PUBLIC AND BANK HOLIDAYS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Adrian Louis, Earl of Hopetoun, Viscount Aithrie, and Baron Hope, in the Peerage of Scotland; Baron Hopetoun of Hopetoun, and Baron Niddry of Niddry Castle, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1133, Part VI., section 135) and in the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164, Part III., section 20), I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint the days and dates hereunder mentioned to be observed as Public Holidays or Bank Holidays (as the case may be) at the places respectively specified, viz.:—

- WEDNESDAY, THE 15TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Borough of Daylesford;
- THURSDAY, THE 16TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Shires of Avon and Winchelsea;
- FRIDAY, THE 17TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Eastern Riding of the Shire of Waranga,* and as a Bank Holiday at Murchison;
- WEDNESDAY, THE 22ND DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Shires of Glenlyon, Kyneton, Newham, and Shepparton,* and as a Bank Holiday at Kyneton and Trentham;
- THURSDAY, THE 23RD DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Bairnsdale;
- FRIDAY, THE 24TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Bank Holiday at Learmonth;
- THURSDAY, THE 30TH DAY OF NOVEMBER INSTANT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Mansfield;
- FRIDAY, THE 1ST DAY OF DECEMBER NEXT,
- as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Buninyong, and as a Bank Holiday at Buninyong.
