That in respect of the area excised from the Tongala Irrigation District (which District is under the control of the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission) and the inclusion thereof in the Waterworks District of the Tongala Waterworks Trust, the sum of One hundred and fifty pounds (£150) shall, as on and from the 25th May, 1914, be transferred in the books of the Treasury Department. Melbourne, from the said Commission to the said Trust, and the said Trust shall be liable for the repayment of such sum, and shall in respect thereof make payments in terms of section 274 of the Water Act 1905. And the Honorable William Hutchinson His Mainetyke

And the Honorable William Hutchinson, His Majesty's Minister of Water Supply for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

REGULATION OF THE VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS.

No. 59.

THE Victorian Railways Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred in that behalf by the Railways Acts, do hereby make the following Regulation in regard to the qualifications, selection, and examination of candidates for employment as Apprentices, and do hereby repeal all previous regulations relating thereto.

- 1. Every person desiring to become a candidate for employment as an Apprentice must prepare, in his own handwriting, an application on the form prescribed, stating that he is an applicant for the position of Apprentice to one of the trades specified in the public notice.
- 2. The age of each candidate shall be reckoned to the date fixed by the Commissioners for the opening of the applications, and shall not be less than fourteen (14) years nor more than eighteen (18) years, with the exception that every youth at present in the permanent or supernumerary employment of the Commissioners who will not have reached the age of twenty (20) years at the date fixed for the opening of the applications shall be eligible to become a candidate, provided that he has had continuous employment in the service of the Commissioners at least from the date of his eighteenth birthday. The appointment, however to the position of Apprentice of any such candidate who has had permanent or supernumerary service shall be subject to the following conditions, viz .:-
 - (a) That such previous service as a permanent or supernumerary employé shall not be taken into consideration in determining the period of his apprenticeship; and
 - (b) That the wage per day payable to him from year to year, during his term of apprenticeship, shall be at the respective rates prescribed hereunder, irrespective of the wage of which he was in receipt as a permanent or supernumerary employé prior to his appointment as an Apprentice.
- 3. The rate of pay of every apprentice shall be as under:-

and thereafter the rate of pay in each case shall be in accordance with the provisions of any Regulation in operation for the time being

4. Any Apprentice who, owing to the requirements of the Department, may be obliged to reside away from his home, shall, in addition to his ordinary rate of pay, be granted an allowance to-ward his board and lodging expenses during such time as his wage continues to be not more than 3s. 6d. per day in accordance with the following

5. Every candidate shall confine himself to one application for employment as an Apprentice to

one of the trades specified in the public notice, and shall enclose such application in an envelope, which must be properly addressed, duly stamped, and posted, so that it will reach the Acting Secretary for Railways, Spencer-street, Melbourne, not later than the time fixed by the Commissioners for opening and dealing with such applications.

- 6. Every candidate shall furnish with his application a certified extract from the register of his birth. In the case, however, of a candidate born outside of the State of Victoria, a statutory declaration by one of his parents or by a near elder relative as to the date of his birth will be accepted as temporary evidence of age; but every such candidate who is selected will be required to take immediate steps to obtain an official Birth Certificate from the State or country in which he was born.
- 7. Every candidate who has at any time been employed in any capacity in the Railway Department or in the Public Service, whether as a permanent or supernumerary employé, shall furnish particulars with his application as to the period of such employment, and, if he has left such service, the cause of his leaving.
- 8. Any person who has been dismissed from the Railway Department or the Public Service, or whose employment has been terminated for cause, or who has been convicted of a felony or misdemeanour, whether before or after selection or examination, shall not be eligible for employment as an Apprentice.
- 9. The Acting Secretary for Railways, hereinafter referred to as the "Secretary," snall, on the day and at the hour named in the public notice, proceed to open the applications, and shall cause the name and address of the writer of each of such applications to be then and there registered in a book provided for that purpose, hereinafter called the "Register," and a consecutive number, commencing with the number one, shall be placed in the Register opposite the name of each candidate.
- 10. The candidates, if not more than twice the number of Apprentices to be employed, shall thereupon be subject to the course of procedure, and the conditions, defined in Clauses 16 to 24 inclusive of this Regulation.
- 11. The candidates, if more than twice the number of Apprentices to be employed, shall be reduced by a Board of Selectors (which shall be appointed within seven days prior to the date fixed for the selection) to a number equivalent to twice the number to be employed.
- 12. The members of the Board of Selectors shall not be informed of, nor acquaint themselves with, the names of the applicants, or any of them; and any candidate who either directly or indirectly attempts to influence any Member of the Board of Selectors in favour of himself, or in favour of or against any other candidate, shall be for ever disqualified for employment in the service of the Commissioners.
- 13. Every candidate shall be notified in writing of the Secretary of the place and time at which he shall present himself to the Board of Selectors.
- 14. Every candidate, immediately before presenting himself to the Board of Selectors, shall be furnished by the Secretary with a card bearing a number, by which number alone he shall be known to the Board of Selectors.
- 15. A list of the names of the candidates selected by the Board of Selectors shall be compiled and certified to by the Board of Selectors, and every candidate whose name has been enrolled on such list shall be entitled to present himself for examination by the Railways Medical Officer.

- 16. Every such candidate shall pass an examination by the Railways Medical Officer, and for such examination shall pay a fee of 5s.
- 17. Every such candidate shall, if certified as free from any physical infirmity, and as up to the standard prescribed in respect of vision, coloursense, and hearing, present himself for an examination by the Educational Examiners duly appointed for that purpose at such time and place as may be notified to him by the Secretary.
- 18. Every such candidate shall be required by the Examiners to pass an educational examination equivalent to the examination prescribed for the State School Exemption Certificate.
- 19. Every such candidate shall produce to the Educational Examiners satisfactory written testimony that he is of respectable character, and shall furnish the name or names of any person or persons or firms with whom he may have been employed during the preceding two years, and every such candidate who has had previous employment in the service of the Commissioners shall produce a statement of such service and a certificate of competency and good conduct from the Head of the particular Branch in which he is or may have been employed.
- 20. The Educational Examiners shall thereupon examine the selected candidates who have passed the physical, &c., examination, at such time and place as may be notified to such candidates respectively.
- 21. The Educational Examiners shall, immediately after the completion of the examination, forward to the Secretary the examination papers of every candidate so examined, together with a certificate as prescribed hereunder:—

We, the undersigned duly appointed Examiners under the "Railways Acts," do hereby certify that on the * 191, we examined for the position of Apprentice to the trade of in the Branch, and allotted him marks, and accordingly certify that he is for such employment.

Examiners.

- 22. After examination by the Educational Examiners, the successful candidates, if not in excess of the number required, shall be employed in order of merit according to the number of marks respectively allotted them by such Examiners; but if in excess of the number required, they shall be called together at a place and time of which due notice shall be sent them in writing, and shall then and there in the presence of the Secretary draw lots in accordance with the following method to determine the order of precedence in which their names shall be recorded for appointment, viz.:—
 - Two ballot boxes shall be provided, numbered 1 and 2 respectively, in each of which shall be deposited as many numbers in arithmetical progression, commencing with the number one, as shall correspond with the number of successful candidates.
 - Every such candidate shall then draw first from No. 1 box, and afterwards from No. 2 box in the numerical order ascertained by the drawing from No. 1 box. For instance, the candidate drawing No. 4 out of No. 1 box shall be the fourth in order for drawing out of No. 2 box,

and the number drawn from No. 2 box shall fix his order of precedence for appointment, and in the event of two or more such candinates being appointed on the same day such drawing shall, all other things being equal, determine the relative seniority of each candidate for future promotion, &c.

- 23. Every successful candidate in excess of the number of Apprentices required by the Commissioners shall, in the order so decided, be eligible for appointment during the twelve months next ensuing from the date of the ballot without further or other examination.
- 24. Every appointment shall be on probation for a period of six months and at the expiration of that period the appointment may be confirmed by the Commissioners, provided that the conduct, capacity and industry of the probationer whilst in the service of the Commissioners have been satisfactory. No probationer, however, shall have his appointment confirmed until he has effected in one of the prescribed Life Assurance Companies an assurance of his life in accordance with the regulations of the Commissioners.
- 25. Every Apprentice shall, immediately after appointment, attend the classes of instruction at the Working Men's College appertaining to the trade to which he may be apprenticed, or such other classes as the Commissioners may direct, at such hours of the day and night as may be prescribed during the complete course of training, which shall extend over a period of three years.
- 26. Every Apprentice shall provide the books, drawing instruments, &c., required at the College at his own expense, but the Commissioners will pay the College fees, as well as the wages of the Apprentice for such portion of the ordinary hours of duty as he may be required to be in attendance at the College.
- 27. Every Apprentice shall present himself for such examinations as may be prescribed at the College, and shall pass in proper sequence the examinations for each year of such course, and, in addition, shall do satisfactory work and be of good conduct in the service of the Commissioners.
- 28. Subject to good conduct, regular attendance, zeal, and industry in the service of the Commissioners, the Apprentices who each year of the three-years' period of tuition at the Working Men's College may be adjudged first and second in order of merit and as possessing the highest qualifications, shall be awarded the prizes applicable to their particular trades as specified in Clause 29 of this regulation, provided that they obtain not less than 75 per cent. of the possible marks.
- 29. The prizes shall be allotted in the following manner, viz.:—

First Year-

The two Apprentices who may be adjudged first and second in order of merit shall be awarded prizes of £5 and £3 respectively.

Second Year-

(a) The two Apprentices amongst those apprenticed to the trades of Blacksmith, Boilermaker, Bricklayer, Carpenter, Car and Waggon Builder, Coppersmith, Electrical Fitter, Fitter and Turner, Moulder and Plumber, who may be adjusted first and second in order of merit shall be awarded prizes of £5 and £3 respectively.

(b) The two Apprentices amongst those apprenticed to the trades of Frenchpolisher, Lampmaker, Painter, Sailmaker, Upholsterer, and Wood Machinist who may be adjudged first and second in order of merit shall be awarded prizes of £3 and £2 respectively.

Third Year-

- (a) The Apprentice amongst those apprenticed to the trades of Blacksmith, Boilermaker, Coppersmith, Electrical Fitter, Fitter and Turner, and Moulder, who may be adjudged first in order of merit shall be nominated as a Student in either Electrical or Mechanical Engineering (as may be determined by the Commissioners), and the Apprentice adjudged second in order of merit shall be awarded a prize of £5.
- (b) The two Apprentices amongst those apprenticed to the trades of Bricklayer, Carpenter, Car and Waggon Builder, Frenchpolisher, Lampmaker, Painter, Plumber, Sailmaker, Upholsterer, and Wood Machinist who may be adjudged first and second in order of merit shall be awarded prizes of £3 and £2 respectively.
- 30. The Apprentice who is nominated as a Student in either Electrical or Mechanical Engineering shall be afforded facilities to attend for two years the full day course at the Working Men's College, and any such Apprentice who passes the prescribed examination and gains a diploma of the College in respect thereof shall thereafter be employed by the Commissioners as an Engineering Assistant. During such course of two years the College fees will be paid by the Commissioners, and in lieu of wages the Apprentice shall be paid at the rate of £7 per month.
- 31. Any Apprentice who fails to pass either the First or Second Year Course, after having studied such course for one year, will be allowed a second year in which to qualify in such course, and shall attend such additional night classes as may be deemed necessary by the Commissioners, and shall pay the fees imposed in respect of such classes, and any Apprentice who fails to pass either the First or the Second Year Course after having studied such course for two years, or who is adjudged guilty of continual frequent or repeated misconduct at the College, or to have neglected to make a proper effort to qualify in the work at the College, will render himself liable to the immediate termination of his services, and shall not have any claim if at any time his services be so dispensed with.
- 32. The term of tuition at the College at the expense of the Department shall in every instance be limited to three years, and any apprentice who fails to complete the Course of Instruction within that period, and who desires to continue his studies, shall be required to pay the fees therefor, and will not be allowed to absent himself from duty during working hours for the purpose of attending the College.
- 33. The term of apprenticeship shall be five years, and each year thereof shall be deemed to mean three hundred and thirteen (313) working days, and shall be inclusive of any proclaimed holidays on which the Work-shops may be closed, and any annual recreation leave of absence, as well as any other leave of absence which may be allowed for any cause whatsoever, provided that such other leave of absence does not during the five years exceed sixty-five working days in the

aggregate. In the event, however, of such other leave of absence to any Apprentice during the five years exceeding sixty-five working days in the aggregate, the term of his apprenticeship shall be extended beyond the five years for a period equivalent to the period of such excess leave of absence.

34. Every appointment shall be made on the distinct understanding that the services of the employé shall without previous notice be liable to be dispensed with either during or after the period of probation, or either during or after the period of apprenticeship, and without his having any claim whatsoever against the Commissioners if at any time his services be so dispensed with.

Tenders for supply of forage to more than five separate stations in any one district must be accompanied by a preliminary teposit of 10s. for each and every station tendered for except in the case of the Melbourne District, the preliminary deposit for which shall be \$25\$ with each tender, irrespective of the number of stations tendered for, and the State Plantation at Wait, the preliminary deposit for which shall be \$10. Deposits must be in bank notes, or bank traits payable to the order of the Secretary to the Tender Board (cheques will in no case be received), which will be returned within ten days to unsuccessful tenderers on their application; such deposit will be forfeited in the event of the tenderer, after the time fixed for the closing of tenders, withdrawing or attempting to withdraw his tender, or of the successful tenderer failing to complete the necessary bond within a reasonable time after the acceptance is notified.

As much forage as can be stored at any station where the storage is small will, for the convenience of the contractor, be ordered at one time.
- 2. The quantities stated in the schedule are only approximate, and the Government may draw either more or less than those mentioned. Should new telegraph stations be formed or additional horses be required at any station, the contractor will be required to supply the extra forage. - 3. - 5. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage as to the quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of the department ordering she supply, and the decision of the Board is to be considered final.
- 6. If the Board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 4.
- 7. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when, from some other cause, injury would accrue to either party by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, but he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 4.

In the event of a station being discontinued or any change in the supplies required, the contractor will receive the earliest possible intimation.
- 11. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as broken, infringed, or vitiated by the purchase by any Department of forage grown at any Government establishment.
