Factories and Shops Act 1915.

. DETERMINATION OF THE WOOLLEN TRADE BOARD.

Note.—This Determination, on the 18th July, 1917, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong; the Towns of Ballarat East and Warrnambool; the Boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, Castlemaine, and Sebastopol; and such portion of the Shire of Bungaree as is within 10 miles of a city or town.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, the Special Board appointed to determine the lowest prices or tates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a woollen mill, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 18th July, 1917, the previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(4) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid:—

(5) Sundays and Public Holidays.—That time and a half shall be the special rate for all work done on Sundays, and double time the special rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, Boxing Day, but if any day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named public holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(6) PIECE-Work.—The lowest piece-work prices to be paid to any person for doing work of the description referred to in the following Schedule shall be:—

The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which the Board has not fixed piece-work prices, but has fixed a minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than 'the wages rate fixed by the Board for such work.
