Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE PRINTERS BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of printing, including bookbinding, has made the following Determination, namely :—

PART I.—INTRODUCTORY.

1. In the construction and for the purposes of this Determination
 “ The Metropolitan District ” shall mean the Metropolitan District as defined in section 36 of Act No. 1445.
 “ Outside the Metropolitan District ” shall mean in any place (to which this Determination applies) other than any place within the Metropolitan District.
2. Part II.—Divisions 1–2 of this Determination, and the schedules referred to therein, shall apply to work done within the Metropolitan District.
3. Part III.—Divisions 3–4 of this Determination, and the schedules referred to therein, shall apply to work done outside the Metropolitan District.
4. Part IV. of this Determination shall, except where otherwise provided therein, apply to every city and town, and to work done within such city or town.
5. Parts V. and VI. of this Determination shall apply to every city and town, and to work done within such city or town.

PART II.—PRINTING DONE WITHIN THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT.

DIVISION I.—LETTER-PRESS PRINTING.

1. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to compositors and letter-press machinists shall be 1s. 1d. per hour, or £2 12s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
2. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to stereotypers shall be 1s. 1d. per hour, or £2 12s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
3. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to proof readers shall be 1s. 2d. per hour, or £2 16s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
4. That the lowest piece-work prices or rates of payment, except as otherwise provided in the First Schedule to this Determination, payable to males and females for piece-work done in conformity with and subject to the provisions contained in the First Schedule to this Determination shall be 1s. per 1,000 ems for all kinds of English composition, from ruby to pica inclusive; and 2d. extra per 1,000 ems for all above pica and below ruby.

5. Overtime:—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to compositors, letter-press machinists, stereotypers, and proof readers over the age of sixteen years, for overtime work in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours shall be one and a third times the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons respectively.

6. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to male feeders (not being apprentices or improvers) employed on platen or cylinder machines shall be as follows:—

Feeders—14 to 15 years of age, 7s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

and after 21 years of age a minimum wage of 36s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

7. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to female feeders (not being apprentices or improvers) employed on platen or cylinder machines shall be as follows:—

Feeders—14 to 15 years of age ... 5s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

and after 18 years of age a minimum wage of 20s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

8. Overtime:—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to male feeders over the age of sixteen years (not being apprentices or improvers) for any time in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours fixed by the Board, shall be—1st year, 3d.; 2nd year, 4d.; 3rd year, 5d.; 4th year, 6d. per hour; and after the fourth year time one and a third times the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

9. That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to all persons for whom a time rate has been fixed under Part II., Division 1, of this Determination, for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

DIVISION 2.—LINOTYPE AND MONOLINE WORK.

1. That the lowest prices or rates of payment, except as otherwise provided in the Second Schedule to this Determination, payable for linotype or monoline work shall be 1s. 8d. per hour, or £3 10s. for a maximum number of 42 hours per week.

2. That during a period of three months' probation the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to probationers for linotype or monoline work in jobbing offices shall be 1s. 2d. per hour, or £2 9s. for a maximum number of 42 hours per week.

3. That the lowest piece-work prices or rates of payment, except as otherwise provided in the Second Schedule to this Determination, payable for linotype or monoline work done in conformity with and subject to the provisions contained in the Second Schedule to this Determination, shall be 3½d. per 1,000 ens.

4. Overtime:—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to any person over the age of sixteen years for linotype or monoline work, who works in excess of the maximum number of 42 hours, shall be one and a third times the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such person.

5. That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to all persons for whom a time rate has been fixed under Part II., Division 2, of this Determination, for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

PART III.—PRINTING DONE OUTSIDE THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT.

DIVISION 3.—LETTER-PRESS PRINTING.

1. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to compositors and letter-press machinists shall be 1s. ¾d. per hour, or £2 10s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

2. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to stereotypers shall be 1s. ½d. per hour, or £2 10s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

3. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to proof readers shall be 1s. 1d. per hour, or £2 12s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

4. That the lowest piece-work prices or rates of payment, except as otherwise provided in the Third Schedule to this Determination, payable to males and females for piece-work done in conformity with and subject to the provisions contained in the Third Schedule to this Determination shall be 11d. per 1,000 ens for all kinds of English composition, from ruby to pica inclusive; and 2d. extra per 1,000 ens for all above pica and below ruby.

5. Overtime:—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to compositors, letter-press machinists, stereotypers, and proof readers, over the age of sixteen years, for overtime work in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours shall be one and a third times the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons respectively.

6. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to male feeders (not being apprentices or improvers) employed on platen or cylinder machines shall be as follows:—

Feeders—14 to 15 years of age, 6s. 6d. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

7. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to female feeders (not being apprentices or improvers) employed on platen or cylinder machines shall be as follows:—

and after 18 years of age a minimum wage of 20s. for a maximum of 48 hours per week.

8. Overtime:—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to male feeders, over the age of sixteen years (not being apprentices or improvers) for any time in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours fixed by the Board, shall be—1st year, 3d.; 2nd year, 4d.; 3rd year, 5d.; 4th year, 6d. per hour; and after the fourth year one and a third times the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

9. That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to all persons for whom a time rate has been fixed under Part III, Division 3, of this Determination, for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

DIVISION 4.—LINTYPE AND MONOLINE WORK.

1. That the lowest prices or rates of payment, except as otherwise provided in the Fourth Schedule to this Determination, payable for linotype or monoline work shall be 1s. 6d. per hour, or £3 3s. for a maximum number of 42 hours per week.

2. That during a period of three months' probation the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to probationers for linotype or monoline work in jobbing offices shall be 1s. 1d. per hour, or £2 5s. 6d. for a maximum number of 42 hours per week.

3. That the lowest piece-work prices or rates of payment, except as otherwise provided in the Fourth Schedule to this Determination, payable for linotype or monoline work done in conformity with and subject to the provisions of the Fourth Schedule to this Determination shall be 3½d. per 1,000 ems.

4. Overtime:—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to any person over the age of sixteen years for linotype or monoline work, who works in excess of the maximum number of 42 hours, shall be one and a third times the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such person.

5. That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to all persons for whom a time rate has been fixed under Part III, Division 4, of this Determination, for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

PART IV.—MALE APPRENTICES OR IMPROVERS.

1. Male apprentices or improvers.—That the number or proportionate number of male apprentices or improvers who may be employed within any factory, or work-room, or shop, or place, shall be one apprentice or improver to the factory, work-room, shop, or place, and in addition thereto one apprentice or improver to every three journeymen permanently employed on day work for six months in the process, trade, or business of a compositor or letter-press machinist, and receiving not less than 50s. per week of 48 hours.

2. Apprentices' or improvers' wages.—That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to apprentices or improvers employed in the process, trade, or business of a compositor or letter-press machinist, excepting linotype or monoline work, shall be as follows:—

1st year	6s.	for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

and after the seventh year, within the Metropolitan District, 1s. 1d. per hour or £2 12s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week; and outside the Metropolitan District, 1s. ½d. per hour, or 50s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

3. Overtime:—That the price or rate of wages which shall be paid to any male apprentice or improver over sixteen years of age for time worked in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours fixed by the Board shall be—1st year, 3d.; 2nd year, 4d.; 3rd year, 5d.; 4th year, 6d.; 5th year, 7d.; 6th year, 8d.; 7th year, 9d. per hour.

4. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to apprentices or improvers for linotype or monoline work during the first six years of their apprenticeship shall be 1s. 3d. per hour, or 60s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week, and during the seventh year of their apprenticeship 7d. per hour or 28s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

5. Overtime:—That the price or rate of wages which shall be paid to male apprentices or improvers over 16 years of age for linotype or monoline work done in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours, fixed by the Board, shall be one and a third times the minimum rates fixed by the Board for such persons respectively.

6. That the wages, price, or rate, which shall be paid to all persons for whom a time rate has been fixed under Part IV. of this Determination, for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

FIRST SCHEDULE
(Within the Metropolitan District).
HAND COMPOSITION SCALE.

1. All casual hands when called on—8s. 8d. for eight hours or any fraction of eight hours, or 8s. for 8,000 or any fraction of 8,000 ens.
2. All kinds of composition entirely in a foreign language shall be done on time, unless compositors are employed of the same nationality as the language in which the work is composed.
3. All kinds of music composition, Greek, Hebrew, or dead languages, shall be done only on time.
4. Alterations from copy to be done by the house, or charged for every line passing through the stick, and all marks in revises not appearing in the first proof to be corrected by the house.
5. All kinds of composition in the English language shall be cast up at the standard rate per 1,000 en quads; where the twenty-six lower-case letters are less than the twenty-six en quads the cast up shall be by the lower-case letters; a thick space to be considered as an en quad in width. Em and en quads, or whatever may be used at the beginning or end of lines, to be reckoned in the width. Bastard founts to be cast up to the width of the smaller body of the founts to which they belong.
6. All persons employed on column or tabular matter, with or without headings or rules:—Two columns—two justifications or arrangements to constitute half-measure—1s. 4d. per 1,000 ens. Three columns—three justifications or arrangements—1s. 6d. per 1,000 ens. Four columns—four or more justifications or arrangements—2s. per 1,000 ens. In all cases where braces are to be pieced each brace shall constitute a column.
7. Tabular or column matter with headings in smaller type than the body is to be cast up at the relative value of the two bodies.
8. Introductory lines or footnotes attached to table matter not exceeding six lines each to be charged as part of the table.
9. Matter consisting of subscribers' names, with the sums of money run out to the end of the line; names of horses, with st. and lb. run out; measurements of land, with acres, roods, and perches run out take no extra charge; but where there are two columns of such figures brought into the same width, 1s. 4d. per 1,000 ens; three columns, 1s. 6d. per 1,000 ens; four or more columns, 2s. per 1,000 ens. In all matter which requires casting-off to ascertain proper widths for the purpose of ranging (whether such matter consists of words or figures) each width or ranging shall be considered a column—with or without rules or headings.
10. Run-on matter, such as is shown in Appendix A, and other matter of a similar character, causing extra delay and trouble to the compositor, 1s. 4d. per 1,000 ens.
11. Takings composed with ancient spelling, or dialect, 1s. 6d. per 1,000 ens.
12. All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, 2s. per 1,000 ens.
13. Algebraical workings to be charged 2s. per 1,000 ens; matter interspersed with algebraical signs, 1s. 6d. per 1,000 ens.
14. Narrow measures (other than tabular):—Ten ems pica and over, at 1s. per 1,000 ens; eight ems and under ten, 1s. 3d. per 1,000 ens; four ems and under eight, 1s. 6d. per 1,000 ens; under four ems, 2s. per 1,000 ens.
15. All lines composed away from the frame 2s. per 1,000 ens.

SECOND SCHEDULE
(Within the Metropolitan District).
LINO TYPE AND MONOLINE WORK.

1. All kinds of composition in the English language shall be cast up at the standard rate per 1,000 en quads; a thick space over to be considered as an en quad in width. Em and en quads, or whatever may be used at the beginning or end of lines, to be reckoned in the width. Bastard founts to be cast up to the width of the smaller body of the founts to which they belong.
2. All persons employed on column or tabular matter cast on one bar:—Two columns—two justifications or arrangements to constitute half measure—4¾d. per 1,000 ens. Three columns—three justifications or arrangements, 5¼d. per 1,000 ens. Four columns—four or more justifications or arrangements, 7d. per 1,000 ens. (The above charges are to be made whether the matter is with or without headings or rules.)
3. Matter requiring two bars to complete one measure (not being tabular matter), 4¾d. per 1,000 ens; three, 5¼d. per 1,000 ens; four or more, 7d. per 1,000 ens.
4. All lines cast by the machine shall be charged as full lines.
5. Matter in all types up to brevier inclusive set to measure under 12 ems pica, 4¾d. per 1,000 ens; under 9 ems pica, 5¼d. per 1,000 ens. All types above brevier set to less than 13 ems pica to be charged by brevier multiple.
6. Run-on figure matter (such as timber and wool sales and similar matter), 4¾d. per 1,000 ens. (See Appendix A for sample.)

7. All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, 7d. per 1,000 ens.
8. Matter of and above four lines composed in other than ordinary English (*e.g.*, dialects), 5½d. per 1,000 ens; and foreign languages, 7d. per 1,000 ens.
9. One line extra shall be charged for each word of small caps, italic, clarendon, &c.
10. Matter having to be transposed by the operator (*i.e.*, which is not set up in the order in which it appears in copy), 4¾d. per 1,000 ens. Illegible or indistinct copy, being unfair, 4¾d. per 1,000 ens.
11. All first-proof and revise corrections (marks left undone in the first proof) to be done by the operator. House marks to be charged 7d. per 1,000 ens, if done by the operator. All "slugging" to be done by the "house."
12. All matter set from books or copy that will not go on the copy-tray, 4¾d. per 1,000 ens.
13. Alterations from copy in the first proof to be charged at the rate of 7d. per 1,000 ens for every line affected by such alterations. Authors' proofs to be charged at the same rate, but not less than twelve lines to be charged for any author's proof. The "house" shall be entitled to correct all revises or authors' marks on time.
14. Twelve lines of 16-ems pica or less, or their equivalent in wider measure, shall constitute a machine "take" of copy.
15. Matrices coming down wrong channel, transposition of matrices, repeated missing of matrices, matrices repeating of their own accord, space bands transposing, and sunken letters shall constitute machine errors, and shall be charged as "house" marks. Provided that the attention of the engineer shall have been called to such defect, and he shall have failed to remedy the matter.
16. Changing magazine and moulds, 6d.; refilling magazine, 1s.

5. Matter in all types up to brevier inclusive set to measure under 12 ems pica, 4½d. per 1,000 ens; under 9 ems pica, 4¾d. per 1,000 ens. All types above brevier set to less than 13 ems pica to be charged by brevier multiple.
6. Run-on figure matter (such as timber and wool sales and similar matter), 4½d. per 1,000 ens. (See Appendix A for sample.)
7. All matter with a border round, whether formed of rules, letters, or otherwise, 6½d. per 1,000 ens.

11. All first-proof and revise corrections (marks left undone in the first proof) to be done by the operator. "House" marks to be charged 6½d. per 1,000 ens if done by the operator. All "slugging" to be done by the "house."
12. All matter set from books or copy that will not go on the copy-tray, 4½d. per 1,000 ens.
13. Alterations from copy in the first proof to be charged at the rate of 6½d. per 1,000 ens for every line affected by such alterations. Authors' proofs to be charged at the same rate, but not less than twelve lines to be charged for any author's proof. The "house" shall be entitled to correct all revises or authors' marks on time.
14. Twelve lines of 16 ems pica or less, or their equivalent in wider measure, shall constitute a machine "take" of copy.
15. Matrices coming down wrong channel, transposition of matrices, repeated missing of matrices, matrices repeating of their own accord, space bands transposing, and snoken letters shall constitute machine errors, and shall be charged as "house" marks. Provided that the attention of the engineer shall have been called to such defect, and he shall have failed to remedy the matter.
16. Changing magazine and moulds, 6d.; refilling magazine, 1s.

3. Overtime :—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to male lithographers (including grainers and stone polishers), over the age of sixteen years, for work in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours shall be one and a third times the minimum wage fixed by the Board for such persons.

Apprentices or Improvers.

7. That the number or proportionate number of apprentices or improvers who may be employed in the process, trade, or business of lithography shall be, in proportion to the number of journeymen permanently employed for six months in the process, trade, or business of a lithographer, and not receiving less than 52s. per week of 48 hours, as follows :—

PART VI.—BOOKBINDING.

That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to bookbinders and vellum binders for turned in work (excepting quarter-bound work cut flush turned in paper sides), marblers, finishers, paper rulers, blockers (excepting blind blocking), guillotine-machine cutters for bookbinding and paper ruling and label work, printers' cutters solely employed in cutting, gilders, leather cutters, and pocket-book makers, shall be 1s. 1d. per hour, or 52s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

2. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to folders, pagers, perforators, staplers, checkers, binders of quarter-bound work cut flush turned in paper sides, and binders of all flush work not turned in, shall be 4d. per hour, or 16s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

3. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to sewers and takers-down of letter-press work shall be 5d. per hour, or 20s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

4. Overtime :—That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to male bookbinders (including vellum binders for turned in work, marblers, finishers, paper rulers, blockers, guillotine-machine cutters for bookbinding and paper ruling and label work, printers' cutters solely employed in cutting, gilders, leather cutters, and pocket-book makers) over the age of sixteen years for work in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours shall be one and a third times the minimum wage fixed by the Board for such persons.

5. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to male feeders (not being apprentices or improvers) employed on ruling machines and to gluers (not being apprentices or improvers) for quarter-bound work cut flush turned in paper sides, and all flush work not turned in shall be as follows:—

Male Apprentices or Improvers.—That the number or proportionate number of apprentices or improvers who may be employed within any factory, or work-room, or shop, or place in the process, trade, or business of bookbinding shall be in proportion to the number of journeymen permanently employed for six months in the process, trade, or business of bookbinding, and receiving not less than 52s. per week of 48 hours, as follows:—

and thereafter one apprentice or improver to every three such journeymen.

9. Apprentices' or improvers' wages.—That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to apprentices or improvers employed in the process, trade, or business of bookbinding shall be as follows:—

11. That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to apprentices or improvers employed in the process, trade, or business of sewing, folding, paging, perforating, stapling, checking, binding of quarter-bound work cut flush turned in paper sides and all flush work not turned in, and takers-down of letter-press work, shall be—

1st year	5s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

5th "	15s. " " "

and after the fifth year for a maximum number of 48 hours per week a minimum wage of 16s. per week for folders, pagers, perforators, staplers, checkers, binders of quarter-bound work cut flush turned in paper sides, and all flush work not turned in; and of 20s. per week for sewers and takers-down of letter-press work.

12. Female apprentices or improvers.—That the number or proportionate number of female apprentices or improvers who may be employed within any factory, or work-room, or shop, or place, shall be two apprentices or improvers to every female permanently employed for six months in the process, trade, or business of bookbinding, and receiving not less than the minimum wage of 16s. per week of 48 hours in the case of folders, pagers, perforators, staplers, checkers, binders of quarter-bound work cut flush turned in paper sides and all flush work not turned in, and not less than 20s. per week of 48 hours in the case of sewers and takers-down of letter-press work.

13. That the wages price or rate which shall be paid to all persons for whom a time rate has been fixed under Part VI. of this Determination, for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

14. That this Determination shall come into force on and after the 1st January, 1902.
