ALTERATION OF THE HOUR FOR ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS OF THE PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA AT THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE SECOND SESSION OF THE EIGHTEENTH PARLIAMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas by a Proclamation under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, made on the 4th day of June, 1901, Tuesday, the 18th day of June, 1901, was fixed as the day for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, and Two o'clock in the afternoon on the said day was fixed as the hour at which the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly were required to give their attendance in the State Parliament Houses, situate in the Carlton Gardens, in the City of Melbourne: And whereas it is expedient that the hour of Twelve o'clock noon on the said 18th day of June, 1901, should be the hour at which the said Parliament of Victoria should meet for the despatch of business instead of the hour of Two o'clock in the afternoon: Now therefore I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria aforesaid, in exercise of the power conferred by *The Constitution Act* aforesaid, do by this my Proclamation fix the hour of Twelve o'clock noon as the hour at which the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are required to give their attendance on Tuesday, the 18th day of June, 1901, at the said place, instead of Two o'clock in the afternoon as previously fixed.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria, at Melbourne, this eleventh day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and one, and in the first year of His Majesty's reign.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE ADULTERATION OF WINE ACT 1900.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the eleventh day of June, 1901.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of Victoria.

Mr. McCulloch | Mr. Gurr.

BY virtue of the power conferred by the *Adulteration of Wine Act 1900*, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS.

1. The Regulation made by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council on the twenty-eighth day of February, 1901, under the *Adulteration of Wine Act 1900*, is hereby revoked.

2. The owner or occupier or person in charge of every vineyard, wine cellar, fermenting house, or premises used for storing, handling, or retailing wine shall post and keep posted in such wine cellar, in such fermenting house, and in or on such premises a copy of the *Adulteration of Wine Act 1900*, together with a copy of the Regulations under the Act, in such type and in such position that they can be easily read.

3. Water and all kinds of sugars and all kinds of starches are hereby declared to be foreign substances, and shall severally be included in the term "foreign substance" used in section 4 of the *Adulteration of Wine Act 1900*.

And the Honorable William McCulloch, His Majesty's Minister of Health for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

ADDITIONAL REGULATION UNDER THE LICENSING ACT 1890.

ALLOWANCES TO RETURNING OFFICERS, ETC., FOR EXPENSES OF CONDUCTING A POLL OF ELECTORS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the fourth day of June, 1901.

WHEREAS by section 30 of the *Licensing Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1111) the Governor in Council is authorized to make regulations prescribing the mode in which a poll is to be taken to determine whether or not the number of victuallers' licences in any licensing district from which a petition under the provisions of sections 27 and 28 of the said Act shall have been presented to him shall be decreased to any number below the number then existing, but not below the statutory number, or to determine whether or not the number of victuallers' licences or the number of grocers' licences in such licensing district shall be increased to any number above the number of victuallers' licences or of grocers' licences (as the case may be) then existing, but not above the statutory number in each case respectively, and the form in which the ballot-papers shall be framed, and defining the powers and duties of the returning officer and his deputies, and generally for all matters whatsoever relating to the taking of the poll, and that such regulations may be at any time altered or repealed. Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth, for the purposes aforesaid, repeal the Regulation previously made fixing the rates of allowances to returning officers, deputy returning officers, and poll clerks, for expenses of conducting a poll, and doth by this present Order make the following Regulation in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

To a Substitute Returning Officer:—

For an uncontested election, a sum not exceeding ... 5 0 0

For a contested election in a district containing from 1 to 15 polling places, a sum not exceeding ... 10 0 0

For a contested election in a district containing from 16 to 30 polling places, a sum not exceeding ... 15 0 0

For a contested election in a district containing from 31 to 50 polling places, a sum not exceeding ... 20 0 0

For a contested election in a district containing from 51 to 75 polling places, a sum not exceeding ... 25 0 0

For a contested election in a district containing upwards of 75 polling places, a sum not exceeding ... 30 0 0

In all the above cases, when the travelling can be done by rail or coach:—The actual fares only.

The cost of travelling is in no case to exceed Sixpence per mile each way, the mileage to be specified on each account.

And when the distance travelled exceeds twenty miles each way, for each day that he is necessarily absent from his residence, in addition:—
