SIR,—With reference to my predecessor's circular despatch of 25th March, 1890* [C.6850]. I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your government, copies of notes which have been exchanged between Her Majesty's Charge d'Affaires at Belgrade and the Servian Minister for Foreign Affairs, prolonging until the 18th July, 1893, the provisional commercial agreement of the 2nd 14th of February, 1890, between Great Britain and Servia.

EXCHANGE OF NOTES PROLONGING TO JULY 1, 1893, THE PRO-VISIONAL COMMERCIAL AGREEMENT OF FEBRUARY 14, 1890, BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND SERVIA.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your Excellency's note of this date, in which you inform me that the Servian Government adhere to their desire to prolong the Provisional Commercial Agreement of the 14th February, 1890, for six months only from the 1st (13th) January, 1893.

I regret that your Excellency has found it impossible to accede to the wish of Her Majesty's Government that the prolongation should be for a year, but under the circumstances I am authorized by the Earl of Rosebery, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, to accept on behalf of Her Majesty's Government the prolongation of the Provisional Commercial Agreement between England and Servia for six months, that is say, till the 1st (13th) July, 1893.

I have also the honour to repeat to your Excellency that when the Servian Government make known their wishes with respect to a new Commercial Treaty, their communication will receive the early attention of Her Majesty's Government, who are prepared at once to commence negotiations.

I trust your Excellency will do me the honour to send an early reply on behalf of the Servian Government, and avail myself, &c.

I have the the honour to acknowledge the receipt of the note in which you were good enough to inform methat Lord Rosebery, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, had authorized you to accept, in the name of the Government of Her Britannic Majesty, the prolongation until the 1st (13th) July, 1893, of the provisional commercial arrangement concluded between England and Servia on the 14th February, 1890.

The object of the present exchange of notes being to establish the agreement arrived at between the two Governments, the necessary instructions will be sent to the Customs authorities of Servia, with the view to the agreement being carried into effect.

I have, consequently, the honour, my Lord, to have recourse to your good offices in begging you to be good enough to make the necessary communication to your High Government, in order that similar instructions may be given to the Customs authorities of the United Kingdom.

In conformity with the wish expressed by you, in the name of your Government, I will not fail to take the necessary steps in order that, after having taken the advice of my colleague, the Minister of Agriculture and Commerce, negotiations may shortly be commenced between our two Governments, with the view to the conclusion of a definitive Treaty of Commerce.

SIR,—I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of a Commercial Convention between Great Britain and Roumania, signed at Bucharest on the 13th day of August, 1892, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Bucharest on the 31st of January last.

I have to call your attention to Article IV. of the Convention, from which you will observe that, if it is desired that the colony under your Government should come within the operation of the Convention, notice to that effect must be given to the Roumanian Minister for Foreign Affairs within two years from 13th August, 1892, the date of the signature of the Convention.

I have therefore to request that you will be good enough to acquaint me as soon as possible of the wishes of your Government in the matter.

COMMERCIAL CONVENTION BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND ROUMANIA.

Signed at Bucharest, 18th August, 1892.

[Ratifications exchanged at Bucharest, 31st January, 1893.] The Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Majesty the King of Roumania, being mutually desirous of consolidating their ties of friendship and of developing the commercial relations be-tween the two States, have, with this object, determined to con-clude a Convention, and have named as their respective Pleui-potentiaries that is to say.—

potentiaries, that is to say:—
Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, Arthur George Vansittart, Esq., &c., &c., Her Britannic Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Bucharest.

His Majesty the King of Roumania, M. Lascar Catargi, Grand Cross of His Order of the Star of Roumania, &c., &c., &c., President of His Council, Minister Secretary of State for the Department of the Interior, and Acting Minister for Foreign

Who, after having communicated to each other their Full Powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

ARTICLE I.

ARTICLE 1.

The subjects, vessels, and goods, produce of the soil and industry of each of the two High Contracting Parties shall enjoy, in the dominions of the other, all privileges, immunities, or advantages granted to the most favoured nation.

It is, however, understood that the foregoing stipulation does not in any way affect the special laws, ordinances, and regulations with regard to trade, industry, police, and public security in force in each of the two countries, and applicable to all foreigners in general. foreigners in general.

ARTICLE II.

All articles, produce of the soil or industry of Great Britain and Ireland, which shall be imported into Roumania, and all articles, produce of the soil or industry of Roumania, which shall be imported into Great Britain and Ireland, whether destined he imported into Great Britain and Ireland, whether destined for consumption, warehousing, re-exportation, or transit, shall be subjected, as long as this Convention holds good, to the same treatment, and, especially, shall be liable to no higher or other duties than the produce or goods of the most favoured nation.

No higher or other duties shall be levied in Great Britain and Ireland on the exportation of goods to Roumania, or in Roumania on the exportation of goods to Great Britain and Ireland, than may be levied on the exportation of the like goods to the country the most favoured in this respect.

Each of the High Contracting Parties undertakes that the other shall enjoy immediately every favour, privilege, or reduction of duties which have been already granted, or may be granted hereafter, under the above-named conditions, by similar Treaties to a third Power.

Goods of all kinds coming from, or proceeding to, the territory of one of the High Contracting Parties shall be exempted, in the territory of the other, from all transit dues. Most-favoured nation treatment is mutually guaranteed to each of the Contracting Parties in all that concerns transit.

ARTICLE III.

ARTICLE III.

The subjects of each of the two High Contracting Parties shall be exempted, in the territory of the other, from all military service and from all extraordinary requisitions which may be established on account of exceptional circumstances.

The liabilities, however, arising out of the possession of landed property, and for military loans and requisitions to which all the subjects of the State may be called upon to contribute as proprietors, farmers, or tenants of real property, shall be excepted.

ARTICLE IV.

The present Convention shall be applicable, as far as the laws permit, to all the Colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britan-nic Majesty, excepting to those hereinafter named, that is to say, except to-

Provided always that the present Convention shall be made applicable to any of the above-named Colonies or foreign possessions on whose behalf notice to that effect shall have been given by Her Britannic Majesty's Representative to the Roumanian Minister for Foreign Affairs within two years from the date of the signature of the present Convention.

ARTICLE V.

, The two High Contracting Parties reserve to themselves reciprocally the right of denouncing at any time the present Convention by giving a year's notice.

ARTICLE VI.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at Bucharest as soon as possible, as soon as the formalities required by the constitutional laws of the two High Contracting Parties have been fulfilled.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the present Convention, and have affixed thereto their seals. Done in duplicate at Bucharest, the thirteenth (first) day of August, of the year One thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

Health Act 1890. UNITED SHIRE OF MOUNT ALEXANDER. BY-LAW No. 4.

For keeping free from noisome matter, yards, stables, and places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, &c., and for regulating management of earth-closets, privies, &c., disinfecting and deodrizing fight-soil and other offensive matter, and for regulating its removal and final deposit.

regulating its removal and final deposit.

In pursuance of the powers contained in the Health Act 1890, and of every other power thereunto enabling them in that behalf, the Council of the Shire of Mount Alexander, in the name and on behalf of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said shire for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within its jurisdiction, hereby make the following by-law (that is to say):—

1. All former by-laws on the matter and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this by-law coming into operation.

2. This by-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the Government Gazette.

3. This by-law shall apply to and have operation in the whole of the Shire of Mount Alexander.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said shire shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto or occupied in connexion therewith to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land in the said shire on which there shall be erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty, shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung, soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said council at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within

the same shall be removed by the said council at the expense of such occupier.

6. The occupier of every house, building, or tenement within the said shire shall cause every cesspool already in existence, and until its abolition, to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of two feet from the top of the sides, walls, or himing of such cesspool. Provided that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m. And provided also that the contents of any cesspool shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith carbolic acid or some other efficient deedorizer unfficient in quality and quantity to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management

or some other efficient decodorizer varificient in quality and quantity to effectually decodorize and disinfect the same.

7. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-closet, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of night-soil on or belonging to such premises.

8. No person shall empty any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of night-soil except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents or any portion thereof or of effluvia therefrom.

9. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and deposited in such place or places only as may be appointed by the council from time to time for the final reception of the same.

10. Every person placing or depositing, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness.

11. The occupier of any premises within the shire used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of slaughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon to be removed therefrom once in every twenty-four hours, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever it may be removed by the said council at the expense of such occupier.

12. Every closet pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron properly riveted and soldered so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.

13. No closet, door, or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid. And any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty notwithstanding that the council may be empowered by this by-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether the council has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

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BY-TAW

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Health Act 1890, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution, the Council of the Shire of Morwell, in the name and on behalf of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said Shire, doth hereby make the following by-law, being By-law No. 1 of the said Shire, that is to say:—

- 1. All former by-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this by-law coming into operation.
- 2. This by-law shall come into full force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health and immediately after its publication in the Government Gazette.
- This by-law shall apply to and have operation in the Shire

DEFINITIONS.

4. In the construction and for the purposes of this by-law, the following terms—abattoir or slaughter-house, cesspool, earth-closet, house, inspector, land, street—shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject-matter, have the respective meanings assigned to them in the Hallth Act 1899.

Words imputing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, and the singular the plural and the plural the singular, and the word "person" shall include a corporation.

corporation.

PART I.-GENERAL CLEANLINESS.

- FART I.—GENERAL CLEANLINESS.

 5. The occupier of every house and premises shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto or occupied in connexion therewith to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all dust, filth, rubbish, and refuse matter to be, once at least in every week, removed from such yard or ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter so removed as aforesaid, the council of the said shire (hereinafter called the council) may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.
- expense of such occupier.

 6. The occupier of any premises used for the purpose of any noxious or offensive trade, business, occupation, process, or manufacture whatever, or used for the purpose of shughtering, whether it be an abattoir or otherwise, shall cause any rubbish, blood, offal, bones, water, liquid, soil, or other offensive matter produced or accumulated thereon, to be effectually deodorized and to be removed therefrom once every three days, and to be in the meantime kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, or to exhale any offensive effluvia; and if such occupier shall neglect or fail to have removed therefrom any offensive matter whatever, it may be removed by the said council at the expense of such occupier. of such occupier.
- 7. No person shall place or deposit any dust, mud, ashes, rubbish, filth, blood, offal, manure, dung, or soil, or any night-soil or other offensive matter, in any street, road, lane, right-of-way or place so as to be a nuisance to any person or injurious to health or in any way contrary to the directions of the council or officer of health.
- 8. No person shall keep any animal in such a manner as to pollute any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, so as to endanger the health of any person using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.

PART II.—DISPOSAL OF HOUSE REFUSE AND CLEANLINESS IN TOWNS, ETC.

- 9. The occupier of any land on which is erected any stable, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pig-sty, or on which land is any building wherein any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine are kept, shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to one cubic yard, or once at least in every week should the quantity not amount in that time to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such dung; soil, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same shall be removed by the said council at the expense of such occupier.

 10. Every occupier of a building or premises wherein or
- meved by the said council at the expense of such occupier.

 10. Every occupier of a building or premises wherein or whereon any horse or other beast of draught or burden or any cattle or swine may be kept, shall provide, in connexion with such building or premises, whenever required by the council or officer of health, a suitable receptacle for dung, manure, soil, fifth, or other offensive or noxious matter which may from time to time be produced in the keoping of any such animal in such building or upon such premises, and cause such receptacle to be constructed so that the bottom or floor thereof shall not in any case be lower than the surface of the ground adjoining such receptacle, and in such a manner and of such materials and to be maintained at all times in such a condition as to prevent any effluvia therefrom, or any escape of the contents thereof, or any soakage therefrom, into the ground or into the wall of any building, and to be furnished with a suitable cover, and, when not required to be open, to be kept properly covered.

 11. He shall likewise provide in connexion with such building
- 11. He shall likewise provide in connexion with such building or premises, if required by the council or officer of health, a sufficient drain constructed in such a manner and of such materials and maintained at all times in such a condition as effectually to convey all urine or liquid filth or refuse therefrom into a proper receptacle.

PART III.—As TO MANURE.

- 12. Nothing herein contained shall be taken to prevent the occupier of any premises from causing any dung, soil (not being night-soil), or other refuse matter produced or accumulated on any premises to be at any time removed, or to be used as manure on any garden or land, or to be kept for the purpose of being used on any garden or land contiguous to such premises as manure, so that the same be not so removed, kept, or used as to contravene any by-law of the council, or so as to be a misance or injurious to health or contrary to any directions of the council or officer of health.
- council or officer of health.

 13. Every person placing, depositing, or spreading, or causing or suffering to be placed or deposited or spread, or assisting in placing or depositing or spreading, on any land, whether by way of manure or otherwise, any liquid manure of which night-soil, urine, or any similar offensive matters form a part, night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter removed from any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or other place, shall immediately on the deposit or spreading thereof cover the same or cause the same to be covered, and shall keep the same covered with a layer of earth not less than six inches in thickness, and shall keep and use the same in such a way only as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health; and before doing so such person shall obtain the written permission of the council or officer of health, subject however to any general regulation or directions which the Board of Public Health by publication in the Government Gazette may make or give; but such permission shall be no defence in any complaint or prosecution for having kept or used such liquid manure, night-soil, offal, blood, or other matter in such a way as to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

 Part IV.—As to Earth-closets, Etc.

PART IV.-As TO EARTH-CLOSETS, ETC.

- 14. Every occupier and every person having the management or control of any premises shall cause to be kept in every earth-closet belonging thereto a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, lime, sawdust, or some other material efficient for deodorizing night-soil, and shall cause all night-soil which may be deposited in any pan or other receptacle in such earth-closet to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of such deodorizing material sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the contents of such pan or other receptacle.
- 15. Every closet pan shall be constructed of galvanized iron, properly riveted and soldered so as to be water-tight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding three cubic feet.
- 16. No closet door or trap shall abut or open on a street, lane, or right-of-way exceeding ten feet in width.
- 17. Every occupier and every person having the management and control of any premises shall once at least in every week empty and cleanse, or cause to be emptied and cleansed, every earth-cluset, privy, and place in the nature of an earth-closet for the reception of night-soil on or belonging to such premises. All business places, weekly; private, fortnightly.
- 18. No person shall empty any carth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the reception of night-soil, except by means of a cart, carriage, or means of conveyance properly constructed and furnished with a sufficient covering so as to prevent the escape of the contents, or any portion thereof, or of effluvia therefrom.
- 19. Where, in any municipality, any nightman is licensed by the municipal authorities, such nightman shall be employed by the occupier of the premises for the removal of night-soil therefrom, and no other person shall remove the same.
- 20. All night-soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter or thing shall be removed to and finally placed in such place or places only as may be appointed by the council from time to time for the final reception of the same.
- 21. No person shall empty, assist in emptying, or cause or permit to be emptied, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, except between the hours of Eleven p.m. and Five a.m., unless otherwise permitted by the council (of which the proof shall lie on such person), or until the contents thereof have been properly deodorized; and every person emptying or causing to be emptied any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, shall cause the night-soil taken therefrom to be removed as soon as the same is emptied.
- 22. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying, any earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or place for the deposit of night-soil, offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any drain or sewer, or so that the contents thereof may find their way or be likely to find their way into any drain or sewer.

PART V.—PREVENTION OF POLLUTION OF WATER.

- 23. No person shall place, assist in placing, or cause or permit to be placed, in or so that the same may or may be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, any matter or thing likely to endanger the health of any persons using such water or drinks or milk or other produce of such dairy.
- 24. No person shall empty, cause or permit to be emptied, or assist in emptying any cesspool or place for the deposit of offal, blood, or other refuse matter into any water supplied, used, or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or for manufacturing drinks for the use of man, or used or likely to be used in any dairy, or so that the contents, or any portion of the contents thereof, may find its way or be likely to find its way into any such water.
- 25. Every accumulation or deposit of offensive matter so situated as to find its way or be likely to find its way into any water used or likely to be used by man for drinking or domestic purposes, or likely to be used in any dairy, shall be deodorized and removed by the owner of the property upon which such accumulation or deposit is situated within twenty-four hours of notice given by the council or by one of its officers.

PART VI .-- DRAINAGE OF BUILDINGS.

- 26. Every person erecting, or causing to be erected, any new building shall cause the foundations thereof and the ground over which such building is to be placed, to be rendered dry, sound, and well drained, so that no water, soakage, or damp shall lodge there.
- 27. Every owner of a building shall cause the same to be provided with proper and sufficient drains, so constructed as to prevent any nuisance arising therefrom, and to secure the healthfulness of the immates of such building; and every tenant of a building under a lease of which fourteen years or upwards is unexpired, shall be deemed an owner within the meaning of this section.

PART VII.—SLAUGHTER-HOUSES AND ABATTOIRS.

- 28. Every occupier of a slaughter-house shall at all reasonable Lines afford free access to every part of the premises to the medical officer of health, the inspector of nuisances, the inspector of abattoirs or slaughter-houses, or to any person specially appointed by the Board of Public Health or the council in that behalf for the purpose of inspecting such premises.
- 29. Every occupier of a slaughter-house shall cause every animal brought to such slaughter-house for the purpose of being slaughtered and confined in any pound, stall, pen, or lair upon the premises previously to being slaughtered, to be provided during such confinement with a sufficient quantity of wholesome water.
- 30. Every occupier of a slaughter-house shall provide proper means of ventilation to be kept at all times in proper order and efficient action, and so that the ventilation shall be by direct communication with the external air, and shall keep the buildings, floors, and roof in thoroughly good order and repair, and in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or intrinsipart health. injurious to health.
- 31. Every occupier of a slaughter-house shall cause the drainage provided in or in connexion with such slaughter-house to be kept at all times in proper order and efficient action, and so as not to cause any effluvia or to be a nuisance or injurious to
- 32. Every occupier of a slaughter-house shall cause every part of the internal surface of the wall, and every part of the floor or pavement of such slaughter-house, and of all yards connected therewith or used for keeping cattle intended for slaughtering, or otherwise used in connexion with such slaughtering establishment, to be kept at all times in good order and repair, so as to prevent the absorption therein of any blood or liquid refuse or filth which may be spilled or splashed thereon, or any offensive or noxious matter which may be deposited thereon or brought in contact therewith.
- 33. He shall cause every part of the internal surface above the floor or pavement of such slaughter-house to be thoroughly washed with hot lime-wash, at least four times in every year; that is to say, at least once during the periods between the first and tenth of March, the first and tenth of June, the first and tenth of September, and the first and tenth of December respectively.
- 34. He shall cause every part of the floor or pavement of such slaughter-house and every part of the internal surface of every wall on which any blood or liquid refuse or fith may have been spilled or splashed, or with which any offensive or noxious matter may have been brought in contact during the process of slaughtering or dressing in such slaughter-house, to be thoroughly washed and cleansed within three hours after the completion of such slaughtering or dressing.
- 35. He shall not at any time keep any cattle or cause or suffer any cattle to be kept in such slaughter-house for a longer period than may be necessary for the purpose of preparing such cattle, whether by fasting or otherwise, for the process of slaughtering.

PART VIII.-PENALTIES.

36. Every person who shall, by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued, unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties—such portion not being less than Five shillings—to be paid; and any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty notwithstanding that the council may be empowered by this by-law or otherwise, to remedy such breach, and whether such council has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

The births of 1,353 children, viz., 695 boys and 658 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of March. In the month of February, 1,227 births were registered, or 126 less than in the month under review. The births were 107 above the average of the month during the previous ten years, but 109 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in March numbered 696, viz., 395 of males and 301 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 657, or 94 per cent. The deaths exceeded those in February by 31, but were below the average of March during the previous ten years by 64. If, however, allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been under that average by 196.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district, the proportion of births registered was 2.85, and of deaths registered 1.46.

The highest temperature in the shado recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 105.5° on the 2nd, and the lowest was 43.3° on the 25th. The mean temperature of the month (65.5°) was 1.8° above the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (45.3°) took place on the 2nd, and the least range (2.7°) on the 3rd. The mean daily range was 22.4°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.268 inches on the 22nd, and the lowest was 29.600 inches on the 31st. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.013 inches) differed from the average by a small fraction.

Rain fell on 4 days, the amount of rainfall being 1.446 inches. The average rainfall in March during the previous ten years was 1.90 inches, or 45 of an inch more than in the month under notice.

Males contributed 57 per cent., and females 43 per cent., to the mortality of the month. Children under 5 years of age contributed 48 per cent. to that mortality, as against 47 per cent. in March, 1892; 44 per cent. in March, 1890; 43 per cent. in March, 1889; 44 per cent. in March, 1887.

Twenty-seven deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, a gentleman, aged 76, died of gout; a female, aged 76, of bronchitis; a female, aged 76, and a male of unknown occupation, aged 77, of syncope; a master mariner, aged 77, of pneumonia; an architect, aged 77, of gallstones; a female, aged 77, of hemiplegia; a male of unknown occupation, aged 77, and a female, aged 78, of pericarditis; a female, aged 78, of heart disease; a gentleman, aged

80, of apoplexy; a gentleman, aged 82, of syncope; a female, aged 83, and a farmer, aged 84, of diarrhica; a labourer, aged 84, of phthisis; a female, aged 85, of heart disease; a female, aged 86, of dysentery; a female, aged 86, of hematemesis; a gentleman, aged 93, of gastrites; a concibuilder, aged 93, of suffocation by foods; a stonemann, aged 76, a male cook, aged 81, three gentlemen, aged 82, 84, and 89 respectively, a labourer, aged 88, and a baker, aged 89, of old age.

Forty-two deaths were ascribed to violence during the month, of which 35 were set down to accident, 3 to homicide, and 4 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A police constable, aged 29, and a servant, aged 61, were passed over by railway trains; a boy, aged 7, a labouror, aged 22, a baker, aged 36, a labourer, aged 39, and a contractor, aged 59, were passed over by vehicles; a coinnercial traveller, aged 59, and a female, aged 74, by horses; a boy, aged 12, was killed by a fall from a horse; a boy, aged 7, by being kicked by a horse; a farmer, aged 60, diad of injuries received by a fall from a tramcar; a groom, aged 30, a driver, aged 34, a carpenter, aged 44, a female, aged 52, and a female, aged 64, of injuries, consequent on falls; an engine-driver, aged 62, was crushed by machinery; a clerk, aged 26, accidentally shot himself; a girl, aged 4, died of burning; two male children, aged 15 months and 2 years respectively, of scalds; a quarryman, aged 57, was killed by explosion of rack-a-rock; a female, aged 27, was poisoned by eating mussels; a female, aged 32, died of pulmism; three boys, aged 6, 14, and 14 respectively, were drowned in the River Yarra; a male infant, aged 1 year, in the Moonee Ponds Creek; and a female, aged 50, in the Saltwater River; a carpenter, aged 63, was found drowned; a now-born male infant was sufficated; and a male infant, aged 1 year, was overlain; a male of unknown occupation, aged 43, was suffocated during a fit; a coachbuilder, aged 39, was choked by a piece of meat. The homicidal deaths were those of a new-born female infant, who died of umbilical hemorrhage, due to neglect; a new born male infant who was suffocated; and a female, aged 619, who was drowned in the Albert Park Lagoon; a verdict of willful murder being returned in the three cases. The suicidal deaths were those of a publican, aged 57, who shot himself: an irenmonger, and a female, aged 26 and 27 respectively, who drowned themselves; and a bootmaker, aged 67, who hanged himself

One hundred and twenty-one deaths, or 17 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—54 in the Melbourne Hospital, 13 in the Alfred Hospital, 1 in the Homocopathic Hospital, 8 in the Children's Hospital, 6 in the Women's Hospital, 7 in the Immigrants' Home, 5 in the Benevolent Asylum, 5 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 9 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 4 in the Austin Hospital, 6 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Pentridge Stockade, and 2 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 331, of which 182, or 55 per cent., were of males, and 149, or 45 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 252 were under one year of age, 61 were between one and two, 6 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 8 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 365. Of these, 213, or 58 per cent., were males, and 152, or 42 per cent., were females; 13 were between five and ten, 6 were between ten and fifteen, 22 were between fifteen and twenty, 21 were between twenty and twenty-five, 26 were between twenty-five and thirty, 35 were between thirty-five and firty, 22 were between forty and forty-five, 18 were between forty-five and fifty, 32 were between fifty and fifty-five, 31 were between fifty and fifty-five, 31 were between fifty and fifty-five, 31 were between sixty-five and seventy, 13 were between seventy-five and seventy-five and eighty-five and eighty-five, 6 were between eighty-five and ninety, and 2 were between ninety and ninety-five.

In the 31 days of March as compared with the 28 days of February, deaths from whooping cough fell from 7 to 1, deaths from diarrhead diseases from 49 to 39, and deaths from influenza from 4 to 3, whilst, on the other hand, deaths from typhoid fever increased from 19 to 21, and deaths from diphtheria or diphtheritic croup from 1 to 2. Seven deaths of child-bearing women, occurred in March, as against 8 in February, the proportions being 1 to 193 births and 1 to 153 births in those months respectively.

The estimated population of Greater Melbourne at the end of 1892 was 474,810, as compared with 491,942 at the same period of the previous year. There was thus an apparent decrease of 17,132, or about $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

According to the estimates of the Municipal authorities, the population fell off in all the sub-districts except the following, in which the increases were as subjoined:—North Melbourne, 1,376; Preston, 514; Malvern, 453; Flemington and Kensington, 400; Caulfield, 60. The falling off in the other sub-districts was as follows:—Richmond, 3,764; South Melbourne, 3,694*; Prahran, 2,449; Brunswick, 1,954; Fitzov, 1,321; Collingwood, 1,177; Williamstown, 818; St. Kilda, 727; Port Melbourne, 633; remainder of district, 549; Essendon, 519; Hawthorn, 407; Melbourne City, 309; Footscray, 222; Oakleigh, 200; Brighton, 117; Northcote, 82; Coburg, 30; Kew, 12; and Boroondara, 12.

In the year 1892, the registered births exceeded the registered deaths in Greater Melbourne by 126 per cent., but excluding the births and deaths which occurred in hospitals, asylums, &c., the excess of the former over the latter was 163 per cent.

In 140 instances twins, and in one instance triplets, were born in Greater Melbourne during the year under notice. As the births in the same period numbered in all 17,399, the confinements must have numbered 17,257. Thus one mother in 122 gave birth to more than one infant.

The births set down as illegitimate in 1892 numbered 1,447, or 79 more than in 1891. Over a third of these took place in the Women's Hospital or in buildings under the supervision of the officers of that institution. The proportion of illegitimate births to the whole number of births registered was 1 in 12, as against 1 in 13 in the previous year.

Subjoined are the birth and death rates in each sub-district in 1892. Births and deaths in hospitals, asylums, &c., are excluded, and the sub-districts are arranged in order, the sub-district with the highest birth-rate and the highest death-rate being placed first and the rest in succession:—

In calculating the rates for the above table, the births and deaths occurring in hospitals, asylums, &c., have been excluded as already stated. If these should be included, the proportion per 1,000 of the mean population of Greater Melbourne would be—births, 36:13: deaths, 15:98.

According to the table, the birth-rate is lower in Melbourne City than in any other sub-district, and the death rate in that city is also below the average.

In view of its open and apparently healthy position, the high death-rate in Oakleigh will, no doubt, excite surprise; as will also the low birth-rate in St. Kilda, a town in which the preponderance of females over males was found at the last census to be greater than in any other part of Victoria.

In consequence of the excessive mortality which attends the period of infancy, high death-rates are usually concurrent with high birth-rates. This, however, it will be noticed, is not always the case, Northcoto standing very high in the birth-rate column, but low in the column for death rates.

In Greater Melbourne, taken as a whole, there was an average of three persons to the acre at the end of 1892, but the density of the population varies considerably in the different sub-districts, ranging from 40 persons to the acre in North Melbourne Town, to less than 2½ persons to the acre in Kew Borough, and about 1 person to overy 6 acres in the portion of the district situated in shires. The following table shows the area of, and density of the population living in, each sub-district:—

According to the experience of the nine years named, the general mortality and the mortality from diarrheal diseases are greatest between November and April, the worst months being December and January: the mortality from typhoid fever is greatest between January and June, the worst months being February, March, and April; and the mortality from diphtheria and croup is greatest between April and September, the worst month being May. It will be noticed that the last-mentioned complaints are the only ones named which appear to be more destructive in winter than in summer.

It should be mentioned that the death-rate of Melbourne is much swelled by the large number of country residents who are admitted to and die in the Metropolitan hospitals. In some of the other colonies it is the custom to eliminate such entries, and it is probable that in Melbourne such deaths bear a higher proportion to the total number of deaths recorded than they do in any of the other cities named.

10 (a) Soldiers of the Victorian Artillery or Permanent Section of Engineers shall forfeit their pay for every day of absence or desertion or of absence without leave for a period exceeding five

desertion or of absence without leave for a period elections of days.

When such absence is for a period not exceeding one day the forfeiture may be enforced or not at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, and when for a period exceeding one day but not exceeding five days at the discretion of the Commandant to whom the matter shall be referred, unless the soldier has been convicted of the offence by a Court under the Defences and Discipline Act 1890, in which case he shall forfeit his pay absolutely for the day or days of such absence and for such time as he may have been under detention before conviction. The forfeiture in all cases to be additional to any other punishment which may be awarded.

(b) A soldier shall be considered absent for one day when he has been absent for six consecutive hours, which may be wholly in one day, or partly in one day and partly in another.
A soldier shall be considered absent for two days when he has been absent for twelve consecutive hours extending over portions of two-days.

A soldier shall be considered absent for two days when he has been absent for twelve consecutive hours extending over portions of two days.

A soldier shall be considered absent for three days when he shall have been absent over consecutive portions of three days, and so on in the same proportion.

(c) When a soldier has absented himself and has thereby been prevented from performing some military duty, which duty has been thrown upon some other person, he shall be considered absent for one day if he shall have been absent for any period of time however short, and for two days if his absence extends over portions of two days and exceeds six consecutive hours, and for three days, and so on in the same proportion.

(d) For the purpose of this regulation, but not for the purpose of fining, a day shall mean the twenty-four hours between one midnight and the succeeding one.

THE subjoined Regulations and Scale of Fees, which have been made by the Trustees of the Foster Public Cemetery and Moliagul Public Cemetery respectively, have, pursuant to the provisions of sections 9 and 16 respectively of the Cemeteries Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1072), been approved by the Administrator of the Government in Council.

FOSTER PUBLIC CEMETERY.—RULES AND REQULATIONS.

1. All charges must be paid to the secretary when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Orders for interment must be given to the person in charge of the cometery between the hours of Nine a.m. and Three p.m. of the day previous to the interment.

3. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick vaults or other graves will be required to construct them under the directions of the trustees; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault the consent, in writing, of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

4. No interment shall be permitted until an application has been made, the particulars required in the form Schedule A given, an order obtained, and a certificate from a coroner, justice of the peace, or registrar of deaths, has been delivered to the secretary, gatekceper, or sexton.

5. The time fixed for the funeral to be at the cemetery must be punctually observed.

6. The hours fixed for interment will be from Ten a.m. to Five o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the only hours for funerals will be from Two to Kive o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

7. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in and cemented, and covered by a slab of stone, slate, or iron.

8. No coffin shall be buried within 4 feet of the ordinary level of the ground unless it contains the body of a child under 12 years, when it shall be not less than 3 feet below that level, and a layer of earth at least 1 foot thick shall be left undisturbed above any coffin previously buried in the same grave.

9. That between every grave site there shall be a space of not less than 1 foot, and between every family vault site, or between every grave site and family vault site, or between every grave site and less than 2 feet.

2 feet. 10. Persons desirous of exhuming their relatives for the purpose of removal to another cemetery or to another grave will be allowed to do so upon obtaining the necessary order, pursuant to the provisions of the 10th section of the Coroners Act 1890, from the Solicitor-General, and upon payment of the usual fee.

11. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

12. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, and a copy of every incription must be submitted to the trustees, without whose approval it shall not be erected or inscribed.

13. A plan of the cemetery and a register will be kept, and may be inspected.

MOLIAGUL CEMETERY.—RULES AND REGULATIONS.

In pursuance of the powers conferred by the Cemeteries Act 1890, the Trustees of the Moliagul Cemetery make the following Rules and Regulations, that is to say:—

1. These Rules and Regulations shall come into force immediately after their publication in the Government Gazette, and from and after such publication all rules and regulations heretofore made shall be and are hereby rescinded.

2. The office of the Trust shall be open daily (Sunday, Christmas Day, and Good-Friday excepted), from Ten a.m. to Four p.m.

mas Day, and Good-Friday excepted), from Ten a.m. to Four p.m.

3. All fees and charges shall be paid when applications are made or orders are given.

4. Any person desiring ground for a private grave shall apply to the trustees therefor, who, if the application is approved, and the prescribed fees are paid, will issue a burial right (Schedule B) which shall give the holder and his representatives the exclusive right of burial or internent in the portion of ground allotted thereby as a family or private burial place, and the right on obtaining the permission of the trustees, as hereafter mentioned, to erect and maintain any monument, cenotaph, tablet, or other crection therein.

5. Any person desiring to construct a vault, grave, tombstone, or other erection shall apply to the trustees for permission to do so, and submit a plan or drawing with a copy of any proposed inscription or epitaph, and no such erection shall be made without the written approval of the trustees.

6. No interment shall be permitted until an application has been made, the particulars required in the form Schedule A given, an order obtained, and a certificate from a coroner, justice of the peake, or registrar of deaths has been delivered to the secretary, gatekeeper, or sexton.

7. Application for an order for interment shall be made at least eight working hours before the time for the burial.

8. No coffin shall be buried within 4 feet of the ordinary level of the ground unless it contains the body of a child under 12 years, when it shall be not less than 3 feet below that level, and a layer of earth at least 1 foot thick shall be left undisturbed above any coffin previously buried in the same grave.

9. The hours for burials shall be:—On week days, spetember to April inclusive, Ten a.m. to Six p.m.; May to August inclusive, Ten a.m. to Four p.m. On Sundays, throughout the year, from Eight to Ten a.m., or from Two to Five p.m.

10. No re-interment or removal from another cemetery or another grave will be permitted until there be submitted a certified copy of the original certificate of the coroner, justice of the peace, or registrar of deaths, and the licence for disinterment of the Minister of the Grown authorized in that behalf.

11. The trustees will cause all ordinary graves to be dug; but any person having paid the fee for a private grave, and requiring a brick grave or vault, shall be permitted to construct the same, subject to the approval of the trustees, but every coffin placed therein shall be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of stone or iron, securely cemented.

12. No private grave shall be re-opened or any interment permitted to give the same.
