APPOINTMENT OF BRITISH RESIDENT IN THE BRITISH SOLOMON ISLANDS.

QUEEN'S REGULATION TO PREVENT THE INTRODUCTION OF CONTAGIOUS DISEASE INTO THE BRITISH SOLOMON ISLANDS.

THE following extract from a Despatch from Her Majesty's High Commissioner for the Western Pacific to His Excellency the Governor, and its Enclosure, are published for general information.

MY LORD,

I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that, in pursuance of instructions received by telegram from the Secretary of State, I have appointed Mr. Charles Morris Woodford, Acting Deputy Commissioner for the British Solomon Islands, to act as British Resident in the same Group.

Mr. Woodford's head-quarters will at present be the Island of Gavatu, near Florida, but will during the year be shifted to the neighbouring Island of Tulagi, where a permanent station will be erected.

I enclose copies of a Regulation which I have issued for the purpose of preventing the introduction of contagious disease into the Group.

QUEEN'S REGULATION

(Made in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty by Her Majesty's High Commissioner for the Western Pacific in accordance with the provisions of the Pacific Order in Council, 1893.)

TO PREVENT THE INTRODUCTION OF CONTAGIOUS DISEASE
INTO THE BRITISH SOLOMON ISLANDS.

PART I.

INTERPRETATION.

1. In this regulation, unless the subject or context otherwise requires—

The Group.—"The Group" means the islands comprised in the protectorate established by Her Majesty in the Solomon Islands:

Health Officer.—"Health officer" means the Resident Commissioner or any person appointed by him to act as health officer under this regulation:

Seat of Government.—"Seat of Government" means the Island of Gavatu, near Florida, until such time as the Resident Commissioner shall move his head office to the Island of Tulagi, near Gavatu, when it shall mean the Island of Tulagi:

Vessel in quarantine.—"Vessel in quarantine" means any vessel not exempted from quarantine which has not been admitted to pratique, or which has been placed in quarantine under the provisions of this regulation:

Contagious disease.—"Contagious disease" means and includes cholera, small-pox, scarlet fever (scarlatina), oriental plague, typhoid fever, typhus fever, yellow fever, measles, and any disease the nature of which is doubtful so far as its being one of the aforesaid diseases or not.

PART II.

EXEMPTIONS FROM QUARANTINE.

2. *Vessels exempted.*—Vessels entering the group from one of the Australasian colonies, including Fiji and British New Guinea, or from New Caledonia, Tonga, or Samoa, shall, subject to the conditions hereinafter contained, be exempt from entering into quarantine: Provided always that—

(a) *Under what conditions.*—Such vessel have a clean bill of health signed, in the case of a vessel from one of the Australasian colonies, by the proper authority in such colony; or, in the case of a vessel from New Caledonia, Samoa, or Tonga, by a British consular officer at the port of departure;

(b) There be no person on board suffering from any contagious disease;

(c) Such vessel shall not, after leaving the port where it obtained its bill of health and before arriving in the Group, have communicated except by signal with any other vessel or place beyond the Group;

(d) That the master of such vessel shall, when required by the health officer, produce the bill of health herein provided, and that the master and the surgeon (if any) shall, if required by the health officer, answer in writing and sign the questions contained in the Schedule hereto, as provided in the case of vessels not exempted from quarantine;

(e) That the health officer may at any time, if he shall think necessary, order such vessel into quarantine.

PART III.

VESSELS ARRIVING IN THE GROUP IN QUARANTINE OR PLACED IN QUARANTINE WHILE IN THE GROUP.

3. *Unexempted vessels to perform quarantine.*—All vessels not exempt from quarantine under this regulation shall proceed to the Seat of the Government, and shall perform quarantine until pratique is granted by the health officer.

4. *Vessels from infected places to be detained twenty-one days.*—Vessels coming from the protectorate established by His Imperial German Majesty in New Guinea, New Ireland, New Britain, and the Solomon Islands, or from any other place where there is any infectious disease, shall not be admitted to pratique until after the expiration of at least twenty-one days from leaving the last place of call. Provided that the health officer may permit passengers and cargo to be landed at a quarantine station as hereinafter provided.

5. *Quarantine signals.*—Every vessel entering the Group in quarantine shall, on arriving within three miles of the coast, exhibit on the foremast-head a yellow flag by day and a green light by night until such time as pratique shall have been given.

6. *Vessel to anchor where directed.*—No vessel in quarantine shall anchor at any place distant more than two miles from the Seat of Government, and every such vessel, if so directed, shall anchor at such place as the health officer may require.

7. *Quarantined vessel not to communicate except by signal.*—It shall be unlawful for any vessel in quarantine to communicate, otherwise than by signal, with any island, vessel, or place within the Group, or to approach within one hundred yards of any other vessel in any harbour at any place within the Group, or for any person, except as provided for in this regulation, to leave any such vessel or to transmit any article therefrom, or for any person except the health officer and his boat's crew to approach within one hundred yards of a vessel in quarantine at any place within the waters of the Group.

8. *Inquiry by health officer.*—The health officer shall approach the vessel on the windward side within speaking distance, but he shall not go on board nor grant the vessel pratique until there shall have been delivered to him a copy of the Schedule hereto attached with the questions therein contained answered in writing and signed by the master and by the surgeon (if any) of the vessel. Such master or surgeon shall answer the aforesaid questions truthfully and upon oath or not on oath, according as may be desired by the health officer.

9. *Contagious disease to be reported.*—Every master or surgeon of a vessel which shall at any time have on board any person afflicted with a contagious disease who shall fail to declare the same by the first opportunity to the health officer, or who shall attempt to conceal from the health officer any person so affected, or who shall refuse or fail to bring every person on board such vessel before such health officer for inspection at the request of such health officer, and the master of any vessel that, on the demand of the health officer, shall fail or refuse to produce for inspection by him the log-book and journal of such vessel, shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation.

10. *Surgeon to report contagious disease to master.*—Any surgeon of a vessel who shall fail to inform the master thereof of the existence of any infectious or contagious disease on board such vessel, and who shall knowingly allow the introduction of such disease into any port or place in the Group, shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation.

11. *Answering falsely.*—Any person whatever on board any vessel in quarantine or otherwise who shall refuse to answer or shall answer falsely or evasively any question contained in the Schedule hereto, or such other questions as may be put to him by the health officer, shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation.

12. *Health officer may fix limits of quarantine station.*—The health officer, in any case in which he deems it necessary, may determine a place or places at any greater distance than one hundred yards from any vessel in quarantine or from the boundary of any quarantine station at which guard-posts or guard-boats shall be stationed or warning-signals displayed. At every such guard-post or guard-boat and for every warning-signal as aforesaid a red flag shall be used by day and a red light by night, and any person except the health officer entering the space enclosed by such guard-posts, guard-boats, or warning-signals shall, if thought necessary by the health officer, be detained in quarantine, and shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation.

13. *Visiting parties.*—A visiting party, under the charge of the health officer, flying a red flag by day or displaying a red light by night, may proceed as often as necessary as far as the boundary of the quarantine station or as far as one hundred yards from a vessel in quarantine, or, subject to the direction of the health officer, to any safe or convenient spot at or near low water, in order to convey any communication to and fro and whatever provisions and other necessities are required by those in quarantine, and shall leave the same in some safe place to be approved of by the health officer, so that those persons in quarantine may procure such provisions or necessities after the visiting party shall have retired at least one hundred yards; but any person in quarantine who shall approach or remain within one hundred yards of any of the visiting party, or any of the visiting party who shall approach or remain within the same distance of any person in quarantine, or any person who shall send or take away from a quarantine station when used as such or from any vessel or boat in quarantine any article that has not previously been disinfected as prescribed by the health officer, shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation.

14. *Vessels in the Group may be placed in quarantine.*—When the health officer shall from any cause believe that disease exists in any portion of the Group, and that any vessel other than those coming from beyond the Group should be put in quarantine, it shall be lawful for such health officer to direct that such vessel be put in quarantine, and such vessel shall thereupon display a yellow flag by day and a green light by night, and shall thenceforth be dealt with under this regulation as if such vessel were a vessel coming from beyond the Group and placed in quarantine, and such vessel may be ordered to proceed to the Seat of Government to perform quarantine.

15. *Signals to be exhibited at quarantine stations.*—When any quarantine station is used as such a yellow flag shall be kept constantly flying at some conspicuous place in such station from sunrise to sunset, and from sunset to sunrise such quarantine station shall exhibit a green light, and the display of such flag or such light shall be deemed sufficient notice that such station and the land or sea surrounding it to the distance of one hundred yards, or if guard-posts, guard-boats, or warning-signals have been placed round the quarantine station, that the land and sea from the station up to such guard-posts, guard-boats, or warning-signals are in quarantine.

16. *Breaking quarantine.*—Every person who, being subjected to quarantine, shall, on any pretence whatsoever, leave any quarantine station or any vessel, boat, or place in quarantine until he shall have been admitted to pratique by the health officer shall be guilty of an offence against this Regulation. Provided always that it shall be lawful for the health officer to permit any person to leave quarantine, under such precautions as such health officer may consider necessary, to go on board any vessel that has cleared outwards to leave the Group; but any vessel receiving on board any such person, or having any communication with the same, shall thenceforth be treated as a vessel in quarantine, and shall, until clear of the Group, display quarantine signals.

17. *Embarking in vessel in quarantine.*—Nothing in this regulation shall prevent any person from embarking in any vessel when in quarantine for the purpose of being a passenger therein or one of the officers or crew thereof. Provided that nothing in this section shall be held to authorize any person who shall have embarked in any vessel for any of the purposes mentioned in this section to quit such vessel or to communicate otherwise than by signal with the shore or any other vessel in any harbor or roadstead in the Group respectively while such vessel first mentioned shall remain in quarantine, and every person so embarking who shall, in relation to such embarkation, fail to obey any directions and orders which he shall receive in regard thereto from the officer of police or other officer appointed to direct the due observance of quarantine at any place or quarantine station shall be guilty of an offence against this regulation.

18. *Entering quarantine station through ignorance.*—Should any person through ignorance, stress of weather, or other accident land upon or approach within one hundred yards of any quarantine station, when occupied as such, or within one hundred yards of any boat or vessel in quarantine, or proceed within the space enclosed by any guard-boats, guard-posts, or warning-signals, such person shall be detained in quarantine at his own expense until he can safely be liberated by the health officer.

19. *Health officer's crew.*—All persons belonging to the boat of the health officer who shall have been on board any vessel either when such vessel was in quarantine, or immediately before such vessel was ordered to perform quarantine, shall remain on board such vessel, return thither, or proceed to a quarantine station, as may be directed by the health officer.

20. *Health officer may set apart quarantine station.*—The health officer may appropriate or set apart, either permanently or temporarily, any place or vessel as a quarantine station, where any person's cargo or baggage may be landed and detained, or where any vessel may be anchored in quarantine, and may also temporarily put in quarantine any place or places required for the passage of any person or of any boat or vessel from any vessel or place in quarantine to any other vessel or place in quarantine. Provided that it shall not be compulsory for the health officer to set apart or provide any quarantine station as aforesaid.

21. *Cargo and passenger in quarantined vessel may be taken away from the Group.*—In the event of the health officer not providing a quarantine station where passengers and cargo may be landed, it shall be lawful for any vessel in quarantine to leave the Group with its passengers and cargo, notwithstanding that such passengers and cargo may have been received on board for the purpose of being landed or transhipped within the group.

22. *Vessels in quarantine to wait for health officer.*—In the event of a vessel in quarantine arriving at the Seat of Government during the temporary absence of the health officer, such vessel shall perform quarantine until the return of the health officer, and such further period as the health officer may direct.

23. *Cargo to be disinfected.*—Before releasing any person, cargo, or vessel from quarantine the health officer may require that all personal effects, cargo, or the vessel be disinfected in such manner as he may direct.

24. *Expenses of quarantine to be borne by vessel.*—All expenses incurred in the landing of any persons or cargo in quarantine, in the maintenance of persons in quarantine, and in disinfecting cargo, effects, or the vessel, shall be borne by the master and owners of the vessel; and the health officer may require security to his satisfaction for such expenses before allowing any person, effects, or cargo to be placed in a quarantine station, or before admitting any vessel to pratique.

25. *Penalty.*—Any person omitting to do anything required by this regulation, or doing, or aiding, abetting, or advising the

doing of anything prohibited by this regulation, shall be liable, on conviction, to imprisonment not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding One hundred pounds, or to both punishments.

This regulation may be cited as "*The Quarantine (Solomons) Regulation 1897.*"

OF CIGARS.

ON and after the 1st April, 1897, an allowance not exceeding 20 per cent. of the net weight of imported duty-paid tobacco leaf will be made for the waste of material used in the manufacture of cigars by manufacturers working under a £50 or £5 licence.

2. The precise amount of allowance, not exceeding 20 per cent., shall be fixed by the Inspector of Excise in all cases, who shall take into consideration the quality of the leaf used.

3. Imported leaf tobacco, duty paid, received into any factory must be properly accounted for to the satisfaction of the Inspector of Excise; and where the tobacco is received into the factory in the original package as delivered from bond a copy of the entry upon which duty was paid; duly indorsed by the locker, must be produced.

4. Manufacturers who sell imported leaf to other manufacturers must keep a strict account of their sales, showing to whom sold, &c.; and they must weigh out, to the satisfaction of the Inspector, the quantities they require for their own use from time to time.

5. Clauses 23 and 24 of the regulations of 28th January, 1896, relating to the manufacture of cigars must be strictly complied with.

6. All waste material must be produced to the Inspector, and weighed and destroyed in his presence.

7. Any request or direction of the Inspector in connexion with the method of accounting for waste or disposing of the same must be complied with.

8. The percentage of loss on imported leaf tobacco used in the manufacture of cigars is to be credited to the excise accounts of manufacturers subject to section 11 of the regulations.

9. When it is desired to pay duty on cigars manufactured from duty-paid leaf, the Inspector shall certify on the entry the quantity of cigars which may be deducted from the gross quantity as an allowance for the waste of leaf occasioned in their manufacture (not being an amount greater than an equivalent to 20 per cent. of the leaf used in their manufacture), and no entry shall be received unless bearing such certificate.

10. These regulations shall come into force on 1st April next, and shall apply to any cigars upon which excise duty may be paid from that date inclusive.

11. The Minister may at any time revoke or vary these regulations.

The births of 962 children, viz., 472 boys and 490 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of February. The number was, it will be observed, 209 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, and as much as 212 below that average, if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in February numbered 477, viz., 249 of males and 228 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 485, or 102 per cent. The deaths, it will be noticed, fell off considerably (by no fewer than 152) as compared with the corresponding month of the previous year, and were by far the least numerous recorded for the month during the previous ten years. They were, moreover, 248 below the average of February during the previous ten years, and, if allowance be made for the increase of population, they will be found to have been lower than that average by 250.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 27.80 and of deaths registered 13.78 per annum, as compared with averages for the same month during the last ten years of 34.10 and 21.35 respectively, and averages for the whole year of 34.55 and 18.41.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 95.6° on the 18th, and the lowest was 48.9° on the 22nd. The mean temperature of the month (64.7°) was two degrees below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (33.3°) took place on the 16th, and the least range (2.0°) on the 19th. The mean daily range was 17.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.137 inches on the 9th and 11th, and the lowest was 29.508 inches on the 23rd. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.894 inches) was about the average.

Rain fell on thirteen days, the amount of rainfall being 2.97 inches, or about one-ninth of an inch lower than in February, 1896, but the highest recorded for the month during the previous nine years; it was, moreover, 1.91 inches above the average of the last ten years, but 2.45 inches below the maximum ever recorded for the month, viz., 5.42 inches in February, 1875.

Fog occurred on one day during the month.

Males contributed 52 per cent. and females 48 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 34 per cent. to that mortality, as against 42 per cent. in February, 1896; 40 per cent. in February, 1895; 40 per cent. in February, 1894; 49 per cent. in February, 1893; 49 per cent. in February, 1892; and 49 per cent. in February, 1891.

Twenty-nine deaths of persons who had attained or passed the age of 75 years were recorded during the month. Of these, two gentlemen, each aged 75, died of typhoid fever and cerebral effusion, respectively; a female, aged 75, of valvular disease of the heart; a labourer, aged 75, of nephritis; a gentleman, aged 76, of cancer; a female, aged 76, of apoplexy; a nurse, aged 76, of paralysis; a gentleman, aged 76, of syncope; a tailor, aged 76, of pneumonia; a gentleman, aged 76, of hepatitis; a female, aged 77, of pneumonia; a female and a contractor, each aged 80, of heart disease and disease of the prostate respectively; a female, aged 83, of dysentery; a bootmaker, aged 85, of pneumonia; a gentleman, aged 86, of bronchitis; a pilot, aged 88, of congestion of the brain; a female, aged 90, of heart disease; a butcher and a female, each aged 95, of cancer and enteritis respectively; an agent, aged 75, a farmer, aged 77, a laundress, aged 79, a master mariner and a farmer, each aged 80, a female, aged 82, a contractor, aged 83, a female, aged 84, and a butcher, aged 86, of old age.

Thirty-one deaths during the month were from external causes, of which 26 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 3 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A watchmaker, aged 50, and a labourer, aged 74, were passed over by railway trains; a labourer, aged 42, by a waggon; a seaman, aged 50, died of fracture of the skull, and a labourer, aged 56, of fracture of the ribs, the result of falls from horses; a boy, aged 11, of fracture of the skull, caused by falling off a fence; a miner, aged 53, of injuries received, consequent on a fall from a window; a labourer, aged 42, of fracture of the spine, the result of a bag of coal falling on him; a pensioner, aged 63, was killed by a portion of a house falling on him; a waterman, aged 74, died of fracture of the skull, owing to an accidental fall; a male child, aged 1 year, of burns; a female child, aged 6, of sunstroke; two boys, aged 7 and 12 respectively, were drowned through falling into the River Yarra; nine persons were found drowned, viz., a boy, aged 5, a hairdresser, aged 26, a seaman, aged 45, a foreman, aged 68, and a labourer, aged 69, in the River Yarra; a gardener, aged 69, in the Saltwater River; a male, of occupation unknown, aged 70, in Coode's Canal; a labourer, aged 49, at Brunswick; and a dealer, aged 59, in the Moonee Ponds Creek; a male child, aged 5 weeks, was accidentally suffocated by his mother pressing him to her breast; two male infants, aged 12 and 19 days respectively, died of umbilical hæmorrhage. The homicidal deaths were those of a female child, aged 1 month, who was found drowned in the River Yarra; and a boy, aged 11 months, who was overlain by his mother, who was intoxicated; a verdict of wilful murder being returned in the former case and of manslaughter in the latter. The suicidal deaths were those of a draper, aged 36, and an estate agent, aged 42, who shot themselves; and a female, aged 36, who drowned herself.

One hundred and three deaths, or 22 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—43 in the Melbourne, 12 in the Alfred, 4 in St. Vincent's, 6 in the Women's, 5 in the Children's, 2 in the Homeopathic, and 5 in the Austin Hospitals; 7 in the Metropolitan and 1 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 2 in the Immigrants' Home, 11 in the Benevolent Asylum, 3 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor, and 2 in the Protestant Refuge.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 165, of which 83, or 50 per cent., were of males, and 82, or 50 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 129 were under one year of age, 24 were between one and two, 4 were between two and three, 6 were between three and four, and 2 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 312. Of these, 165, or 53 per cent., were males, and 146, or 47 per cent., were females; 11 were between five and ten, 12 were between ten and fifteen, 7 were between fifteen and twenty, 19 were between twenty and twenty-five, 24 were between twenty-five and thirty, 23 were between thirty and thirty-five, 32 were between thirty-five and forty, 17 were between forty and forty-five, 23 were between forty-five and fifty, 13 were between fifty and fifty-five, 22 were between fifty-five and sixty, 30 were between sixty and sixty-five, 26 were between sixty-five and seventy, 24 were between seventy and seventy-five, 14 were between seventy-five and eighty, 8 were between eighty and eighty-five, 4 were between eighty-five and ninety, 1 was between ninety and ninety-five, and 2 were between ninety-five and one hundred.

In the month under review, deaths from all classes of disease show a marked falling off as compared with February, 1896; those from zymotic diseases having decreased by 6, those from dietetic diseases by 10, those from developmental diseases by 18, those from local diseases by 108, and those from violence by 6. Of the decrease under local diseases 49 took place under diseases of the digestive system—deaths from enteritis alone having fallen off by 47, 27 under diseases of the nervous system, 20 under those of the respiratory system, and 11 under those of the circulatory system; whilst of the decrease under dietetic diseases, 9 occurred under starvation; and of that under developmental diseases, 9, and 7 occurred under the heads of premature birth and old age respectively.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1896, and the first two months of 1897, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year; it will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November. It will also be noticed that the mortality from diphtheria has steadily increased since 1893, when, however, it was exceptionally low; whilst that from typhoid fever has varied but little since 1894:—

Any person hereinbefore designated neglecting to send the above notice is liable (unless he can prove he was aware such case had already been reported) to a fine of Twenty pounds.

SWAN HILL SHIRE.

PROPOSED SEVERANCE OF AREA AND CONSTITUTION OF A NEW MUNICIPALITY.

IN pursuance of the provisions of the *Local Government Act 1890* (No. 1112, section 43), the substance and prayer of a Petition in accordance with the 10th section of Act 1243 and the 41st section of Act 1112, which has been presented to His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published, viz.:—

The petitioners purport to constitute a majority of the rate-payers in the portion of the Shire of Swan Hill which is described in their petition, and they desire that the area so described may be severed from the Shire of Swan Hill, and constituted a new municipality under the name or title of "The Shire of Tatchera."

The petitioners state that the portion sought to be severed has become a most important farming and agricultural district, and the larger portion of it is very remote from Kerang, and that their interests would be better served by being constituted a separate shire, as it could be more economically worked and the district more fully developed.

Area described in petition:—

Commencing at the north-west angle of mallee allotment 35A, being the north-west corner of the parish of Lalbert, county of Tatchera; thence southerly by the western boundary of mallee allotment 35A to its south-west angle; thence southerly by the southern boundary of aforesaid mallee allotment to Lake Lalbert; thence southerly by the western margin of that lake and Lalbert Creek to the road to Ninjenook at the north-east angle of allotment 17, section 4, parish of Towaninny; thence south-westerly by that road to the north-west angle of allotment 25A, section 1; thence east and south by that allotment to the north boundary of the Towaninny Pre-emptive section; thence east by that section and allotment 22 to the north-east angle of said allotment 22; thence southerly by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 17A; thence easterly by a road to the north-east angle of allotment 13; thence southerly by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 2; thence west by a road to the north-west angle of allotment 44, section 1, parish of Ninjenook; thence south by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 15; thence east by a road to the north-west angle of allotment 13; thence south, east, and south by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 9A; thence east by a road to the south-east angle of allotment 10, section 1, parish of Ninjenook, and further east by a line to the Avoca River; thence easterly and north-easterly by that river to the north boundary of the parish of Yeruk; thence easterly by that boundary to the west boundary of the parish of Marmal; thence north and easterly by the west and north boundaries of the parish of Marmal to the west boundary of the parish of Gredwin; thence south and east by the west and south boundaries of that parish and a line further east to the north-east angle of mallee allotment 149A; thence south by that allotment to the south-east angle thereof; thence east by the south boundaries of mallee allotments 149A, 148, and 143, and northerly and westerly by the east and north boundaries of the last-mentioned allotment to the south-west angle of allotment 29A, parish of Leaghur; thence north-easterly by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 28; thence northerly and easterly by that allotment to the south-east angle of mallee allotment 133; thence northerly by the east boundary of that allotment to the north-east angle thereof; thence east by the south boundary of mallee allotment 132 and north by the east boundaries of that allotment and mallee allotment 132A to the south

boundary of mallee allotment 120A; thence east by the south boundaries of that allotment and mallee allotment 120C, to its south-east angle; thence in a north-easterly direction by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 36, section 1, parish of Meerling; thence west by a road to the south-east angle of mallee allotment 107A; thence in a northerly direction by the eastern boundary of the parish of Kooranjie to the north-west angle of allotment 1, parish of Dartagook; south side of three-chain road near Cullen's Lake; thence south-westerly along the south side of said three-chain road, being the northern boundary of the parish of Kooranjie, to the junction of three-chain roads at the south-west angle of allotment 21, parish of Bael Bael; thence northerly and westerly along a three-chain road to the north-east angle of allotment 1 on the north boundary of the parish of Bael Bael; thence westerly by the northern boundaries of the parishes of Bael Bael, Korrak Korrak and Gnawee, to the Swan Hill road; thence south-westerly by that road to the north-east corner of the parish of Lalbert; thence westerly by the north boundary of the parish of Lalbert to the north-west corner thereof, being the point of commencement.

Petitioners therefore pray that His Excellency in Council may be pleased to sever the area above described and constitute it a separate municipality, under the name and title of "The Shire of Tatchera," such municipality to be not subdivided.

KORUMBURRA WATERWORKS TRUST.—
REGULATION No. 1.

THE Korumburra Waterworks District having been proclaimed an Urban District on the 31st of December, 1896, the Chairman and Commissioners of the Korumburra Waterworks Trust do hereby, in pursuance and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred upon them by the *Water Act 1890*, make the following Regulation:—

1. Supply not compulsory.—It shall not be compulsory on the Trust to supply or to continue to supply any water to any person whomsoever.

2. Trust not liable.—The Trust shall not be liable to any penalty or damages for not supplying water if the want of such supply arises from unavoidable cause or accident.

3. Meter to be provided by consumer.—Every person who shall have agreed with the Trust for a supply of water by measure shall, at his own expense, provide a meter and keep and maintain the same in good working order and condition to the satisfaction of the Trust, and in the event of any repairs thereto being required, notice in writing shall be immediately given by such person to the Trust.

4. Penalty for not providing meter.—If any person who, under the provisions herein contained, ought to provide a meter, neglect or refuse, after having been required by the Trust so to do, to provide such meter he shall for every day during which such neglect or refusal continues forfeit a sum not exceeding Two pounds.

5. Penalty for neglect to give notice of repairs to meters.—If any person who has provided any meter as aforesaid fail to give notice hereinbefore required of any repairs required for such meter he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

6. If meter not kept in order water may be cut off.—If any person refuse or delay to have such meter properly repaired and put in correct working order after having been required by any officer of the Trust so to do, the Trust may shut off the supply of water from the premises of such person, either by cutting the service-pipe or otherwise, until such meter shall have been properly repaired and certified by some officer of the Trust as being in proper order.

7. Trust may let meters, &c.—The Trust may let for hire to any consumer of water, supplied by measure, any meter or instrument for measuring the quantity of water supplied and consumed; any pipes and apparatus for the conveyance, reception, or storage of the water for such remuneration in money as may be agreed upon between the Trust and the consumer, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as rates due to the Trust for water.

8. Such meters, &c., not distrainable.—Such meters, instruments, pipes, and apparatus shall not be subject to distress for rent of the premises where the same are used, or be attached or taken in execution under any process of any court of law or equity, or under or in pursuance of any sequestration or order in insolvency, or other legal proceeding against or affecting the consumer of the water or the occupier of the premises or other person in whose possession the meters, pipes, instrument, and apparatus may be.

9. Penalty for fixing uncertified meter.—If any plumber or other person fix or refix any meter upon any premises supplied with water by the Trust without having first obtained a certificate from the Trust that the said meter has been examined and found in correct working condition, he shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

10. Meters, how placed.—Defective meter.—Every meter shall be placed according to the direction of duly authorized officer of the Trust and so as to be open to inspection at all times, and as far as practicable where it cannot be affected by frost or injured by any other means, and shall be provided with means of access thereto. A meter shall not be connected with more than one separate and distinct inlet pipe leading from the service-pipe or other pipe of the Trust, unless permitted in writing under the hand of the duly authorized officer of the Trust. A meter shall not be continued to be used if it is found on being tested by the Trust's officer to be inaccurate.

11. Notice of removal or change in meter.—Every person requiring to remove or alter the position of any meter shall give six days' notice in writing to that effect to the Trust, and a registration of the quantity of water used shall be taken before such removal or alteration is made.

12. Penalty for removing or altering meter without notice.—If any person remove or alter the position of or in any way interfere with any meter without giving such notice as aforesaid, he shall for such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding Five pounds over and above the damage which he may be found liable to pay in any action at law at the suit of the Trust.

13. Officers of the Trust may inspect meters.—The officers of the Trust may enter any house, building, or lands, to, through, or into which water is supplied by the Trust by measurement, conveyance, reception, or storage of water supplied or consumed, and may from time to time enter any house, building, or lands for the purpose of removing any meter, instrument, pipe, or apparatus the property of the Trust; and if any person hinders any such officer from entering or making such inspection or effecting such removal, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds: but, except with the consent of a Justice, this power of entry shall be exercised only between the hours of Ten in the forenoon and Four in the afternoon.

14. Use of hose prohibited.—No cock or tap with any connexion for attaching hose shall be affixed to any service-pipe, connexion, or fitting, and no hose or pipe shall be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground or trees or plants, or washing house walls or vehicles or animals, or for any similar purpose, unless the water is charged for by meter, without the written authority of the Trust, under a penalty not exceeding Two pounds.

15. Limit of domestic supply.—A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water for livery or carriers' stables, or a supply for any manufacturing purposes, or for irrigation, or for water power, or for fountains, or for ornamental purposes, and the supply of water for other than domestic purposes solely shall in all cases be by measure.

The Trust may supply any person with water for domestic or for domestic and other than domestic purposes by measure at such rates, upon such terms, and subject to such conditions as the Trust and the person requiring such may agree to adopt.

16. Penalty for misapplication of water.—Any person receiving water from the Trust who shall take or carry away such water from his premises, or who shall allow any person to take or carry away such water, or who shall sell the same to any other person, shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two pounds, without prejudice to the right of the Trust to recover from him the value of the water misused.

17. Penalty for waste of water.—If any person supplied with water by the Trust willfully or negligently causes or suffers any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil pan, water-closet, or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be used or contrived so that the water supplied to him by the Trust is or is likely to be wasted, misused, unduly consumed for irrigation or otherwise howsoever, or contaminated, or so as to occasion or to allow the return of foul air or other noxious or impure matter into any pipe belonging to or connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

18. Penalty for illegal use of water.—Any person not having agreed to be supplied with water by the Trust who shall take or carry away water from any stand-pipe, drinking tap, water trough, or private or public service-pipes, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

19. Licence to lay service-pipes.—Penalty for breach of this clause.—Before any person shall affix any service pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter or repair or in any manner interfere with any pipe of the Trust, or any service-pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall obtain from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such works, and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service-pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

20. Licence-fee.—Licences to affix and lay or alter or repair service-pipes, to tap mains and sub-mains, and to do and execute generally the plumbing and other work necessary for laying on and maintaining water services may be granted to persons who shall satisfy the Trust of their competency to perform such plumbing and other work upon payment of an annual fee of One pound.

21. It shall not be compulsory on the Trust to grant a licence to every or any applicant who shall prove his competency.

22. Deposit as security for good faith.—Every person previous to being licensed to lay services shall deposit with the Trust Secretary the sum of Two pounds sterling as security for the strict observance and performance of the regulations and conditions contained in this regulation, and in case of the non-observance or non-performance of any of such stipulations and conditions at any time by such licensed person, the Trust shall be entitled to declare his deposit absolutely forfeited, and the same shall be forfeited as liquidated damages, and the name of such person shall at once be struck off the roll of licensed plumbers. On surrender of licence to the Trust, the deposit, if not forfeited, shall be refunded.

23. Responsibility of licensee.—In every case a licensee shall be responsible for the acts and errors and omissions of his employees, and the Trust shall have power to cancel the licence at any time.

24. No pipe to be fixed without permission of Trust.—It shall be unlawful for any person, whether licensed or not, who shall offend by opening any ground so as to uncover any pipe or pipes the property of the Trust, or to a communication or service-pipe belonging to or used by the owner, occupier, consumer, or any other person, or to make any alteration in any such communication or service-pipe or in any apparatus connected therewith without the consent in every such case of the Trust, and if any person acts in any respect in contravention of the provisions of

this clause, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds without prejudice to the right of the Trust to recover damages from him in respect of any injury done to its property, and without prejudice to its right to recover from him the value of any water wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

25. Defective service-pipes, penalty for neglect to repair.—If any person shall neglect to have repaired any service-pipe conveying water from the pipes of the Trust into the premises of such person after having received notice from an officer of the Trust that such service-pipe requires repairing, the Trust may stop the water from flowing into such premises either by cutting off the service-pipe or otherwise until the necessary repairs shall have been effected. The occupier (if any) and if none the owner shall in every instance in which any damage shall be caused by reason of such service-pipes being leaky or otherwise out of repair or broken, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds, and in the event of continuing the offence to a further penalty not exceeding Two pounds for each day such offence is continued after notice thereof from the Trust.

26. Water-troughs and cisterns.—To prevent overflow, all water-troughs and cisterns must be fitted with approved self-acting tap, which shall be at all times maintained in good working order.

27. All boilers or hot-water apparatus must be supplied from cisterns, as in no case will they be permitted to be fed direct from the pipes of the Trust.

28. Baths.—In every bath the inlet must be distinct and unconnected with the outlet; the inlet pipes must be visible and accessible and be attached to the bath above the bottom thereof, and such bath shall be provided with a proper well-fitted and perfectly water-tight ground outlet plug or cock. Overflow pipes to private baths or other vessels will not be permitted except where the supply is taken by measure.

29. Water-closets.—Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush.

30. Entry of Trust's officers for purposes of inspection.—The officers of the Trust may at all reasonable hours enter any house, tenement, or land through or into which water is supplied by the Trust in order to inspect the instruments, pipes, and apparatus for conveyance, reception, or storage of water, or for the purpose of examining if there be any waste or misuse of such water.

31. Regulations for laying service.—The following regulations shall be observed by all persons in connexion with the laying of services, &c.:—

1. The whole of the pipes, tees, bends, &c., shall be sound and free from defects, and all ends of pipes, bends, &c., shall be properly threaded and capable of being screwed into thimbles, tees, &c. All delivery cocks shall be high-pressure and the best quality in workmanship. All jointing between pipes, thimbles, bends, couplings, elbows, meters, and cocks shall be made with red lead and flax.

2. No service-pipe shall be laid at a depth below the surface of less than 10 inches. After service-pipes have been laid the trench or trenches shall be properly filled in and thoroughly rammed, and any subsidence therein which may appear within three months shall be immediately made good by the owner or occupier of the premises supplied by such service-pipe. No trench made for the purpose of receiving, altering, repairing, or extending a service-pipe shall be left open after sunset.

3. No private service whatsoever shall be laid or extensions made by any licensed person unless he has ascertained at the Trust's office that the person for whom such work is intended has received the consent of the proper officers of the Trust to have such work executed.

4. Within twenty-four hours after the completion of each service the licensed person by whom such service shall have been laid shall report at the office of the Trust the completion of such service.

5. If at any time any such licensed person wilfully acts contrary to any of the provisions of this regulation, either by himself or his workmen, his name may be erased from the Trust's list of licensed plumbers.

6. Each licensed person shall be held solely responsible to the Trust for such service-pipes being laid and completed by him or his workmen in a sound workmanlike and durable manner, and maintained in that condition (sound and water-tight) for a period of three months after such service-pipe has been completed.

32. In the construction of this by-law the word "person" shall be deemed to extend to and include a corporation, whether aggregate or sole; and the word "Trust" shall mean the Korumburra Waterworks Trust.

33. No service-pipe of a larger bore than $\frac{3}{4}$ inch will be permitted, unless by special consent of the Trust, and for houses rated at Twenty pounds per annum and under the bore of the service-pipe shall not exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ inch.

34. Polluting the water.—Any person bathing, swimming horses or dogs in the Trust reservoir, or doing or permitting anything to be done whereby the water may be likely to be polluted, will be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

WHEREAS by Part I. of the *Defences and Discipline Act 1890* it is provided that the Governor may make rules and regulations for the employment, removal, or dismissal, and for the better government, of persons engaged by virtue of the said Part of the said Act, and for enforcing good order and discipline among them, and otherwise carrying out the said Part of the said Act, and from time to time annul, alter, or amend the same, and substitute others in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following alterations in the Dress Regulations for the Victorian Military Forces (that is to say):—

“In the case of a Non-Commissioned Officer or man holding two or more badges they will be worn in the following order, commencing from the point of cuff, each one inch above the other:—

When the Gunnery and Layers prizes are won by any one man the Layers badge only is to be worn, and not that for Gunnery.”

Artillery Badges.

“1st Class Badge: Crossed guns and laurel wreath worked in gold.

WHEREAS by Part I. of the *Defences and Discipline Act 1890* it is amongst other things provided that the Governor may make rules and regulations for the employment, removal, or dismissal, and for the better government, of persons engaged by virtue of the said Part of the said Act, and for enforcing good order and discipline among them, and otherwise carrying out the said Part of the said Act, and from time to time annul, alter, or amend the same and substitute others in lieu thereof: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following alterations in and additions to the Financial and Store Regulations for the Victorian Naval and Military Forces (that is to say):—

PART IV.—ALLOWANCES.*Section III.—Military Allowances.—Sub-section II.—Uniform Allowances.*

In paragraph 99 the following words are cancelled, viz.:—“All Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers of the Permanent Staff attached to Head-Quarters, and Warrant Officers of the Victorian Permanent Artillery who may wish to do so are authorized to draw money value for their boots at the following rates,” and the following words are substituted therefor:—“All Warrant and Non-commissioned Officers of the Permanent Staff attached to Head-Quarters, and Warrant Officers of the Victorian Permanent Artillery and the Victorian Permanent Engineers who may wish to do so are authorized to draw money value for their boots at the following rates.”

PART VII.—STORES.*Section I.—General Regulations, Ordnance Stores.*

After paragraph 137, the following paragraph is added, viz.:—

137A. Before issuing to the regiments of Mounted Rifles, Rangers, and Cadets, from the Ordnance Stores, arms, accoutrements, great coats, and helmets, the articles will be inspected for approval or otherwise by an Officer of the Permanent Staff of the Corps requisitioning; and the Controller will notify the Commanding Officer when stores are ready for issue, and the responsibility for any delay that may arise between the notification and the inspection will rest with the Commanding Officer. The inspecting Officer will initial the requisition against each item as he approves; and, in the event of the Controller being unwilling or unable to supply articles of a description or quality to satisfy the Inspector, the latter may provisionally reject them, reporting the fact, and in the meantime the articles that have been passed will be supplied to the Corps. The Commandant will appoint a Board to decide whether the articles provisionally rejected or other articles in stock are to be supplied; but in this connexion paragraph 167 of the Financial and Store Regulations must always be strictly observed. Should the Commandant approve that the articles rejected, and similar articles in store, are unfit for issue, he will forward the report, with any recommendation he may deem necessary, to the Secretary of Defence. No fresh supply of articles rejected is to be purchased until authority for so doing is obtained.

Section VI.—Clothing.—Sub-section V.—Badges, Chevrons, &c.

In paragraph 265, for the words “Gunnery, Laying,” the word “Artillery” is hereby substituted.

*Customs Act 1890.***DRAWBACK REGULATIONS AMENDED.**

upon which drawbacks may be allowed: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following alterations in and addition to the Drawback Regulations, and also the following alterations in Schedule No. 1 to the said Regulations (that is to say):—

In Clause 4. The words commencing "on goods" to the end of the clause are rescinded, and the following words are substituted therefor, viz:—"Rates of duty in excess of those in force at the time of the exportation of any goods for drawback will not be recognised for more than six months after the date on which the said duties were reduced."

In Clause 15. The words "originally paid" are rescinded and the words "which would be at present chargeable" are substituted therefor.

After Clause 37 the following clause is added, viz:—

Clause 38. Any person committing a breach of the Drawback Regulations will be liable to a penalty not exceeding One hundred pounds.

In Schedule No. 1 the following alterations are made, viz:—

'Cards, Playing.—Drawback rate to be 3s. per dozen packs. Carriages, Carts, and Conveyances.—The words "including second-hand" are excised.

The words "including second-hand," preceded by an asterisk, are inserted after each of the following items:—

All carts and waggons without springs, and spring carts and spring drays with two wheels;
All carriages or conveyances not otherwise enumerated;
Bicycles, tricycles, and similar vehicles.

The words "including the second-hand made-up article," preceded by an asterisk, are inserted after the item:—

"Perambulators and Children's Carriages, whether wholly or partly made up, or parts of the same."

After the item, "Pipe Organs, and all parts thereof, including Pianoforte action made up," the words "including second-hand Pipe Organs," preceded by an asterisk, are inserted, and the words "excluding second-hand," in the Drawback Rate column, are excised.

A footnote explanatory of the asterisk is inserted as follows:—

"* Subject to the conditions under Clause 15 of the Regulations."

CITY OF BALLAARAT.

BY-LAW NO. 81.

A By-law of the City of Ballarat made under section 191 of the *Local Government Act 1890*, and numbered 81, for regulating the speed that cyclists shall ride through the streets of the city, and for the better regulation and government of riding and driving of bicycles and other velocipedes.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1890*, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the City of Ballarat order as follows:-

No person driving, riding, or impelling a machine shall proceed at a greater speed than 8 miles per hour upon or along any of the streets or public places within the City of Ballarat, nor shall proceed at a greater speed than 5 miles per hour upon, over, or along any crossing within the said city.

No person whilst riding, driving, or impelling a machine through the said streets shall ride with his feet off the pedals, or with his hands off the handle bars, or otherwise ride the machine carelessly or negligently, or adopt the practice generally known as "coasting;" but shall so ride, drive, or impel the machine in such a manner that he shall at all times retain full control thereof.

When a person who is riding, driving, or impelling a machine is passing any pedestrian, vehicle, or machine going in the same direction he shall pass such pedestrian, vehicle, or machine at a distance of not less than 6 feet on the off side, and shall maintain such distance for at least 30 feet ahead of such pedestrian, vehicle, or machine before crossing to the near side of the roadway.

This by-law shall be read and construed as one with By-law No. 64 of the City of Ballarat, as if this by-law had been originally included or formed part of said By-law No. 64, and the word "machine" herein shall mean a bicycle, tricycle, or other velocipede.

Any person offending against or failing to observe this by-law shall on conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding (£5) Five pounds.

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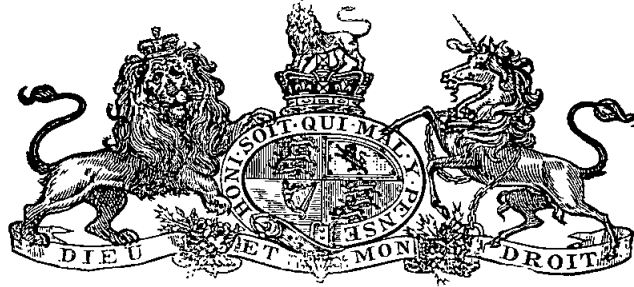
