## NOTICE UNDER VOTING BY POST ACT 1900.

### WESTERN PROVINCE.

Printed forms of application may be obtained at any post office, or the application may be in writing.

If applicant is the holder of an elector's right, such right must be attached to application.

Any Elector who intends to vote through the post must apply at once, as no Postal Ballot-paper will be supplied unless the Returning Officer receives application therefor sufficiently early to admit of Postal Ballot-paper being sent to and returned by such Elector so as to reach the Returning Officer before closing of Poll.

**Caution.**—Any person wilfully making a false statement in an application is liable on conviction to two years' imprisonment.

REGULATIONS for the distribution of the sum of Two thousand pounds (£2,000) granted by Parliament to Agricultural Societies, 1902-3.

1. Each society shall furnish to the Secretary for Agriculture, on or before the 1st April, 1903, a statement in the form marked A, which must be verified by statutory declaration in the form marked E.

2. On receipt of the above-mentioned statement, so verified, the Minister of Agriculture may cause to be paid to the treasurer of each society a sum equal to one-half of the amount shown to have been awarded and paid away in prizes not exceeding £25 each (except for the exhibits mentioned in the statement above referred to, and such other exhibits the Minister may consider unsuitable), on condition that this sum does not exceed the amount raised by members' subscriptions and private donations; and, if it do exceed the same, that it be in that case reduced to a sum equal to the amount so raised.

3. If the sums claimable be in excess of the sum of One thousand seven hundred and forty-five pounds (£1,745), they shall be reduced *pro rata*.

4. No society located within 20 miles of any other society shall be entitled to participate in the vote unless the sum awarded and paid away in prizes by such society as hereinbefore specified amounts in the total to One hundred pounds at least. The Royal Agricultural Society of Victoria shall participate in the said vote to the extent of an amount not exceeding Two hundred and fifteen pounds (£215) for special prizes awarded. A sum not exceeding Forty pounds (£40) may be paid out of said vote for medals awarded at the Grand National Show held at Sale on 29th and 30th October, 1902, as special prizes.

## INSTRUCTIONS.

1. The blank spaces in the declaration, form E, for the sums awarded and paid in prizes and raised by members' subscriptions and private donations between the 1st January, 1902, and the 31st December, 1902, must be filled up in words as well as in figures; and the declaration must be made before a justice of the peace by the treasurer of the society.

2. The account, when received, must be signed by the treasurer and be countersigned by the president or the vice-president, or by two members of the committee of management; it should then be returned to the Secretary for Agriculture, Melbourne.

## PUBLIC PARKS AND GARDENS.

**R**EGULATIONS in connexion with the vote of One thousand five hundred pounds (£1,500) for fencing and improving public parks and gardens under the control of borough councils, trustees, committees of management, &c.

1. A sum not exceeding Five shillings may be paid to the treasurer of the managing body of any public park or garden having a claim on the vote for every One pound expended by such body on fencing, preparation of land and planting, forming of roads and paths, and such other works as the Minister may approve, in such park or garden between 1st January, 1902, and 31st December, 1902, out of funds locally contributed, provided such claim be received by the Secretary for Agriculture on or before the 1st April, 1903. Every statement of particulars of claim on the vote must be made in the Form A, and be accompanied by a declaration in the Form B.

2. The term "locally contributed" shall mean and include all moneys voted by the managing body of any public park or garden from its own funds for the fencing and planting of such park or

garden, also all moneys voluntarily contributed for the same purpose, between the 1st of January, 1902, and 31st December, 1902; but it shall not mean nor include any sums advanced by any bank, nor any subsidy paid by Government between the above-mentioned dates, nor the balance of any subsidy paid by Government at any period prior to the 1st January, 1902.

3. The subsidy or the balance thereof last paid to the managing body of any public park or garden shall be deducted from the return of expenditure for the year 1902 (*vide* Form A), and a sum equal to one-fourth of the balance then remaining, if made up of local contributions as above interpreted, shall be paid as subsidy; provided that if the claims are in excess of the sum of One thousand five hundred pounds they shall be reduced *pro rata*.

4. In every case in which a claim is sent in an officer of the Department may be instructed to make an inspection of the books kept by the managing body, and of the vouchers for the several items of expenditure; and if such inspection be refused the claim shall be disallowed.

5. Moneys expended in street planting, or in fencing, formation, or maintenance of land for racing, cricket, football, croquet, tennis, bowling, quoits, or other sports, or in erection or repairs of stands or pavilions for the purpose of witnessing sports, must not be included in any claim upon the vote.

6. The foregoing shall not apply to parks and gardens within the limits of the city of Melbourne, except the Royal Park, or to the Edinburgh Garden, Fitzroy, or the Darling Gardens, Collingwood, or to Albert Park, South Melbourne and St. Kilda, or the Richmond Park, Richmond, or the Botanical Garden, Geelong.

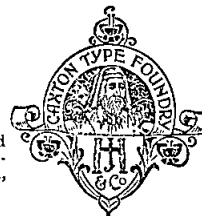

The births of 991 children, viz., 508 boys and 483 girls, were registered in Greater Melbourne during the month of February. The number was, it will be observed, the highest recorded since 1894, but was only 1 above the average of February during the previous ten years, or 67 below it if allowance be made for the increase of population.

The deaths registered in February numbered 529, viz., 281 of males and 248 of females; the births thus exceeded the deaths by 462, or 87 per cent., as against 81 per cent. in February, 1902, and 67 per cent. according to the average. The number was, it will be noticed, the lowest recorded for the month during the previous ten years, except 1897 and 1900. It was also 65 below the average of February during that period, and 105 below it, allowing for the increase of population.

To every 1,000 of the population of the district the proportion of births registered was equivalent to 25.76, and of deaths registered to 13.75 per annum, as compared respectively with averages of the same month in 1902 of 25.23 and 13.91, with averages of the month during the last ten years of 26.05 and 16.24, and with averages of the year 1901 of 24.85 and 15.09.

The highest temperature in the shade recorded at Melbourne Observatory during the month was 104.4° on the 9th, and the lowest was 42.7° on the 25th. The mean temperature of the month (64.4°) was 24° below the average. The greatest range of the thermometer in any one day (44.9°) took place on the 9th, and the least range (4.8°) on the 3rd. The mean daily range was 20.3°. The highest atmospheric pressure recorded was 30.084 inches on the 6th, and the lowest was 29.281 inches on the 14th. The mean atmospheric pressure (29.837 inches) was slightly below the average.

Rain fell on eight days, the amount being 1.36 inches, which was a sixth of an inch above the average.

Fog occurred on one day during the month.

The mean humidity of the month was 63.

Males contributed 53 per cent. and females 47 per cent. to the mortality of the month. Children under five years of age contributed 35 per cent. to that mortality, as against 39 per cent. in February, 1902; 33 per cent. in February, 1901; 30 per cent. in February, 1900; 37 per cent. in February, 1899; 44 per cent. in February, 1898; 34 per cent. in February, 1897; 42 per cent. in February, 1896; 40 per cent. in February, 1895; 40 per cent. in February, 1894; and 49 per cent. in February, 1893.

The deaths of infants under twelve months numbered 148, as compared with 164 in February, 1902. The rate of infantile mortality per 1,000 births registered was 149 in the month under review, as compared with 169 in February, 1902; 156 in February, 1901; 127 in February, 1900; 176 in February, 1899; 233 in February, 1898; 134 in February, 1897; 203 in February, 1896; 171 in February, 1895; 156 in February, 1894; and 220 in February, 1893.



Forty-seven persons—as against 48 in February, 1902—whose deaths were recorded during the month had attained or passed the age of 75 years. Of these, a female, aged 75, died of cancer; two farmers, each aged 75, of pericarditis and heart disease (undefined) respectively; a female, aged 75, of Bright's disease; four females, each aged 76, of diarrhoea, cerebral hæmorrhage, pneumonia, and Bright's disease respectively; a builder, aged 76, of cystitis; a female, aged 77, of cancer; a miner, aged 77, of phthisis; a female, aged 77, of syncope; a solicitor, aged 78, of cancer; a female, aged 78, of disease of the liver; two females, each aged 79, of cancer and asthma respectively; a painter, aged 79, of retention of the urine; a female, aged 79, of anasarca; a male of no occupation, aged 80, of cancer; a bootmaker, aged 80, of dilatation of the heart; a gentleman, aged 80, of stomatitis; a master mariner, aged 80, of enteritis; two females, each aged 81, of bronchitis and pneumonia respectively; a farmer, aged 81, of gastro-intestinal catarrh; another, aged 82, of heart disease; a gentleman, aged 82, of cystitis; three females, each aged 83, of apoplexy, pleurisy, and gastritis respectively; a pastoralist, aged 84, of heart disease; a miner, aged 86, of rheumatism; a female, aged 90, of cancer; a female, aged 75, a gilder, aged 77, a male of no occupation, aged 78, a cabinetmaker and a miner, each aged 79, a cordial manufacturer, aged 80, a farmer and a female, each aged 81, a gardener, aged 83, a female, aged 84, a male of no occupation and a female, each aged 88, a gentleman, aged 91, and a female, aged 96, of old age.

Twenty-four of the deaths recorded during the month—as compared with 21 in February, 1902—were from external causes, of which 20 were set down to accident, and 4 to suicide. The following are the particulars of the accidental deaths:—An engine-driver, aged 38, was passed over by a railway train; a fireman, aged 29, died of hæmorrhage of the lungs, the result of a fall from a cart; a horse breaker, aged 35, of injuries to the spine, caused by a horse falling on him; a male of no occupation, aged 73, of injuries consequent on a fall downstairs; a female, aged 41, of burns; a male child, aged 7 months, and two females, aged 1 year and 70 respectively, of heat apoplexy; a cellarman, age 35, of morphine poisoning; a boy, aged 16, was drowned in the River Yarra; a bootmaker, aged 21, in the Saltwater River; and a female, aged 29, in a bath; six persons were found drowned, viz.:—A clerk, aged 32, and a lamp trimmer, aged 36, in the River Yarra; a printer, aged 35, in the Saltwater River; a male of occupation unknown, aged 35, in Gardiner's Creek; a male of occupation unknown, aged 50, in the West Melbourne Canal; and a machinist, aged 22, in Hobson's Bay; a male child, aged 3 months, and a male of no occupation, aged 60, were suffocated by food. The suicidal deaths were those of a seaman, aged 45, and a fireman, aged 49, who shot themselves; a hotel manager, aged 53, who poisoned himself with strychnine; and a cabman, aged 49, who hanged himself.

The deaths of children under five years of age numbered 185, of which 104, or 56 per cent., were of males, and 81, or 44 per cent., were of females. Of those who died, 148 were under one year of age, 25 were between one and two, 5 were between two and three, 4 were between three and four, and 3 were between four and five.

The persons who died at a more advanced age than five years numbered 344. Of these 177, or 51 per cent., were males, and 167, or 49 per cent., were females; 7 were between five and ten, 11 were between ten and fifteen, 12 were between fifteen and twenty, 19 were between twenty and twenty-five, 22 were between twenty-five and thirty, 14 were between thirty and thirty-five, 34 were between thirty-five and forty, 20 were between forty and forty-five, 28 were between forty-five and fifty, 17 were between fifty and fifty-five, 18 were between fifty-five and sixty, 19 were between sixty and sixty-five, 27 were between sixty-five and seventy, 49 were between seventy and seventy-five, 23 were between seventy-five and eighty, 18 were between eighty and eighty-five, 3 were between eighty-five and ninety, 2 were between ninety and ninety-five, and 1 at the age of ninety-six.

As compared with the corresponding month of the preceding year, there was an increase of 2 deaths each under parasitic and dietetic, 33 under constitutional diseases, and 3 under the head of violence; whilst there was a decrease of 17 under zymotic, 11 under developmental, and 18 under local diseases. Under the zymotic class, deaths from influenza fell from 4 to 1, those from whooping-cough from 8 to 3, those from typhoid fever from 12 to 6, and those from septic diseases from 6 to 3. Under the constitutional class, deaths from rheumatism rose from 2 to 5, those from cancer from 26 to 49, and those from other forms of tuberculosis from 4 to 10. Under the developmental class, deaths from premature birth fell from 21 to 14. Under the local class, deaths from diseases of the circulatory system increased by 3, and those from diseases of parturition and organs of locomotion each by 2; whilst those from diseases of the respiratory system diminished by 6, and those from diseases of the digestive system (chiefly enteritis) by 15.

The following is a statement of the deaths set down to diphtheria, typhoid fever, and tubercular diseases in each month of the years 1897 to 1902, and the first two months of 1903, from which may be traced the rise and fall of the mortality at various periods of the year. It will be noticed that the mortality from typhoid fever usually attains its maximum in March, and is at a minimum from July to November.

#### VITAL STATISTICS OF BENDIGO AND SUBURBS.

RETURN OF THE BIRTHS AND DEATHS REGISTERED IN BENDIGO AND THE SURROUNDING REGISTRATION DISTRICTS DURING THE MONTH OF FEBRUARY, 1903.

THE number of births registered during the month of February in all the Bendigo Districts was 115; of these, 63 were of males and 52 of females; included were 6 illegitimate births and 2 cases of twins. In the previous month the registered births numbered 88, viz., 44 of males and 44 of females.

The number of deaths registered during the month was 89, viz., 47 of males and 42 of females. The births thus exceeded the deaths by 26. In the previous month the recorded deaths numbered 69; in the month of February, 1902, they numbered 72; in the month of February, 1901, they numbered 78; in the month of February, 1900, they numbered 80; in the month of February, 1899, they numbered 80; in the month of February, 1898, they numbered 91; in the month of February, 1897, they numbered 82; in the month of February, 1896, they numbered 68; in the month of February, 1895, they numbered 72; in the month of February, 1894, they numbered 67; and in the month of February, 1893, they numbered 66.

Of the registered births, 89 occurred within the city of Bendigo and 26 in the surrounding districts. Of the deaths registered 68 took place within and 21 without the city.

NOTE.—During the year 1902, the number of births was 30,461, or 547 less, and the number of deaths 16,177, or 273 more, than in the preceding year. The natural increase was thus 14,284, or 820 less than in the previous year.

The recorded arrivals by sea numbered 87,557, and the recorded departures 97,933, the former being 5,550 less, and the latter 7,807 more, than in 1901.

The net recorded loss by emigration was thus 10,376, as compared with a recorded gain of 2,981 by immigration in the preceding year. The allowance for unrecorded departures, however, increases the total estimated loss during the year to 17,476, consisting of 11,330 males and 6,146 females, as shown in the table, against an estimated loss of 3,605 in 1901.

The total recorded increase of population was 3,308, as against 18,085 in the previous year. After allowing, however, for unrecorded departures (estimated), the net decrease for the year was 3,192, made up of the difference between a loss of 4,899 males, and a gain of 1,707 females, as compared with a net increase of 11,499 in 1901.

From the date of the Census (31st March, 1901), to the 31st December, 1902, the allowance for unrecorded departures has been 11,746, viz., 8,853 for males, and 2,893 for females.

Had no such allowance been made, the apparent population at the end of December last would have been 1,217,253, viz., 611,237 males, and 606,022 females. This allowance must be taken into account in comparing the population with that in another State, which may have made no such allowance.

In regard to the apparent origin or destination of emigrants, the records show a net loss of 7,702 to other States of the Commonwealth, and of 2,674 to other countries. The former resulted from an apparent net loss of 1,730 to New South Wales, and 8,058 to Western Australia, less a net gain of 791 from Queensland, of 888 from South Australia, and of 407 from Tasmania. The latter was made up of a gain of 125 from other British Dominions, and 1,294 from Foreign Ports, less a loss of 1,692 to New Zealand, 903 to the South Seas, 253 to the United Kingdom, and 1,245 to South Africa.

The net emigration to Western Australia (including emigrants from other States passing through Victoria), which nearly ceased in 1898 and 1899, has since gradually revived, until in 1902 over 8,000 was reached—a number which was by far the highest since the great rush to the Western Australian gold-fields in the years 1894 to 1897. The following are the figures of net emigration to that State in each of the last ten years:—2,255 in 1893; 10,145 in 1894; 11,127 in 1895; 24,497 in 1896; 11,195 in 1897; 817 in 1898; 2,938 in 1900; 5,333 in 1901, and 8,058 in 1902. In 1899 the immigrants exceeded the emigrants by 104.

The net emigration to South Africa, viz., 1,245, resulted from a net emigration of 2,008 civilians, less a net immigration of 763 soldiers. The civilians consisted of persons to whom "permits" had been granted in this or other States by the Federal Government—the total number of such permits issued during the year being 1,891. The soldiers who left for the seat of war during the year was 1,909, whilst the number who returned therefrom was 1,136, leaving a balance of 763 in favour of those returning, as already shown. The net emigration to South Africa in each of the last eight years was as follows:—1,338 in 1895; 2,831 in 1896; 746 in 1897; 130 in 1898; 198 in 1899; 1,767 in 1900, and 1,245 in 1902. In 1901 the immigration exceeded the emigration by 1,070.

## EUROA WATERWORKS TRUST.—REGULATIONS FOR THE ELECTION OF COMMISSIONERS.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the tenth day of March, 1903.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor of Victoria.

WHEREAS by Division I of Part I. of the Water Act 1900 the Governor in Council is empowered to make regulations for the election of Commissioners of Waterworks Trusts: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and in pursuance of the provisions of the now in part recited Act, doth make the following regulations for the election of Commissioners of the Euroa Waterworks Trust.

1. Interpretation of terms.—In these regulations "the Trust" or "the said Trust" shall mean the Euroa Waterworks Trust "Minister" shall mean the Minister of Water Supply.  
2. Period for which Commissioners shall hold office.—The period for which the Commissioners shall hold office shall be three years, and shall date on and from the date of election.

3. Extraordinary vacancies, how filled.—Should any vacancy in the office of Commissioner be occasioned by death, resignation, disqualification, or any other cause whatever, the same shall be filled up by election under these regulations within one month after the vacancy has occurred, and the person elected to fill such vacancy shall hold the office of Commissioner during the unexpired portion of the term of office of the Commissioner whose seat shall have become vacant.

4. Date of first and subsequent Election of Commissioners.—The first election of Commissioners under these regulations shall be held on the 6th day of May, 1903, and the ordinary election of Commissioners shall be held on the 6th day of May in each succeeding triennial year. Provided that whenever such date shall fall upon any day set apart as a public holiday such election shall be held upon the day next following.

5. Voters' List to be prepared.—For the purposes of the first election of Commissioners a voters' list shall be prepared in like manner to that provided by section 6 of the *Water Act 1900* in so far as circumstances will admit, on or before the 1st day of April, 1903, by the Secretary to the Trust, certified by him as correct, and such list shall be the list of voters for the said election of Commissioners, and shall remain in force and shall be used at any subsequent election of Commissioners, that may be held prior to a fresh voters' list being made out as hereinafter provided.

6. Voters' List to be prepared annually.—Before the last day of February in each year a voters' list shall be made out in the manner prescribed by section 6 of the *Water Act 1900*, which shall, upon approval of the Commissioners under the common seal of the Trust, be the list of voters for the election of Commissioners for the twelve months next ensuing.

7. Form of Voters' List.—First Schedule.—Such voters' list shall be in the form in the First Schedule hereto, and shall contain, in regular numerical sequence and alphabetical order of surname, the christian name or names, surname, and address (so far as these may be known) of every ratepayer within that portion of the municipal district of the Shire of Euroa included within the district of the Waterworks Trust.

In making out such list of voters, if the property in respect of which any ratepayer is entitled to vote is only in part within the Waterworks district, then the number of votes of such ratepayer in respect of such property shall be reduced in the proportion which such part bears to the whole property of such ratepayer rated in the municipal district.

8. Minister may appoint returning officer for first election.—Chairman of Trust to be returning officer at subsequent elections.—For the purpose of the first election herein mentioned the Minister shall appoint some fit and proper person to be returning officer; but for every subsequent election (whether ordinary or extraordinary) the Chairman of the Trust holding office as such on the day immediately preceding the date of election shall be the returning officer; but if at the time of any election the office of Chairman of the Trust should become vacant the Commissioners of the Trust may, by resolution, appoint one of their number to be returning officer; and the returning officer may appoint a deputy to assist him or to act in his room at any election, and such deputy may do all things which the returning officer is hereby authorized or required to do.

9. Notice of Election.—Nomination of Candidates.—Second Schedule.—Fourteen clear days before any election of Commissioners under these regulations, the returning officer shall give public notice of such election by advertisement inserted in some newspaper generally circulating in the Euroa township, and by such notice shall require all candidates at such election to be nominated at some place within the said township to be named in such notice in manner hereinafter mentioned, between the hours of Ten o'clock in the forenoon and Four o'clock in the afternoon, on some day before a day (hereinafter called the day of nomination) not less than four nor more than seven days after the time of giving such notice, and named therein, and any person desirous of becoming a candidate shall, before Four o'clock in the afternoon of the day next preceding the nomination day, cause to be delivered at the place aforesaid to the returning officer a nomination paper, in the form to the Second Schedule, or to the like effect, stating therein both his christian and surname, together with the other particulars required in and by the said Schedule; and such nomination paper shall be signed by not less than three persons duly qualified to vote at such elections, as well as by the candidate. And no person who shall not have been so nominated shall, within the provisions of these regulations, be deemed to be a candidate at any election of Commissioners.

10. Qualifications of Commissioners.—No person shall be eligible for election as a Commissioner unless he is liable to be rated under the Water Acts in respect of property within the district of the Trust.

11. Where Number of Candidates does not exceed Number of Commissioners to be elected.—If, at the expiration of the time limited as hereinbefore provided for the nomination of candidates, the number of persons who have become candidates as aforesaid does not exceed the number of Commissioners to be elected, the returning officer shall then declare such candidates to be duly elected, and they shall be deemed to be then duly elected accordingly.

12. Where Number of Candidates exceeds the Number of Commissioners to be elected.—Third Schedule. Notice of Poll. Hours of Polling.—If, at the expiration of the time limited for the nomination of candidates, the number of candidates exceeds the number of Commissioners to be elected, then the returning officer shall forthwith cause the ballot-papers to be printed, with the christian names and surnames of all the candidates in full in the form of the Third Schedule hereto, and shall also give public notice by advertisement in some newspaper circulating in the Euroa township, stating the names of the persons so nominated, and that a poll will be taken for the election of such Commissioners upon the day named in such notice, at such place within the said township as the returning officer shall in and

by such notice appoint; and such poll shall take place accordingly, and shall commence at Eight o'clock in the forenoon, and close at Seven o'clock in the afternoon.

13. Retirement of Candidates before polling day.—If, at any election, after a poll shall have been appointed as aforesaid, any candidate for such election, and two of the persons having signed the paper nominating him as aforesaid, are desirous that he should retire from such candidature, such candidate and the persons aforesaid may sign and deliver to the returning officer, not later than four clear days before the day of polling, a notice in the form of the Fourth Schedule hereto, stating that such candidate so retires; and the said candidate or his agent shall thereupon publish in some newspaper generally circulating in the Euroa township a copy of such notice, and the returning officer, on sufficient proof of such publication aforesaid, if the number of candidates is by such retirement reduced to the number of persons to be elected at such election, shall, on the day appointed for the election, declare the remaining candidates duly elected, and, if the said number is not so reduced, shall omit the name of the person so retiring from the ballot-papers to be used at the said election, and, if such papers are already printed, shall erase such name therefrom; and such person shall not be capable of being elected at such election.

14. Polling booth may be hired.—At such election the returning officer shall provide a suitable place for taking a poll, and may, if necessary, cause to be hired and used as a polling booth any room which he may deem to be suitable at the place appointed for taking the poll, and may divide such room into compartments as to him may seem most convenient.

15. Returning Officer to preside at Polling Booth.—The returning officer or his deputy shall preside at the polling booth for taking the poll.

16. Scrutineers may be appointed.—Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, in writing, one scrutineer to be present in the polling booth, and the said returning officer or his deputy, and the said scrutineers, and any voters not exceeding four in number, actually engaged in voting, shall alone be permitted at any one time to enter or remain in the polling booth.

17. Pencils to be provided.—The returning officer or his deputy shall provide pencils in the polling booth for the use of the voters, and also a locked box, to be called the ballot-box, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the ballot-papers, and such box shall be opened and exhibited to the scrutineers before the polling begins; and the box shall then be locked, and shall stand on a table opposite the returning officer or deputy returning officer, who shall keep the key of such box.

18. Mode of voting where Voter is illiterate.—The returning officer shall deliver to every voter who requires the same a ballot-paper, or if such voter appears by the roll to be entitled to give more votes than one, then so many ballot-papers as may be equal to the number of votes which such voter so appears to be entitled to give, such ballot-papers being in the form of the Third Schedule thereto, and initialed by the returning officer; and every such voter shall, without leaving the booth, strike out from all or any of such papers the name of every candidate for whom he does not intend to vote. And in case any voter is unable to read or write, the returning officer or his deputy, if so required, shall, in view of such one of the scrutineers as the voter may desire, strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such voter may designate; and after such name or names have been so struck out, the ballot-paper or ballot-papers (as the case may be) shall forthwith be deposited in the said box. Provided that all the ballot-papers to which any person may be entitled at the polling booth shall be demanded and received by him at one and the same time; and no person having once demanded and received any such ballot-paper or papers, and voted by the same, shall at the same election receive any further ballot-papers, or exercise any further right of voting.

19. Ballot-papers to be numbered.—Before delivering any ballot-paper to the voter, the returning officer or his deputy shall write upon the back of each such ballot-paper, as near as practicable to the lower edge thereof, the number set opposite to the voter's name in the roll, and shall thereupon, upon a copy of such roll, check off such voter's name as having voted, and mark against such name the number of ballot-papers delivered to such voter.

20. Informal Ballot-papers.—If any voter suffer to remain upon his ballot-paper a greater number of names not struck out than the number of Commissioners to be elected, the vote given on and by such paper shall be void and of no effect.

21. What Question may be asked.—At any election of Commissioners the returning officer may, if he see fit, or if required to do so by any candidate or scrutineer, put to any person tendering his vote the question following:—

"Are you the person whose name appears as (A.B.) in the roll now in force for this Trust, being enrolled therein in respect of property described to be situated in (here specify the street or other place described in the roll)?"

And no other question shall be put to any person tendering his vote; and no person who shall refuse to answer such question, or who shall not answer the same absolutely in the affirmative, shall receive a ballot-paper or be permitted to vote.

22. False Answer, Polling Twice, and Personation.—Every person who shall wilfully make a false answer to the question aforesaid, or who shall poll more than once or offer to poll more than once at the same election, or who shall depart or attempt to depart from any polling booth after having received a ballot-paper, without having deposited the same in the ballot-box, as hereinbefore provided, or who shall personate any other person for the purpose of polling at such election, shall be guilty of a breach of these regulations; but nothing contained in this clause shall apply to any person only by reason of his exercising the right of voting as often as it appears by the roll he is entitled so to do.

31. Interpretation.—In these regulations words importing the masculine gender shall be deemed and taken to include females, unless there is something in the context repugnant to or inconsistent with this interpretation.

REGULATIONS MADE IN LIEU THEREOF.

**WHEREAS** by section 23 of the Education Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1085) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying the said Act into effect: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind Clause 9 of Regulation No. II. and Clause 7 of Regulation No. VII. of the Regulations made by Order in Council dated the 24th day of September, 1900, and doth make the following Regulations in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

REGULATION II.—STAFF, SALARIES, AND ALLOWANCES.

9. In addition to their salaries, head teachers of day schools will be paid monthly allowances for maintenance expenses, which will be subject to an equitable deduction in the case of schools which become connected with a sewerage system. Note.—Special payments will be made in the cases of schools held in orphanages.

The allowances for the various individual schools, whether full-time schools or part-time schools, from the 1st January, 1903, as determined upon the basis of the average attendance during the six months ended the 31st October, 1902, or of some other month or months sanctioned by the Minister, shall be and shall continue to be the allowances for such schools, unless and until the Minister shall direct, upon the recommendation of the District Inspector of Schools approved by the Director of Education, that in any particular case the allowance be increased or reduced.

In the case of new schools the allowance is to be fixed by the director.

On the occasion of his visit to any school for the purpose of the annual examination, the District Inspector will, when necessary but not otherwise, report upon any alterations in the floor space, fireplaces, and out-offices, and upon any marked change in the attendance, and will base any recommendation he may make to increase or reduce the allowance upon the grounds disclosed in such report.

REGULATION VII.—NIGHT SCHOOLS.

7. In addition to these payments, allowance will be made to teachers of night schools for cleaning, providing fuel, light, and such other articles as may be required, as determined upon the basis of the average attendance, according to the scale in force on the 28th February, 1903; and from and after the 1st March, 1903, the allowance for each school shall not be altered, unless and until the Minister shall direct, upon the recommendation of the District Inspector of Schools approved by the Director of Education, that in any particular case the allowance be increased or reduced.

And the Honorable John Mark Davies, His Majesty's Minister of Public Instruction for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

PORTS IN VICTORIA.—PORT RULES REGARDING  
EXPLOSIVES.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Sydenham Clarke, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Fellow of the Royal Society; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by the Marine Act 1890 it is among other things provided that the Governor in Council may from time to time frame Rules and Regulations for the governance and preservation of Ports in Victoria, and for the regulation of shipping in the same, and also for the due protection and preservation and the good government and management of all public Wharfs: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do make the Rules following with respect to ships having explosives on board, and generally for the shipping and discharge of explosives into and from ships in Ports within the State of Victoria.

1. Title.—These Rules may be cited as the Port Rules (Explosives) 1903, and are divided into Parts and Divisions, as follow:—

Part I. Introductory.

Part II. Rules applicable to Port  
Phillip, Geelong, Portland,  
Port Fairy, and Warrnambool.

Division 1. All ships  
other than licensed  
powder lighters.

Division 2. Licensed  
powder lighters.

Part III. Rules applicable to  
Port of Gippsland Lakes, Port  
Campbell, Apollo Bay, Lorne,  
Western Port, Anderson's In-  
let, Corner Inlet, Port Albert,  
Snowy River, and Mallacoota.

2. Repeal.—The Rules numbered 101 to 109, inclusive of certain Rules for Ports in Victoria made by the Governor in Council on the twenty-fourth day of February, 1896, appearing in the Government Gazette of the 28th of February, 1896, are hereby repealed.

PART I.—INTRODUCTORY.

3. Interpretation.—In these Rules, unless inconsistent with the subject-matter or context, the word "ship" shall include every description of navigable vessel, whether propelled by wind, steam, or other power, and also any lighter, barge, or other vessel (other than a licensed powder lighter) not usually provided with independent means of propulsion.

Whenever in these Rules an explosive is distinguished as belonging to a particular class or division of a class, reference is made to the classification of explosives contained in an Order in Council, made the thirteenth day of December, 1897, in pursuance of section 49 of the Explosives Act 1890.

PART II.—RULES APPLICABLE TO PORT PHILLIP, GEELONG,  
PORTLAND, PORT FAIRY, AND WARRNAMBOOL.

Division 1.—All ships other than licensed powder lighters.

4. Where to anchor.—No ship with explosives on board shall, except as hereinafter provided for, go alongside any wharf or jetty within any Port to which this Part applies, or be or anchor otherwise than as follows:—

At the Port of Port Phillip	Eastward of an imaginary line bearing north to the floating light off Point Gellibrand, and exceeding a distance of three-quarters of a mile from the shore.
At the Port of Geelong	Eastward of an imaginary line bearing south-south-east to Limeburners Point, and exceeding a distance of one-half a mile from the shore.
At the Port of Port- land	Eastward of an imaginary line bearing south to Observatory Point, and exceeding a distance of three-quarters of a mile from the shore.
At the Port of Port Fairy	Outside the limits of the Port of Port Fairy, namely, eastward of an imaginary line bearing south-east to the eastern end of Griffith Island.
At the Port of Warr- nambool	Outside of an imaginary line bearing south to the seaward end of the Warrnambool Breakwater.

5. Exemption.—Any ship not having more than 2,000 lbs. of explosives on board may be allowed by permission, in writing from the Port Officer, to go alongside a wharf or jetty, or to be or anchor within the limits hereinbefore referred to, on such conditions as he may deem fit.

6. Rules not to apply in certain cases.—Nothing in these Rules shall apply to any ship having on board exclusively explosives of the following kind or kinds, or to the loading or unloading into or out of or conveyance to or from any such ship of the same (that is to say):—

(a) Explosives belonging to the 1st Division of the 6th (ammunition) class, namely:—

Safety cartridges for small arms  
Percussion caps  
Railway fog signals  
Safety fuse for blasting.

- (b) The following explosives of the 2nd Division of fireworks class, namely:—  
Squibs, crackers, serpents, rockets (other than war rockets), maroons, stars, lances, wheels, and roman candles.
- (c) Other explosives, and in such quantities and under such authorities as may be from time to time approved by the Port Officer.
- (d) Explosives on His Majesty's ships, provided that such exemption shall not affect the provisions hereinafter contained in clause 23 of these Rules.
- (e) Explosives carried for a ship's own use, and in such quantities as are necessary to meet the law's requirements for signalling purposes, and provided that the explosives are kept, while the ship is in port, in a magazine of copper or other suitable material, and that if two or more of the following explosives be in the ship they shall be kept in separate and completely enclosed receptacles in the magazine:—

7. Ships to lie apart.—Ships having explosives on board shall lie singly, and, as far as practicable, not less than 300 yards apart.
8. Notice of arrival and departure of ship to be given.—Before the arrival or departure of any ship laden wholly or in part with explosives, not less than 48 hours' clear notice, in writing, shall be given by the importer or exporter, as the case may be, of the explosive, or by his or their broker or agent, to the Port Officer.
9. Ships to fly red burgee at the main.—Ships having a fixed mast or masts, with explosives on board, shall fly the red burgee at the main or only mast, while loading or unloading, and while in port. Ships without masts shall fly a red flag or vane, at least 2 feet square, on a flag pole provided for that purpose.
10. Lights and fires to be extinguished, and smoking prohibited.—Before explosives are taken on board, or discharged from any ship, all fires and lights on board shall be extinguished, except boiler fires, which shall be previously carefully banked up, and no smoking shall be allowed on board. Provided that this Regulation shall not prevent the employment of an artificial light, constructed and disposed in such manner as shall not tend to cause fire or explosion.
11. Persons not to work aloft near ship's magazine when open.—No person shall be allowed to work aloft in those parts of the rigging which are near to a ship's magazine containing explosives, unless the hatches of the magazine are closed and covered with tarpaulins.
12. Officer to be in charge of ship when loading, &c.—During the time any ship is loading or unloading explosives, and until the completion of the receipt, delivery, and stowage thereof, there shall be present an officer of such ship, or, when the ship is not one carrying officers, there shall be present some responsible person, and such officer or person shall supervise such receipt, delivery, and stowage, and all persons on or about a ship shall take all due precautions for the prevention of accidents by fire, or explosion in the same, and for preventing unauthorized persons having access to the ship, or any part thereof, or to the explosives therein, and shall abstain from any act whatever which tends to cause fire or explosion, and which is not reasonably necessary for the purpose of the work of the ship.
13. Careful men to be employed to handle explosives on board ship.—No person shall be employed in receiving, delivering, or stowing explosives on board any ship when under the influence of liquor.
14. Men to remove boots and to be searched before commencing work.—The persons employed to work in the magazine of the ship or to handle the explosives shall, before commencing work, remove any matches, pipes, keys, iron hooks, or other articles about their persons which are considered likely to be a source of danger, and shall, if necessary, be searched, and any dangerous articles taken from them; and all such persons shall go shod in magazine shoes while in the magazine where the explosives are stowed.
15. Exposed iron or steel to be covered over.—All exposed iron or steel in or near the place where any explosives are being passed or stowed shall be covered over with tarpaulins, wadmilt tilts, or other suitable material.
16. Explosives to be passed from hand to hand.—All explosives being loaded into or unloaded from a ship shall be passed from man to man, and on no account shall any package containing explosives be pitched, slung, slid, or rolled.
17. Vessels not to approach ship having explosives on board.—No ship without reasonable excuse shall approach within 200 yards of any ship having explosives on board unless such explosive is stowed in the hold, and the hatches are securely closed.
18. Hatches to be closed on approach of thunderstorm.—On the approach of or during a thunderstorm all operations connected with the loading or unloading of explosives shall be suspended, and the hatches of the hold in which the explosives are stowed shall be closed.
19. Explosives which may be kept together in same magazine.—In respect to the different kinds of explosives which may be kept together in a ship's magazine, the following classification shall be observed, and only those explosives classed under a particular letter shall be stowed together while the ship is in port, in the same magazine:—
- Class A.—The various explosives of Class 1 (Gunpowder), Class 2 (Nitrate mixture), Class 3 (Nitro compound), safety fuse belonging to the 1st Division of Class 6 (Ammunition), and the various explosives of the 2nd Division of Class 6 (Ammunition) as do not contain any exposed iron or steel.

Class B. The various explosives of the 1st Division of Class 6 (Ammunition).

Class C. Such of the explosives of the 2nd Division of Class 6 (Ammunition) as contain any exposed iron or steel.

Class D. The various explosives of the 3rd Division of Class 6 (Ammunition).

Class E. The various explosives of Class 7 (Fireworks).

20. Explosives to be carefully stowed on board.—Due precaution shall be taken by means of partitions or otherwise, and by careful stowing, to secure the explosives carried in any ship from being brought into contact with or endangered by any other article or substance conveyed in such ship which is liable to cause fire or explosion.

21. Ships not to load or unload explosives before sunrise or after sunset.—Explosives shall not be discharged from or loaded into any ship before sunrise or after sunset without permission in writing from the Port Officer.

22. Explosives to be packed and marked in accordance with Explosives Act.—Nothing in the above Rules shall be taken to authorize the loading or unloading or conveyance of any explosives unless the same are packed and marked in accordance with the provisions of the *Explosives Act 1890* and Regulations made thereunder, or of any explosive not authorized to be imported, manufactured, or sold in Victoria.

23. Warships not to go alongside wharf or in dock with explosives other than ammunition on board.—Before being moored alongside any wharf, or before going into dock, ships belonging to His Majesty's Imperial, Commonwealth, or State navy shall have all explosives on board except filled shell, small arms, machine gun and quick-firing ammunition removed therefrom. Provided that the Minister may, subject to conditions, exempt any ship from the provisions of this Rule.

24. Port Officer may stop loading or unloading of explosive in certain cases.—In the event of any act being committed while loading or unloading explosive which tends to cause explosion or fire on board a ship in or upon which there is any explosive, the Port Officer or person deputed by him may order the work of loading or unloading explosives on such ship to be immediately suspended and the hatches to be closed.

25. Powder lighters to be licensed.—Subject to the exception specified in Rule 5, no boats shall be employed in the loading, unloading, or conveyance of explosives, except powder lighters licensed under the *Explosives Act 1890* for such purposes.

#### Division 2.—Licensed Powder Lighters.

26. Powder lighters to fly a red flag.—A powder lighter having explosives on board shall fly a red flag or vane at least two feet square.

27. Fires and lights to be extinguished.—All fires and lights shall be extinguished on board a powder lighter one hour before the hatches are removed.

28. Person to be constantly in charge.—Every powder lighter with explosives on board shall be in charge of and constantly attended by at least one person, and such person shall not have charge of more than one such powder lighter, and the person in charge, and all persons employed on or about a powder lighter, shall take all due precautions for the prevention of accidents by fire or explosion in the same, and for preventing unauthorized persons having access thereto or to the explosives therein, and shall abstain from any act whatever which tends to cause fire or explosion.

29. Powder lighters to be examined.—Every powder lighter shall be carefully examined by the person in charge before going alongside a ship for the purpose of taking in explosives to see that the magazine is clean, and the decks are to be cleaned and swept before and after loading and unloading explosives.

30. Spilt explosives.—If any explosive should escape from the package in which it is contained, or be spilt while it is being loaded, unloaded, or conveyed, it shall be carefully swept up and thrown overboard.

31. Hatches to be covered.—The hatches of a powder lighter with explosives on board, when closed shall be covered over with tarpaulins and battened down, and are only to be opened when necessary for loading, unloading, or for any absolutely necessary purpose.

32. Smoking not allowed.—No smoking shall be allowed on a powder lighter, except in a place (if any) specified in the licence issued under the authority of the *Explosives Act 1890*.

33. Men to be carefully selected.—Care shall be exercised in ascertaining that the men employed in handling explosives are sober.

34. Magazine clothing to be worn.—All persons employed on powder lighters shall, when on board, wear magazine shoes and magazine clothes, and no other clothing with pockets shall be worn under the magazine clothing.

35. Exposed iron or steel to be covered.—All exposed iron or steel in or near the place where any explosives are being passed or stowed, shall be covered over with tarpaulins, wadmilt tilts, or other suitable material.

36. Explosives to be passed from hand to hand.—All explosives being loaded into or unloaded from a powder lighter shall be passed from man to man, and on no account shall a package containing explosives be pitched, slung, slid, or rolled.

37. Vessels not to approach powder lighter containing explosives.—No ship, without reasonable excuse, shall approach within 200 yards of any powder lighter having explosives on board, unless the explosive is stowed in the hold and the hatches are securely closed.

38. Steps to be taken during thunderstorm.—On the approach of or during a thunderstorm all operations connected with the loading or unloading of explosives shall be suspended, the hatches shall be closed, and the powder lighter shall move away at least 200 yards from any ship or magazine.



39. Certain explosives may be kept together.—In respect to the different kinds of explosives which may be stored together in a powder lighter, the following classification shall be observed, and only those explosives classed under a particular letter shall be stowed together:—

Class A.—The various explosives of Class 1 (gunpowder), Class 2 (nitrate mixture), Class 3 (nitrate compound), safety fuse belonging to the 1st Division of Class 6 (ammunition), and the various explosives of the 2nd Division of Class 6 (ammunition) as do not contain any exposed iron or steel.

Class B.—The various explosives of the 1st Division of Class 6 (ammunition).

Class C.—Such of the explosives of the 2nd Division of Class 6 (ammunition) as contain any exposed iron or steel.

Class D.—The various explosives of the 3rd Division of Class 6 (ammunition).

Class E.—The various explosives of Class 7 (fireworks).

40. Kerosene not to be on board.—Mineral or other volatile oils shall not be taken on board a powder lighter for any purpose whatsoever.

41. Times for loading, &c.—No explosive shall be loaded into, unloaded from, or conveyed in a powder lighter before sunrise or after sunset, without special permission, in writing, from the Port Officer.

42. Powder lighter after loading to move away.—After a powder lighter is loaded with explosives it shall not lie alongside, or approach any ship within 200 yards, but shall proceed to its anchorage without delay.

43. Anchorage for powder lighters in Port Phillip.—No powder lighter having explosives on board shall go alongside any wharf in the Port of Port Phillip without permission, in writing, from the Port Officer, or anchor otherwise than as follows:—

Eastward of an imaginary line bearing north to the floating light off Point Cellibrand, and exceeding a distance of three-quarters of a mile from the shore, and no explosive shall be landed into or discharged from a powder lighter, except within the limits above defined. Provided that this Rule shall not apply to the loading, unloading, or conveyance of—

(a) Explosives belonging to the 1st Division of the 6th Class (ammunition), viz.:—

Safety cartridges for small arms.  
Percussion caps.  
Railway fog signals.  
Safety fuse for blasting.

(b) The following explosives belonging to the 2nd Division of the 7th Class (fireworks), viz., squibs, crackers, serpents, rockets (other than war rockets or signal rockets), maroons, stars, lances, wheels, and roman candles.

(c) Explosives on His Majesty's ships.

(d) Other explosives, and in such quantities as may from time to time be approved of by the Minister.

44. Conditions as to towing powder lighters with explosives on board.—No powder lighter having explosive on board shall be towed by a high-pressure open-deck steam tug, of which the boiler furnace is exposed, nor shall any such powder lighter be towed by any other steamer with less tow line than 60 feet between her and the steam tug, and no steam tug shall approach within 200 yards of any powder lighter containing explosives, unless the explosive is stowed in the hold, and the hatches are closed and covered with tarpaulin.

PART III.—RULES APPLICABLE TO PORT OF GIPPSLAND LAKES, PORT CAMPBELL, APOLLO BAY, LORNE, WESTERN PORT, ANDERSON'S INLET, CORNER INLET AND PORT ALBERT, SNOWY RIVER, MALLAGOOTA.

45. Ships not to go alongside wharf without permission, and not to anchor except at prescribed places.—No ship having explosives on board shall go alongside a wharf for any purpose without permission, in writing, from the Port Officer, or be or anchor otherwise than as follows:—

At the Port of Gippsland Lakes, west of Reeves Channel, off Rigby Island, or in the Cunningham Arm, midway between Port Office Jetty and the Eastern Jetty. No ship with explosives on board, other than explosives belonging to the 1st Division of the 6th Class (ammunition), or other such explosives as may be from time to time approved of by the Minister shall be taken beyond an imaginary line passing through the beacon off Point King north, north-west, and south-east.

At the Port of Port Campbell.  
At the Port of Apollo Bay.  
At the Port of Lorne.  
At the Port of Western Port.  
At the Port of Anderson's Inlet.  
At the Port of Corner Inlet and Port Albert.  
At the Port of Snowy River.  
At the Port of Mallagoota.

At a distance exceeding a quarter of a mile to seaward of every wharf or jetty.

46. Ships to fly red burgee at the main.—Ships when entering a port with explosives on board, and while in port, shall fly a red burgee at the main until all explosives are discharged.

47. On arrival of ship in port with explosives on board, pilot to be communicated with.—Ships with explosives on board when entering a port shall anchor at the place prescribed in these Rules, and the person in charge of the ship shall not remove the hatches or move from the anchorage until after he has communicated with the pilot or wharf manager.

48. Wharf Regulations to be observed.—The loading, unloading, and conveyance of explosives shall be carried on in accordance with the Wharf Regulations in force at the several Ports above-mentioned.

**DONALD.**—Thirty-eight acres two roods thirty-two perches, county of Kara Kara, town of Donald, being allotments 4 and 5 of section 8, and the portions of allotments 1, 2, and 3, situate north-east of the Railway Reserve, and forming part of the site temporarily reserved for Water Supply purposes by Order of the 11th September, 1876.—(02.C.20063.)

## CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. The Government will not be bound to order from the contractor all the articles enumerated in the schedules, but only those articles, and such quantities of those articles, as it may be found necessary to order. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the quantity stated in the schedule, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates.

2. The supplies are to be the same as sample where so stated, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule of tenders. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. The supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture. A preference will, however, be given to goods of Victorian manufacture, provided the quality is equal to the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule.

3. The value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., to be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. Contractors must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour may be required in the packing of stores.

4. All orders for supplies will emanate from the departments requiring the goods. The goods shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for the same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted, and shall return the order to the contractor.

5. Supplies ordered for delivery in Melbourne and Williamstown districts are to be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.) and, for the purposes of those contracts, Melbourne district will include a radius of six miles from the General Post Office; and Williamstown district will include the town of Williamstown, Hobson's Bay, and the River Yarra.

6. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the officers ordering the goods.

7. Orders must receive prompt execution; and in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order, or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the officer named in Condition 6, or the head of the department to whom the goods are to be supplied, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies, or any like supplies that are suitable for the service, at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

8. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form at the time of the delivery of the goods, and the account shall be accompanied by the receipted delivery orders on which it is based. The prices quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

9. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the conditions. The contractor may, however, claim a survey on any goods objected to; but in that case he must, within twenty-four hours after objection is made, give notice thereof, in writing, to the officer rejecting the goods. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such stores may be returned to the contractor.

10. All goods forwarded under these contracts shall, where practicable, be forwarded by rail, and all consignments shall bear the number of the consignment notes under which they are forwarded, and also the name of the contractor or contractors by whom consigned.

11. When a contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail for any department except the Defence Department, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate of the form as an authority for the carrier to act as agent for and charge the freight to the Stores and Transport Department. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver at the Tender Board Offices the original, the duplicate to be retained by himself. (In the case of the Defence Department, however, the consignment note only which accompanies the order must be used.) Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which service the departmental consignment note is not to be used. Any infringement of this condition may subject the contractor to such mulct as the Tender Board may recommend under clause 14 of these conditions.

12. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. In case of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies rejected or returned, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense deducted as in Condition 7.

13. The members of boards of survey will be appointed by the Treasurer of the State for the time being, and the decision of the board is to be considered as final. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it, or any like supply that is suitable for the service, will be procured elsewhere, and the survey fees and extra expense (if any) will be charged as in Condition 7.

14. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds, as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as in Condition 7. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer, upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay, to terminate the contract forthwith, and forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money; and, in addition, the contractor will be disqualified from tendering or holding any future contract or contracts for a period of twelve months from the date of such disqualification.

15. Contractors are not at liberty to transfer their contracts under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise; and no such transfer will be recognised by the Government.

16. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Imperial Commissariat or Agent-General for Victoria, or by any contracts or agreements made for any works or supplies by the Departments of Public Works and Defence, or on account of the Federal or other Governments, or for the Telegraph or Railway Departments, or for supplies to the Aborigines, or for connexions and fittings of Diamond Drills; or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment; or by the consumption of the surplus stock of any Government establishment.

17. In the event of any alteration in the Tariff affecting any of the items included in this contract, the Government or the contractor (as the case may be) may give two months' notice, through the Secretary to the Tender Board, of the termination of the contract for the particular item or items so affected to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of the month, and within the period for which the contract is made. The contract for the unaffected items to remain in full force and effect.

18. As regards Contracts for Supplies used expressly for the Defence Department, however, it will be competent either for the contractor, on his own behalf, or for the Secretary of the Tender Board, on behalf of the Government, to terminate the whole or any item of the contract by giving three full calendar months' notice, in writing, to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can only be given as in Condition 17.

2. In case the said land, or any part thereof, should be sold, leased, licensed, alienated, dealt with, or resumed as aforesaid, the licensee shall not be entitled to any compensation other than that which the responsible Minister of the Crown for the time being administering the *Land Acts* may think fit.

3. This licence is subject to the rights of the holders of miners' rights or of mining leases now issued or hereafter to be issued to enter upon the allotment hereby licensed, and to search for gold, and to mine thereon, and to erect and occupy mining plant and machinery, without making any compensation to the licensee, his executors, administrators, or assigns, for surface or other damage.

4. Subject to these conditions, the licensee shall be entitled to use the land for the purpose for which this licence has been granted, until such land, or any part thereof, has been sold, leased, licensed, alienated, dealt with, or resumed as aforesaid, and thereupon all the interest of the licensee therein shall cease and be determined.

That where improvements are authorized under section 189 of the *Land Act 1901* the licensee shall notify, on completion, that such improvements have been made, otherwise the work will not be recognised.
