## DETERMINATION OF THE CYCLE TRADE BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 24th April, 1920, applied to the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warrnambool; the Towns of Ballarat East and Sandringham; and the Boroughs of Maryborough, Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of bicycles, tricycles, or motor cycles, or of a maker of any part or parts (other than tires) of a bicycle, tricycle, or motor cycle," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That, on the 24th April, 1920, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(5) Double time shall be the special rate for all work done on Sunday, Good Friday, New Year's Day, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; and time and a half shall be the special rate for all work done on 26th January (Foundation Day), Easter Monday, and King's Birthday; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(6) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed in the rim-making department, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions and that such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the minimum wage fixed for the said department.

All time worked, excepting between 10 p.m. and midnight, on New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), King's Birthday, and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
