## DETERMINATION OF THE CIGAR TRADE BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of Cigar Making has made the following Determination, viz. :—

1. That previous Determinations of this Board are hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 1st day of November, 1912. The Determination and amendments are printed hereunder.

## WAGES.

2. That the lowest rates of wages payable to the undermentioned persons shall be :—

Persons engaged re-tying or boxing cigars,  
or at any other work in connexion with  
sorting and packing cigars not specified

3. That the number of apprentices who may be employed within any factory, or place, shall be one apprentice to every three, or fraction of three, workers engaged as aforesaid, and receiving at wages rates or earning at piece-work prices not less than 45s. per week of 48 hours.

4. That the lowest rates payable to apprentices shall be :—

For the first six months' experience at the trade ..	7s. 6d. per week of 48 hours.

## IMPROVERS.

## PROPORTION.

5. That the number of improvers who may be employed within any factory or place, shall be one improver to every twenty or fraction of twenty persons employed, and receiving at wages rates or earning at piece-work prices not less than 45s. per week of 48 hours.

## WAGES.

6. That the lowest rates payable to improvers shall be £2 per week of 48 hours.

## OVERTIME.

7. That any employé over the age of sixteen years (other than a piece-worker) who works for any time in excess of 48 hours in any one week shall be paid for such extra time 4d. per hour in addition to the wages rate.

(c) That 6d. extra per hundred on the piece-work prices fixed be paid for making all cigars covered with Brazil, Mexican, or Habana tobacco.

(d) That 3d. extra per hundred on the piece-work prices fixed be paid when the "bunches" are pressed and turned by the cigarmaker.

(e) That 3d. extra per hundred on the piece-work prices fixed be paid for making cigars longer than the mould.

*Note.*—For the purposes of this Determination, "Clear Habana Work" shall be deemed to mean a cigar made with Habana filler and covered with Habana wrapper. "Dry Work" means bunches made one day, and covered the next, irrespective of the number of moulds used.
