PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir John Madden, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia.

I IN pursuance of the provisions contained in Part VI. of the *Public Service Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1133), in Part III. of the *Banks and Currency Act 1890* (54 Vict. No. 1164), and in the *Public and Bank Holidays Act 1897* (61 Vict. No. 1534), I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation appoint

WEDNESDAY, THE 3RD DAY OF JULY INSTANT, to be observed as a Public Holiday throughout the Shire of Violet Town, and as a Bank Half-Holiday, from the hour of Twelve o'clock noon, at Violet Town.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria, at Melbourne, this second day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and one, and in the first year of His Majesty's reign.
