EXTRADITION TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE REPUBLIC OF COLOMBIA.

THE following despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor, and its enclosure, are published for general information.

My LORD,—I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 28th of November, 1889, for giving effect to the Treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Colombia for the mutual extradition of Fugitive Criminals, signed at Bogotá, on the 27th of October, 1888, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Bogotá on the 21st August, 1889.

The Treaty came into operation on the 16th of December, in conformity with Article XVIII.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such Law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 17th day of November, 1888, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provisions of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-seventh day of October, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Colombia, for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and His Excellency the President of the Republic of Colombia, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice, and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty, that is to say:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, William John Dickson, Esquire, Her Minister Resident to the Republic of Colombia; and

His Excellency the President of the Republic of Colombia, Vicente Restrepo, Minister for Foreign Affairs of the said Republic:

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II, committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences:—

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.
2. Manslaughter.
3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.
4. Rape.
5. Unlawful carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge, of a girl under 16 years of age, if the evidence produced justifies committal for those crimes according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties.
6. Indecent assault.
7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child-stealing.
8. Abduction.
9. Bigamy.
10. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily harm.
11. Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
12. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.
13. Perjury or subornation of perjury.
14. Arson.
15. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.
16. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

17. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.

18.—(a) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeit or altered money.

(b) Forgery, or counterfeiting or altering, or uttering what is forged, counterfeit, or altered.

(c) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin, or forgery of any paper money of the respective countries.

19. Crimes against Bankruptcy Law.

20. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway.

21. Malignant injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

22. Crimes committed at sea:—

(a) Piracy by the law of nations.

(b) Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

(c) Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

(d) Assault on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

23. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the Contracting Parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

ARTICLE III.

Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, refuse to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

ARTICLE IV.

The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Colombia, has already been tried and discharged, or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of Colombia or in the United Kingdom respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or on the part of the Government of Colombia, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of Colombia or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial, in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered.

This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in *contumaciam* is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

ARTICLE X.

A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed, or the person convicted, in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction; provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall,

in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in Colombia as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country, in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty.

The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, and certificates of, or judicial documents stating, the fact of a conviction, provided the same are authenticated as follows:—

1. A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of, or judicial document stating, the fact of a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by law where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other Powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date.

ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

ARTICLE XVII.

The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such Colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or possession by the chief Consular officer of the Republic of Colombia in such Colony or possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Colombian criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such Colony or foreign possession will allow, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any Colony or foreign possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

ARTICLE XVIII.

The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Contracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

March 14, 1890.

The Treaty, after receiving the approval of the Congress of Colombia, shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Bogotá as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto their respective seals.
Done at Bogotá this twenty-seventh day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight.

And whereas the ratifications of the said Treaty were exchanged at Bogotá on the twenty-first day of August, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine.

Now therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the sixteenth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine, the said Acts shall apply in the case of Colombia, and of the said Treaty with the President of the Republic of Colombia.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the Republic of Colombia and to the said Treaty, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer.

“THE IRRIGATION ACT 1886.”

IN the matter of the Petition of the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust, praying for the constitution of a certain portion of its Waterworks District as an Irrigation and Water Supply District within the meaning of the said Act, and for the appointment and creation of a Trust for such district.

Pursuant to section 18 of the said Act, I hereby declare upon the said petition the matters following, viz. —

1. That the scheme or plan of works will comprise a storage reservoir at Lake Lonsdale, with channels from Fyans Creek, the Mokepilly Creek, and Pleasant Creek, to divert their waters into the said storage reservoir; a main supply channel from the reservoir to the Glenorchy weir, which will be enlarged and strengthened to adapt it to act as the distribution headwork; a system of distribution and reticulation channels to convey and distribute the water throughout the irrigable area of the Trust district; and the existing channels, dams, tanks, and other works owned by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust.

2. That the Lake Lonsdale reservoir, the channels from Fyans, Mokepilly, and Pleasant creeks, the channel to Glenorchy, and the weir there will be National works; the remainder of the works will be Trust works.

3. That the amount of money which it is proposed that the Board of Land and Works will advance, by way of loan, for Trust works, is Two hundred and seventeen thousand pounds (£217,000), which will be inclusive of a sum of about £120,000 to recoup advances now owing by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust in respect of its existing works, to be taken over by the new Trust.

4. That the rate of interest to be paid by the Trust upon such loan shall be Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum.

5. That the rate at which the Trust shall pay for water when supplied from National works shall be such price as will be equivalent to Four pounds ten shillings per centum per annum on the cost of such National works, in addition to the necessary charges for the maintenance and management thereof, in respect of the right to use the whole of the available water from time to time impounded therein.

6. The quantity of water which the Trust shall be entitled and required to take from the National works shall be the whole available supply impounded in the Lake Lonsdale reservoir, except such quantity (if any) as the Minister may consider necessary to be reserved for compensation water.

7. The source, other than National works, from which the Trust will obtain its supply will be the Wimmera River at Glenorchy, from which the Trust will be entitled to take and use two-thirds of the total natural volume at any time flowing therein, provided that no water shall be withdrawn from the river when its volume is less than 300 cubic feet per minute.

8. That the powers of rating to be given to the Trust shall not exceed the sum of Four shillings in the £ of the net annual value of the property in the Trust district.

This declaration shall be deemed to be in lieu of the declaration made by me in the matter of the said Petition, on the fourth day of February, 1890, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 7th day of February, 1890, and such said declaration dated and published as aforesaid is hereby cancelled.

REGULATIONS AS TO REGISTRATION OF COW-KEEPERS, DAIRYMEN, AND PURVEYORS OF MILK, AND INSPECTION OF DAIRIES.

THE Governor, with the Advice of the Executive Council, pursuant to the provisions of section 15 of *The Public Health Act 1889*, has approved of the subjoined Regulations as to Registration of Cowkeepers, Dairymen, and Purveyors of Milk, and Inspection of Dairies, made by the Board of Public Health under the powers conferred by section 22 of the said Act.

The Public Health Act 1889.

WHEREAS by section 22 of *The Public Health Act 1889*, the Board of Public Health may make Regulations for the purposes mentioned in that section: And whereas the provisions of section 74 of *The Public Health Amendment Statute 1883* have, by Order in Council, been directed to be put in force in Victoria: The Board of Public Health, by virtue of the powers conferred by the said sections and by *The Public Health Acts 1865-1889*, doth make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

REGISTRATION OF COWKEEPERS, DAIRYMEN, AND PURVEYORS OF MILK, AND INSPECTION OF DAIRIES.

1. These Regulations shall be applied in all cities, towns, boroughs, and shires, so far as they shall not be inconsistent with any by-law of the council of such city, town, borough, or shire heretofore made in virtue of powers conferred by *The Public Health Acts 1865-1889*.

2. Every person carrying on the trade of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall, on or before the first day of April, 1890, and in subsequent years, on or before the first day of January, register himself by signing and forwarding to the municipal clerk of the city, town, borough, or shire in which he carries on his business an application in the form hereunder written; and every such person shall, with every such application, pay such fee as is required under any by-law of the council.

3. Every person who, after the 1st day of April next, shall undertake the trade of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, shall register himself forthwith in the manner provided in the next preceding section.

4. Upon receipt of every application for registration and fee, the municipal clerk shall endorse the same with a memorandum of the date on which it is received and of the payment of the fee, and shall file the same, and shall enter the particulars in the schedule to such application in a book to be kept for that purpose, and cause the same to be properly indexed.

5. After the coming into operation of these regulations no person shall carry on the trade of cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, unless registered as aforesaid, and at the place for which he is registered.

6. All paddocks, grounds, lands, and enclosures used as grazing ground for dairy cattle shall, whenever necessary, be inspected by any member or officer of the council, or by any person authorized in writing by the chairman or clerk of the said council; and if, on inspection, such paddocks, grounds, or enclosures, or any one of them, are or is likely in the opinion of the officer or person so inspecting, to be prejudicial to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, the said council may, by an order in writing signed by the municipal clerk and served personally or left at the dwelling-house of the registered person, prohibit the use of the same for the purpose of feeding dairy cattle, either absolutely or for any time named in such order. All cattle and other animals in dairies may also be similarly inspected by a veterinary surgeon or other competent person; and any cows found to be diseased, or which from poverty or weakness are, in the opinion of the inspector, likely to be unfit for use for dairy purposes, and any other diseased animal, shall be forthwith removed from such dairy if

ordered by such inspector or other officer as aforesaid. And any such order as aforesaid the said council may revoke, but upon every fresh inspection a similar order may from time to time be made.

7. The council may, on receiving a report from an inspector that the construction of any dairy, milking place, cowshed, milk store, milk shop, or other building in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman is defective or faulty in such a way as to prejudicially affect the health of the cows or the wholesomeness of the milk or other dairy produce, order the cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, to make alterations in any such buildings or structures within a time specified in such order; and if such alterations are not made within the time specified, the council may, by order served in the manner specified in these regulations, prohibit the sale and vending, and forwarding for sale of the milk or produce thereof, until such alterations in the buildings or structures have been made.

8. Such closet accommodation shall be provided for the persons employed on the premises of any dairy, milk store, or milk shop, and at such distance from the milking place, milk store, or milk shop, as may be directed by the council, and the closet pans on such premises shall be disinfected daily.

9. Where horses are kept on the premises of any dairy, milk store, or milk shop, such stable accommodation shall be provided, and at such distance from the milking place or milk store, or milk shop as the council may direct.

10. All houses, dairies, milking places, cowsheds, milk stores, milk shops, or other buildings or structures in the occupation of any person following the trade of cowkeeper or dairyman, shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, by affecting the milk or otherwise, and shall be thoroughly and effectively lighted and ventilated; and the drainage of all such buildings and milking places shall be so arranged that no stagnant water or refuse matter of any kind shall remain or lie in any way whatever in or upon or contiguous to any premises of such person following the trade of a cowkeeper or dairyman.

11. All yards, sheds, or other places used for keeping or holding dairy cows shall be regularly swept and be kept perfectly clean, and shall, within twenty-four hours of any order to such effect from the health officer or inspector, be fumigated, disinfected, or lime-washed, as may be in any such order so directed.

12. All vessels used for holding milk shall be thoroughly scalded and scoured daily. And no cowkeeper, dairyman, or person employed in milking or dairy work shall use in connexion with milking, or for washing vessels used for holding milk or for any dairy work, water that is in any way infected or contaminated, or contains matter injurious to health, and the health officer or inspector may, after inspection, prohibit, by order served as prescribed in clause 6 of these regulations, the use for dairy purposes of the water obtained from any well or tank or other source of water supply, and may require any tank to be cleaned and disinfected.

13. If at any time disease exists in the dairy or among the cows or cattle in any cowshed or dairy, or in the herds of any cowkeeper, dairyman, vendor, or purveyor of milk, the registered person, owner, occupier, or other person in charge, as the case may be, shall immediately give notice to the council, officer of health, or nearest member of the police force, and the milk of a diseased cow shall not be used in any way whatsoever.

14. No cowkeeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk shall keep, or permit, or suffer to be kept, any pigs in the sheds, buildings, or milking yards in which any dairy cows may be kept or sheltered.

15. No person suffering from any dangerous, infectious, or contagious disease, or dangerous infectious disease, or who has been recently in contact with any person so suffering, shall milk cows or handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way take part or assist in the conduct of such trade or business until authorized by the council, municipal clerk, or health officer so to do.

16. If any person (whether an adult or a child) living on or occupying or staying on a visit at any premises used as a grazing ground or dairy, or for cowsheds, or as a milk shop or milk store, be attacked by any dangerous infectious or contagious disease, or any dangerous infectious disease, the occupier of the house or premises in which such person is (or, if he be the person attacked, his wife or other person in charge) shall immediately give notice thereof to the council or health officer, or to the nearest member of the police force; and the council may, whether or not the person so attacked has been removed from the premises, by order served as aforesaid, prohibit absolutely the sale and vending and forwarding of milk or the produce thereof from the premises until danger, in the opinion of such council or officer of health, no longer exists, and may order the destruction of the milk or any produce thereof on the premises.

17. Every dairy, milk store, or milk shop shall be inspected once in each quarter of the year by the council's inspector, who shall furnish a report to the council on the following matters, that is to say, condition of paddocks, water supply, drains, sheds, and buildings, disposal of manure, closet and stable accommodation, storage for milk, means of scalding and cleaning vessels, cleanliness of premises, compliance with regulations.

REGULATIONS UNDER "THE FACTORIES AND SHOPS AMENDMENT ACT 1887."

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the eleventh day of March, 1890.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has, in accordance with the provisions of, and in exercise of the powers conferred by, *The Factories and Shops Amendment Act 1887*, rescinded the Regulations for the issue of certificates to engine-drivers for factories and work-rooms made by Order in Council dated the seventh day of February, 1888, and has made the subjoined Regulations for the issue of certificates to engine-drivers and boiler attendants for factories and work-rooms in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS.

Preliminary Requirements.

1. Each applicant for a certificate must forward to the Secretary for Mines, Melbourne, notice in writing of his intention to present himself for examination, such notice to be given not less than fourteen clear days prior to the date of examination.

The notice must be accompanied by cash, post-office order, postal note, or stamps to the amount or value of 10s.

Should the applicant pass the prescribed examination, the deposit shall, in each instance, go towards payment of the fee for certificate; in the event, however, of the failure of the candidate to pass the examination, such amount shall be forfeited to the consolidated revenue.

No certificate shall be issued until full payment of the fee required shall have been made to the Secretary for Mines.

Certificates of Competency.

2. The certificates of competency to be issued by the Board of Examiners shall be of two classes, namely, first and second.

A first-class certificate shall entitle the holder thereof to drive any engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room.

A second-class certificate shall entitle the holder thereof to drive any engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room the cylinder of which does not exceed twelve inches in diameter (or if two cylinders be used the combined area thereof must not exceed that of a cylinder twelve inches in diameter).

3. An applicant for a second-class certificate must produce to the Board satisfactory evidence—

(a) Of his respectability of character.

(b) That he has had not less than twelve months' experience in assisting at the working of an engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room.

(c) That he is at the date of examination not under the age of eighteen (18) years, nor over the age of fifty (50) years. The latter age not to apply to persons who have previously been drivers.

(d) That neither his eyesight nor his hearing is defective, and that he is not subject to any other mental or bodily infirmity likely to interfere with the efficient discharge of his duties.

Candidates must produce testimonials or certificates signed by their employers, and such documents must specify clearly and distinctly the class of engines they have driven. The diameter of the cylinders of the engines driven must be stated on the testimonials.

4. An applicant for a first-class certificate must produce to the Board satisfactory evidence—

(a) Of his respectability of character.

(b) That he has been the holder of a second-class certificate, under these regulations, for a period of not less than twelve months, and that he has during that period had charge of and driven a "second-class" engine for a period of not less than six months.

(c) That he is at the date of examination not under the age of nineteen (19) years, nor over the age of fifty (50) years. This latter age not to apply to persons who have previously been drivers.

(d) That neither his eyesight nor his hearing is defective, and that he is not subject to any other mental or bodily infirmity likely to interfere with the efficient discharge of his duties.

Candidates must produce testimonials or certificates, signed by their employers, and such documents must specify clearly and distinctly the class of engines they have driven. The diameter of the cylinders of the engines driven must be stated on the testimonials.

5. Provided nevertheless that at any series of examinations held at any place, under the provisions of these regulations, the Board may grant a first-class certificate of competency to any such applicant as shall satisfy the Board that he has had experience in driving, and is fully competent to drive any and every kind of engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room.

6. Candidates for certificates of competency will be examined as to their practical knowledge and working of machinery, including steam engines and all connections, boilers, and mountings, or any other machinery used in or in connection with a factory or work-room.

7. If a candidate shall fail to pass the examination prescribed, he shall not again present himself until a period of not less than six months shall have elapsed from the date of his last examination.

Certificates of Service.

8. The certificates of service to be issued by the Board of Examiners shall be of two classes, namely, first and second.

(a) A first-class certificate shall entitle the holder thereof to drive any engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room.

(b) A second-class certificate shall entitle the holder thereof to drive any engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room the cylinder of which does not exceed twelve inches in diameter (or if two cylinders be used the combined area thereof must not exceed that of a cylinder twelve inches in diameter).

9. First-class certificates of service will be granted to such candidates as satisfy the Board that they have been in charge of and have efficiently managed and driven an engine the cylinder of which is more than twelve inches in diameter, or a double cylinder engine the cylinders of which have an area equal to a single cylinder of more than twelve inches in diameter, used in or in connection with a factory or work-room for a period of not less than twelve months prior to 3rd November, 1883.

10. Second-class certificates of service will be granted to such candidates as satisfy the Board that they have been in charge of and have efficiently managed and driven an engine used in or in connection with a factory or work-room the cylinder of which does not exceed twelve inches in diameter (or if two cylinders be used the combined area thereof does not exceed that of a cylinder twelve inches in diameter) for a period of not less than twelve months prior to 3rd November, 1883.

12. If a candidate attempt to obtain a certificate of service or of competency by means of false testimonials, he shall not be allowed to again present himself to the Board of Examiners for examination until a period of not less than twelve months shall have elapsed from the date of his last examination.

Examinations.

13. Examinations will be conducted by the Board at such times and places as may from time to time be notified by the Secretary in the *Government Gazette* and in a newspaper or newspapers published or circulated in the locality, and candidates will be examined according to priority of receipt of notice required by clause 1.

Miscellaneous.

14. Whenever a person proves to the satisfaction of the Board of Examiners that he has, without fault on his part, lost or been deprived of any certificate previously granted to him under the provisions of *The Factories and Shops Amendment Act 1887*, such Board shall, upon payment of such fee, if any, as they may direct, but not exceeding the fee specified in the schedule hereto, cause a copy of the certificate to which the applicant appears to be entitled to be made out and certified by the Secretary to the Board, and delivered to the applicant, and any copy so made and certified as aforesaid shall have the effect of the original certificate. The fee, if any, herein referred to shall be paid to the Secretary for Mines in cash, stamps, postal note, or post-office order, and shall by him be paid into the consolidated revenue.

15. The holder of a second-class certificate of competency issued under *The Regulation of Mines and Mining Machinery Act 1883* and *The Factories and Shops Amendment Act 1887* shall be entitled to drive any "second-class" engine under either Act.

16. Every certificate of competency or service issued under *The Factories and Shops Amendment Act 1887* shall specify the name, place, and date of birth of the person to whom such certificate is issued.

18. No person in charge of steam machinery used in or in connection with any factory or work-room shall, under any pretext whatever, unless relieved by a competent person for that purpose, absent himself or cease to have continual supervision of such machinery during the time such machinery is at work.

Disqualification of Holder of Certificate.

19. Any person holding a certificate of competency or of service as an engine-driver, and who is charged with any offence or misconduct likely to be detrimental to the proper or efficient discharge of his duties, may be called upon by the Board of Examiners to show cause why he should not be disqualified as a certificated engine-driver; and if he fail to satisfy the said Board, he may, by an order of the Governor in Council, published in the *Government Gazette*, be disqualified for any period from acting as engine-driver.

Any such person shall, after such order, deliver into the charge of the said Board his certificate of competency or of service, which shall be retained by the said Board during the period of his disqualification, and no such person shall, during the period of such disqualification, take charge of any machinery in which steam or air is used as motive power.

The Board may, if they think fit, hold an inquiry into the conduct of an engine-driver accused of any of the foregoing offences; and with respect to such inquiry the following provisions shall have effect:—

(1) The inquiry shall be held at such time and place as the Board may appoint, the engine-driver to have the right to engage counsel to defend him at such inquiry. He shall receive fourteen days' notice of the Board's intention to hold the inquiry, and if the engine-driver intends to employ counsel he shall give seven days' notice of such intention to the Secretary to the Board.

(2) The Secretary to the Board shall, before the commencement of the inquiry, furnish to the engine-driver a statement of the case upon which the inquiry is instituted.

(3) The engine-driver shall attend such inquiry, and may produce such evidence as may be considered necessary.

(4) The Board shall, upon the conclusion of the inquiry, forward to the Minister of Mines a report containing a full statement of the case and their opinion thereon.

(5) An engine-driver may, in addition to disqualification, be compelled to defray all or part of the expenses of any inquiry which may be held under the provisions of this clause.

The Board may examine candidates, and grant certificates of competency to such of them as satisfy the said Board that they have had the necessary experience as engine-drivers of any class of steam engines other than factory ones.

Every holder of a second-class certificate under these regulations must produce such certificate to the Board previous to his being examined for a first-class one, and in the event of the latter certificate being granted, his second-class one shall be surrendered and delivered up to the Board.

The Board may grant certificates of competency to boiler attendants in cases where steam boilers only are used, and where no engine or engine-driver is employed.

An applicant for a certificate of competency as boiler attendant must produce to the Board satisfactory evidence—

(a) Of his respectability of character.

(b) That he has had not less than six months' experience in assisting to work a steam boiler used in or in connection with a factory or work-room.

(c) That he is, at the date of examination, not under the age of eighteen (18), nor over the age of fifty (50) years. The latter age is not to apply to persons who have previously worked steam boilers.

(d) That neither his eyesight nor his hearing is defective, and that he is not subject to any other mental or bodily infirmity likely to interfere with the efficient discharge of his duties.

A document signed by the applicant's employers bearing on this clause may be considered satisfactory evidence.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict. No. 506, § 19, 38, and 49) it is amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council may from time to time make Orders, amongst other things, to sever any portion of Victoria forming part of a municipal district from such municipal district, and annex the same to any other municipal district with which the portion so severed forms one continuous area, and from time to time make any apportionment of property rights and liabilities, and give any directions as to any matters and things that may be necessary to do justice as between the municipalities concerned; and every such Order shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, and shall take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas the powers conferred upon the Governor by the above Act are now exercised upon a petition of certain ratepayers of the Shire of Alberton therein described, and notices of such petition have been published in the manner prescribed in the forty-sixth section of the same Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth by this present Order sever from the West Riding of the Shire of Alberton the portion described in such petition, and doth direct that the portion so severed from such shire shall be annexed to the Shire of Woorayl as a separate Riding to be called the South Riding of the said Shire, and with the advice aforesaid doth hereby re-define the boundaries of the said Shire of Woorayl, as hereby enlarged, and of the South Riding thereof, and of the said Shire of Alberton, together with its West Riding hereby reduced, as hereinafter described, that is to say:—

WOORAYL SHIRE.—ENLARGED AND RE-DEFINED.

Commencing at the north-west angle of the parish of Korumburra; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of the parishes of Korumburra, Koorooman, and part of Mardian to the most southern angle of allotment 85, parish of Allambes East; thence north-easterly by road forming the south-eastern boundaries of allotments 85, 86, and 87, all of the said parish; thence north-west by the road forming the north-eastern boundary of allotment 87 to the southern angle of allotment 88; thence north-easterly by the boundaries of allotments 88 and 90, and north-westerly by the eastern boundary of the said allotment 90 to the south-west angle of allotment 91; thence north-easterly by the south-eastern boundaries of allotments 91, 92, and part of 93 to the west angle of allotment 95; thence east by the south boundary of the last-named allotment to the west boundary of allotment 96 (all in the parish of Allambes East); thence south by the west boundary and east by the south boundary of the last-named allotment to the road forming the west boundary of allotments 30 and 31, parish of Narraean South; thence south by same road to the south-west angle of the allotment last named; thence east by the south boundary of said allotment and a line in continuation thereof to the west boundary of the village reserve; thence south by the west boundary of said reserve to its intersection by the Morwell and Mirboo railway line; thence easterly by said railway line to the intersection thereof by the west boundary of the shire of Traralgon, as defined in *Gazette* of the 20th January, 1888; thence by a direct line southerly to the north-west corner of Matthew Rout's selection, in the parish of Mirboo; thence southerly by the west boundary of said selection and of allotments 5, 6, 7, 14, and 15 to the south-west angle of the last-named allotment; thence west by a road on the south boundary of allotment 30 and part of allotment 34 to the termination of said road at Lydiard's Track; thence southerly by Lydiard's Track to the Tarwan River; thence south-west by the Tarwan River to the eastern boundary of the parish of Nerrena; thence southerly by that boundary and the eastern boundary of the parishes of Meeniyah and Tarwin South to the south-east angle of the parish last named; thence easterly by the northern boundary of the parish of Waratah to the Waratah Bay; thence following the sea-coast southerly, westerly, and north-westerly to the boundary between the counties of Mornington and Buln Buln; thence northerly by said boundary to the commencing point.

Separate tenders will be received for each schedule, but they must include the whole of the articles therein mentioned, and a separate price must be stated for each article, for one and three years respectively. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. The value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c.

Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour may be required in the packing of stores.

Tenders having alterations or erasures therein will not be entertained.

Security will be required either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt in favour of the Deputy Postmaster-General, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

Tenders must be accompanied by bank notes, or a bank draft in favour of the Deputy Postmaster-General, for the amount of the deposit required (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

The security will be calculated at Ten per cent. on the total amount of contract.

The security must be completed within ten days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

In the event of the contractor failing to carry out the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Persons failing to take up their contracts will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The Postmaster-General will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractors for all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only for such articles, and such quantities of those articles, as the Postmaster-General may order from time to time; neither will the Postmaster-General be bound to take from the contractors any larger supply of any of the articles than may be shown upon the orders which have been issued during the year, nor will he be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedules for which orders have not been issued. Should the Postmaster-General require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, the contractor will be bound to supply the same at the contract rate.

2. The supplies are to be according to sample, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. In other cases the supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds of manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality be equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. All orders must accompany the goods on delivery, otherwise the goods will not be received. Delivery, as a rule, is to be of the full quantity ordered.

4. Supplies ordered for delivery in Melbourne to be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.) within a radius of six miles from the General Post Office.

5. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the Supervisor of Maintenance, General Post Office.

6. Orders must receive prompt execution; and in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the officer named in condition 5, or the head of the department, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account.

7. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form simultaneously with delivery of the full quantities of goods ordered, the account being rendered with order to which it relates. The prices quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

8. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer named in condition 5. The contractor may, however, claim a survey on any goods objected to; but in that case he must, within twenty-four hours after objection is made, give notice thereof in writing to the officer rejecting the goods.

9. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. All articles rejected must be immediately replaced by the contractor, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in condition 6.

10. The members of boards of survey will be appointed by the Government, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be procured elsewhere, and the survey fees and extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 6.

11. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of a delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report, to such mulct, not exceeding fifty pounds, as the Postmaster-General may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 6, or from the contractor's security. It will also be in the power of the Postmaster-General, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

12. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised.

13. It will be competent either for the contractor on his own behalf, or for the Postmaster-General, to terminate the contract, by giving notice, in writing, of three full calendar months to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

14. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Postmaster-General, or the contractor, as the case may be, will make a proportionate allowance by way of deduction from, or increase to, the price of the item so affected.

15. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or violated by the importation of stores for the Electric Telegraph Service, or by any contracts made by the Imperial Commissariat or the Agent-General for Victoria, or by any contracts or agreements made for any works or supplies by the Department of Public Works, or the Tender Board, or on account of other Governments; or by any article being made at, and supplied for the use of, any Government establishment; or by the consumption of the surplus stock of any Government establishment.

Schedules as above, giving an estimate of the articles required, and printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, by whom also the samples will be shown and any information or explanation afforded to persons tendering.

Separate tenders will be received for each schedule, but they must include the whole of the articles therein mentioned, and a separate price must be stated for each article.

The total amount of tender must be stated in words as well as in figures.

Tenders having alterations or erasures therein will not be entertained.

Tenders must be accompanied by the preliminary deposit as shown above in bank notes, or a bank draft in favour of the Secretary of the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

Security will be required either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt in favour of the Secretary of the Tender Board, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

The security is calculated at Ten per cent. upon contracts not exceeding £1,000, and at Five per cent. over that sum; but no deviation will be allowed from the amounts above stated.

The security must be completed and contract signed within ten days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Persons failing to take up their contracts will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

Tenders, enclosed in a separate envelope, and having the words "Tender for —" (as the case may be) written thereon, must be deposited in the Tender-box at the Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The Government will not be bound to order from the contractor all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only those articles, and such quantities of those articles, as it may be found necessary to order. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates.

2. The supplies are to be the same as sample where so stated, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. In other cases the supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. The value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour may be required in the packing of stores.

4. All orders for supplies will emanate from the departments requiring the goods. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted, and shall return the order to the contractor.

5. Supplies ordered for delivery in Melbourne and Williamstown districts are to be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.), and, for the purposes of these contracts, Melbourne district will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra.

6. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the officers ordering the goods.

7. Orders must receive prompt execution; and, in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the officers named in condition 6, or the head of the department to whom the goods are to be supplied, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies, or any like supplies that are suitable for the service, at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

8. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form as soon as possible after delivery of the full quantities of goods ordered, the account being accompanied by the receipted delivery orders on which it is based. The prices quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

9. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. The contractor may, however, claim a survey on any goods objected to; but in that case he must, within twenty-four hours after objection is made, give notice thereof in writing to the officer rejecting the goods. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor.

10. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carriers to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall, as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 13 of these conditions.

11. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies rejected or returned, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in condition 7.

12. The members of boards of survey will be appointed by the Treasurer of the colony for the time being, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it, or any like supply that is suitable for the service, will be procured elsewhere, and the survey fees and extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 7.

13. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the said Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 7. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money.

14. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

15. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

16. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Imperial Commissariat or the Agent-General for Victoria, or by any contracts or agreements made for any works or supplies by the Departments of Public Works and Defence, or on account of other Governments, or for the Telegraph or Railway Departments, or for supplies to the Aborigines, or for connections and fittings of Diamond Drills; or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment; or by the consumption of the surplus stock of any Government establishment.

17. In the event of any alteration in the tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government will neither claim any decrease upon the contract price nor entertain any application from a contractor for any increase to it.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR A RACE-COURSE AND OTHER PURPOSES OF PUBLIC RECREATION IN THE PARISH OF STRANGWAYS AT NEWSTEAD.

WHEREAS by the Crown grant issued in favour of James Charles House, John Kyd, John Treacy, James Sheehan, and John McGuinness (hereinafter and hereinafter designated the said trustees) in respect of the reserve for a racecourse and other purposes of public recreation in the parish of Strangways at Newstead, it is provided and declared that the land thereby granted, and the buildings for the time being thereon, shall be maintained and used as and for a racecourse and for other purposes of public recreation, and offices and conveniences connected therewith, under and in accordance with such regulations for the preservation of good order and decency therein as shall from time to time be made by the said trustees or the survivors of them or other the trustees for the time being of the said land and premises (such survivors or other trustees not being less than two in number at the making of such regulations), such regulations to be approved by the Governor or Administrator of the Government of the colony of Victoria for the time being, acting with the advice of the Executive Council. Now, therefore, the said trustees do hereby make, in lieu of the regulations heretofore in force in respect of the said reserve for a racecourse and other purposes of public recreation in the parish of Strangways at Newstead, the regulations following in respect thereof, and submit the same to His Excellency the Governor in Council for approval:—

REGULATIONS.

1. The reserve, which is parcelled out into the divisions set forth hereunder, shall be open to the public free of charge from sunrise to sunset, except on such days (not to exceed four in any one year) as the reserve may be set apart by the said trustees for the holding therein of races:—(1) the grand stand, lawn, saddling paddock, stewards' stand, and weighing yard, all of which are enclosed partly by a close fence and partly by a picket fence. (2) The portion of the ground known as the hill reserve, and which is enclosed partly by a picket fence and partly by the boundary fence. (3) The remainder of the reserve, excepting such parts (if any) as may hereafter be enclosed and set apart for plantations.

2. The scale of charges or fees which may be levied and taken on the occasion of races for admission to the first, second, and third divisions of the reserve and the buildings thereon shall be as follows:—

For admission to the first division of every person, Five shillings.

For admission to the second division of every person, whether on horseback or on foot, or in a vehicle, Two shillings.

For admission of every horse to the second division, Two shillings.

For admission to the second division of every vehicle drawn by one horse, Two shillings.

For admission to the second division of every vehicle drawn by more than one horse, Two shillings for each horse.

For admission to the third division of every person, One shilling.

Provided always that the said trustees may exempt any member of a racing club wholly or partially from the payment of all or any such charges or fees; and the money so received shall, after deducting necessary expenses, be applied in the permanent improvement of the reserve for racing purposes, or in the erection, maintenance, or repair of buildings and fences, or the planting of trees and shrubs in the reserve, and in prizes for any race, or for the owner of any horse engaged in any race, or in such other manner in or upon the reserve as shall be necessary or expedient for the purpose of rendering the same more convenient for racing or other purposes of public recreation.

3. No horse, except a racehorse engaged in the races, or any vehicle of any kind whatsoever, shall be admitted to the first division of the reserve, and no horse or vehicle shall be admitted to the third division thereof.

4. The scale of charges or fees which may be levied and taken for the admission of horses to the reserve, for the purpose of training or exercising, shall be as follows:—

For every horse engaged in the Newstead races only, Five shillings.

For every other horse, One pound for every year.

5. No person, unless otherwise permitted under these regulations, shall enter upon the reserve, or any division or part thereof, unless such person shall have a ticket duly authorizing him in that behalf.

6. No person who has been proved to the satisfaction of the said trustees to have been guilty of malpractice or dishonorable conduct in connexion with racing, or to be a defaulter, shall enter upon the reserve, or any division or part thereof.

7. Every member of the Newstead Jockey Club, and every person paying for admission to the first, second, or third division, shall be supplied with a ticket of admission, which he shall upon demand produce, or (if required) surrender, to any gatekeeper, servant, or other person having authority from the said trustees to demand the production or surrender of the same.

8. Persons renting or hiring for any race-meeting the grandstand, or any portion thereof, or any booth upon the reserve, shall abide by any order given by the said trustees in reference to the reserve and the buildings and other erections thereon.

9. No person shall bring any dog into the reserve, or into any division or part thereof, or into any building thereon.

10. Any person committing in the reserve, or any division or part thereof, or in any of the buildings or erections for the time being thereon, any of the following offences shall be liable to be removed from the reserve, notwithstanding such person may have purchased, and is or may be in possession of, a ticket of admission:—

1. Assaulting any other person.
2. Being drunk.
3. Riding, crossing, or trespassing upon the course, or any part of it, during a race-meeting, or when the horses are preparing or prepared to start, or are running for any race.
4. Using any profane, indecent, or obscene language.
5. Using any threatening, abusive, or insulting words.
6. Behaving improperly or riotously.
7. Being found in the first, second, or third division, and not producing upon demand, or not surrendering (if required), to any gatekeeper, servant, or other person having authority from the said trustees to demand production of the same, a ticket duly authorizing admission to such division, unless the person so found shall forthwith satisfy the said trustees that the proper charge for admission has been paid by him, and that his ticket has been lost or surrendered.
8. Obtaining admission to the reserve, or any part or division thereof, when disentitled to such admission under these regulations.
9. Remaining in the reserve, or any division or part thereof, after having been warned off any part of the reserve.

11. No person shall, after the first day of March, One thousand eight hundred and ninety, carry on any trade, business, or calling whatever on any portion of the reserve other than upon such portions as may be respectively set apart by the said trustees for the carrying on of any such trades, businesses, or callings, and then only when he shall have obtained the consent in writing of the said trustees.

12. No person shall, after the first day of March, One thousand eight hundred and ninety, carry on the trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker on any portion of the reserve unless he shall comply with the following conditions:—

1. That he be registered annually as a bookmaker by the trustees, committee, or stewards of the Newstead Jockey Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards.
2. That, during the time he shall be in or upon the reserve carrying on his trade, business, or calling of a bookmaker, he shall wear a ticket to be supplied by the said trustees, committee, or stewards of the Newstead Jockey Club, or those authorized by such trustees, committee, or stewards, which ticket shall be visible to the public, and shall have thereon his name.

13. No person shall climb or jump over the gates or fences, stick bills thereon, or cut names on the fences, trees, or seats, or roll or throw stones in the reserve.

14. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, flowers, buildings, or fences in and around the reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein, except with the consent in writing of the said trustees.

15. No person shall, except as hereinbefore provided, bring any horse or vehicle into the reserve without the permission in writing of the said trustees.

16. No person shall put in the reserve any cattle, goats, or pigs without the permission in writing of the said trustees: Provided always that the moneys received for agistment shall be expended in the maintenance and improvement of the reserve.

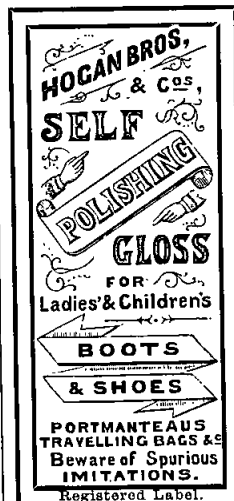
