Teachers applying for positions lower than their classification must signify their willingness to accept the pay and status thereof, with the understanding that they cannot regain their present classification except in the ordinary course of promotion.

Licensed pupil teachers may apply for 7th and 8th class positions.

The Head Teacher is requested to post this list in his school for a week for the information of his staff.

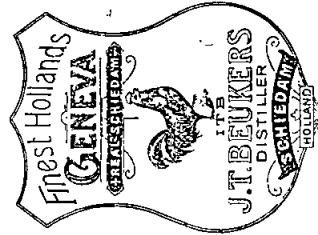

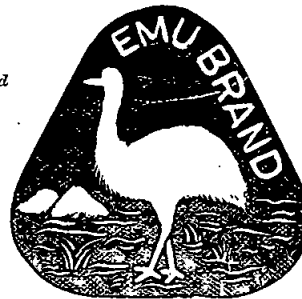

SMALL-POX ON THE S.S. "INDRADEVI."

WHEREAS by the Health Act 1890 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make such Order as shall be deemed expedient upon any unforeseen emergency, or in particular cases with respect to any vessel arriving in Victoria, and having any infectious or contagious disease on board, or on board of which any such infectious or contagious disease may have appeared in the course of the voyage, or arriving under any other alarming or suspicious circumstances as to infection or contagion; and also with respect to the persons and things on board the same: And whereas the steam-ship or vessel *Indradevi* arrived in Victorian waters on 2nd April, 1902, having on board a case of the contagious disease small-pox: And whereas it is expedient to make an Order to prevent, as far as possible, the spread of such contagious disease in Victoria: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth by this Order direct that the said vessel shall be detained and anchored off the Quarantine Station at Point Nepean or at the Outer Anchorage off Williamstown, and shall fly and keep flying the yellow flag at the main-mast-head; and doth further direct that no person other than the passengers for Victoria, unless directed to do so by the Health Officer or other officer in charge on behalf of the Board of Public Health, nor any article, cargo, goods, or letters shall leave the said vessel, nor be taken or allowed or suffered to be taken and removed from her, nor shall any boat put off from the said vessel except only that her mails, cargo, and passengers' luggage for Victoria may be discharged into lighters, and may, after careful disinfection under the supervision of the Health Officer, be afterwards conveyed to shore under his directions; and, further, that cargo, provisions, luggage, and mails may be stung or hoisted on board the said vessel under such conditions as the Health Officer may direct, and under his supervision; and, further, that no person, except the Medical Inspector or Health Officer or person authorized by either of such officers necessarily employed in fumigating or discharging cargo shall be permitted to board or approach the said vessel, nor shall any one remain unnecessarily in her vicinity; and, further, that all persons engaged in conveying any cargo, passengers' luggage, provisions, or mails to or from the said vessel shall immediately afterwards, together with their clothing, be fumigated and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Health Officer; and, further, that the said vessel and all persons and things on board of her shall be detained in quarantine until severally released by the Health Officer.

And His Excellency, with the advice aforesaid, doth hereby direct that this Order shall be deemed to have been in force on and since 2nd April, 1902.

PARISH OF YARROWEYAH.

THE allotments mentioned in the schedule hereunder will be available for application on or before Wednesday, 7th May, 1902.

Applications, accompanied by the registration fee of 5s., must be made on usual form, and lodged at the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne.

The purchase money, with interest at 4½ per cent., must be paid by 63 or a lesser number of half-yearly instalments (including deposit), calculated according to any of the tables under Division 3 of Part I. of the *Swings Banks Act 1890 Amendment Act 1896*. Each instalment will include interest upon the balance of the purchase money remaining unpaid.

On a conditional purchase lease application a deposit equal to the two (2) first instalments of purchase money, together with fees (including survey charge) must be paid within fourteen days after an allotment has been recommended.

Perpetual Lease.

On a perpetual lease application the first rent and fees (including survey charge) must be paid within fourteen days after an allotment has been recommended.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Sydenham Clarke, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Fellow of the Royal Society; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the Land Act 1901 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette, at any time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in Part I., Division 1, section 5, of the said Land Act 1901, but that the area of lands which may be sold by auction (class 7) shall not be increased except as in certain cases in the said Act provided: And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted that where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding fifty acres, and not contiguous or adjacent to any other Crown lands, is so situated as to make it desirable, in the opinion of the Governor in Council, that the same should be sold, or where any portion of Crown lands not exceeding three acres is required for a site for a church or for any charitable purpose for which land cannot legally be reserved, the Governor in Council may direct the sale of such portion of Crown lands, and for such purpose may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the said Land Act as lands which may be sold by auction (class 7 aforesaid) by adding such portion thereto: And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted that, notwithstanding anything contained in Division 6 of Part I. of the Land Act 1901 aforesaid, the Governor in Council may increase the area of land described in the Second Schedule to the said Act as land which may be sold by auction by adding thereto any portion of the Crown lands described in the said Schedule as Swamp lands: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7, 8, and 9 respectively of the classes mentioned in section 5 of the Land Act 1901 aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively (that is to say):—

The births of 972 children, viz., 491 boys and 481 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of March. The number was the lowest recorded for the month during the last eighteen years, and 261 below the average of the month during the previous ten years, or 345 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in March numbered 588, viz., 307 of males and 281 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 384, or 65 per cent., as against 99 per cent. in March, 1901, and 87 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, 26 more than in March, 1901, but the lowest recorded for the month during the last eleven years, except 1893, 1897, and 1900. It was also 73 below the average of March during the previous ten years, or 122 below it allowing for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 22.82 and of deaths registered to 13.80 per annum, as compared respectively with averages of the same month in 1901 of 26.48 and 13.28, with averages of the month during the last ten years of 29.53 and 16.04, and with averages of the year 1901 of 24.85 and 15.09.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 97.1° on the 7th, and the lowest was 40.3° on the 21st. The mean temperature of the month (61.1°) was 2.1° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (41.6°) took place on the 6th, and the least range (3.3°) on the 25th. The mean daily range was 17.4°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.380 inches on the 25th, and the lowest was 29.375 inches on the 25th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.960 inches) was slightly above the average.

Rain fell on nine days, the amount being 5.44 inches, which was the highest recorded for the month, except 6.36 inches in 1874, and 5.85 inches in 1878, and 3.48 inches above the average.

Fog occurred on one day during the month.

The mean humidity of the month was 700.

Males contributed 52 per cent. and females 48 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 31 per cent. to that mortality, as against 33 per cent. in March, 1901; 26 per cent. in March, 1900; 40 per cent. in March, 1899; 43 per cent. in March, 1898; 33 per cent. in March, 1897; 38 per cent. in March, 1896; 37 per cent. in March, 1895; 42 per cent. in March, 1894; 48 per cent. in March, 1893; and 47 per cent. in March, 1892.

The deaths of infants under twelve months numbered 144, as compared with 140 in March, 1901. The rate of infantile mortality was 148 per 1,000 births registered in the month under review, as compared with 125 in March, 1901; 116 in March, 1900; 165 in March, 1899; 174 in March, 1898; 124 in March, 1897; 143 in March, 1896; 137 in March, 1895; 149 in March, 1894; 187 in March, 1893; and 180 in March, 1892.

Seventy persons—as against 47 in March, 1901—whose deaths were recorded during the month, had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these, two females, each aged 75, died of cancer and cerebral hemorrhage respectively; a contractor and a female, each aged 75, of heart disease; an ex-police constable, aged 75, of pneumonia; a manufacturer, aged 75, of hernia; a carpenter, aged 78, of cirrhosis of the liver; a labourer, aged 76, of rheumatism; a carpenter, aged 76, of cancer; a female, aged 76, of softening of the brain; an official assignee, aged 76, of dilatation of the heart; a gentleman and a builder, each aged 76, of heart disease; a carpenter aged 76, of pleurisy; a labourer, aged 76, of uræmia; a sailor, aged 76, of suppression of urine; a female, aged 76, of cystitis; another, aged 77, of cancer; a law clerk, aged 77, of hemiplegia; a gentleman and a female, each aged 77, of syncope; a female, aged 77, of aneurism; two farmers, each aged 77, of heart disease and Bright's disease respectively; a male of no occupation, aged 77, of cystitis; two females, each aged 78, of dilatation of the heart and chronic nephritis respectively; a carpenter and a female, each aged 79, of diarrhoea; a female, aged 79, of apoplexy; two females, each aged 79, of bronchitis; a tradesman, aged 80, of phthisis; a minister, aged 80, of paralysis; a female, aged 80, of pneumonia; a clergyman, aged 80, of cystitis; a female, aged 81, of cancer; a cabinetmaker, aged 81, of paralysis; a brass-finisher, aged 81, of pneumonia; a male of no occupation, aged 81, of chronic nephritis; a farmer, aged 81, of disease of the prostate; a seaman, aged 82, of heart disease; a horse dealer and a painter, each aged 82, of bronchitis; a labourer, aged 82, of disease of prostate; a female, aged 83, of syncope; a male of no occupation, aged 83, of bronchitis; a female, aged 84, of obstruction of the intestines; another, aged 85, and a labourer, aged 86, of cancer; two females, each aged 86, of pericarditis and syncope respectively; a medical practitioner and a female, each aged 86, a female, aged 93, and a marine dealer, aged 99, of bronchitis; a driver, aged 75, a bricklayer, aged 78, a brickmaker and a female, each aged 80, a grazier, a master mariner, and a pensioner, each aged 83, six females, aged 85, 85, 87, 87, 87, and 88 respectively, and a male of no occupation, aged 91, of old age.

Twenty-three of the deaths recorded during the month—as compared with 24 in March, 1901—were from external causes, of which 14 were set down to accident, 2 to homicide, and 7 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—A farmer, aged 65, was knocked down by a train; an upholsterer, aged 48, died of fracture of the skull, caused by a fall from a train; a driver, aged 27, of injuries to the head, the result of a dray passing over him; a jockey, aged 13, of laceration of the brain, caused by his horse falling in a race; a female, aged 52, of injuries, consequent on a fall down an embankment; a clerk, aged 26, a railway employe, aged 48, and a female, aged 65, of injuries, the result of falls; a male child, aged two months, of burns; a boy, aged 11, was drowned in a clay hole; a seaman, aged 19, in Hobson's Bay; a storeman, aged 37, was found drowned in the River Yarra; a seaman, aged 42, in Gode's Canal; and a female child, aged 4, was suffocated in bed. The homicidal deaths were those of a female servant, aged 24, whose throat was cut, a verdict of wilful murder being returned; and a male child, aged 1 month, who was suffocated. The suicidal deaths were those of a female, aged 27, who cut her throat; a labourer, aged 26, a commercial traveller, aged 31, a dealer, aged 53, and two females, aged 17 and 20 respectively, who poisoned themselves; and a confectioner, aged 23, who hanged himself.

One hundred and thirty-five deaths, or 23 per cent. of the whole, took place in public institutions, viz.:—52 in the Melbourne, 16 in the Alfred, 4 in St. Vincent's, 7 in the Women's, 11 in the Children's, 4 in the Homeopathic, and 6 in the Austin Hospitals; 2 in the Metropolitan, and 5 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylums; 9 in the Immigrants' Home; 12 in the Benevolent Asylum; 1 in the Convent of the Little Sisters of the Poor; and 6 in the Protestant Refuge.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 184, of which 97, or 53 per cent., were of males, and 87, or 47 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 144 were under one year of age, 24 were between one and two, 7 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 5 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 404. Of these 210, or 52 per cent., were males, and 194, or 48 per cent., were females; 7 were between five and ten, 7 were between ten and fifteen, 11 were between fifteen and twenty, 18 were between twenty and twenty-five, 23 were between twenty-five and thirty, 18 were between thirty and thirty-five, 24 were between thirty-five and forty, 38 were between forty and forty-five, 28 were between forty-five and fifty, 18 were between fifty and fifty-five, 23 were between fifty-five and sixty, 33 were between sixty and sixty-five, 41 were between sixty-five and seventy, 45 were between seventy and seventy-five, 34 were between seventy-five and eighty, 21 were between eighty and eighty-five, 12 were between eighty-five and ninety, 2 were between ninety and ninety-five, and 1 at ninety-nine.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 7 deaths under zymotic, and 40 under local diseases, whilst there was a decrease of 1 under parasitic, 6 each under dietic and constitutional, 2 under developmental diseases, 1 under the head of violence, and 5 under ill-defined causes. Under the zymotic class, deaths from whooping-cough rose from 4 to 12. Under the constitutional class, deaths from cancer rose from 32 to 37, whilst those from phthisis fell from 62 to 57, and those from other forms of tuberculosis, &c., from 11 to 5. In the local class, deaths from diseases of the circulatory system increased by 31, those from diseases of the urinary system by 12, and those from diseases of the organs of generation by 4; on the other hand, deaths from diseases of the respiratory system diminished by 6. The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria and typhoid fever in each month of the years 1892 to 1901, and the first three months of 1902, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November. It will also be noticed that the mortality from both causes during the month was below the average.

TOWN OF NORTHCOTE.

By-Law No. 11.

A By-law of the Town of Northcote, made under the provisions of the *Tramways Act 1890*, second schedule, clause 14, and in conformity with Part VII. of the *Local Government Act 1890*.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1890*, and the *Tramways Act 1890*, and the second schedule thereto, the Mayor, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Town of Northcote order as follows:—

1. The by-law hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to the tramway and to all cars and dummies and to all premises used in connexion with the said tramway with respect to which the council have power to make by-laws.

2. No passenger shall smoke in or on any car other than a dummy car used on the tramway.

3. No passenger or other person while riding in or upon any car shall solicit alms, play or perform upon any musical instrument, distribute handbills or advertisements, or, without having first obtained the written permission of the council or lessee, offer for sale any article.

4. No person who, in the opinion of the conductor, is in a state of intoxication shall be allowed to enter or mount upon any car, and if any such person be found in or upon any car he shall at the request of the conductor leave the car upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned or tendered, and if he does not thereupon at once leave the car he may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor, and in such case he shall also be liable to the penalty provided by this by-law.

5. No person shall swear or use obscene, indecent, or offensive language whilst in or upon any car, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger, and any person who, in the opinion of the conductor, shall have committed a breach of this by-law shall leave the car on the request of the conductor to do so upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned or tendered, and if he does not at once leave the car he may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor, and he shall also be liable to the penalty fixed by this by-law.

6. No person shall in any way soil or damage any car or remove or interfere with any fastening apparatus or gear on any car, or remove, affix, or deface any number plate, printed notice or advertisement, or writing on any part of or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any car. Any person acting in contravention shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by this by-law, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

7. No person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor, soil or injure the dress or clothing of any passenger or who for any other reason might be offensive to passengers shall be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any car, nor shall he enter or get upon any car after being requested not to do so by the conductor, and any such person may be prevented from entering or getting upon any car, and if found on any such car he shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the car upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned or tendered, and if he does not at once leave the car he may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor, and in such case he shall be also liable to the penalty provided by this by-law.

8. No person shall, without lawful excuse (the proof whereof shall lie on him) wilfully do any of the following things, namely:—Persist in riding or driving any horse, cart, carriage, or other vehicle, or any sheep, cattle, pigs, or other stock on the tramway line in front of any car after the bell on such car shall have been rung as a warning that the car is coming behind or overtaking such horse, cart, carriage, or vehicle, sheep, cattle, pigs, or other stock; interfere with, remove, or alter any part of the tramway or of the works connected therewith; place or throw any stones, dirt, wood, refuse, or other material on any part of the tramway; do or cause to be done anything in such manner as to obstruct any car using the tramway or to endanger the lives of persons therein or thereon, or knowingly aid or assist in doing of any such thing he shall for every such offence be liable (in addition to any proceedings by way of indictment or otherwise to which he may be subject) to the penalty prescribed by this by-law.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, exhibit and deliver up his ticket, or pay to the conductor the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Personal or other luggage, including the tools of workmen, shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any car.

11. Every passenger who shall take upon a car any article or articles which shall exceed altogether the weight of 28lbs. shall pay to the conductor on demand the sum of threepence for every such article, or for each package of luggage so in excess. Nevertheless the conductor may refuse any such article or any such excess luggage, and may remove it from the car if found thereon.

12. No person not being a servant of the council or of the lessee shall travel on the steps of any car.

13. No person shall enter or attempt to enter, or leave or attempt to leave any car while such car is in motion.

14. No person, except a passenger or intended passenger, shall enter or mount any car, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any car.

15. When a car contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to carry no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such car when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. No person shall travel in or on any car with loaded fire-arms, paints, oil, or glass or anything which shall project beyond the car or which may in the opinion of the conductor be liable to damage the car or the person or property of any person.

17. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede the lessee or any officer or servant of the council or of the lessee in the execution of his duty upon or in connexion with any car or the tramway.

18. No person shall be entitled to have any dog or other animal in or on any car.

19. If any servant of the lessee be guilty of incivility or discourtesy to any person or persons using the cars, or be in a state of intoxication while in the execution of his duty, he shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by this by-law.

20. The conductor of each car shall enforce this by-law to the best of his ability, and if any such conductor fails to enforce the same as aforesaid he shall be deemed to have committed a breach of this by-law.

“Conductor” shall mean any person in the employment of the council or lessee and having charge of any car.
