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## PROVISIONAL COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND SERVIA.

MY LORD,—With reference to my Circular Despatch of the 13th of March, 1889,\* I have the honour to transmit (C—5917) to you, for publication in the colony under your Government a copy of a Provisional Commercial Agreement between the Governments of Great Britain and Servia, signed at Belgrade on the 2nd (14th) of February, 1890, which will remain in force from the 6th (18th) of May next until the 1st (13th) of January, 1893.

## PROVISIONAL COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENTS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND SERVIA.

(Signed at Belgrade, 2nd (14th) February, 1890.

The Government of Her Majesty the Queen of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and the Government of the Regency of His Majesty the King of Servia, both desiring to provisionally regulate from the 6th (18th) May, 1890, the date of the expiration of the Commercial Convention which has been denounced, until the conclusion of a new definitive Commercial Convention, the position of their respective subjects residing in the dominions and possessions of the other party, as well as the commercial relations between the two States, have agreed upon and concluded the following provisions:—

British subjects residing in Servia, and Servian subjects residing in the territories, colonies, and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, shall enjoy, as in the past, all the rights accorded to the subjects or natives of the most favoured nation; and merchandise of every kind the produce of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of its colonies or possessions, imported into Servia, and all merchandise the produce of Servia which may be imported into the dominions of Her Britannic Majesty, including the colonies and foreign possessions, shall be reciprocally subjected to the same customs duties of import or export, to the same accessory duties of re-export, of commission, or of warehousing, to the same local duties, and duties relative to all customs formalities, as the merchandise of the most favoured nation.

It is nevertheless understood that the provisions of the present Act shall not apply to those colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty to which the provisions of the original Treaty of the 26th January (7th February), 1880, did not apply, that is to say, to the Dominion of Canada, and to Her Majesty's colonies in South Africa.

The present Agreement will remain in force from the 6th (18th) May, 1890, until the 1st (13th) January, 1893.

The two Governments engage, if necessary, to obtain assent to the present Agreement by the Legislative Assemblies of their respective States.

VICTORIAN MILITARY FORCES.—ALTERATION OF REGULATIONS.

THE Governor in Council has been pleased to order the following alterations in the regulations for the Victorian Military Forces, made on the third day of December, 1888:—

PART II., PERMANENT FORCES.—SECTION II., VICTORIAN ARTILLERY.

Paragraph 16 is cancelled, and the following is substituted therefor:—

“No man can claim his discharge until the expiration of his term of service, but after serving three months he may, subject to the approval of the Commandant, obtain his discharge on payment of £2, and on paying also for deterioration of uniform and kit. At subsequent periods he may purchase his discharge at the rates set forth below:—

- (a) With less than three years' service ... £10
- (b) Over three and under four years' service ... £5
- (c) Over four years' service ... Free

“16a. Any man dismissed from the service by the Commandant shall forfeit to the Government (a) the amount he would have to pay if he were purchasing his discharge on the day the offence was committed, or (b) such smaller sum as the Commandant may determine.”

PART II., SECTION IV.—PERMANENT SECTION, VICTORIAN ENGINEERS.

Paragraph 14 is cancelled, and the following is substituted therefor:—

“The amended regulation, made on the fourth day of June, 1890, relative to the purchase of discharge by members of the Victorian Artillery, being paragraphs 16 and 16a, Part II., Section II., shall hereafter apply to members of the Permanent Section of Engineers also.”

## "THE PUBLIC SERVICE ACT 1883," SECTION 47.

## REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS by *The Public Service Act 1883*, section 47, it is enacted that—"The Classifiers may from time to time make and repeal, alter, and amend Regulations, which shall have full force and effect as soon as approved by the Governor in Council for all or any of the following purposes:—

"(i.) For determining the conditions to be fulfilled by candidates for the position of student in training, pupil teacher, or sewing mistress, and for determining by competitive examination the persons to be appointed to any such position when there are more candidates than vacancies to be filled; and for holding any such competitive examination:

"(ii.) For determining which schools shall be district training schools, and for allotting the studentships therein."

We, the undersigned, being the Members constituting the Committee of Classifiers, in pursuance of the said powers, do make and declare the Regulations following, and declare that the same shall have full force and effect as soon as approved by the Governor in Council.

## STUDENTS IN TRAINING.

*Act 773, Fourth Schedule, Part II.*—"The order for appointment to Studentships in Training shall be as follows:—

"(i.) Pupil teachers who have completed their course. If at any time there are more pupil teachers candidates than there are studentships to be allotted, the order of precedence shall be determined by competitive examination:

"(ii.) Other qualified candidates in order of precedence determined by competitive examination."

1. Qualified candidates in (ii.) must be not less than seventeen years of age; they must have passed the Matriculation examination of the University of Melbourne, or the examination for first class pupil teachers, and in addition must produce satisfactory certificates as to character, health, and aptitude to teach—the last from an inspector of schools.

2. The competitive examinations in (i.) and (ii.) shall be in the subjects contained in the programme of instruction for first-class pupil teachers, as provided for by the Regulations for the time being of the Education Department, and shall be held at such times and places, and by such officers, as may be determined by the Education Department.

## PUPIL TEACHERS.

1. Candidates for employment as pupil teachers must be not less than fourteen nor more than eighteen years of age, and must furnish satisfactory evidence of aptitude for teaching. Prior to appointment candidates must furnish certificates of good character, of sound constitution, and of freedom from any physical defect likely to impair their usefulness as teachers; and (1) must have passed an examination by an Inspector of Schools in the work, as far as needlework inclusive, prescribed for the Fourth Class or some higher class in the course of Free Instruction, Regulation I., and in singing and drawing, as prescribed for the Third or some higher class in Regulation I., or have passed in singing and drawing as above, and, in addition, have passed the Matriculation examination of the University of Melbourne.

2. Where there is only one qualified candidate for any vacancy, or only one qualified candidate from the school in which the vacancy exists, the name of such candidate shall be entered on the Employment Register for that vacancy.

3. Where there are more qualified candidates than one from the school in which the vacancy exists, or where there is no qualified candidate from the school, but more than one other qualified candidate, a competitive examination shall be held, the subjects of which shall be those specified in the programme of instruction for the Sixth class of State schools as provided for by the Regulations for the time being of the Education Department. In determining the order of merit of the candidates, consideration shall be given to the aptitude of the respective candidates for teaching as reported on by the district inspector. The examiner shall place in order of merit first the names of candidates from the school in which the vacancy exists, and after them in the same order the names of other candidates, and shall report to the

June 6, 1890.

Secretary of the Education Department for the information of the Committee of Classifiers the names of the first three candidates in their order. The names of such three candidates shall be entered in the Employment Register in the same order.

4. Candidates for any present or immediately prospective vacancy may be presented to the district inspector of schools for examination at any ordinary visit for inspection.

#### SEWING MISTRESSES.

1. Candidates shall be not less than seventeen years of age, and, prior to appointment, shall furnish satisfactory evidence as to good character and sound health.

2. Where there is only one candidate for any vacancy, the Secretary of the Education Department shall, when satisfied that the candidate is competent to perform the duties of the position, inform the Committee of Classifiers thereof, who shall then enter the name of the candidate on the Employment Register for that vacancy.

3. Where there are more candidates than one for any vacancy, a competitive examination shall be held in the subjects of the programme of instruction for the Third class of State schools, as provided for by the Regulations for the time being of the Education Department, in ability to perform all the kinds of needlework required from girls in State schools, to teach the same, and to instruct the First and Second classes in any of the programme subjects. The examiner shall arrange the names of the candidates in their order of merit as determined by the examination, and report to the Secretary for the information of the Committee of Classifiers, who shall enter in the Employment Register in such order the names of the first two.

#### *Act No. 773, Fourth Schedule, Part II.—Note.*

“Names of candidates for any of the above-named positions will be struck off the Register after one year, unless they signify their desire to be kept on the Register, and in the case of candidates for appointment as pupil teachers produce a certificate that they are still attending school. In the case of candidates for the position of pupil teacher, the names of not more than three shall be entered for each school, and qualified candidates from the school in which there is a vacancy shall have precedence over others.”

#### TRAINING SCHOOLS.

1. Any school which, at the coming into force of *The Public Service Act* 1883, was recognised by the Education Department as a district training school shall continue to be so recognised whenever and so long as a sufficient number of students can be allotted to it.

2. Before any new district training school shall be established, a report shall be furnished to the Secretary of the Education Department by the Inspector-General, the Superintendent of the Training Institution, and the Senior Inspector of Schools, or any two of them, recommending the same; and on such recommendation the Minister of Public Instruction may direct that any school so recommended shall be made a district training school whenever and so long as a sufficient number of students can be allotted to it.

3. Studentships shall be allotted amongst the district training schools in such manner as may best provide for the training of students near their homes.

PUPIL-SURVEYORS.

APPLICATIONS will be received, addressed to the Secretary to the Board of Examiners, up to Monday the 16th June next, from Candidates desirous of being appointed as Pupil Surveyors and Draughtsmen in connexion with this department. Two vacancies.

Conditions.

An applicant for appointment must be not more than twenty years or less than sixteen years of age. He will be required to produce a medical certificate to the effect that he is of sound constitution, and not affected with any physical infirmity which would interfere with the proper exercise of his profession. He will also be required to produce satisfactory evidence of having received a good general education, including a competent knowledge of euclid, algebra, and arithmetic, also a specimen of his plan drawing.

Competitive Examination.

Having duly complied with the foregoing requirements, he will undergo a competitive examination on a date of which he will be duly notified—subjects, plane trigonometrical computation, plotting, and plan drawing—when the competitors to whom shall be awarded a sufficient number of points by the Board of Examiners will be recommended for appointment in the order of merit, subject to the regulations of the department as to probation.

Term of Service.

The pupil's service in the department shall be for a term of four years, the first two of which will be served in the office, where he will be engaged in drawing and computing. He will then (if thought necessary) be examined in trigonometry, including computation of areas and reduction of traverse surveys, also plotting from field-book and plan drawing. If his progress up to this time is not deemed satisfactory he will be liable to be dispensed with, but, if satisfactory, he will be placed under a departmental surveyor for two years for field practice.

Afterwards he will have the privilege of attending for two months at the Melbourne Observatory, where he will be instructed in such branches of practical astronomy as are necessary for the duties he may be called on to perform as a qualified surveyor.

He will be allowed to present himself at the next ensuing examination for land surveyors (without payment of fees), for the purpose of obtaining the formal certificate of the Board of Examiners as to his qualifications.

Remuneration.

He will receive the following remuneration during the term of his pupilage:—1st year, £52; 2nd year, £53; 3rd year, £66; 4th year, £72.

Subject to Regulations.

During the whole term of his pupilage and service in the department he shall be subject to the Regulations for the Public Service of Victoria dated 31st December, 1884, or any subsequent substituted or additional regulations.

Bonds required.

Each successful candidate for appointment as pupil surveyor and draughtsman will be required to find two approved sureties, who shall enter into bonds for £150 each for the faithful performance of his duties.

SIR,—I am directed by His Honour the Chief Justice to inform you that it has come to his knowledge that some Commissioners for taking affidavits have been in the habit of receiving as fees a smaller sum than is provided for the fees of Commissioners by the rules of the Supreme Court.

His Honour wishes that it should be clearly understood by all Commissioners that a Commissioner must in every case *claim* and *retain* for his own use, for each affidavit and for each exhibit, a fee *neither more nor less* than is provided by the rules of the Supreme Court.

And further, that such rules are applicable in every case in which a Commissioner may Act, whether in the Supreme Court, or in any inferior Court, any rule or practice of such inferior Court notwithstanding.

The whole of the articles in the foregoing schedules, required for the service of the Victorian Railways, are to be strictly in accordance with the samples and specifications, and in every respect to be of the very best description, quality, and manufacture—subject to the approval of the Secretary, the Engineer-in-Chief, the Engineer for Existing Lines, Traffic Manager, Locomotive Superintendent, Telegraph Engineer, and the Railway Storekeeper. The goods will be subject to the examination and test of an inspecting officer appointed by any of the above. The Victorian Railways Commissioners will not be bound to issue orders upon the contractor for all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only for such articles and such quantities of those articles as the Victorian Railways Commissioners may order from the contractor from time to time; neither will the Victorian Railways Commissioners be bound to take from the contractor any larger supply of any of the articles than the orders which have been issued during the period of contract, viz., from 1st of July, 1890, to 30th June, 1893, nor will they be bound to take any of the articles enumerated in the schedules for which orders have not been issued. Should the Victorian Railways Commissioners require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedules, or should articles of a particular manufacture be ordered, the contractor will be bound to supply the same at the contract rate.

**LADDERS.**

The Ladders are to be of Red or Yellow Baltic Fir, free from large or loose knots, and perfectly straight in grain, sound and free from heart and sap. The rounds are to be cleft, of young and fresh Hickory, English Ash, or English Oak, straight in grain, and turned to 1¼ inch diameter in centre, and for ¾-inch holes at ends. The 16-foot Ladders 14 inches clear at bottom, and sides 3½ x 1⅞ inches; and at top 10 inches clear, and sides 2½ inches x 1¼ inches.

The castings are to be clean, sharp, free from surface scale, shell, cold shuts, blow holes, honeycomb, cinder, or any other imperfections, and are to be sound in every respect, and thoroughly close in grain. When specially ordered, the castings are to be run with heads or runners of such weight as may be requested, and no extra charge shall be made or allowed for same, and the Contractor will be required to remove the head or runner from the casting, where possible, and charge the casting at the net weight only, trimmed and clean. In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Station nearest to the Contractor's works, there to be delivered to the Contractor free of cost or carriage.

Whenever ordered, the castings are to be moulded in loam without a pattern, and loam price will be paid according to schedule, but no extra charge will be allowed for patterns, strickles, or loam-boards. The orders will express the kind or description of casting according to the schedule distinction; and the rates there filled in opposite each item will be allowed accordingly.

The Railway Department will supply all patterns, and deliver the same to the Station nearest to the Contractor's works, free of cost, from whence the Contractor must fetch them when required and when due notice of same has been given in writing. Any pattern lost by the Contractor must be replaced by him.

In cases where it is necessary to cut off the head in a lathe or machine, such head will be cut off by the Government, and returned to the Station nearest to the Contractor's works, there to be delivered to the Contractor free of cost or carriage.

The Railway Department will supply all patterns, and deliver the same to the Station nearest to the Contractor's works, free of cost, from whence the Contractor must fetch them when required, and when due notice of same has been given in writing. Any pattern lost by the Contractor must be replaced by him.

Whenever only one or two castings are required, and they can be moulded from the broken originals, the Contractor will be bound to mould from such patterns without requiring the Victorian Railways Commissioners to supply a wooden or other pattern for same, and no extra price will be allowed.

All patterns, &c., supplied by the Victorian Railways Commissioners must be returned by the Contractor in good order, with the castings, and delivered to the Railway Stores at Newport.

Notwithstanding the delivery of any castings and a receipt having been given for them, should such castings turn out unsound, not in accordance with pattern or instructions, or in any way whatever defective, or of different quality of iron to that ordered, they must be removed at the expense of the Contractor, and other castings must be supplied in lieu thereof, without delay, and without additional charge.

Should the Contractor, in the opinion of the Engineer-in-Chief, Engineer for Existing Lines, or the Locomotive Superintendent, fail to furnish work in accordance with the specification, then, in seven days after due notice to that effect shall have been given in writing, the Secretary for Railways shall have full power to re-advertise and re-let this contract to any other person the Victorian Railways Commissioners shall think fit; and at the expiration of seven days after such notice shall have been given to the Contractor, this contract shall become null and void.

THE subjoined Rules and Regulations and Scale of Fees, which have been made by the trustees of the Cunninghame Public Cemetery, have, pursuant to the provisions of *The Cemeteries Statute 1894* (27 Vict. No. 201), been approved by the Governor in Council.

1. All charges must be paid to the secretary when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing any monument in the cemetery by and with the permission of the trustees under these rules, and upon payment of the charges herein mentioned, is entitled to maintain and keep up a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission to and for the sole and separate use of such representatives for ever.

3. Applications for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery to be made to the trustees. A certificate of permission will be granted to the person applying on payment of the charges set forth in schedule A.

4. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any person on evidence being produced, satisfactory to the trustees, that the relatives or friends of such persons are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interments must be given to the person in charge of the cemetery on the day previous to the interment.

6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick vaults or other graves will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees.

7. Between every grave site there shall be a space of not less than one foot, and between every grave site and family vault site, or between two adjacent vault sites, a space of not less than two feet.

8. When applying for the order for interment a form of application for burial, containing the name, age, and late place of residence of the deceased, which will be provided, must be filled up where practicable, and entered in the interment book.

9. The time fixed for the funeral to be at the cemetery must be strictly adhered to.

10. The hours for interments will be from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. in the months from September to April inclusive, and from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the other four months of the year.

11. No burial shall be allowed to take place between the hours of 6 p.m. and 10 a.m. without the special permission of the trustees.

12. No burial shall be permitted to take place in the said cemetery without a certificate from a deputy registrar of deaths or a coroner; such certificate shall be delivered to the secretary or his representative before the funeral enters the cemetery.

13. The trustees will not (unless in very exceptional cases) permit the removal of any corpse from any grave for re-interment either in this or any other cemetery.

14. The original interment in any grave shall not be removed or in any way interfered with until a period of ten (10) years from the date of such interment shall have elapsed without the special permission of the trustees.

15. Every grave shall be at least six (6) feet deep, and there shall be a depth of not less than three (3) feet from the top of the coffin to the original surface of the ground, after any subsequent interment.

16. An ordinary grave site shall be eight (8) feet by four (4) feet.

17. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every epitaph or inscription, shall be submitted to the trustees for approval, who may withhold permission, and prevent the erection of any monument, stone, tomb, pedestal, epitaph, or inscription which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming, and shall determine and fix the position of such stone, tomb, monument or pedestal which may be proposed to be erected, according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

18. All monuments, vaults, graves, and grave stones shall be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

19. Any fence, if not kept in proper repair, may be removed by order of the trustees, without notice to the owners of such fence.

20. Any person putting up any erection or placing any inscription in any part of the cemetery without permission from the trustees shall be liable to the penalties imposed by the Act for so doing, and to be further dealt with as a trespasser.

21. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave shall be bricked in and cemented, and be covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron, and shall be made air and water-tight, or any space surrounding such coffin shall be filled up with charcoal or dry earth.

22. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

23. The ground will be open to the public from sunrise to sunset daily.

24. No person shall be allowed to take any flower or plant out of the cemetery without permission of the trustees.

25. All dogs found in the cemetery may be destroyed without further notice.

26. A plan of the cemetery and a register will be kept, and may be inspected by any person during business hours.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. That all fees and charges shall be paid when applications are made or orders given.

2. That any person desiring ground for a private grave or a vault, tomb, monument, cenotaph, tombstone, or for any other purpose, in the cemetery under the above Act, shall apply to the trustees therefor. If approved, the trustees, on payment of the required fees, shall issue to such person so applying a certificate of right of burial on payment of the usual fee for such certificate.

3. That any person desiring to construct a brick grave, vault, or tomb, or to erect a monument, tombstone, wall, fence, or any other erection in any part of the cemetery, shall apply to the trustees for permission to do so, and at the same time submit a plan, design, or drawing of such, with full particulars, for approval.

4. That any order for interment shall be given at the cemetery nine working hours prior to the time fixed for the burial, otherwise an extra charge shall be made. No free interment shall be allowed without said notice.

5. That the name, age, late place of residence, and any other particulars required, shall be furnished at the time of giving the order.

6. That the trustees shall cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but any person wanting a brick grave or vault shall be permitted to construct the same, under directions of the secretary, on payment of the required fees, and every coffin placed therein shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.

7. That every coffin shall have on the lid a lead or copper plate, with the name of the deceased stamped thereon.

8. That every grave shall be not less than 7 feet deep, and there shall not be a less depth than 3 feet from the top of the coffin to the original surface of the ground.

9. The written consent of the owner of a grave must be produced, where necessary, prior to the interment in a private grave.

10. No burial shall be permitted to take place without a certificate from a deputy registrar of deaths or a coroner. Such certificate shall be delivered to the gatekeeper before the funeral enters the cemetery.

11. That the hours fixed for burials shall be as follows:—On week-days, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; on Sundays, from 1 to 4 p.m.

12. That every grave and erection thereon shall be maintained and kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owner.

13. That any person desiring to place any inscription or epitaph in any part of the cemetery shall apply to the trustees for permission to do so, and at the same time submit a copy thereof.

14. Any person putting up any erection or placing any inscription or epitaph in any part of the cemetery without the permission of the trustees shall be liable to the penalties imposed by the above Act for so doing, and to be further dealt with as a trespasser.

15. That every erection shall be placed on proper and substantial foundations (extending to the bottom of the grave when ordered). All stones, refuse, and rubbish remaining after any work is completed shall be removed at once. Copper cramps only shall be used in exposed stone work.

16. That all materials required in the completion of any stone or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery. No vehicle shall be permitted to enter the cemetery without the consent of the trustees first obtained.

17. That no catacomb shall be allowed.

18. That the trustees shall not (unless in very exceptional cases) permit the removal of any corpse from any grave for re-interment either in said or any other cemetery.

19. That before any such exceptional case can be dealt with by the trustees, a written application, setting forth the reasons for the proposed removal, and verified by a statutory declaration, shall be produced by the nearest available representative of the deceased; and in the event of said application being granted, the permission of the Minister administering *The Coroners Statute 1885* and the Act numbered CCXXXVIII, in addition to that of the trustees, shall be obtained. If found necessary, the coffin shall be enclosed in a second and air-tight coffin prior to removal.

20. That unless otherwise ordered, the cemetery entrance shall be open daily from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

21. That no dogs shall be admitted into the cemetery.

22. That any person violating the rules of propriety and decorum or committing any nuisance or trespass, or injuring any tree, shrub, flower, border, or any erection, or otherwise infringing the above Act, or any rule, regulation, or by-law made for protecting the cemetery, shall be prosecuted as the law directs.

23. That the secretary shall exercise a general supervision and control, under the trustees, over all matters pertaining to the cemetery.

24. That a plan of the cemetery, showing the distribution of the land, compartments, situations, and numbers of the graves, and a registry of all burials, shall be kept at the office.

RULES AND REGULATIONS AND SCALE OF FEES.

THE subjoined Rules and Regulations and Scale of Fees, which have been made by the Trustees of the Princetown General Cemetery, have, pursuant to the provisions of *The Cemeterics Statute 1884* (27 Vict., No. 201), been approved by the Governor in Council.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

1. The rules and regulations, numbered 1 to 30, shall be rules and regulations of the Princetown General Cemetery, after approval and publication hereof in the *Government Gazette*.

2. The office of the trust shall be open daily (Sundays, Christmas Day, and Good Friday excepted), from ten a.m. to 4 p.m.

3. No burial shall under any circumstances be permitted in the cemetery until an application has been made, name, age, late place of residence, occupation, and probable cause of death of the deceased given at the office of the Trust, an order in the form Schedule A obtained, and the fees (where not remitted) paid.

4. The fees mentioned in Schedule B shall be the fees payable under the Act, and shall be paid at time of making application for any order.

5. A burial right (Schedule C) shall give the holder and his representatives for ever the exclusive right of burial or interment in the portion of ground allotted thereby as a family or private burial place, and the right, on obtaining permission of the trustees as hereafter mentioned, to erect and maintain any monument, cenotaph, tablet, or other erection therein.

6. A permit will, on the application of the holder of the burial right, and deposit of a plan, designs, or drawing of the proposed erection, or a copy of the proposed inscription or epitaph thereon, be granted to construct a vault or grave, and to erect a monument, cenotaph, tablet, or other erection thereon, if approved by the trustees, and subject to such terms and conditions as they may see fit to impose.

7. Any application for ground exceeding ten feet in width shall be reserved for the special decision of the trustees.

8. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but any person having paid the fee for a private grave, and requiring a grave or vault, shall be permitted to construct same, subject to approval of the trustees. Every coffin placed therein shall be bricked-in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron, securely cemented.

9. Any tomb, monument, or material requiring to be removed on re-opening a grave or vault must be removed and re-erected or replaced by the owner.

10. No person, other than the owner, or his agent duly authorized in writing, shall be permitted to interfere in any way whatever with a grave or enclosure unless by special direction of the trustees.

11. Every vault, grave, tombstone, or other erection shall be maintained and kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owner.

12. Any grave may, on approval of the trustees, be converted into a private grave on payment of the fees or balance of fees provided for herein.

13. Every grave shall be six feet deep for an adult's body, and not more than two adults, unless the grave be of a greater depth or of extra width, shall be interred in each, two infants being considered equal to an adult.

14. Notice of any burial shall be given at the office of the trustees eight working hours prior to the time fixed for the burial.

15. Before a private grave shall be re-opened, the consent in writing of the person entitled to give the same shall be given.

16. No order for burial shall be issued until there has been deposited at the trust office a certificate from a coroner, justice of the peace, or registrar of deaths; and in case of re-interment or removal from another cemetery, verified copies of such certificate, and of the licence of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf, and on payment of the usual fees.

17. The hours for burial, unless by special permission of the trustees, shall be: On week days, September to April inclusive, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; May to August inclusive, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.; on Sundays, throughout the year, from 8 to 10 a.m., or from 2 to 5 p.m.

18. The time fixed for any burial shall be the time when the funeral is to be at the cemetery; and the same shall be punctually observed.

19. Hearses and mourning carriages only are allowed within the cemetery; and the drivers are to observe such directions of the trustees, their officers, and servants as may be found necessary from time to time for regulating the traffic.

20. No tree or shrub shall be planted in any portion of the cemetery except as approved by the trustees.

21. Licensed exhumations shall be made between the hours of 6 and 8 a.m.; and in all cases of exhumations the trustees may, where necessary, impose special conditions, any non-compliance therewith being a breach of these rules.

22. An additional fee, according to the circumstances of the case, shall be paid for any exhumation or sinking involving extra labour.

23. No smoking shall be allowed, nor any firearms discharged within the cemetery.

24. No person shall be permitted to pluck any flower, or take any tree, shrub, or plant from the cemetery, unless by authority of the trustees first had and obtained.

25. No dogs shall be allowed within the cemetery.

26. The cemetery shall, unless otherwise ordered, be open to the public from sunrise to sunset daily throughout the year, but the trustees shall have the right by themselves, their officers, and servants, to remove from the cemetery all persons misconducting themselves or violating the rules of propriety or decorum, or

committing any nuisance or trespass, or injuring any erection, or tree, shrub, flower, or border, or otherwise infringing the Act 201, or any Act made or to be made amending the same.

27. No person employed by the trustees shall accept any gratuity whatever in the discharge of his duty, nor shall he be allowed to be pecuniarily interested in any work in the cemetery other than that for which he receives payment or special authority from the trustees.

28. Any workman employed in the cemetery, though not in the employment of the trustees, shall be required to comply with such general directions of the trustees or their secretary as may be necessary for the control and good order of the cemetery.

29. Sculptors, stonemasons, and others desirous of erecting tombstones, monuments, tablets, or railings, or of constructing vaults, or of placing inscriptions and epitaphs, shall obtain licences, in the form of Schedule E, from the trustees.

30. All material required in the completion of any stone or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery. Stones, refuse, and rubbish remaining after the work is completed shall be removed at once by the person employed on the work.

3. Orders for interment to be given to the trustees at least eight hours previous to interment, when a form of instruction must be filled up and given to the sexton.
4. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug, but when a brick, or other grave, or vault is required, it must be constructed under the direction of the trustees or some person duly appointed by them.
5. The time fixed for the funeral to be at the cemetery must be punctually observed.

6. The usual hours for the performance of funerals shall be from sunrise to sunset, until otherwise ordered.

7. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones must be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owner.

8. Plan of every monument or headstone must be submitted to the trustees for approval.

9. Every coffin in a vault must be bricked-in or cemented, or covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.

10. A plan of the ground and register will be kept, which may be examined.

11. No burial will be allowed to take place in the cemetery without a certificate from a deputy-registrar, or coroner, or from a magistrate. Such certificate shall be delivered to the person in charge at the cemetery before the funeral enters the gates.

12. The trustees reserve to themselves the right of making any alteration from time to time in these regulations and charges, subject to the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Council.

2. The funerals are to be of the most economical description consistent with propriety. A plain hearse for an adult, and a covered, plain, suitable four-wheeled vehicle for a child under seven years of age, to be provided. The body shall be taken direct to the cemetery, and no more than one body shall be carried in the hearse at a time.

3. Coffins to be sufficiently long, deep, and wide for the corpse to lie extended at full length, and to be fastened down with screws. The contractor shall provide two inches of sawdust for the bottom of the coffin; a small block of wood to keep the head of the deceased in position, and sufficient white calico to cover the body. In the event of a body being decomposed or whenever it may be considered necessary by the member of the Police Force issuing the order for the burial, a coffin must be supplied sufficiently large to leave at least 2 inches between the body and the sides and top and bottom of the coffin, and this space must be filled up round the body with pine or phenyle sawdust by the contractor at his own expense; and in the event of any neglect in so providing or filling up the coffin it will be competent for the Tender Board to inflict a fine not exceeding £5 to be deducted as in condition 9. Coffins to be properly lowered into the graves, and the graves filled up again.

4. The graves to be dug of the proper depth, and in conformity with the Cemetery Regulations.

5. In the event of the contractor failing to attend punctually to the order, the work will be otherwise performed, and the extra expense, if any, incurred will be charged to the contractor.

6. When burials are required to take place on Sunday, no delay must take place in complying therewith, and any additional fees charged by the cemetery authorities will be repaid to the contractor.

7. The attendance of a minister of the denomination named in the order for the burial must, if practicable, be provided, and the contractor must inform the Police of the hour when the funeral service will take place, so that the friends of the deceased may attend at the cemetery if they wish. Such order to be produced at the cemetery when the contractor gives the order for interment. The contractor must pay the minister's fee for reading the burial service should it be claimed, and he will be reimbursed, on producing the minister's receipt, which must specify that the burial service was duly and properly performed, and that he received the fee for so doing; the receipt must also specify the name, age, and denomination of deceased, the name and denomination of the minister who performed the burial service, and the hour when the service was performed.

8. The account is to be rendered monthly to the officer ordering the service for payment at the Treasury, Melbourne. The charge for the minister's fee should be included in the account for the funeral.

9. In the event of any charge of impropriety or neglect in conducting the funerals being established against the contractor, the Government may for the first offence deduct from the security money, by way of fine, £5; and for the second offence a similar amount, and, in addition thereto, may forthwith cancel the contract.

10. Under no circumstances will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. 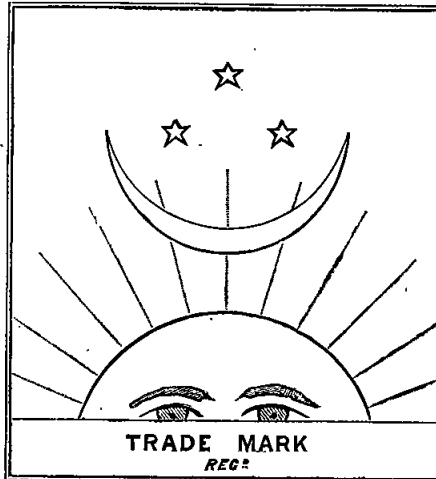
