PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Constitution Act it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to proroque the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand proroqued until Monday, the 30th day of March, 1896, and it is expedient to further proroque the same: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further proroque the said Parliament of Victoria from Monday, the 30th day of March, 1896, until Monday, the 4th day of May, 1896.



ALTERATION OF REGULATION 18.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to approve that Regulation 18 of the Regulations and Conditions under which telegraphic messages are authorized to be transmitted in Victoria be hereby cancelled, and that the following Regulation be substituted therefor:—

REDIRECTION OF TELEGRAMS WITHIN VICTORIA.

A telegram directed to any place within Victoria may be retransmitted by telegraph to any other address within the colony at half rates if returned unopened to the office from whence it was delivered; but in no case shall the charge for retransmission be less than Ninepence.

If a telegram be opened after having been delivered and be then returned for retransmission, full rates must be charged thereon.

thereon.

In either case the telegram should be indorsed by the person at whose request it is to be retransmitted, or if sent to a telegraph office it must be accompanied by a written request signed by the person requesting the retransmission of such telegram.

The cost of retransmission may be paid in advance or collected upon delivery. If the amount is to be collected, the person tendering the telegram for retransmission must guarantee and be responsible for the payment thereof in the event of it being found impossible to collect the same from the addressee.

 REGULATIONS in connexion with the Sum of Two thousand five hundred pounds (£2,500) for fencing and improving public parks and gardens under the control of borough councils, trustees, committees of management, &c., 1895-6.

 1. A sum not exceeding Five shillings shall be paid to the treasurer of the managing body of any public park or garden having a claim on the vote for every One pound expended by such body on fencing, preparation of land and planting, forming of roads and paths, and such other works as the Minister may approve, in such park or garden between 1st January, 1895, and 31st December, 1895, out of funds locally contributed, provided such claim be received by the Secretary for Agriculture on or before the 1st April, 1896. Every statement of particulars of claim must be made in the form A, and be accompanied by a declaration in the form B.

 2. The term "locally contributed" shall mean and include all
- declaration in the form B.

 2. The term "locally contributed" shall mean and include all moneys voted by the managing body of any public park or garden from its own funds for the fencing and planting of such park or garden, also all moneys voluntarily contributed for the same purpose, between the lat of January, 1895, and 31st December, 1895; but it shall not mean nor include any sums advanced by any bank, nor any subsidy paid by Government between the abovementioned dates, nor the balance of any subsidy paid by Government at any period prior to the 1st January, 1895.

 3. The subsidy or the balance thereof last paid to the managing
- ment at any period prior to the 1st January, 1895.

 3. The subsidy or the balance thereof last paid to the managing body of any public park or garden shall be deducted from the return of expenditure for the year 1895 (vide form A), and a sum equal to one-fourth of the balance then remaining, if made up of local contributions as above interpreted, shall be paid as subsidy; provided that if the claims are in excess of the sum of Two thousand five hundred pounds they shall be reduced pro ratâ.

 4. In every case in which a claim is sent in, an officer of the Department may be instructed to make an inspection of the books kept by the managing body, and of the vouchers for the several items of expenditure; and if such inspection be refused the claim shall be disallowed.

 5. Moneys expended in street planting or in foreign forces.
- shall be disallowed.

 5. Moneys expended in street planting, or in fencing, formation, or maintenance of land for racing, cricket, football, croquet, tennis, bowling, quoits, or other sports, or in erection or repairs of stands or pavilions for the purpose of witnessing sports, must not be included in any claim upon the vote.

 6. The foregoing shall not apply to parks and gardens within the limits of the city of Melbourne, except the Royal Park, or to the Edinburgh Garden, Fitzroy, or the Richmond Park, Richmond, or the Botanical Garden, Geelong.

SHIRE OF YARRAWONGA.

BY-LAW No. 2.

For keeping free from noxious matter yards, stables, places used for noxious trades, slaughter-yards, and other places of a like nature, for regulating the management of earth-closets and privies, and for regulating the removal and final deposit of night-soil and offensive matter.

night-soil and offensive matter.

THE Council of the Shire of Yarrawonga, in the colony of Victoria, in the name and on healt of the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the said shire, by virtue of the powers contained in the Health Act 1830 and every other power enabling them in this behalf, and for the purpose of carrying the said Act into execution within the jurisdiction of the said council, hereby make the following by-law, being By-law No. 2 of the said council, that is to say:

of the said council, that is to say:—

1. All former by-laws on the matters and things hereinafter provided for are hereby repealed, excepting as to acts done, penalties incurred, and proceedings at law pending at the time of this by-law coming into operation.

2. This by-law shall come into force and operation on its confirmation by the Board of Public Health, and immediately after its publication in the Government Gazette.

3. This by-law shall have operation in the township of Yarrawonga, in the Shire of Yarrawonga.

4. The occupier of every house and premises within the said township of Yarrawonga shall cause the yard and ground belonging thereto, or occupied in connexion therewith, to be kept so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all filth, rubbish, or refuse matter to be from time to time removed from such yard and ground; and if at any time the occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter removed as aforesaid, the said council may cause the same to be removed from such yacter and the expense of such occupier.

5. The commiss of any land situate in the said township of

occupier of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such filth, rubbish, or refuse matter removed as aforesaid, the said council may cause the same to be removed at the expense of such occupier.

5. The occupier of any land situate in the said township of Yarrawonga on which there shall be erected any stable, cowhouse, cow-yard, cattle-shed, or pigstye shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause all soil, dung, or other manure produced or accumulated therein to be from time to time removed from such premises as often as the quantity of the same so produced or accumulated shall amount to 1 cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier of such premises shall neglect or fail to have such soil, dung, or other manure removed therefrom as aforesaid, the same may be removed by the said council at the expense of such occupier.

6. No person shall construct or cause to be constructed any privy except in the form of an earth-closet, which shall consist of a suitable privy building, the floor whereof is at no point less than 3 inches above the surface of the adjoining ground, and every such building shall be properly and sufficiently ventilated, and shall be constructed so as to admit of the pan being placed and fitted beneath the seat in such manuer as may effectually prevent the deposit elsewhere than in such pan of any filth which may from time to time fall or be cast through the aperture in such seat; and such privy building shall be constructed and placed so as to afford proper means of access for the purpose of removing the pan and contents thereof. Every privy attached to any school, hotel, licensed public-house, factory, work-room, or common lodging-house, and every public privy, shall be flagged or paved with some non-absorbent material, having a fall or inclination towards the door or other opening of at least half-aninch to the foot.

7. No closet door or trap shall abut or open upon a street, lane, or right-of-w

of clean earth.

10. The occupier of every house or premises shall provide a properly constructed galvanized-iron closet-pan, properly viveted and soldered so as to be watertight, and with handles thereto, and of a capacity not exceeding 3 cubic feet, and shall keep the same in good and thorough repair.

11. Each occupier as aforesaid shall from time to time provide and keep in use in the closet or closets on his premises a suitable disinfectant or deedorant.

12. To provide for the proper removal of night-soil, each occupier as aforesaid shall pay to the Council of the Shire of Yarrawonga the sum of Ten shillings annually per pan, or such other sum as may from time to time be fixed by resolution of the said council for emptying and removing night-soil.

13. Such annual charge shall be payable by each occupier in four equal instalments, due and payable on the 1st day of January, April, July, and October in each year, commencing from the date of the coming into operation of this by-law. Such charges shall be paid to the secretary of the said council at the Council Chambers, Yarrawonga.

14. Every person who shall by any act or default be guilty of any breach of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty of Ten pounds for every such breach, or of Five pounds for each day during which such breach shall be committed or continued unless the justices before whom the penalty is sought to be recovered shall order any portion only of either of the said penalties, such portion to be paid being not less than Five shillings, and any person committing any such breach as aforesaid shall be liable to the penalty notwithstanding that the said council may be empowered by this by-law or otherwise to remedy such breach, and whether such council has or has not taken advantage of such powers.

WIMMERA UNITED WATERWORKS TRUST.— \cdot RATING REGULATIONS.

THE Commissioners of the Wimmera United Waterworks
District, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section
123 of the Water Act 1890, do make the following Regulation:—

No. 52.-URBAN DISTRICT OF MURTOA.

The following are the rates which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay in respect of water supplied for domestic purposes by the Wimmera United Waterworks Trust within the urban district of Murtoa, that is to say, in regard to houses or tenements fronting any streets in which pipes for water supply are laid, or which houses or tenements, if not on such streets, are supplied with water by reticulation from such pipes:

- 1. For every house or tenement of Ten pounds annual value or under, the sum of One pound per annum.
- 2. For every house or tenement above the annual value of Ten pounds, the sum of Two shillings in the pound sterling on the annual value of such property.
- 3. For all tenements in the said urban district situate otherwise than on streets in which the pipes for the supply of water have been laid down, and which tenements are not supplied with water by reticulation from such pipes, and being within a quarter of a mile of any stand-pipe for the supply of water, one-half of the before-mentioned rates; and where such tenements are over a quarter of a mile from such stand-pipes and within half-a-mile thereof, one-fourth of the before-mentioned rates.
- 4. Such before-mentioned rates shall be based upon the municipal valuation.
- 5. Such rate is hereby made for the year 1896, commencing on the 1st January, 1896, and terminating on the 31st December, 1896, and shall be payable, the one moiety on the 1st January, and the other moiety on the 1st July of such year.

Such person or persons as the Commissioners of the said Trust may from time to time appoint shall be authorized to demand and receive the said rates.

The births of 949 children, viz., 499 boys and 450 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of February. This number was only 4 more than that in February, 1885, but was 221 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, and 237 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population. The births have fallen off by one-third as compared with 1890 or 1892.

The deaths registered in February numbered 629, viz., 321 of males and 308 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 320, or 51 per cent. The deaths were more numerous than in the corresponding month of the two preceding years, but were fewer than in that of any other of the previous ten years; they were also fewer than the average of February during the previous ten years by 104, or, allowing for increase of population, fewer than that average by 114.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 26.76, and of deaths registered 17.74 per annum.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 102.8° on the 17th, and the lowest was 49.2° on the 2nd. The mean temperature of the month (65.9°) was half a degree below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (36.4°) took place on the 17th, and the least range (1.4°) on the 22nd. The mean daily range was 16.5°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.185 inches on the 22nd, and the lowest was 29.642 inches on the 18th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.930 inches) was nearly a twentieth of an inch above the average.

Rain fell on 8 days, the amount of rainfall being 3.08 inches. This amount, which was in marked contrast to the low rainfall of the month in the six preceding years, as shown above, was by far the highest for February during the last sixteen years, the next highest being 2.74 in 1885, and 2.67 in 1887; it was, moreover, 2½ inches above the average of the last ten ye

One bundred and thirty-two deaths, or 21 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—61 in the Melbourne Hospital, 11 in the Alfred Hospital, 2 in the St. Vincent's Hospital, 3 in the Women's Hospital, 3 in the Children's Hospital, 6 in the Homecopathic Hospital, 2 in the Austin Hospital, 6 in the Metropolitan Lunatic Asylum, 9 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 2 in the Pentrique Stockade, 2 in the Protestant Refuge, 5 in the Infant Asylum, 8 in the Immigrants' Home, 8 in the Benevolent Asylum, and 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor.

As compared with the corresponding month in the previous year, the deaths in the month under review show an increase of 57 under the head of local diseases, 17 under developmental diseases, 11 under violence, 8 under dietic, and 5 under constitutional diseases; whereas there was a falling-off of 9 under the head of zymotic, of 10 under the head of ill-defined, and of 3 under the complaint of lease as the review system from 10 to 145 (chiefly under the complaint of enteritis), of the respiratory system (chiefly pneumonia) from 36 to 47, of the circulatory system from 35 to 43, and of the nervous system from 25 to 60; but those from diseases of the urinary organs fell from 30 to 20. Under the class developmental diseases, deaths from premature birth rose from 13 to 13, from other malformations from 3 to 7, and from old age from 11 to 18. The increase under the head of dietic diseases was confined to infants who died of want of breast milk, which was the cause of distinct in the month under review as compared with only 3 in February, 1895; but, as against this, deaths from atrophy and debility (chiefly of young children) fell from 37 to 30. The small falling-off under the zymotic class was the net result of a diminution in the deaths from diphtheria from 8 to 11, from septic diseases under violence was chiefly due to sunstroke, which resulted fatally in as many as 9 cases in the month under review as compared with only 1 in the corresponding month of 1895.
