CONVENTION BETWEEN THE UNITED KINGDOM AND JAPAN FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE ESTATES OF DECEASED PERSONS.

THE subjoined Despatch and its Enclosure, received by His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies, are published for general information.

SIR,

I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the State under your Government, a copy of a Convention between the United Kingdom and Japan for the reciprocal protection of the estates of deceased persons, which was signed at Tokio on the 26th April last and ratified at Tokio on the 25th October last.

2. It will be observed from Article II. of the Convention that if it is desired that the stipulations of the Convention should be made applicable to the State under your Government, notice to that effect must be given to the Japanese Government by His Majesty's Representative at Tokio within two years from the date of the exchange of the ratifications.

3. I shall therefore be glad to be informed whether the State under your Government wishes to adhere to the Convention.

CONVENTION BETWEEN THE UNITED KINGDOM AND JAPAN FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE ESTATES OF DECEASED PERSONS.

SIGNED AT TOKIO, 26TH APRIL, 1900.

[Ratifications exchanged at Tokio, 25th October, 1900.]

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, being equally desirous of maintaining the relations of good understanding, which happily exist between them, by laying down rules for the protection of the estates of deceased persons, have agreed to conclude a Convention, and for that purpose have named as their respective Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, Sir Ernest Mason Satow, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Her Britannic Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, and His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, Viscount Aoki Shuzo, Junji, First Class of the Imperial Order of the Rising Sun, His Imperial Majesty's Minister of State for Foreign Affairs.

Who, having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon the following Articles:—

Article I.

Whenever a subject of one of the High Contracting Parties shall die within the dominions of the other, and there shall be no

person present at the time of such death who shall be rightly entitled to administer the estate of such deceased person, the following rules shall be observed:—

1. When the deceased leaves, in the above-named circumstances, heirs of his or her own nationality only, or who may be qualified to enjoy the civil status of their father or mother, as the case may be, the Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent of the country to which the deceased belonged, on giving notice to the proper authorities, shall take possession and have custody of the property of the said deceased, shall pay the expenses of the funeral, and retain the surplus for the payment of his or her debts, and for the benefit of the heirs to whom it may rightly belong.

But the said Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent shall be bound immediately to apply to the proper Court for letters of administration of the effects left by the deceased, and these letters shall be delivered to him with such limitations and for such time as to such Court may seem right.

2. If, however, the deceased leaves in the country of his or her decease, and in the above-named circumstances, any heir or universal legatee of other nationality than his or her own, or to whom the civil status of his or her father or his or her mother, as the case may be, cannot be granted, then each of the two Governments may determine whether the proper Court shall proceed according to law, or shall confide the collection and administration to the respective Consular officers under the proper limitations. When there is no Consul-General, Consul, Vice-Consul, or Consular Agent in the locality where the decease has occurred (in the case contemplated by the first rule of this Article), upon whom devolves the custody and administration of the estate, the proper authority shall proceed in these acts until the arrival of the respective Consular officer.

Article II.

The stipulations of the present Convention shall be applicable, so far as the laws permit, to all the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, excepting to those hereinafter named, that is to say, except to—

India,
The Dominion of Canada,
Newfoundland,
The Cape,
Natal,
New South Wales,
Victoria,
Queensland,
Tasmania,
South Australia,
Western Australia,
New Zealand.

Provided always that the stipulations of the present Convention shall be made applicable to any of the above-named colonies or foreign possessions, on whose behalf notice to that effect shall have been given to the Japanese Government by Her Britannic Majesty's Representative at Tokyo, within two years from the date of the exchange of ratifications of the present Convention.

Article III.

The present Convention shall come into force immediately after the exchange of the ratifications thereof, and shall remain in force until the 17th July, 1911.

Either High Contracting Power shall have the right at any time after the 16th July, 1910, to give notice to the other of its intention to terminate the same, and at the expiration of twelve months after such notice is given this Convention shall wholly cease and determine.

Article IV.

The present Convention shall be ratified, and the ratifications thereof shall be exchanged at Tokyo as soon as possible, and not later than six months from the present date.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their arms.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE JAM TRADE BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Acts*, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing jam, fruit jelly, pickles and sauces, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That the lowest rates of wages to be paid to the following classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing jam, fruit jelly, pickles and sauces shall be—

MALES.

- Adult males—30s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
- Males over eighteen years of age, but not over 21 years of age—17s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
- Males over sixteen years of age, but not over eighteen years of age—12s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
- Males under sixteen years of age—9s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

FEMALES.

- Females of eighteen years of age and upwards—14s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
- Females over sixteen years of age, but not over eighteen years of age—11s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.
- Females under sixteen years of age—9s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

APPRENTICES OR IMPROVERS.

NUMBER.

(2) That the number of apprentices or improvers who may be employed within any factory or work-room or shop or place shall be one apprentice or improver to every 50 male adults or fraction thereof employed in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing jam, fruit jelly, pickles and sauces.

WAGES.

That the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to apprentices or improvers employed in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing jam, fruit jelly, pickles and sauces shall be the following:—

For the 1st year's experience	7s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.
" 2nd	"	...	10s. " "
" 3rd	"	...	12s. 6d. " "
" 4th	"	...	15s. " "
" 5th	"	...	17s. " "

OVERTIME.

(3) That any male employé over the age of sixteen years who works in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing jam, fruit jelly, pickles and sauces for any time in excess of 48 hours per week, shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a quarter.

(4) That the above Determination shall come into force from the 3rd day of June, 1901.

Factories and Shops Acts.

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, and after due inquiry, I, the responsible Minister for the time being administering the Factories and Shops Acts, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of section 30 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1890*, as re-enacted by the *Factories and Shops Act 1896*, in the

for a period of four weeks from the 26th April, 1901, upon the following express conditions, that is to say:—

1. The births of 1,111 children, viz., 574 boys and 537 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of March. The number was, it will be observed, 45 more than in March, 1900, and 21 more than in March, 1899, but lower than that recorded for the month in any other of the last eleven years, and 144 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, or 213 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths recorded in March numbered 557, viz., 299 of males and 258 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 554, or 99 per cent., as against 87 per cent. in March, 1900, and 83 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, 14 fewer than in March, 1900, and the lowest recorded for the month during the last eleven years; it was also 127 below the average of March during the last ten years, and 165 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 26.48, and of deaths registered to 13.28 per annum, as compared with averages of the same month in 1900 of 26.27 and 14.07 respectively, and during the last ten years of 31.76 and 17.30 respectively, and averages of the whole year of 29.73 and 16.15.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 102.2° on the 2nd, and the lowest was 45.5° on the 20th. The mean temperature of the month (63.1°) was seven-tenths of a degree below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (41.2°) took place on the 1st, and the least range (6.7°) on the 5th. The mean daily range was 21.0°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.173 inches on the 7th, and the lowest was 29.488 inches on the 21st. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.912 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on 11 days, the amount being 3.14 inches, which was higher than in the corresponding month during any of the previous ten years except 1900, and 1.37 inches above the average.

The mean humidity of the month was 67.9.

Males contributed 54 per cent. and females 46 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 33 per cent. to that mortality, as against 26 per cent. in March, 1900; 40 per cent. in March, 1899; 43 per cent. in March, 1898; 33 per cent. in March, 1897; 38 per cent. in March, 1896; and 37 per cent. in March, 1895.

The deaths of infants under twelve months numbered 140, as compared with 124 in March, 1900. The rate of infantile mortality was 126 per 1,000 births, registered in the month under review, as compared with 116 in March, 1900; 165 in March, 1899; 174 in March, 1898; 124 in March, 1897; 143 in March, 1896; 137 in March, 1895; 149 in March, 1894; 186 in March, 1893; 180 in March, 1892; and 200 in March, 1891.

Forty-six persons—as against 50 in March, 1900—whose deaths were recorded during the month had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these, a female, aged 75, died of cancer; a labourer, aged 75, of phthisis; a female, aged 75, of cerebral hemorrhage; a gentleman, aged 75, of valvular disease of the heart; a ship-builder, aged 75, of heart disease (undefined); a porter, aged 75, of bronchitis; an iron merchant and a female, each aged 75, of enteritis; a labourer, aged 75, of nephritis; two females, each aged 76, of diarrhoea and dysentery respectively; two gentlemen, a male of no occupation, and two females, each aged 76, of cerebral hemorrhage, valvular disease of the heart, syncope, heart disease (undefined), and nephritis respectively; a labourer, aged 77, of cancer; a gentleman, aged 77, of apoplexy; a labourer, aged 77, of hemiplegia; a female, aged 77, of pneumonia; a gentleman, aged 77, of uræmia; a labourer, aged 77, of injuries, consequent in each case on a fall from a vehicle; a labourer, aged 78, of paralysis; a pensioner, aged 78, of heart disease; a female, aged 79, of bronchitis; an ironmonger, aged 79, of enteritis; a watchmaker, aged 81, and a female, aged 82, of embolism; two females and a gentleman, each aged 83, of dysentery, enteritis, and congestion of lungs respectively; a gentleman, aged 88, of œdema of lungs; a female, aged 89, of asthma; a gentleman, aged 92, of pneumonia; a handicapper, aged 75, a gardener, aged 76, a mariner and a female, each aged 80, two females, aged 81 and 83 respectively, a labourer, aged 84, a manufacturer, aged 85, a gentleman, aged 86, and three females, aged 87, 87, and 90 respectively, of old age.

Twenty-four of the deaths recorded during the month—as compared with 18 in March, 1900—were from external causes, of which 22 were set down to accident and 2 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A clerk, aged 19, a solicitor, aged 71, and a labourer, aged 77, were passed over by railway trains; a gate-keeper, aged 56, was killed by a railway gate striking him; a female, aged 38, by falling off a tram-car; a farmer, aged 50, died of fracture of the spine, the result of a fall from a horse; a carter, aged 28, and a female, aged 50, of injuries, consequent in each case on a fall from a vehicle; a driver, aged 35, of injuries, caused by being jammed between a lorry and a post; a female, aged 72, of fracture of the hip, the result of a fall; two boys, aged 2 and 14 respectively, and a female, aged 13, of fracture of the skull, accidentally caused; a boy, aged 15, of gunshot wounds; a female child, aged 3, of scalds; a cabinetmaker, aged 70, was accidentally drowned by falling overboard from his yacht; two females, aged 53 and 70 respectively, of burns; a labourer, aged 32, was accidentally drowned in the Saltwater River; three persons were "found drowned," viz.:—A female, aged 52, in the River Yarra; a labourer, aged 40, in a clay hole at South Brighton; and a female, aged 50, in Hobson's Bay. The suicidal deaths were those of a female, aged 23, who drowned herself; and a male, of no occupation, aged 60, who hanged himself.

One hundred and forty-two deaths, or 25 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—58 in the Melbourne, 19 in the Alfred, 3 in St. Vincent's, 7 in the Women's, 6 in the Children's, 10 in the Homœopathic, and 7 in the Austin Hospitals; 5 in the Metropolitan and 7 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 8 in the Immigrants' Home; 7 in the Benevolent Asylum; 2 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor; 1 in the Protestant Refuge; and 2 in the Melbourne Gaol.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 182, of which 100, or 55 per cent., were of males, and 82, or 45 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 140 were under one year of age, 28 were between one and two, 7 were between two and three, 5 were between three and four, and 2 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 375. Of these 199, or 53 per cent., were males, and 176, or 47 per cent., were females; 13 were between five and ten, 7 were between ten and fifteen, 7 were between fifteen and twenty, 14 were between twenty and twenty-five, 21 were between twenty-five and thirty, 33 were between thirty and thirty-five, 23 were between thirty-five and forty, 26 were between forty and forty-five, 19 were between forty-five and fifty, 24 were between fifty and fifty-five, 34 were between fifty-five and sixty, 20 were between sixty and sixty-five, 35 were between sixty-five and seventy, 45 were between seventy and seventy-five, 28 were between seventy-five and eighty, 10 were between eighty and eighty-five, 6 were between eighty-five and ninety, and 2 were between ninety and ninety-five.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 2 deaths under parasitic, 7 under dietetic, 16 under developmental diseases—chiefly premature birth and old age—6 under the head of violence, and 9 under ill-defined causes, whilst there was a decrease of 13 under zymotic, 17 under constitutional, and 24 under local diseases. Under the defined causes, deaths from typhoid fever fell from 17 to 8; but those from diarrhoeal zymotic class, deaths from influenza fell from 10 to 3, and those from cancer fell from 49 to 31. In the local class, deaths from diseases rose from 11 to 18. Under the constitutional class, deaths from diseases of the nervous system diminished by 6, diseases of the urinary system increased by 13; on the other hand, deaths from diseases of the respiratory system by 13, and those from diseases of parturition by 3.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1890 to 1900, and the first three months of 1901, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November. It will also be noticed that the mortality from both causes during the month was below the average.

VITAL STATISTICS.

RETURN OF THE BIRTHS AND DEATHS REGISTERED IN BALLARAT AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF MARCH, 1901.

THE births of 57 boys and 43 girls, or in all of 100 children, were registered in Ballarat and Sebastopol during the month of March. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter cases, hogsheads, butter firkins or boxes, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed from the place of delivery at the contractor's expense.

5. The meat supplied under these conditions must, if practicable, be slaughtered at abattoirs which are under proper authorized inspection and supervision. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor, on report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account, or from the security money.

6. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned or any officer authorized by him.

7. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted and shall return the order to the contractor, and the account is to be rendered as soon as possible after the delivery of the supplies, accompanied by the receipted delivery order. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

8. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they or any like supplies suitable for the service will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account or from the security money.

9. If the officer in charge of stores be not satisfied as to the quantity or quality of the stores, or if, after taking delivery of any stores or material, he shall discover any deficiency or defect

therein, he may return such deficient or defective stores or material to the contractor, and shall report the same to the head of his department and to the Tender Board.

10. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Treasurer of the State for the time being; and the decision of the board is to be considered final.
