FACTORIES AND SHOPS ACTS.

DETERMINATION OF THE CLOTHING BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Special Board appointed to determine the Lowest Price or Rate which may be paid to any person for wholly or partly, preparing or manufacturing either inside or outside a factory or work-room, the following articles of Men's and Boys' Clothing or Wearing Apparel namely, Coats (including Overcoats and Cloaks of every description), Vests, Trousers, Jackets, and Knickerbockers, except indiarubber waterproof garments, has made the following Determination, namely:—

That all other Determinations of the Board shall be cancelled and annulled, and that the following Determination shall come into operation on Monday, the 25th day of November, 1901.

ORDER GARMENTS—WAGES—MALES.

That the lowest rate of Wages to be paid to Males engaged in the manufacture of order garments shall be as follows:—
Tailors, Cutters, Trimmers, Pressers, Machinists, 7s. 6d. per day of eight hours.

That the number of Apprentices or Improvers who may be employed in any factory or work-room in the Clothing Trade shall be as follows:—

MALES.

One Apprentice or Improver to every three Males or fraction thereof employed in a factory or work-room, and being paid not less than 7s. 6d. per day or piece-work rate, provided that the said Males be so employed continuously in the said factory or work-room for nine successive months, except in the case of any person or persons commencing business, when the provision respecting the employment of such Males for the past nine months shall not be enforced.

That the rate of Wages to be paid to Male Apprentices or Improvers engaged in the manufacture of order garments shall be as follows:—

That any male person over the age of sixteen years who may be employed in the manufacture of Coats (including Overcoats and Cloaks of every description), Vests, Trousers, Jackets, and Knickerbockers, for more than 48 hours per week, shall be paid for such extra hours at the rate of time and a half.

PIECE-WORK RATES FOR ORDER GARMENTS—MALES.

That the lowest price or rate of payment to any Male person for wholly preparing or manufacturing any article of the description referred to in the following schedules of prices or rates, or for doing work of the kind specified in connexion with the preparation or manufacture of any such article, shall be the price or rate fixed by such schedules in respect of such article or work, as the case may be, subject to such extras or reductions as by the said schedules provided.

In this Determination the following terms shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them (that is to say) :—

- “Order garments” shall mean garments generally known as “bespoke garments” made to individual measure.
 - “First class” shall mean all faced cloths, meltons, corkscrews, fancy vestings, silks, velvets, Hooper’s white elastic, and white cashmere.
 - “Second class” shall mean indigo and black worsteds, tweeds, sergerettes, serges, vicunas, Bedford cords, flannel, alpaca, and similar materials.
 - “Third class” shall mean moleskin, corduroy, drill, linen, and similar material.
 - “Hand-made” shall mean that the garments shall be made wholly by hand.
 - “Extras” shall mean any work that is not specified in starting price.
- All extras not specified to be calculated at the rate of 10d. per hour. All sewings and trimmings to be provided by the employer free of charge to the operator. Where maker machines garment, machining to be paid extra according to schedule of prices for machining.

ORDER GARMENTS—WAGES—FEMALES.

The lowest rate of Wages to be paid to Females, other than apprentices or improvers, engaged in the manufacture of order garments shall be 3s. 4d. per day of eight hours.

The number of Female Apprentices or Improvers who may be employed in any factory or work-room in the Clothing Trade shall be as follows:—

One Apprentice or Improver to every two Females employed in a factory or work-room and being paid not less than 3s. 4d. per day of 8 hours or piece-work rate, provided that the said Females be so employed in the said factory or work-room continuously for nine successive months, except in the case of any person or persons commencing business, when the provision respecting the employment of such Females shall not be enforced.

The lowest price or rate of payment to any female for wholly preparing or manufacturing any article of the description referred to in the following Schedules of Prices or Rates, or for doing work of the kind specified in connexion with the preparation or manufacture of any such article shall be the price or rate fixed by such Schedules in respect of such articles or work as the case may be; subject to such extras or reductions as by the said Schedules provided:

In this Determination the following terms shall have the meanings hereby assigned to them (that is to say) :—

"Order garments" shall mean garments generally known as "bespoke garments" made to individual measure.
 "First class" shall mean all faced cloths, meltons, corkscrews, silks, velvets, fancy vestings, Hooper's white elastic, and white cashmere.
 "Second class" shall mean indigo and black worsteds, tweeds, sergerettes, serges, vicunas, Bedford cords, flannel, alpaca, and similar materials.

 "Deductions" shall mean parts of garments usually done by special hands which can be deducted from full price.
 "D.-B." shall mean double-breasted.
 "S.-B." shall mean single-breasted.

That any male person over the age of sixteen years who may be employed in the manufacture of Coats (including Overcoats and Cloaks of every description), Vests, Trousers, Jackets, and Knickerbockers, for more than 48 hours per week, shall be paid for such extra hours at the rate of time and a half.

PIECE-WORK RATE FOR READY-MADE GARMENTS.

The lowest price or rate of payment to any person for wholly preparing or manufacturing any article of Ready-made Clothing of the description referred to in the following Schedules of Prices or Rates, or for doing work of the kind specified in connexion with the preparation or manufacture of any such article shall be the price or rate fixed by such Schedules in respect of such article or work, as the case may be, subject to such extras or reductions as is by the said Schedules provided.

NOTE.—All extras not specified to be calculated at the rate of 6½d. per hour. All sewings and trimmings and other articles used in manufacturing of garments must be provided by employer free of charge to the operator. Out-door worker to be paid both making and machining price on each garment.

COATS AND VESTS.—Items included in the starting price of each garment:—Three (3) outside pockets, excepting Eton Coats, one (1) pocket; single-stitched edges; edges, pockets, and buttons with stays where necessary; pocket tacks done by machine; seam pressing; canvas padding through foreparts; side seams and shoulder linings felled. Back-straps to vests. Fitting up, button-holes, sewing on buttons, and pressing not included.

JUVENILE COATS.—Items included in the starting price of each Coat:—Canvas padding, stays where necessary, and single-stitched. All other items to be added, see extras re pockets, collars, &c.—Without fitting up, button-holes, buttons, and pressing.

JUVENILE VESTS.—Items included in the starting price of each Vest:—Canvas, backstraps, without button-holes, buttons, and pressing.

JUVENILE KNICKERBOCKERS.—Items included in the starting price of each Knickerbocker. Lined throughout or unlined, button, button-holes, and making complete, except pressing off.
