Factories and Shops Acts.

## DETERMINATION OF THE PERAMBULATOR BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 30th July, 1921, applied to the following parts of Victoria, viz.—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, and Warrnambool; the town of Sandringham; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Geelong West, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of perambulators," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 30th July, 1921, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(6) SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
