Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE SUGAR REFINERS BOARD.

Norn.-This Determination on the 5th November, 1920, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in connexion with the trade of sugar refining," has made the following Determination namely:—

(1) That this Determination shall be operative on and after the 5th November, 1920.

⁽³⁾ Definition of Juvenile Workers.—Persons under 21 years of age (other than apprentices or improvers) employed turning bags, sweeping trucks, receiving and placing sacks, driving friction which, sewing mouths of bags, trucking sugar, sheathing bags, collecting samples, labelling, filling golden syrup and treacte tims.

(4) Overtime.—All work done in excess of 48 hours in any one week shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(5) Special Rate for Suddays and Public Holidays.—All time worked excepting between 10 p.m. and midnight on Sundays. Christmas Day, and Good Friday shall be paid for at the rate of double time. All time worked, excepting between 10 p.m. and midnight, on New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Easter Monday, 21st April (Right Hours Day), King's Birthday, and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so embstituted.

(6) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at any work for which the Board has fixed the minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under tike conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can carn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE COUNTRY AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 29th October, 1920, applied to the whole of the State outside and excepting the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warrnambool; the towns of Ballarat East and Sandringham; the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol; and the shire of Braybrook.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in—

- (1) The process, trade, or business of a maker of-

 - (a) Agricultural machinery or implements;
 (b) Parts of agricultural machinery or implements;
 (c) Bag-filling machinery, bone-crushers, butter-making machinery, chaff-cutters, corn-crushing machinery, cream separators, hay presses, horse works, iron feeding troughs, lawn mowers, machinery for treating flax or hemp, maize shellers, windmills; or
- (2) Assembling or putting together any parts of machinery or implements of classes or kinds (whether the same have been made inside or outside the State) same or similar to those mentioned in paragraph (1),"
- has made the following Determination, namely :--(1) That on the 29th October, 1920, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- (3) OVERTIME.—That any employee who works for any time in excess of 48 hours in any week shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a quarter for the first six hours, and thereafter time and a half.
- (4) Special Rayes.—Time and three quarters shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, and Christmas Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for the above holidays the special rate shall be payable only on the day so substituted.
- (5) Piece-work.—The Board determines under the provisions of Section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at any work for which the Board has fixed a minimum wage, provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker-working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.
