Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE WOOD WORKERS BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop or employed as stackers or sorters in connexion with the loading or unloading of timber from ships or in the stacking of same in any yard or place, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That the Determination of the Wood Workers Board, dated the 18th February, 1910, shall be cancelled and annulled from and after the date upon which this present Determination comes into force and is operative.

(2) That the lowest prices or rates payable per week of 48 hours to the following classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop shall be:—

MALE IMPROVERS; ETC.

NUMBER.

(3) (a) That the number of improvers who may be employed within any factory or work-room or shop or place shall be one improver to every 4 persons up to 24 persons;

And thence one improver to every additional 8 persons employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop and for whom the Board has fixed more than 42s. per week of 48 hours.

(b) Provided that in addition to the number of improvers fixed—

Each workman engaged at lath cutting and paid for same at piece-work rates shall be entitled to employ a boy (other than an apprentice or improver) as a puller-out at a wage of 15s. per week, such wage to be paid by the workman.

APPRENTICES.

WAGES.

(4) That the lowest prices or rates payable to apprentices employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop shall be as follows:—

1st 6 months' experience	7s. 6d. per week of 48 hours
2nd	"	...	10s. " "
2nd year's	"	...	15s. " "
3rd	"	...	20s. " "
4th	"	...	25s. " "
5th	"	...	30s. " "

and thereafter the minimum wage determined by the Board.

IMPROVERS.

WAGES.

(5) That the lowest prices or rates payable to improvers employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop shall be as follows:—

1st 6 months' experience	7s. 6d. per week of 48 hours
2nd	"	...	12s. 6d. " "
2nd year's	"	...	17s. 6d. " "
3rd	"	...	22s. 6d. " "
4th	"	...	27s. 6d. " "
5th	"	...	35s. " "

and thereafter the minimum wage determined by the Board.

OVERTIME.

(6) That any male person (other than apprentices or improvers) over the age of sixteen years employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop, who works for any time in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours, shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a quarter.

That any male apprentice or improver over the age of sixteen years employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill, timber-yard, box factory, or joiners' workshop, who works for any time in excess of the maximum number of 48 hours, shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of 6d. per hour in addition to the ordinary wage.

(7) Holiday—Special rate for.—That the price or rate of payment to any person or persons or classes of persons for all work done on Eight Hours Day shall be one and a half times the minimum price or rate fixed by this Determination for such person or persons or classes of persons.

(8) STACKERS AND SORTERS.

(1) Persons employed as Stackers and Sorters in connexion with—

- (a) landing slings of timber at the ship's side;
- (b) sorting timber in sizes and qualities (from inward cargoes), on wharfs, or on roads, or on lands adjoining wharfs, where such lands are not used as a storage yard.
- (c) laying timber down on wharfs, picking timber up from wharfs, loading or assisting to load timber on vehicles, whether on wharfs, or on roads, or on lands adjoining wharfs, where such lands are not used as a storage yard—

1s. 3d. per hour.

(2) Casual stackers and sorters engaged in stacking or assisting to stack timber in private storage yards—

1s. 1½d. per hour.

(3) Casual stackers and sorters engaged in stacking or assisting to stack timber in public storage yards—

1s. 3d. per hour.

(4) Foreman—

1s. 6d. per hour.

OVERTIME.

That the wage price or rate for overtime which shall be paid to stackers or sorters in connexion with the loading or unloading of timber from ships or in the stacking of same in any yard or place shall be as follows :—

(1) For work done after 5 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, or from 12 o'clock midday to 5 p.m. on Saturday—one and half times the rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

(2) For work done after 5 p.m. on Saturday—double the rate fixed by the Board for such persons.

HOLIDAYS—SPECIAL RATES FOR.

That the price or rate of payment payable to any person or persons or classes of persons for all work done on 26th day of January in each year (or such other day as may be observed as a Public Holiday in lieu thereof), Sunday, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, and Eight Hours Day, shall be double the minimum price or rate fixed by this Determination for such person or persons or classes of persons.

PIECE-WORK.

(9) That the lowest piece-work prices or rates to be paid to persons for doing work of the kinds specified in the following Schedule shall be the prices or rates fixed by such Schedule in respect of such work :—
