CONSERVATOR OF FORESTS.

APPLICATIONS will be received by the Public Service
Board up to Saturday, the 27th April, 1901, from officers

appointment to the position of Conservator of Forests, Professional
Division, Department of Lands and Survey.

Yearly salary—£537 minimum; £600 maximum.

The duties attached to the position will be—

- (1) To re-organize the forest system of Victoria upon the most
modern scientific basis.
- (2) To efficiently supervise and command the staff of officers
connected with the forests.
- (3) To visit and personally inspect the different parts of the
forests, and to determine (subject to the concurrence
of the Minister) questions pertaining to conflicting
interests.
- (4) To carry on a system of training foresters.
- (5) To manage all business pertaining to forestry, to report
thereon when directed, and to advise generally with
the Minister, through the Permanent Head of the
Department.

Preference will be given to such applicants as can show, in
addition to a British or Indian forest training, a successful
record of forest management in Australia, and a thorough know-
ledge of the general principles of forestry, as well as an intimate
and familiar acquaintance with the forests and geography of the
State of Victoria.

The petitioners state that owing to the location of the officers of the shire at Numurkah the other portions of the shire are less open to supervision, and they are put to much expense travelling long distances to view and inspect the works being carried on. They have no business connexion with Numurkah, Nathalia being a market centre of the proposed new shire. That the Shire of Numurkah has become too large to work conveniently, and the area proposed to be severed could be worked more advantageously and at less expense than under existing conditions.

The petitioners therefore pray that His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may be pleased to sever the said area from the Shire of Numurkah, and constitute it a separate municipality under the name and title of "The Shire of Nathalia," such municipality to be subdivided into three Ridings to be called—

THE NORTHERN RIDING,
THE CENTRAL RIDING,
THE MOIRA RIDING.

THE MELBOURNE HARBOR TRUST COMMISSIONERS.

IN pursuance of the *Melbourne Harbor Trust Act 1890*, the Melbourne Harbor Trust Commissioners make the following regulations:—

332. Fit certificates issued by the owner or owners of colliers or their agent or agents duly authorized thereto, are to be produced by the master or agent in Victoria of the vessel to which they are issued to the clearing clerk of the Customs department of the Commonwealth, either at the time of entering inwards or before clearing of such vessel outwards.

333. No coal shall be landed from any vessel carrying coal and hereinafter mentioned as a collier at any wharf, dock, pier, jetty, landing stage, or platform within the Port of Melbourne, unless an entry has been previously passed or a permit granted to land such coal by a collector or landing surveyor at Melbourne of the Commonwealth.

334. When a permit has been granted to land coal as mentioned in the last preceding regulation and in regulation No. 340 hereinafter mentioned, complete entries shall be passed by the company or person desiring to land such coal within seven days after the arrival of such vessel within the Port of Melbourne.

335. All such entries must be passed within seven days after the arrival of such vessel, and be delivered to the coal officer of the Customs department of the Commonwealth at No. 9 Berth South, or at such other place as such officer may from time to time appoint, accompanied by a stevedore's certificate showing the distribution of the coal and the time and date of the final discharge of the vessel.

336. All coal put overboard from such vessel into other vessels will be treated as transshipments free of wharfage rates, but in all instances (except in the case of lighters used for storage purposes) when coal is put into a vessel or vessels not intended to go beyond the State of Victoria, import entries must be passed such as will satisfy the coal officer aforesaid that no wharfage rates are payable. When coal is put into lighters used for storage purposes, transshipment entries shall immediately be passed clearly stating the word "Lighter" before the name of the receiving vessel.

337. All coal landed from any vessel at any wharf, dock, pier, jetty, landing stage or platform within the Port of Melbourne and not transhipped within forty-eight hours of the final discharge of such vessel shall be subject to payment of wharfage rates.

338. Receipts for all coal exported or transhipped shall be produced to the coal officer aforesaid, and such receipts shall after the entries aforesaid have been indorsed thereon by him be retained and filed by such officer at the Coal Station No. 9 Berth South, or at such other place as such officer may from time to time appoint.

339. Register books shall be kept by the coal importers at their offices on the wharf, and such register shall show the distribution of the inward cargo of each collier; that is to say the number of

tons landed, the number of tons transhipped into any vessel, and the number of tons retained for stores, and the number of tons (if any) then remaining in such vessel. Such transactions shall be entered immediately after the final discharge of a collier and must be available for signature by the coal officer of the Customs department of the Commonwealth. Such books shall be accessible at any time, and as often as he may require, to any Customs or Harbor Trust official.

340. No coal shall be landed from any lighter at any wharf, dock, pier, jetty, landing stage, or platform within the Port of Melbourne without an entry having been previously passed or a permit granted to land such coal by a collector or landing surveyor of the Commonwealth at Melbourne.

341. All coal landed from lighters at any wharf, dock, pier, jetty, landing stage, or platform within the Port of Melbourne, will be subject to payment of wharfage rates, and an "Import" entry must be passed for such coal, the name of the lighter appearing therein as the importing vessel.

342. No coal transhipped from a lighter or lighters shall be subject to payment of wharfage rates, but a transhipment entry must be passed for such coal by the company or person desiring to tranship, and the name of the lighter or lighters shall appear in such entry as the importing vessel or vessels.

343. A register of lighters intended to be used for the storage of coal shall be kept by the coal officer of the Customs department of the Commonwealth at Melbourne, and no lighter shall be recognised by the said department, or by the Commissioners for such purpose, unless so registered, and all such lighters shall keep books at the coal importers' offices on the wharf, showing the quantities of every input and output; such transactions shall be entered within twenty-four hours after the transaction; such books shall be available for inspection, verification, and signature by such coal officer so soon after each transaction as he shall think fit, and shall be accessible to, and may be inspected at any time by any Customs and Harbor Trust official.

344. The lighter books mentioned in the last preceding regulation shall be balanced at the end of each quarter year, that is to say at the end of the months of March, June, September, and December, in every year, and the coal officer aforesaid shall certify as to the correctness or otherwise of each such balance.

These regulations shall be incorporated with and form part of, and be construed with the regulations of the said Commissioners, made and passed on the 23th day of March, One thousand nine hundred.

DANDENONG WATERWORKS TRUST.—RATING REGULATIONS.

THE Dandenong Waterworks Trust do hereby, pursuant to and in execution of the powers and authorities conferred by the Water Acts, make the following Regulations:—

- The following rates and charges are those which the owners and occupiers of lands and tenements shall pay for the year 1901 in respect of water supplied by the Trust within the Trust area, and such rates shall be payable in one moiety on the 1st March, 1901—
- On every house and tenement of the annual municipal value of Ten pounds (£10) and under, the minimum sum of Ten shillings (10s.) per annum.
- On every house and tenement above the annual municipal value of Ten pounds sterling (£10), the sum of One Shilling in the pound (£1) on the amount of said valuation.
- Warehouses and wholesale stores not being dwellings or used in retail business, the sum of One shilling in the pound (£1) on the amount of municipal valuation, provided that in no case shall a less rate than One pound sterling be paid.
- A rate of One shilling in the pound shall be levied on all vacant ground fronting such streets as are reticulated.
- Water supplied by measure to be used in private dwellings or other premises for domestic or other than domestic use shall be charged at the rate of One shilling (1s.) per 1,000 gallons. The minimum quantity to be charged for yearly shall be that which, at One shilling per 1,000 gallons, shall be equal to the amount which the Trust would be entitled to receive under the current rating upon the municipal assessed value of any such premises, and at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons for any quantity of water used for the above purposes beyond such an amount as aforesaid.
- The charge for water supplied for manufacturing and other purposes, and to buildings, lands, and institutions not rated, to be subject to special agreement with the Trust.
- For water supplied to charitable institutions for garden or irrigation purposes, Sixpence per 1,000 gallons.
- For water supplied to cricket or bowling clubs, subject to arrangement with the Trust.
- For water supplied to gardens or nurseries cultivated for trade purposes, One shilling per 1,000 gallons.
- For water supplied to syphon pumps, One shilling per 1,000 gallons, or as may be decided upon by the Trust, in addition to a supply for domestic or other purposes.
- For water supplied to private fountains, Twenty shillings each per annum, or as may be decided upon by the Trust, in addition to a charge for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

13. For water supplied and used solely as a motive power for hydraulic lifts, water blasts, turbines, water wheels, electric and other motors (subject to the supply being refused or discontinued at any time). One shilling per 1,000 gallons, or as may be agreed upon, in addition to the rating upon the assessment of the premises for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

14. For a temporary supply during the erection of new buildings, Ten shillings per cent. on the amount of contract for stone, brickwork, and plastering.

WHEREAS by the *Treasury Bonds Act 1896* (No. 1451) it is among other things provided that the sum of Thirty-five thousand pounds, to be raised by the issue of Treasury Bonds under the authority of the said Act, may be applied for the giving of bonuses for dairy produce, fruits, and honey of best quality, and in best order exported to markets other than Australasia; for the construction of wineries in vine-growing districts and viticultural education generally; for the sowing, and planting, and cultivation of seeds or plants to be used for the manufacture of the same, and for the manufacture of raisins, currants, and figs, to be expended under regulations to be approved by the Governor in Council. And whereas by Order in Council dated the 16th day of November, 1896, regulations were made for payment of bonuses for export of fruit pulp, and such regulations were amended by Order in Council dated the 21st day of November, 1898. Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby further amend the regulations made for the purpose aforesaid in the manner following (that is to say):—

BONUSES FOR EXPORT OF FRUIT PULP.

Clause 2 in the aforesaid regulations of 16th November, 1896, is hereby revoked, and the following regulation is substituted therefor:—

2. A bonus may be paid upon fruit pulp, of a quality to be approved by the Minister of Agriculture, grown in Victoria, and exported therefrom to such foreign port or ports as may be approved by the Minister of Agriculture, of following kinds, and at the rates specified:—

Fig, 1s. 3d. per lb.
Peach, 1s. 3d. per lb.
Plum, 1s. 3d. per lb.
Quince, 1s. 4d. per lb.
Apple, 1s. 4d. per lb.
Raspberry, 1s. 2d. per lb.
Apricot, 1s. 2d. per lb.

All shops in the Township of Seymour within the municipal district of the Shire of Seymour (other than those mentioned in the Fourth Schedule to the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*) shall be closed on Wednesday in each week from the hour of One o'clock in the afternoon.

WHEREAS by the Local Government Acts it is enacted that, subject to the provisions of the said Acts, the Governor in Council may from time to time make Orders exercising certain powers therein set forth, amongst others to declare any borough, having in the year preceding such declaration a gross revenue of not less than Ten thousand pounds, a town: And whereas by the said Acts it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may exercise any of the powers therein conferred as aforesaid after the presentation of a petition in pursuance of the provisions of the said Acts for the exercise thereof, and after the publication of such petition as therein described and the lapse of one month at the least from the day of such publication, and except as in the said Acts provided, not otherwise; but that it shall be in the discretion of the Governor in Council absolutely to refuse the prayer of any such petition, or to grant the whole or any part thereof: And whereas it is further enacted that every petition to declare any borough a city or town must be signed with the common seal of such borough, and that every Order exercising any such powers as aforesaid shall be published in the *Government Gazette* and shall take effect as from the day of such publication: And whereas a petition signed with the common seal of the Borough of Malvern to declare the said borough a town has been presented to the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in Council: And whereas the substance and prayer of such petition have been duly published in pursuance of the provisions of the said Acts: And whereas the gross revenue of the said Borough of Malvern in the year ended on the 30th September, 1900, was not less than Ten thousand pounds: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this Order declare the said Borough of Malvern to be a Town under the designation of

THE TOWN OF MALVERN.

And the Honorable William McCulloch, His Majesty's Commissioner of Public Works for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

NEWTOWN AND PITFIELD RAILWAY
CONSTRUCTION TRUST.

REGULATION No. 2.

FOR CONVENING MEETINGS OF THE TRUST; AND GENERALLY FOR
REGULATING THE CONDUCT OF THE BUSINESS OF THE TRUST.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the sixteenth day
of April, 1901.

PRESENT :

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria.

Mr. Peacock	Mr. Gürr
Mr. Burton	Mr. Phillips

WHEREAS by section 25 of the *Railway Lands Acquisition Act 1893* (No. 1288) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make Regulations relating to any Railway Construction Trust appointed and created under Part I. of the said Act for the purposes following:—

- “(a) The mode in which meetings of the members of Trusts under the said Part of the said Act are to be convened;
- “(b) The form of any notice or order which may be required to be given by any Trustees under the said Act; and
- “(c) Generally for regulating the conduct of the business and the proceedings of such Trusts and the numbers of members to form quorums thereof, and the appointment of the Chairman of each Trust, and for carrying into effect the provisions of the said Part of the said Act.”

Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof and in pursuance of the said provisions of the now in part recited Act, doth for the purposes aforesaid, so far as these may relate to a certain Railway Construction Trust duly appointed and created under the Railway Acquisition Acts, and known as the Newtown and Pitfield Railway Construction Trust, make the Regulation following, viz:—

1. First meeting.—The first meeting of the Trust shall be convened by the Minister, at such time and place as he may direct.
2. Time and place of meeting.—The subsequent meetings of the Trust shall be held at such time and place as the Trustees may from time to time appoint, or, in default of such appointment, as the Minister may direct.
3. Quorums of meetings.—There shall be present at least four members at such first meeting in order to constitute a quorum, and all future quorums shall consist of three members, exclusive of the Chairman.
4. Chairman.—The Chairman shall be elected at the first meeting of the Trust, or at any adjournment thereof, and thereafter annually by a majority of votes of those present, and he shall hold office as Chairman for one year if he remain a member of the municipal council of his district, and may be willing to act.
5. Vacancy of Chairman, how filled.—Any vacancy in the position of Chairman shall be filled at the next meeting of the Trust after such vacancy has occurred, or at any adjournment thereof, in the same manner as aforesaid, and such election shall be the first business on the notice-paper for such meeting.
6. Appointment by Minister.—In the event of the Trust failing or neglecting to elect a Chairman the Minister may, by writing under his hand, appoint one of the members of the Trust to be Chairman, who shall hold office for one year if he remain a member of the municipal council of his district, and be willing to act.
7. Vice-Chairman.—In the absence of the Chairman, through illness or otherwise, at any meeting the members shall elect a Vice-Chairman to conduct the business of that meeting.
8. Special meetings.—The Trust may hold special meetings, which may be called upon the requisition of the Chairman, or upon the requisition, in writing under their hands, of any three members, addressed to the Chairman; but no such special meeting shall be held unless three clear days' notice thereof at least be given.
9. General conduct of business.—In all cases not herein provided for resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of the Trust.
10. Meetings, notice of.—A notice of every meeting of the Trust shall be, by the Secretary, delivered or sent by the post, addressed to the usual or last-known place of abode of each member, three clear days at least prior to the day upon which such intended meeting is to be held.
11. Minutes of meeting to be read at subsequent meeting.—At every meeting of the Trust the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting a question for the confirmation of the minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting, and the reading of the minutes of the proceedings of any Committee presented at any such preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings; and the said minutes of the proceedings at the preceding meeting shall then be signed by the Chairman.
12. Order of business of meetings.—After the signing of the minutes, as aforesaid, the order of business of any ordinary meeting shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but, for the greater convenience of the Trust at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect:—

- (i.) Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of the Trust.
- (ii.) Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
- (iii.) Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
- (iv.) Presentation of reports of Committees.
- (v.) Payments.
- (vi.) Ordinary business, including dealing with tenders.

- (vii.) Orders of the day, including subjects continued from proceedings of former meetings.
- (viii.) Extraordinary business, new rules and regulations.
- (ix.) Other motions of which previous notice has been given.
- (x.) Notices of motion.

And the order of business at a special meeting shall be the order in which such business stands in the notice thereof.

13. Addresses to the Governor in Council.—All addresses and applications to the Governor shall be presented by the Chairman and Secretary of the Trust, unless otherwise ordered by the Trust.

14. Motions.—All notices of motion shall be given in writing to the Secretary at least ten clear days before the meeting at which the motion is intended to be moved, and the Secretary shall, seven clear days at least before such meeting, cause notice of such intended motion to be sent to each Trustee; or notice of motion may be handed to the Secretary at any meeting, and, on being read to the meeting, may be dealt with at the next meeting.

15. Notice of motion to be given.—No member shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion, but in pursuance of notice given, as prescribed in the last preceding clause.

16. Petitions.—No motion, except that for receiving the same, shall, unless under most urgent circumstances, and then only by leave being granted by a two thirds majority of those present at the meeting, be made on any petition, memorial, or other like application until the next ordinary meeting of the Trust after that at which it has been presented.

17. Motions to be moved in order.—Except by leave of a majority of the Trustees present, motions shall be moved in the order in which they have been received, and if not so moved shall be struck out.

18. Motion to be moved by member giving notice.—No motion shall be proceeded with in the absence of the member who gave notice of the same, unless by some other member producing written authority from him to that effect.

19. Mover of motion appointing committee to be a member.—The mover of every motion appointing a committee shall be a member of such committee.

20. Draft of address or petition to be submitted at previous meeting.—No motion for any address or petition shall be entertained unless the mover shall at some previous meeting have submitted a draft of the same.

21. Order, &c., of debate.—Any member desirous of making a motion or amendment, or taking part in discussion thereon, shall rise and address the Chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the member calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the member in possession of the Chair may proceed with his subject.

22. Nature of motion to be stated.—Any member desirous of proposing an original motion or amendment must state the nature of the same before he addresses the Trust thereon.

23. No motion to be withdrawn without leave.—No motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of a majority of the Trustees present.

24. Motion to be seconded.—No motion or amendment shall be discussed or put to the vote of the Trust unless it be seconded; but a member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the Trust by directing the Chairman's attention to the infraction thereof.

25. Mover of motion.—A member moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a member merely seconding a motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

26. Motions, &c., how decided.—All questions shall be decided in accordance with the terms of section 21, clause 1, of Act No. 1288.

27. Resolutions, how revoked or altered.—No resolution shall be revoked or altered except in accordance with clause 2 of section 21 of the same Act.

28. Priority of members.—If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the Chairman shall decide, by naming the member, who is entitled to priority.

29. Members to stand while addressing the Trust.—Every member, including the Chairman, shall stand while addressing the Trust.

30. Points of order.—The Chairman, when called upon to decide on points of order or practice, shall state the provision, rule, or practice which he deems applicable to the case, without discussion or commenting on the same; and his decision as to order or practice in each case shall be final.

31. Members not to digress.—No member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or comment upon the words used by any other member in a previous debate; and all imputations of improper motives, and all personal reflections on members, shall be deemed highly disorderly.

32. Members to apologize for disorderly or offensive expressions.—Whenever any member shall make use of any expression disorderly, or capable of being applied offensively to any other member, the member so offending shall be required by the Chairman to withdraw the expression, and to make a satisfactory apology to the Trust.

33. Members called to order to sit down.—A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted by the Trust to explain.

34. Members twice offending to be liable to a penalty.—Any member using disorderly or offensive language, and having been twice called to order, or to withdraw, and to apologize for such conduct, and refusing to do so, shall be liable to a penalty for a breach of this Regulation.

35. Strangers.—Any person, not being a member of the Trust, who shall, having been admitted to any meeting of the Trust, be guilty thereof of any improper or disorderly conduct, or who shall not leave when requested by the Chairman to do so, may, on his order, be forthwith removed, and shall be liable to a penalty for a breach of this Regulation.

36. Members may demand documents.—Any member may of right demand the production of any of the documents of the Trust applying to the question under discussion.

37. No second amendment until previous one disposed of.—No second or subsequent amendment, whether upon an original proposition or on an amendment, shall be taken into consideration until the previous amendment is disposed of.

38. Mover of motion to have right of reply.—The mover of every original proposition, but not of any amendment, shall have a right of reply, immediately after which the question shall be put from the Chair; but no other member shall be allowed to speak more than once on the same question unless permission be given to explain, or the attention of the Chair be called to a point of order.

39. No discussion on motion for adjournment of Trust.—No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for an adjournment of the Trust; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived; the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice-paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the debates on motions moved and seconded, or any other order of the day, may be resumed at the next adjourned meeting of the Trust at the point at which it was so interrupted.

40. Protests.—Any member may protest against any resolution of the Trust, and notice of intention to protest shall in every case be given forthwith on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest shall specify the reasons for protesting, and shall be entered three days at least before the next ordinary meeting of the Trust by the protesting member, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the office of the Secretary, and signed by such member, and shall also be entered in the minutes of the meeting at which notice of the intention to protest shall have been given previously to the confirmation thereof; but such protest may be expunged from the minutes if declared by a majority of the Trust to be not in accordance with truth, or in its terms disrespectful to the Trust.

41. Lapsed questions.—If a debate on any motion moved and seconded be interrupted by the number of members present becoming insufficient for the transaction of business, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

42. Lapsed order of the day may be restored.—If a debate on any order of the day be interrupted by such insufficiency of number as aforesaid happening, such order may be restored to the notice-paper for a future day on motion upon notice, and then such debate shall be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted.

43. Committees.—Minutes of all proceedings of Committee shall be entered in the Committee's minute-book, and, being signed by the Chairman of the Committee, shall be presented to the Trust.

44. Meetings of Committees.—The Secretary shall convene every Committee within ten days of its first appointment, or at any other time by order of the Trust, or on the written order of the Chairman, or of any two members of the Committee.

45. Petitions.—No petition shall be presented after the Trust shall have proceeded to the orders of the day; and every member presenting a petition to the Trust shall acquaint himself with its contents, and ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the Trust, and that its contents do not violate any Regulation herein contained, and shall write his name at the beginning of the said petition.

46. No debate shall take place upon petitions.—No debate shall take place upon any petition or memorial, except as to its being received and taken into consideration as an order of the day at any future meeting, or, if necessary, that it be referred to a Committee.

47. Secretary.—The Secretary shall keep all minutes of meetings of the Trust, or of any Committee of the same; he shall also keep all accounts, books, and documents, conduct all correspondence, and perform all clerical work required to be performed for the Trust; and shall attend all meetings of the Trust or Committees when required, and at the office for the transaction of business as provided for under this Regulation; and shall perform all other acts which shall be deemed by the Trust incumbent upon the Secretary to discharge; he shall also have the receipt and disbursement of all moneys, and shall provide a guarantee for such amount for his fidelity and due fulfilment of his duties, and for the proper management and disposal of the funds of the Trust, as they may direct. All moneys received by him shall, as soon as possible thereafter, be paid into the account of the Trust to the bank wherein the same is kept. That he shall at no time hold in his hands more than Twenty pounds (£20) for 72 hours without banking the same. That all payments of the Trust shall be made by cheque, signed by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman and two members, and countersigned by the Secretary. That he shall take account of all moneys received by the Collector, and supervise his accounts as provided for under these Regulations.

48. Treasurer.—The Treasurer shall provide a guarantee for such amount for his fidelity and due fulfilment of his duties, and for the proper management and disposal of the funds of the Trust, as they may direct.

49. Collector.—The Collector shall give security for his fidelity and due fulfilment of his duties, and for the proper management and disposal of the funds of the Trust, for such amount as they may determine. He shall give no receipts except upon the printed forms provided for the same; and every receipt shall have a butt filled in by him, containing all particulars of moneys received and from whom. He shall pay the Treasurer or Secretary all moneys received by him at least once a week, and he shall at no time hold more moneys of the Trust than Twenty pounds (£20) for 72 hours without paying the same to the Treasurer or Secretary. He shall, at the close of each month at least, submit his books and butts, with a statement of all amounts collected, to the Secretary, and render to him a full account then, or whenever demanded by him, of all moneys received by him on account of the said Trust.

50. Appointment, &c., of Officers.—No appointment to any office at the disposal of the Trust shall take place until seven clear days' notice shall have been given, by advertisement in one of more newspapers circulating in the Construction District; inviting applications from qualified candidates for the same. Where the number of candidates are in excess of the number required, the Trust may reduce the same by ballot.

51. Salaries of Officers, &c.—The salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the Trust shall in all cases be fixed before they proceed to appoint any person to fill the same; and before the advertisement inviting applications as aforesaid, and shall be specified in such advertisement.

52. Expense of preparing security.—In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any duty, the expense of such security shall be borne by the Trust.

53. Common seal.—The Secretary of the Trust shall have the custody of the common seal, and shall be responsible for the same; and impressions shall only be made by order of the Trust, verified by the signatures of the Chairman, a member, and Secretary.

54. Suspension of rules.—With the exception of clauses 25 and 26, any one or more of the clauses of this Regulation may be suspended *pro tem.* in cases of emergency, and with the consent of a majority of the whole Trust.

55. Penalty.—Any person guilty of a breach of this Regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5).

And the Honorable William Arthur Trenwith, His Majesty's Minister of Railways for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies, in the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by Part I. of the Chinese Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1073) it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, to exempt any person or class of persons from the provisions of the said Part of the said Act, and to declare that such provisions shall not at any time, or for any specified period, apply to the person or class of persons mentioned in such Proclamation: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this Proclamation exempt the Chinese named in the first column of the Schedule hereto subjoined from the provisions of Part I. of the Chinese Act 1890 aforesaid, from the date hereof, for the periods specified opposite their respective names in the fourth column of the said Schedule, that is to say:—

QUEENSLAND, NEW SOUTH WALES, SOUTH AUSTRALIA, AND WESTERN AUSTRALIA

are infected with Oriental Plague, and that it is probable such diseases may be brought from such places to Victoria.

Each scale capable of weighing over half hundred-weight—
Each hundred-weight up to ten hundred-weights—Three-pence.
Each additional hundred-weight over ten hundred-weights—Sixpence.
If compared on the premises of the owner, each hundred-weight—One shilling.

III. WEIGHBRIDGES.

For testing each weighbridge—Two pounds two shillings.
The charge made by the inspector for carriage of weights shall be One shilling per mile.
For examining weights and scales (except weighbridges) within twelve months of the time when the same were last tested in the shire, one-half only of the above fees shall be charged.

The inspector will make one circuit annually throughout the shire with the authorized copies of the standard weights for the purpose of making the said comparisons therewith, keeping office on the days and at the places following, viz:—
