QUARTERLY STATISTICAL ABSTRACT
TO 31ST MARCH, 1913.

COMPILED FROM OFFICIAL RETURNS IN THE OFFICE OF THE
GOVERNMENT STATIST.

QUARTERLY STATISTICAL ABSTRACT, 31ST MARCH, 1913.

Population.—The estimated population on 31st December, 1912, was 1,380,561; on 31st March, 1913, it was 1,387,175—thus showing an increase of 6,614 persons. The natural increase in the population was 4,608, and the excess of immigration was 2,006. During the quarter Victoria gained from the United Kingdom 3,155 persons, and from Tasmania 3,032 persons; but New South Wales gained from Victoria 2,253 persons.

Vital Statistics of the State.—The marriages—2,752—were 77 more, the births—8,683—were 440 more, and the deaths—4,075—were 75 more, and the excess of births over deaths was greater by 365 than in the corresponding quarter of the previous year. Of the total number of deaths, 241 were due to phthisis, and 65 to other tubercular diseases, 290 to cancer, 56 to typhoid fever, and 44 to diphtheria and croup.

Vital Statistics of Melbourne, &c.—The births during the quarter numbered 4,325. This includes 40 cases of twins and 400 illegitimate births. The deaths numbered 2,001, and the excess of births over deaths was 2,324. The deaths from diphtheria and croup numbered 17, from typhoid fever 18, and from tubercular diseases 160, as against 21, 15, and 144 respectively in the first quarter of 1912. The total deaths in Melbourne were 2,001, of whom 418 were of infants under twelve months of age. In Ballarat, of 194 deaths, 33 were of infants; in Bendigo, of 200 deaths, 41 were of infants; and in Geelong, of 117 deaths, 24 were of infants. In the four towns mentioned there were 731 deaths of people aged 65 years and upwards—or 29 per cent. of the total.

State Revenue and Expenditure.—The total revenue for the quarter was £2,483,151, which represents a decrease of £95,036 on that for the corresponding quarter of the previous year. The principal items of revenue were—Railways, £1,480,206; and Probate Duty, £82,936. The total expenditure was £1,890,157, a decrease of £360,308 on that for the corresponding quarter of 1912.

Railways.—Compared with the corresponding quarter of the preceding year, the revenue increased by £96,071, the expenditure by £24,006, train/miles run by 215,962, passengers carried by 1,700,088, and the tonnage of goods and live stock traffic by 65,730.

Victorian Banking Returns.—On the 31st March the total liabilities of the banks were £48,608,116, and the assets £48,276,017, as against £49,809,251 and £49,183,188 on the 31st March, 1912. The reserves amounted to £8,605,975, and paid-up capital to £14,687,656. The ratio of coin, bullion, and notes to liabilities was 18·09 per cent.

State Savings Bank.—On the 31st March the amount at credit of the 664,719 depositors was £20,579,411. During the quarter 34,839 accounts were opened, and 26,272 were closed; the deposits made were £4,564,530, and the withdrawals £4,227,434.

Gold Yield.—The total yield of gold up to the end of March, 1913, is 73,159,096 ounces.

Imports and Exports.—The total value of oversea imports into Victoria during the quarter under review was £6,150,125, and the total oversea exports during the same period were valued at £4,449,692, as compared with £6,651,778 and £6,474,500 respectively in the corresponding quarter of the previous year.

Exports of Frozen, Preserved, and Perishable Products.—For the first quarter in 1913, the total value of these exports oversea through Cool Stores was £811,892, of which £692,576 went to the United Kingdom, £40,284 to South Africa, and £79,032 to Eastern and other ports. The principal exports were—Butter, valued at £452,212; Mutton and Lamb, £190,408; and Fresh Fruit, £119,843.
