DISSOLUTION OF THE UNION OF SWEDEN WITH NORWAY.

THE following despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor is published for general information.

Sir,

I have the honour to state, for the information of your Ministers, that His Majesty's Government have been formally notified that the Union of Sweden with Norway has been dissolved, and that they have taken official recognition of Norway as a separate Kingdom.

2. His Majesty's Government have also received from the Swedish Legation in London an intimation that the Treaties concluded in common by Sweden and Norway will be considered as valid by the Swedish Government until further notice by that Government, but that the Swedish Government cannot accept any further responsibility for any obligations contained in such Treaties so far as the State of Norway is concerned.

3. A similar communication has been received from the Norwegian Representative in London, intimating that the Government of Norway recognises its obligations under the Treaties concluded in common by the two States, but repudiates any obligation as regards such Treaties so far as Sweden is concerned.

4. The replies of His Majesty's Government to these communications, gladly take note of the desire of the Governments of the two States that their respective arrangements should remain in force pending a further study of the subject, but observe that the dissolution of the Union undoubtedly affords His Majesty's Government the right to examine; *de novo*, the Treaty arrangements by which Great Britain was bound to the Dual Monarchy.

DENTAL BOARD OF VICTORIA.

for a period of eight weeks from the 5th February, 1906, upon the following express conditions, that is to say:—

1. That no person or persons shall employ in the said factory or work-rooms more than one hundred females for more than forty-eight hours in any one week, and that the said one hundred females shall not be employed for more than fifty-seven hours in any one week, nor for more than three hours beyond the ordinary working hours in any one day, in preparing or manufacturing articles for trade or sale.
2. That every female so employed shall receive not less than eight shillings per week for each week during which she works overtime, and, in addition, each wage-worker shall be paid for such overtime at the rate of time and a half; and each piece-worker shall be paid Threepence per hour for overtime in addition to ordinary earnings by piece-work.
3. That every female shall receive Sixpence tea money each evening she works overtime.
4. That none of such females shall be so employed for more than forty-eight hours in any one week without their consent.
5. That a copy of this Order be kept conspicuously and continually posted in such factory or work-rooms for the information of all concerned.

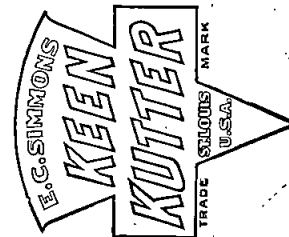

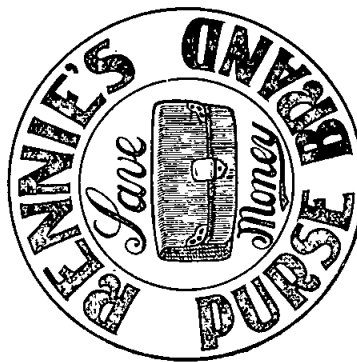

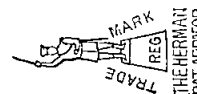

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETIES.

REGULATIONS for the distribution of the sum of £300 granted by Parliament to Horticultural Societies, 1905-6.

1. That each society claiming to participate in the grant shall furnish to the Secretary for Agriculture, on or before the 1st March, 1906, a statement in the form marked A, which must be verified by statutory declaration in the form marked E.

2. The distribution of the vote will be made one month after the above-mentioned date, when a sum equal to the amount of the prize money awarded and paid away for horticultural exhibits will be allotted to each society having a claim, and be made payable to the treasurer thereof, provided that the sum claimed do not exceed in the whole Two hundred and eighty-nine pounds ten shillings, and if they do exceed this amount then they will be reduced *pro rata*, and the allotment made accordingly.

3. No society whose expenditure in prizes between the 1st January, 1905, and the 31st December, 1905, amounts in the total to less than Twenty-five pounds shall be entitled to participate in the vote.

4. A sum not exceeding Ten pounds ten shillings may be paid out of the above vote to the Royal Horticultural Society for Grand Champion prizes, to be awarded at said society's show in 1906.

5. A sum not exceeding Two pounds may be paid out of above vote for a gold medal for best "exhibit of fruit suitable for export" at Doncaster and Box Hill Show in 1906.

AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES.

REGULATIONS for the distribution of the sum of Two thousand pounds (£2,000) granted by Parliament to Agricultural Societies, 1905-6.

1. Each society shall furnish to the Secretary for Agriculture, on or before the 1st March, 1906, a statement in the form marked A, which must be verified by statutory declaration in the form marked E.

2. On receipt of the above-mentioned statement, so verified, the Minister of Agriculture may cause to be paid to the treasurer of each society a sum equal to one-half of the amount shown to have been awarded and paid away in prizes not exceeding £25 each (except for the exhibits mentioned in the statement above referred to, and such other exhibits the Minister may consider unsuitable), on condition that this sum does not exceed the amount raised by members' subscriptions and private donations; and, if it do exceed the same, that it be in that case reduced to a sum equal to the amount so raised.

3. A sum not exceeding Seventy-eight pounds may be paid out of the above vote for medals awarded as Grand National prizes at the Ovens and Murray Agricultural Society's Show.

4. In addition to the sum of One hundred and twenty-five pounds payable out of above vote under Regulation gazetted 15th August, 1905, a sum not exceeding Four pounds may be paid for medals awarded as champion prizes for poultry.

5. No society located within 20 miles of any other society shall be entitled to participate in the vote unless the sum awarded and paid away in prizes by such society as hereinbefore specified amounts in the total to One hundred pounds at least.

6. The Royal Agricultural Society shall not participate in the vote for the year 1905-6, but a sum not exceeding Eight pounds may be paid for medals awarded at that Society's Show.

7. If the sums claimable be in excess of the balance remaining after payment of above amounts, they shall be reduced *pro rata*.

SHIRES OF BENALLA AND NORTH OVENS.

IN pursuance of the provisions of the *Local Government Act* 1903 (No. 1893, section 46), the substance and prayer of a Petition in accordance with the 36th and 44th sections of the said Act, which has been presented to His Excellency the Governor in Council, are published, viz.:—

The petitioners purport to constitute a majority of the ratepayers in the portion of the Shire of Benalla described in their petition, and they desire that the area so described may be severed from the said Shire of Benalla and annexed to the Shire of North Ovens.

Area described in petition: Commencing at the north-west angle of the Parish of Killawarra; thence east by the north boundary of that parish to the Ovens River; thence southerly by that river and the western boundary of the municipal district of the Borough of Wangaratta to the south-west angle of allotment 1, section F, Parish of Wangaratta South; thence easterly by a road to the Fifteen-mile Creek; thence south-easterly by that creek to the Sydney-road; thence southerly by that road to the south boundary of the last-named parish; thence east by a road to the Fifteen-mile Creek aforesaid; thence southerly by that creek to the south-east angle of allotment 7, Parish of Glenrowan; thence westerly by a road to the south-west angle of allotment 23A, same parish; thence northerly and westerly by a road to the south-east boundary of allotment 114, Parish of Taminick; thence northerly by a road to the south boundary of allotment 113; thence easterly and northerly by a road to the western boundary of the Parish of Wangaratta South; thence northerly by that boundary to the south-east angle of allotment 99, Parish of Taminick; thence westerly, northerly, westerly, northerly, and westerly by the southern boundaries of allotments 99, 96A, and 95 to a road; thence southerly, south-westerly, westerly, and south-westerly by a road to the western boundary of allotment 101; thence northerly by a road to the south-east angle of allotment

PORTS IN VICTORIA.—AMENDMENT OF PORT RULES REGARDING EXPLOSIVES.

PROCLAMATION

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by Part II. of the *Marine Act* 1890 (54 Vict. No. 1165), it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, may from time to time define the limits and boundaries of ports in Victoria, and that such limits and boundaries may from time to time be in like manner altered, amended, or repealed, and others substituted in their stead: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the State, do hereby repeal all previous proclamations defining the limits and boundaries of Ports in Victoria, in so far as regards the Port of Geelong, and do by this Proclamation re-define the limits and boundaries of such Port as hereunder, that is to say:—

The port of Geelong shall include all inlets, rivers, bays, harbors, and navigable waters westward and southward of and within an imaginary line bearing north 32 degrees west from a point on the east side of Mercer-street, Portarlington, and one chain from high-water mark to a point formed by the intersection of a line parallel with the right bank of Little River, and 150 links therefrom, and a line parallel with high-water mark, at a distance of one chain therefrom, exclusive of the waters of Limeburner's Bay north of a line from the south-east point of such bay to a point on high-water mark in Corio Bay in line with the west side of the road forming the eastern boundary of allotment 2, parish of Moranghurk.

WHEREAS by section 35 of the *Teachers Act* 1905 (5 Edw. VII. No. 2006) it is enacted that the Governor in Council may make regulations for all or any of the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying out the provisions of the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby rescind Regulations No. V. and No. VII. of the Regulations made on the 7th June, 1905, under the *Education Act* 1890, the *Teachers Act* 1893, and the *Education Act* 1901, and doth make the following Regulations No. V., Staffs, Salaries, and Allowances, and No. VII., Appointment and Transfer of Junior Teachers and Sewing Mistresses, in lieu thereof.

And the Governor in Council doth further direct that, in the Regulations made on the 7th June, 1905, as aforesaid, wherever the words "pupil teacher" or "pupil teachers" respectively occur the words "junior teacher" and "junior teachers" respectively shall be substituted; and that wherever reference is made to a First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, or Seventh School it shall be read and construed as meaning a school to which under normal conditions a head teacher of the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, or Seventh Class (as the case may be) may be appointed under Regulations made in accordance with the provisions of the *Teachers Act 1905*.

REGULATION V.—STAFFS, APPOINTMENTS, AND TRANSFERS OF TEACHERS, AND MAINTENANCE ALLOWANCES.

1. No person shall be permanently employed in a school as head teacher, assistant teacher, or relieving teacher unless he shall hold a Trained Teacher's Certificate, a First Class Certificate, a Second Class Certificate, a Certificate of Competency, a Licence to Teach, or approved equivalent.

2. Head teachers may be appointed to or retained in schools in accordance with the following scale :—

A head teacher of the First Class in a school with an average attendance exceeding 690 pupils.

A head teacher of the Second Class in a school with an average attendance exceeding 420 pupils.

A head teacher of the Third Class in a school with an average attendance exceeding 160 pupils.

A head teacher of the Fourth Class in a school with an average attendance exceeding 80 pupils.

A head teacher of the Fifth Class in a school with an average attendance exceeding 25 pupils.

A head teacher of the Sixth Class in a school with an average attendance exceeding 18 pupils.

A head teacher of the Seventh Class in a school with an average attendance not exceeding 25 pupils.

Note.—To avoid frequent changes of teachers it shall not be deemed necessary, unless the public interest requires it, to transfer a teacher because the attendance at his school somewhat exceeds that to which a teacher of his class is usually appointed, or in which such a teacher may be retained.

3. Except as otherwise provided in section 23 (4) of Act No. 2006, assistant teachers, junior teachers acting as assistant teachers, junior teachers, and sewing mistresses may be appointed to or retained in schools in accordance with the following scale :—

And thereafter, one female assistant of the eighth class, and one junior teacher alternately, for each increase in average attendance of 50 pupils and 40 pupils respectively.

* In schools with an average attendance exceeding 740 pupils, a male assistant of the sixth class may, subject to the approval of the Director, be substituted for a male assistant of the eighth class.

teacher's certificate may be substituted for a female assistant of the eighth class, provided that not more than one female assistant of the sixth class shall be employed in any school unless there is an infant department with an average attendance exceeding 150 pupils.

In schools with an average attendance above 240 pupils, junior teachers may be substituted for acting assistants and *vice versa*, reckoning three junior teachers as being equivalent to two junior teachers acting as assistants, provided that where in the staff of a school there would be an uneven number of acting assistants, one junior teacher acting as assistant may be regarded as equivalent to a junior teacher.

In schools with an average attendance of from 50 to 80 pupils a junior teacher acting as assistant may be appointed in lieu of a junior teacher and sewing mistress, and in schools with an average attendance of from 200 to 240 pupils a junior teacher may be appointed in lieu of a junior teacher acting as assistant.

In amalgamated schools or in schools held in two buildings situated at a distance from one another, where the average attendance at the adjunct school exceeds 100 pupils, an additional assistant may be appointed, and where the average attendance at the adjunct school is less than 100 an additional junior teacher may be appointed.

4. Should the number of teachers of any given class which would be required for the staffs of schools as allotted by sections 2 and 3 above exceed the number of teachers in such class as determined in Part I. of the Second Schedule to Act No. 2006, a teacher of a lower class may be appointed to or retained in any school in the position of head teacher or assistant as the case may be.

5. The number of teachers employed in any school will be increased or reduced from time to time as the average attendance for the two months immediately preceding may render necessary; but in cases where the attendance has been reduced by the prevalence of sickness or other exceptional cause, the normal average attendance will be taken as a basis.

6. In the case of a new school, a staff of teachers will be allotted upon the expected attendance at the school.
7. Vacancies in schools for head teachers and assistants will be advertised from time to time in the *Education Gazette and Teachers' Aid*, and teachers desiring to apply for such vacancies shall make application on a form supplied for the purpose by the Department. Any teacher who desires to claim the privilege contained in section 22 (3) of Act No. 2006, i.e. :—"A teacher whose record of work is good and who has served for at least five years in an outlying district shall be considered as having special claims to transfer from such district"—must make a special application to the Classifiers, accompanied by a recommendation from the district inspector. The Classifiers will register such applications, and give them due weight when making nominations to vacancies.
8. No person appointed or promoted to the office of teacher in any school shall within two years from the date of such appointment or promotion be transferred to a vacancy in his own or any lower class in any other school unless the Director certifies that it is desirable that such teacher should be transferred.
9. No teacher employed in a woodwork or cookery centre shall be eligible to apply for transfer to a position other than as a teacher of woodwork or cookery respectively until he or she has served for a period of at least four years as a teacher of woodwork or cookery (as the case may be) unless the Director certifies that it is desirable that he or she should be so transferred.
10. (a) When a vacancy for a junior teacher occurs in a school in which there are two or more junior teachers eligible for appointment as acting assistants, the Director may appoint two of such junior teachers as acting assistants in such school.
- (b) When a vacancy for a junior teacher occurs in a school in which there is but one junior teacher eligible for appointment as acting assistant, the Director may appoint such junior teacher as acting assistant in such school.
11. Qualified candidates may be appointed to positions as teachers of woodwork or cookery. Priority of appointment shall be determined by the Director upon the results of the work done by such candidates during their period of training in woodwork or cookery respectively and the general character of their work as teachers.
12. Whenever and so long as the teaching staff of a school is reduced below its proper strength by the death, resignation, absence on leave, or transfer of any assistant or junior teacher employed in a school, or by the withdrawal of a first-class junior teacher to act temporarily as assistant or head teacher, the head teacher of the school may, subject to the approval of the Minister, appoint a temporary junior teacher in the stead of each assistant or junior teacher deceased, resigned, absent on leave, transferred or withdrawn.
13. During the absence of, or pending the permanent appointment of, a sewing mistress, the head teacher may, subject to the approval of the Minister, and provided the average attendance is sufficient, appoint a temporary sewing mistress.
14. In addition to their salaries, head teachers of day schools will be paid monthly allowances for maintenance expenses, according to the following scale, subject to an equitable deduction in the case of schools that become connected with a sewerage system. NOTE.—Special payments will be made in the case of schools held in Orphanages.

The average attendance during the six months ending the 30th April and 31st October in each year will be generally adopted as the basis for determining the allowances from 1st July and 1st January respectively next ensuing; but in cases where exceptional fluctuations in attendance have occurred, the average attendance of any other month or months may, with the sanction of the Minister, be adopted.

15. In consideration of the above allowances, the head teacher will be required—

- To have the floors of all school-rooms, class-rooms, porches, out-offices, &c., properly swept and thoroughly scrubbed out, the walls brushed down, and the paint washed with sufficient frequency to keep the rooms clean and healthy. To keep all eaves, spouting, down-pipes, and iron tanks free from leaves and dirt, and all drains clean and free from stoppages.
- To provide water for the use of the children for drinking and washing; also drinking cups, soap, basins, and towels.
- To keep the chimneys and windows clean, and all locks, latches, stoppers to basins, keys, and handles, &c., to doors and cupboards, and glass in windows, in proper repair.
- To keep properly emptied, disinfected, and attended to, the pans in earth-closets, and the cess-pits where there are no earth-closets, and also urinals.
- To provide pens, penholders, ink, slate-pencils, chalk, sewing materials, and all stationery (except copy-books).
- To provide fuel for warming the school-rooms, and to keep them properly warmed.

All articles must be provided, and the duties specified must be performed, to the satisfaction of any officer of the Education Department who may be authorized by the Minister of Public Instruction to visit and examine the schools. On leaving a school, the teacher will be required to furnish a report signed by his successor and himself as to the condition in which everything is left.

16. Teachers in charge of State schools, and in receipt of the allowance for maintenance expenses provided and fixed by section 14 above, are required to keep a detailed account of the expenditure of the allowance for carrying out the requirements set forth under the various heads of section 15 above. This account should show fully the items and amounts of expenditure, and be accompanied, where practicable, by vouchers for each item, duly receipted by the persons entitled to payment. It should be available for the information and perusal of the district inspector or other authorized officer of the Department, and of the Board of Advice.

17. An allowance of 2s. 6d. per meeting will be made to head teachers of State schools in which Boards of Advice hold their meetings; and, in consideration of such amount, they will be required to provide lights and fires when necessary, and to supply pens, ink, &c.

REGULATION VII.—APPOINTMENT AND TRANSFER OF JUNIOR TEACHERS AND SEWING MISTRESSES.

Junior Teachers.

1. Candidates for appointment as junior teachers must, if boys, be not less than 14 years of age, and, if girls, not less than 15 years of age. They must (1) have obtained a Certificate of Merit; or (2) have passed the Matriculation examination or the Primary examination, or any one of the Public examinations of the University of Melbourne, or some approved examination of equivalent difficulty; or (3) have been holders of State-school scholarships. They must furnish satisfactory evidence that they are of good moral character and of good general health. They must further produce a certificate from the head teacher of a State school or other approved school that they exhibit aptitude and general suitability for the work of a teacher.

Prior to appointment, candidates must furnish certificates from the Government Medical Officer or other approved qualified medical practitioner that they are of sound constitution, and are free from any physical defects, especially of vision and of hearing, likely to impair their usefulness as teachers.

2. On and after the 1st January, 1907, candidates who have attended for two years at a continuation school for junior teachers and have passed the examination in the full course of study, and who show satisfactory aptitude for teaching shall be held to have preferential claim over monitors and all other candidates for appointment as junior teachers, and upon appointment shall without further examination be classified and paid as junior teachers of the Third Class. Such candidates shall be appointed in order of merit as determined by the reports of the head master of the continuation school taken in conjunction with the results of the annual examination at the school.

The Director shall have power to reserve vacancies for junior teachers in anticipation of the candidates above-mentioned qualifying for the position of junior teacher.

3. Until the 31st December, 1906, as vacancies occur for junior teachers, eligible monitors shall be held to have preferential claim over all other candidates for appointment as junior teachers, and the order in which they shall be appointed shall, where necessary, be determined by competitive examination. Eligible monitors employed in schools shall take precedence over all others for appointment as junior teachers in their own schools, and where there are more eligible monitors than there are vacancies for junior teachers in a school the order of precedence for appointment shall be determined by competitive examination.

In the event of there being no eligible monitor applying for a vacancy for junior teacher in any school, and of there being more than one qualified candidate for such vacancy, the order of precedence for appointment shall be determined by competitive examination.

An eligible monitor is one who satisfies the Director that he is deserving of appointment to the position of junior teacher.

4. The competitive examination referred to in the preceding section will be an examination to test the candidate's aptitude for teaching and general suitability for the work of a teacher. It may include, at the discretion of the inspector, an examination in one or more of the subjects prescribed for the Sixth Class (Regulation I.). In awarding the marks, the candidate's age, physique, general health, and freedom from physical defects, such as imperfections of sight or of hearing, will be taken into account. Due weight will be given to reports from head teachers as to the zeal, ability, and intelligence shown by candidates when working as monitors, or when assisting, in order to gain experience as teachers.

5. The inspector will place the names of the candidates in order of merit, and the names of such candidates as are meritorious shall be entered in the *Employment Register* in the same order. Such order of merit and record shall remain in force, as regards the school or schools with respect to which such examination is held, for a period of six months, or for such further period, not exceeding twelve months in all, as the Director may deem expedient.

6. Where there is no junior teacher recorded for transfer, and only one qualified and eligible candidate for any vacancy, the name of such candidate shall be entered on the *Employment Register* for that vacancy. No such candidate shall, however, be appointed junior teacher until he has received satisfactory reports as to his conduct and efficiency from his head teacher and the district inspector.

7. Candidates for any present or immediately prospective vacancy may be presented to the district inspector for examination for qualification at any ordinary visit of inspection.

8. Junior teachers in excess of the staff allowed by the regulations may be transferred by the Director to any suitable vacancy.

A junior teacher on his own application may be transferred by the Director to a vacancy which cannot be filled by the appointment thereto of an eligible monitor or by a candidate who holds the qualification referred to in section 2 above.

Monitors.

9. The services of a monitor may be dispensed with at any time at the discretion of the Minister, and will cease while the average attendance of the school in which the monitor is employed falls below the number required for the employment of such monitor.

10. The salary for monitors will be at the rate of £12 per annum for males, and £10 for females.

11. Monitors shall receive instruction as provided for pupil teachers in Regulation XI., section 19, and, subject to Regulation XI., sections 16 and 17, may present themselves at the annual examinations in the literary work prescribed for the examinations for the several classes of junior teachers.

12. Monitors who have passed the literary examination for any class of junior teachers above the Fourth Class will be entitled, on their being appointed junior teachers, to be recorded and paid as Fourth Class junior teachers until the 1st January following the date of their appointment, when they will be entitled, on completing their examinations, to be classified in such higher class and to be paid accordingly, subject to the provisions of Regulation XI., section 17.

13. When the reduced average attendance at any school in which there are more monitors than one employed renders the removal of a monitor necessary, the order of seniority for retention shall be determined by the respective qualifications of the monitors as shown by literary attainments, reports of inspectors, and length of service.

14. Monitors may be recorded for transfer on their satisfying the Director that such transfer is necessary.

Sewing Mistresses.

15. Candidates shall not be less than seventeen years of age, and must furnish, with their application, satisfactory evidence as to good character and suitability, and, prior to appointment, as to sound health.

16. When there is no person recorded for transfer and only one qualified candidate for any vacancy, the Director shall, if satisfied that the candidate is competent to perform the duties of the position, inform the Committee of Classifiers thereof, who shall enter the name of the candidate on the *Employment Register* for that vacancy.

17. When there is no person recorded for transfer and there are more candidates than one, a competitive examination shall be held in reading, writing (including dictation and composition), arithmetic, grammar, and geography for the Third Class in State schools, as provided for by the regulations in force for the time being, in all kinds of needlework required from girls in State schools, and in teaching such needlework, and any of the other programme subjects for the First and Second Classes.

The inspector shall arrange the names of the candidates in their order of merit as determined by the examination, and report to the Director for the information of the Committee of Classifiers, who shall enter in the *Employment Register* the name of the first candidate, provided she prove duly qualified.

18. Sewing mistresses may be recorded by the Director for transfer in the following order:—

First—Sewing mistresses in schools that have been closed or whose services have been discontinued through alteration in the average attendance.

Second—Sewing mistresses recorded for transfer—

- (i.) In the public interest;
- (ii.) On the ground of ill-health, attested by satisfactory medical evidence;
- (iii.) For some other satisfactory reason.

And the Honorable Arthur O. to Sachse, His Majesty's Minister of Public Instruction for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by section 208 of the *Land Act 1901* power is given to the Governor in Council from time to time to make, alter, and rescind rules, regulations, and orders for the various purposes therein prescribed: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following amendment of, and additions to, the Regulations made under the Land Acts (that is to say):—

Land Acts.

AMENDMENT OF, AND ADDITIONS TO, THE REGULATIONS MADE ON 8TH JANUARY, 1902, AND 13TH MAY, 1902.

PART II.—CROWN LANDS OTHER THAN
MALLEE LANDS.

CHAPTER IV.—GRAZING AREAS.

In Condition 6 of Schedule E4 to the Regulations made by His Excellency the Governor in Council on 13th May, 1902, after the word "timber" there shall be inserted the words "trees, except wattle trees."

The following condition shall be added to Schedule E4 to the Regulations made by His Excellency the Governor in Council on 13th May, 1902:—

17A. That these presents are upon this further condition that each and every licensee of a bee farm site, his family, agents, and workmen, with or without horses or vehicles, shall have a right of ingress, egress, and regress over and across the land hereby demised between his bee farm site and any public road or track by the shortest practicable route.

CHAPTER IX.—MISCELLANEOUS LICENCES.

Clause 11 of Chapter IX. of the Regulations made by His Excellency the Governor in Council on 8th January, 1902, is hereby rescinded.

BEE FARMS.

(Section 147 of the *Land Act 1901*, as amended by Section 16 of the *Land Act 1904* and Section 9 of the *Land Act 1905*.)

Every application for a site for a bee farm shall be made in the form prescribed in Schedule 55A hereto, and shall be forwarded with a duty stamp for the sum of Two shillings and sixpence (2s. 6d.) to the Land Officer for the district, who shall, on receipt thereof, cancel such stamp.

No application, unless specially ordered, shall be remitted to a Local Land Board.

Licence-fees shall be payable yearly, in advance, unless otherwise specially provided.

No bee farm site shall be transferred or sublet without the previous consent, in writing, of the Minister, and payment of a fee of Ten shillings (10s.).

Every licence shall be in the form prescribed in Schedule T5 hereto, and shall be subject to such payment and such other conditions as may be fixed by the Minister.

8. No fence shall be erected on any bee farm site except on the boundary thereof, nor unless the boundaries thereof are clearly defined by a survey approved by the Surveyor-General.

9. No dog shall be kept or be allowed to remain on any bee farm site.

10. The said Minister may at any time cancel any bee farm licence in the event of it being proved to his satisfaction that the licensee has committed or permitted in connexion with the bee farm site a contravention of any of the provisions of the Land Acts or of the terms or conditions of the licence.

11. No licensee shall permit the careless use of fire on or near his bee farm site.

12. No cultivation by the licensee on a bee farm site shall be allowed without the previous consent, in writing, of the Minister.

13. The licensee of a bee farm site is entitled, without payment, to a right of ingress, egress, and regress for himself and his family, and his agents and workmen, with or without horses or vehicles, over and across any land held under any grazing area lease, or pastoral lease, or grazing licence between any such bee farm site and any public road or track by the shortest practical route, and shall close all gates or slip panels that he may open, and in default thereof shall be liable, on conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

14. The non-observance or non-compliance with, or the non-performance of, any of the obligations or conditions specified in this licence shall render this licence null and void, and the said Minister may thereupon cause the land in respect to which this licence has been granted to be re-entered upon and dealt with as unoccupied Crown land.

15. If, during the period for which this licence is issued, the said Minister deems the resumption of the whole, or any part of, the land described in this licence necessary for public purposes, the said Minister may resume possession of the land, or of part thereof, without giving compensation to the licensee for so doing, at the expiration of one month after the licensee has been served with a notice under the hand of the said Minister, of his intention to resume possession of the land, or of part thereof.

district of the said Trust be divided into divisions for rating purposes under the *Carrum Drainage Works Act 1905*.

Stone, building or in large spalls, 13 cubic feet.

The weights of any weighbridge approved of by the Towong Shire Council to be deemed correct.

VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

BY-LAW No. 195.

THE VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS, in pursuance of the powers conferred in that behalf under the provisions of the Railways Acts, do hereby make the following By-law, and do hereby repeal so much of all previous By-laws as conflicts therewith:—

The word "Commissioners" in this By-law shall mean the Victorian Railways Commissioners; the word "pier" shall mean any railway pier, wharf, or jetty, or any railway breakwater if used as a pier, vested in, or under the jurisdiction of the Commissioners; and the word "pier-master" shall mean any railway pier-master, acting or assistant pier-master, station-master, assistant station-master, or other duly accredited officer in charge of a pier vested in or under the jurisdiction of the Commissioners.

Interpretation.

(1.) No ship or vessel of any kind or description whatsoever shall be moored or fastened to any pier or attached to any ship or vessel of any kind or description whatsoever so moored or fastened without the prior consent in writing of the pier-master; and the master or other person causing any such ship or vessel to be so moored or fastened or attached without such consent as aforesaid shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds; and should the pier-master not have given his consent to the mooring or fastening of such vessel, he may proceed to remove the vessel in the manner prescribed under the provisions of section 17 of the *Railways Act 1890*, No. 1135.

No vessel to be moored without authority.

(2.) When and so soon as the discharge of the cargo of any vessel at any pier shall have been completed, and irrespective of whether such discharge shall have been carried out within the period fixed therefor, the master of such vessel the unloading of which shall have been completed shall immediately thereafter cause to be taken on board thereof such sand, stone, or other ballast or such cargo as may be required to steady such vessel.

Vessels to take on board ballast or cargo to steady such vessels.

(3.) Every vessel shall be removed by the master thereof from any pier to such a position as will not obstruct any other vessel or vessels from reaching, leaving, or using such pier within three hours after written notice shall have been left on board by the pier-master requiring the removal of such vessel, and any master failing to so remove such vessel within the period aforesaid prescribed shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One pound per hour for each and every hour or part thereof thereafter during which such vessel may not be so removed.

Vessels to be removed when notice is given by pier-master.

(4.) The master of any vessel which occupies a berth at any pier, if so required by the pier-master, by written notice left on board of such vessel shall cause the discharge and the loading thereof both of ballast and of cargo to be proceeded with vigorously during the whole 24 hours of every day except Sundays, and shall render the usual assistance and provide the usual facilities, rigging, and equipment to permit of such expeditious discharge and loading. In the event of the neglect, refusal, or failure of the master of any such vessel when so required to cause such discharge or loading of his vessel to be so proceeded with, or should such master neglect or refuse or fail to render the usual assistance or provide the usual facilities, rigging, and equipment, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One pound for each and every hour or part thereof during which any such neglect or refusal or failure may continue, with the exception of Sundays and any period during which the weather conditions may, in the opinion of the pier-master, be such as to render it impracticable to carry on the work of discharging or loading or such as to cause damage to the cargo while being discharged or loaded.

Discharging and loading to be proceeded with by day and night if required.

(5.) In addition to any other toll or penalty which may be or may become due under this or any other by-law for the time being in force, a charge shall be paid in respect of every vessel during the time such vessel uses any pier at Port Melbourne or Williamstown of one twenty-fourth of one halfpenny per ton of the net register tonnage (British standard) of such vessel for every hour of the first 144 hours, during which such vessel uses any such pier, and one twenty-fourth of one farthing per ton of such net register tonnage for every hour in excess of such 144 hours subject to a minimum charge at Port Melbourne or Williamstown respectively of one halfpenny per ton of such net register tonnage provided that—

Quayage Rates.

- (a) If any vessel without having left the Port of Melbourne in the interim shall first use any wharf of the Melbourne Harbor Trust and subsequently any pier at Port Melbourne or Williamstown for more than 144 hours in the aggregate, the charge which shall be paid for any time such vessel uses any pier at Port Melbourne or Williamstown in excess of such 144 hours in the aggregate, shall be one twenty-fourth of one farthing per ton of such net register tonnage per hour, subject to a minimum charge at Port Melbourne or Williamstown respectively of one halfpenny per ton of such net register tonnage.
- (b) Subject to the minimum charges hereinbefore mentioned, in computing the charges due under the provisions of this clause, any part of an hour, thirty minutes or less, shall not be charged for, and any part of an hour over thirty minutes shall be charged for as one hour.
- (c) A vessel lying in tier outside a vessel moored to or alongside the pier shall be liable to the foregoing charges as if such vessel were moored directly to such pier.
- (d) Sundays and any other days which may be declared by the Commissioners as holidays at the pier at Port Melbourne or the piers at Williamstown shall be excluded from the operation of this by-law.

- (e) This clause shall not apply in respect of any boat, tug, launch, lighter, hulk, or other vessel licensed under Clause 10 of this by-law, nor to any vessel unloading or loading a full cargo of coal or other materials for the Commissioners during the time the unloading or loading of such coal or materials is in progress.

To be discharged or loaded at expense of agent or master.

Pier not to be used for removal of ballast without authority.

Weighing and sampling.

Spars, &c., not to be placed or left on pier.

No vessels or boats to ply from pier without licence, &c.

Charges for licences to ply for hire, &c.

Tolls on goods and live stock taken along the piers to or from vessels at piers.

Tolls on goods brought to or taken from vessels at piers by water.

(6.) The pier-master may at any time direct that any vessel be discharged or loaded by stevedores, and such stevedores shall be employed by and at the risk and expense of the master or agents of such vessel and not by or on behalf of the Commissioners.

(7.) No person unless duly authorized by the pier-master to supply ballast to or remove ballast from any vessel lying at any pier shall come upon such pier with ballast for or from any vessel, and any person guilty of a breach of this provision shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds in respect of each and every such breach.

(8.) Any person who continues to weigh or sample grain, wool, or other goods on the pier, or on trucks or other vehicles standing on the pier, after notice in writing from the pier-master has been served on him to discontinue such weighing or sampling, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding One pound for each and every hour or part thereof during which such weighing or sampling continues after the service of such notice.

(9.) Ship's spars, boats, hencoops, empty casks or cases, or other things belonging or appertaining to any ship or vessel lying at the pier shall not be placed or left lying on any part of any pier without the prior permission in writing of the pier-master. Any person who commits, permits, or causes a breach of this provision shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten shillings for each and every hour or part thereof during which such breach continues.

(10.) No boatman, waterman, master of any vessel, or other person shall ply for hire to or from any pier, nor shall any tug, lighter, or hulk use or be moored at any pier or attached to any vessel berthed at any pier unless duly licensed by the Commissioners; and any person who infringes this provision shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds in respect of each and every such infringement.

(11.) Tolls not exceeding the amounts specified in the following scale shall be paid before the licence referred to in clause 10 hereof will be issued and such licence will in every case expire on the 31st day of December each year:—

(a) For every boat propelled by oars only, 5s. per annum.

(b) For every sailing boat licensed to carry ten passengers, 10s. per annum.

(c) For every tug, launch, lighter, or hulk, £1 per annum.

(d) For every steam-boat, £10 per annum.

(12.) Tolls shall be paid on goods and animals not forwarded by rail which may be received at or delivered upon or from any pier, as follows; and in every case the consent of the pier-master to the receipt at or delivery upon or from such pier of such goods and animals shall be first obtained. All handling shall be done by the owner, consignor, or consignee, who shall also accept all risks:—

Horses	2s. 6d. per head.
Cattle	2s. 6d. per head.
Sheep, exported	2s. 6d. per score.
Sheep, imported	1s. each.
Pigs	3d. each.
Vehicles	2s. 6d. each.
Goods not otherwise specified, per ton of

Pianos	1s. each.
Bicycles, tricycles, and perambulators	3d. each.
Packages not exceeding 56 lbs. weight	2d. each.

(13.) Tolls shall be paid in respect of any pier at Williamstown and Port Melbourne on goods brought to or taken from any vessel using any such pier by lighter or other vessel in accordance with the under specified scale:—

(a) Where such goods are taken to or brought from Melbourne *via* the River Yarra—

For every ton of general cargo	2s. per ton.
For every bale of wool	1s. per bale.
For every bale of leather	1s. per bale.

(b) In all cases other than the above—

For every ton of general cargo	4d. per ton.
For every bale of wool	2d. per bale.
For every bale of leather	2d. per bale.

Tolls shall be paid in respect of any pier situated elsewhere than at Williamstown and Port Melbourne, on goods brought to or taken from any vessel using such pier by lighter or other vessel, in accordance with the under specified scale:—

For every ton of general cargo	4d. per ton.
For every bale of wool	2d. per bale.
For every bale of leather	2d. per bale.

All tolls as aforesaid shall be primarily payable by the owner or other person for the time being entitled to the earnings of the lighter or other vessel bringing the goods to or taking the goods from any vessel using any such pier; and in the event of the non-payment of such toll or tolls by such owner or other person within fourteen days after demand from such owner or other person, the said toll or tolls may be sued for and recovered by the Commissioners from the consignors or consignees of the said goods, or from the vessel to or from which such goods were taken or brought.

(14.) Nothing in this by-law shall prevent the pier-master from removing any vessel at any time in terms of the Statute on the subject. Power to remove vessel.

(15.) Any person who hinders, prevents, or obstructs the pier-master in the execution of his duty shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds in respect of each and every such offence. Pier-master not to be hindered in the execution of his duty.

Extracts from the Railways Act 1890, No. 1135.

15. The collector of rates may, either alone or with any other person, enter into any vessel berthed or lying at or moored to any pier, wharf, or jetty in order to ascertain the tolls payable in respect of such vessel or of any goods therein. Collector may enter on vessels to ascertain rates payable.

16. The master of every registered vessel berthed or moored at any such pier, wharf, or jetty shall, on demand, produce the certificate of the registry of such vessel to the collector of rates. Master of vessel to produce certificate of registry.

17. If the master of any vessel at any pier, wharf, or jetty respectively shall not moor, unmoor, place, or remove the same vessel according to the directions of the pier, wharf, or jetty master, or if there be no person on board of any such vessel to attend to such directions, the pier, wharf, or jetty master may cause such vessel to be moored, unmoored, placed, or removed as he shall think fit, and for that purpose may cast off, unloose, or cut the rope, or unshackle or break the chain by which any such vessel is moored or fastened: (a) and the mooring, unmooring, placing, or removing of such vessel shall be deemed to be work done by the Commissioner or company for and at the request of the owner or master of such vessel, and may be recovered accordingly. Pier-master's directions may be executed at cost of vessels.

18. Every vessel at any pier, wharf, or jetty shall have substantial hawsers, tow-lines, and fasts fixed to the mooring posts when required by the pier, wharf, or jetty master. Vessels at piers or jetties to be properly secured.

26. If any vessel be at any pier, wharf, or jetty without substantial hawsers, tow-lines, or fasts fixed to the mooring posts as hereinbefore directed, after notice from the pier, wharf, or jetty master to the master of such vessel to furnish or fix the same, such master shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds. Penalty for vessel insecurely moored.

27. If any person other than the pier, wharf, or jetty master, acting under the power hereinbefore given to him in that behalf, wilfully cut, break, or destroy the mooring or fastening of any vessel lying at the pier, wharf, or jetty, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds. Penalty for wilfully cutting moorings.

28. If the master of any vessel or the owner of any goods evade, or attempt to evade, the payment of the tolls payable to the Commissioner or company in respect of such vessel or goods, or any part thereof, he shall pay to the Commissioner or company three times the amount of the tolls of which he shall so have evaded or attempted to evade the payment; and the same shall be recovered from such master or owner respectively either summarily before two justices or by action in any court of competent jurisdiction. Penalty for evasion of tolls.

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION, AND MANAGEMENT OF THE RESERVE FOR A BOTANIC GARDEN, KNOWN AS THE "EASTERN PUBLIC PARK," IN THE TOWN OF GEELONG.

THE Council of the Town of Geelong, the duly appointed Committee of Management of the Reserve for a Botanic Garden, known as the "Eastern Public Park," in the Town of Geelong, having framed the following Regulations for the care, protection, and management thereof, and for the preservation of good order and decency therein, submit the said Regulations to the Board of Land and Works, to be made by such Board, in pursuance of the powers conferred by section 199 of the *Land Act 1901* :—

REGULATIONS.

1. The Park shall be open to the public daily free of charge from 1st October to 31st March, both days inclusive, from Six o'clock a.m. to Eight o'clock p.m., and from 1st April to 30th September, both days inclusive, from sunrise to sunset.

2. No person shall enter or remain in the Park who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct.

3. No person shall in any way interfere with the trees, shrubs, flowers, statuary, fountains, or other property in the Park, or with the fish or birds therein, or throw stones, or bird-nest, or commit any nuisance in the Park, or leave any bottles, orange or banana peel, paper, cast-off clothing, or other litter, or light fires therein, or smoke when walking off the paths, or in the Nursery or any other reserved place.

4. No person shall climb or jump over the fences or gates of the Park, or stick bills thereon, or alter the names, letters, or marks, or write on the trees, pavilions, seats, gates, posts, or fences or other buildings.

5. No person shall erect or place any dwelling in the Park or any booth or other structure for the purpose of offering for sale any article, or offer for sale any article, without the consent, in writing, of the Committee of Management.

6. Every person riding or driving shall keep to the portions of the Park laid out as carriage drives, and no person shall at any time ride or drive any animal at a greater speed within the Park than at the rate of seven miles an hour.

7. No person shall cycle in the Park at a greater speed than at the rate of ten miles an hour, nor shall any motor car, motor cycle, or any other motor vehicle be driven in the Park at a greater speed than at the rate of ten miles an hour.

8. During wet weather the Curator of the Park shall be at liberty to close for such time as may be considered necessary the carriage gates thereof, to preserve the carriage drives therein.

9. No person shall bring into the Park any dog unless led by a chain or cord. All dogs found at large within the Conservatory and Nursery of the Park shall be liable to be destroyed.

10. All picnic parties shall be located in such portions of the Park as may be arranged with the Curator thereof.

11. The Conservatory and Nursery shall be open on Sundays from Two o'clock p.m. to Five o'clock p.m., and on each of the other days of the week from Seven o'clock a.m. to Five o'clock p.m.

12. No child under ten years of age shall be allowed to enter the Conservatory and Nursery in the Park unless accompanied by an adult.

13. Perambulators, go-carts, cycles, and other vehicles shall not be admitted to the Conservatory and Nursery in the Park.

Every person offending against these Regulations shall, in accordance with section 199 of the *Land Act 1901*, on conviction before any Justice, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence; and every person who knowingly and wilfully offends against any such Regulations, and who, after he has been warned by any Bailiff of Crown Lands, or any constable, does not desist from so offending, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or constable, and taken before some Justice of the Peace, and shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding £10.

**HEARING OF REASONS AGAINST THE FORFEITURE OF CERTAIN LICENCES AND LEASES BY PERSONS
APPOINTED UNDER 193RD SECTION OF THE LAND ACT 1901.**
