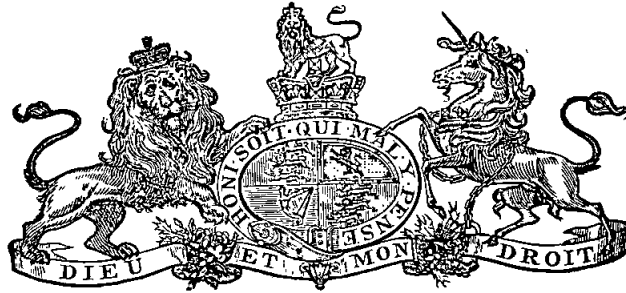

PUBLIC AND BANK HOLIDAYS.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions contained in the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1133, Part VI., section 135) and in the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164, Part III., section 20), I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint the days and dates hereunder mentioned to be observed as Public Holidays or Bank Holidays (as the case may be) at the places respectively specified, viz.:-

WEDNESDAY, THE 1ST, AND THURSDAY THE 2ND, DAYS OF JULY NEXT,  
as Public Holidays throughout the Boroughs of Majorca\* and Maryborough\* and the Shire of Avoca\* ;

THURSDAY, THE 2ND DAY OF JULY NEXT,  
as a Bank Holiday at Maryborough ;

WEDNESDAY, THE 8TH DAY OF JULY NEXT,  
as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Merriang ;

THURSDAY, THE 10TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER NEXT,  
as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Wodonga.

The births of 1,009 children, viz., 515 boys and 494 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of May. This number was, it will be observed, 112 lower than in the corresponding month of the previous year, also the lowest recorded for the month during the last eleven years, and one-third less than the maximum recorded in 1892. It was, moreover, 377 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, and 398 below that average if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in May numbered 532, viz., 285 of males and 247 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 477, or by only 90 per cent. The deaths were, it will be noticed, only slightly lower than in the corresponding month of the two preceding years, but were much fewer than in any other of the preceding ten years except 1893. They were, moreover, 114 below the average of May during the previous ten years, but if allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been below that average by 124.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 26.34, and of deaths registered 13.89 per annum.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 72.1° on the 1st, and the lowest was 38.5° on the 8th. The mean temperature of the month (53.5°) was two-fifths of a degree below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (28.8°) took place on the 8th, and the least range (5.1°) on the 12th. The mean daily range was 12.9°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.350 inches on the 18th, and the lowest was 29.253 inches on the 2nd. The mean atmospheric pressure (30.053 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on 10 days, the amount of rainfall being 2.62 inches, or nearly three times as much as in May, 1895, and three-fifths of an inch above the average of the month during the previous ten years. During the first five months of the current year the rainfall amounted to 12.98 inches, or 6.12 inches higher than in the corresponding period of 1895.

Fog occurred on two days during the month.

Males contributed 54 per cent and females 46 per cent to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 30 per cent to that mortality, as against 25 per cent in May, 1895; 28 per cent in May, 1894; 33 per cent in May, 1893; 30 per cent in May, 1892; 32 per cent in May, 1891; 31 per cent in May, 1890.

Fifty-two deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, two gentlemen, each aged 75, died of diarrhoea and stricture of the oesophagus respectively; a baker, aged 76, of cerebral hemorrhage; a female, aged 76, of softening of the brain; two females, each aged 76, of endocarditis; a gentleman, aged 77, of heart disease; two females, each aged 77, of rheumatism and cancer respectively; a surveyor, aged 77, of apoplexy; a female, aged 77, of heart disease; a master-mariner aged 77, of pneumonia; a female, aged 77, of Bright's disease; a plasterer, aged 78, of dysentery; a female, aged 78, of cerebral hemorrhage; a female, aged 79, of heart disease; a bricklayer and a female, each aged 79, of hepatitis; a male servant, aged 80, of pneumonia; a tallow chandler, aged 80, of hernia; a mason, aged 80, of hepatitis; a female, aged 80, of

eczema; a female, aged 81, of erysipelas; a cigar-maker, aged 81, of bronchitis; two females, each aged 82, of apoplexy and bronchitis respectively; two females, each aged 83, of cancer and heart disease respectively; a female, aged 84, of hemiplegia; two females, each aged 85, of influenza and dysentery respectively; a gentleman, aged 85, of cerebral hemorrhage; a lady, aged 85, of softening of the brain; a gentleman, aged 85, of hemiplegia; a cabinetmaker, aged 87, of bronchitis; two females, each aged 90, of mitral regurgitation and syncope respectively; a seamstress, aged 90, of pneumonia; an overseer, a miner, and a sawyer, each aged 75, a baker, aged 77, a female, aged 78, a carpenter and a female, each aged 80, a gardener, aged 83, a tallow chandler, aged 84, a tea broker and a female, each aged 85, a housekeeper, aged 90, a sawyer, aged 95, and a female, aged 96, of old age.

Eighteen deaths during the month were from external causes, of which 15 were set down to accident, 3 to homicide, and 2 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A boy, aged 2, died of fracture of the skull, the result of a kick of a horse; a carpenter, aged 33, of fracture of the spine, consequent on a fall from a window; a labourer, aged 33, of injury to the eye, caused by a splinter of wood; a farmer, aged 49, of injury to leg, resulting from a log of wood falling on him; a labourer, aged 17, was drowned by the swamping of a duck punt in Hobson's Bay; a commercial traveller, aged 46, a male of occupation unknown, aged 50, and a female, aged 73, were found drowned in the River Yarra; two new-born male infants were accidentally suffocated at birth; a grazer, aged 53, and a female, aged 70, were choked by food; and a male infant, aged 4 months, was overlain. The homicidal deaths were those of 2 new-born infants—a male and a female—who were suffocated; and a boy, aged 14, who died from fracture of the skull, the result of a blow from a hammer thrown by an athlete, a verdict of wilful murder being returned in the first two cases, and of manslaughter in the last case. The suicidal deaths were those of a police constable, aged 37, who shot himself; and a female aged 27, who cut her throat.

One hundred and fifty-nine deaths, or 30 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—58 in the Melbourne Hospital, 12 in the Alfred, 5 in the St. Vincent's, 6 in the Women's, 13 in the Children's, 5 in the Homoeopathic, and 1 in the Austin Hospital; 13 in the Metropolitan, and 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum; 10 in the Immigrants' Home, 14 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Infant Asylum, 6 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, 3 in the Pentridge Stockade, 3 in the Protestant Refuge, and 1 in the Eye and Ear Hospital.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 158, of which 92, or 58 per cent., were of males, and 66, or 42 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 107 were under one year of age, 23 were between one and two, 7 were between two and three, 13 were between three and four, and 8 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 374. Of these, 193, or 52 per cent., were males, and 181, or 48 per cent., were females; 12 were between five and ten, 9 were between ten and fifteen, 13 were between fifteen and twenty, 12 were between twenty and twenty-five, 30 were between twenty-five and thirty, 34 were between thirty and thirty-five, 32 were between thirty-five and forty, 22 were between forty and forty-five, 18 were between forty-five and fifty, 25 were between fifty and fifty-five, 21 were between fifty-five and sixty, 30 were between sixty and sixty-five, 32 were between sixty-five and seventy, 32 were between seventy and seventy-five, 23 were between seventy-five and eighty, 15 were between eighty and eighty-five, 8 were between eighty-five and ninety, 3 were between ninety and ninety-five, and 3 were between ninety-five and one hundred.

## CLASS VIII.—ILL-DEFINED AND NOT SPECIFIED CAUSES.

In the month under review as compared with the corresponding one in the preceding year, there was an increase of 37 deaths under the head of local diseases, and of 8 under ill-defined causes (chiefly debility), but as these increases were counterbalanced by decreases of 31 under constitutional diseases, 10 under developmental diseases, and 11 under violence, the deaths from all causes showed a decrease of only 5, as previously shown. The mortality from zymotic causes as a whole remained the same at the two periods, for, although deaths from influenza rose from 3 to 7, and those from diphtheria from 4 to 11, those from syphilis and from other zymotic diseases each fell off by 5. Under the local class, deaths from diseases of the respiratory system rose from 64 in May, 1895, to 86 in May, 1896, the increase being mainly confined to pneumonia and congestion of the lungs, and those from diseases of the digestive system fell from 56 to 48, and those from the nervous system from 57 to 51. Under the constitutional class, the mortality from cancer fell from 39 to 25, and from phthisis from 73 to 54; and under the developmental class, that from premature birth fell from 20 to 11. The decrease in the mortality from violence was distributed over the three divisions of accident, homicide, and suicide.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1895 and the first five months of 1896, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to

November; also that more deaths were set down to diphtheria in May, 1896, than in the corresponding month for any previous years since 1892, but that fewer were set down to typhoid fever than for any previous year shown, except 1892.
