Factories and Shops Act 1915.

DETERMINATION OF THE ASPHALTERS BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1915*, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of asphaltting or tar paving has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That the previous Determination of this Board is hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 2nd day of June, 1916. The Determination and amendments are printed hereunder.

2. That the lowest rates of wages to be paid to the following persons shall be:—

Men on mastic machine boilers	80s. per week of 60 hours.
Layers engaged on hot work	66s. " 48 "
Layers engaged on cold work	60s. 6d. " 48 "
Rubbers down	60s. 6d. " 48 "
Binmen and mixers on asphalt mixing machine	60s. " 48 "
Tar distillers	60s. " 48 "
Potmen	55s. " 48 "
Yard foremen	55s. " 48 "
Labourers	55s. " 48 "

APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS.

"Apprentice" means any person under 21 years of age bound by indentures of apprenticeship, or any person over 21 years of age who, with the sanction of the Minister, is bound by indentures of apprenticeship. (Act 2650, section 3.)

"Improver" means any person (other than an apprentice) who does not receive a piecework price or a wages rate fixed by any Special Board for persons other than apprentices or improvers, and who is not over 21 years of age, or who being over 21 years of age, holds a licence from the Minister to be paid as an improver. (Act 2650, section 3.)

OVERTIME.

5. That wherever overtime is worked it shall be paid for at the rates as hereunder :—

Men on mastic machine boilers—

For work done in excess of 60 hours in any week—

First two hours	Time and a quarter.
Thereafter	Time and a half.

All other persons—

For work done within the times of beginning and ending work in excess of 48 hours in any week	Time and a quarter.
For work done between 11.45 a.m. and 1.45 p.m. on the day on which the half holiday is observed	Time and a quarter.
For work done between 1.45 p.m. and midnight on the day on which the half holiday is observed	Time and a half.
For work done between 5 p.m. and 7 p.m. on the other working days	Time and a quarter.
For work done between 7 p.m. and midnight on the other working days	Time and a half.
For work done by potmen between midnight and 6.30 a.m.	Time and a half.
For work done by persons other than potmen between midnight and 7.30 a.m.	Time and a half.

SPECIAL RATES FOR PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

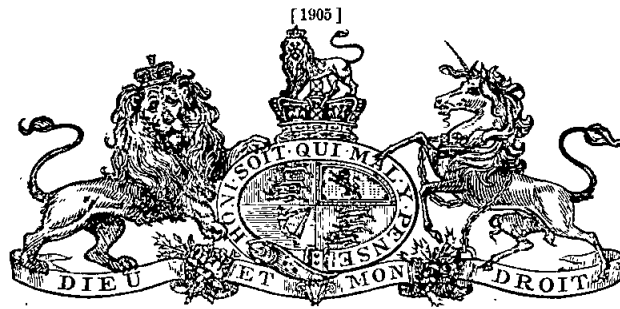

- Boxing Day,

but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

Factories and Shops Act 1915.

DETERMINATION OF THE FUEL AND FODDER BOARD.

IN accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1915*, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons—

- (a) employed in the business of a hay, corn, or chaff dealer;
- (b) employed in carting or driving or assisting in carting or driving in connexion with the business of a hay, corn, or chaff dealer;
- (c) employed in any business or occupation connected with the preparation of firewood for sale or connected with the sale or distribution of wood, coal, or coke.

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That the previous Determinations of this Board are hereby amended, and such amendments shall come into force and be operative on and after the 1st day of June, 1916. The Determination and Amendments are printed hereunder.

NOTE.—On the 10th September, 1913, this Board was deprived of the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons, or classes of persons, employed in any business or occupation connected with the sale or distribution of coal or coke by any—

- (a) coal importer,
- (b) coal mine owner,
- (c) gas company

and such power was conferred exclusively on the Coal and Coke Board.

2. That the lowest rates of wages to be paid to the following persons shall be—

Hay, Corn, or Chaff Stores.

Foreman, <i>i.e.</i> , the man who gives instructions to and is responsible for the work done by not less than four adult employees	60s. per week of 48 hours.

CASUAL LABOUR.

3. That casual hands, i.e., persons who are employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work, shall be paid 5d. per hour extra above the ordinary rate.

APPRENTICES AND IMPROVERS.

"Apprentice" means any person under 21 years of age bound by indentures of apprenticeship or any person over 21 years of age who, with the sanction of the Minister, is bound by indentures of apprenticeship (Act 2650, section 3).

"Improver" means any person (other than an apprentice) who does not receive a piecework price or a wages rate fixed by any special board for persons other than apprentices or improvers and who is not over 21 years of age, or who, being over 21 years of age, holds a licence from the Minister to be paid as an improver (Act 2650, section 3).

4. That—

(a) the lowest rates which may be paid to apprentices or improvers; and

(b) the proportionate number of apprentices and improvers who may be employed in any shop or place—

but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named public holidays the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

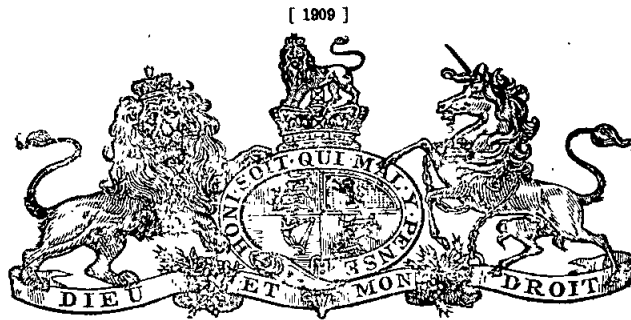
