward, bright, over an unbroken arc of 117°, and a red ray will be exhibited at either extremity of the bright arc. This will warn mariners when they are within one mile of the outer extreme of the Horseshoe Reef to the eastward, and the outer extreme of Rocky Reef, off Don Bluff, to the westward.

SUNKEN WRECK OFF POINT GELLIBRAND, PORT PHILLIP BAY.
MARINERS and others are hereby informed that the ship *Cape Verde* has sunk off Point Gellibrand, Port Phillip Bay, in 32 feet water, the Gellibrand Lightship bearing W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. distant about six (6) cables. Until further notice the wreck will be marked between sunset and sunrise by the exhibition of three red lights in globular lanterns, in a vertical line one over the other, not less than three feet apart, placed on or in front of the foremast, and elevated not less than 20 feet above the level of the sea, and between sunrise and sunset by three black balls, not less than two feet in diameter, placed in position and line as described for lanterns.

Caution.

Notice has been given for the removal of the wreck, and in the meantime mariners navigating Port Phillip Bay are warned to look out for floating wreckage, and are also requested to report the discovery of the same to this office.

The births of 1,513 children, viz., 815 boys and 698 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of May. In the month of April 1,344 births were registered, or 169 less than in the month under review. The births were 538 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but only 210 above that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in May numbered 854, viz., 447 of males and 407 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 659, or 79 per cent. The deaths were fewer than those in May by 128, but above the average of May during the previous ten years by 323. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to exceed that average by 144 only.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 3.45, and of deaths registered 1.95.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 76.1° on the 1st, and the lowest was 39.4° on the 8th. The mean temperature of the month (55.6°) was slightly above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (28.6°) took place on the 8th. The least range (4.7°) was on the 15th. The mean daily range was 13.2°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.540 inches on the 17th, and the lowest was 29.547 inches on the 9th. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.682 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on 11 days, the amount of rainfall being 0.94 inches. The average rainfall in May during the previous ten years was 2.11 inches, or 1.17 inches more than in the month under notice.

Fog occurred on 4 days during the month.

Males contributed 52 per cent., and females 48 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 33 per cent. to that mortality, as against 37 per cent. in 1888, 32 per cent. in 1887, 32 per cent. in 1886, 33 per cent. in 1885, 36 per cent. in 1884, 34 per cent. in 1883, 30 per cent. in 1882, 31 per cent. in 1881 and 1880, and 39 per cent. in 1879.

Fifty-two deaths of persons who had attained or exceeded the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, an engineer, aged 75, died of dysentery; a gentleman, aged 75, was run over by a tram; two females, each aged 75, died of apoplexy; a merchant aged 76, of obstruction of the bowels; a gentleman, aged 77, of heart disease; a bootmaker, aged 77, of bronchitis; a female, aged 78, of diarrhoea; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 78, of valvular disease of the heart; a gentleman, aged 78, of syncope; two gentlemen and a female, each aged 78, of heart disease; a male of occupation unknown, aged 78, of chronic bronchitis; a waterman, aged 78, of cystitis; a female, aged 79, of heart disease; a dressmaker, aged 79, of bronchitis; a laborer, aged 79, of Bright's disease; a female, aged 80, of apoplexy; a collector, aged 81, of heart disease; a gentleman, aged 81, of paralysis; a female, aged 82, of bronchitis; a baker, aged 83, of bronchitis; a female, aged 83, of insanity and pneumonia; a female, aged 84, of heart

disease: a female, aged 82, of injuries received through slipping on a piece of orange peel; a farmer, aged 88, of hernia; a female, aged 91, of cancer; a nurse, aged 75, a cabinetmaker and a female each aged 78, a splitter, two gentlemen, and a female each aged 79, a female, aged 80, a gardener, a gentleman, and a female, each aged 81, a servant, aged 82, a female, aged 83, a laborer, aged 84, two females, each aged 85, a carpenter and a female each aged 86, two laborers and a gentleman each aged 89, a farmer, aged 90, a male of occupation unknown, aged 95, and a female, aged 97, of old age.

Thirty-eight deaths were set down to external causes during the month, of which 26 resulted from accident, 3 from homicide, and 9 from suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A female, aged 82, died of fracture of the thigh, the result of stepping on a piece of orange peel; two laborers, aged 28 and 32 respectively; a railway guard, aged 28, and a gentleman, aged 75, were killed by trains which passed over them; a laborer, aged 34, was killed through getting out of a train whilst in motion; a cabman, aged 32, died of injuries received through coming into collision with a tramcar; a gardener, aged 48, and a ship's cook, aged 58, were passed over by trains; a hawker, aged 65, was run over by a cab; a jockey, aged 17, died of injuries, consequent on being thrown from a horse whilst riding a race; an engineer, aged 27, a laborer, aged 54, and a quarryman, aged 59, of injuries caused by falls; a laborer, aged 37, of compound fracture of the thigh, resulting from his being struck by a broken chain; a fireman, aged 38, of injury to the side, and a carter, aged 17, of fracture of the skull, how caused not being stated in either case. A station hand, aged 18, died of a gunshot wound self-inflicted; three females, aged 12, 16, and 69 respectively, of injuries consequent on burns. A boilermaker, aged 28, an accountant, aged 30, and a male of occupation unknown, aged 65, were drowned; an infant, aged 8 months, was overlain; and a shipwright, aged 50, was suffocated by food. The homicidal deaths were those of a boy, aged 8, who died of injuries received by a stone thrown at him; a laborer, aged 25, who was run over by a cab; and a female, aged 44, who died of hemorrhage, the result of a gunshot wound inflicted by her husband—a verdict of manslaughter being returned in the first two cases, and of murder in the last. The suicidal deaths were those of a seaman and a commission agent, each aged 37, and of a plasterer, aged 41, who shot themselves; a gentleman, aged 32, and a messenger, aged 60, who cut their throats; a female, aged 68, who poisoned herself with phosphorus; a gardener, aged 58, who drowned himself; a laborer, aged 23, and a gold miner, aged 50, who hanged themselves.

One hundred and fifty-six deaths, or 18 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—58 in the Melbourne Hospital, 33 in the Alfred Hospital, 14 in the Homœopathic Hospital, 8 in the Children's Hospital, 4 in the Lying-in-Hospital, 13 in the Immigrants' Home, 9 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 5 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 5 in the Austin Hospital, and 4 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 279, of which 144, or 51 per cent., were of males, and 135, or 49 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 161 were under one year of age, 59 were between one and two, 26 were between two and three, 17 were between three and four, and 16 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 573. Of these, 303, or 53 per cent., were males, and 272, or 47 per cent., were females; 34 were between five and ten, 25 were between ten and fifteen, 25 were between fifteen and twenty, 51 were between twenty and twenty-five, 57 were between twenty-five and thirty, 40 were between thirty and thirty-five, 36 were between thirty-five and forty, 32 were between forty and forty-five, 35 were between forty-five and fifty, 48 were between fifty and fifty-five, 32 were between fifty-five and sixty, 46 were between sixty and sixty-five, 35 were between sixty-five and seventy, 27 were between seventy and seventy-five, 25 were between seventy-five and eighty, and 27 were upwards of eighty.

REGULATIONS FOR TAKING A POLL OF ELECTORS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 24 OF "THE LICENSING ACT 1885" (49 VICT. No. 857), AS AMENDED BY SECTION 7 OF "THE LICENSING AMENDMENT ACT 1888" (52 VICT. No. 1007), REGARDING VICTUALLERS' LICENSES.

WHEREAS by section 24 of "The Licensing Act 1885," as amended by section 7 of "The Licensing Amendment Act 1888," the Governor in Council is authorized to make Regulations prescribing the mode in which a poll is to be taken; to determine whether or not the number of victuallers' licences in any licensing district from which a petition under the provisions of the said Acts shall have been presented to him shall be decreased to any number below the number then existing, but not below the statutory number, or to determine whether or not the number of such victuallers' licences in such licensing district shall be increased to any number above the number then existing, but not above the statutory number, and the form in which the ballot-papers shall be framed, and defining the powers and duties of the returning officer and his deputies, and generally for all matters whatsoever relating to the taking of the poll. Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Acts, doth for the purposes aforesaid, make the Regulations following, namely:—

1. Any particular member of the licensing court for any licensing district, on receipt of a notification that the Governor in Council has ordered him to take a poll in such district, and to preside at such poll as returning officer, shall forthwith endorse on such notification the date of such receipt, and shall, by advertisement in some newspaper published in the district, or, if no newspaper be so published, then in a Melbourne daily newspaper, give notice of the day fixed for the taking of the poll, and of the names of the several polling-places in the district, and of the purpose for which the poll is so ordered by the Governor in Council.

On receipt of notification returning officer to advertise.

2. The polling-places for a licensing district for the purpose of taking a poll under "The Licensing Act 1885" as amended by "The Licensing Amendment Act 1888" shall be the polling-places existing for the time being for the electoral division forming such licensing district. In these Regulations "electoral division" means division of an electoral district.

Polling-places.

3. The returning officer shall obtain as polling-booths the use of suitable rooms or buildings by hiring or otherwise, or, if he deem it necessary, may cause to be erected booths for the purpose of taking the said poll. And in determining whether one, two, or more booths shall be provided at one polling-place, he shall be guided by the practice adopted in the particular polling-place to secure sufficient accommodation for voters at elections of Members of Parliament; and if under this Regulation there shall be more than one booth at any polling-place, there shall be affixed over the entrance of each booth in succession so many letters of the alphabet, in their alphabetical order, as shall denote the booth at which each voter, according to the initial letter of his surname, is to vote; and no voter shall vote in any booth save that which is so denoted by the initial letter of his surname. Provided always that no polling-booth shall be in any house licensed for the sale of fermented or spirituous liquors, or upon the premises appertaining to such house.

Booths to be provided.

4. Each booth shall be so divided or arranged that there shall be in the same one or more inner compartments opening only into that part of the booth in which the ballot-box is kept; and the returning officer or his deputy shall provide in every such compartment pencils, or pens and ink, for the use of the voters; and shall also provide for each booth a ballot-box having a lock and key, and with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the ballot-papers herein mentioned.

How booths to be arranged and fitted.

5. The returning officer shall preside and take the poll at some one booth of such polling-place within the licensing district as he shall see fit, and such polling-place shall be deemed the principal polling-place; and he shall, by writing under his hand, appoint a deputy to act for him, and take the poll at each of the other booths of the several polling-places, and may also in like manner appoint one poll clerk for each booth, to assist himself and his several deputies in taking the poll.

Returning officer to preside at one booth and appoint deputies at others.
Poll clerks to be appointed.

6. Every deputy returning officer and poll clerk shall, before he shall enter upon any of the duties assigned to him under these Regulations, make and sign before some justice a declaration in the form given in the First Schedule hereto.

Deputy returning officer and poll clerk to make declarations.

7. The returning officer shall deliver, before the day of polling, to each of his deputies, for use at each polling-booth, copies of all electoral rolls in force for the electoral division, forming the licensing district in and for which the poll is to be taken, certified under his hand to be true copies. He shall also cause to be printed ballot-papers, in the form in the Second Schedule hereto, and shall deliver to each deputy, and shall himself retain, such numbers respectively of such ballot-papers, signed or initialed by him, as shall be sufficient for the persons entitled to vote at each booth at which he or his deputies respectively are to take the poll. He and his deputies shall keep an exact account of all such signed ballot-papers.

8. The polling shall commence on the day appointed at eight o'clock in the forenoon, and close at five o'clock in the afternoon, unless adjourned as hereinafter provided.

Time of polling.

9. In addition to the scrutineer named in the *Government Gazette* as the person named by the petitioners as their scrutineer, and before the time appointed for the commencement of the polling, the petitioners, or any number of them not being less than five, may under their hands appoint one person to be a scrutineer on their behalf at each polling-booth other than the polling-booth at which the petitioners' scrutineer named in the said *Government Gazette* is present; and any number not being less than five of the persons entitled to vote at such poll (other than the petitioners) and who may be opposed to the decrease in

Scrutineers may be appointed.

the number of victuallers' licences in the district where the question to be determined at such poll is whether the number shall be decreased, or when the question to be determined at such poll is whether the number of victuallers' licences in such district shall be increased, who shall be opposed to such increase, may, under their hands, appoint one person to be a scrutineer at each polling-booth on behalf of the persons so opposed to the decrease or increase of the number of victuallers' licences (as the case may be); and the persons so appointed shall be entitled to be present in the polling-booth during the taking of the poll as scrutineers at the booth for which they are so appointed, in addition to the persons entitled to be present in such booth as hereinafter provided, but no other persons than the persons so permitted and the said scrutineers shall be permitted to enter or to remain in the said polling-booth during the taking of the poll; and not more than two scrutineers shall be appointed at any one and the same booth at one and the same poll.

10. The appointment of scrutineers under these Regulations, in addition to the scrutineer named in the *Government Gazette* as the person nominated by the petitioners as their scrutineer, shall be optional, and neither the absence of such scrutineers nor any defect or irregularity in the appointment of scrutineers under these Regulations shall in any manner affect the validity of any poll held under these Regulations.

11. Every scrutineer before he shall act at any polling-booth shall make and sign, before the returning officer or deputy (as the case may be) who shall take the poll at such booth, a declaration to the effect following:—

I [A.B.], a scrutineer appointed at the present poll, held under section 24 of "*The Licensing Act 1885*," as amended by "*The Licensing Amendment Act 1888*," for the licensing district, do solemnly declare that I will faithfully observe all the provisions of the said Acts and all the regulations made thereunder which relate to my office of scrutineer. And I do further solemnly promise and declare that I will not, as such scrutineer at the said poll, attempt to ascertain in what manner, in reference to the question to be determined at such poll, any person shall vote or have voted thereat; and that if, in the discharge of my duties at or concerning the said poll, I shall have learned, or have the means of learning, in what manner, in reference to the question to be determined at such poll, any person shall vote or have voted thereat, I will not, by word or act, or by any other means whatsoever, directly or indirectly, divulge or discover, or aid in divulging or discovering the same, save in answer to some question which I am legally bound to answer in some court of justice of competent jurisdiction to impose such question.

12. The returning officer or deputy, the poll clerks, the scrutineers, and any voters not exceeding six in number being actually engaged in voting, to be designated if necessary by the returning officer or deputy, shall alone be permitted at any one time to enter or remain in the polling-room during the taking of the poll.

13. Immediately before proceeding to take the poll at any booth, the returning officer or deputy shall satisfy himself and the poll clerks (if any) and the scrutineers if they so desire, that the ballot-box is empty, and shall forthwith close and lock the same, being still empty, and set and keep the same unopened upon the table at which he is to preside, and in view of such persons as shall from time to time be present in the polling-booth, and shall keep the key of the said box.

14. All persons whose names for the time being are on the electoral rolls in force at the time of such poll for the electoral division forming the licensing district for which the poll is being taken are entitled to vote at the polling-place for such district, or, if there be more than one polling-place, then at any one of such polling-places, but no person shall vote more than once at the same poll.

15. Every person tendering his vote shall state to the returning officer or deputy his christian names and surname, and such other particulars as the said returning officer or deputy may, for the purpose only of ascertaining upon the roll the name intended by such person, require; and shall also, if he claim to vote as the holder of an elector's right, exhibit to the returning officer or deputy the elector's right which shall purport to entitle him to exercise such right of voting; and shall demand a ballot-paper.

16. When any person shall have tendered his vote at any polling-place in manner required, the returning officer or deputy shall ascertain that the name given by such person is upon the elector's right (if any) exhibited by him, and also (as the case may be) upon an ordinary electoral roll in force for the electoral division forming the licensing district for which such poll is being taken, or upon the roll of ratepaying electors in force for the division forming the said licensing district, and shall compare such elector's right with such name upon the roll, and the particulars stated against the same, so as by inspection to satisfy himself of the identity of the person to whom such elector's right shall have been issued with the person so named on the roll.

17. After having found upon the proper roll for the electoral division forming the licensing district for which such poll is being taken the name intended by any person tendering his vote, the returning officer or deputy may, if he think fit, and shall if requested by the scrutineers or either of them, put to any such person, before he shall have received a ballot-paper, and not afterwards, the questions following, hereinafter called "The prescribed questions" (that is to say):—

- (1.) Are you the person whose name appears as [A. B., No.] in the general roll [or, as the case may require, the supplementary roll or the roll of ratepaying electors] in force for the electoral division forming this licensing district?
- (2.) Have you already voted at the present poll?

18. The returning officer or deputy may, if he think fit, and shall if requested by the scrutineers or either of them, require any person tendering his vote, before he shall receive a ballot-paper, to sign his name in a book to be kept for that purpose; and if such person claim to vote as the holder of an elector's right, the returning officer shall compare such signature with the signature purporting to be that of the holder of such elector's right.

19. If any person shall refuse or omit distinctly to answer the prescribed questions, or either of them, when put to him, or shall not answer question (1) in the affirmative, or question (2) in the negative, or being required and being able to do so shall refuse or omit to sign his name as aforesaid, the returning officer, if not satisfied of his identity as the elector entitled to vote, or being satisfied that such person has already voted, may prohibit him from voting then or afterwards at such poll.

20. When any person shall have tendered his vote in compliance with these Regulations, and the name in which he shall demand to vote shall appear in one of the electoral rolls in force at the time of the poll for the electoral division forming the licensing district, the returning officer or deputy shall, unless he shall under the preceding Regulation have prohibited such person from voting, forthwith write upon the back

of one of the ballot-papers issued under these Regulations, as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number corresponding to the number set opposite such person's name upon the roll, together with the figures and initial letters of the title of such roll, and so that in folding up such ballot-paper as hereinafter mentioned the voter may easily conceal from view the said writing; and shall deliver to such person such ballot-paper, and shall forthwith mark upon a certified copy of such roll, against the name of such person, the fact of his having received such ballot-paper, and mark such elector's right with his initials and with the date expressed as follows (that is to say) the number of the day in the month, the number of the month in the year, and the number of the year in the century of our Lord, and add the letters "V.L.B." which shall be held to signify Victuallers' Licence Ballot, and return the same to such person.

21. Every person to whom a ballot-paper shall have been delivered shall forthwith retire alone to some unoccupied compartment of the polling-booth, and shall there alone and without delay insert in such ballot-paper the number of victuallers' licences for which he intends to vote, such number being either the statutory number or the existing number or some number determined upon by the voter between the statutory number and the existing number, and shall fold up such ballot-paper in such manner as will conceal the number of victuallers' licences voted for, and shall deposit the ballot-paper so filled up in the ballot-box in the presence of the returning officer or deputy.

How vote to be recorded.

22. If any person to whom a ballot-paper shall have been delivered as aforesaid shall be blind, or be unable to read, or be unable to write, or be otherwise unable to fill up his ballot-paper, and shall signify the same to the returning officer or deputy, such returning officer or deputy may and shall, at the request of such person, and for him and in presence of a witness if so desired by such person, in the polling-booth, insert in such ballot-paper the number of victuallers' licences which such voter shall state to be the number for which he intends to vote.

How vote of blind or uneducated voter to be taken.

23. During the polling at any poll held under these Regulations no person shall take any ballot-paper out of the polling-booth save into one of the compartments aforesaid; and no person shall enter any such compartment while any other person shall be therein; and no person being in any such compartment shall remain there for a longer time than such as shall be reasonably required for the purpose of inserting in the ballot-papers the number of licences for which he intends to vote.

No ballot-paper to be taken out of polling-booth.

24. When the proceedings for taking the poll shall be interrupted or obstructed at any place by any riot or open violence, the returning officer or deputy (as the case may be) shall not for such cause finally close the poll, but shall adjourn the taking of the poll at the polling-place at which such interruption or obstruction shall have happened to the following day; and if necessary such returning officer or deputy shall further adjourn such poll until such interruption or obstruction shall have ceased, when such returning officer or deputy shall again proceed with the taking of the poll at the place at which the same may have been so interrupted or obstructed.

Polling may be adjourned if interrupted by riot or open violence.

25. If from any cause no polling shall have been opened at any booth of a polling-place on the day appointed, the polling at such booth shall stand adjourned to a day not later than seven clear days following the day upon which such polling was to have taken place, and the returning officer or deputy (as the case may be) shall forthwith cause public notice to be given thereof. If such adjournment be by a deputy, then he shall forthwith notify the same to the returning officer; and in case of any adjournment of the polling authorized by the Regulations, the returning officer shall not determine the result of the poll until the poll so adjourned shall have been finally closed and the ballot-papers transmitted to the returning officer.

Adjournment of poll in certain cases.

26. In accordance with the provisions of "*The Licensing Amendment Act 1888*," no vote shall be disallowed by the returning officer for informality so long as the intention of the voter is expressed actually or by reasonable intendment.

Votes not to be disallowed for mere informality.

27. Immediately upon the close of the poll the deputy at each polling-booth throughout the district in which the poll is being taken shall, in the presence of the scrutineers, or either of them, if they or either of them choose to be present, and of the poll clerks (if any), but of no other person, open the ballot-box used at the polling-booth at which he shall have presided; and shall make up into one parcel the ballot-papers which shall have been used in voting at his polling-booth during the poll; in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which shall have remained unused; and in another separate parcel the certified copies of rolls supplied, and all books, rolls, and papers kept or used during the poll at his polling-booth; and shall seal up the said several parcels, and shall endorse the same severally with a description of the contents thereof and with the name of the polling-place and with the number of the polling-booth (if more than one), and shall sign with his name the said endorsements; and shall transmit the said parcels to the returning officer at the booth presided over by the returning officer at the principal polling-place, together with an account in which such deputy shall charge himself with the number of ballot-papers delivered to him, specifying therein the number thereof delivered to and used by voters and the number not so delivered and used, and every such account shall be verified by the signature of the said deputy.

Deputy returning officer to forward ballot-papers, &c., to returning officer at principal polling-place.

28. The returning officer, at the conclusion of the poll, shall, in pursuance of the provisions and in the terms of the said "*Licensing Amendment Act 1888*" in that behalf, proceed to count the votes recorded at the said poll for the various propositions voted upon; and shall, by advertisement in the *Government Gazette*, declare the determination of the electors of the licensing district.

Declaration of result of ballot.

29. All Regulations for taking a poll of electors regarding victuallers' licences previously made under the provisions of "*The Licensing Act 1885*," and "*The Licensing Amendment Act 1887*," are hereby repealed, save as to any act, matter or thing done or suffered, or any right, privilege or liability accrued under the said Regulations before the making of these Regulations.

And in determining whether one, two, or more booths shall be provided at one polling-place, he shall be guided by the practice adopted in the particular polling-place to secure sufficient accommodation for voters at elections of Members of Parliament; and if under this Regulation there shall be more than one booth at any polling-place, there shall be affixed over the entrance of each booth in succession so many letters of the alphabet, in their alphabetical order, as shall denote the booth at which each voter, according to the initial letter of his surname, is to vote; and no voter shall vote in any booth save that which is so denoted by the initial letter of his surname. Provided always that no polling-booth shall be in any house licensed for the sale of fermented or spirituous liquors, or upon the premises appertaining to such house. Booths to be provided.

5. Each booth shall be so divided or arranged that there shall be in the same one or more inner compartments opening only into that part of the booth in which the ballot-box is kept; and the returning officer or his deputy shall provide in every such compartment pencils, or pens and ink, for the use of the voters; and shall also provide for each booth a ballot-box having a lock and key, and with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the ballot-papers herein mentioned. How booths to be arranged and fitted.

6. The returning officer shall preside and take the poll at some one booth of such polling-place within the licensing district as he shall see fit, and such polling-place shall be deemed the principal polling-place; and he shall, by writing under his hand, appoint a deputy to act for him, and take the poll at each of the other booths of the several polling-places; and may also in like manner appoint one poll clerk for each booth to assist himself and his several deputies in taking the poll. Returning officer to preside at one booth and appoint deputies at others. Poll clerks to be appointed.

7. Every deputy returning officer and poll clerk shall, before he shall enter upon any of the duties assigned to him under these Regulations, make and sign before some justice a declaration in the form given in the Second Schedule hereto. Deputy returning officer and poll clerk to make declarations. Second Schedule Electoral rolls.

8. The returning officer shall deliver, before the day of polling, to each of his deputies, for use at each polling-booth, copies of all electoral rolls in force for the electoral division forming the licensing district in and for which the poll is to be taken, certified under his hand to be true copies. He shall also cause to be printed ballot-papers, in the form in the Third Schedule hereto, and shall deliver to each deputy, and shall himself retain, such numbers respectively of such ballot-papers, signed or initialed by him, as shall be sufficient for the persons entitled to vote at each booth at which he or his deputies respectively are to take the poll. He and his deputies shall keep an exact account of all such signed ballot-papers. Ballot-papers. Third Schedule.

9. The polling shall commence on the day appointed at EIGHT o'clock in the forenoon, and close at FIVE o'clock in the afternoon, unless adjourned as hereinafter provided. Time of polling.

10. Before the time appointed for the commencement of the polling, the petitioners, or any number of them not being less than five, may under their hands appoint one person to be a scrutineer on their behalf at each polling-booth; and any number not being less than five of the persons entitled to vote at such poll (other than the petitioners), and who may be opposed to the increase in the number of grocers' licences in the district, may under their hands appoint one person to be a scrutineer at each polling-booth on behalf of the persons so opposed to the increase of the number of grocers' licences; and the persons so appointed shall be entitled to be present in the polling-booth during the taking of the poll as scrutineers at the booth for which they are so appointed, in addition to the persons entitled to be present in such booth as hereinafter provided, but no other persons than the persons so permitted and the said scrutineers shall be permitted to enter or to remain in the said polling-booth during the taking of the poll; and not more than two scrutineers shall be appointed at any one and the same booth at one and the same poll. Scrutineers may be appointed.

11. The appointment of scrutineers under these Regulations shall be optional, and neither the absence of scrutineers nor any defect or irregularity in the appointment of scrutineers shall in any manner affect the validity of any poll held under these Regulations.

12. Every scrutineer before he shall act at any polling-booth shall make and sign, before the returning officer or deputy (as the case may be) who shall take the poll at such booth, a declaration to the effect following:—

I [A.B.], a scrutineer appointed at the present poll, held under section 31 of "The Licensing Act 1885," as amended by "The Licensing Amendment Act 1888," for the licensing district, do solemnly declare that I will faithfully observe all the provisions of the said Act, and all the regulations made thereunder which relate to my office of scrutineer. And I do further solemnly promise and declare that I will not, as such scrutineer at the said poll, attempt to ascertain in what manner, in reference to the question to be determined at such poll, any person shall vote or have voted thereat; and that if, in the discharge of my duties at or concerning the said poll, I shall have learned or have the means of learning in what manner, in reference to the question to be determined at such poll, any person shall vote or have voted thereat, I will not, by word or act, or by any other means whatsoever, directly or indirectly, divulge or discover, or aid in divulging or discovering the same, save in answer to some question which I am legally bound to answer in some court of justice of competent jurisdiction to impose such question.

Who may be

13. The returning officer or deputy, the poll clerks, the scrutineers, and any voters not exceeding six in number being actually engaged in voting, to be designated if necessary by the returning officer or deputy, shall alone be permitted at any one time to enter or remain in the polling-room during the taking of the poll.

Returning

to close and lock

14. Immediately before proceeding to take the poll at any booth, the returning officer or deputy shall satisfy himself and the poll clerks (if any) and the scrutineers if they so desire, that the ballot-box is empty, and shall forthwith close and lock the same, being still empty, and set and keep the same unopened upon the table at which he is to preside, and in view of such persons as shall from time to time be present in the polling-booth, and shall keep the key of the said box.

Who may vote,
and where.

15. All persons whose names for the time being are on the electoral rolls in force at the time of such poll for the electoral division forming the licensing district for which the poll is being taken are entitled to vote at the polling-place for such district, or, if there be more than one polling-place, then at any one of such polling-places, but no person shall vote more than once at the same poll.

How votes to be
tendered.

16. Every person tendering his vote shall state to the returning officer or deputy his christian names and surname, and such other particulars as the said returning officer or deputy may, for the purpose only of ascertaining upon the roll the name intended by such person, require; and shall also, if he claim to vote as the holder of an elector's right, exhibit to the returning officer or deputy the elector's right which shall purport to entitle him to exercise such right of voting; and shall demand a ballot-paper.

Duty of return-
ing officer or
deputy on vote
being tendered.

17. When any person shall have tendered his vote at any polling-place in manner required, the returning officer or deputy shall ascertain that the name given by such person is upon the elector's right (if any) exhibited by him, and also (as the case may be) upon an ordinary electoral roll in force for the electoral division forming the licensing district for which such poll is being taken, or upon the roll of ratepaying electors in force for the division forming the said licensing district, and shall compare such elector's right with such name upon the roll, and the particulars stated against the same, so as by inspection to satisfy himself of the identity of the person to whom such elector's right shall have been issued with the person so named on the roll.

Questions which
may be put to
voter.

18. After having found upon the proper roll for the electoral division forming the licensing district for which such poll is being taken the name intended by any person tendering his vote, the returning officer or deputy may, if he think fit, and shall if requested by the scrutineers or either of them, put to any such person, before he shall have received a ballot-paper, and not afterwards, the questions following, hereinafter called "The prescribed questions" (that is to say):—

(1) Are you the person whose name appears as [A.B., No.] in the general roll [or, as the case may require, the supplementary roll or the roll of ratepaying electors] in force for the electoral division forming this licensing district?

(2) Have you already voted at the present poll?

Voter may be

19. The returning officer or deputy may, if he think fit, and shall if requested by the scrutineers or either of them, require any person tendering his vote, before he shall receive a ballot-paper, to sign his name in a book to be kept for that purpose; and if such person claim to vote as the holder of an elector's right, the returning officer shall compare such signature with the signature purporting to be that of the holder of such elector's right.

Voter refusing
to answer, &c.

20. If any person shall refuse or omit distinctly to answer the prescribed questions, or either of them, when put to him, or shall not answer question (1) in the affirmative, or question (2) in the negative, or being required and being able to do so shall refuse or omit to sign his name as aforesaid, the returning officer, if not satisfied of his identity as the elector entitled to vote, or being satisfied that such person has already voted, may prohibit him from voting then or afterwards at such poll.

Duty of return-
ing officer when
voter's name
appears on roll.

21. When any person shall have tendered his vote in compliance with these Regulations, and the name in which he shall demand to vote shall appear in one of the electoral rolls in force at the time of the poll for the electoral division forming the licensing district, the returning officer or deputy shall, unless he shall under the preceding Regulation have prohibited such person from voting, forthwith write upon the back of one of the ballot-papers issued under these Regulations, as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number corresponding to the number set opposite to such person's name upon the roll, together with the figures and initial letters of the title of such roll, and so that in folding up such ballot-paper as hereinafter mentioned the voter may easily conceal from view the said writing; and shall deliver to such person such ballot-paper, and shall forthwith mark upon a certified copy of such roll, against the name of such person, the fact of his having received such ballot-paper, and mark such elector's right with his initials and with the date expressed as follows (that is to say) the number of the day in the month, the number of the month in the year, and the number of the year in the century of our Lord, and add the letters "G.L.B.," which shall be held to signify Grocers' Licence Ballot, and return the same to such person.

How vote to be
recorded.

22. Every person to whom a ballot-paper shall have been delivered shall forthwith retire alone to some unoccupied compartment of the polling-booth, and shall there alone and without delay insert in such ballot-paper, the number of grocers' licences for which he intends to vote, such number being either the

statutory number or the existing number, or some number determined upon by the voter above the existing number but below the statutory number of grocers' licences, and shall fold up such ballot-paper in such manner as will conceal the number of grocers' licences voted for, and shall deposit the ballot-paper so filled up in the ballot-box in the presence of the returning officer or deputy.

23. If any person to whom a ballot-paper shall have been delivered as aforesaid shall be blind, or be unable to read, or be unable to write, or be otherwise unable to fill up his ballot-paper, and shall signify the same to the returning officer or deputy, such returning officer or deputy may and shall, at the request of such person, and for him and in the presence of a witness if so desired by such person, in the polling-booth, insert in such ballot-paper the number of grocers' licences which such voter shall state to be the number for which he intends to vote.

How vote of blind or uneducated voter to be taken.

24. During the polling at any poll held under these Regulations no person shall take any ballot-paper out of the polling-booth save into one of the compartments aforesaid; and no person shall enter any such compartment while any other person shall be therein; and no person being in any such compartment shall remain there for a longer time than such as shall be reasonably required for the purpose of inserting in the ballot-papers the number of licences for which he intends to vote.

No ballot-paper to be taken out of polling-booth.

25. When the proceedings for taking the poll shall be interrupted or obstructed at any place by any riot or open violence, the returning officer or deputy (as the case may be) shall not for such cause finally close the poll, but shall adjourn the taking of the poll at the polling-place at which such interruption or obstruction shall have happened to the following day; and if necessary such returning officer or deputy shall further adjourn such poll until such interruption or obstruction shall have ceased, when such returning officer or deputy shall again proceed with the taking of the poll at the place at which the same may have been so interrupted or obstructed.

Polling may be adjourned if interrupted by riot or open violence.

26. If from any cause no polling shall have been opened at any booth of a polling-place on the day appointed, the polling at such booth shall stand adjourned to a day not later than seven clear days following the day upon which such polling was to have taken place, and the returning officer or deputy (as the case may be) shall forthwith cause public notice to be given thereof. If such adjournment be by a deputy, then he shall forthwith notify the same to the returning officer; and in case of any adjournment of the polling authorized by the Regulations, the returning officer shall not determine the result of the poll until the poll so adjourned shall have been finally closed and the ballot-papers transmitted to the returning officer.

Adjournment of poll in certain cases.

27. Immediately upon the close of the poll the deputy at each polling-booth throughout the district in which the poll is being taken shall, in the presence of the scrutineers, or either of them, if they or either of them choose to be present, and of the poll clerks (if any), but of no other person, open the ballot-box used at the polling-booth at which he shall have presided; and shall make up into one parcel the ballot-papers which shall have been used in voting at his polling-booth during the poll; in another separate parcel the ballot-papers which shall have remained unused; and in another separate parcel the certified copies of rolls supplied, and all books, rolls, and papers kept or used during the poll at his polling-booth; and shall seal up the said several parcels, and shall endorse the same severally with a description of the contents thereof and with the name of the polling-place and with the number of the polling-booth (if more than one), and shall sign with his name the said endorsements; and shall transmit the said parcels to the returning officer at the booth presided over by the returning officer at the principal polling-place, together with an account in which such deputy shall charge himself with the number of ballot-papers delivered to him, specifying therein the number thereof delivered to and used by voters and the number not so delivered and used, and every such account shall be verified by the signature of the said deputy.

Deputy returning officer to forward ballot-papers, &c., to returning officer at principal polling-place.

28. Upon the close of the poll the returning officer shall, at the booth presided over by him at such principal polling-place, and in the presence of the scrutineers or either of them, if they or either of them choose to be present, and of the poll-clerks (if any), and of no other person, open the ballot-box used at such booth; and shall also, in the like presence, open the several parcels containing the ballot-papers used at and transmitted to him from the several polling-places throughout the licensing district in which the poll is taken, and shall then, count up the number of votes recorded for each of the several propositions voted for; and shall, by notice signed by him and posted in some conspicuous position at the principal polling-booth, and also inserted in some newspaper published in the district, or if no newspaper be so published then in a Melbourne daily newspaper, announce the number of votes recorded for the said several propositions, and shall also forward a copy of such notice to the clerk of the Licensing Court for the district, together with the total number of electors upon the several rolls in force at the time of the poll within the electoral division forming the licensing district and the total number of votes recorded.

Duty of returning officer at close of poll.

29. All Regulations for taking a poll of electors regarding grocers' licences previously made under the provisions of "The Licensing Act 1885" and "The Licensing Amendment Act 1887" are hereby repealed, save as to any act, matter or thing done or suffered, or any right, privilege or liability accrued under the said Regulations before the making of these Regulations.

Repeal of previous Regulations.

30. The rates of allowances to returning officers, deputy returning officers and poll clerks, for expenses of conducting a poll, shall be as follow, viz.:-

TATURA WATERWORKS-TRUST CONSTITUTED.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth day of June 1889.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Administrator of the Government.

WHEREAS by *The Water Conservation Act 1887* it was amongst other things enacted that, at the expiration of two months after the notice of any application should have been first advertised in the *Government Gazette*, the Minister, if satisfied that the provisions of the now in part recited Act have been substantially complied with, should submit such application, and the general plan and description therein referred to, and all petitions which have been received in respect of such application, to the Governor in Council, together with any recommendations as to the granting of the application or as to any alterations or additions he might think desirable in the proposed waterworks; and the Governor in Council might thereupon approve of the construction of such proposed waterworks, with or without any alterations or additions in the general plan and description thereof, or might disapprove of the construction of such waterworks, and should make an Order in Council accordingly; And it was further enacted that if the Governor in Council should approve of the construction of such waterworks, with or without alterations or additions or restrictions of any such general plan and description, a Waterworks Trust should be constituted to construct, maintain, and continue the whole or any part of the waterworks therein described, in accordance with the provisions of such Order and of the now in part recited Act: And every Order approving the construction of any proposed waterworks, and of the constitution of a Waterworks Trust for the purpose, should—

(a) State the amount of money which the Governor in Council will grant as a loan for the purpose of carrying out such proposed waterworks, and of paying the cost and expense of preparing the general plan and description of the same, and the costs of the application for the constituting of such Waterworks Trust; and also the rate of interest which will be charged for such loan, such rate being at least one-half per centum more than the rate payable by the Government on the Public Loan out of which loan might be granted;

(b) Specify the limits of the lands, whether within or without the municipal districts of the council or councils applying for the proposed waterworks, within which such Waterworks Trust should have authority, to be called a Waterworks District;

(c) State what are the principal works to be constructed;

(d) Assign a corporate name to such Waterworks Trust; and

(e) Contain such provisions (not inconsistent with this Act) as, according to the nature of the application and the facts and circumstances of each case, the Governor in Council thinks fit.

And it was further enacted that the Governor in Council might, where a Waterworks District is either wholly or with the exception of the waterworks or proposed waterworks thereof within one or more ridings of any municipal district, appoint the councillors for such riding or ridings, together with any other person or persons, not exceeding three in number, to be the Commissioners of the Waterworks Trust of such Waterworks District. Now therefore His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, has approved of a general plan and description, as set forth in a certain application of the Council of the Shire of Rodney for a loan of Two thousand pounds (£2,000) to carry out certain waterworks for the domestic supply of a Waterworks District under the said Act, embracing the township of Tatura as shown on the general plan and description accompanying the said application, deposited in the Department of Water Supply, and doth hereby order and appoint as follows:—

(1.) The construction of the said waterworks and the constitution of a Waterworks Trust.

(2.) That the councillors for the Tatura Riding of the said Shire of Rodney Municipal District and three other persons shall be the Commissioners of the Waterworks Trust.

(3.) That the amount of loan hereby granted shall be Two thousand pounds sterling, for the purpose of constructing works for the supply of the township of Tatura with water, and also for paying the cost and expense of the plans and application for the same; and that the interest to be charged for such loan shall be Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum, payment of which interest shall be made half-yearly.

(4.) That the limits of the land within which the said Waterworks Trust shall have authority shall be that portion of the Shire of Rodney included within the boundaries hereunder described, viz.:—Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 1, section 13, township of Tatura; thence by a line bearing south 89° 55' west six chains; thence by a line bearing north 0° 16' west twenty-four chains fifty links; thence by a line bearing north 89° 55' east sixty-six chains eighty links; thence by a line southerly to the north-east angle of the Railway station reserve; thence south-westerly to the south-east angle of that reserve; thence by a line westerly to the north-east angle of the Agriculture Show Yards reserve; thence southerly, westerly, and northerly by the east, south, and west boundaries of the Agricultural Show Yards reserve to the north-west angle thereof; thence westerly along south boundary of Service street to the commencing point.

(5.) The principal works to be constructed shall consist of an open tank, the erection of a tank on cast-iron columns, a pumping plant, and the reticulation of the township of Tatura.

(6.) The name of the Trust shall be the Tatura Waterworks Trust.

PUBLIC HIGHWAY IN THE TOWN OF FOOTSCRAY.**PROCLAMATION**

By His Excellency Sir WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict. No. 506) it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time, and from time to time, upon the request of the council of any municipality by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to declare any land reserved, used, or by purchase or exchange acquired for a street, road, highway, thoroughfare, bridge, square, court, alley, or right-of-way to be a public highway, and such land shall thereupon and thenceforth from the date of such proclamation become and be absolutely dedicated to the public as a public highway within the meaning of any law then or thereafter in force: And whereas the Council of the Town of Footscray has requested that the street hereinafter mentioned be so declared a public highway: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this notice declare the land acquired or used for the street hereinafter named and described, and situate in the Town of Footscray, to be a public highway within the meaning of the said Act, viz.:—

GRANT TO PUBLIC PARKS AND GARDENS, 1888-89.

THE Administrator of the Government in Council has approved of the subjoined Regulations in connection with the distribution of the grant of Nine thousand five hundred pounds (£9,500) for fencing and improving Public Parks and Gardens for the financial year 1888-89.

REGULATIONS.

1. That a sum of Eighty-four pounds fifteen shillings and eightpence (£84 15s. 8d.) be paid to the Ballarat Shire Council for expenditure on parks in the shire during the year 1887.

2. That a sum of Two shillings and fourpence (2s. 4d.) be paid to the treasurer of the managing body of any public park or garden having a claim on the vote under clause 1 of Regulations of 8th January 1889, gazetted 11th January 1889, for every One pound expended from local contributions on works specified in the said Regulations.

PUBLIC HEALTH.—SHIRE OF DIMBOOLA.

BYE-LAW No. 1.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Dimboola in the Colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in the Public Health Acts 1865-1888, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 1 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

2. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the Shire of Dimboola with the exception of Part II., which shall apply to the township of Dimboola only.

Definitions.

3. In the construction and for the purposes of this bye-law the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

“House” shall mean and include dwellings of any kind, schools, hotels, licensed public-houses, factories, work-rooms, common or other lodging-houses, or other buildings or premises.

“Cesspool” shall mean any receptacle for night-soil or for noxious or offensive matter below or above the ground; and “earth-closet” shall include a pan closet of any description.

“Street” shall mean and include any highway and any public bridge, and any road, lane, footway, square, court, alley, or passage, whether a thoroughfare or not.

“Slaughter-yard” or “Slaughter-house” shall include an abattoir or any place whatever where slaughtering takes place.

Words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural and the plural the singular, and the word “person” shall include a corporation.

Part I.—General Cleanliness.

4. The occupier of every house and premises shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connexion therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all dust, filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be, once at least in every week, removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the local board may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, occupation, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon, to be effectually deodorized and to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

6. No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter in any street, road, lane, right-of-way, or place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health, or in any way contrary to the directions of the local board or officer of health.

7. No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

Part II.—Disposal of House Refuse and Cleanliness in Towns, &c.

8. Every occupier of a house or premises shall provide and keep thereon a box or some other covered receptacle for the temporary deposit of house refuse, which box or receptacle shall be of such dimensions as that the same may, with the contents thereof, when full, be readily and conveniently movable by one man, or so many such boxes or receptacles as may be necessary to contain all the house refuse produced or accumulated on such premises during one week, and shall cause all house refuse to be deposited as soon as conveniently may be in some such box or receptacle.

9. The occupier of any premises fronting, adjoining, or abutting on any street shall, once at least in every day before nine o'clock a.m., sweep and cleanse, or cause to be swept and cleansed, the footways and pavements adjoining such premises.

10. In order that the contents of every box or receptacle in or about any house or premises containing house refuse may be conveniently discharged and removed by the public scavengers or other person or persons authorized or appointed to remove the same by the municipality or the Local Board of Health, every occupier of such house or premises shall cause every such box or receptacle containing house refuse to be placed in the yard of such house or premises, and close to the entrance thereof, or in the street, lane, or right-of-way contiguous to such house or premises, between such hours as may be directed by the local board or inspector of nuisances.

11. The occupier of any land on which is erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty, or on which land is any building wherein any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any

cattle or swine are kept, shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to two cubic yards, or once at least in every week should the quantity not amount, in that time, to two cubic yards; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said local board at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every occupier of a building or premises wherein or whereon any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine may be kept shall provide, in connexion with such building or premises, whenever required by the local board or officer of health, a suitable receptacle for dung, manure, soil, filth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may from time to time be produced in the keeping of any such animal in such building or upon such premises, and cause such receptacle to be constructed so that the bottom or floor thereof shall not in any case be lower than the surface of the ground adjoining such receptacle, and in such a manner and of such materials and to be maintained at all times in such a condition as to prevent any effluvia therefrom, or any escape of the contents thereof, or any leakage therefrom, into the ground or into the wall of any building, and to be furnished with a suitable cover and, when not required to be open, to be kept properly covered.

13. He shall likewise provide in connection with such building or premises, if required by the local board or officer of health, a sufficient drain constructed in such a manner and of such materials, and maintained at all times in such a condition, as effectually to convey all urine or liquid filth or refuse therefrom into a proper receptacle.

PART III.—As to Manure.

14. Nothing herein contained shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil (not being night-soil), or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed, or to be used as manure on any garden or land, or to be kept for the purpose of being used on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravene any bye-law of the local board of health, or so as to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or contrary to any directions of the local board or officer of health.

15. Every person placing, depositing, or spreading, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any liquid manure of which night-soil, urine, or any similar offensive matters form a part, night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same or cause the same to be covered and shall keep the same covered with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness, and shall keep and use the same in such a way only as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health. And before doing so such person shall obtain the written permission of the local board or officer of health, subject however to any general regulations or directions which the Central Board by publication in the *Government Gazette* may make or give. But such permission shall be no defence in any complaint or prosecution for having kept or used such liquid manure, night-soil, offal, blood, or other matter in such a way as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

Part IV.—Prevention of Pollution of Water.

16. No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any persons using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

17. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter, into any water supplied, used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents or any portion of the contents thereof may find its way, or be likely to find its way, into any such water.

18. Every accumulation or deposit of offensive matter so situated as to find its way or be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deodorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within twenty-four hours of notice given by the local board or by one of its officers.

Part V.—Drainage of Buildings.

19. Every person erecting, or causing to be erected, any new building shall cause the foundations thereof, and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well-drained, so that no water soakage or damp shall lodge there.

20. Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the healthfulness of the inmates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

Part VI.—Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairymen, and Purveyors of Milk.

21. Every person carrying on the trade of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of July in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall with every such application pay a fee of Five shillings.

22. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the Secretary of the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received, and of the payment of the fee and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

23. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle, shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said local board, or by any person authorized in writing by the chairman or secretary of the said local board; and if on inspection such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting, to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said local board may, by an order in writing, signed by the secretary and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, or in the case of an unregistered person, served personally or left at his dwelling-place or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person; and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said local board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

24. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated; and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

25. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept and be kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

26. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

27. If any person, or any member of the family of any person, registered as aforesaid, or not so registered but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health, and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale,

or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business; nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until in either case all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

28. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor, or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the local board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

29. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit, or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

Part VII.—Penalties.

30. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law, shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid; and any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health (being the Municipal Council in and for the Shire) this fourth day of June in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—AS TO DAIRIES, DAIRY CATTLE, AND MILK.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Echuca, in the Colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in the Public-Health Acts 1865-1888, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board; doth hereby make the following bye-law, No. 2 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the Shire of Echuca.

4. Every person carrying on the trade of a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of January in every year, register himself with the Local Board of Health in manner following, that is to say, by signing and forwarding to the Secretary of the Local Board of Health an application in the form hereunder written, and every such person shall, with every such application, pay a fee of Ten shillings.

5. Upon receipt of every such application and fee, the Secretary for the Local Board of Health shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule of such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

6. All paddocks, grounds, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the said local board, or by any person authorized in writing by the chairman or secretary of the said local board; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are or is likely, in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting, to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said local board may, by an order in writing signed by the secretary, and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, or in the case of an unregistered person served personally or left at his dwelling-place, or posted upon the land, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle in dairies shall also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person, and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said local board may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

7. All houses, dairies, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated; and the drainage of all such buildings shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman, whether registered or not.

8. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept and be kept perfectly clean, and shall within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector of nuisances, be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

9. All vessels used for containing milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily.

10. If any person, or any member of the family of any person, registered as aforesaid, or not so registered but employed as a cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, or any visitor or member of the family of any visitor to any such person, shall be attacked by typhoid fever or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house in which such person shall be, or (if he be the person attacked) his wife or other person in charge, shall immediately give notice thereof to the local board or officer of health, or to the nearest member of the police force, who shall immediately inform the Local Board of Health; and thereupon it shall and may be lawful for the said local board or the officer of health, by order served as aforesaid, to prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk for sale from any premises in the use and occupation of any such cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk until danger, in the opinion of such local board or officer of health, no longer exists. And in any such case it shall not be lawful to allow any person so suffering, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business. Nor, if the person registered or conducting such business be himself the person suffering, shall he take any part whatever in the conduct of such trade or business until, in either case, all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or to its contamination has ceased.

11. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor, or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the local board, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

12. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

13. In the interpretation of this bye-law words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural, and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

14. Every person guilty of any breach of this bye-law, or of any of its provisions, shall be liable in the discretion of the convicting justices to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds nor less than Five shillings, or, in the like discretion, to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds nor less than Five shillings, for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health (being the Municipal Council) in and for the Shire of Echuca this 30th day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

PUBLIC HEALTH.—SHIRE OF NUMURKAH.—LOCAL
BOARD OF HEALTH.

BYE-LAW No. 11.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Numurkah, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in *The Public Health Acts 1865-1888*, and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 11 of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

2. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the townships of Numurkah, Nathalia, and Wunghnu, and also within a radius of ten chains of the boundaries of the said townships.

3. Clauses 8, 9, 10, and 12 of Bye-law No. 6, made and ordered by the said local board, shall be and are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

4. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other refuse or offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and buried, as hereinafter provided, in the manure depot appointed by the local board from time to time for the final reception of the same, and in no other place.

5. No person shall place, deposit, spread, or bury, or cause or suffer to be placed or deposited or spread or buried, or assist in placing, depositing, spreading, or burying in any place except the manure depot, to be from time to time appointed by the said local board, any night-soil, blood, offal, or other refuse, or offensive matter or thing whether by way of manure or otherwise.

6. Any person or persons removing night-soil, blood, offal, or other refuse or offensive matter or thing to the manure depot, to be appointed by the local board from time to time as aforesaid, shall bury the same in a trench to be dug out or excavated by such person or persons in such place in said manure depot as shall be appointed by the inspector of the said local board, which trench shall not be less in measurement than three feet deep by one foot six inches in width, by six feet in length; and such person or persons shall cover the night-soil, blood, offal, or other refuse or offensive matter or thing buried in such trench with at least eighteen inches of soil at the same time as such burial takes place. Any surplus earth from such excavation after the burying of such night-soil, blood, offal, or other refuse or offensive matter or thing, and covering the same with eighteen inches of soil, shall be spread evenly and regularly on the surface of such trench.

7. No person shall empty any earth closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of night-soil except by means of a cart, carriage, or other conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of any effluvia therefrom. No such cart, carriage, or other conveyance shall be so used until the same has been approved of in writing by the inspector of the said local board.

8. Every closet-pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly rivetted and soldered so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet. No receptacle other than such a closet-pan shall be used in connection with any premises, and the owner or the person or persons having the management and control of any premises shall furnish every privy or closet in connection with such premises with such a closet-pan.

9. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this bye-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties, such portion not being less than Five shillings, to be paid; and any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty, notwithstanding that the Local Board of Health may be empowered by this bye-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such local board has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

PUBLIC HEALTH.—SHIRE OF MOUNT ROUSE.

BYE-LAW No. 4.

THE Local Board of Health in and for the Shire of Mount Rouse, in the colony of Victoria, being the Municipal Council thereof, by virtue of the powers contained in *The Public Health Acts 1835-1883* and every other power enabling the said local board in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said local board, doth hereby make the following bye-law, being Bye-law No. 4 (4) of the said Local Board of Health, that is to say:—

1. All former bye-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this bye-law coming into operation.

2. This bye-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Central Board of Health, and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This bye-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the said shire.

4. The owner or occupier of any place, building, or premises used for the purpose of carrying on any of the following trades shall pay an annual registration fee in respect thereof according to the amounts hereinafter mentioned, viz.:—Fellmongeries, tanneries, wool-scouring establishments, or places for the storing, drying, or preserving of bones, hides, hoofs, or skins, Two pounds (£2); piggeries, Ten shillings (10s.).

The foregoing bye-law was duly made, ordered, and passed by the Local Board of Health (being the Municipal Council) in and for the Shire of Mount Rouse this tenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine (1889).

CUTTING, DIGGING, OR REMOVING LIVE TREES OR SUCKERS FROM CERTAIN CROWN LANDS PROHIBITED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir WILLIAM CLEAVER FRANCIS ROBINSON, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of the Government of the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act 1884* it is amongst other things enacted that, notwithstanding anything therein before contained, the Governor may by Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall cut, dig, or remove live or dead timber or particular description of timber or bark, stone, gravel, sand, loam, brick, or other earth from such portions of Crown lands as are named in such Proclamation, or shall exercise on any such portions the powers, or any of them, conferred by any license granted under the authority of Part VIII. of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Administrator of the Government of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, under and by virtue of the power conferred by the above-recited Act, do by this my Proclamation declare that no person, although he be duly licensed or otherwise authorized, shall, unless he be specially licensed under the authority of the Minister of Lands to cut or remove timber for mining purposes only, cut, dig, or remove live trees or suckers, which, at the height of two feet from the surface of the ground, are of less diameter than twelve inches, on or from the Crown lands, not being State Forest, situate within a radius of twenty miles from the Public Buildings, Sandhurst.—(89.Mc.28647.)

REBATES ON GOODS FOR RIVERINA.

Goods forwarded from Melbourne, Williamstown, or Port Melbourne to Echuca, Wodonga, Wahgunyah, Rutherglen, Chiltern, Yarrawonga, or Cobram, and conveyed thence by river, rail, or teams to any station on the Murray below the Murrumbidgee Junction, or to any station on the Darling or Murrumbidgee Rivers or their tributaries, or to a destination north of, or intersected by, an imaginary line drawn straight from Jingellie on the Murray to Gerogery on the New South Wales line; thence to the south-east corner of Coree Station, the following stations forming the Southern boundary:—Table Top, Gerogery, Burgunderi, Burrumbuttock, Goombargama, Mahonga, Coreen, Wongamong, Narrow Plains, Barrigan-Momalong, and Booroobarilly; thence in a northerly direction to Burrabogie blocks; to include in that line Coree, Moonbria, Steam Plains, Willurah, Warwillah, Wargam, and Nyanga Stations; thence in a westerly direction along the south boundary of the River back-blocks to the intersection of the Murrumbidgee River at Balranald, will be allowed the undermentioned rebates, on production of certified bills of lading, or certificates, or such other proof as the Commissioners may deem sufficient that they have been duly received at their destination.

2. The ordinary rates will be charged in the first instance, and rebates allowed on production of rebate sheets, accompanied by bills of lading or certificates as above mentioned.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF CERTAIN RESERVES IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF DAYLESFORD AND PARISH OF WOMBAT.

THE Council of the borough of Daylesford, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the land temporarily reserved by Order of 26th May 1885, as a site for an ornamental lake and for public recreation, in the parish of Wombat, municipal district of Daylesford, and of the land temporarily reserved by Order of 22nd of January 1889, for the purpose of protecting mineral springs in the municipal district of Daylesford and parish of Wombat, having framed the following regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 133 of *The Land Act 1884*—

REGULATIONS.

1. The reserve shall be open to the public from sunrise to sunset.
2. No person shall enter or remain in either of the reserves who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.

3. No person shall cut down or remove any live or dead timber, bushes, or scrub in either of the reserves without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management, nor damage in any way the trees, shrubs, bushes, or flowers in either of the reserves.

4. No person shall remove any gravel, stone, sand, earth, grass, or other material from either of the reserves, nor mine thereon, nor in any way break, remove, or interfere with the surface thereof, nor erect any dwelling therein, or any booth, or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article, without the consent in writing of the Committee of Management first obtained.

5. No person shall damage in any way any notice-board, building, or enclosure in either of the reserves, or any building, enclosure, pipe, covering, or other protection erected or placed around or over any spring.

6. No person shall throw stones or debris of any kind into any of the springs in the reserves, nor in any way pollute, defile, divert, obstruct, or otherwise interfere with the flow of the waters of the springs.

7. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates, stick bills thereon, or cut names, or in any way deface, damage, or destroy any of the trees, fences, gates, seats, or buildings in the reserves.

8. No person shall roll or throw stones in the reserves, nor light fires therein, nor deposit thereon any rubbish or debris of any kind, or cause or allow any sludge to flow thereon.

9. No person shall enter any plots or enclosures in the reserves which may be set apart or enclosed for plantations of young trees, shrubs, or flowers.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 133 of *The Land Act 1884*, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable, and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.
