Two HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.

REGULATIONS FOR PUPILS IN ARCHITECTURE AND ENGINEERING.

CONDITIONS.

A N applicant for appointment must be not more than 20 years, or less than 16 years of age. He will be required to produce a medical certificate that he is of sound constitution, and not affected with any physical infirmity which could interfere with the proper discharge of his profession.

QUALIFICATIONS.

- 1. The candidate must have passed the Matriculation Examination (including Algebra, Euclid, and Arithmetic) in the Melbourne or other recognised University; or
- 2. Passed such other recognised examination, or produce such certificates from the Education Department or other authority as shall satisfy the Inspector-General of Public Works as to his competency in those three subjects, and as to his general educational proficiency.
- 3. He shall also, with such certificates, submit satisfactory proof of his aptitude for drawing.

PROBATION.

Each candidate approved by the Minister shall enter the office as a probationer for a period of one month without pay; and at the end of that time, if reported by the Inspector-General to have displayed aptitude for the work, he shall be enrolled as a pupil, and shall be subject to the General Regulations for the Public Service so far as they can fairly apply.

No more pupils will be received than are needed for the requirements of the Department.

TERM OF SERVICE.

The term of service shall be two years, and at the end of each year the pupil will be required to pass an examination on the subjects mentioned in the attached schedule.

The Minister reserves the power to dispence at any time with the services of any pupil who may, in the opinion of the Inspector-General, be wanting in application or in the careful performance of his work, or whose conduct may be considered by him to be unsertification. unsatisfactory.

REMUNERATION.

The salary for the first year shall be £40, and, subject to the passing of the required examinations, the salary for the second year shall be £50. On successfully passing the prescribed departmental examinations, a pupil will, at the end of the term of two years, receive a certificate of competency as an engineering or architectural draughtsman in the Clerical Division; or he may be called upon to continue in his "pupilage for two additional years, at salaries of £50 and £100 respectively, and to undergo a final examination, upon passing which satisfactorily he will receive a certificate and become qualified for appointment as junior architectural or engineering draughtsman, Professional Division.

Tracing, colouring, drawing to scale, neat lettering, general knowledge of terms used in building and engineering work, mensuration, and elementary freehand drawing.

Simple geometrical and freehand drawing, elementary building materials and construction.

Building quantities, ornamental writing and printing.

For Engineering-Simple practical trigonometry and field

Tracings and drawings connected with the subjects for examination for each year, and duly certified as being the work of the pupil, will be considered in connexion with each examination.

GENERAL RULES FOR THE EXHIBITION.

General Rules for the Exhibition.

1. The Exhibition will be held in Launceston during the years 1890-91, under the patronage of His Excellency the Governor.

2. Schedules and application forms for space may be obtained from the Secretary. These must be filled up and returned to the Secretary not later than 15th September, 1890.

3. The Executive Committee reserve the right to refuse exhibits without stating any reason for so doing.

4. There will be no charge for space in arts, botanical, zoological, and mineral sections, nor in juvenile classes. Charges for space in other classes are as follow:—Ordinary charge for space, Ten shilling for the first five square feet or any less space, and One shilling for every additional square foot, with the exception of space for machinery in motion, for which the charge will be Sixpence per square foot. Wall space, Sixpence per square foot.

5. Space must be paid for within 14 days after notice of allotment. Space allotted and not occupied within 14 days after the opening of the Exhibition will revert to the Committee, and payment made for same will be liable to be forfeited to the Executive Committee,

6. In the event of the receipts from the Exhibition exceeding the expenditure, exhibitors who have paid for space will be entitled to receive a refund of their payment for same, or any less sum that such excess will allow. This rule does not apply to any exhibitor whose space may have been forfeited from any cause whatever, nor to any person paying rent.

7. Exhibitors will have to pay customs entries, and all expenses of conveying, delivering, arranging, fxing, storing empty cases, and removing their exhibits, also the cost of the erection of all fixtures, screens, and counters, when required; they must personally, or by representative, superintend the transmission, reception, unpacking, installation, and (at the close of the Exhibition) the removal of their goods. The Executive reserve; to themselves the right of doing whatever may be deemed necessary unless this regulation is strictly compiled with.

8. The Executive Committee have obtained special terms for the conveyance to and from the Exhibition from the various railways and steam-ship companies, particulars of which may be obtained from the Secretary.

9. All packages containing goods for Exhibition must have painted on them the distinctive mark—and the name and number of the department to which the exhibits belong, together with the name and address of the exhibitor.

10. Precautions will be taken to preserve exhibits from injury, and to guard the buildings; but no responsibility will be taken for damage or loss, from whatever cause. Exhibitors will make

11. The Executive Committee may issue at their discretion monthly permits for the sale of articles manufactured in the Exhibition; but no other exhibit will be allowed to be taken out of the buildings until the close of the Exhibition; and any exhibitor selling goods for immediate delivery renders himself liable to the forfeiture of his space and all rights as an exhibitor.

12. The Exhibition building will be constituted a bonded store, but exhibits sold will be subject to duty.

13. The introduction of dangerous substances is strictly pro-

13. The introduction of dangerous substances is strictly prohibited.

14. No article may be copied, photographed, drawn, or reproduced without the special permission of the exhibitor and of the Executive Committee.

15. All cases, counters, platforms, screens, and partitions must not (without special permission) exceed the following dimensions.—Show cases and partitions, 10 feet above the floor; counters, 2tt. 6im. above the floor; platforms, 1 foot above the floor.

16. No exhibitor will be permitted to display exhibits in such a manner as to obstruct the light or impede the view along the open spaces, or to occasion inconvenience or injury to other exhibitors.

17. In order to insure uniformity of decoration, no exhibitor will be allowed to put up flags, banners, or other kinds of decoration without permission of the Executive Committee.

18. Signs or name-boards must be placed to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee, and must in no case interfere with the lighting.

19. All handbills, printed matter, &c., intended for gratuitous distribution within the Exhibition building, must first receive the approval and permission of the Executive Committee, which permission may be withdrawn at any time.

20. Exhibitors will be required to provide all necessary attendance to keep their stands and exhibits properly cleaned and in good order during the whole period of the Exhibition.

21. Exhibitors will not be allowed to transfer any portion of the space allotted to them, or to allow any other than their own duly admitted exhibits to be placed therein.

22. All goods must be exhibited in the name of the individual or firm signing the application form.

23. In the case of sales being effected during the Exhibition, the articles sold cannot be removed without the special permission of the Executive Committee and payment of all charges.

24. If exhibits are not intended for competition, notice must be given in the application for space.

25. An official catalogue will be published by the Executive Committee, by whon the sale of catalogues is reserved. Anything beyond the ordinary description of the exhibit, together with the name and address of the exhibitor, must be paid for as an advertisement.

26. Motive power will be supplied to exhibits of processes of manufacture free of charge, on application to the Executive Committee; but the right is reserved of reducing the amount asked for, or to make a charge for certain portions of the motive power supplied; at discretion. The Executive desire to encourage the display of machinery in motion and of all descriptions of manufactures in progress. Requests for motive power must be made to the Secretary prior to the 15th September, 1890.

27. All shafting, pulleys, belting, &c., for the transmission o

30. The Exhibition will be ready for the reception of exhibits on 1st October, 1890—the Exhibition to be open on or about the 15th November, and it is expected to close about the end of March.

31. All who become exhibitors signify by so doing their compliance with the whole of these regulations, together with such other regulations as the Executive may issue from time to time.

32. The right to alter, amend, add to, or cancel any of these rules is reserved by the Executive.

JUDGING REGULATIONS.

- 1. No exhibit will be allowed to compete for awards which is not placed in the Exhibition building on or before the 1st December, 1890, unless the exhibitor is able to prove to the satisfaction of the Executive Committee that the delay in its arrival has been due to causes arising subsequently to its despatch from its place of origin, and entirely beyond his own control. Perishable articles are alone exempted from this rule.
- 2. The classification of articles for competition shall follow the schedule as published in the official catalogue, but the Executive Committee shall have power to amalgamate or subdivide classes if necessity should arise.
- 3. A separate jury, consisting of not less than three members, shall be appointed for each section.
- 4. One of the jurors in each section shall be elected by the exhibitors and one by the Executive Committee, the third juror shall then be appointed by the two already elected; any additional juror shall be appointed by the Executive Committee. No person shall be eligible for appointment as a juror in any section in which he exhibits, unless he withdraws from the competition.

 5. Exhibitors will be invited to appear either personally or by representative in the jury room, on dates to be notified, for the purpose of electing jurors. The names of exhibitors will be read out by the Secretary, and each exhibitor or his representative will be at liberty to nominate a juror on his name being called. Where there is a majority of votes in favour of one person, he shall be considered duly elected. When an equal number of votes have been given to two or more persons, the Executive Committee shall appoint the one they deem best qualified. When no nominations are received, the Committee shall themselves make all appointments. appointments.
- 6. Each juror shall receive a pass that will admit him to the Exhibition buildings.

 7. In the event of the non-attendance of any juror at two
- meetings in succession, or any juror declining to act, the Committee shall, on the requisition of a majority of the remaining jurors, or of not less than five exhibitors in the section being judged, appoint a substitute.
- 8. Notice of the times of meetings of the several juries shall be given by the Secretary at least 24 hours in advance. Exhibitors shall be invited to attend meetings of the juries in their own sections for the purpose of giving information as to their exhibits, if deemed necessary by the jurors. If they omit to attend, they must bear the consequence of any want of explanation to the jurors regarding any article.
- 9. The jurors in each section shall choose their own chairman, who shall convene meetings, preside over debates, and enter the propositions and resolutions of the jury, together with the reasons for the same, in the minute-book. He shall have a deliberative as well as a casting vote, and shall also certify, under his signature, the award of the jury.
- 10. Jurors shall have the power to invite the co-operation of jurors from other sections, but such persons shall have no voting
- 11. The names of all persons called in to co-operate with jurors shall be recorded in the minutes of meetings of each jury, and such minutes shall be submitted by the chairman to the Executive Committee.
- 12. Juries may, if they consider it necessary, subdivide classes into special divisions, and make awards in each of the subdivisions thus created.
- 13. Collective exhibits shall, as a rule, be judged as one exhibit. Should, however, an exhibitor so desire, and supply the jury with due notice and the necessary information, his exhibit shall be divided, and parts judged separately; but no exhibit, to any part or parts of which an award of menit may be given, shall be eligible for a reward as a collective exhibit.
- 14. Each jury shall submit to the Executive Committee a signed report, embodying the results of their examination of exhibits, and stating the specific reasons for which each award is

Reports and awards shall be based upon inherent and comparative merit, the elements of merit being held to include considerations relating to originality, invention, discovery, utility, quality, skill, workmanship, fitness for the purposes intended, adaptation to public wants, economy, and cost. Exhibitors shall be at liberty to supply the jurors with a statement in writing of the merits which they claim for the articles exhibited by them.

 16. The reports of jurors shall name the exhibitors who deserve recognition, and shall recommend whether the award made to them shall be of the first, second, or third class. Jurors shall limit themselves to placing exhibits in classes, and shall not decide as to the comparative merits of articles in the same class.

These payments shall form a special fund for the remunerating of experts, called in to give evidence to the committee.

Where an exhibitor has made out a primal facic case for the re-examination of his exhibits, the Executive Committee may request the jury to re-examine the exhibit, or order such re-examination to be made by an expert, and on a report being made by such jury or expert, the Executive Committee may, if they see fit, alter the award appealed against. The decision of the Executive Committee on any question connected with awards shall be final.

 19. If any question shall arise as to the interpretation of any of these regulations, the decision of such question shall rest solely with the Executive Committee.

WHEREAS upon the statutory declarations of Inspectors of Stock, made pursuant to clause 59 of the Regulations of the 19th March, 1880, under The Discases in Stock det 1872, the lands hereinafter described have become Quarantine Districts until the determination and declaration of the Governor in Council relative thereto: It is hereby notified that the Governor in Council has declared the said lands to be Quarantine Districts, in pursuance of clause 60 of the Regulations under the Act aforesaid, viz.:—

PUBLIC HEALTH.—TOWN OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BY-LAW No. 12.

By-law of the Town Council of Ballaarat East, made under the 253rd section of the Health Act 1890.

IN pursuance of the powers contained in the Local Government Act 1830 and the Health Act 1830, and in the interests of public health, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Town of Ballaarat East make the following By-law:—

Rubbish from Houses.

That rubbish from houses and yards be placed, without delay, in covered non-absorbent receptacles, into which a sufficient quantity of some efficient deodorant shall be introduced when necessary.

That at least once a fortuight, or so much more frequently as the Council may from time to time direct, the contents of these receptacles be removed and either rendered inoffensive or removed to a destructor.

That in future the receptacles be not placed in streets or lanes by the householders, but be taken from the yards and replaced by the scavengers.

That the householders be held responsible for the keeping of the receptacles in an inoffensive condition.

The foregoing part of this By-law shall apply to and have operation in the following streets and portions of streets within the said town as hereinafter specified, viz.—Bridge-street; Victoria-street, from Bridge-street to Stawell-street; Mainstreet, from Bridge-street to Lal Lal-street; Grenville-street; Wills-street; Eastwod-street; East Barkly-street; Princes-street; Humffray-street, from Main-street to Stawell-street; South Humffray-street, from Main-street to Grant-street; and Grant-street, from Anderson-street to Wainwright-street.

The two following clauses to apply to the whole of the town of Ballaarat East.

Fowl Yards.

That all fowl yards shall, if possible, and where necessary for health, be at least 25 feet from any dwelling house.

Spouting, Downpipes, and Drains.

That all buildings be provided with spouting, downpipes and drains sufficient to carry off all storm or rain water.

Penalties.

Any person disobeying any provision of this By-law shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds or less than Five shillings for every breach of such By-law, or a penalty not exceeding Five pounds or less than Five shillings for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE PUBLIC PARK IN THE PARISH OF JEFFCOTT.

W. F., John S. Tonkin, Thomas Stevens, Alexander Barber, Richard Sherwood, Michael Considine, James Nolan, and Francis Beckham, the younger, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the Public Park, in the parish of Jeffeott, having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 136 of the Land Act 1890:—

REGULATIONS.

- 1. The park shall be open to the public from sunrise to
- No person shall enter or remain in the park who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.
- 3. No person shall damage in any way the trees, shrubs, or flowers in the park, nor shall fires be lighted therein.
- 4. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates, stick bills thereon, or cut names on the fences, trees, or seats, or roll or throw stones in the park.
- 5. No person shall put in the park any cattle, goats, or pigs.
- 6. No person shall bring into the park any dog, unless led by a chain or cord, without the authority, in writing, of the Committee of Management.
- 7. No person shall erect any dwelling in the park, nor any booth or other structure for the purpose of affering for sale any article without the consent, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained. Management first obtained.
- 8. No person, except labourers and workmen employed in the park, shall enter any plots therein which may be enclosed for plantations of young trees or shrubs.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 136 of the Land Act 1890, on conviction before any justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any Balliff of Crown lands, or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such balliff or constable, and taken before some justice of the peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.




