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COMMISSION TO INQUIRE INTO CERTAIN CHARGES AGAINST THE DEPARTMENT OF LANDS AND SURVEY BY MR. F. MADDEN, M.L.A.

THE Governor in Council has, by an Order made on the 8th day of May, 1899, been pleased to appoint

HIS HONOUR SIR HARTLEY WILLIAMS, Judge of the Supreme Court of the Colony of Victoria,

to be a Commission to inquire and report as to the following charges which were made by Mr. F. Madden, M.L.A., in the Legislative Assembly, on the 15th day of December, 1898 (that is to say) :—

- (1) That in the year 1868 the Lands Department, at the instigation of Mr. David Syme, improperly and without adequate reason, and in fraud of the Land Act, proclaimed Mount Macedon a gold-field, and had certain land, portions thereof, divided into allotments under the 42nd section of *The Land Act 1865*.
- (2) That the 42nd section of *The Land Act 1865* and the regulations thereunder allowed only 20 acres to be held by one person, but Mr. Syme was nevertheless improperly and illegally allowed by the Lands Department to acquire licences, and subsequently a Crown grant for three of these allotments, consisting of about 20 acres each, although the district in which the land was situated had been proclaimed as auriferous.
- (3) That in this transaction Mr. Francis Johnson was allowed by the Department to act as a dummy for Mr. Syme, and that Dr. Howitt was allowed to be falsely represented as an applicant under an unsigned application for one of the allotments referred to in paragraph (2) above.
- (4) That an application was then made to transfer two of the three allotments to Mr. Syme, thus enabling him to obtain in all about 60 acres, and such transfer was improperly and illegally approved by the Government, and that such approval was made in violation of a law providing that no person should be entitled to hold more than 20 acres, and notwithstanding there was no district surveyor's report as required by law, and notwithstanding that Mr. Blundell, an officer of the Department, had drawn attention to the alleged violation of the law as above mentioned.
- (5) That in 1869 a new Land Act was passed, and by improper arrangement between the Government of the day and Mr. David Syme an amendment of the Act of 1865 was proposed and passed for the purpose of entitling, and which entitled, Mr. Syme, instead of having the land put up to auction with a valuation for improvements in his favour, to apply without competition to purchase the land at a price to be agreed upon by the Government.

(6) That Mr. David Syme was allowed improperly and illegally by the Government of the day to acquire the land in the first instance on the ground that it was auriferous, and afterwards, when he wanted to buy it, to get a title on the ground that it was not auriferous.

(7) That the Government and Mr. Syme corruptly agreed that he should sell to the Government the real property and certain furniture for an amount greatly exceeding their value, and such agreement was carried out, and that Mr. Skene, the then Surveyor-General, was a party to such corrupt agreement.

Reference is hereby made to the *Victorian Parliamentary Debates*, 1898, volume 90, pages 3847 to 3850, as containing the full statement in which the above charges were made.

Factories and Shops Acts.

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act*, and after due inquiry, I, the Chief Secretary of Victoria, being the responsible Minister for the time being administering the *Factories and Shops Acts*, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of section 30 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1896*, as re-enacted by the *Factories and Shops Act 1896*, in the

FACTORY OR WORK-ROOMS OF MESSRS. WRIGHT AND NEIL, MANTLE MANUFACTURERS, 318-20 BOURKE-STREET, MELBOURNE,

for a period of four weeks from the 3rd May, 1899, upon the following express conditions, that is to say:—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factory or work rooms more than twelve females for more than forty-eight hours in any one week, and that the said twelve females shall not be employed for more than fifty-six hours in any one week, nor for more than eleven hours in any one day, in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That each female so employed shall receive not less than Twelve shillings per week for each week during which she works overtime, and, in addition, each wage-worker shall be paid for such overtime at the rate of time and a half; and each piece-worker shall be paid Threepence per hour for overtime in addition to ordinary earnings by piece-work.
3. That each female so employed shall receive Sixpence tea money each evening she works overtime.
4. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without their consent.

The attention of examiners of engineers is called to the accompanying Report relating to a fatal accident to an engineer on board a British ship, and they are requested to see that all candidates for engineers' certificates realize the danger of removing a manhole door without taking the necessary precautions.

REPORT.

Board of Trade Surveyors' Office,

SIR,

We beg to report that in accordance with your instructions we visited the s.s. *Elderslie*, O.N. 89,929, and inquired into the cause of the death, at Smyrna, of Ernest Marshall, 3rd Engineer of that steamer, on the 15th October, 1898.

The *Elderslie* is a screw steamer, built in 1884, of 2,761 tons gross and 1,801 tons net register. The engines are compound, direct-acting, and there are two double-ended boilers of the usual marine type, each boiler having six furnaces, three at each end, W.P. 90 lbs. From these papers it will be seen that E. Marshall, the 3rd Engineer, was found dead in one of the boilers—under circumstances which are not readily understood. The Chief Engineer, Mr. Bishop, made a statement to us, similar to that on M. 20,464, and he was corroborated, so far as his personal knowledge went, by the 2nd engineer, and also by the Greek fireman, Spiloni, and the other firemen in the engine room and stokehold at the time. It is clear that on the vessel's arrival at Smyrna on the 14th October, after the fires had died out, the boilers were blown down between 5 and 6 p.m., and, by the instructions of the Chief Engineer, the 3rd Engineer proceeded at 7 a.m. on the following morning to take the manhole doors off. (The manholes are 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", and are in the end plate at the after end of the boiler.) He was assisted by Spiloni, who was usually detailed to work with him, and who says that one nut and one dog or cross-bar had been taken off the door, and the other nut started, when the 3rd Engineer sent him to prepare to take the door off the manhole of the other boiler. Spiloni left the 3rd Engineer, went down a ladder into the stokehold across the stokehold, up another ladder to the starboard boiler, and immediately afterwards, hearing a loud report went back to the port boiler where he had left the 3rd Engineer, and saw nothing but that the door was off and not in sight. What happened in the interval between this fireman leaving the 3rd Engineer and his return in a few minutes can only be reasoned out from the conditions and circumstances of the case as there is nothing definitely known.

The engineers and engineers' crew were at this time engaged as follows:—

Chief Engineer on deck.

2nd Engineer in engine-room at H.P. Cylinder; 1 Fireman with 2nd Engineer; 1 Fireman with 3rd Engineer; 4 Firemen cleaning engines, and 2 Trimmers cleaning tubes in boilers.

The 2nd Engineer in the engine-room heard the report, he says, about 7.15 a.m.; and describes it as being like the sound caused by coal falling in the bunkers. The Chief Engineer knew nothing until informed that the 3rd was missing. Spiloni and others had been looking about and inquiring for him. The Chief joined in the search and finally went to the manhole, when he noticed that the door was off, and not to be seen. He states that the boiler was so hot inside that he could not keep his hand in, and that on trying to put his head in the manhole he found it impossible to do so. Hot vapour was coming out of the manhole. His first thought was that the 3rd Engineer had allowed the door to drop into the boiler, and, attempting to get it out, had gone into the boiler, and been overcome by the heat. He tried to look in with lamps, &c., but could not see anything. He then got the bottom doors off, first the after bottom door and then the forward one. He could not see anything through the after door, but on looking in the forward bottom door he saw blood on the sides of the furnaces—that is, he explains there was some fresh blood as if running down on the side of the centre and wing furnaces near to the forward end of the boiler. This was at 7.45 a.m. The boiler was allowed to cool down and in about four hours the body of the 3rd Engineer was got out. It was found lying on two of the longitudinal stays close to the forward end plate, and opposite the manhole. The door was found on the top of the tubes almost underneath the body, and one of the dogs beside it—both of the studs in the door were bent and a small piece of rope was fastened to one of the studs. A spanner was found on the top of the combustion box girders, that is, half-way between the manhole and the position of the body; and a lamp, hammer, and chisel and broom-head or brush were found in the bottom of the boiler. When the body was got out it was found that the skull was fractured, and that the skin were exposed peeled off when rubbed. A surgeon certified that the skull was fractured but does not appear to have examined the whole body, contenting himself with seeing sufficient cause for the man's death. The Master, however, says that the arms and shoulders looked to him as if seriously injured or broken, and that there was a deep mark on the forehead and the clothing torn in places.

The foregoing statement contains the important points of the case so far as we can gather them. We both have entered the boiler, examined the manhole and door, had the exact position where the body was found pointed out, and also that of the door, &c., and spanner. The whole story appears straightforward and is easily realized, but the causes which brought the body of the 3rd Engineer to the position where it was found are not so readily explained. Accepting the statements of the Master, Engineers, and Firemen (and we have no reason for doubting them), it is clear that the 3rd Engineer either (1) got into the boiler of his own accord, (2) was put in by others, or (3) met his death accidentally by causes unforeseen and unnoticed, and which no one contributed to, except himself, and that unknowingly. The first two causes must, it appears to us, be dismissed—the position of the body and the statement as to the high temperature of the boiler and other reasons rendering them

absolutely inadmissible; and after considering the whole circumstances of the case we are of opinion that the death of the 3rd Engineer was brought about in the following manner:—

The boilers were blown down and left, neither safety-valves nor cocks were opened (the Chief Engineer says he gave instructions to open the gauge cocks, but found them shut) so that when the steam condensed there would be a vacuum in the boilers. The manhole is in the after end plate, there is a small platform almost in a line with the door. The deceased took off both the nuts without starting the door, one dog was taken off, the other turned partly round, a piece of small rope (which the 2nd Engineer says was very weak stuff) was fastened to one of the studs of the door and to the gauge glass stand. He then stooped down in almost a lying position, probably holding the door by one of the studs, or by the rope, with one hand, and perhaps tapping it with the spanner in the other hand, when the door started, was suddenly driven inwards by the pressure of the atmosphere with great force, the rope broke, and the deceased, involuntarily tightening his grip on the stud or rope, was drawn into the boiler—the inrush of air assisting this movement, as his body became near to or partly filled the hole—and he was propelled with such violence as to fracture his skull on the other end of the boiler, or it may be by striking the plate at the manhole as his head was entering it.

This explanation, which from its singularity may at first appear somewhat doubtful, is the only one which we think fits all the known facts of the case, such as:—the short interval which elapsed between the time when the fireman Spiloni left the 3rd Engineer and his return to the manhole; the short time from starting work at 7 a.m. until the report was heard fifteen minutes later; the sudden disappearance of the 3rd Engineer; the condition and position of the body when found, the position of the door, spanner, &c.; and also the high temperature of the boiler.

It certainly appears extraordinary that a man could be drawn into a boiler through a manhole with such force as to fracture his skull on the end plate, 16 feet from the hole, and in a direct line with it, but the stays would form a sort of guide to keep the door and body travelling in a horizontal and direct line, and it may be added that the deceased was not a big man. He is said to have been about 10 stone in weight and 5ft. 5in. high. It can be seen by examination of the small platform at the manhole that the occurrence is at least quite possible. At any rate, unless the whole story is disbelieved, a manhole door weighing 85 lbs. was found along with the body of the 3rd Engineer, close to the end plate furthest from the manhole, and had been in that position for some hours and from a time when the condition of the boiler was such that no one would have entered it, or could have lived therein.

We wish to add that, although death under the above circumstances is probably unprecedented, the violent inrush of a manhole door due to vacuum in the boiler, has been frequently experienced. A case somewhat analogous occurred in one of the steamers of the — Line, which hearing about, we inquired as to the facts from the Superintendent who kindly sent the attached letter describing the case.*

We have inquired in reference to the circumstances of this case of the Master, 1st and 2nd Engineers, Spiloni, and the other men. The firemen are Greeks, and understand very little English. The present 3rd Engineer, who is a native of Smyrna, and can speak English and Greek, acted as interpreter.

The area of the manhole, 16½" x 12½", is about 156 sq. inches, and, assuming a temperature of about 180 degrees in the boiler, there might exist an external pressure of 7 lbs. per sq. in., which, if suddenly applied, would exert a force of 1,092 lbs., at any rate sufficient force would be exerted to set up a high velocity on the door when suddenly relieved.

Referring to our conversation this morning, relative to the death of an engineer in a boiler on board a British steamer at Smyrna, it affords me some pleasure to give you the details of an almost similar occurrence on board one of the steamers of the — Line some few years ago. They are as follows:—The vessel arrived on a Saturday evening, and, it being necessary to get the men in the boiler at the earliest possible moment for cleaning purposes, one of the junior engineers was ordered to the ship on Sunday morning. His instructions were to pump the remaining water out of the boiler, and he did this without admitting air. So far as we were able to gather at the time, it seems that the engineer, together with a Chinese fireman, went to take off the lower manhole door. This door was some few inches above the stokehole floor, and, as is the usual practice of Chinamen, the fireman assumed the "squatting" attitude. He was left to himself to remove the nuts and dogs of the door, and when he had done so, he started the door, and was instantaneously drawn in towards the boiler, his stomach practically closing the aperture, and the door swinging to the back of the boiler with a loud report.

Hearing the fireman's cries, the engineer opened the gauge cocks in order to admit air to the boiler, whilst the fireman in the meantime suffered great agony, being pinned in this position until the vacuum was destroyed.

When the matter was reported to me the next morning, I saw the fireman, who complained of internal injuries. These, however, do not appear to have been of a severe nature, as the man was able to resume his work in a few days.

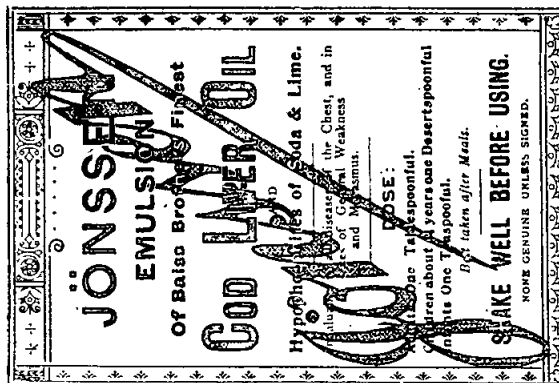

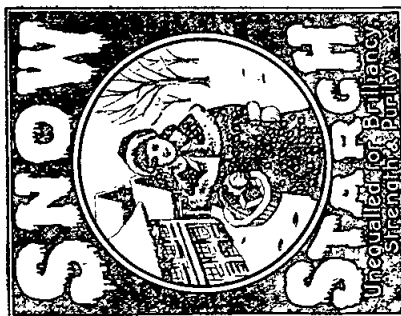

Dentists Act 1898.

DENTAL BOARD OF VICTORIA.

REGULATIONS.

I. Candidates for registration as Dentists under the *Dentists Act 1898*, section 8, sub-section (c), and for the Diploma of Licentiate of Dental Surgery of Victoria, shall produce evidence of having—

- (a) Passed a Preliminary Examination.
- (b) Served an Apprenticeship.
- (c) Pursued a Course of Professional Study.

A.—*As regards the Preliminary Examination.*

II. Every person except as hereinafter provided for shall, before he enters upon the course of study herein prescribed, pass before the Examiners appointed by the Board a Preliminary Examination in four at least of the following subjects, of which Latin shall be one:—

English	Arithmetic	French
German	History	Algebra
Latin	Geometry	Geography.

III. In lieu of the Preliminary Examination to be passed before the Examiners appointed by the Board, the Board will accept as a substitute for such examination one of the following as the examination to be passed before any person enters into his indentures of apprenticeship:—

- (a) The matriculation examination of the University of Melbourne or other equivalent examination prescribed for admission to some one of the Public Universities in some part of Her Majesty's Dominions. Provided that one of the subjects passed at such examination was Latin; or, if the student did not at such examination pass in Latin, in addition to such examination an examination either at the same or some other such University in Latin, the standard for such examination being at least equal to the standard for Latin for the time being prescribed for matriculation at the Melbourne University.
- (b) The Preliminary Examination of the College of Pharmacy held under sub-clause (IV.), section 88 of the *Medical Act 1890*, Part III.

IV. Every candidate shall lodge with the Registrar of the Board the necessary certificate or certificates from the proper authorities that he has passed an examination as aforesaid.

B.—*As regards Apprenticeship.*

V. Subsequent to such preliminary examination every candidate (hereinafter called a dental student) shall be apprenticed under articles of indenture with a registered Victorian dentist for a period of not less than three years. Provided that, in the case of students indentured up to the 31st December, 1901, the preliminary examination may be passed at any time prior to entering on the last two years of apprenticeship.

VI. A copy of the articles of indenture shall in every case be filed with the Registrar of the Dental Board within three months from the date of their execution.

C.—*As regards the Course of Professional Study.*

VII. Dental students shall pursue their studies for four years and pass four examinations before the Board.

During the first year dental students shall attend the following courses of lectures:—

1. *Chemistry, theoretical and practical.*—The course at the University of Melbourne, Part I.; or at the Melbourne College of Pharmacy, or at the Schools of Mines at Ballarat or Bendigo, or at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
2. *Anatomy.*—The course of lectures on junior anatomy at the University of Melbourne; or the course of lectures on anatomy, with special reference to the head and neck, at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at any school of anatomy that may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
3. *Dental Mechanics and Metallurgy.*—The course of lectures at the Australian College of Dentistry for first year students, or the course at any public educational institution that may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.

The subjects of examination for the first year shall be—

1. *Chemistry, theoretical and practical.*
2. *Anatomy, with special reference to the head and neck.*
3. *Dental Mechanics and Metallurgy.*

During the second year dental students shall attend—

1. *Lectures in Materia Medica and Therapeutics*, with special application to dentistry.—The course at the Melbourne College of Pharmacy, or at the Schools of Mines at Ballarat or Bendigo, or at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
2. *Lectures in Physiology and Histology*, practically illustrated, with special reference to dentistry.—At the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
3. *A course of Dissections*, including dissections of the head and neck.—At the University of Melbourne, or at any medical school that may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.

The subjects of examination for the second year shall be—

1. *Materia Medica and Therapeutics*, with special application to dentistry.
2. *Physiology and Histology*, with special reference to dentistry.
3. *Dissections*, with special examination of the head and neck.

During the third year dental students shall attend the following courses of lectures :—

1. *Medicine*, with clinical illustrations.—The course at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
2. *Dental Surgery, Pathology, and Bacteriology*.—The course with practical illustrations for third year students, at the Australian College of Dentistry, or the course at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
3. *Dental Mechanics and Metallurgy*.—The course at the Australian College of Dentistry for third year students, or the course at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
4. *General Surgery and Pathology*.—The course, with specimens and exhibits, at the Australian College of Dentistry, or the course at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.

Students shall produce a certificate of having attended during nine months of the year the dental practice of the Australian College of Dentistry, or of such other dental hospital as shall from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose, such attendance to include clinical instruction and lectures.

The subjects of examination for the third year shall be :—

1. *Medicine*.
2. *Dental Surgery, Pathology, and Bacteriology*.
3. *Dental Mechanics and Metallurgy*.
4. *General Surgery and Pathology*.

During the fourth year dental students shall attend the following courses of lectures :—

1. *Dental Anatomy and Oral Surgery*, with clinical illustrations.—The course at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.
2. *Dental Surgery, Pathology, and Bacteriology*, with practical illustrations.—The course at the Australian College of Dentistry for fourth year students, or the course at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.

During the year students shall attend the course of practical laboratory work in dental mechanics and metallurgy at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose.

Students shall also produce a certificate of having attended during nine months of the year the dental practice of the Australian College of Dentistry, or of such other dental hospital as shall from time to time be prescribed by regulation for the purpose, such attendance to include clinical instruction and lectures.

The subjects of Examination of the fourth year shall be—

1. *Dental Anatomy and Oral Surgery*.
2. *Dental Surgery, Pathology, and Bacteriology*.
3. *Dental Mechanics and Metallurgy*.

Candidates who have passed all the foregoing examinations and fulfilled all the prescribed conditions, shall be entitled to registration as Dentists and to the Diploma of Licentiate of Dental Surgery of Victoria.

EXAMINATIONS.

VIII. The annual examinations before the Board shall consist of—(a) Pass Examinations for the different years of study; and (b) Supplementary Examinations to be held not less than six weeks subsequently to the pass examinations. Any student who has failed in any subject at the last previous Pass Examination shall be permitted to present himself at the supplementary examination.

IX. Any student who has failed in one subject only at any Pass Examination shall require re-examination in that subject only; otherwise he must again present himself for re-examination in all subjects.

X. No student shall be permitted to enter upon the examinations of a more advanced year of study unless and until he has obtained a certificate from the Board that he has fulfilled the educational requirements and has passed the examinations of the previous year.

XI. The Pass Examinations shall be held yearly, in the last quarter of the year.

XII. In all examinations there shall be at least two examiners appointed by the Board.

XIII. All examinations shall be partly written, partly oral, and partly practical.

FEES.

XIV. The fee for the preliminary examination shall be £1 1s.

The fee payable for each annual examination and certificate shall be £5 5s.

The fee paid for the Pass Examination shall admit to the Supplementary Examination.

If a candidate fail to pass at any examination his fee shall not be returned.

The fee for the diploma of Licentiate of Dental Surgery of Victoria shall be £5 5s.

PROVISION FOR PAST STUDENTS.

XV. Dental students who have completed four years' apprenticeship and have either passed the examination under the regulations of the 28th January, 1896, or who are entitled to present themselves for such examination, and shall pass it, and who shall have otherwise complied with all the conditions

of those regulations, shall, notwithstanding anything contained in these regulations, be entitled to the Diploma of Licentiate of Dental Surgery of Victoria upon attending a course of lectures in Medicine, with clinical illustrations, at the Australian College of Dentistry, or at such other public educational institution as may from time to time be prescribed by regulation, and upon passing the examination before the Board therein, and upon fulfilling the requirements of the fourth year of study of the curriculum, and upon passing the recognised examination of the Board therein.

ADMISSION AD-EUNDEM.

XVI. When any person has passed the preliminary examination necessary prior to registration outside Victoria, the Board may, if it think fit, give such person credit, wholly or in part, for the subjects of preliminary examination prescribed for candidates for the Diploma of Licentiate of Dental Surgery of Victoria.

XVII. Persons who have completed the whole or part of their dental studies in any Dental College outside Victoria which may be from time to time recognised by regulation, and shall produce evidence thereof satisfactory to the Board, may be allowed credit for the same in the determination of their status in the curriculum, but shall be otherwise subject to the provisions of these regulations.

RAILWAY LANDS ACQUISITION ACTS.

THE FERN TREE GULLY AND GEMBROOK RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION DISTRICT CONSTITUTED.

WHEREAS J. under the name, style, or title of the Fern Tree Gully and Gembrook Railway Construction District the land above referred to:—

REGULATION FOR FIXING CHARGES FOR WATER FOR 1899.

ALL water supplied from the works of the Trust for the irrigation of lands shall be paid for by measure.

The forms of measure shall be and are hereunder for the year 1899 determined by the Trust.

The rate or price to be paid for water delivered by gravitation from the River Murray, through the Reedy Creek and the Trust channels, shall be for cereals and all field crops—For the first watering, 8d. per inch per acre; for the second watering, 4d. per inch per acre; for grass land and fallow land, 2d. per inch per acre. Three inches in each case to be considered a watering.

For all water supplied outside the Trust area the charge shall be double the above rates.

KYABRAM URBAN WATERWORKS TRUST.— RATING REGULATIONS FOR 1899.

THE Commissioners of the Kyabram Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District for the purpose of the *Water Act 1890*, do hereby, pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, make the following Regulations:—

The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay for the year 1899 in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the Water Supply District:—

1. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of Ten pounds annual municipal value and under, a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling, provided that such rate shall not in any case be less than Twenty shillings per annum.

2. For every house or tenement used either wholly or partly as a domicile of more than Ten pounds annual value, a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound sterling, provided that no rate shall be less than One pound sterling.

The rate to be paid in respect of unoccupied allotments of land shall be Five shillings for each allotment not exceeding one-quarter of an acre, Ten shillings if more than a quarter of an acre but not exceeding half-an-acre, Fifteen shillings if more than half-an-acre but not exceeding three-quarters of an acre, with a maximum charge of One pound sterling for any parcel of land within the boundary of the Urban Trust.

4. For water supplied by the Trust by measurement (except in cases of special arrangement with the Trust), Two shillings and sixpence for every 1,000 gallons.

5. The foregoing rates are hereby made payable half-yearly in advance, on the 1st day of January, and the 1st of July, 1899.

WHEREAS by the Factories and Shops Acts it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations to have effect within any specified municipal district, or any specified part of such district, for, amongst other things, permitting shops of any particular class not included in the Fourth Schedule to the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*, on obtaining a licence to keep open after the hours mentioned in the said Factories and Shops Acts, and during such hours as shall be specified in such licence, provided a petition shall have been previously addressed to the Governor in Council and forwarded to the Minister, certified to by the municipal clerk as having been signed by a majority of the shopkeepers keeping shops of such class within such district: And whereas a petition has been so addressed and forwarded praying that in the municipal district of the City of Prahran all watchmakers and jewellers' shops (such shops being shops not included in the Fourth Schedule to the *Factories and Shops Act 1890* aforesaid) may be permitted, on obtaining a licence, to keep open until Nine o'clock on the evenings of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in each week, and until half-past Ten o'clock on the evening of Saturday in each week: And whereas such petition has been certified to by the municipal clerk of the said district as having been signed by a majority of the shopkeepers keeping shops of such class within the said district: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby make the following Regulation, that is to say:—

It shall be lawful for any watchmaker and jeweller's shop within the municipal district of the City of Prahran to keep open on the evenings of Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in each week from Seven o'clock until Nine o'clock, and on the evening of Saturday in each week from Ten o'clock until half-past Ten o'clock on obtaining a licence to keep open during such hours from the Chief Inspector of Factories.

ALTERATION OF REGULATIONS.

WHEREAS by section 23 of the *Education Act 1890* (54 Viet. No. 1086) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying the said Act into effect: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this Order rescind Regulation No. I. (Course of Free Instruction), Regulation No. II. (Staffs, Salaries, and Allowances), Regulation No. III. (Payments by way of Results), and Regulation No. IV. (Fees for Extra Subjects) of the Regulations made under the provisions of the Act aforesaid, and doth make the following Regulations in lieu thereof respectively, viz:—

REGULATION I.

I.—The Course of Free Instruction shall be as follows:—

CLASS I.

(The average age of scholars presented for *individual* examination should not exceed eight years.)

Reading and Spelling.—Reading tablets, the Primer, and the First Book.

Recitation.—Approved poems, at least 150 lines.

Writing.—To be learning to form on slates small letters, short words, and capitals from copies on the black-board and from dictation; the elder and more advanced children to be learning to write in copy-books with pen or pencil, as in Australian Copy-books, Set A No. 1, or approved equivalent; to transcribe on slates.

Arithmetic.—To be learning to count up to 100; to read and write numbers up to 100; oral addition and subtraction of numbers each less than 11; and to learn all combinations of numbers up to 20.

General Lessons.—

- (a) Form and colour, days of the week, months and seasons of the year, telling the time;
- (b) Suitable courses of lessons dealing with the ordinary phenomena of nature and of lessons on objects familiar to children;
- (c) In schools with an average attendance of over 100, and where practicable in other schools, appropriate and varied occupations.

*Needlework.**—Needle drill, placing a hem, learning to hem, fastening a new thread on. Boys, where practicable, to have instruction in this subject.

Singing.†—Infant-school songs. In addition to regular lessons suitable school songs should be sung at class changes.

Drawing.‡—Suitable exercises on slate or paper, plain, or ruled as for kindergarten work.

Drill.—Marching, Disciplinary, and Physical Exercises.§ See also General Note (m).

CLASS II.

(Average age of scholars should not exceed nine years.)

Reading, Spelling and Explanation.—The Second Royal Reader, or approved equivalent.

Recitation.—Poetry from the Reading Book, at least 150 lines.

Writing.—Short words in copy-books, as in Australian Copy-books, Set A No. 2, or approved equivalent; copying on slates, in manuscript, sentences from the Reading Book; and writing on slates from copies set on the black-board.

* See Appendix III. —† See Directions, Appendix I. —‡ See General Note (c). —§ See Appendix II.

Arithmetic.—Numeration and notation of numbers less than 10,000; simple addition, subtraction of numbers not higher than 100,000, and the multiplication table, together with related facts in division, both abstract and applied.

Mental Arithmetic.—Easy exercises in the addition, subtraction, and multiplication of both abstract and applied numbers.

Geography.—Explanation of a map and of simple geographical terms: geography of the locality; and to point out on a map the continents, oceans, and larger seas.

General Lessons.—Suitable courses of lessons to include a more extended treatment of the courses prescribed for Class I. under (b) and (c). Lessons under (c) to be given in all schools.

*Needlework.**—Hemming (including beginning a hem), placing a fell, learning to seam, knitting-pin drill. Boys, where practicable, to have instruction in this subject.

Singing.†—Easy school songs.

Drawing.‡—As for Class I., but work to be of better quality.

Drill.—Class Drill, including the Physical Exercises.§ See also General Note (m).

CLASS III.

(Average age should not exceed ten years and six months.)

Reading, Spelling and Explanation.—The *School Paper*.

Recitation.—Poetry from the *School Paper*, at least 150 lines.

Dictation and Composition.—Dictation from the *School Paper*.

Composition: To form simple sentences; other elementary exercises of a suitable and varied character.

Writing.—In copy-books, text or half-text or small hand, with capitals, as in Australian Copy-books, Set B Nos. 1, 2, and 3, or approved equivalent.

Arithmetic.—Numeration and notation; the four simple rules and the money tables; compound addition and subtraction of money; reduction of money in the four denominations, pounds, shillings, pence, and farthings.

Mental Arithmetic.—Easy exercises in the four simple rules, and calculations involved in such simple money transactions as come under a child's notice.

Grammar.—To distinguish nouns (abstract nouns not required), verbs, adjectives, and personal pronouns, and also subjects and predicates in easy sentences.

Geography.—As prescribed for Class II.; definitions; the principal physical features and the chief towns of Victoria; the principal inlets, straits, islands, peninsulas, and capes of Australasia as indicated in lists supplied by the Department; the relative positions of the Australasian Colonies, and their capitals.

General Lessons.—As prescribed for Class II., but of a more advanced character.

Needlework (for Girls).*—Hemming and seaming; casting on and knitting with two needles, plain and purled (ribbed); stitching on coarse material (e.g. forfar).

Singing.¶—Theory: For details see Appendix I.

Practice: For details see Appendix I.

Drawing.‡—Freehand: Forms based on straight lines and circular curves.

Practical Geometry: Applied Geometry with instruments.

Drill.—Class Drill, including the Physical Exercises, and, where practicable, Military Drill, viz., Squad Drill with intervals, in single rank, and in two ranks.§ See also General Note (m).

Gymnastics (where practicable).—The free exercises, marching, running, and jumping, and climbing ropes and poles.

CLASS IV.

(Average age should not exceed twelve years.)

Reading, Spelling and Explanation, and History.—The *School Paper* and *The Empire*, or approved equivalent. See General Note (c).

Recitation.—Poetry or Prose from the *School Paper*, at least 150 lines.

* See Appendix III. —† See Directions, Appendix I. —‡ See General Note (l). —
§ See Appendix II. —¶ See General Note (k).

Dictation and Composition.—Dictation from the *School Paper*.

Composition: To form sentences, embodying selected words or phrases; other elementary exercises of a suitable and varied character.

Writing.—In copy-books, small hand; simple commercial forms, including receipts, accounts current, and bills of parcels, with proper headings, as in Australian Copy-books, Set C Nos. 1, 2, and 3, or approved equivalent.

Arithmetic.—Numeration and notation; tables; the simple and compound rules, including exercises in the ordinary weights and measures, reduction, and bills of parcels; simple practice.

Mental Arithmetic.—(a) Easy exercises in all the rules under arithmetic in this class. (b) Exercises familiarizing the children with the nature of the fractions $\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{3}$, $\frac{2}{3}$. (c) Rules 1, 3, 5, 7 in the section on Mental Arithmetic in the First Book of Arithmetic (Irish National Board's).

Grammar.—The parts of speech; inflexions of nouns and adjectives; to analyse simple sentences.

Geography.—The outlines of the descriptive geography of Australasia as indicated in lists supplied by the Department; the positions of the chief British possessions and their capitals; the principal islands of the world; the relative positions and the capitals of the chief countries of the world.

*General Lessons.**—Form and motions of the earth, cause of day and night, lever, spirit-level, and pump. Hand and eye training.

Needlework (for Girls).—Hemming, seaming, knitting (including turning the heel of a stocking and six rows further), stitching, and darning. Sewing a string on.

Singing.†—Theory: For details see Appendix I.
Practice: For details see Appendix I.

Drawing.‡—Freehand: Form based on elliptical, spiral, and reflex curves. Comparative strength of lines and drawing from simple objects of one plane.

Practical Geometry: Applied Geometry with instruments. Simple scales, and drawing simple figures to scale.

Drill.—Class Drill, including the Physical Exercises, and, where practicable, Military Drill, viz., Squad Drill and Company Drill.§ See also General Note (m).

Gymnastics (where practicable).—As prescribed for the Third Class; and vaulting, exercises on the rings, round swing, and horizontal ladder.

CLASS V.

(Average age should not exceed thirteen years six months.)

Reading, Spelling and Explanation, and History.—The *School Paper* and *The Empire*, or approved equivalent. See General Notes (a) and (c).

Recitation.—Poetry or Prose from the *School Paper*, at least 150 lines.

Dictation and Composition.—Dictation from the *School Paper*.

Composition: Easy exercises, including letter-writing, and short simple essays on some easy subject; also exercises such as the reproduction of general lessons and of short stories, and expanding short notes into sentences. Books to be kept showing these exercises.

Writing.—In copy-books, running hand. Commercial forms of a more advanced character than for Fourth Class, to include accounts current, other accounts, and invoices, &c. Australian Copy-books, Set D Nos. 1, 2, and 3, or approved equivalent.

Arithmetic.—As prescribed for Class IV.; the meaning and notation of a vulgar fraction and a decimal, vulgar fractions, addition and subtraction of decimal fractions, practice, simple proportion, easy exercises in simple interest, the calculation of the area and sides of rectangular figures, and questions as to carpeting of rooms and calculations of fencing.

Mental Arithmetic.—(a) Easy exercises in all the rules under arithmetic in this class. (b) As in (c), Class IV., and in addition Rules 2, 4, 8, 13, 15, 18, 19.

Grammar.—Analysis of complex sentences (detailed analysis, including classification and relation of sentences); full parsing of easy sentences.

Geography.—Descriptive geography of the British Empire (including a special knowledge of the Australasian Colonies) as indicated in lists supplied by the Department, explanation of the lines marking latitude and longitude and zones on a map of the world.

*General Lessons.**—As prescribed for Class IV., and in addition the causes of the seasons, the atmosphere and its phenomena (winds, rain, &c.), thermometer, barometer, siphon, wheel and axle. Hand and eye training.

Needlework (for Girls).—To hem, seam, darn, work button-holes, gather, to knit stockings, and to commence patching.

Singing.†—Theory: For details see Appendix I.

Practice: For details see Appendix I.

Drawing.‡—Freehand: Form based on the same elementary curves as for Class IV., but in more difficult combinations. Drawing from simple objects.

Practical Geometry: Applied Geometry with instruments. Bisections, perpendiculars, angles, parallels, division of lines into parts, proportionals greater or less. Construction of triangles and four-sided figures, circles, inscription and description of figures; simple applications. Drawing to scale.

Drill.—As for Class IV. See also General Note (m).

Gymnastics (where practicable).—The exercises prescribed for the lower classes; rod exercises, and exercises on the horizontal bar and slanting ladder.

CLASS VI.

Reading, Spelling, and Explanation, and History.—The *School Paper* and *The Empire*, or approved equivalent. See General Notes (a) and (c).

Recitation.—Poetry or Prose from the *School Paper*, at least 150 lines.

Dictation and Composition.—Dictation from the *School Paper*.

Composition: More advanced exercises, such as—To state in a short and simple form the substance of a narrative; letter-writing; simple essays. Pupils to keep books showing exercises in composition and letter-writing.

Writing.—Running hand. Exercise books containing running hand will be accepted. Commercial forms.

Arithmetic.—To vulgar and decimal fractions, compound proportion, interest, proportional parts, and square root; the calculation of the area and sides of right-angled triangles, and of the diameter, circumference, and area of circles, and of the contents and dimensions of rectangular and of cylindrical solids. Less difficult exercises in mensuration will be set to pupils who are being examined for the first time in the class, and are not candidates for a Certificate of Merit, than to those who are examined for the second time in the class or are presented for a Certificate of Merit.

Mental Arithmetic.—(a) Exercises in all the rules under arithmetic in this class. (b) As in (b) in Class V., the exercises to be of a more advanced character.

Grammar.—Full parsing; analysis (classification and relation of sentences to be given); the structure of words; roots, prefixes and affixes as in lists supplied by the Department; the rules of syntax and their application.

Geography.—The descriptive geography of Europe and the United States, as indicated in lists supplied by the Department; a more advanced knowledge of the lines marking latitude, longitude, and zones on map of the world; the determination of time, including zone time.

*General Lessons.**—The organs of respiration and digestion; the properties of solids, liquids, and gases; the simpler phenomena of heat; the pulley, the inclined plane. Hand and eye training.

Needlework (for Girls).—To cut out, put work together, and do all kinds of needlework, including patching. Very fine stitching not required.

Singing.—As for Class V.

Drawing.‡—Freehand: Drawing from copies and from objects.

Practical Geometry: Applied Geometry with instruments. Plans and elevations of points, lines, simple solids, and sections.

Drill.—As for Class V. See also General Note (m).

Gymnastics.—As for Class V.

* See General Note (j).—† See General Note (k).—‡ See General Note (l).

GENERAL NOTES.

(a) *Reading*.—A natural tone and reasonable fluency are expected to characterize the reading of all classes. Classes V. and VI. will be required to read the History prescribed under (c) in addition to the *School Paper*.

(b) *Spelling*.—Useful rules of spelling and word building should receive special attention.

(c) *History*.—For Class IV., from the earliest times to 1485 A.D.; for Class V., from 1485 to 1714 A.D.; and for Class VI., from 1714 A.D. to the present day. The outlines given in the text-book prescribed should be supplemented by teachers with information from other text-books of a more advanced character. (See Circular 98/5 and Appendix IV.) In schools where there is not a separate teacher for each of these classes, they may be combined for instruction in history, and take the same work (Fourth Class work one year, Fifth Class work the next year, and so on).

(d) *Recitation*.—Care should be taken that such explanation is given as will enable pupils to understand and repeat intelligently the passages committed to memory. A list of the selections taught in each class should be kept for the Inspector.

(e) *Composition*.—Attention should be paid to oral composition and to the correction of errors of speech in all classes.

(f) *Writing*.—Correct attitude and position at writing, also proper holding of pen, should be inculcated.

(g) *Arithmetic*.—The principles should be fully explained and taught, and from the *earliest stages* examples illustrating the practical application of the rules prescribed must be given. *Oral practice should precede slate work*.

In the Second and Third Classes problems involving more than one operation will not be required.

In the Fourth Class problems involving more than two operations will not be required.

In Class V. problems similar to, but of a more advanced character than, those given in Class IV. may be required.

Exercises under the head of "proportion" may be worked by the unitary method. Cube root will not be required.

The tables to be learnt should be those contained in the Arithmetical Table Book in the Department's list of books and requisites.

In judging the instruction in Arithmetic the character of the text-books used will be taken into account.

Mental Arithmetic.—At examinations a short paper, say of five questions, may be given. Questions relative to concrete quantities may be given in all classes.

(h) *Grammar*.—In the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Classes the teaching of grammatical inflexions and the elements of sentences should include constructive exercises. (For roots, &c., see Appendix IV.)

(i) *Geography*.—In teaching geography of the locality in Classes II. and III., the creeks, mountains, townships, &c., within an easy radius of the school, or that may be seen from any hill near it, should be given. A map showing this information should be provided, and should be left in school by teachers when transferred. To make the teaching of this subject more instructive and interesting, the lessons should be so given that the pupils may be able to answer such questions as—(1) Where are tigers found? (2) Where does tea come from?

In Class III. the physical features of Victoria should comprise its mountains, rivers, lakes, inlets, capes, and peninsulas.

In Classes IV., V., and VI., by the descriptive geography of a country is to be understood such a description of its physical features, its natural productions, and its inhabitants as is usually found in any good text-book, such as Chisholm's *School Geography of Australasia*. (For lists, see Appendix IV.)

(j) *General Lessons*.—In Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh class schools the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Classes may be combined for general lessons, the work prescribed for the Fifth Class to be taken. Teachers in permanent charge of schools may substitute for general lessons an equivalent number of elementary lessons in any approved science. **Instruction will not be considered satisfactory unless illustrated by suitable objects, apparatus, &c.** A list of the objects and apparatus available should be posted up in each classroom. An abstract of the lessons given should be left in school by teachers when transferred. Lessons should be given from prepared notes. (For approved courses of Object Lessons, &c., see Appendix IV.)

(k) *Singing*.—(1) Suitable school songs should be taught in all classes. (2) In those schools where the Tonic Sol-fa notation is adopted, instruction must be given in accordance with the requirements of the programme recognised by the Department. (Appendix 1.) (3) In Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh class schools where there are no visiting teachers of singing, no higher programme than the programme of the Fourth Class will be insisted on in the higher classes. The following books are recommended to teachers who wish to acquire proficiency:—*Stimpson's Singing Class Book*, *Curwen's How to Rend Music and Understand it*, *Curwen's Companion for Teachers*, and *Sight Singing for Schools* (London National Society's Depository).

(l) *Drawing*.—In all classes above the Second, the work should be on paper and the exercises should be dated. In Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh class schools, where there are no visiting teachers of drawing, no higher programme than that of the Fourth Class will be insisted on in the higher classes.

Classes I. and II.—Exercises to be such as appear in Department's Series of Graded Examples; in Poynter's Drawing for the Standards, books 1, 2, 3, and 4; or in Ablett's Drawing Copies, books 1 and 2. In cases where an example is to be used both for freehand and for ruling, *the ruled exercise should be taken first*.

Class III.—Freehand: Poynter's Drawing, book 5, except the last two pages; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, book 3, except diagram No. 25. (It will be noted that the diagrams are such as can be made by rule and compass.) Practical Geometry: Poynter's Drawing, books 7 and 8, or Ablett's Drawing Copies, book 4.

Class IV.—Freehand: Poynter's Drawing, books 9 and 10; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, book 7. (The least complicated diagrams, based on the curves mentioned—elliptical, spiral, and reflex—should be selected; and where dotted lines appear, very faint continuous lines should be used in place of them.) Practical Geometry: Poynter's Drawing, books 12 and 13; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, book 9.

Class V.—Freehand: Poynter's Drawing, books 14, 15, and 16; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, books 10 and 11. (In Model Drawing the pupils should draw from the objects, not from the diagrams. In Ablett's Series, books 5 and 8, much useful information will be found regarding the treatment of lessons in drawing from objects.) Practical Geometry: Poynter's Drawing, books 17 and 18; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, book 12.

Class VI.—Freehand: Poynter's Drawing, books 20 and 21; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, books 13 and 14. Practical Geometry: Poynter's Drawing, book 22; or Ablett's Drawing Copies, book 15, parts 1 and 2.

(m) *Physical Exercises*.—One or more of the physical exercises should be practised at least once in each class at each school meeting.

In Appendix II., Physical Exercises, General Instructions, Exercise 6 should not be taught; Exercise 10 should take its place.

The attention of teachers is specially drawn to the importance of utilizing these exercises and drill generally as a means of promoting healthy growth and an erect carriage on the part of their pupils.

(n) *Cookery*.—In schools where suitable provision is made for instruction in cookery, somewhat less time than is required in other schools may, subject to the approval of the Minister, be given to needlework by the girls in the upper classes.

(o) *Special Lessons*.—To children above nine years of age, lessons prepared from some recognised lesson books on the laws of health and on temperance should be given at least fortnightly. The Health lessons should also include the information contained in these wall sheets—*Treatment of Snake-bite*; *Treatment of the apparently Drowned*; *What to do till the Doctor comes*. The lessons on Temperance should include the information contained in the wall sheets on that subject. An abstract of the lessons given should be left in school when a teacher is transferred.

(p) *Certificate of Merit*.—To obtain this certificate candidates must pass an examination in the subjects prescribed under Regulation I. for Sixth Class, except Poetry, Singing, Drill, and Gymnastics. (See notes (c) and (j).)

NOTE.—Head teachers will be required to thoroughly examine at regular intervals all the classes in their schools at least three times a year. A copy of the questions given, and a record of the examination in detail, should be kept for the information of the District Inspector.

II.—STAFFS, SALARIES, AND ALLOWANCES.

1. No person shall be employed in a school as head teacher, assistant teacher, or relieving teacher unless he shall hold a first class certificate, a certificate of competency, or a licence to teach.

2. Staffs will be allotted and salaries paid in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 1382 and the schedules thereto. (See Appendices IV. and V.)

3. The number of teachers employed in any school will be increased or reduced from time to time as the average attendance for the two months immediately preceding may render necessary; but, in cases where the attendance has been reduced by the prevalence of sickness or other exceptional cause, a longer trial may be given before the staff is reduced.

4. Whenever and so long as the teaching staff of a school is reduced below its proper strength by the death, resignation, absence on leave, or the transfer of any assistant employed in a school, the head teacher may, subject to the approval of the Minister, appoint a temporary pupil teacher in the stead of each assistant so deceased, resigned, absent on leave, or transferred. The salary payable to each such temporary pupil teacher will be that payable to fourth-class pupil teachers.

5. Whenever and so long as the teaching staff of a school is reduced below its proper strength by the death, resignation, or absence on leave of a pupil teacher, or by the withdrawal of a first-class pupil teacher to act temporarily as assistant or head teacher, the head teacher of the school may, subject to the approval of the Minister, appoint a temporary pupil teacher in the stead of each pupil teacher so withdrawn. The salary payable to each such temporary pupil teacher will be that payable to fourth-class pupil teachers.

6. During the absence of or pending the permanent appointment of a sewing mistress the head teacher may, subject to the approval of the Minister, and provided the average attendance is sufficient, appoint a temporary sewing mistress.

7. During the absence of or pending the permanent appointment of a monitor the head teacher may, subject to the approval of the Minister, and provided the average attendance is sufficient, appoint a temporary monitor.

8. In the case of a new school, a staff of teachers will be allotted upon the expected attendance at the school.

9. In addition to their salaries, head teachers of day schools will be paid monthly allowances for maintenance expenses, according to the following scale, subject to an equitable deduction in the case of schools that become connected with a sewerage system. NOTE.—Special payments will be made in the cases of schools held in Orphanages.

The average attendance during the six months ending the 30th April and 31st October in each year will be generally adopted as the basis for determining the allowances from 1st July and 1st January respectively next ensuing; but in cases where exceptional fluctuations in attendance have occurred, the average attendance of any other month or months may, with the sanction of the Minister, be adopted.

10. In consideration of the above allowances, the head teacher will be required—

- (a) To have the floors of all the school-rooms, class-rooms, porches, out-offices, &c., properly swept and thoroughly scrubbed out, the walls brushed down, and the paint washed with sufficient frequency to keep the rooms clean and healthy. To keep all caves, spouting, down-pipes, and iron tanks free from leaves and dirt, and all drains clean and free from stoppages.
- (b) To provide water for the use of the children for drinking and washing; also drinking cups, soap, basins, and towels.
- (c) To keep the chimneys and windows clean, and all locks, latches, stoppers to basins, keys, and handles, &c. to doors and cupboards, and glass in windows, in proper repair.
- (d) To keep properly emptied, disinfected, and attended to, the pans in earth-closets, and the cesspits where there are no earth-closets, and also urinals.
- (e) To provide pens, penholders, ink, slate-pencils, chalk, sewing materials, and all stationery (except copy-books).
- (f) To provide fuel for warming the school-rooms, and to keep them properly warmed.

All articles must be provided, and the duties specified must be performed, to the satisfaction of any officer of the Education Department who may be authorized by the Minister of Public Instruction to visit and examine the schools. On leaving a school, the teacher will be required to furnish a report signed by his successor and himself as to the condition in which everything is left.

11. Teachers in charge of State schools, and in receipt of the allowance for maintenance expenses provided and fixed by clause 9 *supra*, are required to keep a detailed account of the expenditure of the allowance for carrying out the requirements set forth under the various heads of clause 10 *supra*. This account should show fully the items and amounts of expenditure, and be accompanied, where practicable, by vouchers for each item, duly receipted by the persons entitled to payment. It should be attached to the Inspector's Register for the information and perusal of the District Inspector or other authorized officer of the Department, and of the Board of Advice.

12. An allowance of 2s. 6d. per meeting will be made to head teachers of State schools in which Boards of Advice hold their meetings; and in consideration of such amount they will be required to provide lights and fires when necessary, and to supply pens, ink, &c.

III.—PAYMENTS BY WAY OF RESULTS.

1. Payments by way of results will be made to head teachers and assistant teachers upon examination of their schools by an Inspector in the subjects specified in the course of free instruction.

2. The maximum payment which any teacher can obtain by way of results will be an amount equal to one-half of his fixed salary.

3. In order to entitle the teachers of any school to this maximum—

- (i.) Every scholar who has attended the school during any part of the two weeks preceding such visit must be presented for examination, unless prevented from attending by any unavoidable cause, such as—

(a) Removal from the district;

- (b) Suffering from severe bodily accident or sickness, or being excluded on account of infectious disease at home;
- (c) Flooded state of the roads;
- (d) Death of a near relative.

Scholars who within the two months immediately previous to the Inspector's visit have resumed attendance after exclusion from school for at least two months on account of infectious disease need not be taken into account in calculating the percentage unless the teacher so desire.

(ii.) The Inspector must be satisfied—

- (a) That every scholar has a satisfactory knowledge of the work of the class in which he is enrolled, and has made adequate progress, and that singing and drill and the general and special lessons mentioned in the General Notes to Regulation I. have been satisfactorily taught.

Scholars over seven years of age in Class I. who have been not less than *eighteen* months on the roll must be presented for individual examination. Other scholars in that class may be so presented if their attainments be satisfactory.

Children (1) who have been less than six months in their class or (2) have attended less than half the number of possible attendances during the six months preceding the examination need not be taken into account in calculating the percentage, but should be examined to test their classification and progress; provided that of the children due for examination in any school the number excluded from examination on the foregoing grounds shall not exceed 10 per cent. In the case of the children included under (1) above who have been promoted less than six months prior to the examination, the Inspector must be satisfied that their promotion was necessary or desirable; and in the case of those included under (2) above the irregularity of attendance must be satisfactorily explained. A satisfactory explanation would be one which showed that the irregularity was in no measure due to negligence or want of energy or tact on the part of the head teacher.

- (b) That the names and ages of the scholars are stated correctly in the rolls.
- (c) That the scholars are properly classified.

(iii.) The average age of the scholars examined individually in Class I. must not exceed eight years; the average age of the scholars in Class II. must not exceed nine years; of those in Class III., ten years and six months; of those in Class IV., twelve years; and of those in Class V., thirteen years and six months.

(iv.) In special cases, where considerable progress is shown, no deductions will be made on account of the average age of any class exceeding that specified in the preceding clause. "Considerable progress" shall be thus defined for this purpose:—

- (a) The scholars to be properly classified and to pass well, gaining not less than 80 (eighty) per cent. of the possible passes, exclusive of the merit grant.
- (b) The infants to be efficiently taught on a proper system.
- (c) Of the children presented for individual examination, excluding those who have been previously examined in the Sixth Class, not less than 70 (seventy) per cent. shall be presented for examination in a higher class than that in which they were presented in the preceding year. Should 80 (eighty) per cent. be so promoted 75 (seventy-five) per cent. will be accepted under (iv.) (a).

4. Not more than 94 per cent. of the marks obtained by any school shall be granted for compliance with the conditions specified above under 3 (ii.). The remaining 6 per cent. shall be awarded according to the degree of merit shown either at date of examination or at any inspection during the preceding twelve months in the following respects, viz.:—

- (a) State of premises, furniture, apparatus, and supply of requisites, including their proper care; due economy as regards the use of free stock.

- (b) Arrangement of school work (including time-table), distribution of staff, supervision, classification, discipline, tone, and general effectiveness of the management.
- (c) Style of work at examinations and inspections, progress (as shown by percentage of promotions), presence of a Sixth Class where practicable, &c.
5. Marks will be withdrawn for individual scholars and for classes failing to comply with any of the required conditions. Provided that if the classification and progress are satisfactory—
- (a) No deduction will be made for the excessive age of scholars in part-time schools;
- (b) In full-time schools the age of any pupil who has been less than twelve months on the rolls of the school may be disregarded.
6. The result payment made to the teachers will be in the same ratio to the maximum as the number of marks actually awarded to the school is to the number which might have been obtained; provided that in schools having more than one teacher entitled to result payment any of such teachers, whether head teacher or assistant, who has displayed marked inefficiency may be paid on some lower percentage of the maximum than that awarded to the school.
7. Any change in the amount payable for results consequent upon an examination of the school will take effect from the first day of the month succeeding that in which the examination is held.
8. In new schools result payments will be based upon a percentage of 80 until the school shall have been examined for results; but the payments upon that percentage will cease from the last day of the month in which the examination takes place.
9. The examination of a school for results will be held annually, and, as far as practicable, in the same month of the year.
10. Applications for special percentages, with a statement of the grounds for such application, must be forwarded through the District Inspector at the close of the examination. No appeal against a result examination will be entertained unless it reaches the Education Office within a fortnight of the date of examination.

IV.—FEES FOR EXTRA SUBJECTS.

1. Fees payable by parents for subjects not included in the Third Schedule to the *Education Act* 1890, herein called extra subjects, will be at weekly rates not exceeding the sums mentioned in the following scale:—

For any approved subject not included in the above list the fee to be charged will be at the discretion of the teacher, but must not, in any case, exceed One shilling per week.

2. A percentage, not exceeding 5 per cent., is appropriated for payments by results. The amount thus appropriated will remain in the hands of the head teacher till the school is inspected, when, if the Inspector is satisfied with the instruction, it will be returned to the teachers; otherwise it must be remitted to the Department for distribution amongst those in whose schools the instruction has been found satisfactory.

3. Instruction in extra subjects must not be given so as to interrupt the course of instruction in accordance with Regulation I.

And the Honorable Alexander James Peacock, Her Majesty's Minister of Public Instruction for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by section 267 of the *Health Act 1890*, among other things the Governor in Council is empowered from time to time to make, alter, and repeal such Orders as may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the introduction into Victoria from any country or colony, or part of a country or colony (in which respectively any disease in sheep, cattle, horses, dogs, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever is known to exist), and for the detention in quarantine in such place and for such period as the Governor in Council by such Order appoints or directs of all sheep, cattle, horses, dogs, swine, or other animals of the same or any other kind or kinds whatsoever, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate amongst men or other animals any infectious or contagious disease whatsoever: And it is also enacted that all Orders for any of the purposes in the said section mentioned shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the now in part recited Act: And that all persons offending against any Order made under the authority of the said section shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding Fifty pounds or such smaller sum as the Governor in Council may in any case by such Order direct, and that such sum shall go to form part of the consolidated revenue: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this Order prohibit the introduction of swine into Victoria from New Zealand.

No. 1591) it is among other things enacted that "Disease" means and includes pleuro-pneumonia, tuberculosis, anthrax, trichinosis, and cancer, and also any disease whatever in stock which the Governor in Council may at any time by Order declare to be a disease for the purposes of the said Act: And whereas it is deemed expedient to include the disease known as Tick or Ticks or Texas Fever in the term "Disease": Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this Order declare the disease known as Tick or Ticks or Texas Fever to be a disease for the purposes of the said Act.

APPROACHING LAND SALES.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable Thomas, Baron Brassey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1890* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in section 6 of Part I. of the said Act, except increasing lands which may be sold by auction: And whereas by the *Land Act 1891* it is amongst other things further enacted that where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding twenty acres, and not contiguous or adjacent to any other Crown lands, is so situated as to make it desirable, in the opinion of the Governor in Council, that the same should be sold, or where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding three acres is required for a site for a church or for any charitable purpose for which land cannot legally be reserved, the Governor in Council may direct the sale of such portion of Crown lands, and for such purpose may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the *Land Act 1890* as lands which may be sold by auction by adding such portion thereto: And whereas by the *Land Act 1893* it is amongst other things further enacted that, notwithstanding anything contained in section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid, the Governor in Council may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the said last-mentioned Act as lands which may be sold by auction by adding thereto any portion of the Crown lands described in the said Schedule as Swamp lands: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in classes 2, 3, 4, and 8 of the classes mentioned in section 6 of the *Land Act 1890* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively (that is to say):—

8. Potatoes to be dry and free from dirt. Contractors to supply 105 lbs. of potatoes for each cental credited to them, and, in addition, to take back all rejected before being cooked.

25. Under no circumstances other than those mentioned in clause 23 will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

26. Where specially indicated in the schedules no subletting will be allowed, and no delivery shall be made on Sundays; all work must be carried out by the contractor, and the hours of employment of any person engaged in the preparation or
