NOTE.—During the first quarter of 1890 the excess of registered births over registered deaths was 3,420, viz., 1,484 of males, and 1,936 of females; and the excess of recorded arrivals over recorded and unrecorded departures (the latter being estimated) was 3,745, viz., 2,295 of males, and 1,450 of females. The total gain to the population was thus 7,165, viz., 3,779 males, and 3,386 females, as shown in the table.

The natural increase in the quarter (3,420) exceeded that in the first quarter of last year by 366. This was due to the fact that whilst the births were fewer by 36, the deaths were fewer by as many as 402. The net gain by immigration (3,745) exceeded that in the first quarter of 1889 by 666, due to an increase of 3,942 in the arrivals, less an increase of 3,276 in the departures. The total increase of population was thus greater by 1,032 in the quarter under review than in the corresponding period of the previous year.

The total allowance for unrecorded departures since the census of 1881 was taken, has been 49,208, viz., 39,045 males, and 10,163 females. Had no such allowance been made, the apparent population at the end of March would have been 1,174,401, viz., 636,622 males, and 537,779 females.

An estimate based upon returns made annually by the municipal authorities of the populations of their respective districts, supplemented by an allowance for such portions of the colony as have not been brought under local self-government, gives the total population at the end of March as 1,116,515, or 8,678 less than the estimate given in the table.

The total excess of recorded arrivals over recorded departures during the quarter was 5,724. The greatest gain to the population being from Tasmania, 3,181; the next from New South Wales and Queensland, 1,355; that from the United Kingdom, 952; and New Zealand, 671. On the other hand, there was a loss, by excess of departures over arrivals, to South and Western Australia of 269, and to Foreign Countries 166. All the arrivals and departures referred to are by sea.

THE WESTERN WIMMERA IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY TRUST.—REGULATION.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the subjoined Regulation made by the Commissioners of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, under the provisions of section 95 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*.

THE Commissioners of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, in pursuance of the powers conferred by Section 95 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, do make the following regulation:—

REGULATION No. 3.

1. All water supplied from the works of the Trust for the irrigation of land shall be paid for by measure. All measurements of water shall be by gauges of such form and pattern as may be adopted and fixed by the Trust. The registration of the quantities of water delivered shall be made by the Trust's officers.

2. All irrigation regulating outlets and stops required from any of the channels or works of the Trust, including the removal or alteration of the position of the outlets, shall be constructed by the Trust upon the application only of owners of the land to be supplied from such outlet or outlets, or of occupiers of the said land endorsed or approved by such owners, and the landowners for whose use they are shall bear half the cost.

3. All applications for the construction of irrigation regulating outlets and stops shall be dealt with by the engineer to the Trust.

4. Only one outlet shall be allowed to each owner or occupier of land up to three hundred and twenty acres, and one for every additional three hundred and twenty acres or fraction thereof,

except in such cases where the Trust may order otherwise, or the full cost of the construction of the said outlet is paid by the applicant.

5. Outlets may be fixed at any suitable spot most convenient to the applicant, subject to the approval of the engineer to the Trust.

6. All outlets, whether their cost of construction or only a portion thereof has been paid by the owner or occupier of the land to be supplied from such outlet, shall remain absolutely under the control of the Trust, and shall not be interfered with either by such owner or occupier or any other person in any way whatsoever, except with the express sanction of the Trust in writing, and under the supervision of its engineer or other responsible officer.

7. The rate or price to be paid for water delivered from the works of the Trust for irrigation purposes shall be One shilling per inch per acre for all land, including gardens, payment in all cases to be made in advance.

8. All persons agreeing to take water from the works of the Trust shall take delivery thereof through their respective outlets at such times, in such order, and in such manner as the engineer to the Trust shall direct. No person shall be supplied with a less quantity of water than is equal to the value of two pounds sterling. And the delivery of water may be continued on Sundays and holidays as well as on ordinary working days.

9. Every person agreeing to take water from the works of the Trust shall receive notification of the dates and quantities in which it will be delivered to him.

10. The outlets for the delivery of water shall be opened only by the authorized officers of the Trust, and no person other than such officers shall, under any circumstances (unless by the express written sanction of the engineer), open any such outlet, or otherwise do any act that may permit of the escape of water from the channels or works of the Trust.

11. No person shall trespass along the works or upon the lands of the Trust to the hindrance of Trust servants, annoyance of adjacent landowners, damage to works or adjacent property or crops, and to stock depasturing on adjacent lands.

12. Any person who shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation shall be liable, for any such offence to a penalty not exceeding the sum of Fifty pounds, which may be recovered in accordance with the provisions of section 217 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*.

The foregoing Regulation, numbered three, was made by the Commissioners of the Western Wimmera Irrigation and Water Supply Trust, under and by virtue of section 95 of *The Irrigation Act 1886*, this second day of May, 1889.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirteenth day of May, 1890.

WHEREAS by the *Local Government Act 1874* (38 Vict. No. 506) it was amongst other things enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council might, from time to time, make Orders, amongst other things, to subdivide or re-subdivide any municipal district into any number of subdivisions not exceeding eight; and every such Order should be published in the *Government Gazette*, and should take effect as from the day of such publication; And whereas a petition purporting to be signed by more than one-fourth of the ratepayers whose names are for the time being inscribed on the municipal roll of the City of Richmond has been presented to the Governor in Council, the substance and prayer of which petition were published in the *Government Gazette* of the twenty-eighth day of March, 1890, and no counter petition received: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order abolish all previous subdivisions of the City of Richmond, and, in compliance with the prayer of the petition hereinbefore mentioned, doth hereby re-subdivide the said City of Richmond into five separate wards, the names and boundaries of which shall be as follow, that is to say:—

NORTH WARD.

Commencing at a point on the city boundary at the intersection of Hoddle-street and Highett-street; thence easterly along the last-named street to Burnley-street; thence north along that street to the city boundary; thence following the city boundary westerly and southerly to the point of commencement.

WEST WARD.

Commencing at a point on the city boundary at the intersection of Hoddle-street and Highett-street; thence easterly along Highett-street to Church-street; thence southerly by that street to Swan-street; thence westerly by Swan-street to the city boundary; thence northerly by said boundary to the point of commencement.

CENTRAL WARD.

Commencing at the intersection of Church-street and Highett-street; thence southerly along Church-street to Swan-street; thence easterly along Swan-street to Burnley-street; thence northerly along Burnley-street to Highett-street; thence westerly along Highett-street to the point of commencement.

EAST WARD.

Commencing at a point on the city boundary at its intersection with Burnley-street and Victoria-street; thence southerly by Burnley-street to the city boundary; thence following said boundary easterly, northerly, and westerly to the point of commencement.

SOUTH WARD.

Commencing at a point on the city boundary at the intersection of Swan-street and Hoddle-street; thence easterly along Swan-street to Burnley-street; thence southerly by that street to the city boundary; thence following said boundary westerly and northerly to the point of commencement.

The city boundary above referred to is that described in the *Government Gazette* of the 24th April, 1855.

Wherever the line described as aforesaid runs beside or along a river, creek, or road, whether specially described or not, the centre of such river, creek, or road shall be taken to be the boundary line.

The Vermin Destruction Act 1889.

SHIRE OF WINCHELSEA.—LOAN.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirteenth day of May, 1890.

WHEREAS under the provisions of *The Vermin Destruction Act 1889*, No. 1028, it is among other things provided that on the application of the council of any shire the Governor in Council, out of any moneys which may be provided by Parliament for the purpose, may from time to time grant a loan to any such shire for the purpose of enabling such shire to obtain materials for wire-netting or other rabbit-proof or vermin-proof fencing, to be supplied to owners of land in special areas constituted under the said Act: And whereas the Council of the Shire of Winchelsea has received petitions signed by a majority in number of the owners of land in the special area (the petitioners owning more than one-half of the land in such area), describing the special area for which the petitioners desire a loan to be obtained by the shire, which petitions contain statements of the area of the whole of such special area, and of the area owned by each and every owner of every part thereof, with a short description of the land owned by each petitioner, and of the area thereof, and gives an estimate of the probable cost of the whole of the materials for wire-netting or other rabbit-proof or vermin-proof fencing required for the land in such area, and asks that the said shire council will apply to the Governor in Council for a loan of the amount of such estimate, and gives an estimate of the materials required for each petitioner's land, and the probable cost of such material, and an estimate of the extent of fencing to be erected by each owner; and states that in such special area adjoining properties could advantageously be enclosed by one continuous wire-netting fence; "and states in each case the estimated cost of such continuous fence, and the proportions thereof to be borne by every owner of property to be enclosed by such fence"; and states that each petitioner signing the petitions undertakes to pay to the council in each and every year one-tenth part of his proportion of the value of all materials for wire-netting fencing which the council may obtain by means of the loan proposed to be obtained from the Governor in Council, and that such undertaking as between each petitioner or the owner for the time being of the land of such petitioner, or any part thereof, and the said shire council is to be deemed to be and may be enforced as a speciality contract, and states that each petitioner undertakes to erect on his land, with the materials with which he may be furnished wire-netting fencing to the satisfaction of the said council, or that he will join with other owners in erecting all necessary fencing: And whereas every signature to such petitions is verified by the solemn declaration of a person signing such petitions, which declaration is in the form or to the effect in the Eighth Schedule to the said Act.

And whereas the said shire council has considered the prayer of such petitions, and has determined to apply for a loan from the Governor in Council in accordance therewith, and has transmitted to the Minister the said petitions, accompanied by an application under seal on behalf of the said shire for a loan of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings in the terms therein stated, which said application contains an undertaking by the said shire to repay such loan, in accordance with the provisions of the said recited Act and of any Order in Council granting such loan: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby order that the sum of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings being the whole of the amount applied for by the said shire council in the application hereinbefore referred to, be granted out of the moneys provided by Parliament as a loan to the said Shire of Winchelsea for the purposes of Part II. of the said *The Vermin Destruction Act 1889*.

That the said sum of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings be paid to the council in one instalment of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings.

That the said sum of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings be a loan for the benefit of the whole land described in the petitions.

That the said sum of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings be a loan for the benefit of the land specified in the schedule hereunder.

That the proportion of the said sum of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings to be paid by each and every owner of land within the special area to the said shire council is that set out in the schedule hereunder.

That the said sum of One thousand nine hundred and eighty-four pounds ten shillings be repaid by the council of the said shire to the Secretary for Lands for the time being, within ten years, by annual instalments of not less than One hundred and ninety-eight pounds nine shillings each. The first of such payments to be made on or before the thirty-first day of May, 1891, and a further instalment of not less than One hundred and ninety-eight pounds nine shillings on or before the thirty-first day of May in each and every succeeding year until the whole sum of One

The Aborigines Protection Act 1886.

REGULATIONS RELATING TO HALF-CASTES.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the thirteenth day of May, 1890.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor.

Mr. Gillies
Mr. WrixonDr. Pearson
Mr. Derham.

WHEREAS by *The Aborigines Protection Act 1886* it is among other things enacted that the Governor may from time to time make regulations and orders for the purposes set forth in section 8 of the said Act. Now therefore the Governor in Council doth by this present order make the following regulations:—

The words "prescribed station" in these regulations shall mean "any place now or hereafter to be prescribed by the Governor as the place where any aboriginal or tribe of aboriginals shall reside."

1. *Licences.*—On the recommendation of the general inspector or the manager of a prescribed station, the Board may in cases of illness, infirmity, or other necessitous circumstances, issue a licence, signed by the secretary of the Board, to any half-caste or child of half-caste to reside for a period of three months upon any prescribed station; and the Board may renew such licence for a like period as often as it may think fit, and may at any time cancel such licence.

2. *Discipline.*—Any half-caste or child of half-caste who may be permitted under a licence to reside at a prescribed station shall be under the control of the manager of such station, and shall strictly adhere to the regulations of the Board, for the management of such stations.

3. *Misconduct.*—Any half-caste or child of half-castes may, with the approval of the Board, be dismissed and removed from any prescribed station for misconduct on the advice of the manager of such station or the general inspector.

4. *Rations.*—Any half-caste who may be permitted to reside on any prescribed station shall receive the following supply of rations weekly:—7lbs. of bread or 8lbs. of flour, 2lbs. of sugar, ½lb. of tea, 7lbs. of meat when obtainable, and rice, oatmeal, and salt, in such quantities as the manager of the station may think necessary.

Children under ten years of age shall receive half of the above supply of rations.

5. *Clothing, Medical Attendance, &c.*—Any half-caste, or child of half-castes, who may be permitted to reside on any prescribed station shall be supplied with clothing and blankets as heretofore, and medical attendance and comforts may be granted by special permission of the Board.

6. *Work Necessary.*—Every able-bodied half-caste residing on a prescribed station shall do a reasonable amount of work, and any one persistently refusing to do so when required shall have his supplies stopped.

7. *Interference with Children's Supplies.*—If any half-caste having his supplies so stopped, use the supplies of any half-caste child, or in any way deprive any half-caste child thereof, he shall be reported to the Board.

8. *Travelling.*—The granting of railway passes to half-castes shall be limited to urgent and needful cases only, and travelling discouraged and prevented as much as possible.

9. *Acquisition of Land.*—Before any half-caste can receive any assistance from the Board to select or acquire Crown lands or private property, or to improve the same, the Board must be satisfied that he is sober, honest, and industrious; and if living on a prescribed station, he must produce a certificate to that effect from the manager of such station, or from a respectable householder if not living on a prescribed station.

10. *Loans for Improvements.*—Loans may be made by the Board to any such half-caste on the security of such property for the purpose of enabling him to erect boundary fences, or houses, but such assistance shall not exceed half the cost thereof, nor £100 in the aggregate.

11. *Advances on Land and Security thereof.*—In exceptional cases the Board may advance money towards the payment of rent or purchase money of any land acquired by a half-caste on the security of such land, further security being taken that any money advanced by the Board shall be repaid with interest if required before any sale or assignment of such land shall be made by such half-caste.

12. *Custody of Titles, &c.*—All leases, licences, or titles of land upon which the Board has advanced money shall be in the custody of the Board.

13. *Apprentices, &c.*—The general inspector, with the approval of the Board, may license or apprentice, in a lawful manner, to any trade or occupation any male or female half-caste child over 14 years of age to any person or persons of approved respectability.

14. Girls shall not be apprenticed or sent to service to single gentlemen, or hotel or boarding-house keepers.

15. Half-castes licensed to service and apprentices shall be provided with female protection and sleeping accommodation to be approved of by officers authorized by the Board to inspect them.

16. All persons to whom boys or girls are licensed or apprenticed shall properly feed and lodge them, and also provide them with medicines and medical attendance when necessary, and also see that their persons, clothing, &c., are kept clean and healthy.

17. One-half of the wages of every half-caste child licensed to service and of every apprentice shall be paid quarterly, viz.:—On the 1st January, April, July, and October, and sent by the employer to the General Inspector of the Board, who shall have such money placed to such child's credit in a savings bank, and paid to such child at the end of his or her service or apprenticeship, and the other half shall be paid to the child at the end of each quarter's service or apprenticeship.

18. Apprentices and half-castes licensed to service shall be allowed, when practicable, to attend divine service and Sunday school, and their moral training shall be duly cared for by their employer.

19. If within three months after the execution of any indenture the employer shall not be satisfied with the apprentice, the child may be returned to the Board, and the indenture shall be cancelled.

20. In the event of any change of residence by any employer, written intimation thereof shall be given by him at once to the General Inspector of the Board.

21. Every employer shall forward to the General Inspector so often as he shall require written reports on the conduct of any

child in his service or apprenticed to him, and shall allow such child to write to the Board at such times as it may deem necessary.

22. In the event of any child becoming seriously ill, dying, absconding, leaving, or meeting with an accident, information shall at once be given by the employer to the General Inspector of the Board, and in the event of a child absconding, information shall also at once be given by the employer to the local police, who shall take immediate steps to recover and return the child.

23. *Application for.*—The Board shall provide a printed form of application for the use of those who desire to obtain children as apprentices or servants, and such form shall be filled up with the following particulars:

FORM OF APPLICATION.

- (a) Name, address, profession, or occupation of applicant.
- (b) Whether married or single.
- (c) Religious denomination and family of applicant.
- (d) Ages of male members of family.
- (e) Particulars of sleeping accommodation.
- (f) Name of child applied for.
- (g) Description of work to be performed or trade to be learned by child.
- (h) Reference to two reliable persons (one if possible a minister of religion) as to the respectability of the applicant.

24. Indenture.—

FORM OF INDENTURE.

TENDERS FOR UNIFORM CLOTHING FOR THE PERMANENT FORCE.

TENDERS will be received until Ten o'clock a.m. on Friday, the 23rd May, from persons willing to supply Uniform Clothing as may be ordered by the Victorian Government, from the 1st June, 1890, to the 30th June, 1893.

Schedules giving an estimate of the articles required, and printed forms of tender may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, or the Controller, Naval and Military Stores, by whom also the samples will be shown and any information or explanation afforded to persons tendering.

The total amount of tender must be stated in words as well as in figures.

Tenders having alterations or erasures therein will not be entertained.

Tenders must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit of Ten pounds in bank notes, or a bank draft in favour of the Secretary of the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

Security to the amount of £100 will be required either in Government debentures, bank deposit-receipt in favour of the Secretary of the Tender Board, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

The security must be completed and contract signed within ten days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

Persons failing to take up their contracts will be disqualified from tendering for Government supplies for a period of twelve months.

Tenders, enclosed in an envelope, and having the words "Tender for Uniform Clothing for the Permanent Force" written thereon, must be deposited in the Tender-box at the Pay Office, Treasury, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The Government will not be bound to order from the contractor all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only those articles, and such quantities of those articles, as it may be

found necessary to order. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates.

2. The supplies are to be the same as sample where so stated, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. In other cases the supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. The value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour may be required in the packing of stores.

4. All orders for supplies will emanate from the departments requiring the goods. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted, and shall return the order to the contractor.

5. Supplies ordered for delivery in Melbourne and Williamstown districts are to be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.), and, for the purposes of these contracts, Melbourne district will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra.

6. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the officers ordering the goods.

7. Orders must receive prompt execution; and, in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the officers named in condition 6, or the head of the department to whom the goods are to be supplied, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies, or any like supplies that are suitable for the service, at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

8. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form as soon as possible after delivery of the full quantities of goods ordered, the account being accompanied by the receipted delivery orders on which it is based. The prices quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

9. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. The contractor may, however, claim a survey on any goods objected to; but in that case he must, within twenty-four hours after objection is made, give notice thereof in writing to the officer rejecting the goods. If after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor.

10. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carriers to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall, as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 13 of these conditions.

11. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies rejected or returned, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in condition 7.

12. The members of boards of survey will be appointed by the Treasurer of the colony for the time being, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it, or any like supply that is suitable for the service, will be procured elsewhere, and the survey fees and extra expense (if any) will be charged as in condition 7.

13. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the said Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 7. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith and forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money.

14. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

15. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power-of-attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

16. It will be competent either for the contractor on his own behalf, or for the Secretary of the Tender Board on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract, by giving three full calendar months' notice, in writing, to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of the month, and within the period for which the contract is made, and under no other circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract.

PHOTO-LITHOGRAPHIC TRANSFERS.

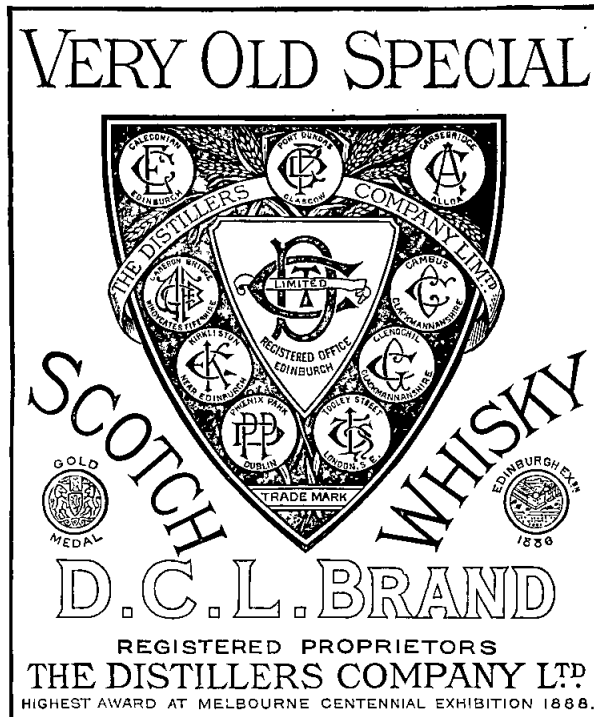

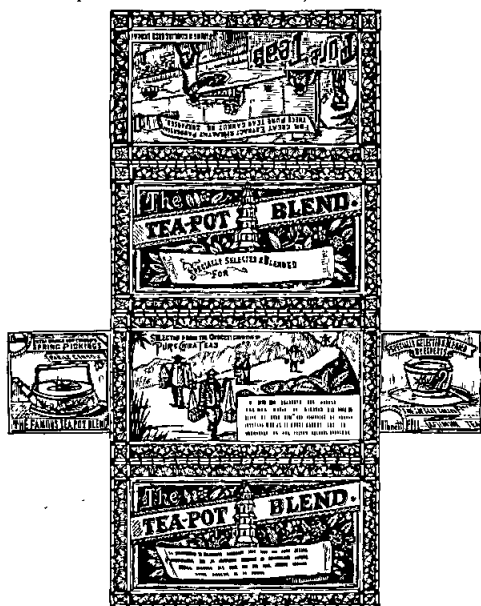
