FISHING IN THE GILBERT AND ELLICE-ISLANDS PROTECTORATE.

THE subjoined despatch, with its enclosure, received by His Excellency the Governor from His Excellency the High Commissioner for the Western Pacific, is published for general information.

I have the honour to forward herewith ten copies of a Regulation which I have issued to prohibit the use of explosives for the destruction of fish in the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Protectorate.

KING'S REGULATION

(Made by His Majesty's High Commissioner for the Western Pacific, in accordance with the provisions of the Pacific Order in Council, 1893.)

TO PROHIBIT THE USE OF EXPLOSIVES FOR FISHING IN THE GILBERT AND ELLICE ISLANDS PROTECTORATE.

(L.S.) EVERARD IM THURN.

Interpretation .- In this Regulation the term-

- "Explosives" shall mean and include dynamite guncotton nitro-glycerine gunpowder fulminate of mercury and every adaptation and preparation thereof as an explosive.

 "Public fishery" shall mean any salt or fresh water in the Protectorate or on the coasts or bays thereof within the three miles coastal limit but shall not include waters the property of any private person.
- 1. Date of coming into operation.—On and after the first day of July, One thousand nine hundred and five; the use of explosives for the purpose of catching or destroying fish in any public fishery within the limits of the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Protectorate shall be prohibted.
- 2. Penalty—£5 fine—14 days' imprisonment.—Any person guilty of a breach of this Regulation shall on conviction be liable to a money penalty not exceeding Five pounds, or in the discretion of the Court to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding fourteen days.

 3. Short title.—This Regulation shall be cited as "The Gilbert and Ellice (Fisheries) Regulation 1905."



REGULATION No. 1.

THE Commissioners of the Wangaratta Waterworks Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been proclaimed an Urban District, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Water Act 1890, make the following Regulation :-

Part 1.—Ordinary and Special and Committee Meetings.

repart i.—Ordinary and Special and Committee Meetings.

I. Vacancy of Office of Chairman.— If any vacancy shall occur in the office of chairman by death, resignation, disqualification, or otherwise, the same shall be filled at the next meeting of the Trust after such vacancy has occurred, or at any adjournment thereof, by a majority of votes of those present, and such election shall be the first business on the notice paper for such meeting. Such chairman so elected to fill any such vacancy shall hold office only so long as the chairman in whose place he has been elected would have continued to hold office without re-election. Provided that, in the event of the Trust failing or neglecting to elect a chairman, the Minister of Water Supply may, by writing, under his hand, appoint one of the members of the Trust to be chairman; to hold office so long as any chairman elected by the Trust would have held office.

2. Special Business.—Where any business, other than ordinary business, is required or intended to be transacted, done, or adopted at any ordinary meeting of the Trust, notice thereof shall be given to each Commissioner, and no such extraordinary business nor any new rules or regulations shall be transacted or adopted at the ordinary meetings of the Trust unless due notice thereof have been given at a prior meeting of the Trust, or sent to each Commissioner, in writing, at least three clear days before the meeting at which same is to be dealt with.

3. Revocation of Resolutions.—No resolution or other act of the Commissioners at any subsequent meeting unless such meeting be specially convened for the purpose, nor unless such notice of intention to propose such revocation or alteration be determined upon by a majority consisting of two-thirds of the Commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be not greater than the number present when such resolution was come to, or by a majority if the number of Commissioners present at such subsequent meeting be greater than the number present at such former meeting.

4. Special Meetings.—Three clear days' notice of any Secial meeting of the Trust shall be given or sent to each Commissioner; such notice shall state the business to be transacted at such special meeting, and no other business shall be transacted at such special meeting than that stated upon the notice convening the same.

5. Notice of Meetings.—A notice of every meeting of the Trust shall be delivered or sent by post by the Secretary of the Trust to the usual or last known place of abode of each Commissioner at least three clear days before the day upon which such intended meeting is to be held.

6. Committees of Trust.—The Trust may, from time to time, appoint occasional or standing committees, and may fix a quorum of every such committee, and every such committee shall report to the Trust, and the Trust may from time to time alter or discontinue any such committee.

mittee shall report to the Trust, and the Trust may from time to time alter or discontinue any such committee.

7. Chairman of Committee.—Every such committee shall appoint one of the members' thereof to be chairman of such committee, and such committee may from time to time remove such chairman, and may, in the absence of the chairman at any meeting of the committee, appoint a vice-chairman to conduct the business of that meeting.

8. Meetings of Committee.—Every committee so appointed may meet from time to time, and adjourn from place to place as they may think proper, and no business shall be transacted at any meeting of the committee unless the quorum of members, if any, fixed by the Trust, and if no quorum be fixed three members be present, and all questions shall be determined by a majority of the votes of the members of the committee present, and in case of an equal division of votes the chairman shall have a casting vote, in addition to his vote as a member of the committee.

62. Collector.—The collector shall give no receipts, except upon the printed forms provided for such purpose, and every receipt shall have a butt filled in by him containing particulars of moneys received and from whom.

63. Disbursement of Money in Certain Cases.—It shall be lawful for the secretary from time to time to disburse such moneys as have been appropriated by the Trust for the purposes of this clause and as are required for any necessary occasion not exceeding in the whole in any interval between two ordinary meetings of the Trust the sum of £5.

64. Payment by Trust.—All payments of the Trust exceeding the sum of One pound shall be made by cheque drawn on the Trust's bank signed by any three Commissioners, duly authorized by the Trust, and countersigned

68. Penalty.—If any person shall be guilty of a breach of this regulation he shall be liable to a penaty not exceed-

THE Commissioners of the Wangaratta Waterworks
Trust, the Waterworks District of which has been
proclaimed an Urban District, do hereby, in pursuance of
the powers conferred by the Water Act 1890, make the follawing Regulation. lowing Regulation :-

Part I.—Regulating the Supply of Water, Fixing Meters, &c.

Meters, &c.c.

1. A supply of water for domestic purposes shall not include a supply of water for any livery or carrier's stable or trough, or a supply for steam boilers, or for any manufacturing purposes, or for irrigation (which shall mean any mechanical or artificial contrivance for conveying water to the roots of trees, plants, corn, or grass, without labour), or for water power, or for fountains or for any ornamental purpose. No hose or pipe is to be applied to any pipes or taps for the purpose of watering the ground or trees or plants, or washing the house walls or any carriage or other vehicle, or any horse or other animal, or for any similar purpose unless where the water is charged for by meter, except by the written authority of the Trust, and no cock or tap with any connexion for attaching hose shall be affixed to any service pipe, connexion, or fitting without the written authority of the Trust.

2 All persons using or requiring a supply of water for

any connexion for attaching hose shall be affixed to any service pipe, connexion, or fitting without the written authority of the Trust.

2 All persons using or requiring a supply of water for other than domestic purposes shall consume the same by meter, and shall provide such meter of approved gauge at their own expense, and keep and maintain the same in good working order to the satisfaction of the officer of the Trust appointed for that purpose.

3. Any person receiving water from the Trust, who without the written permission of the Trust shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or allow any person to take or carry away such water, or who shall take and carry away such water from his premises, or allow any other person, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

4. Any person not having agreed to be supplied by the Trust, and who shall not be rated or liable to be rated for water in respect of property situated within the Urban District, who shall take or carry away water from any tap, trough, private or public service pipe shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

5. Before any person shall affix any service pipe to any pipe of the Trust, or alter, repair, or in any manner interfere with any pipe, or any service pipe, cock, or fitting connected with the pipes of the Trust, he shall obtain from the Trust a licence in that behalf to execute such work, and any unlicensed person affixing, altering, repairing, or in any manner interfering with any such pipe, service pipe, cock, or fitting as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

6. Before any such licence shall be granted by the Trust, the person applying for the same shall satisfy the Trust that he is a competent plumber, and shall furnish an approved security to the Trust, in the sum of Thirty pounds (£30) sterling to provide for any damage he may do, cause, or allow to be done to the property of the Trust, and the Trust shall have the power of cancelling such licence at any time.

- 13. All water troughs must be fitted with approved selfacting taps to prevent overflow.
- 14. All boilers or hot water apparatus must be supplied from cisterns, and in no case shall they be fed directly from the pipes of the Trust.
- 15. In every bath the inlets must be distinct from and unconnected with the outlet, and the inlet pipes must be visible and accessible and be attached to the bath above the bottom thereof; and every bath shall be provided with a proper well-fitted and perfectly watertight ground outlet plug or cock let plug or cock.
- 16. No overflow pipe to any private bath will be allowed. Any person permitting or allowing an overflow pipe to be attached to such private bath shall be guilty of an offence, and shall forfeit and pay for such offence a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5), and every day such person permits or allows any such offence to continue he shall forfeit and pay a further penalty of One pound (£1) for each day after notice of the offence from the Trust.

 17. Any person watering any street or footpath by means of a hose attached to any tap or pipe connected with the pipes of the Trust, except by permission of the Trust, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two pounds (£2) for each offers. each offence.
- 18. Water-closets will not be allowed to be supplied direct from the main, but from a cistern only, so constructed that the water cannot flow continuously, and that not more than two gallons can escape at each flush; water used in flushing urinals shall be consumed only by meter.
- 19. The fire-plugs shall not be used except for the purpose of extinguishing fires unless any other use of them is allowed in writing by the Trust, and they shall at alt such times be under the control of the officers of the Trust.
- such times be under the control of the officers of the Trust.

 20. The Trust may order meters to be affixed in any case where they may consider it necessary, and such meter shall be of approved gauge, and shall be provided and affixed at the expense of the consumer, and the water supply shall be charged for at the rates provided for in the Trust regulations. Syphon pumps will not be allowed unless the water is supplied by measure. No meter shall be affixed until the dial on the same is capable of registering 1,000,000 gallons, and until it shall have been approved by a duly authorized officer of the Trust. authorized officer of the Trust.
- 21. The keys of all meters in use within the Water Supply District shall be kept in the custody of the Trust or such officer or servant of the Trust as may be appointed for that purpose.

- 22. The charges for water supplied under special agreement or by meter or measure shall be paid monthly, unless otherwise ordered by the Trust.
- 23. If any meter should cease registering, or register incorrectly, during the time it is undergoing repairs the Trust shall estimate and charge for water consumed by taking an average quantity during the previous quarter or during the corresponding period of the preceding year.
- 24. A meter shall not be used unless the same is of a kind and is placed in a situation approved, in each instance in writing, by a duly authorized officer of the Trust.
- 25 Every meter shall be so placed as to be open to inspection, and as far as practicable in a situation where it cannot be affected by frost, or injured by any other means, and shall be provided with means of access thereto.
- 26. A meter shall not be used or be continued to be used if it be found on being tested by an officer of the Trust to be inaccurate, and any person who shall continue to use any meter found to be inaccurate or not in proper working ender after notice thereof by the Trust, shall be liable to a penalty of One pound (£1) for each day such meter shall be used while out of repair, and in addition the Trust may estimate and charge for the water consumed while such meter is out of repair being still in use, and after notice from the Trust as aforesaid, by taking the average quantity used during the previous quarter, or during the corresponding period of the preceding year.

 27. A meter shall not be connected to more than one separate and distinct inlet pipe leading from the service pipe or other pipe of the Trust unless permitted by a memorandum, in writing, under the hand of a duly authorized officer of the Trust.

- 28. Every person who has been ordered by the Trust to affix a meter shall keep and maintain the same in good working condition to the satisfaction of such officer as may be appointed by the Trust, and in the event of any repairs being required notice, in writing, shall be immediately given by such person to the Trust, and a registration of the quantity of water used shall be taken before such repairs are effected.
- 29. No person but an officer or servant of the Trust, duly outhorized in that behalf, shall be allowed to shut off or turn on water in the main pipes of the Trust when required for the purpose of fixing service pipes thereto. Any person offending against this clause of this regulation will be liable to a penalty not exceeding Two pounds.
- 30. If any person supplied with water by the Trust does or causes to be done anything in contravention of any of these regulations, or fails to pay his rates or any other moneys payable by him, whether under separate agreement or otherwise, when due, or fails to do anything which under this or any other regulation of the Trust ought to be done, this or any other regulation of the Trust ought to be done, or wilfully or negrigently allows water to run to waste, the Trust may without notice cut off the supply of water from the premises of such person either by cutting the pipes by or through which water is supplied or otherwise, and may cease to supply him with water so long as the cause of complaint remains or is not remedied, but no such cutting off of the water shall exempt the offender from rayment of the water rate during such suspension of the supply, nor from any fine or penalty provided for by such offence by the Water Act 1890, or any amendment thereof or this regulation, nor shall it affect any right of the Trust to iccover any rate or other money in accordance with the Water Act 1890 or any amendment thereof, or as otherwise provided by law or by this or any other regulaotherwise provided by law or by this or any other regulation of the Trust.
- 31. The water supplied in the Waterworks District of the Trust shall be received and consumed under and in accordance with this regulation and not otherwise, through pipes and meters, laid, placed, and being under and in accordance with the said regulations and not otherwise.
- 32. The Trust may contract with any owner or occupier of premises or of any land or tenements, who is entitled to be supplied with water from its works, who is desirous of being so supplied, for the provision and laying on of a service pipe from the pipes of the Trust to the boundary of such land, premises, or tenement abutting on the street or road of which are the pipes of the Trust.

Any person guilty of any offence against these regulations not otherwise specifically provided for shall be liable on conviction thereof to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5), in addition to being liable to make good any damage or loss sustained by the Trust, and in cases of continuing the offence not specially provided a further penalty not exceeding Two pounds (£2) for every day after notice of the offence from the Trust.
- Part 2.—Regulating Plumbers' Work and the Quality of Material in Laying Private Services.
- 34. The quality of material required in laying private services shall be as follows:—

 (a) The whole of the pipes, thimbles, bends, reduced couplings, plugs, &c., to be of the best galvanized iron.

(b) All pipes and pieces to be true in sectional form, straight longitudinally, and of equal strength and thickness throughout the entire body of the

same.
(c) All ends of pipes, bends, &c., to be properly and truly threaded, and capable of being screwed into thimbles, tees, &c.
(d) The whole of the pipes, tees, bends, &c., to be sound and free from all defects, and capable of standing a hydrostatic pressure equal to a column of water of 300 feet.
(e) All delivery pipes and cocks and thimbles for connecting the service pipe and mains to be of high pressure, and made of brass of the best quality and workmanship, and of approved pattern to

necting the service pipe and mains to be of high pressure, and made of brass of the best quality and workmanship, and of approved pattern to screw into elbows, bends, &c. All cocks and thimbles to stand the same pressure as the pipes.

(f) No service pipes shall be laid at a depth below the surface of the ground less than 10 inches, except by permission of the Trust.

(g) All joining between pipes, thimbles, bends, couplings, elbows, meters, and cocks to be made with red lead and flax only.

(h) After service pipes have been laid, the trench is to be properly filled in and thoroughly rammed, and any subsidence which may appear within three months is to be immediately made good by the person laying such service.

(i) No private service whatsoever shall be laid or extension made by any authorized person unless he has ascertained at the Trust's office that the person for whom such work is intended has received the consent of the proper officers of the Trust to execute such work.

(j) After private services are made and attached to the pipes of the Trust or otherwise, or to private service pipes already connected, each authorized person shall within 24 hours after each service has been completed report all work done by him at the Trust's office, and shall write in a book to be kept for that purpose his name, the nature of the work done, and the date when each service they for that purpose his name, the nature of the work done, and the date when each service was completed.

REGULATION No. 32.

REGULATION for the supply of water for the period commencing the 1st day of January, 1905, and ending the 30th day of April, 1905.

1. All water supplied by the Trust for the irrigation of lands shall be paid for by measure; the forms of measurement shall be as under, determined by the Trust.

2. The rate or price to be charged for water delivered from the River Murray, Gunbower Creek, Deep Creek, or the Barr Creek, through the Trust channels, or otherwise, shall be as follows:—

Gravitation Water.

3. The charge for the supply of cereal crops shall be at the rate of fourpence per inch per acre for the first watering, and threepence per inch per acre for a second or subsequent watering, in each case three inches to be considered a watering.

quent watering, in each case time indust ob econsidered a watering.

4. For the supply of amber cane, lucerne, or other fodder crops the charge shall be threepence per inch per acre, three inches to be considered a watering; grass land, twopence per inch per acre, three inches to be considered a watering.

5. For the months of January, February, March, and April, the charge shall be at the rate of fourpence (4d.) per inch per acre, three inches to be considered a watering; for the supply of gravitation water the minimum charge shall be Five shillings (5s.).

Supply by Pumps.

6. When the River Murray is five (5) feet above summer level, the charge shall be at the rate of eightpence per inch per acre; and when the River Murray is below five (5) feet, the charge shall be at the rate of tenpence per inch per acre; in each case three inches to be considered a watering. The minimum charge shall be Ten shillings.

7. Water supplied outside the Trust district shall be charged twice the rate of that supplied inside.

Filling Tanks.

8. No charge shall be made for filling tanks inside the Trust district, and for filling tanks outside the Trust district, or otherwise conveying water through channels cutside the Trust district, the following scale of charges shall be made:—For the first half mile, Ten shillings; for the second half mile, Ten shillings; and for every additional half mile or fractional part of a mile, for such distance as water may be conveyed, Ten shillings.

Garden Rights.

9. Garden rights may be issued for the supply of water to orchards, vineyards, and vegetable gardens; area not to exceed 25 acres each. 10. All reasonable efforts shall be made for such supply

10. All reasonable efforts shall be made for such supply in the months of January, February, and March. For such garden rights fees shall be paid in full by 31st March. Such rights and fees covering the right of supply in the above months do not deprive those in possession of garden rights of obtaining water on other occasions, but special attention as to supply in the above months of January, February, and March is required. The fees paid for such garden rights shall be at the rate of Ten shillings (10s.) per acre, or fractional part of an acre; no minimum charge to be demanded.

11. Neither cereals, amber cane, lucerne, nor any fodder crop shall be supplied by virtue of a garden right.

Fodder Rights.

12. Fodder rights may be issued for the supply of water to fodder crops, not exceeding in extent an area of 15 acres each; and the charge for each such right shall be at the rate of Ten shillings (10s.) per aure, or fractional part of an acre. All such rights must be applied for before the 31st day of March, 1905, and the charge in respect thereof shall be due and payable within 30 days of the date of application. In all cases the minimum charge shall be Ten shillings (10s.).

application. In all cases the minimum charge shall be Ten shillings (105.).

13. When by virtue of a fodder right an area of 15 acres is watered, only one-half of the area allowed to each person (when the Trust finds it necessary to limit the supply) shall be supplied with water; thus an occupier entitled to a supply of 40 acres out of his 320 acres when he has exercised his right by virtue of a fodder right, shall be only entitled to water 20 acres, and so on in the like proportion.

14. That the minimum charge for all water supplied within the Trust district (exclusive of garden or fodder rights) shall be Ten shillings, and for water supplied outside the Trust district the minimum charge shall be One pound (£1).

15. All water wasted shall be charged at the rate fixed by

15. All water wasted shall be charged at the rate fixed by this Regulation in respect of the purpose for which the water is being supplied.

16. Gauging of the River Murray shall be taken at the Trust's head works.

5. A rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound (£1) on the municipal valuation shall be levied on all vacant ground fronting such streets as are reticulated.

6. Water supplied by measure, to be used in private domiciles or other premises for domestic or other than domestic use, shall be charged for at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons. The minimum quantity to be charged for yearly shall be that which at One shilling per 1,000 gallons would be equal to the amount which the Trust would be entitled to receive under the current rating upon the municipal assessed value of any such premises, and the municipal assessed value of any such premises, and at the rate of One shilling per 1,000 gallons for any quantity of water used for the above purpose beyond such an amount of contraction.

ity of water used for the above purpose beyond such an amount as aforesaid.

7. The charge for water supplied for manufacturing and other purposes and to buildings, lands, and institutions not rated to be subject to special agreement with the Trust.

8. The water supplied to charitable institutions for garden or irrigation purposes, Sixpence per 1,000 gallons.

9. For water supplied to cricket or bowling clubs the charge shall be subject to arrangement with the Trust.

10. For water supplied to gardens or nurseries cultivated for trade purposes, One shilling per 1,000 gallons.

11. For water supplied to syphon pumps, One shilling per 1,000 gallons, or as may be decided upon by the Trust, in addition to a supply for domestic or other purposes, with a minimum charge of Ten shillings (10s.) per annum.

12. For water supplied to private fountains, Twenty shillings each per annum, or as may be decided upon by the Trust, in addition to a charge for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

13. For water supplied and used solely as a motive power for hydraulic lifts, water blasts, turbines, water-wheels, electric and other motors (subject to the supply being refused or discontinued at any time). One shilling per 1,000 gallons, or as may be agreed upon, in addition to the rating upon the assessment of the premises for a supply for domestic or other purposes.

14. For a temporary supply during the erection of new buildings, Ten shillings per cent. on the amount of contract for stone, brickwork, and plastering.

WHEREAS by section 230 of the Education Act 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1086) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and rescind regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying the said Act into effect: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind Regulation No. II. of the Regulations under the Education Act 1890, and doth make the following Regulation in lieu thereof, to take effect from the 1st March, 1905, that is to say:—

REGULATION II.—STAFFS, SALARIES, AND ALLOWANCES.

1. No person shall be employed in a school as head teacher, assistant teacher, or relieving teacher unless he shall hold a trained teacher's certificate, a first class certificate, a second class certificate, a certificate of competency, or a licence to teach.

- 2. Staffs will be allotted in accordance with the provisions of Act No. 1642 and the schedules thereto.
- 3. The number of teachers employed in any school will 3. The lumber of teachers employed in any school will be increased or reduced from time to time as the average attendance for the two months immediately preceding may render necessary; but, in cases where the attendance has been reduced by the prevalence of sickness or other exceptional cause, a longer frial may be given before the staff is reduced.
- 4. Whenever and so long as the teaching staff of a school is reduced below its proper strength by the death, resignation, absence on leave, or transfer of any assistant or pupil teacher employed in a school, or by the withdrawal of a first-class pupil teacher to act temporarily as assistant or head teacher, the head teacher of the school may, subject to the approval of the Minister, appoint a temporary monitor in the stead of each assistant or pupil teacher so deceased, resigned, absent on leave, transferred, or withdrawn. drawn.
- 5. During the absence of or pending the permanent appointment of a sewing mistress the head teacher may, subject to the approval of the Minister, and provided the average attendance is sufficient, appoint a temporary sewing mistress.
- 6. During the absence of or pending the permanent appointment of a monitor the head teacher may, subject to the approval of the Minister, and provided the average attendance is sufficient, appoint a temporary monitor.
- 7. In the case of a new school, a staff of teachers will e allotted upon the expected attendance at the school.
- 8. In addition to their salaries, head teachers of day schools will be paid monthly allowances for maintenance expenses, according to the following scale, subject to an equitable deduction in the case of schools that become connected with a sewerage system. Nore.—Special payments will be made in the cases of schools held in Orphanages.

- (e) To provide pens, penholders, ink, slate-pencils, chalk, sewing materials, and all stationery (except copy-books).

All articles must be provided, and the duties specified must be performed, to the satisfaction of any officer of the Education Department who may be authorized by the Minister of Public Instruction to visit and examine the schools. IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Cometeries

Act 1890, the Trustees of the Woosang Public Cemetery make the following Rules and Regulations, that is to

1. These rules and regulations shall come into force immediately after publication in the Government Gazette, and all rules and regulations heretofore made shall be and are hereby rescinded.

2. The office of the Trust shall be open daily (Sunday, Christmas Day, and Good Friday excepted) from Ten a.m.

Christmas Day, and Good Friday excepted) from Ten a.m. to Four p.m.

3. All applications shall be made to the trustees through the secretary. All fees and charges shall be paid to him at his office, and particulars given as in Schedule A before the ground or vault is opened, when a burial right will be issued (Schedule B).

4. Any order for interment shall be given to the secretary before Twelve noon on the day previous, except that for a burial on Monday it shall be ordered before Twelve noon on the Saturday previous, otherwise an extra charge shall be made, and no burial shall be permitted in said cemetery unless a certificate from a Coroner, Justice of the Peace, or Registrar of Deaths has been delivered to the secretary, gatekeeper, or sexton.

5. The hours fixed for burials shall be as follows:—On week days, Sentember to April inclusive, from Ten a.m. to half-past Four p.m.; Sundays, throughout the year, One to Four p.m.;

half-past Four p.m.; Sundays, throughout the year, One to Four p.m.

6. No burial shall be allowed to take place between the hours of Seven p.m. and Seven a.m., except by special permission of the trustees.

7. The time fixed for burial shall be the time when the funeral is to be at the cemetery, and the same shall be punctually observed.

8. No coffia shall be buried within 4 feet of the ordinary level of the ground unless it contains the body of a child under 12 years, when it shall be not less than 3 feet below that level, and a layer of earth at least 1 foot thick shall be left undisturbed above and around any coffin previously be left undisturbed above and around any coffin previously buried in the same grave.

9. That any person wanting a brick grave or vault may be permitted to construct the same, under directions of the secretary.

secretary.

10. No re-interment or removal from another cemetery, or another grave will be permitted until there be submitted a certified copy of the original certificate of the Coroner, Justice of the Peace, or Registrar of Deaths, and the licence for disinterment of the Minister of the Crown authorized in that behalf.

11. Any extra labour or expense other than ordinary sinking, such as exhuming and removing a body, opening vault or tomb, removing slabs, stones, trees, &c., from graves shall be at the cost of those to whom permission is given.

12. No person shall place any erection, inscription, or epitaph in any part of the cemetery without first submitting a plan or copy thereof, and obtaining the permission of the

a plan or copy thereof, and obtaining the permission of the trustees thereto.

13. No child under to years of age shall be admitted, except in charge of some responsible person.

14. No smoking shall be allowed, nor any fireworks discharged within the cemetery, without the sanction of the

15. No ivy, tree, or shrub that will grow a root more than 15. No ivy, tree, or shrub that will grow a root more than 2 inches in diameter shall be placed on any grave. Any so placed may be removed by order of the trustees, and at the cost of those having the right of burial.

16. Dogs found in the cemetery may be destroyed.

17. No vehicle conveying material shall be permitted to enter the cemetery without the consent of the trustees.

18. No work of any description shall be permitted to be done without the vermission of the trustees.

done without the permission of the trustees.

10. Every erection shall be placed on proper and substantial foundations (extending to the bottom of the grave if required by the trustees). No bath, Caen, or other soft stone, or soft brick shall be allowed to be used in any work. Copper cramps only shall be allowed in the erection of tablets or other exposed stone work.

20. All materials required in the completion of any stone or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery, and shall be admitted only at the principal entrance.

or other work shall be fully prepared before being taken into the cemetery, and shall be admitted only at the principal entrance.

21. Any person having permission to erect any fence, monument, or any other work in the cemetery, and any one employed by such person, shall in no way interfere with, remove, or use anything in the cemetery other than that taken therein by them; and they shall remove from the cemetery all bricks, rubbish, scaffolding, or other material immediately upon completion of the work which they had permission to perform; and if they do not remove such material the trustees or their secretary may have the same removed at the cost of those to whom permission was given.

22. Any workman not employed by the trustees shall be under the supervision and control of the secretary, who shall see that the work is completed satisfactorily and with despatch, and shall remove him summarily from the cemetery upon any cause of offence. No such workman shall work in the cemetery after Six p.m.

23. Any person violating the rules of propriety, committing any nuisance, or trespass, injuring or removing any tree, flower, shrub, or otherwise infringing the Cemeteries Act, shall be prosecuted.

24. The secretary shall exercise a general supervision and control under and for the trustees over all matters pertaining to the cemetery.

25. No person employed by the trustees shall receive

pertaining to the cemetery.

25. No person employed by the trustees shall receive any gratuity or be pecuniarily interested in any work in the cemetery, other than that for which he receives payment from the trustees, unless with their permission.

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir Reginald Arthur James Talbot, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the Land Act 1901 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation to be published in the Government Gazette, at any time increase or diminish the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in Part I., Division I, section 5, of the said Land Act 1901, but that the area of lands which may be sold by auction (Class 7) shall not be increased except as in certain cases in the said Act provided: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in accordance with the provisions of sections 113 and 132 of the Land Act 1901 aforesaid, do hereby increase or diminish (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in classes 1, 2, 3, 7, 8, and 9 respectively of the classes mentioned in section 5 of the Land Act 1901 aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedules respectively (that is to say):—

6. Annual contributors of One pound or over, whose subscriptions have been paid any time on or before 30th June, shall alone be entitled to record their votes at the succeeding annual meeting of contributors. All subscribers shall be entitled, however, to be present and express their sentiments.

7. The committee shall meet every month on such days as it shall appoint, five (5) members to form a quorum. In the event of a quorum not being present within half-anhour of the appointed time of such meeting, it shall be in the power of the members present, or if there be no members present, of the secretary, to adjourn such meeting to any day not exceeding seven days from the date of such exclusivement.

8. The President, or in his absence the Vice-President, shall preside at all meetings of contributors and of the committee. In the absence of these officers, the meeting shall choose its own chairman. In the event of an equality of votes, the President, or chairman for the time being, shall have an additional or casting vote.

Powers and Duties of Committee.

The committee shall present a report to the annual meeting of contributors; shall direct the business of the Hospital; shall frame regulations for its control and for the direction of the officers of the Hospital (the same not being repugnant to these By-laws); shall have power to enter into all necessary contracts on its behalf, to direct payment to be made therefor, and to appoint and discharge all paid officers and servants. all paid officers and servants.

Visiting Committee.

11. The committee shall elect from their number a visit-11. The committee shall elect from their number a visiting committee of two (2), who shall meet at the Hospital on such days as they may appoint in each week for the purpose of confirming or otherwise the admission of any cases received into the Hospital during the interval between their meetings. They shall report to each monthly meeting of the committee on the general condition of the Hospital, and on such other matters as they think of importance. They shall have power to examine and check the Hospital books and records, to engage and suspend servants, and to regulate the internal management of the Hospital under the direction of the committee, and shall, in cases of emergency, have power to order, in writing, any requisite work or materials to extent of £5.

Treasurer.

12. All moneys received on account of the Hospital shall be paid to the honorary treasurer thereof, and shall be appropriated by him to the purposes of the Hospital, under the direction of the committee. He shall deposit all moneys received by him, whenever the same shall amount to £5, in such bank as the said committee shall direct, and place the same to the account of the Swan Hill District Hospital. Payments shall be made by the honorary treasurer only upon the orders of the committee, under the hand of the chairman of the meeting at which such orders shall have been made, such payments to be made by cheque upon the banking account, signed by the honorary treasurer and any one member of the committee who shall have been present at the meeting at which such payments shall have been authorized, and countersigned by the secretary. The honorary treasurer shall present a statement of amounts received by him to each monthly meeting of the committee. 12. All moneys received on account of the Hospital shall

13. The secretary shall keep the minutes, accounts, and records of the Hospital, compile all reports, conduct the correspondence, attend all meetings, and bring all business before the same, carry out all resolutions of the committee, and perform all clerical duties that may be ordered by such committee. He shall convene the annual meeting of contributors, and shall duly advertise in the notice convening such meeting all the business to be transacted at such meeting. He shall convene special meetings of contributors when required. He shall procure a fidelity guarantee to such amount as the committee shall deem sufficient, the premium for same to be paid by the committee. One month's notice by or to the committee shall terminate the appointment. terminate the appointment.

Collector.

14. (1) The collector shall carvass for contributions such districts as the committee may appoint. He shall pay to the honorary treasurer fortnightly all the sums that he

may have collected. He shall give printed receipts for all moneys paid to him, and shall keep a counterpart or butt for the inspection of the honorary treasurer and the finance committee.

(2) He shall procure a fidelity guarantee to such amount as the committee shall deem sufficient, the premium for same to be paid by the committee.

Auditors.

15. The accounts of the Hospital shall be audited in the first week in July of every year by the auditors of the Hospital, who shall sign the summary of receipts and expenditure for the preceding year. The auditors shall be two in number, and shall not be members of the committee, nor necessarily contributors.

Medical Officer and Dispenser.

16. The medical officer shall be a legally qualified medical practitioner, possessing the certificate of the Medical Board of Victoria. He shall be appointed by the committee annually at their first meeting after the annual meeting of contributors.

(a) He shall receive for his services such remuneration—
as the committee shall determine, and in addition he shall be allowed the right of private practice, providing it does not interfere with his duties at the Hospital. In the event of the position of medical officer becoming vacant, the committee shall fill the same for the unexpired portion of the year.

(b) He shall have the immediate superintendence of the matten and nurses, and direct them in their

(b) He shall have the immediate superintendence of the matron and nurses, and direct them in their duties.
