## DETERMINATION OF THE BOARDING HOUSES BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applied on the 16th January, 1922, to the whole of the State.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates, which may be paid to any persons employed in a boarding house, with accommodation for seven or more boarders," has made the following Determination, namely:—

- (1) That this Determination shall come into force and be operative on and after the 16th January, 1922.

(3) OVERTIME.—Any employee who in any week works for any time in excess of the number of hours fixed shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half, calculated on the rates fixed without board and lodging.

(4) SPECIAL RATES.—The special rates payable to persons for work done on New Year's Day, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Good Friday, and Christmas Day shall be time and a half, calculated on the rates fixed without board and lodging, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
