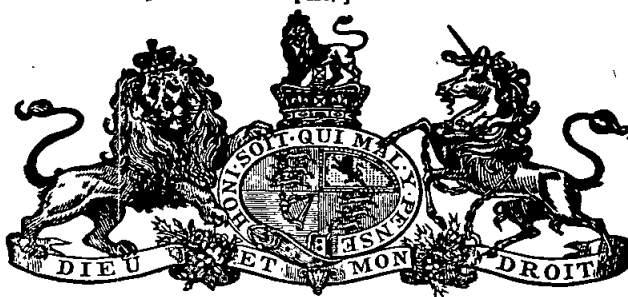

FURTHER PROROGUING THE PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir Arthur Lyulph Stanley, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS The Parliament of Victoria stands prorogued until Tuesday, the twenty-fourth day of April, 1917: Now I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria until Tuesday, the twenty-second day of May, 1917.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this eighteenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and seventeen, and in the seventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George V.

Factories and Shops Acts.

CONSTITUTION OF COURT OF INDUSTRIAL APPEALS TO DECIDE AN APPEAL AGAINST DETERMINATION OF THE HOTEL EMPLOYEES BOARD.

At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne, the seventeenth day of April, 1917.

WHEREAS The Special Board (herein referred to as the Hotel Employees Board) appointed under the Factories and Shops Acts to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in a restaurant coffee-palace hotel eating-house fish shop or oyster shop or any premises for which a colonial wine licence or billiard-table licence is in force or which are occupied as a club [the powers of the said Board having on the 6th day of June 1911 been extended to include persons employed in the business of a caterer and on the 2nd day of September 1912 to include persons employed in a boardinghouse (with accommodation for twenty or more boarders) and the said Board having on the 27th day of July 1914 been deprived of the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the business of (a) killing plucking dressing poultry, or game (b) preparing fish for sale

uncooked (c) selling by retail uncooked poultry uncooked game or uncooked fish] did by a certain Determination made on the fifth day of February 1917 and published in the *Government Gazette* of the twelfth day of February following, determine the lowest prices and rates to be so paid. And whereas a majority of the representatives of employees on the said Board have in the prescribed manner appealed against the said Determination to the Court of Industrial Appeals under the Factories and Shops Acts. Now therefore it is hereby ordered by His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof under the powers in that behalf vested in him by the said Acts that a Court of Industrial Appeals consisting of the President His Honour Mr. Justice Hodges and H. Percival Smith of Federal Palace Hotel Collins-street Melbourne person *bonâ fide* and actually engaged in the trade concerned duly nominated by the representatives of the employers on the Hotel Employees Board to represent the employers and Edwin H. Burrington of 263 High-street Northcote a person *bonâ fide* and actually engaged in such trade nominated by a majority of the representatives of the employees on the said Board to represent the employees be and the same is hereby constituted to consider and deal with the Appeal aforesaid against the Determination of the said Hotel Employees Board in form and manner as provided by law.

And the Honorable Sir Alexander James Peacock, His Majesty's Minister of Labour for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
