Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE COUNTRY BREAD BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 30th July, 1923, applied to the whole of the State OUTSIDE AND EXCEPTING the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Sandringham, and Warrnambool; the town of Geelong West; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Newtown and Chilwell, and Sebastopol.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates of payment for bread-making or baking" has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 30th July, 1923, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) OVERTIME—

- (a) That any employee (other than an apprentice) who works in any week for any time in excess of 48 hours shall be paid for such extra time at the wages rate of time and a half.
- (b) That any apprentice who works in any week for any time in excess of 48 hours shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of double time for the first eight hours, and thereafter at the rate of 2s. 4d. per hour.

(4) TIME RATE.—That any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to 24 hours, be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three per centum.

(5) SPECIAL RATES.—That time and a half shall be the rate payable for all work done on New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), 3rd June (King's Birthday), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted.
