## PUBLIC SERVICE ACTS.—ALTERATION OF REGULATIONS.

**T**HE Public Service Board, pursuant to the provisions of the *Public Service Act* 1890 and the *Public Service Act* 1900, hereby repeals all Regulations heretofore made by the Board relating to the salary of Officers in the General Division of the Department of Trade and Customs, and hereby makes the following Regulations :—

### CLASSIFICATION OF GENERAL DIVISION.

[Section 59 (viii.) of Act No. 1133, and Section 13 of Act No. 1721.]

1. The scale of amount of yearly salary attached to the several offices mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall be that respectively entered opposite the name of the office in such Schedule.

2. In cases where no minimum salary is entered opposite the name of his office in the said Schedule, every officer shall be entitled to receive pay at the maximum rate, without addition thereto.

3. In cases where there is a minimum rate and a maximum rate every officer shall be entitled to receive salary at a rate, within the minimum and maximum limits, to be fixed by the Governor in Council on the recommendation of the Board, provided that an Officer on his first appointment to the service shall be paid at the minimum rate of his office.

4. Seniority as regards promotion, and salaries of officers transferred or promoted, will be regulated in accordance with the provisions of section 10 of the *Public Service Act* 1893, so far as such provisions are applicable.

5. In cases where officers are graded, promotion from grade to grade shall be regulated in accordance with clause 6, chapter xi., of the Regulations relating to "Promotion of Officers in the General Division."

6. Increments, except where otherwise stated, may be granted to officers appointed to the positions mentioned in the following Schedule on the scale shown hereunder, viz. :—

Three increments, each equal to one-third of the difference between the minimum and maximum, to be payable as follows :—

Where the difference between the minimum and maximum salary exceeds £45—

1st increment, after an interval of one year from appointment.

2nd increment, after a further interval of two years.

3rd increment, after a further interval of three years.

Where the difference does not exceed £45—

1st and 2nd increments as above.

3rd, after a further interval of two years.

Every increment to be discretionary, and not to be payable except on the certificate of the Permanent Head of the Department and (after independent inquiry) of the Public Service Board that such increment has been earned by good conduct and efficient service.

Factories and Shops Acts.

IN compliance with an application in writing under the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, and after due inquiry, I, the responsible Minister for the time being administering the Factories and Shops Acts, do hereby suspend the operation of the first clause of section 30 of the Factories and Shops Act 1890, as re-enacted by the Factories and Shops Act 1896, in the

FACTORY OR WORK-ROOMS OF MRS. F. C. SHAW, LAUNDRY PROPRIETOR, MORELAND-STREET, FOOTSCRAY,

for a period of three weeks from the 3rd May, 1901, upon the following express conditions, that is to say:—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factory or work-rooms more than eight females for more than forty-eight hours in any one week, and that the said eight females shall not be employed for more than fifty-seven hours in any one week, nor for more than eleven hours in any one day, in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That each female so employed shall receive not less than eight shillings per week for each week during which she works overtime, and, in addition, each wage-worker shall be paid for such overtime at the rate of time and a half; and each piece-worker shall be paid Threepence per hour for overtime in addition to ordinary earnings by piece-work.
3. That each female so employed shall receive Sixpence tea money each evening she works overtime.
4. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without their consent.
5. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such factory or work-rooms for the information of all concerned.

**I**N accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of glazing or bevelling plate glass, or of silvering plate or sheet glass, or of embossing plate, sheet, or stained glass, or of cutting plate or stained glass, or of glazing stained glass in lead has made the following determination, namely:—

(1) That the lowest rates of wages to be paid to the following classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of glazing or bevelling plate glass, or of silvering plate or sheet glass, or of embossing plate, sheet, or stained glass, or of cutting plate or stained glass, or of glazing stained glass in lead, shall be—

Pencil Hand Embosser, 1s. per hour or £2 8s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week  
 Rubber-out Embosser, 11½d. per hour or £2 5s.       "       "       "       "  
 Lead Light Glaziers, 1s. per hour or £2 8s.       "       "       "       "  
 Men turning out lead from the mill for lead light glaziers, 8½d. per hour or £1 12s. 6d. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Boys (other than apprentices or improvers) under 21 years of age turning out lead from the mill for lead light glaziers, 3¾d. per hour or 15s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Cementers—8½d. per hour or £1 12s. 6d. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
       "       Boys (other than apprentices or improvers) under 21 years of age, 3¾d. per hour or 15s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Plate Glass Cutter.—Cutting all kinds of cast plate or rolled plate glass, 1s. per hour or £2 8s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Plate Glass Cutter (being the man in charge of department), 1s. 1½d. per hour or £2 14s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Cutter of polished plate glass, for bevelling or silvering to sizes not over 25 feet super., 10½d. per hour or £2 2s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Foreman Glazier, glazing plate-glass in shop fronts, 1s. 1½d. per hour or £2 14s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Glazier, glazing plate glass of every kind, 10½d. per hour or £2 2s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Stained-glass Cutter, cutting glass to be glazed in lead, 1s. 1½d. per hour or £2 14s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Plate-glass Beveller, 10½d. per hour or £2 2s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Silverer of plate or sheet glass, 10½d. per hour or £2 2s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Sand Boys (other than apprentices or improvers) under 21 years of age, 7s. 6d. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.  
 Feeders-up (other than apprentices or improvers) under 21 years of age, 5s. for a maximum number of 48 hours per week.

(2) That the number of apprentices or improvers who may be employed within any factory, or work-room, or shop, or place shall be—

**RATES OF PAYMENT.**

(3) That the lowest prices or rates to be paid to any apprentice or improver employed in the process, trade, or business of glazing or bevelling plate glass, or of silvering plate or sheet glass, or of embossing plate, sheet, or stained glass, or of cutting plate or stained glass, or of glazing stained glass in lead shall be as follows:—

and thereafter the minimum wage determined by the Board.

**OVERTIME.**

(4) That any male employé over the age of 16 years employed in the process, trade, or business of glazing or bevelling plate glass, or of silvering plate or sheet glass, or of embossing plate, sheet, or stained glass, or of cutting plate or stained glass, or of glazing stained glass in lead, who works for any time in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours fixed by the Board shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a third.

(5) That the above determination shall come into force from the 20th May, 1901.

The prices must be expressed without alterations or erasures, in words as well as in figures, and the total amount of the tender stated without any percentage or other reductions.

Printed forms of tender, showing the estimated monthly consumption, and the conditions of contract, may be obtained from the Secretary to the Tender Board, Melbourne; for the respective districts from the Receivers and Paymasters at Geelong, Ararat, Ballarat, Beechworth, Bendigo, Castlemaine, Maryborough, and Sale; for Sunbury, from the Medical Superintendent, Hospital for the Insane; for Fort Franklin, at the Fort; and for Queenscliff, from the Officer Commanding Victoria Regiment, Royal Australian Artillery, by whom also any information or explanation will be afforded to persons tendering.

Security will be required, either in Victorian Government debentures, Savings Bank Deposit Book, or Bank Deposit Receipt, in favour of the Secretary to the Tender Board, or cash deposit, as the tenderer may elect.

Tenders must be accompanied by a preliminary deposit, as shown above, in bank notes, or a bank draft payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application. Such deposit to be forfeited in the event of the successful tenderer failing to complete the security within the prescribed period.

The security must be completed and contract signed within five days of acceptance of the tender, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

## CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. All the articles are to be of the best quality of the several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages, free from all charges for cartage, freight, &c. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply.

2. Supplies for country stations for which no local contract may have been taken, or for which the contract has been terminated, may be ordered under the Melbourne contract.

3. The Melbourne District will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; Williamstown District will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra, and all Government vessels which may be in Hobson's Bay during the currency of the contract; the Ararat, Beechworth, and Ballarat Districts will include the Hospitals for the Insane, Gaols, Police Gaols, and Lock-ups at these places; and the Geelong District embraces a radius of two miles from the Post Office.

The lock-ups at City Watch-House, Bourke-street West, Brunswick, Carlton, Coburg, Collingwood, Fitzroy, North, Hotham Hill, Little Bourke-street, North Melbourne, Port Melbourne, Prahran, Richmond, St. Kilda, South Melbourne, and South Yarra are included in the contracts for the Melbourne District.

4. Packages suitable for transport of goods supplied must be provided by the contractor free of expense, and the value of these packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded, except brandy casks, porter casks, hogsheds, butter firkins or boxes, and soap boxes (not including fancy soaps), flour, meal, and potato bags, which will remain the property of the contractor, and only the actual net weight or quantity received will be paid for. The empties to be removed from the place of delivery at the contractor's expense.

5. The meat supplied under these conditions must, if practicable, be slaughtered at abattoirs which are under proper authorized inspection and supervision. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor, on report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty-pounds, as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account, or from the security money.

6. The supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto on the written order of the officer in charge. All other supplies will be ordered by the head of department concerned or any officer authorized by him.

7. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted and shall return the order to the contractor, and the account is to be rendered as soon as possible after the delivery of the supplies, accompanied by the receipted delivery order. For the supplies coming under the head of Rations and Medical Comforts, the account is to be rendered monthly for such quantities only as are issued, the difference between the supply and issue to be kept at the contractor's credit. Supplies not issued at the termination of the contract to be removed by the contractor. The rates or quantities quoted in the orders cannot be exceeded.

8. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles at the time mentioned in the order, they or any like supplies suitable for the service will be otherwise procured, and the expense over and above the contract price will be deducted from his account or from the security money.

9. If the officer in charge of stores be not satisfied as to the quantity or quality of the stores, or if, after taking delivery of any stores or material, he shall discover any deficiency or defect

therein, he may return such deficient or defective stores or material to the contractor, and shall report the same to the head of his department and to the Tender Board.

10. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies as to the quality, the same to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey composed of persons named by the Treasurer of the State for the time being; and the decision of the board is to be considered final. In the event of the decision being against the contractor, the survey fees and expenses (if any) will be deducted as in clause 8.

11. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor; failing which, it or any like supply suitable for the service will be procured by the officer requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 8.

12. In the case of supplies for Hospitals for the Insane, it will also be competent for two or more of the official visitors, in conjunction with the medical superintendent, to reject any supplies that they may consider not in accordance with contract; and in such cases the reference to a board of survey will not be deemed to be necessary on the part of the contractor.

13. In the case of supplies for Hospitals for the Insane, it will be competent for a board of survey, consisting of the medical superintendent (or, in his absence, of the medical officer) and any two officers named by him, to examine and reject any supplies that may be objected to. It must be distinctly understood, however, that the contractor will have a right of appeal to the Treasurer of the State for the time being; but, pending such appeal, he must take back the rejected articles and at once supply others of approved quality; failing which, the supplies required or any like supplies suitable for the service may be obtained by the officer concerned, and the expense charged to the contractor. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor.

14. As the exact quantity of any article of provisions which may be required cannot be stated, the estimate being approximate only, the Government will not be bound by the quantity stated in the schedule, but will be at liberty to order more or less, according to circumstances, and the contractor will be bound to supply the same as ordered.

15. In cases where the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due or to the contractor in waiting for a board to survey, the head of the department or officer authorized to take delivery will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article and supply good in its stead; failing which, it or any like supply suitable for the service will be obtained by the officer requiring it. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies so rejected or returned.

16. A refusal to execute orders; irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50, as the said Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in condition 8. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith, and forfeit the whole or any part of the security money.

17. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carriers to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board (offices the original), the duplicate to be retained by himself. Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 16 of these conditions.

18. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

19. It will be competent for the Secretary to the Tender Board to terminate the contract, without notice, should there be reason to know that the contractor takes advantage of his contract to communicate improperly with a prisoner.

20. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Imperial Commissariat, or on account of the Federal or other Governments, or for supplies to the aborigines; or by the consumption of the produce or surplus stock of any Government establishment, or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment.

21. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in these contracts, the Government, or the contractor, as the case may be, may give two months' notice of the termination of the contract to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of the month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

22. Under no circumstances other than those mentioned in clause 21 will a contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited; and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.

23. For the purposes of these contracts the word Government shall mean Government of the Commonwealth as regards supplies for the Commonwealth, and Government of the State as regards supplies for the State; and the word Treasurer shall mean Treasurer of the Commonwealth as regards supplies for the Commonwealth, and Treasurer of the State as regards supplies for the State.

24. Where specially indicated in the schedules, no subletting will be allowed, and no delivery shall be made on Sundays; all work must be carried out by the contractor, and the hours of employment of any person engaged in the preparation or manufacture of the articles tendered for in those schedules, or engaged in the delivery of or in any other way in connection with the supply of the articles tendered for in these schedules, are not to exceed forty-eight per week (unless otherwise stated in the schedules), and every such person shall be paid at the minimum wage specified in the schedules concerned; and a copy of the labour condition, as indorsed on the schedules affected, shall be kept conspicuously and continually posted, in legible Roman characters, in the factory, shop, or dairy (and in each part of the factory, shop, or dairy where several rooms are in use) in which goods are prepared or manufactured under these contracts. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding £50 (Fifty pounds), as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money, and the Treasurer's decision shall be binding, final, and conclusive as to the fact of infringement and in all other respects.

3. Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this by-law shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

That it shall be lawful for the Council or its Surveyor, or Inspector of Nuisances, or any other officer duly authorized in this behalf, on complaint in writing from any ratepayer that any chimney, flue, or vent for smoke is not constructed of proper materials, or that the top of such chimney, flue, or vent, though constructed of proper materials, is not sufficiently elevated or not sufficiently removed from any inflammable materials of which the roof or other portion of the building or any adjoining building is constructed, or that any chimney, flue, or vent is not so constructed as properly to carry up the smoke that passes through such chimney, flue, or vent, so that it becomes a nuisance to the persons residing in the vicinity of such chimney, flue, or vent, then in any such case of which complaint may be made, or if it shall appear necessary to such Surveyor, Inspector, or other officer without any complaint having been made, any one of the said officers shall forthwith inspect any such chimney, flue, or vent, and if he shall find that there is just cause of complaint or reasonable cause to apprehend danger or nuisance, he shall forthwith serve a notice upon the occupier of such premises, calling on him to alter such chimney, flue, or vent in such manner as shall be pointed out in such notice, and any occupier refusing or delaying for more than one week to make the alteration required shall, on conviction thereof before two or more Justices of the Peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5).

5. Any person who shall be found guilty of any wilful act or default contrary to this By-law shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

Any person or persons riding, driving, or propelling any bicycle, tricycle, motor car, or other similar vehicle between sunset and sunrise, in, upon, or along any of the roads, streets, or thoroughfares within the Town of Port Melbourne, without having a good and serviceable lamp securely fixed and properly lighted in front of any such vehicle shall be guilty of an offence against this By-law.

3. Every person guilty of any offence against this By-law shall forfeit and pay, upon conviction, a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5) for every such offence.
